

CHINA APPEARS READY NOW TO MODIFY STAND

Nationalists Disposed
To Agree To Joint
Control Of Railway,
Center Of Dispute

LONDON, July 26.—(INS)—While diplomatic moves continued today to bring about settlement of the Sino-Russian question, dispatches from the Far East indicated that China may modify her position on the crux of the entire dispute—seizure of the Chinese Eastern Railway.

A Mukden dispatch to the Daily Telegraph reported that during the conference between Chang Tsiang, governor of Kirin, and Boris Melnikoff, Soviet consul general at Harbin, indications were given that China will agree to joint control of the railway by the Chinese and the Soviets, and acknowledge this principle as fair and just.

The message states that Chang Tsiang informed Melnikoff that the Chinese General Lu, who had seized the railway, was exercising his authority in asserting the principle of Russian control of the line.

This admission was regarded as a landmark in Chinese acquiescence to joint control of railway, and sets forth the Chinese position as being amenable to diplomatic settlement.

View of this revelation, it is probable, that China may agree to restoration of the status quo in Manchuria, as urged by the United States Secretary of State, before any media steps are taken.

MOSCOW, July 26.—(INS)—Hundreds of new arrests of Soviet residents in Manchuria have been reported from Harbin, and according to an official announcement made here last night, "organized" Soviet employees of the Chinese Eastern Railway are being arrested in increasing numbers, the report said. Despite threats of retaliation many were beaten by the police.

Party Soviets were arrested in Manchuria and were sent to Harbin chained as prisoners and given no food.

"White" Russian guerrilla bands are continuing to organize near the Siberian borders and are moving toward territory, the natives said.

Reynold's 2nd Trial Begins This Morning

LONDON, July 26.—(INS)—Richard J. Reynolds, member of a rich Indiana family of Winston-Salem, N. C., was placed on trial for the second time today charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of an Englishman who was run down on May 14 by an automobile driven by Reynolds.

The first trial was halted yesterday by Justice Humphreys and the jury was discharged because two witnesses for the defense had approached and talked with the foreman of the jury. A new jury was picked and the defendant was again arraigned in Old Bailey Court this morning.

Gotham To Pay \$50 Million For 2 Tubes

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 26.—(INS)—Father Knickerbocker will soon be enriched with two more millions, one under water and the other over land.

Appropriations for the plan of both of these tunnels granted by the department of plant and structures by the board of estimate amount to \$50,000,000. The proposed under-water tunnels is said to be laid under the narrows, while a two-borough tube, which will connect Manhattan Island, will connect it to Brooklyn and Queens.

Sanitor Edge To Be Succeeded By Fort

WASHINGTON, July 26.—(INS)—Rep. Franklin Fort (D) of New Orange, N. J., will go to the Senate in place of Senator Walter E. Edge, of Atlantic City, who has been definitely selected by President Hoover as ambassador to France.

Announcement of Edge's appointment to the post occupied by the late Myron Herrick, probably will not be made until after the close of the special session of the Senate as Edge's services on the Senate Finance Committee are needed by the administration in the tariff fight.

JOKER IN HOUSE TARIFF MEASURE FOUND BY SOLONS

Debiture Plan Pro-
vided For Rebates
On 2 Kinds Of Goods

WASHINGTON, July 26.—(INS)—After rejecting the export debiture plan of farm relief for American agriculture, the House of Representatives wrote a joker into the new tariff bill, it had been learned today, providing a debiture plan on tariff rebates to sugar and non-sugar agricultural products that would cost the American government \$100,000,000 a year.

The joker has been discovered by members of the Senate Finance Committee and undoubtedly will be eliminated before the bill is reported to the Senate. Senate legislation felt the provision had been slipped into the bill by the House Ways and Means Committee under misapprehension and enacted by the House without its import being realized.

The joker was found in section 241 under a title called "Substitution for drawback purposes." It would affect the copper, tin, silver and other non-ferrous metal industries as well as sugar manufacturers.

Under its application, 20 percent of all duties received by the government through the tariff on sugar and non-sugar metals would have to be refunded if the late Charles J. Justice, Jr., attorney for the residence of Herbert C. Flowers, president of the New Orleans Public Service, Inc.

Three persons, Mrs. Justice, her son, and her mother, were, it was learned, charged with the murder of the residence. Subsequent flames raged the debris.

BOTH LOTT AND TILDEN BEATEN BY FRENCHMEN

Cochet Overwhelms
Big Bill Lott
Pushes Borotra In
1st Singles Match

ROLAND GARROS STADIUM, PARIS, July 26.—(INS)—America hopes for a return of the Davis Cup this year virtually died on the shoulders of William T. Tilden and George M. Lott, Jr., this afternoon, the Yankee pair being soundly beaten by the French in the first two singles matches on the challenge round.

Tilden, playing without a remembrance of the first old champion who knew, succumbed decisively to his nemesis, Henri Cochet, by 6-1, 6-2, 6-2. Lott made his challenge round debut in a more one-sided fight than a mere one by fighting Jean Borotra to the death before the Basque's greater steadiness and savvy, gaining the decision by 6-1, 6-2, 6-4 and 7-5.

With only two matches remaining, France thus gained what amounted virtually to a charter mortgage on the cup for another year. It now needs one more victory, either in the doubles match tomorrow, or in the final two singles on Sunday, to retain the trophy it has held since 1927.

It had been expected that the absence of Rene Lacoste, would place the French in jeopardy but there was no evidence to support this notion today, although Lott for a time revived American hopes by beating Lott in which he lost. The young Yankee finally found a "lead" in 2 to 3 in games in the fourth set only to be swept aside by the power and brilliance of the Frenchman's final shot to victory.

VATICAN CITY, July 26.—(INS)—With the voluntary imprisonment of Roman Catholic pontiffs in the Vatican officially at the end, preparations went ahead today for a meeting between the pope and King Emanuel of Italy on some "neutral" ground, that is, neither the Vatican nor at the residence of the King. There are many delicate issues to be considered in arranging this meeting.

Traces of yesterday's great event were still visible in the plaza of St. Peter's today. Thousands of torches placed in the facade of the St. Peter's cathedral, burned throughout the night, creating a scene of indescribable beauty as the inspiring architecture of the edifice was illumined against the clear Italian sky.

The day-long ceremony attendant upon the pope's first emergence ended at twilight when, standing before a velvet draped altar erected before the facade of the cathedral, he blessed the awed crowd of 350,000 who had stood in the great square throughout the day.

GEORGIAN KILLS WIFE AND TRIES TO MURDER SON

Despondent Man Out
Of Work Also Tries
To Finish Own Life

AUGUSTA, Ga., July 26.—(INS)—R. L. Burnett, 55, today told local police that he killed his wife with a razor and a hammer in their home here yesterday and then sought to end the life of their 11-year-old son by beating him over the head with the hammer.

"I know I was crazy," Burnett told the Police Sergeant M. O. Matthews. "But I never believed I would be crazy enough to do this. I hope they send me straight to the electric chair and let it over with."

Burnett made his confession from the bed to which he had been taken suffering from a severe mental breakdown. He had been confined in a mental hospital after killing his wife. Police believe that the man may have been driven out of his head by brooding over his lack of a job.

Mrs. Burnett's body was found yesterday in front of the couple's home. She had been beaten about the head and her throat had been cut. Her son was found lying a few feet away with a fractured skull. He is in a serious condition at a local hospital.

Upon entering the house today, investigators found Burnett unconscious with knife wounds at his throat and bruises on his head. A bloody hammer and razor lay on the dining room table.

Burnett told Sergeant Matthews that after having slain his wife, he first sought to finish himself in a bathtub. This was too slow, though, he said, so he started to cut his throat. Then he grabbed the hammer and beat him over the head with it.

Because of the hammer blow, Burnett had received police at first thought that the man was responsible for the violence. They were investigating whether a burglar had killed Mrs. Burnett and wounded the other two when Burnett confessed.

CAPITAL SEES NAVAL PARLEY FOR 5 NATIONS

Conference Hinges
Upon Complete Ac-
cord Between U. S.
And Great Britain

WASHINGTON, July 26.—(INS)—The principal aim of which will be to reduce existing navies to the utmost limit consistent with international policing safety, was definitely forecast here today for the late autumn or mid-winter.

This is the goal toward which President Hoover and Premier Ramsay MacDonald are now striving, with every indication of success. When the time is deemed ripe, the two nations will be invited to send plenipotentiaries. In all likelihood the conference will be held in Washington at MacDonald's invitation.

Anonymous Postcard Informs J. F. Seidel He Is 'Doomed' Man

COLUMBUS, O., July 26.—(INS)—A threat was sent to him through the mail, Judge John F. Seidel, one of the attorneys defending Dr. James H. Sneed, college professor, for the murder of Thelma Holla, a coach, asserted in court today while examining a prospective juror.

Seidel was interrogating J. B. Colson, a retired druggist. He asked him: "Have you received any telephone calls, or threatening letters, since you were subpoenaed for jury duty?"

"The juror said 'no' and then Seidel declared:

"Well I have. I received a threat in the mail last night."

He started to say more, but Judge Seidel asked him to stop. "Proceed with the examination," the judge ordered. This was done.

The lawyers on both sides engaged in a bitter debate while Colson was undergoing examination. Sneed asked him whether, in considering the question of Sneed's sanity he would accept the testimony of lay or medical witnesses on the question.

"That is not a fair question," interrupted Prosecutor John J. Chester Jr.

E. O. Hockett of defense counsel leaped to his feet and shouted: "It is."

Heated argument followed. The judge finally calmed them. Finally Colson was accepted as a juror and took his place in seat number two.

That filled the jury box once more. But the defense promptly exercised another preliminary challenge, excusing Louis C. Davis, painter, who was occupying seat number nine. Questioning of the foreman was then resumed.

Asked by International News Service what he had said the threat was, Seidel said:

"It was an anonymous postcard warning me I was doomed. No one was turning it over to the authorities. I think the writer was a nut."

DEBT PAID, RATIFIED

PARIS, July 26.—(INS)—The Mellon-Berenger, (France-American) war debt agreement became officially effective tonight, so far as France is concerned when the Senate ratified the accord by 242 to 30 votes.

30-Ton Cold Storage Plant Has Been Added To Sanford-Jacksonville Ship

Addition of a large refrigerating plant, furnishing cold storage facilities for 30 tons of perishable products, has been completed on the motor-driven freight boat, Lusterite, operated by the St. John River Transportation Company, according to an announcement today by officials of the line running between Sanford and Jacksonville.

The cold storage plant was added in answer to demands by ship-owners both in Jacksonville and Sanford, it was explained. Already up-state firms have begun to make extensive use of the service while local truck growers are expected to avail themselves of the accommodations for shipments of fruits and vegetables.

Poincare Resigns As French Premier

PARIS, July 26.—(INS)—Raymond Poincare resigned as Premier of France tonight on account of ill health. The former premier was stricken about a week ago during debate in the chamber of deputies upon the ratification of the British and American war debt agreements. He grew worse and today a cancer expert was called to see him. This led to a rumor that the Premier was really a cancer victim. Up until today it was believed he was suffering from nervous exhaustion and indigestion.

PLANE BEGINS 316TH HOUR OF RECORD FLIGHT

Flyers Are Spurred
On By Knowledge
That Houston Plane
Is Close On Heels

LAMBERT FIELD, ST. LOUIS, July 26.—(INS)—The spur of the rival's achievement today was thought to be partly responsible for the amazing feat of the St. Louis Robin which at 11:17 this morning had been in constant companionship with the clouds for 316 hours and had begun its fourteenth day in the air.

Just as the threat of Lou Gehrig's challenge pushed Babe Ruth on to a new world record in the world of sports, the reminder that the "Billion Dollar City" the Houston endurance plane was still aloft, today was brought to be instilling new determination in the doughty Forrest O'Brien and Dale Jackson, the Robin crew.

Jackson has managed their determination "not to come down while the Houston plane is in the air." Yesterday the friendly rivalry culminated in an exchange of notes, (Glen Loomis and J. G. Glass of the "Billion Dollar City") with "Good luck but use discretion, we have only one wing left" and the local pilots, answering: "Play with her boys that one may get it."

Jackson and O'Brien's latest message read feeling fine and getting fat. We are good for many more hours." This would scarcely bode their determination.

Arthur Nutt, of Buffalo, chief engineer of the company sponsoring the flight, who is here for the landing, states that the 600-hour mark is quite possible. Nutt explains that the air cooled Challenger motors have run 500 hours in full throttle in a block test at the factory.

Seth K. Price, another engine expert declared today "I wouldn't be a bit surprised to see the plane stay up 200 more hours. It probably will be the value, which always first, but it might be some little thing that you never gave a thought which will force the 'St. Louis Robin' down."

But while the others are urging the flyers on their titanic air feat, Samuel O'Brien, Forrest O'Brien's father, is exercising a parent's prerogative to worry about his boy. "I am afraid the boys are feeling the grind now," he said today.

Gold as well as glory still continues to pile up for the doughty pilots. In addition to the \$2,674 which they are to receive daily, a flat purse of \$1,624 had been raised for them yesterday.
