Brumley Replies To Mayor Blow

Brumley told The Herald in a prepared statement, "In response to the information letter of April 13, 1970, from Mayor Curtis Blow, while I do not want to become involved in a controversy with him, in view of the recent newspaper publicity as to the letter, I feel I must make a statement.

Blow charged that Brumley did not follow through on collecting damage repayments on a city loader damaged by two juveniles of the estimated \$200 damage done to the equipment received on June 19, 1970.

Brumley stated, "There are no moral charges against him but he did not elaborate on the other charges which have been termed as opinions of the mayor and not record.

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Hearing Set For Agent

A May 14 hearing by the State Insurance Commission into allegations involving a Sanford insurance agent has been scheduled tentatively in the state office building at Winter Park.

According to a statement to day from Charles McIntosh, deputy insurance commissioner, the hearing resulted after an investigation by the insurance commission of Everett Harper, McIntosh declined to reveal the nature of the charges against Harper, but said "under our insurance code, there is a chapter dealing with suspension of license. The insurance commission has investigated an agent and allegations were drawn up and submitted to Harper. These allegations were answered by the agent and after submission to Tallahassee, it was decided to have the hearing."

McIntosh said the investigation files would not be divulged before the hearing, but since the session will be opened to the public, anyone can hear the charges at that time. The Herald telephoned Harper's office this morning for comment but was subsequently advised by his attorney, Vernon Mize: "We do not wish to make a statement at this time."

Taxpayer Revolts Surface In Education Voting

Good Business

As a word power, as well as a sea-faring nation, dependent upon world trade for sustenance, the U.S. had no alternative but to finally mend its fences in the matter of merchant ships.

However, there is another side to the merchant ship program that is still not understood in some quarters. That side is stated by James J. Reynolds, president of the American Institute of Merchant Shipping.

"Too long," says Mr. Reynolds, "has there been the feeling in this country by the uniformed, both in and out of government, that the Merchant Marine is a drain on the economy rather than an asset that has survived . . . off federal funds with little, if any, economic justification for its existence. This is not so. I have proof the American Merchant Marine is a proven money-maker and money-saver for this country."

For proof, Mr. Reynolds cites the findings of the two-year study being undertaken by Harbridge House, entitled "The United States Merchant Marine in National Perspective."

In the ten-year period under study, total balance of payments impact as a result of U.S. Merchant Marine operations was about \$7.5 billion — on the favorable side. Under the category of national security, the availability of U.S. merchant ships saved the government from having to pay foreign-flag carriers an additional \$4 billion for the shipment of military cargo in the past decade.

Republican state leaders literally pulled the rug out from under U. S. Rep. William Cramer and Democratic leaders this week when G. Harold Carwell formally announced he had resigned from the U. S. Appellate Court to seek the GOP nomination for the U. S. Senate.

Months and months ago this column reported that Cramer would drop out of the race for Senate. It seems this was after Osborne announced. And this column has been pooh-poohed for making the statement.

Now that there is formidable opposition in Carwell, the runner-up in the primary will announce formally early next week that he is withdrawing from the senatorial race. (We do not make up these rumors—we just report them.)

There is another possibility in this Carwell-Cramer race. Cramer has continually hinted and the White House has denied that Nixon supports Cramer for the Senate.

One thing about the Carwell announcement, Governor Kirk landed on both feet. After biting into the Manatee County school problem and getting his hands slapped by the federal district judge and the U.S. Supreme Court, the Carwell announcement put Kirk in a favorable light with the public once again.

It's a long road to the September primaries and Carwell could stumble. His only previous try at elective office was an unsuccessful 1948 campaign for the Georgia Legislature distinguished by his declaration of belief in the concept of white supremacy.

"If he is truly mediocre, it will come out. He can't hide from the cameras now," said Sen. Lee Weisenborn (D-Miami). Cramer is one of Florida's most experienced politicians.

Kirk, facing stiff opposition from millmiller Eckerd of Belleair, was obvious by his presence at Carwell's announcement in Miami. Kirk employs Carwell's son-in-law, Fenton Langston, as an attorney.

"These licenses are extremely valuable," Eckerd said. "They are sold by the state, by the taxpayers, for no more than \$2,900. And, in one larger county at least, each of these licenses are immediately worth up to \$40,000 on the open market. That's a handy profit for someone but not for the taxpayer."

"It isn't hard to see," the candidate continued, "how an in-house peddle could easily raise several millions of dollars. I'm saying let's remove this and any other temptation of this nature."

As written, state law provides for one liquor establishment for each 2,500 population, according to the most recent census, Eckerd said. "I am not at all sure we need 650 new bars in Florida in 1970. Has anyone here had trouble finding a place to drink lately?" he asked.

Electoral College Doomed?

Nixon had proposed \$256.5 million for the Apollo program but the House panel boosted this to \$1.1 billion.

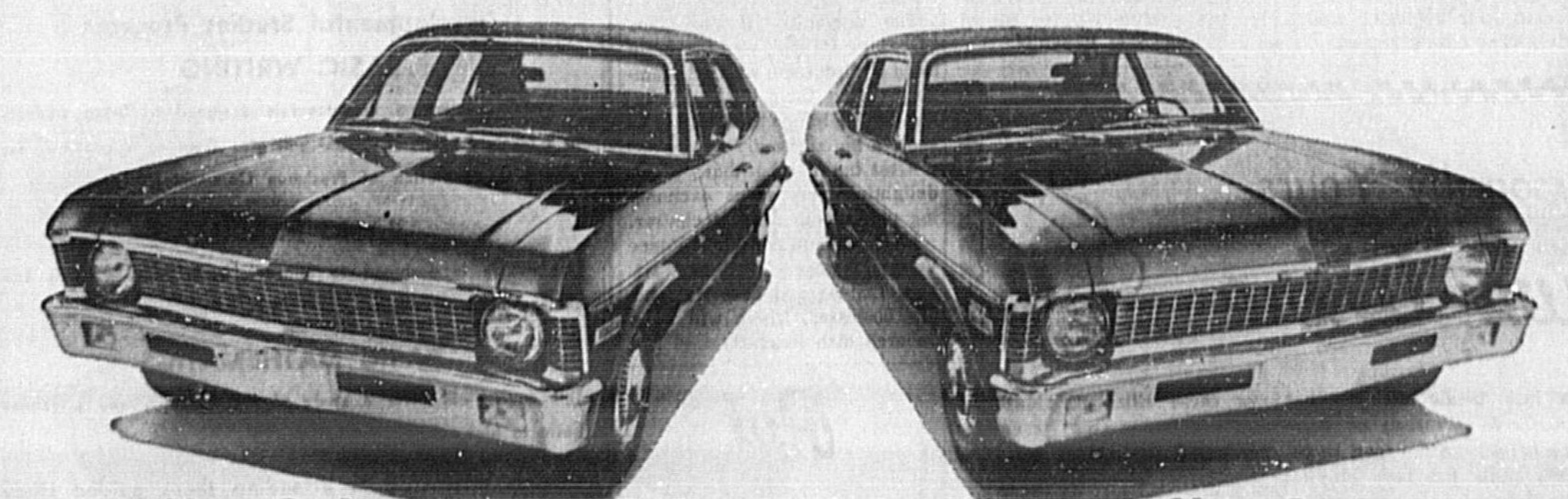

Then he counts his sure tricks and arrives at 11. There will be a 12th trick if either diamonds or clubs breaks evenly and 13 tricks if both suits break as friends of the declarer should. So match-point South runs off his top cards as fast as he can and winds up losing the last two tricks to East.

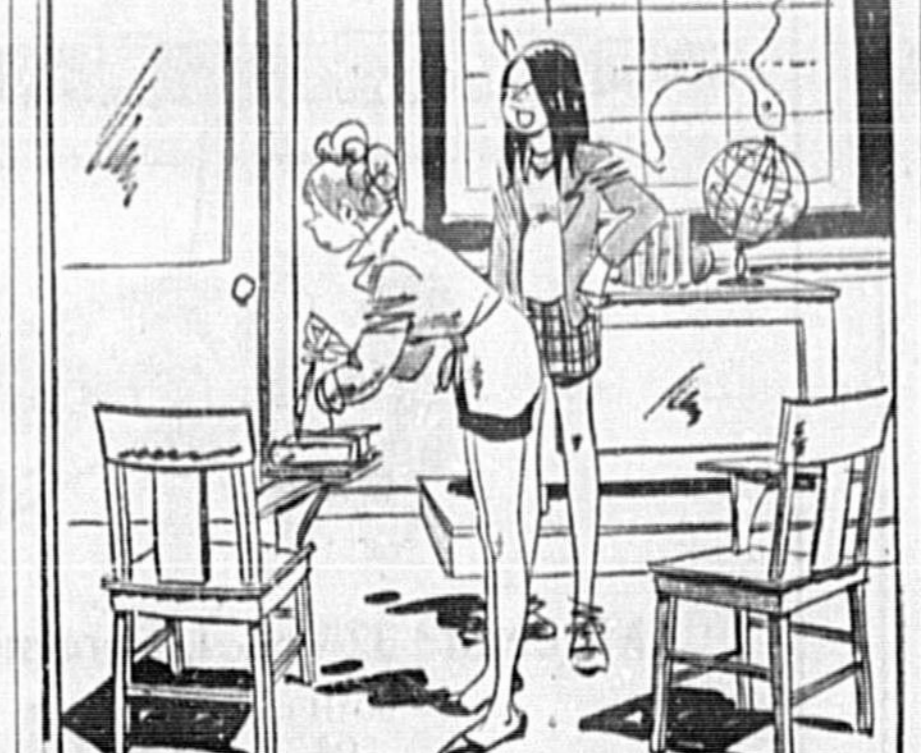

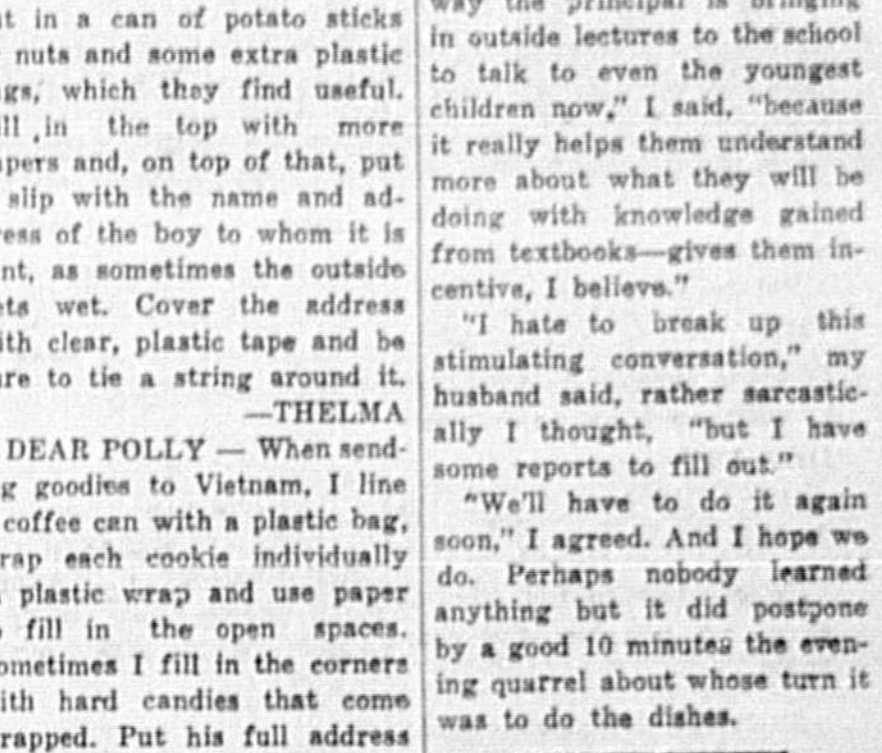

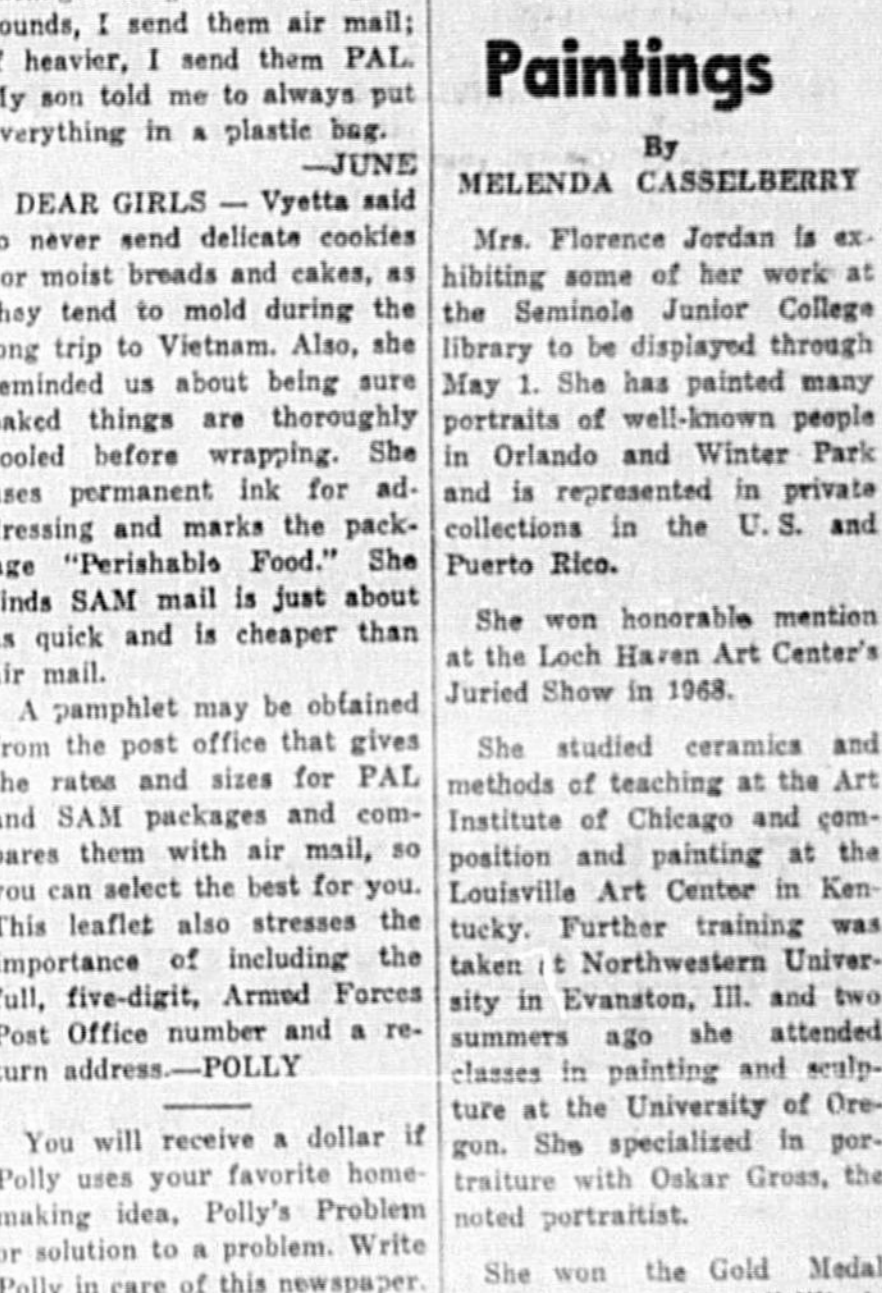

Forays Planned Into Cambodia

S. Viets Strengthen Forces

SAIGON (AP) — The South Vietnamese army is putting more artillery and troops along several hundred miles of the Cambodian border in preparation for more armed forays into Cambodia in pursuit of North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops, informed Vietnamese sources said today.

"We have gone into Cambodia many times," said one source. "We expect to continue. We are paying more attention to the western side of South Vietnam. We are reinforcing it with more artillery. There are more air strikes along the border. We are reinforcing our outposts."

The building is heaviest in South Vietnam's 3rd Corps Tactical Zone, an area of 10,000 square miles sharing 231 miles of border with Cambodia. The border area runs in an arc from 35 miles west of Saigon to 100 miles northeast of the capital.

The sources estimate 40,000 to 50,000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops are in eastern Cambodia. One source said Cambodian troops had withdrawn from their posts along the border because they were "afraid of the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese."

This source said there is no official agreement between South Vietnamese and Cambodian authorities for South Vietnamese forces to cross into Cambodia.

"The Cambodians don't approve officially," he said. "They just don't care. They are inert. We just inform them we're going in on 'hot pursuit' and go."

The source said American advisers are also helping to plan the forays. He said the U.S. Command had tried to discourage the South Vietnamese operations into Cambodia.

The South Vietnamese operations across the border are forcing the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong to pull deeper into Cambodia. One source said Cambodian troops had withdrawn from their posts along the border because they were "afraid of the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese."

6 Hostages Freed

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad (AP) — Mutinous soldiers Thursday released six hostages — a high-ranking officer and five women — from Trinidad's military base, where they are held up in support of Black Power demands.

Col. Jeffrey Serrette, a former commander of Trinidad's 720-man army, obtained the releases in negotiations with the rebels at the Tereba Bay base site of Trinidad's only army.

Serrette also persuaded the mutineers to transfer army officers who were holding hostages from detention cells to house arrest in their quarters on the base.

The mutineers were reported asking for amnesty for more than a score of Black Power leaders arrested under the state of emergency.

Loyal troops have rigged the base, snaling it off. But the rebels' possession of the army's chief stock of weapons, put the government in a tight spot.

Eckerd killed Kirk's takeover, as "pure political action." Puffing on a cigar Eckerd then expounded on the busing situation and what he would have done if he had been Florida's chief executive.

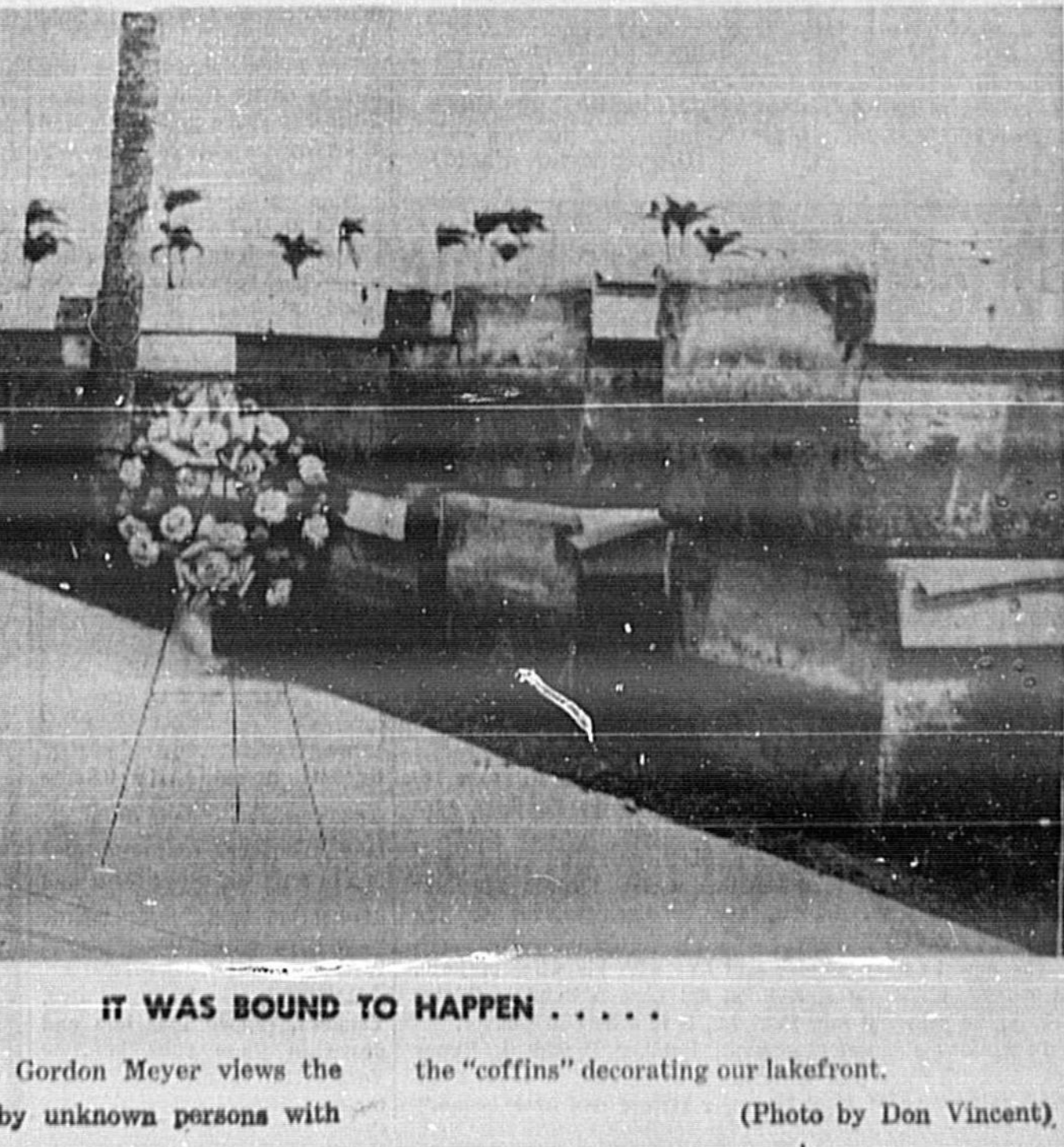

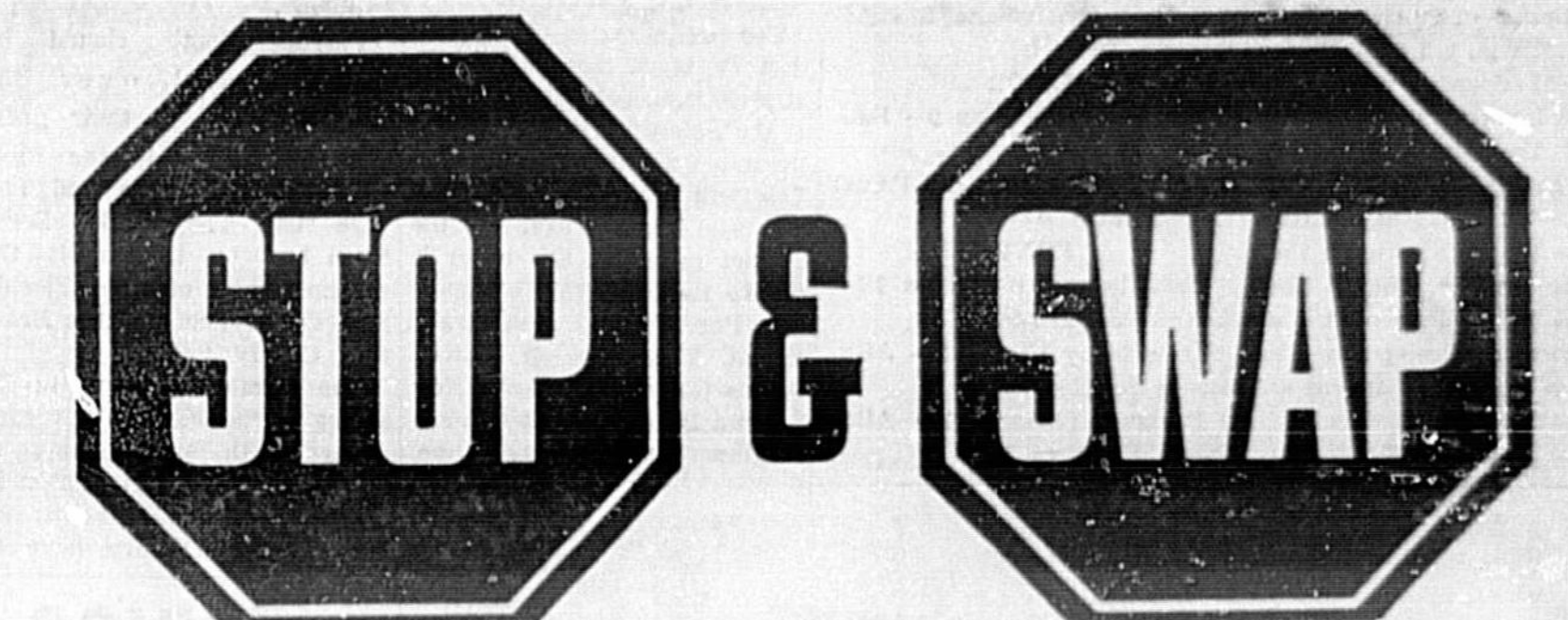

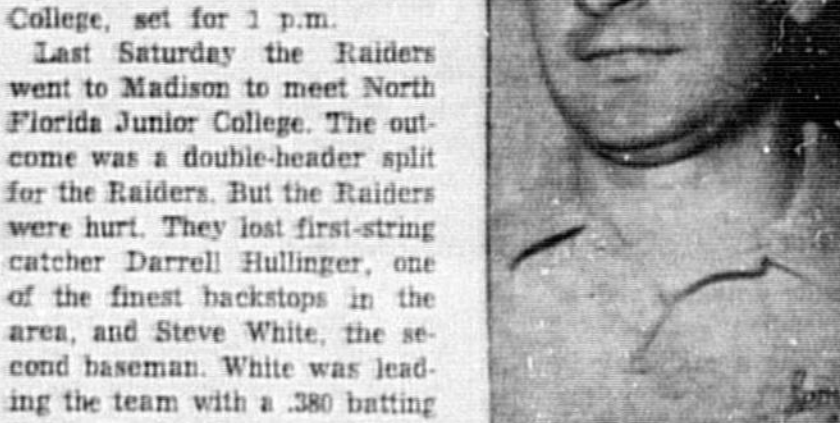
Raider Diamond Nine In Final Division Tilts

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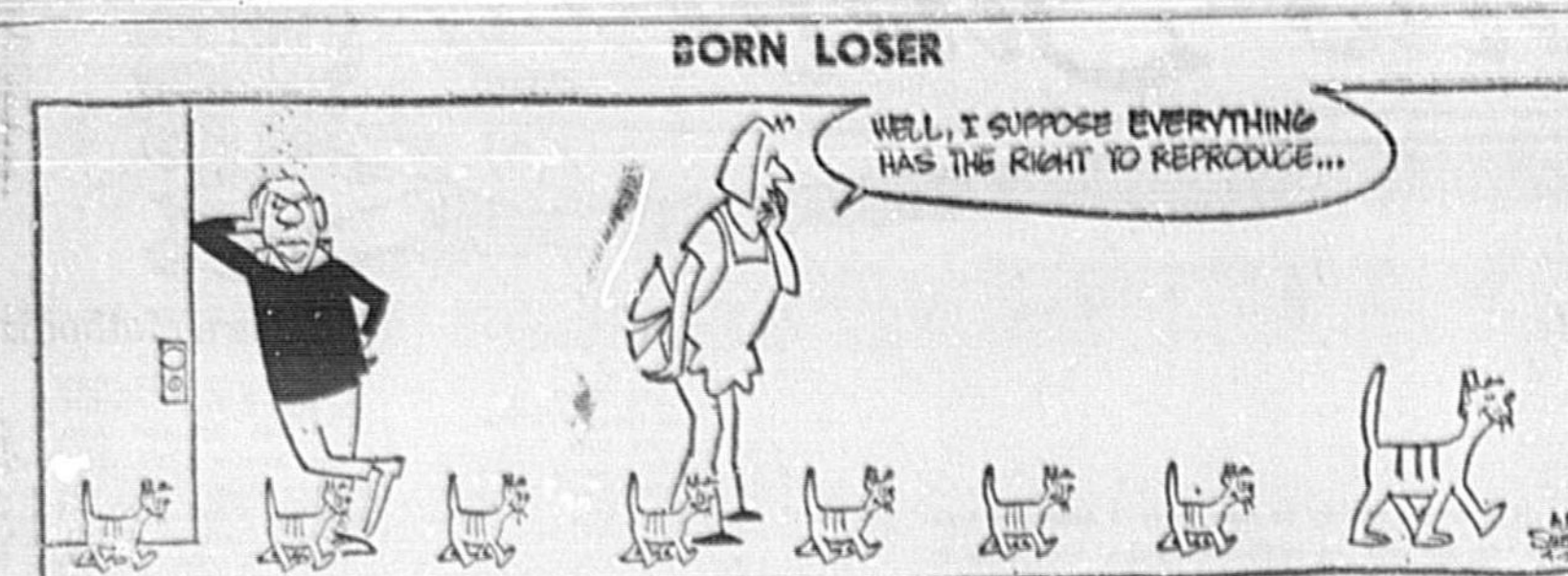
