

MUGGSY THINKS GIANTS STRONGER THAN LAST YEAR

General Resentment Reigns In Camp Over Failure Of Roush To Sign Contract; Outfield Seemingly Wanker

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Mar. 19.—Who is the dumbest guy on Giants ball club.

This is neither an important nor personal question because the Giants themselves are playing this end of the grape fruit circuit today, really would like to know. According to members of the rival teams with whom the writer talks, the many Giants have nominated other players with the outfit for this doubtful distinction that is fast becoming apparent that most of them are very dumb or all of them very mistaken.

This condition, plus a general irritation against Ed Roush for his failure to join the club when a \$20,000 contract would seem to indicate that a disquieting condition is developing in the Giants' camp. However, manager John McGraw has another story to tell.

"It's not the best club that ever was organized," he said. "It has the little weaknesses here and there, which I don't care to elaborate upon. All I want to say is that I have a smarter, faster club than last year, with more punch and squander defense, and I think it is good enough to win."

"The other contenders? Well, you must figure the Cardinals, Pirates and Reds, for one thing, and the Cubs will be dangerous. In fact, they may turn out to be the team we have to beat. Anyway I say that the club that wins the pennant will have to beat us."

McGraw declined to comment in any way on Roush's absence from the camp but his intimates made no secret of the fact that John has taken great umbrage over the matter, as had indeed the team in general. Roush, they say, has been offered \$20,000 for the season as compared with the \$10,000 he wanted from the Reds; yet, he has ignored both offers and the man who made it.

Of course, like a drug clerk who hasn't what you want, the ball club isn't like that, doesn't have "something just as good" with which to forget the absent star.

The something in this case is Edwin Ott, the seventeen-year-old catcher of last year who in the sixteen-year-old centerfielder this year. They say that Ott will be in the lineup every day by the first of June, Reds or no Reds.

The Giants have plenty of outfielders in camp but not all of them are good. In fact, the writer would venture to say that it is an open question whether the club is as strong as it was last year.

It has been weakened, beyond all doubt, at first base where Terry will appear instead of the departed Kelly. It is a stranger and second base with the uncertain Frisch replaced by Rogers Hornsby, who looks slower to me, although he is hitting well and obviously is saving himself. However, the loss of these Young in right field would hurt any club and the Giants are no exception. Farther than that a club with three untried catchers making up the entire staff of receivers is not exactly any man's earthly.

RAILROAD BOARD PAYS TRIBUTE TO ROBERT L. EATON

Passing Of Monticello Man Deplored By Colleagues In Resolutions Passed At Tallahassee Meeting

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 19.—(INS)—The State Railroad Commission has just passed a resolution to be entered permanent record in the annals of the commission, commemorating the memory of State Railroad Commissioner Robert L. Eaton of Monticello who died on Feb. 27.

"The Railroad Commissioners of Florida deeply deplore the death of Hon. Robert L. Eaton," the resolution says.

Mr. Eaton was prominent throughout the state, being by everyone who knew him and a personal friend of the Commissioners for many years before assuming the duties of his office on Jan. 1, 1927. Through intimate contact with him in the office, his associates and their employees had the opportunity of valuing his personality.

"Mr. Eaton endeavored to do right at all times; he possessed an attractive personality, and was kindly natured, whole-souled and charitable. He was endowed with executive ability and good judgment, guided at all times by a desire to be fair to his fellow men."

"Mr. Eaton was a native Floridian, born in Lake City in 1873, educated in the schools of Columbia county, and graduated from the old Florida State Agricultural College, taking an A. B. degree in 1891."

He moved to Monticello and managed the Girardeau plantation for many years and was known as the largest producer of watermelon seed in the world. He served as state labor inspector for a number of years, resigning from that office upon his selection as Railroad Commissioner.
