CHINA APPEARS READY NOW TO MODIFY STAND

Nationalists Disposed
To Agree To Joint
Control Of Railway,
Center Of Dispute

LONDON, July 26—(INS)—While diplomatic moves continued today to bring about settlement of the Sino-Russian question, dispatches from the Far East indicated that China may modify her position on the crux of the entire dispute—seizure of the Chinese Eastern Railway.

A Meldon dispatch to the Daily Telegraph reported that during the conferences between Chang Tsung, Hsiang, governor of Kirin, and Boris Melnikoff, Soviet consul general at Harbin, indications were given that China will agree to joint control of the railway by the Chinese and the Soviets, and acknowledges this principle as fair and just.

The message states that Chang Tsung informed Melnikoff that the Chinese General Lu, who handed seizure of the railway, received his authority to negotiate with the principal Russian of the line.

This admission was regarded as tantamount to Chinese acquiescence to joint control of railway, which makes her last night.

LONDON, July 26—(INS)—Richard J. Reynolds, member of a rich tobacco family of Winston-Salem, N. The first trial was halted yesterday by Justice Humphreys and the jury was discharged because two witnesses for the defense had approached and talked with the foreman of the jury. A new jury was picked and the defendant was again arraigned in Old Bailey Court this morning.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 26—(INS)—Father Knickerbocker will soon be enriched with two more tunnels, one under-water and the other under land.

The proposed under-water tunnel is said to be laid under the narrow, white tri-borough tube which will connect Manhattan Island with Brooklyn and Queens.

VANQUISHED



BOTH LOTT AND TILDEN BEATEN BY FRENCHMEN

Cochet Overwhelms
Big Bill But Lott
Pushes Borotra In
1st Singles Match

ROLAND GARROS STADIUM,
PARIS, July 26—(INS)—American hope for a return of the Davis Cup this year virtually died on the shields of William T. Tilden and George M. Lott, Jr., this afternoon, the Yankee pair being soundly beaten by the French in the first two singles matches on the challenge round.

Tilden, playing without a remnant of fire, the old champion once knew, vanquished easily to his nemesis, René Cochet, by 6-4, 6-2, 6-2. Lott made his challenge round debut a more mobile one by fighting Jean Borotra to the death before the Basque's greater steadiness and saved 15 games in the decision by 6-4, 6-4 and 7-5.

With only three matches remaining, France thus gained what amounted virtually to a chattel mortgage on the cup for another year. It now needs one more victory, either in the doubles match tomorrow, or in the final two singles on Sunday, to retain the trophy it has since 1927.

It was long expected that the advance of René Lattou would place the French in jeopardy but there was no evidence to support this notion today, although last in time, revived American hopes by the manner in which he fought Borotra back on his heels. The young Yankee finally took a lead of 5 to 3 in games in the fourth set only to be overtaken by the power and brilliance of the Frenchman's final rush to victory. Lott thus died with his boots on. With Tilden's defeat, the drama was utterly rising. Just an old man, he was helpless against Cochet's redoubtable fistful gestures, serving only to delay the inevitable. It was Cochet's third victory over Tilden in Davis Cup play and to his odds, the Frenchman, for the first time, a game was carried to decide. In the second, Tilden was beaten in 12 minutes. In the
