## Sanford Approves \$1.6 Million Budget

By a three-to-one vote, the Sanford City Commission last night approved a \$1,641,016 general operating budget for fiscal 1968-69.

Commissioners M. L. Raborn and A. L. Wilson voted "nay" and by their actions forced a second reading of the document scheduled for Sept. 23, before adoption can become official on Oct. 1.

Both commissioners had voted against the 50 cents per month garbage collection fee increase recently enacted by the city as a means of obtaining enough revenue to finance a five per cent across the board pay increase for city employees.

On this subject, Commissioner Earl Higginbotham desired the following statements be inserted in minutes of meeting: "Due to the state prohibiting city from raising millage rate after next year, we must raise our garbage service charge by 50 cents to meet our expenditures."

Higginbotham left no doubt that this action was a method used by city to get around state millage-raising law by making what would probably have been a millage increase into a refuse pickup fee.

In a series of companion resolutions and ordinances all dealing with budget and taxes, the Commission approved: Resolution appropriating unexpended cash surplus of fiscal 1967-68;

First reading of ordinance making appropriations for 1968-69;

Ordinance determining and fixing rate of taxation and setting annual tax levy;

Resolution designating three local banks as city depositories for 1968-69;

Adopt new pay schedules and work hours, effective Oct. 1.

## Goldsboro Rec Contract Let

Manuel Builders, Inc., of Orlando, was awarded contract for construction of the Goldsboro Recreation Center by action of the Sanford City Commission last night.

The Orange County firm submitted the lowest of three bids and was given 105 days to complete the facility after the \$76,986 estimate was accepted.

Two other bidders were Harvey Spears Construction Company at \$80,000 and Shoemaker Construction Company at \$81,000.

Bids were tabulated in the office of John A. Burton IV, architect for the facility. The proposed site is on Persimmon Avenue near McCracken Road.

## In Detention Of Young Mar Grand Jury Probe Asked

### Youth Jailed 5 Months Bulletin!



Sheriff Peter Millott this afternoon confirmed he had made a noon telephone call to state attorney's office requesting immediate grand jury investigation into charges made today before County Commission.

Grand jury probe into the apparent "illegal imprisonment" of John Burgess Jr. in the county jail for some five months was requested by the Board of County Commissioners today and Sheriff Peter Millott.

Commissioner W. Lawrence Swofford joined by Commissioner Edward Varborough initiated the action to determine the official responsible for the youth being held for the extended period though charges against him had been dismissed.

Agencies requested investigated by the Commission are the office of Sheriff Peter D. Millott, District 4 Peace Justice Alfred Davis and Public Defender Thomas Sawyer.

Commissioner Chairman John Alexander in agreeing to the resolution, unanimously adopted by the board asking for the probe, said the case is a "point of public interest."

The incident first came to light when a representative from "After Care," a state re-habilitation service for youths on probation, discovered the situation in a check of county jail for former inmates from Martinsburg School.

Burgess was arrested by Sanford police officers March 6 and charged with larceny of an auto. When the 18-year-old Sanford youth appeared before Peace Justice Davis, the charges were dismissed and he was ordered released due to failure of the accusing party to appear.

The "After Care" agent is reported to have contacted Davis' office and determined that Burgess should have been released five months previously.

At that time, Millott said he later received a copy of the release with an April 18 date and released the prisoner Aug. 19. Millott said the situation was regrettable but "we have to depend on the judges being accurate."

Public Defender Speer was assigned to the case on July 20 almost three weeks before the youth was released.

## Whipping Case Report Asked

Sheriff Peter Millott was asked to come before the County Commission today to "explain or deny" failure of his department to take action against the persons responsible for the "alleged beating, whipping or attempted murder" of 18-year-old McNeil Simmons of Winwood Park.

Commissioner W. Lawrence Swofford, who first asked for a grand jury investigation into the matter said to have happened in June, later amended his motion to permit the sheriff to explain the incident.

Swofford said the youth was beaten beyond recognition with a machete or hatchet near the Negro community east of Altamonte Springs. "The people are quite concerned that no action has been taken," the district three County Commissioner said.

The victim is reported to have left the state on advice of the sheriff's department, Swofford declared. "I understand armed persons are regularly patrolling the neighborhood looking for the 'right man,'" the Commissioner said, explaining that the assailants of the 18-year-old Simmons youth had apparently been mistaken for another.

"It is a dangerous situation," Swofford said, "with people carrying firearms."

Swofford said the Simmons youth was hospitalized for an extended period of time following the beating and is reported to have had some 600 stitches.

Sheriff's deputies who investigated the incident at first thought to be a hit-and-run were Jack Bushon and Kenneth Brown. Highway Patrolman Robert Lovring also looked into the matter, but turned all information over to the deputies when hospital authorities determined it was not a hit-and-run.

"Something must be done," Swofford declared.

Swofford stated he began to gather information about the "alleged attempted murder" when he was contacted about the matter by The Sanford Herald.

# Arabs, Israelis In Gun Battle

TEL AVIV (AP) — Arab gunners shelled the Israeli town of Beit She'an with 120mm rockets Monday night, and several hours later the Israelis retaliated by hammering the Jordanian town of Irbid with artillery.

It was the first time the Arabs have used such heavy rockets and the first time since June 4 that populated areas in the two-bird Beisan Valley have come under attack.

The rocket launcher, mounted on a truck, hurled eight projectiles at Beit She'an at 7 p.m., in a 15-minute session.

There was no word of casualties from the retaliatory Israeli attack.

A reliable source said the Arab rockets were dug in for the night, one of the most vulnerable spots troops can be hit. The Marines apparently were caught before they could get their bodies dug.

A mile away from the 20th Marines' battleground, Marines from the 9th Regiment clashed with a North Vietnamese platoon of perhaps 40 men in fortified positions. Jet fighters bombed the positions until the enemy soldiers withdrew as darkness was approaching.

U.S. headquarters said 27 North Vietnamese also were killed in this fight. The Marines had no dead and seven were wounded.

A spokesman said that troops from the two Marine regiments are conducting sweep operations in close proximity to each other, trying to clear the area of North Vietnamese troops pressing along the central DMZ.

With the South abandoned, there are indications that the North Vietnamese now plan to attack heavy pressure on the Red Pile, and perhaps lay siege to it. Stable North Vietnamese forces have been making in the area, and the Marines have dashed several times recently with enemy units of platoon and company size. Two big munitions stockpiles containing hundreds of rockets and mortar rounds were found by Marines last week.

After the North Vietnamese who attacked the 9th Marines pulled out, the Marines swept the area and uncovered what they uncovered a third big munitions stockpile. It included 1,800 rounds of mortars, rockets and rifle grenades, more than 200 hand grenades.

South Vietnamese rangers also were hit hard in the northern war zone when an estimated 400 North Vietnamese attacked a ranger battalion's camp about 10 miles below Da Nang, killed 22 and wounded 86. But a second battalion of rangers caught up with the Communist attackers several hours later and reported killing 42 of them.

At the Saer Canal, where 10 Israeli soldiers and 15 Egyptian soldiers were reported killed in a prolonged artillery duel, more than 400 Arab refugees were exchanged and Egyptian boat crews and Israeli soldiers clank and laughed with each other as they helped the refugees.

Under the supervision of the International Red Cross, 225 Palestinian Arabs sought in Egypt during the 1967 war and 230 Egyptians caught in the Israeli advance were exchanged between the two halves of El Qantara.

Meanwhile, Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan told a United Labor party rally that the Israelis "have to be ready for the possible renewal of war, and in this case we must be equipped to win a full victory."

"I don't know if it will be another war," he continued, "but hope the Egyptians will not make the fatal mistake and be misled by their leaders into sparking another war against Israel."

## Marines Trapped

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese troops caught a column of U.S. Marines as the Leathen rocks were digging in for the night Monday, killed 25 and wounded 126, more than 200 mortar rounds and a hail of small arms fire.

The Americans struck back with mortars, artillery and helicopter gunships. The Marines reported 27 of the enemy killed in the 10-hour fight four miles south of the central part of the demilitarized zone.

The Marines were from the 20th Regiment, the defenders of the Khe Sanh who held out against a 71-day Communist siege last winter, and then abandoned that outpost. The casualties Monday were comparable to those in the worst days at Khe Sanh.

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## Johnson Pushes For Top Meet

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson is keeping his options open for a summit meeting of the Vietnam war allies this fall, possibly in mid-October.

Diplomatic sources say there are strong hints the President would like to fulfill the promise of the last Honolulu communique for another summit meeting before the end of the year.

A speedier preparation for the meeting could be quickly carried out once the decision is reached, sources said.

Johnson's last meeting with South Vietnam's leaders was in July at Honolulu.

Before that session, White House aides had said that it would be kept in keeping with a Johnson policy to hold a summit of the Vietnam war every six months.

One question puzzling the political experts here is the effect such a meeting would have on the presidential campaign of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey. U.S. officials see no like. However, Johnson will back-track from the strong positions he took in two recent speeches when he said there would be no withdrawal of troops from the demilitarized zone that divides North and South Vietnam and indicated there would be no let-up in the limited bombing of the North.

According to one view, the question is how much would be gained in re-opening U.S. allies about the future course of American policy in the Far East and how much would be lost at home by such assurances.

At the same time, North Vietnam appears to be hardening its negotiating position in Paris, according to analysts here.

The demand that the United States recognize and negotiate with the National Liberation Front on matters dealing with the war in the South has been emphasized repeatedly in recent weeks by North Vietnam Premier Pham Van Dong and Nguyen Thanh Le, the political adviser at the Paris talks who is believed to be handling negotiations in Paris, according to analysts here.

Only about 10 persons showed up at a meeting of county officials from throughout the state called by Rep. George Stallings, D-Jacksonville. The meeting was called for lack of support.

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## Soviet Guns Ring City

PRAGUE (AP) — Thousands of Soviet troops ring Prague in the city of Cape Canaveral.

The steel ring of Soviet artillery is evident to anyone traveling outside the now tranquil but still city. Heavy cannon, rockets and missiles point at Czechoslovakia's capital from north, south, and east and west.

One military expert says there is enough artillery now only to destroy the 600-year-old city but to "overkill" if shelling is ordered.

A short ride on the main highway toward the village of Dubice and there are 24 big guns set up in the alfalfa fields, their barrels pointed toward the capital.

Twelve are lined up in a row to the right of the road; there are two groups of six on the left.

The guns appear to be 122mm heavy artillery. Two more Soviet Praga is less than eight miles away so these weapons could hit the presidential palace and the opposite bank of the Vltava River.

A mile or so farther are five batteries of multiple rocket launchers pointing at the city.

A few hundred yards beyond the end of Prague's Strazovka street line, two more Soviet 175 medium tanks are parked, their guns directed toward the city.

Northwest of Prague, near the village of Hornonovice, more than 20 big guns are covered in a field, their barrels include at least 16 mm howitzers, six huge 152mm cannon plus 50mm guns and 81mm anti-aircraft batteries.

## Space Chief Quits Post

WASHINGTON (AP) — James E. Webb, who presided over America's entry into the space age as head of a U.S. space program he believes ranks second to Russia's.

Webb announced his retirement Monday and said Dr. Thomas O. Paine, deputy administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, would become acting head of the agency.

Under the proposal by Sen. J. Bennett Johnston, D-La., a committee member opposing the proposed change would have assumed administration for 90 per cent of all firearms.

## HHH Vows Fight On Crime

Democratic candidate Hubert H. Humphrey, declaring the riots will be stamped out, has promised to forge a federal, state and local government attack on crime and civil disorder if he wins the presidency.

Republican candidate Richard M. Nixon, meanwhile Monday, said he would try to "eliminate a generation of Americans" who are addicted to drugs.

Third party candidate George C. Wallace said he will announce his vice presidential running mate in the next few days, and he said both the Republican and Democratic candidates "are beginning to sound like me."

Humphrey's pledge to stop the riots came in a statement, in which he endorsed 80 recommendations made up by his special task force and called for an "honest, clear discussion" of the crime and disorder problem.

"This is not a matter for fear-mongering, slogan or empty promises," Humphrey said. "These leaders can only lead to national disaster."

His program included federal funds for better paid, trained and equipped local police; "highly trained, highly mobile units which can act immediately to stop civil disorders by a man like J. Edgar Hoover."

Wallace was in Dallas for the Texas state convention of the American Independent party.

## Collins, Gurney On TV Tonight

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Democrat LeRoy Collins and Republican Edward Gurney, candidates for the U.S. Senate, are scheduled to air their views on a statewide television hookup tonight.

The candidates will be questioned by newsmen on a 9 p.m. program over education television stations. Some commercial stations may tape the program for later broadcast.

ISLAHORA, Fla. (AP)—A Spanish galleon sunk in a 1733 hurricane has been located by treasure hunters here and is providing a wealth of artifacts including an array of toys apparently designated for the Christmas market in Spain.

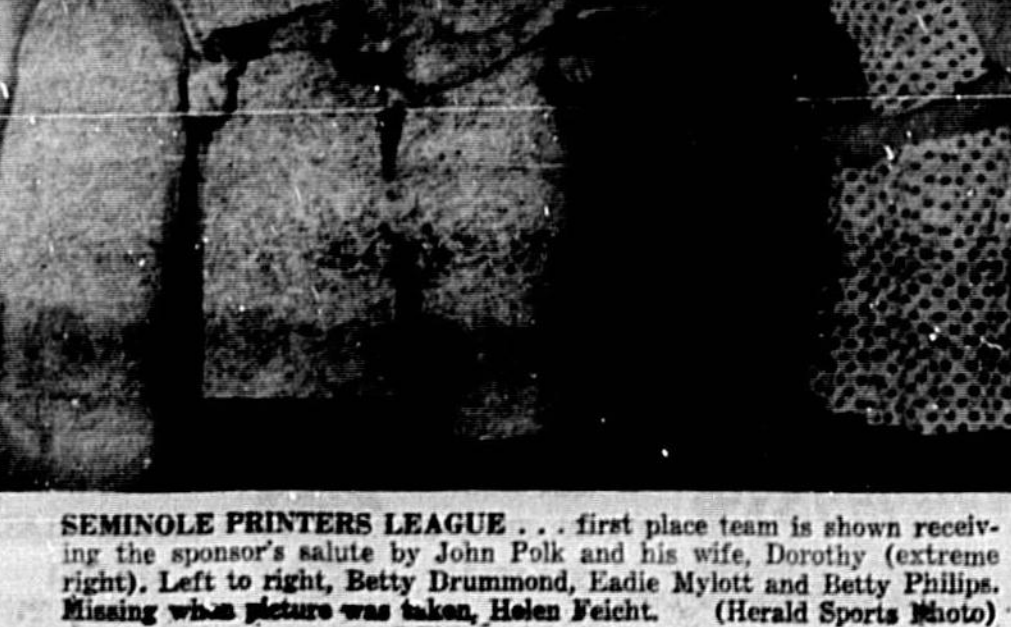

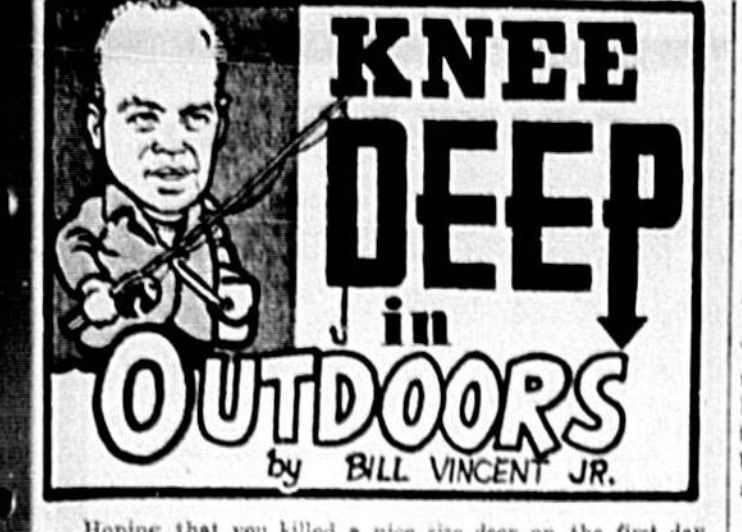

TALLAHASSEE — Indian summer is just around the corner and the 1968-69 hunting season is in the immediate future. The best way to enjoy a hunting trip to the fullest is to make adequate advance plans, according to the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

With the hunting season about to begin in earnest, the Commission advises sportsmen that proper planning can make the difference between a good day afield or a disappointing, troublesome experience. Here are some suggestions which will help insure proper preparation.

1. Dove hunters should locate promising dove fields now. Doves are usually in search of a place to hunt now. The season opens in late September and early October.
2. When hunting on private lands, always get advance permission before you enter. Share your bag with the land owner.
3. Make sure that each member of the hunting party knows and understands the rules of safe gun handling.
4. Have a physical checkup and condition yourself for the unusual activity involved in most hunting. Each year more people die in the field from heart seizures than gun accidents.
5. Condition your hunting dog before the season opens. Check regulations for dog training laws and seasons.
6. Visit a trap or shoot range to get back in the swing of things. Be sure to sight in your hunting rifle before opening day.
7. Duck hunters should check decoys, anchors and deejay lines. Now is the time to begin construction of duck blinds.
8. Obtain a copy of the 1968-69 hunting regulations and study rules applying to any game you may be hunting. Obtain maps of wildlife management areas and become familiar with the roads and landmarks.
9. Obtain the proper hunting license and wildlife management area stamp. Hunting licenses and wildlife management area stamps are available at the office of all County Judges or their authorized license agents. Duck stamps are available at U. S. Post Offices.
10. Resolve to conduct yourself in a sportsmanlike manner during the 1968-69 hunting season. Courtesy on the part of all will pay big dividends.

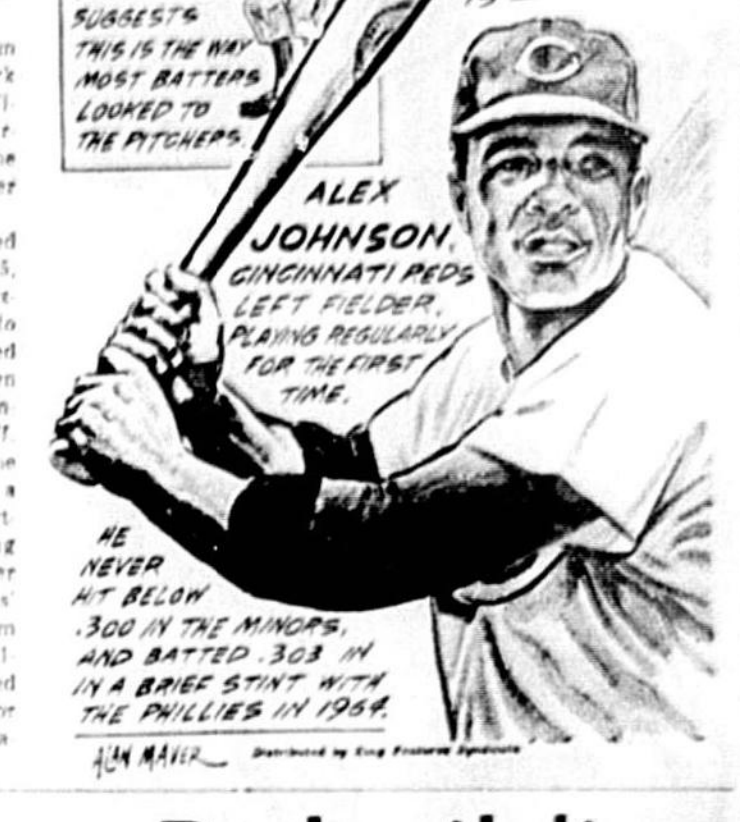

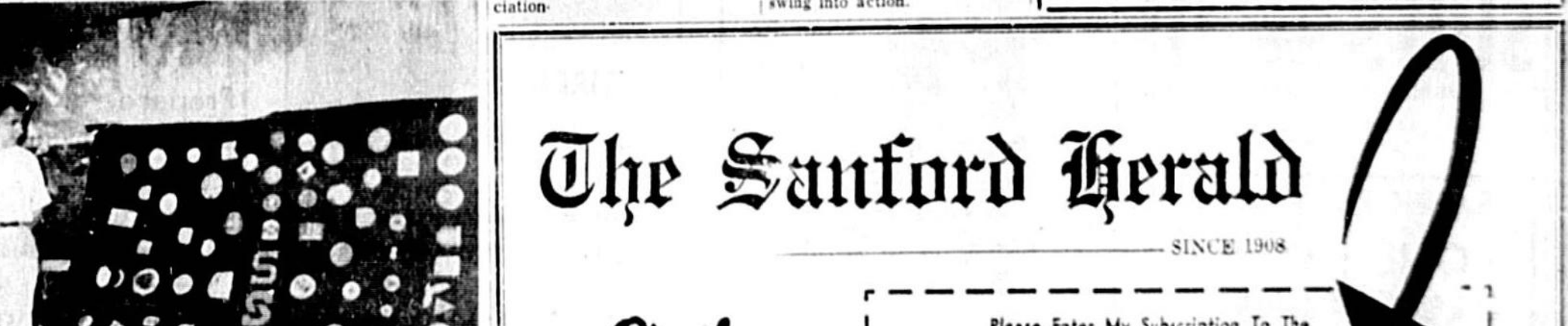

**Hearty Beef Soup**

In a large heavy kettle combine 1 1/2 pounds boneless beef chuck, 1 soupbone, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 2 bay leaves, and 16 cups water; heat to boiling. Stir in 4 or 5 medium-size carrots, pared and sliced; 1 medium-size onion, chopped (1/2 cup); 1 cup chopped celery, 1 cup chopped cabbage. Simmer 2 1/2 hours, or until meat is tender. Remove meat, bone, and bay leaves from kettle. Cut meat in bite-size pieces; stir back into kettle with 1 can (1 1/2 pound) Italian style tomatoes, 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 beef flavor bouillon cube, and a dash of oregano. Simmer 1/4 hour longer. Makes 8 servings.

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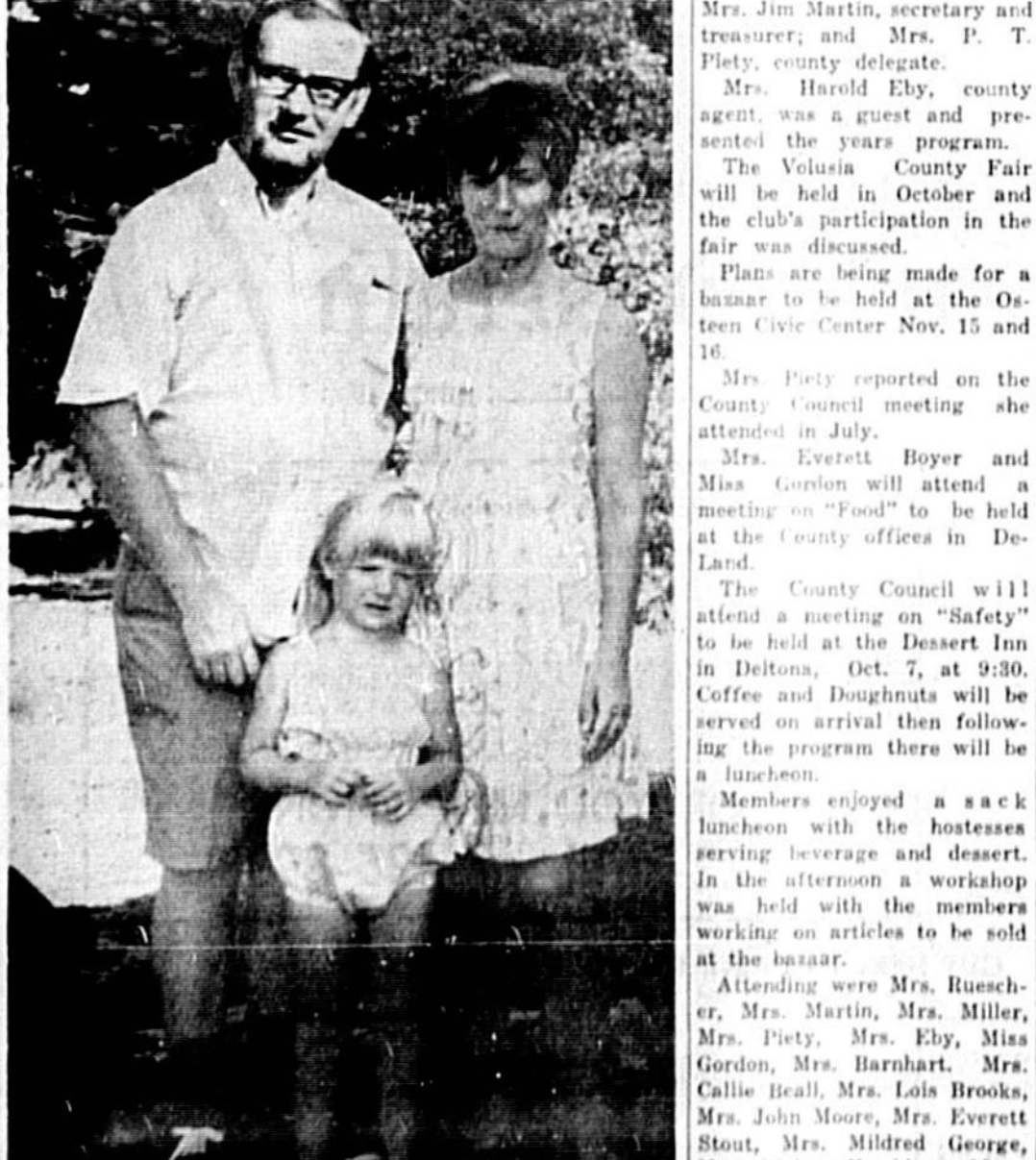

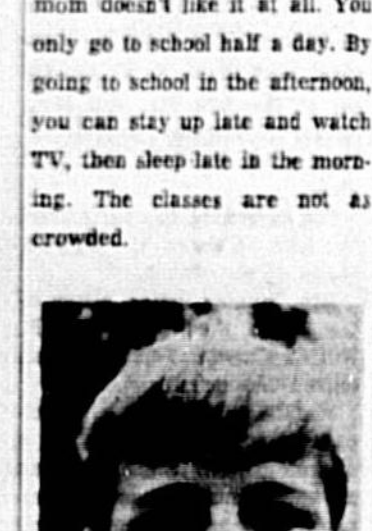

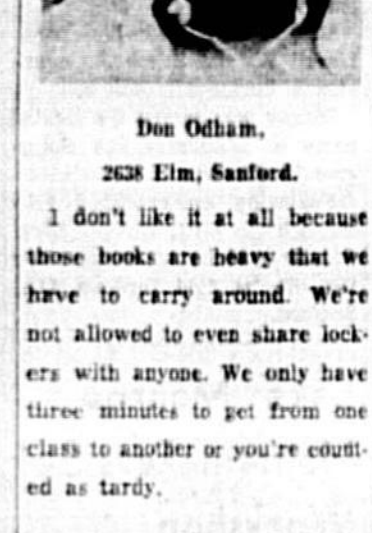

### Dems Split; Law Suit Considered

Consideration is being given by certain county Democratic party chairmen to instituting legal action to force the state committee to fulfill the requirements of law and return money to local committees for use in the November elections, Jans Adriatico, Seminole County Democratic chairman, told The Herald today. Mrs. Adriatico reported she had attended the meeting of the Association of Democratic Chairmen held at Tampa. Pat Thomas, state chairman; Hazel Tally, national committeewoman, and Ann Cramer, vice chairman, were present at the meeting, Mrs. Adriatico said. "Thomas offered the county chairmen \$25,000 in cash with stipulation that it be used for television, bumper stickers or newspaper advertising as set up by the professional agency hired by the state committee. This sum if equally divided among the 67 counties, would have been less than \$400 per county. "Rep. Henry Land, chairman of Orange County Democratic executive committee, successfully moved that the county chairmen reject the offer of the \$25,000. "Mrs. Adriatico pointed out that if the \$25,000 were accepted by the county chairmen this would set a precedent and that "we are governed by a law which states that two-thirds of the qualifying fees shall be used to promote the candidacy of candidates for county office. This would mean that Seminole County Democratic committee would be entitled to approximately \$6,800 in lieu of \$400 as offered. "A principle is involved," Mrs. Adriatico declared, "and that is we cannot merely give lip service to the words 'law and order' but we must live by these words and set an example for all to uphold. "Discussion on the floor was that various chairmen have made numerous attempts to contact the state committee but were given little or no consideration in the past. Several of the chairmen stated their committees are ready to file suit against the state committee. "The Seminole County committee at its regular meeting last week authorized contribution of \$25 to the Association of Democratic Chairmen and wished Mrs. Adriatico "good luck" in her effort along with the other county chairmen particularly in the Central Florida area of obtaining moneys from the state committee. The money referred to came from the filing fees of candidates for county office.

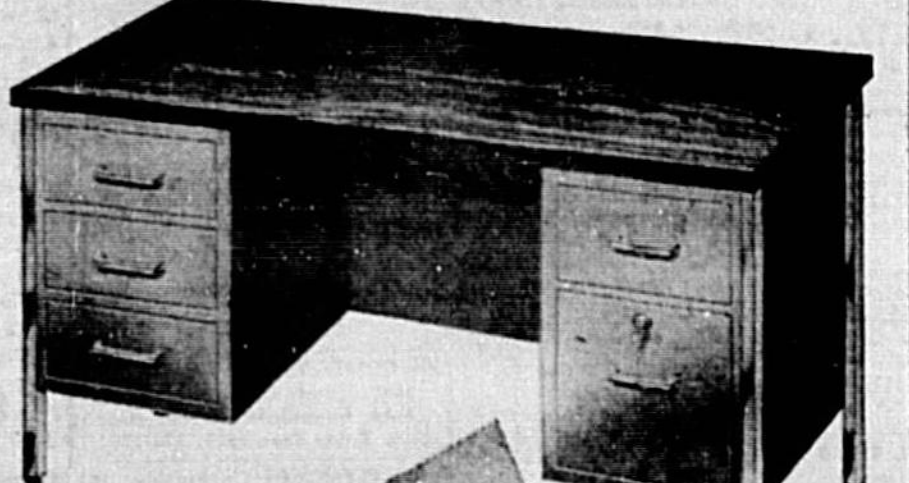

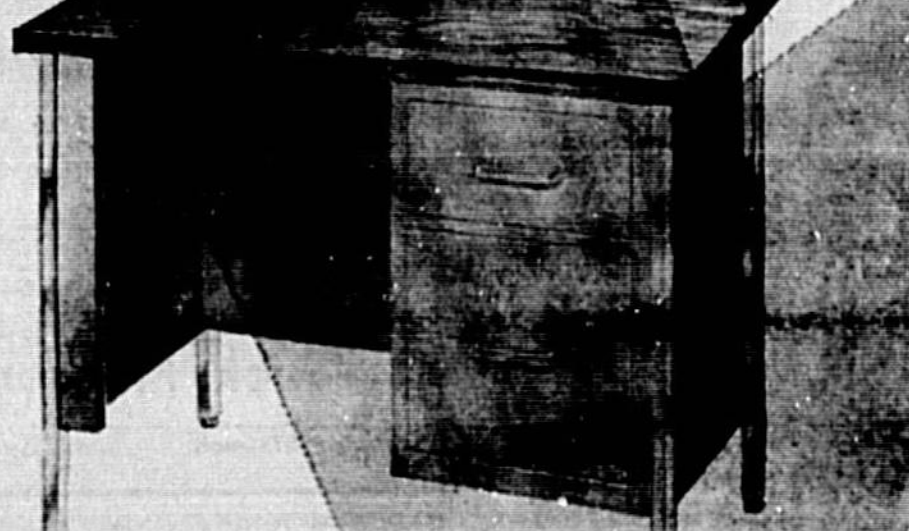

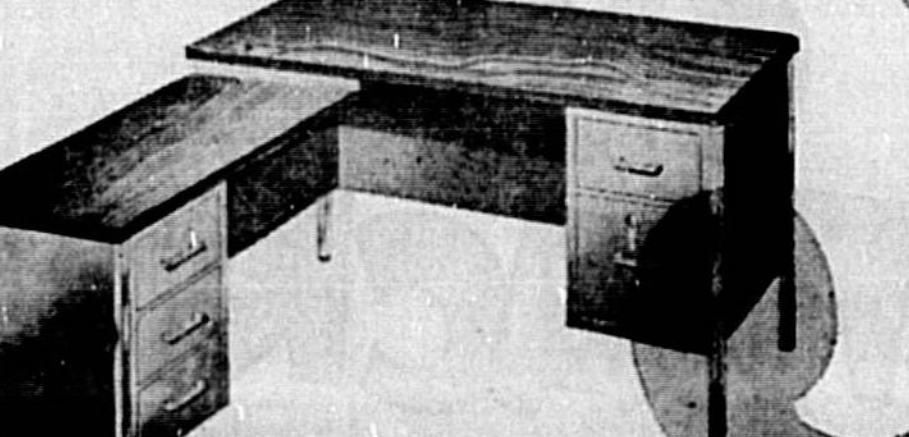

## Milliot Clears Air On Beating

By BILL SCOTT  
 Sheriff Peter Milliot today, in an effort to "clear the air" in the backdrop investigation of the beating of an 18-year-old youth, released a memorandum to the press and a copy of a letter sent by him to an interested person some weeks ago.

Milliot released the information after allegations were leveled against his department by County Commissioner W. Lawrence Swafford at Tuesday's regular County Commission meeting. The sheriff did not identify the addresser of the letter, but he said he had not received a copy of a letter from the person some weeks ago.

On September 17, 1968, since this matter had been brought to the attention of the public by others, and since our hope of avoiding an investigation that might lead to other unnecessary incidents is no longer possible, I formally requested the Sem-

County Grand Jury to investigate this situation.

"My intentions in doing this are twofold. First I want to clear the air and let the people know what the actual facts are. Secondly, I am hopeful that the Grand Jury will be able to look into the involvement of Commissioner Swafford, and some others, while they are under oath, in the incidents that followed the actual beating of McNeil Simmons." Letter to the community leader follows:

"This will acknowledge and than you for yours of July 13, 1968.

"On June 15, 1968, this office received a call stating that a person had been injured by a hit-and-run automobile on North Street, in Altamonte Springs.

"When we arrived upon the scene we found that the injured person was McNeil Simmons. At that point, we did not have any reason to doubt that he had been hit by an automobile. An appropriate Complaint Record was filed in our public records.

"Subsequently, after the Simmons boy had been examined by a doctor, we were advised by that doctor that McNeil was not the victim of an automobile accident. He had been beaten.

"As our investigation continued, we learned that this boy was apparently mistaken for another and beaten by individuals who had been beaten.

"The Commission had attempted to meet with Williams several weeks ago and had scheduled a meeting at the courthouse, but the state officer canceled the meeting on the appointed day.

**Wanted: Wooden Indian**

Navy personnel stationed aboard the USS Seminole currently based in the waters off Vietnam want an appropriate mascot, preferably a wooden Indian.

Appeal for the "mascot" was directed to the office of Gov. Claude Kirk by Mrs. George Smith, whose husband is stationed aboard the ship, and then referred by the governor to the Seminole County Commission.

County Commission is faced with the dilemma of not being able to expend county funds for the "mascot" and are relying on the public along with individual county commissioner's efforts to obtain a suitable memento for the servicemen.

Howard Wheelchel, Sanford finance director, confirmed today that city had received a September check for \$21,787.13 from the State Beverage Department.

Check is refund for the cigarette tax collected by city during the month of July and is approximately \$5,000 more than received a year ago during September.

According to the tax figure, city already has received \$84,775.20 during state fiscal year, and according to Wheelchel, this is approximately \$20,000 over what was received a year ago.

The city tax officer said the increase was figured in the

present 1967-68 city budget, which will cease at the end of this month, when new city budget adopted Monday night by City Commission will become effective.

Wheelchel said new budget projected \$50,000 more in cigarette taxes and approximately \$250,000 had been figured as year's total cigarette tax receipts in 1966-69 budget.

Wheelchel explained that cigarette tax receipts have to be estimated a year in advance for sake of budget adoption. City's fiscal year begins with October and ends in September, while state follows a July through June budget year.

The Sanford finance man also explained that a lag of approximately two months in actual sale of cigarettes to refund of taxes due cities and counties was routine.

Other smoke tax information from state revealed that Seminole County received a \$3,680.01 check this month for tax collections made by county.

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## Sales Tax Divvy Up

State sales taxes collected in Seminole County during the month of August were up nearly 62 per cent over the same period last year, Fred O. Dickinson Jr., state comptroller, reported to The Sanford Herald today.

Some \$21,818.24 was collected last month in the county as compared to \$12,145.25 in August, 1967. Collections followed the state-wide trend, however, of being down from July's total of \$22,818.18.

Statewide more than \$411 million were collected in August, up some 71.8 per cent over the August, 1967 total of \$23.9 million.

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
