FIRST Y. M. C. A. CONVENTION TO BE ON TUESDAY

Reports For First Year Of Organization's Work Will Be Submitted And Officers For Year Will Be Elected

Member Of National Council Will Speak

Delegations From All Sections Of Seminole County To Attend Session

The first Seminole County Y. M. C. A. convention is to be held at the Hotel Forrest Lake Thursday evening and reports of the first year's work of the organization are to be made, board of directors and officers elected and plans for the first year to be discussed.

The banquet session, which is to start at 6:30 o'clock, is to be addressed by A. E. Roberts, of New York, who is a member of the National Y. Council and in charge of town and county work throughout the United States. He is expected to deliver a message of great importance to the Y. M. C. A. workers of Seminole County.

Delegations from every town and community in the county are to be present and individual community reports are to be read before the assembly. The group work of local leaders is expected to occupy a greater portion of the time set aside for the business of the meeting.

The public is welcome to attend the banquet and meeting, according to Y. officials, who have asked that those who intend to come telephone their reservations to the office of the Y. M. C. A. in the First National Bank Building.

Other matters of interest are to come before the Legion, one of which has to do with the selection of delegates to the state convention at Tattnall Springs, which is to begin next Monday. Four delegates and four alternates are to represent the local post at the meeting and a determined effort is to be made to bring the 1929 convention to Sanford.

The game next Monday is being advertised throughout the central part of the state and on the east coast. Advertising and publicity in charge of A. J. Holt, who today is touring the east coast cities within 80 miles from Sanford.

T. W. Lawton, superintendent of public instruction, is to close all schools Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock and all school children who came to see the game are to be the guests of the Legion. Both white and black children are to be admitted free. The game is to start at 3:30 o'clock.

Major Forrest Lake is expected to issue a proclamation calling on all business houses in the city to close promptly at 2 o'clock in order to allow all employees to see the game. One of the largest crowds in the history of baseball in Sanford is expected to be present.

Ty Cobb, Eddie Collins and Zack Wheat are to be in the lineup. Conie Mack, manager of the Athletics, guaranteed the Legion that each of the three stars would appear in the game.

Cobb and Collins, both of whom were managers of American League clubs last season, are playing under the same banner for the first time in their long careers. Wheat, also a veteran, will add color to the game through his presence in the Athletic lineup.

MARTIN WILL ASK FOR CHANGES IN ELECTION LAWS

State Executive Will Seek Statute That Will Allow Citizens To Cast Ballots If Absent On Election Day

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 21—(INS)—Stressing the fact that a man or woman voter of Florida is obliged of the franchise if absent from the state on election day and that there is practically no absent voter's ballot in this state, Governor John W. Martin will ask the state legislature to amend the antiquated election laws.

Governor Martin will ask the 122nd session of the state legislature to pass a statute permitting absent voters to cast their ballots in a sealed envelope to be held in the custody of county officials until election day, when the envelope can be deposited in the proper voting and opened and counted with the others.

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Senate Campaign Probing Group Prepares For New Invasion Of Pennsylvania

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21—(INS)—Armed with the mandate of the Reed campaign fund investigating committee, Jerry C.
