WASHINGTON President Bush will ask Congress Thursday for a freeze on defense spending in Issai 1990, reducing President Reagan's proposed \$45.2 billion budget by more than \$6 billion government sources said

In addition. Bush will propose in his address. to Congress Thursday real or after inflation increases of 1 percent in defense spending in each of the next two liscal years and a 2 percent increase in its al 1993, the sources said.

In January Reagan proposed a \$315.2 hillion defense budget for fiscal 1990, which begins Oct. 1. That is a 2 percent merease over inflation from this year's \$299 billion budget







#### Latin group endorses job campaign

MIAMI — Two Latin builders groups have endorsed a Job campaign for inner-city blacks in the aftermath of riots caused by the deaths of two blacks at the hands of a Latin police officer, officials said Tuesday.

Leaders of the Latin Builders Association and the rival Hispanic American Builders Association said they are asking members this week to help decrease unemployment in Overtown, Liberty City and a predominately black section of Coconut Grave, where rioting occurred last month.

They want members to post job openings with the Job Service of Florida, the state's employment agency, which is working with the city of Miami's fleigborhood Jobs Program. The Job Service, which set up trailers in Liberty City and Coconut Grove Tuesday, will refer applicants to the businesses.

"We are minorities and we have to help each other," said Lorenzo Luaces, president of the 900-member Latin Builders Association, "What we're trying to do is to make a greater effort to find positions for a group that is at a disadvantage

Marcia Morgado, executive director of the 300-member Hispanic American Builders Association, said leaders would make their appeal at a luncheon on Friday. The drive will be publicized in the group's newsletter, HAB Update.

We want to help groups that need to be helped," said Morgado. "In this case, it's the black community."

#### TV newsman charged with stealing ideas

TAMPA - Michael Shaprio, assistant news director of television station WTSP, St. Petersburg, was arrested Tuesday and charged with breaking into the newsroom computer system of rival WTVT in Tampa with his home computer.

Shapiro, a former assignments editor at WTVT, was arrested by agents of the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and was booked into the Hillsborough County jail on 14 counts of computer-related crime. Bond was set at \$14,000.

WTSP news director Terry Cole said Shapiro, an employee for four months, had been placed on leave of absence, and said he did not know what was involved in the alleged illegal accessing of the WTVT system.

Bob Franklin, assistant news director at WTVT, said station personnel discovered a number of computer files were missing from their assigned areas in the station's newsroom computer. system Jan. 12.

Franklin said an investigation revealed that since at least early January, the station's newsroom computer system had been the subject of repeated actual and attempted "break-ins."

"The computers contain highly confidential information concerning the station's current and future news stories and the station's future story assignments," Franklin said. "This totally unauthorized access to our computers was gained from outside the station by the use of computer modems and

#### Class in lottery graduates first group

PENSACOLA - The first group of students who took a new course in how to increase their chances for winning the Florida Lottery has graduated, but so far none of them has hit the jackpot.

Dennis Printy, an instructor of math and business, is teaching the unusual and popular "Lotto Strategies," a continuing education course at Pensacola Junior College.

The four-week class offered throughout the spring is designed to teach students how to piak the six winning numbers for the grand prize of the Florida Lottery. In the popular game of chance players pick humbers from one

Printy's first class had 32 students, many of them in their 50s, received diplomes upon graduation last week. They met once a week for a scheduled hour, but students said it was so enjoyable they usually stayed 90 minutes.

Although the class has not had any winners. Printy claims that one week he had three correct numbers on one ticket and three correct numbers on another one.

#### Trial requested in suit against Contras

MIAMI - Lawyers for the family of Benjamin Linder requested a civil trial Tuesday in their \$50 million lawsuit against Contra leaders in Miami because of Linder's execution by anti-Sandinistas in Nicaragua.

U.S. District Judge Stanley Marcus took the request under advisement after an hour-long hearing. He did not indicate when he would rule

Linder and two of his Nicaraguan co-workers, Pablo Rosales and Sergio Hernandez, were killed Jan. 31, 1987 by a Contrapatrol in the province of Matagalpa in rural northern Nicaragua, where he was building a hydro-electric plant.

The suit was filed by the Center for Constitutional Rights in New York. A CCR investigation determined that Linder was killed while he lay injured on the ground.

# Martinez proposes more prisons

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Bob Martinez said Tuesday he will ask the Legislature for \$152.4 million to house an additional 8,843 prison inmates, but predicted early releases of inmates will continue despite the pro-

The crash construction program would go beyond the 4,500 additional beds the Department of Corrections asked for, and would include alternatives such as community control for less dangerous inmates.

It's not only about locking up (inmates). but it's dealing with alternative sentences," Martinez said in a news conference. "Yes, we are putting up a lot of beds ... But we are also recommending the acceleration of diverting (criminals) from the jail system to other forms of carrying out sentencing." Martinez' five-part prison initiative would

 Tighten eligibility requirements for early release to exclude inmates who attacked or murdered police or corrections officers.

• Improve medical care for inmates, experiment with privatization of prison medical services, and expand the Corrections Medical Authority from five to 11 members to help with planning and oversight of the system.

Develop a five-year master plan for the prisons, to predict the number of inmates and construction needs. Martinez said it would be the first such plan by any state.

 Permit prison officials to see Juvenile arrest records to improve monitoring of repeat juvenile offenders.

 Permit the Department of Corrections to collect restitution and other court-ordered payments from inmates.

Assuming current predictions hold true, the additional prison beds would reduce the number of inmates granted early release because of overcrowding by 5,400, Martinea

However, some 37,600 inmates would still have their sentences reduced under an existing state program designed to keep the system within court-ordered inmate population limits, Martinez' aides said.

Attorney General Bob Butterworth questioned the need for additional maximum security cells, raying the state could build 10,000 medium and minimum security cells for \$200 million by relying on prefabricated

#### Inmate: state wasting money

TALLAHASSEE - The immate who launched a 17-year court fight over conditions in Florida's prisons urged a Senate committee Tuesday to defy the federal Judge overseeing the settlement in the case.

Michael Contello, serving a life sentence for first-degree murder, appeared in shackles before the Senate Corrections Committee and said conditions have improved to the point where court oversight is no longer needed.

"The settlement agreement for medical and overcrowding is now operating to the detriment of the plaintiffs - that is, all the prisoners of Florida," Costello said.

'If necessary, the state of Florida must openly defy the federal court and let it be litigated to the United States Supreme Court," he said. "The state is expending money to satisfy the consent decree and it is a waste.

Costello filed the 1972 class action lawsuit over prison conditions that brought the Florida Department of Corrections under the scruliny of the federal district court in Jacksonville.

He said the lawyers appointed to represent the state's 35,000 inmates in the federal proceedings were focusing too much on how much space prisoners are allotted and other procedures that ignore the special needs of

# Adult homes target of plan

TALLAHASSEE - State of ficials said Tuesday they plan to crack down on homes for the elderly, disabled and mentally ill that abuse and neglect their wards, in part by overhauling the regulations that govern such

"We've seen too many cases of abuse and neglect of our elderly, disabled and mentally ill," said Gregory Coler, secretary of the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services.

"We've seen people whose life savings have been ripped off by ACLF tadult congregate living facility) operators and we've seen people living in deplorable conditions because they've

committed the ultimate sin they're old and they're poor.

'We've seen enough, and I've had all I can take of this issue." Coler said.

HRS plans to ask the Legislature for \$3.9 million to hire additional staff to monitor the facilities, for a new computer system and for income supplements for residents of the homes.

Coler said he asked for a similar amount last year, but was turned down amid heavy lobbying by the industry.

# Astronauts perform final tests

CAPE CANAVERAL - The crew of the shuttle Discovery completed a final practice countdown Tuesday while technicians worked to remove a third and final engine turbopump that must be replaced before blastoff next month.

The shuttle's crew - commander Michael Coats, 43, copilot John Blaha, 46, James Bagtan, 36, Robert Springer, 46 and James Buchli. 43 - struggled into bright-orange spacesults early Tuesday and boarded Discovery around 9 a.m. for the final hours of the mock countdown.

The test ended at 11:37 a.m. with a simulated ignition and shutdown of Discovery's three main engines. 37 minutes late liquid oxygen turbo-pumps that because of minor equipment problems and to give launch crews fast-tainute practice reloading the shuttle's flight computers with critical ascent Coats and company flew back

to the Johnson Space Center In Houston later in the day, Blastoff is planned for mid March, although a firm date will not be set until a flight readiness review March 2 and 3.

"Everything appears to have been successful for today's countdown demonstration test," NASA spokeswoman Lisa Malone said.

The astronauts practiced emergency procedures at the launch pad Monday and looked on as engineers disconnected the

#### Officials say **Bundy photos** were 'sick'

TALLAHASSEE - Florida officials said Tuesday the publication of graphic, post-execution photographs of Ted Bundy's corpse was "sick" and amounted to "the commercialization of crime."

"I would find that to be sick. Obviously, using those pictures, even with a case like Ted Bundy, appears to be in bad taste," said Attorney General Bob Butterworth. "I guess there are publica-

tions in our country that deal in that kind of trade," said Gov. Bob Martinez, who signed the death warrant under which Bundy was executed Jan. 24. He said nothing could be done to stop publication.

"I'm not sure under freedom of the press that you can have any impact (on such editorial decisions)," he said.

"That's something I believe

the media and others will have to deal with, about that kind of behavior when it comes to the commercialization of crime." The pictures appeared

Monday in World Weekly News, a supermarket tabloid published by GP Group Inc., which also publishes The National Enquirer.

Martinez added the photos had to have been snapped after Bundy's body left state custody, immediately following the execution.

"It did not happen when it was on our time." Martinez

The two-page photo spread features a full-page picture of Bundy's body from the neck up, showing marks the tabloid describes as "electrode burns" and stitch marks where the skull was opened and then sewn back together during the

The publication's editors said the "historic" pictures could help deter crimes such as Bundy's. The serial killer was under death warrant for three murdets and was supected in as many as three dozen in several states.

Butterworth anid no serious newspaper would publish such pictures.



# Robbers force cop changes

SANFORD - A rash of incidents where robbers have identified themselves as police after forcing entry to houses in Seminole County has brought changes in the approach City County Investigative Bureau

agents use when entering a house for a search or arrests.

CCIB Commander Lt. Donald Eslinger said that his agents usually wear masks and non-standard police clothing when serving a search warrant although their hats and jackets clearly are marked with "police" identification. Now, however, they will make a point of having uniform patrol deputies at such scenes to eliminate any doubt that they are police, he said.

"We have proper identification at all times." and it is plainly marked we are police. But we're going to have be aware of officer

It's been about a decade since an agent of Seminole County's drug task force has been wounded when entering a home, said Eslinger, who has headed CCIB for almost two years. However, he said, his agents have to be more on guard now because the intruders who are posing as police probably are making citizens more concerned about home-confrontations with anyone who claims to be police, and more likely to retaliate against them.

A few years ago in South Florida there was an outbreak of home invasions by fake police, who were drug dealers. They would enter the houses of other drug dealers, who assumed they were police, and confiscate the residents' drugs.

In two recent incidents in Seminole County, intruders identifed themselves as police, after forcing entry; in a third case, the same suspects entered, but didn't say

they were police, according to Capt. Roy Hughey said. He said investigators have no indication that narcotics were taken from any of the three houses.

In rural Longwood and Winter Park incidents, cash and jewelry were stolen. However in a rural Winter Springs case. deputies reported that the intruders told two teenage girls, whom they bound, that they were police and searched the house for drugs. Nothing was stolen from the house in that case.

Other than the addition of uniformed officers at the entry time of raids, Eslinger would not reveal other changes his undercover agenta will initiate.

All police have identification cards with their photographs. A badge alone is not considered adequate Identification for police. If a person doubts someone's claim that they are police, Hughey said the sheriff's department or local police station should be called for confirmation.

## Thrift in area affected by Bush's bailout

WASHINGTON - The first part of President Bush's \$90 billion thrift ballout plan took effect Tuesday with the government's bank insurance fund beginning to take over supervision of about 224 failed savings and loans, including one with two branches in Seminole County.

The Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp., which traditionally insures thrifts, and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., which insures banks, assumed joint control of four failed thrifts Tuesday.

They are the first of about 224 insolvent institutions that will be handled by the combined staff of the two regulatory agencies.

The four are: Baltimore Federal Financial of Baltimore, Pacific Savings Bank of Costa Mesa. Calif., Gill S.A. of Hondo, Texas. and Freedom Savings and Loan Association of Tampa, the one with the Seminole County branches.

"They are large institutions that are losing money at a rapid pace." said Federal Home Loan Bank Board Chairman M. Danny Wall.

Bob Garrison, director of marketting for Freedom Savings and Loan, said two or three FDIC officials were reviewing "problem" loans, but were not everseeing day-to-day operations of the bank. Garrison said the 52-year-old thrift has been under the FLSIC management consignment review program since July 1987, but no agents from that organization have entered

# Cooperating on child care

Has the kinder, gentler government that President Bush is calling for inspired the 101st Congress? Recently, liberal Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., announced that conservative Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, is one of the co-sponsors of the Democrats' \$2.5 billion child-care bill. Sen. Hatch responded several days later by listing Sen. Dodd as a co-sponsor of the less-expensive Republican version.

This newfound spirit of bipartisanship has political analysts scratching their heads in disbelief because the child care issue in the past has prompted bitter wrangling between Democrats and Republicans. Last year, there were more than 100 unsuccessful proposals to provide federal assistance to two-earner families. Yet, the combatants now appear determined to achieve a compromise that will be acceptable to President Bush. Whether they can pull it off is another matter.

Predictably, the Democrats and Republicans approach the problem of child care from opposite positions. The Democrats favor federal subsidies for low- and middle-income working families and a system of national health and safety standards for day-care facilities. For their part, the Republicans support modest tax credits to help poorer families with their child-care expenses. They also oppose the creation of an expanding federal bureaucracy to oversee child care centers.

New reports advise that both sides have agreed to give states greater latitude on how to spend federal day-care funds, provide for employer-sponsored programs, and permit payments to relatives, such as grandparents, aunts, and uncles who provide such care. But what about those parents who put their children in day-care centers operated by churches or synagogues? The Democrats' bill would deny federal assistance to centers with religious affiliations, thus maintaining the separation of church and state, even though these centers are preferred by some parents.

Another issue is the income ceiling. The Democrats' measure would subsidize day care for families earning as much as \$48,000 per year. The Republican bill is less specific because all of its funds would be earmarked for any family, wealthy or poor. Under current law, there are no income limits in order to qualify for tax credits for day care. This, in turn, enables the wealthiest 30 percent of the families to receive 50 percent of the \$4 billion in such benefits while the poorest third received only three percent.

# Terrorists aren't freedom fighters

It's often said that "One person's terrorist is another's freedom fighter" — the implication being that whether a given person is one or the other is merely a question of whose ox is being gored. If you approve of the goring, he's a freedom fighter; if you don't, he's just a terrorist.

The problem is admittedly a complex one, but it isn't beyond all analysis, and it yields to a test that is only marginally more difficult than asking whose ox is being gored.

In a 1973 hard-cover "debate" on the rights of Vietnam War deserters and draft dodgers, I suggested that a democratic society (like the United States) has, unlike a totalitarian state, a moral right to punish those whose disobey its laws, because dissenters have. In a democracy, the right to work for change in those laws with which they disagree.

Pushing the point to its logical conclusion, I added that if the majority, in a democracy, were to "effectively destroy the rights of minorities to work for change," that society would "of course lose any semblance of a moral right to punish" those who disobeyed it.

Such an analysis pretty clearly identifies the IRA forces in Northern Ireland as terrorists rather than freedom fighters, because they have every right to work for change in a basically

democratic society (indeed, their spokesmen are elected to Parliament from time to time). They are simply in the minority and are resorting to terror in an effort to get their way.

But what about the Palestinians? Here, it

seems to me, it is important to draw a distinction between m I I I tary blows aimed by the PLO at the Israeli state, which many dispossessed Palestinian Arabs believe is denying them their rights. and the PLO's well-known penchant for acts of violence against Jews and other perceived "enemies" generally. outside the borders of Israel.

Yasir Arafat has recently pledged, if I understand him aright, to avoid henceforth conduct of the latter kind. If so, he and his PLO may make some progress toward the status of "freedom fighters." Up to now, however, they have most certainly engaged in many acts that were, strictly speaking, terrorist.

What about the African National Congress, which is banned in South Africa and engages in acts of violence? Most such acts occur within South Africa itself, and thus are at least free of the criticism to which Arafat, Gadhaff and certain others are justly subject for their global terrorizing.

But a proper evaluation of the rights and wrongs of the ANC depends, at least in part, on what one believes is the true situation in South Africa today. Here in the West, we live under a barrage of assertions that South Africa is intransigently hostile to self-determination for its black citizens. If that were true, the case for regarding the ANC as terrorists would be much harder to make.

# Biology and a phone

BOSTON — My grandfather had a six-pack of sisters who lived on the other side of the continent. When he got a telephone call from San Francisco, he never once said "Helio." or "How are you?" He picked up the receiver with one stock greeting: "What's wrong?"

Long distance was for disasters. Good news could wait for the mail; bad news came by phone. Maybe a Hollywood mogul made a long-distance call to cement a deal or check up on his tootsie, but toll calls were as foreign to my family as tootsies.

Throughout my childhood, it was clear that these lines were not for conversation but for announcements. We were as likely to reach out and touch someone by telephone as we were to communicate by using a cattle prod. Casual phoning was as rare as casual sex.

Today, however, I do not answer the phone saying, "What's wrong?" I answer it saying, "Yes, I will accept the charges."

As a parent I have learned that the marketing miracle of the age — the century's greatest scain — is the sucess of the telephone company in selling someting as ephemeral as conversation. They have convinced a generation of young Americans to casually, nay whimsically, use the phone.

It isn't only an extra-terrestrial creature who yearns to "Phone Home." Our own litte earthbound kiddles learn their telephone numbers before they learn to count change. In the best Sesame Street style, they have their priorities straight: Digits before dollars. And long distance is just three little digits.

The business plot comes into its profitable peak when our young move to another area code and Join the expensive subspectes known as college students. Having spent high school attached umbilically to the extension cord, they move into a dorm where they are immediately entrusted with the one thing we withheld: Their own touch-tone.

What they do with it can only be explained through a series of anecdotes that lurk in the telephone bills gathered for the Annals of Collegiate Communication. (1) A long distance call in pursuit of someone else's long distance number. (2) A call from a panicky young cook who needs to be talked through a creme anglaise. (3) A call from an operater checking if the child in city A could call the friend in city B and charge it to the parent in home G. G as in Goodman.

The building of a truly impressive phone bill, one that rivals the cost of tuition, is not all the fault of the telephone company and its diabolical direct-dialing. The university col-

ludes in this. It brings together students who do not ordinarily live anywhere near each

As a concept, casual phoning was sold with the premise that a brief call is quite cheap. If this were a drug clinic they would call the marketing strategy, "giving out samples." If you begin to win such a discussion, this student has a backup position. She will promise that the next time she calls Bruce et al. she will just talk for three minutes. This will happen only if Bruce isn't home and she gets his baby sister on the line.

Then there is the final line of student defense. You've heard the one that goes: "The check is in the mail." The undergraduate being cross-examined about the need for another transcontinental chat has a better one: "I'll pay for the call." This is delivered with great moral righteousness and absolute safety, because parents know the only way she can pay for it is with food money.

But in any family, the time comes for a serious conversation about casual phoning. No problem. You will find them absolutely cooperative, even happy to discuss the matter at great length — which is to say, at long distance.

And if you finally get hysterical, the bewildered telephone abuser will innocently echo his ancestor's anxious cry: "What's wrong?" Where, oh, where is grandpa when you need him?

# New energy chief only sees nuclear

WASHINGTON — The man about to be confirmed as Secretary of Energy, Adm. James D. Watkins, admits he is no ace when it comes to oil and gas issues. Nuclear power is his forte.

George Bush has premised his Texas oil buddles that Watkins will be buttressed in the office by fossil fuel experts. They had better be ready for a man who is obsessed with nuclear energy and a master at eliminating the

alternatives.
Watkins, legitimately halled as the
fair-minded leader of
the presidential AIDS
commission, is not so
egalitarian when it

comes to energy.
We have pleced

together an example of his apparent blas from high-level Pentagon and Navy sources. While Watkins was chief of Naval Operations he was afraid that non-nuclear technologies would encroach on his cherished nuclear Navy. His pamnota strained relations with the military

two key American allies and contributed to the loss of thousands of jobs in the ship-building industry. But the nuclear Navy is intact.

Watkins, now 61, retired in mid-1986 after four years as chief of Naval Operations. During his time at the helm, he steadfastly opposed the construction in American ship-yards of diesel-electric submarines for other countries.

Two allies, Israel and South Korea, asked the United States to build diesel submarines for them. In highly classified personal communications, Watkins told Israeli and Korean naval leaders to take their business elsewhere, according to our sources.

The American shipbuilding industry is crying for jobs. Congress has directed the Navy to help allies with shipbuilding. The unfavorable U.S. balance of payments situation would have been helped by the foreign contracts. But Watkins didn't see it as a shot in the arm for America. All he saw was a threat to the nuclear Navy. His close associates told us they believe Watkins didn't want the non-nuclear submarines to be built in the United States because it would call attention to the fact that they are efficient and cheap.

Watkins was the first nuclear submariner to serve as chief of Naval Operations. He was a devoted protege of Adm. Hyman Rickover, the father of the nuclear Navy.

The truth is, the United States hasn't built a diesel submarine since 1959 and has no modern design of its own to share. But the Israelis and Koreans didn't want a U.S. design. They would have supplied German or Dutch designs for the construction.

Watkins and his pro-nuclear submariners then changed their tack. They said there wasn't enough space in the Navy's two submarine-building yards — the General Dynanics/Electric Boat yard in Groton, Conn., and the Tenneco yard in Newport News, Va.

But the Koreans and Israelis had thought of that already. They noted that several other U.S. yards were quite capable of building diesel submarines. Israel's first choice was a General Dynamics yard in Quincy, Mass When the Navy said no, the Quincy yard—which had a work force of more than 3,000—closed after a century of ship building. Next the Israelis and Koreans cabled Watkins to select the Todd Shipyard at San Pedro, Calif. They were turned down. That yard is now in bankruptcy proceedings and more than 1,000 of its employees are out of work.

#### Manson goes before parole board

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. - Charles Manson, one of the most notorious and bizarre figures in American crime, was to go before a state purole board Wednesday for his first hearing in

In August of 1969, Manson sent members of his communal "family" out to conduct ritualistic slayings that he hoped

would ignite "Helter Skelter," a black-white race war. Seven people died in the mayhem, including pregnant actress Sharon Tate. All were savagely butchered and their blood used to scrawl flendish writings such as "death to pigs"

on the walls of the victims' homes. Manson, who has been denied parole six times in the past, is serving a life term.

Manson did not participate in the murders, but acted as mustermind of the carnage in which the seven victims were stabbed hundreds of times, shot, bludgeoned, mutilated and defiled.

Manson and four members of his "family" were sentenced to die for the murders in the two-day bloody orgy in the Los Angeles area. They escaped the gas chamber when the California Supreme Court overturned the death penalty in

#### Widespread AIDS rumors remain

WASHINGTON - Despite years of massive publicity, more than 40 percent of Americans who were surveyed still believe incorrectly that the AIDS virus can be transmitted by toilet scats or insect bites, a public health expert said Tuesday

Dr. Gary Noble, director of AIDS programs for the Centers for Disease Control, testified before the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee.

Under questioning from the chairman. Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., Noble said Americans still hold some widespread misconceptions about the AIDS virus.

Noble said 42 percent of the adults surveyed believed incorrectly - that the deadly virus can be transmitted by tollet seats or insect bites.

About 24 percent of those questioned in September 1988 indicated they thought insect bites were "very likely" or 'somewhat likely'' to spread AIDS, while 18 percent said it was likely AIDS could be transmitted by tollet seats.

Scientists say the AIDS virus survives only briefly outside the body and there have been no cases of transmission from tollet seats or insect bites.

#### Dave Brubeck has heart surgery

NEW HAVEN, Conn. - Jazz planist and composer Dave Brubeck was listed in critical but stable condition Tuesday following triple heart bypass surgery, a spokeswoman at Yale-New Haven Hospital said.

Doctors said the 4 1/2-hour operation was a success and Brubeck, 68, was expected to remain in the hospital for a week to 10 days, said spokeswoman Katle Krauss

Brubeck has been a major force in contemporary music since the 1950s when his jazz quartet gained worldwide fame and he carried acclaim as an improviser and composer.

Brubeck has become known for his experimental meters. complex harmonies, counterpoint, and varied and sophistocated musical forms.

He also is recognized as a composer of oratorios, cantatas and tour moving with ease between the then supposedly separate worlds of jazz and classical music.

In December 1959, Brubeck, on piano, and his quartet joined Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic in premier presention of "Dialogue for Jazz Combo and Symphony." composed by Howard Brubeck, Dave's brother and a music teacher.

#### Terrorist sentenced to 30 years

NEWARK, N.J. - An alleged Japanese Red Army terrorist was sentenced to 30 years in prison Tuesday by a judge who said the defendant planned to use shrapnel bombs to murder 'scores of people for no other reason than that they were Americans.

The sentence will keep Yu Kikumura, 37, a Japanese citizen, in a U.S. prison for at least 25 years. The judge also ordered Kikumura deported as soon as he is released.

Kikumura has been held in a federal detention center since his arrest in April by a state trooper who found homemade pipe bombs in his car during a traffic stop on the New Jersey

During a daylong hearing, federal prosecutors argued that Kikumura intended to bomb a Navy-Marine recruiting office in New York in a coordinated terrorist effort to mark the second anniversary of the 1986 U.S. bombing of Libya.

#### New leads delay **Tower nomination**

WASHINGTON - New allegations against Defense Secretary-designate John Tower held up the release Tuesday of an FBI report to the Senate Armed Services Committee on the controversial nominee, the committee's top Republican said.

Sen. John Warner, R-Va., said the report on the FBI investigation, prompted by allegations raised last week, has been delayed because of a second complaint lodged against the former Texas senator

Warner and committee Chairman Sam Nunn. D-Ga., met Tuesday at Nunn's request at the White House with President Bush to discuss the Tower nomination.

Nunn was not immediately available for comment, but Warner said he discussed with Nunn the possibility of calling a committee meeting and that the two would talk further once Nunn read the FBI report.

Late Tuesday, Warner said the FBI's report had been delayed because of new developments.

There is a new lead which developed subsequent to our visit with the president which has come to the attention of the bureau, and it's my advice and indeed the advice of the White House to let the bureau ... complete this investigation and then come back to the Senate

He provided no details on new lead. Earlier allegations against Tower have concerned alcohol

and his behavior with women. In another development, The New York Times reported Wednesday that Nunn and committee member Sen. James Exon. D-Neb., are prepared to vote against the Tower nomination.

The Times, citing sources familiar with the investigation. sald new allegations about Tower's financial dealings caused the FBI to Inform the committee and the White House that the report cannot be completed for several more days.

And CBS News, quoting unidentified White House and congressional sources, reported Tuesday that Nunn now opposed the Tower nomination.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater disputed the CBS report, saying Nunn "didn't say that in the meeting. He did not say he was against it; he did not say it should be withdrawn: he did not say it was in trouble."

Fitzwater said Nunn requested the White House meeting simply to ask "for the president's position" on the nomination. "The president told him he believed Tower was an excellent nominee and he hoped we'd have a vote the White House soon, spokesman said.

Nunn had no immediate Armed Services Committee with comment on the CBS report.

#### Swastikas mark Ben-Gurion's tomb

JERUSALEM - The grave of one of Israel's founding fathers, David Ben-Gurion, was defaced with swastikas, apparently by members of an ultra Orthodox underground group suspected of carrying out anti-secular bombings, police said Tuesday.

Three swastikas were painted in red on the tombstone located near the Sede Boker kibbutz in the southern Negev Desert. Also written on the grave was the message: "Keshet. Look for us. We have even reached here," said Beersheba police spokesman Ben Haimov.

Keshet is the name of an underground ultra-Orthodox Jewish group that has claimed responsibility for a series of bombing attacks against newsstands that sell secular publications in Bnei Brak, a religious suburb of Tel Aviv.

On Sunday, police arrested 10 religious academy students suspected of belonging to Keshet and of planting bombs in August and December. No one was injured in the incidents, aimed at driving out merchants who sell non-religious

Ben-Gurion, who forged a doctrine of pragmatic socialist Zionism, is regarded by many as the symbol of Israel's independence and a founding father of the country, as well as its first prime minister. Many ultra-Orthodox Jews reject the Zionism espoused by Ben-Gurion because of its secular nature.

#### Oil spill team arrives in Antarctica

SANTIAGO, Chile - A team of U.S. specialists has arrived in Antarctica to begin cleaning up fuel and oil spilled from an Argentine ship that sank in pristine waters near a National Science Foundation research base.

The U.S. Embassy in Santiago said the ship Polar Duke. carrying equipment and experts from various U.S. government agencies, arrived at the site early Tuesday.

The Bahia Paraiso, carrying 350 passengers, struck rocks Jan. 28 about 2 miles from the National Science Foundation's Palmer Base Research Center. The passengers were evacuated and there were no injuries.

The ship capsized Feb. 3 and partially sank. The resulting spill alarmed the National Science Foundation, which organized the \$250,000 cleanup mission.

Scientists said the oil could kill animals in the bay, including baby penguins that were beginning to swim for the first time.

#### Paraguay opposition calls for more time

ASUNCION, Paraguay - The leader of Paraguay's major opposition bloc, asking for more time to organize, Tuesday called for delaying elections now set for May 1 by new President Andres Rodriguez.

Domingo Laino, chairman of the National Accord, a four-party opposition group, said additional time was needed to register and organize voters.

Other political sources said that a May election would give an advantage to the incumbent Colorado Party, once a prop to the 35-year rule of Gen. Alfredo Stroessner, who was ousled in a bloody coup Feb. 2 and 3.

Rodriguez. 64, commander of the 1st Army Corps based in Asuncion, was sworn in as president Friday afternoon, and Tuesday the official government newspaper published a decree setting the election for May 1.

Rodriguez had said Monday he would call for elections for the president, senate and house within 90 days, as is required by the constitution.



WASHINGTON - Congress. reacting to public outrage and efearful of election reprisals. voted by crushing margins Tuesday to reject a \$45,500 pay raise hours before it was scheduled to take effect.

The House, reflecting the greatest concern that accepting the 51 percent pay raise would mean political reprisals for many of the 435 members in the next election, voted 380-48 to reject

the \$45,500 Increase. The Senate, which had rejected the proposed pay raise in a separate resolution last week. quickly followed with a 94-6 vote that dealt the final defeat to the 51 percent pay proposal.

Based on the findings, Goetz and his colleages said it was too early to perform the operation in which pieces of patients' adrenal glands are transplanted into their brains - anywhere but at research centers where doctors are experienced with the procedure

"Despite cautious optimism, we conclude that the widespread use of this procedure outside of research centers is premature," the researchers wrote in reporting their findings in The New England Journal of Medicine.

Dr. Abraham Lieberman of the American Parkinson's Disease Association, who performed the operation on 12 patients at the New York University School of Medicine, said he now believes the risks of the operation currently outweigh the benefits for most pattents.

Parkinson's disease affects an estimated 1 million Americans.

#### Bennett wins praise from mayors

WASHINGTON - William Bennett, nominated to be the nation's first drug ezar, received praise and applause from the country's mayors Tuesday by saying the drug problem is "emphatically the business of the federal government."

Bennett promised to develop a "straight-forward" plan to combat narcotics, and made it clear that he agrees with state and local officials who have long pushed for an increased federal role, particularly in funding.

"Certainly some of this effort is going to take money," Bennett told reporters afterwards. "You're going to see that (President Bush) means what he says when he says 'This is a priori-

Earlier, in his address to the U.S. Conference of Mayor's Second National Conference on Crime and Drugs, Bennett, nominated by Bush to be director of the new Office of National Drug Police Control. said:

"We may not be winning the war. That's probably true. (But) It may be too early to say that we're not winning the war because it can't be won. It may be that we're not winning ... because we haven't really waged It yet."

Bennett noted that while education secretary in the Reagan administration he often "locked horns" with state and local authorities over the federal role in education, and repeated his contention that the role should be limited.

But "I have no ambiguity about a federal role in war on drugs," Bennett said. "This is serious business. It is the business of state and local governments but it is (also) emphatically the business of the federal government."

Bennett's words and zeal drew sustained applause from the gathering, which, during the two-day conference that ended Tuesday, cited rising drugrelated violence in their cities and pressed for an increased federal response.

The conference concluded after the attending 150 mayors and lawmen proposed some drug strategies of their own. beginning with the government officially declaring a "national war on drugs" and committing

the necessary resources. They also proposed a ban on automatic weapons, said that surplus military facilities should be used to house and treat drug addicts and called for a greater emphasis on drug education.

Ironically, the conference was held in the nation's newly crowned "murder capital. Washington, which had 372 homicides in 1988 - 59 per 100,000 residents. Most were

drug-related. The Reagan administration had drawn the wrath of mayors. police chiefs, governors and others over the years by recommending no money for drug-related state and local law enforcement. Congress, however, each year, provided some

Ronald Reagan, in his last budget to Congress last month. again propsed no such funding. Bush is to present his own spending proposals Thursday and Bennett indicated it would provide some law enforcement money




"Maybe having Oester with us all year will make a significant difference this season," Reds General Manager Murray Cook says. "Maybe we were slow to come around last year because we didn't have

# Church women tutored cook

SANFORD - Once our Cook of the Week moved away from home, he soon grew weary of store-bought food and began relying on some of the world's best cooks-church women-for cooking lessons.

David D. McGhee of Sanford, who is minister of music at the First United Methodist Church of Sanford, was born in New Castle.

"Being born a preacher's kid or 'PK' as most of us of that breed call it, I spent my formative years in many loca-tions." McGhee said. When McGhee was released from the hospital after birth, his parents whisked him back to Slippery Rock, Pa., where his parents lived at the time.

"In the course of the next 30 years I moved several times from Pennsylvania to West Virginia." McGhee said.

McGhee attended grade school in Wellsburg, W.V. and spent his high school years in Clearfield, Pa. After graduating. McGhee attended an affiliate school of West Virginia University. The Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, Va.

"Richmond is called the 'Gateway to the South' as many Richmonders think of their beautiful city," McGhee said. "I spent almost 10 fabulous years there before I packed up as many things as I could take and moved to Florida in January of 1987," he said. McGhee also attended Stetson University in DeLand.

McGhee said he didn't learn to cook until after living in Richmond for several years.

"Now I mean really cook," he said. "I guess you could say I had pretty much taught myself how to make all the standard dishes after I moved away from home. My mother, at the time I was growing up, was pretty much of the old school where



girls did all the cooking and laundry, etc.

'To me, the best cooks in the world have always been members of the churches I have served," he said. "There were two ladies who were members of one of my adult choirs in Richmond who really knew how to cook. They'd tell me, 'You ought to try this,' so I would. If I got stuck in the process, I would just call them on the phone and yell 'Help!'

For years, McGhee cooked over the phone, learning from those two ladies how to visualize the ingredients in a recipe and how they would come together to form the end product.

McGhee thinks his Sanford church family is right there at the top with good cooks. "They are different than most of the churches I have served: The main cooks for our church dinners are men. I like that," he said.

He would rather not be associated with any of the early things he cooked, he said.

"I used to buy the same old things in the grocery store, but I would think 'With all these aisles and aisles of food, there has to be something I am greatly missing.' I was right," he said.

McGhee's hobbles include going to the beach and playing racquetball.

DEAR READER: Systemic lupus erythematosis (SLE) is an inflammatory disease of un-known cause, affecting many of the body's organs. It is thought to be an auto-immune condition. in which the body develops an allergy to its own tissues. SLE follows a variable course.

It often begins with fever, rash, weight loss and joint pains. These manifestations can progress to pleurisy (inflammation of the lung covering), pericarditis (inflammation of the heart covering), brain inflammation (causing headaches and personality changes), swollen lymph glands and an enlarged spicen. The most dreaded consequence of SLE - and the usual cause of death - is kidney involvement, leading to progressive renal malfunction and failure.

Some patients experience mild 36 symptoms of SLE for years; others have a more accelerated and serious form, with death occurring early. Remissions and relapses are common.

SLE is diagnosed by blood tests that demonstrate the allergic factor (positive LE cells or unti-DNA antibody) or by blopsy, in which affected tissue is examined microscopically.

Mild or remittent disease requires little or no therapy. Various drugs, such as antiinflammatory medicines, will control symptoms. Cortisone is used to treat severe or unremitting SLE. Immunosuppressive drugs (substances to shut off the body's allergic response) such as azathioprine, may be useful. In the disease's late stage, dialysis or kidney transplants may be necessary to preserve life.





#### Officers injured in disturbance

DEDHAM, Mass. - Inmates at the Norfolk County House of Correction, angered by overcrowding, set fire to mattresses, smashed prison property and attacked guards Wednesday, injuring three officers before being returned to their cells, authorities said.

None of the injuries were serious, but one prison staff member called the melee "lifethreatening."

The altercation began about 7:15 p.m. EST in the jail's recreation room, said Sheriff Clifford Marshall. Between 30 and 50 of the 125 inmates who were gathered there began fighting each other, then set fires to mattresses and clothing. he said.

#### Man stabbed sister, in-law

ROOSEVELT, N.Y. - Investigators Wednesday found the stabbed bodies of a woman and her daughter in their Long Island home where police alleged the woman's knife-wielding son had slashed and seriously wounded another sister and her husband.

Keith Muckle, 30, was subdued by his sister's husband, who was able to grab a baseball bat and knock the knife from Muckle's hand, said Officer Charles Koller, a spokesman for Nassau County Police.

Detectives said they are unsure why Muckle attacked his family members and declined to say whether he was responsible for the killings of his mother and sister, whose bodies were found upstairs, Koller said.

Muckle was charged with two counts of attempted murder.

Muckle allegedly slashed his sister, Rene Hill. 29, and her husband, Darnell Hill, 29, about 6:15 p.m. as the couple entered their home.

SANFORD - What days Seminole County students will and will not attend classes next year was set yesterday by School Board mem-

# Kelley's campaign sets money record

SANFORD - Seminole County District 5 Commissioner Jennifer Kelley raised and spent \$145,518 — including more than \$62,000 of her own money in her 14-month campaign for the \$35,000 a-year job.

The amount of money raised by Kelley, a Republican, is believed to be a record for a single candidate in Seminole County.

The amount exceeds second-place fund-raiser Fred Streetman by more than \$50,000 Republican Streetman raised \$94,912 in his re-election as the District 3 county commission-

Kelley said spending the money was worth it because the satisfaction of doing a job for the public is high "Absolutely," she said "I'm getting more things done than I ever thought possible. It's worth it when you can really feelgood about what you're doing '

Candidates for county offices were required to have their final campaign contribution and expenditure report submitted to the Seminole County Supervisor of Elections Office by 5 p m

Monday All eight candidates for county commission, sheriff and tax collector met the deadline, county elections officials said.

According to Kelley's report, a \$10,908.90 loan was made to her campaign sometime after the last Nov. 4 report was turned in. The loan, which Kelley said she entered in the report's summary of in-kind contributions mistakenly, is not reported in the itemized listing of contributions. contrary to state election requirements

Kelley said she made the loan from her personal bank account to pay architect Eoghan Kelley, her husband and campaign manager \$11,212 for his own time, materials at d his staff to work on her campaign.

I didn't want people to think he contributed all that for free," Kelley said-

Candidates may not accept or personally contribute any money to their campaign after Nov. 8, said Eric Prutsman, assistant general counsel of the Florida Secretary of State's elections division. Prutsman said unless the state elections commission determines elections laws were violated willfully, the commission usually finds the violation is technical in nature and warns the candidate to be more careful in the

Sheriff John Polk closed his successful \$79,799 campaign by making more than \$9,000 in charitable donations and establishing a \$4,000 office expense account, which is permitted by state elections laws. Polk, a Republican, donated \$2,000 to Seniors for a Better Community in Casselberry and \$1,542 to Sanford Christian Sharing, Inc.

Polk also made a \$1,500 donation to the Methodist Children's Home in Deltona and \$1,000 each to the Humane Society of Seminole County, Good Samaritan Home, Florida Sheriff's Youth Fund and R S V P

Ray Valdes, a first-time Republican candidate won his bid for county tax collector by spending a total of \$33,134 for his campaign.

The grand jury returned a seven-count indictment against Wright who is being held without bond in the Seminole County Tail

A five-count indictment was returned against Olson, 28, also being held without bond

Wright 19, of 418 Greyford Lane Casselberry was arrested Jan 19 on a charge that he murdered Theresa B. Ganem, a clerk at the Seven-11 store at Eagle Center the night before Ganem, who worked alone at the store that night was found dead the next morning. She had previously identified Wright as the person who stole beer from her places of employment twice

with stabbing Ganem to death in during the commission of another

an attempt to perpetrate robbery or burglary" and with intent to retal tate against her for her presence as a witness or for information she had relating to an offense pending in-

Ganem had identified Wright as the person who stole beer from the Tenneco station on State Road 436. last August when she was employed. there. She was scheduled to testify at a hearing on that case in January but the hearing was postponed. She also allegedly identified Wright to police as the personwho stole beer from the Seven 11 at Eagle Center on another occasion

Besides the first-degree murder indictment handed down by the grand jury other cour is listed were first degree felony murder robbery burglary, and retaliation against a witness, all in connection with the Jan 18 murder



#### Texas wants to resume citrus ban

AUSTIN, Texas - Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower urged the U.S. Department of Agriculture Wednesday to resume a quarantine against the shipment of fresh Florida citrus to other citrus-producing states.

Hightower said outbreaks of the dangerous and incurable citrus canker disease are still occurring in Florida even though the USDA canceled a 3-year-old quarantine a year ago.

They keep trying over there in Florida, but they can't get it right yet," he said.

Texas Department of Agriculture officials are concerned the disease might spead to the 30,000-acre growing area in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and destroy its \$70 million a year citrus industry.

We aren't questioning the efforts of the Florida Department of Agriculture nor the efforts of the Florida citrus industry to wipe this disease out." said Highiower. "But despite their best efforts, citrus canker continues to break out."

#### Family of drowned recruit sues Navy

PENSACOLA - The family of a young recruit who died last year when he was forced to continue a rescue swimmer class has filed a \$20 million wrongful-death claim charging the Navy with negligence, lawyers said Wednesday,

The law firm representing the family said the claim was mailed to the commanding officer at Pensacola Naval Air Station, which is the location of the Rescue Swimmer School where Lee Mirecki died March 2, 1988.

The claim seeks \$10 million for personal injury and \$10 million for wrongful death, charging negligence, negligent supervision and intentional infliction of emotional distress.

The claim was flied under the Federal Tort Claims Act, which gives exceptions to the principal of sovereign immunity. The FTCA allows the government to be sued under certain circumstances

The claim charges that after Mirecki's death, "officers of the Rescue Swimmer School proceeded to engage in a conspiracy to cover up the cause of death ... the negligent return of him to the school, the negligent training procedures leading to his death, the negligent supervision of the training procedures, and the negligent failure to follow Navy policies...

#### Justice Powell develops pneumonia

JACKSONVILLE - Retired Supreme Court Justice Lewis Powell has developed a mild case of pneumonia and will be kept in the hospital for several days, officials at Haptist Medical Center said Wednesday.

Although Powell appeared to be improving Tuesday, tests late in the day revealed he had come down with the disease. hospital spokeswoman Cindy Hamilton said.

Powell, 81, who retired from the court in 1987, was admitted to the hospital after suitering a dizzy spell Monday.

There had been hope he could be released from the hospital as soon as Thursday, but the results of the tests Tuesday will result in a longer stay. Hamilton said.

These new findings do not change his excellent prognosis or imply any deterioration in his condition. Rather they are part of an evolutionary process in a respiratory illness." Hamilton said. "However, it seems likely he will require hospitalization somewhat longer than hoped for, perhaps several days."

A Supreme Court spokeswoman, Kathy Arberg, said Powell, who lives in Richmond. Va., was in Florida hearing cases on the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. Powell took senior status when he stepped down from the bench June 26, 1987. and, as such, can continue to hear cases in the lower courts.

Charles will play in the inagural Prince of Wales Cup match in Vero Beach Feb. 18. Proceeds will benefit the Friends of Conservation and the Environmental Learning Center for Indian River County.

# Canker, prisons, taxes discussed

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Gov. Bob Martinez and House and Senate leaders agreed Wednesday to form a special committee on ettrus canker, build more prison beds and improve the state's international trade by upgrading airports.

Martinez balked, however, at increasing demands from lawmakers and city and county officials to let local governments add a seventh cent to the local sales tax without holding a public referendum.

Lawmakers voted last year to let local governments collect up to one percent extra above the existing six percent sales tax, saying the money is badly needed to meet the mandates of Florida's growth management laws. But at Martinez' insistence, the extra cent must first be approved by the

Most local officials say they cannot get that approval, and are pushing had to let commissions enact the extra cent with only a majority-plus-one vote of the commission.

The idea that referendums are suggested to be removed and yet no one has yet formulated a spending plan to take to the public is a bit premature," Martinez said. "If you structure a referendum that clearly shows how you are going to resolve some of the growth issues, the public will support

During the meeting, House Speaker Tom Gustafson and Senate President Bob Crawford agreed to form a joint House-Senate committee on citrus canker. Crawford, who proposed the committee, said he is increasingly concerned about the 62 lawsuits filed against the state by citrus growers who say their crops were unnecessarily destroyed in an attempt to wipe

out what turned out to be a relatively haimless attain of crop disease

If the state is found to be liable for the crop destruction, it could be forced to pay some \$250 million in restitution. Crawford said Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner will request \$9.8 million to indemnify citrus growers.

We need to determine where we stand legally; that is very nebulous right now." Crawford said. "I think maybe it's time the Legislature and the state government sat down and said 'All right, let's make a decision here."

Crawford praised Martinez' proposal to build 8,843 new beds in the overcrowded prison system. Gustafson was less enthusiastic, saying he feels, the state should concentrate on reducing the prison population through early intravention, community release and other non-traditional programs.

# Praise for abuse hotline

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Bob Martinez kicked off a publicity drive Wednesday promoting use of a new statewide toll-free abuse hotline expected to uncover some 120,000 cases of child or elderly abuse each year.

The single hotline replaces a system that had abuse reports coming in to 181 different telephone lines scattered across the state. The hotline will instead route all calls to a Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services center in Tallahassee, where abuse investigators will check each report within 24

"1-800-96-ABUSE is the number that will save, in my mind, a number of children and elderly, and those perhaps also who are in institutional care," Martinez said, "When you use this number, you you will be doing something for all the abused people of Florida, particularly children and the elderly."

HRS now receives about 2,000 abuse calls each day, though many prove to be unsubstantiated. Agency officials expect calls to the new hotline will result in 100,000 substantiated cases of child abuse and 20,000 substantiated cases of elderly abuse each year.

"The most important thing we can do to protect kids is cover them with a blanket of security," said HRS Secretary Gregory Coler. "We've got 12 million sets of eyes out there who are sensitive to a kid screaming out, or an elderly person screaming out.

'Our whole effort here is to make sure that everybody knows 1-800-96-ABUSE, knows that all they have to do is drop the dime and there will be some relief."

The hotline was begun last July but has only recently become fully operational.

"A failure in the past ... for us to understand exactly what was happening may have caused some damage to innocent third parties," he said. "I am convinced if we know what the hell we are doing, we can avoid that damage.'

James Joseph Miletello, 39, was arrested Tuesday and charged in the death of Cheryl Snowden, 26, who was killed in a traffic accident on Interstate 75 in Charlotte County last April.

Authorities said Snowden began "freaking out" shortly after ingesting cocaine and the driver of the car pulled off to the side of the highway. They said Snowden jumped out of the car and ran into the path of another

Miletello is accused of having supplied the cocaine that Snowden ingested, but authorities would not say how theylinked Snowden to him.

'If you deal in poison, and cocaine is poison, you're going to be held strictly accountable," Hillsborough County State Attorney Bill James said.

The Florida Legislature passed a law in 1987 holding drug dealers accountable for the welfare of the people they sell to. James said this is the first time he has based a first-degree murder case on the law.

## Jail still crowded but contempt dropped

POMPANO BEACH - The North Broward Detention Center was still 600 prisoners over capacity Wednesday, a day after a federal judge dropped contempt charges against the county sheriff for housing the overflow in a tent.

In a hearing Tuesday, U.S. District Judge William Hoeveler forgave Broward County Sheriff Nick Navarro for violating his July injunction against jail tents.

Navarro apologized, saying he had never read the order and did not understand it.

The decision stunned the six lawyers who lined up to argue that Navarro should be tried for contempt of court. They challenged Navarro's contention that he did not know the tent was prohobited.

Even if he had not understood the injunction, argued assistant U.S. Attorney Marck Schnapp, "Nobody would take the position that ignorance of a lawful order is an excuse" for violating it.

Hoeveler ordered Navarro Into court Jan. 30 after learning several hundred prisoners at the North Broward Detention Center had been moved into a large

canvas tent the day before.

Navarro told reporters he would go to jall to defend his right to use the tent, then said the judge would have to extradite him because he was leaving for Los Angeles.

Navarro apologized profusely in Tuesday's hearing.

"I know how patient you have been." he told the Judge, adding "Absolutely I do, your honor."

A courtroom full of Navarro supporters applauded when the judge accepted Navarro's apolo-

But he added, "If it wasn't clear before, I think it is now. I am in charge of this case and I expect the orders to be followed without question."

Navarro blamed the County Commission for failing to find ways to case Jail crowding. He said his staff suggested using the tent, but acknowledged that he ultimately approved the move before leaving for a trip to California to promote the Fox Breadcasting program "Cops."



SANFORD - A Geneva man who was shot in the head with a .38-caliber bullet and then kicked and stomped by his assailant early Wednesday was nevertheless able to be released from an Orlando hospital and return here before midday.

The alleged assailant, who was charged with attempted murder, two counts of aggravated battery, armed burglary and use of a firearm in a felony in the case, was released from jail on bond

by noon Wednesday. Sanford Police Chief Steven Harriett said today that it is ironic that both men were back in town within hours of the incident, which may have stemmed from a love triangle.

The wound caused by a bullet that appeared to enter the forehead of Charles Carter, 31, of Geneva, apparently tracked around his head under his scalp and exited at the rear.

He appeared to be seriously injured, but neither the bullet nor its impact appeared to have caused damage to Carter's brain. Harriett sald. Carter was treated at Orlando Regional Medical Center.

The man accused of shooting Carter, while he was at 1815 Melionville Ave., Sanford at about 1:45 a.m. Wednedsay, was picked up by police and arrested after he left the scene. Gerald Thomas Fargo, 38, of 320 Shawnee Trail, Geneva was arrested at 4:10 a.ni. Wednesday at the police station. Bond was set at \$30,000.

Police report that Fargo allegedly kicked open the door of the house of Dianna Hittel, on Mellonville Avenue. He entered and pistol whipped her head and

face and threatened to kill Carter who was in a rear bedroom, police said.

The suspect entered the bedroom and pointed a pistol at Carter's head and fired a shot into his head, police said. He stomped and kicked Carter before fleeing, police said.

Although Carter's wound wasn't serious, Harriett said it's obvious to police that his assailant intended to severely injure Carter. "He wanted to do the job," Harriett said of the assailant. "But it was not this guy's time (to die)."





# Sushi instead of hamburger

Whenever John Wayne wanted to go on a cattle drive, it always seemed as though he would just round up the boys, find a sufficiently grizzled character actor to staff the chuck wagon and off they'd go with a yippec-eye-oh. But it's not that easy in real

life, at least not these days.

Montana is celebrating the hundredth anniversary of its admission to the Union this year, and state officials had been hoping to stage a cattle drive as part of the festivities. But then they found out they would need an environmental impact analysis to determine how to dispose of all the waste that 10,000 cattle are going to leave behind. Next, they discovered they have to secure water quality variances to ford the streams and rivers, and air pollution control permits for all the dust they're going to raise. Instead of a latter-day version of "Red River," they are only running into red tape so far.

Promoters of the centennial insist the drive will be in September just as they had planned. But their estimates of how much it's going to cost to move those doggies along a 58-mile route from Roundup to Billings are already more than \$500,000 and still rising. If It had cost that much to get beef to market a hundred years ago, Jesse Chisholm would never have blazed his trail, and Americans might have grown up eating sushi instead of

hamburgers.

#### German complicity with Libya is a crime

It was bad enough that West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl sought to cover up the transfer of German technology employed by Libya to build a poison-gas plant near Tripoli. The problem with our NATO ally is compounded by more recent news that a German firm is providing the Libyans with air-to-air refueling technology so that Col. Moammar Gadahfi can extend the range of his airplanes and possibly drop the poison gas he's been producing in Israel.

According to the German news magazine Der Spiegel, a Munich-based company named Intec has helped convert Libyan-owned transport planes to refueling tankers to service Gadhaff's fighter-bomber jets. Der Spiegel also printed photographs showing a French-built Mirage jet of the Libyan air force nosing into a refueling drogue from another

Once again, the West German government tried to stonewall its unconscionable collaboration with the most terroristic state on earth. When the magazine initially published Intec's involvement with Libya, the chancellor's office officially denied the complicity with the ridiculous explanation that Intec had sent only two fuel tanks to Libya and that these could be used only on the ground.

All this has evoked the world's memories of Germany's shameful history of the Nazi gas chambers used to exterminate European Jews and multitudes of other during World War II. The onus is on West Germany now to extricte itself from Libya's mass-death schemes and try to regain the confidence of civilized men and women that had so painstakingly been built during more than 40

# Self-serving subordinates

President Reagan has called Oliver North a "national hero." That is justified only on the grounds of his valiant service as a Marine in Vietnam. Period. As a national Security Council aide, he was a disaster. He almost brought J. wn, on his own, the most popular and successful president of this century. Politically, he should not be celebrated, but. rather, court-martialed and shot.

It is not clear that Lt. Col. North committed any actual crimes. The legal situation remains murky, and, in Brendan Sullivan, North has an attorney who probably could have saved Ted Bundy. But the broad outlines of what North did are clear enough from what has already been disclosed.

In July 1985, President Reagan was recuperating from surgery, and was visited on the 19th by then National Security Advisor Robert "Bud" McFarlane. This conversation lasted about 15 minutes and touched on a number of topics. Minor among them was the idea of trying to make contact with possibly friendly Iranians. This subject was discussed for about one minute.

From the acorn, the vast oak now known as Iran-Contra grew

McFarlane took it upon himself to secretly visit Teheran. What's that? Suppose the national security advisor had been kidnapped and tortured? Probably James Bond McFarlane had a cyanide pill.

But Reagan's uh huh on July 19 from his hospital bed opened the door to the fantasizers on the National Security Council, operating over there on "Secrecy Row" on the east side of the Executive Office Building First McFarlane and then his successor Admiral John Poindexter were supposed to "report directly" to the president, but, suppose, they do not in fact "report"?

Under McFarlane and Poindexter, the National Security Council became a covert "action" mechanism. Its mandate encompasses no "action" at all. It is supposed to provide "information" to the president. But not now, under its new management. In fact, it kept "information" from the president

McFarlane got in way over his head with the Iranians. The Teheran rug merchants took him to the cleaners. The meeting will likely break down into chaos and Lt. Gen. Prosper Avril, president of Haiti for only five months, will blame the political factions for delaying an election.

Avril is performing a high-wire act. He has to appear to be serious about a democratte election if he hopes to get any more money from Uncle Sam. But he also knows that he will probably lose the election. And, if today's meeting doesn't end with the

promise of an election, Avril will likely be forced out of office anyway in another coup that could happen before April.

That would make it four coups in three years and a stream of presidents who have left Haitt Impoverished and h seless. The ignominious Jean Claude "Baby Doc" Duvaller fleeced the country and fled in 1986, overthrown by a military junta headed by Gen. Henri Namphy. In January 1988, Hald held an election, widely assumed to be fixed. and Leslie Manigat was elected president. Namphy didn't like that, so he ousted Manigat in a coup in June. Then Avril, who had helped Namphy with coups No. 1 and 2, threw him out in coup No. 3 in September,

Haiti is being ripped apart again by competing political factions, including a recent surge of leftist leaders. The potential for a communist regime has alarmed officials in the neighboring Dominican Republic. At a meeting of the Organization of American States in November, the Domintean Republic's foreign minister relayed those fears to our outgoing Secretary of State George Shultz.

The Haltian government is reportedly broke. This year, the United States has earmarked about \$50 million in humanitarian aid, but will not give the money to the government. Instead, the money will go to volunteer organizations in Haiti which have promised to help the Haitian people directly. The United States has refused to give any aid to the Haitian government until a legitimately elected president is in office.

That is why today's meeting in Haiti is under the State Department's microscope.

Haitian sources told our associate Jim Lynch that Avril is a world-class schemer. He has worked for every regime since Duvalier and emerged unscathed from each coup. For the first couple of months in his own regime. he basked in popularity. But soon it became clear that he intended to do no more for his starving people than his predecessors had

Haiti has had enough coups that its leaders know when one is coming by tracking events in major cities. There is a saying among Hattian leaders that goes like this "If you have troubles in Port au Prince, send money. If you have troubles in Gonave, send troops, If you have troubles in Cap Hatten, leave '

Avril has troubles everywhere, including Cap Haitien, the birthplace of most Haitian revolutions. There are daily power blackouts in Port au Prince. U.S. companies crucial to Haiti's economy are pulling up stakes.

In what may be the worst omen. Avril can't even lure junketing members of the U.S. Congress to Hatti.

#### Congress awaits Bush's budget

WASHINGTON - Congressio nal budget experts, awaiting President Bush's first spending plan, said Wednesday they expect it to be realistic and warned Bush not to spoil the atmosphere with "ill-advised" proposals such as a cut in the capital gains tax.

At the White House, Bush aides were tight-lipped about the budget plan, which the president was to outline Thursday night in a nationally televised speech to a joint meeting of Congress.

"I think legislators are going to be very cautious about adopting such a far-reaching policy as drug testing in the workplace," Ros-Lehtinen said.

Members of Ros-Lehtinen's committee seemed receptive to the policy during hearings, but raised questions about the costs for drug testing and its effects on workers' civil rights.

"Things that we just glide over in here in a presentation turn out to be some of the pitfails," said Sen. Arnette Girardeau. D-Jacksonville, the Senate's point man on drug policy.

"We all realize there is a problem. To say that this will be one of the answers to that problem, I'm not at liberty to say. Too many questions were raised that were very serious questions... ... Girardeau said.

Douglas Hughes, Martinez' drug policy adviser, said the proposal is still very preliminary and many details must be finalized in talks with lawmakers, cabinet members and state worker unions.

No formal legislation has been drawn up yet.

"It is my opinion that we can balance the protection of individual rights against search and seizure and confidentiality issues and the urgency of the drug problem in Fiorida," Hughes said, "and we can do it through fair and reliable test-

The plan is to screen potential employees for drug and alcoholproblems through urine or blood tests. An estimated 25,000 such tests would be run each year. People who test positive for illegal drugs or show blood alcohol levels of .04 could not be hired.

#### Coast Guard searches for missing plane

CLEVELAND - Coast Guard officials were searching for a twin-engine plane believed to have crashed into Lake Eric early. Thursday on a flight from Detroit to Cleveland.

Coast Guard spokesmen said the Cessna 310 was en route to Burke Lakefront Airport near downtown Cleveland when a snow squall prevented a landing. The pilot diverted his flight to Cleveland Hopkins International Airport, but before he could land the equall abated

Officials say the pilot then elected to attempt a landing at Burke Lakefront. The airplane disappeared about 1 a.m. from radar scopes about six miles from Burke Lakefront, traveling east-northeast over Lake Erie at 300 feet.

The Coast Guard dispatched a buoy tender and two helicopters to the area to search for the plane. Only one person was believed aboard the five-scat aircraft.

The airplane reportedly had an emergency locator aboard, but officials say no signal was detected.

#### Gunman shoots at police, wounds dog

SANTA ROSA, Calif. — A gunman in a pin stripe suit and cowboy boots exchanged shots with a policeman during a truffic stop Wednesday, then fled on foot through a creek and up a ridge into a posh residential area where he wounded a dog guarding its family, police said.

The suspect, bleeding from a police bullet wound, was captured at 5:30 p.m. PST, some five hours after the incident began, as he tried to break into a home near his parked car, apparently seeking refuge from the inclement weather, police

He was identified as Charles E. Thomas, 44, a parolee from the Santa Rosa area. Police said three handguns and a knife were found on him when he was arrested. Thomas, who had been wounded in the hand during the shootout, was charged with attempted murder, resisting arrest and a variety of other counts.

The incident erupted on the north side of Santa Rosa when Officer Lance Badger stopped a vehicle with four occupants. The driver got out of the vehicle and appeared to be reaching for his wallet when he suddenly brandished a small caliber semiautomatic pistol and began firing, Badger said.

After police returned fire, the gunman fled into a wooded, residential area. Sue Harrison said she heard a "ruckus" outside her home and then a shot. She placed her 8-year-old daughter on the kitchen floor and dialed 911. When police arrived, the family dog was found in the yard, shot in the stomach.

The dog underwent surgery at a veterinary hospital and was listed in "stable" condition, police said.

#### Scientists watch new pulsar in action

BERKELEY, Calif. - Evidence of a newly born pulsar has been obtained in observations of Supernova 1987A, giving scientists a "once-in-a-lifetime" chance to research the development of the mysterious space objects, University of California researchers announced Wednesday,

Supernova 1987A, which can be seen only in the Southern Hemisphere, is a giant exploding star in the Magellanic Cloud in the galaxy closest to Earth's own Milky Way. The birth of the supernova, called by scientists the most speciacular such object to be observed in almost 400 years, made headlines in early 1987.

A pulsar is a superdense sphere of neutrons less than a few miles in diameter but with a magnetic field trillions of times more powerful than the Earth's.

The observation of the pulsar created in the supernova's explosion was made by a team of scientists from Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory and other groups on the night of Jan. 18 at the 4-meter telescope at the Cerro Tololo Inter-American observatory in Chile, where the international scientific team had installed detectors last year.

#### Manson again denied parole

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. - Charles Manson, a cult leader who directed his followers on a murderous rampage in 1969, was denled parole for the seventh time Wednesday and will not be considered for freedom again until 1992

Manson, serving a life sentence, refused to attend the San Quentin Prison hearing after a dispute with officials over the customary use of a waist chain and handcuffs on convicts making their appeals to the board.

Albert Leddy, one of the three state parole board members hearing his case, said Manson was rejected because of the nature of his crimes, his "unstable personality," his six violations of prison regulations in the last three years and his failure to cooperate with prison staff.



#### Love seminar to be heartfelt

MAITLAND - As others are sending red hearts and flowers to celebrate Valentine's Day, the Rev. Richard S. Brown, pastoral counseling consultant at West Lake Hospital in Longwood, will be helping those who are looking for love or are having trouble in

a current relationship.
On Monday, Feb. 13, from 7-9 p.m., Brown will give the sympostum "Love and Rela-tionships." For the past three years, he has spoken to standing room only audiences on that subject.

"For example," Brown said, "there is the illusion of love. That is, none of us marry 'real' people. We marry the expectation, the person we hope our spouse will be."

His oration will not deal exclusively with the problems. expectations and realities of married couples, but also of dating couples.

"Each group has its own special set of expectations to deal with," Brown noted

Being the evening before Valentines Day, the eve of the year's most romantic day, Brown will keep the focus of the seminar on romantic love. While he does not discount the importance of familial love, Brown has found that people want to discover more about romantic love.

One little girl received a fabulous Christmas gift from a Marine who received her letter, The mail from Okinawa touched these children's lives in a very special way.





No one doubts that defense is the hardest part of the game, a point well proven with today's deal. Place yourself in the East position, defending against four spades. Try not to peek at declarer's hand or the West higher of dummy's side suits, in cards, and just assume that your partner has led the ace of diamonds and now continues with the 10. You win the king of diamonds. What next?

Even with full consideration of the possibility of artifice on the part of the declarer, It's not too likely that partner was leading from A-10 doubleton of diamonds. (If declarer held J-9-x-x-x, he would probably hold back the play of the nine to leave you with the suggestion that West was leading from an TERPRISE ASSN.

A-10-9 combination.) Therefore, if West is leading from length, it would be with the thought that you might be able to ruff the second round. And so it makes sense that the 10 of diamonds suggests the lead back of the deal, if West held the same distribution with the queen of clubs and no king of hearts, the play at the second trick would be the three of diamonds rather than the 10. So, following the useful rule of suit-preference and the more important rule of compliance with partner's wishes, you return a low heart and set the contract.

# Search continues for Azores crash victims

LISBON, Portugal - The search resumed Thursday for more bodies in the wreckage of a · U.S.-owned charter airliner that slammed into a log shrouded mountain and exploded while trying to land in the Azores. killing all 144 people aboard.

The 21-year-old Boeing 707, bound from Bergamo, Italy, to the Dominican Republic, plowed Into the 1.794-foot-high Pico Alto volcanic mountain Wednesday as it was about to land for a regular refueling stop in Santa Maria, southernmost Island of the Azores chain in the Atlantic. 900 miles west of Portugal.

Authorities said none of the seven American crew and 137 Ritalian passengers survived.

More than 50 bodies were recovered from the mountainside by late Wednesday, the Portuguese news agency LUSA said, and the search resumed

LUSA earlier reported that one passenger had not been listed on the manifest, but the report later proved incorrect.

LUSA said the pilot had requested a clear runway for an emergency landing moments before the crash. But Azorea airport authorities said the plane shad received permission to land and the pilot had reported no trouble.

Manoel Vicente, a police spokesman in Vila Do Porto, the town closest to the crash site. said the plane crashed and exploded in a fireball on the mountain about 10 miles from the airport.

"Never in my police career have I seen such a horrendous thing." Vicente said.

Local officials said the top of the mountain was covered by fog weather contributed to the Pittman said.

In Washington, Federal Aviation Administration spokeswoman Theresa Greco said preliminary information from the site indicated there was 5 miles visibility with scattered clouds at 500 feet and broken clouds at 1,200 feet. Winds were clocked at 15 knots.

The National Transportation Safety Board was sending three investigators to the site and the FAA was sending one. Greco said. A Boeing expert will also be part of the investigating team.

The Boeing 707 was owned by Independent Air Corp., a small charter company based in Smyrna, Tenn., and under charter by the Dominican Republic's Dominair company.

In Seattle, Boeing spokesman Richard Schleh said the crashed 707 was one of two delivered to TWA in March 1968, adding that the aircraft company does not know when TWA got rid of it or how many times the plane may have been bought and sold. The last commercial passenger version of the 707 was delivered in January 1978, but Schleh could not say how many are still

Independent Air President Al Pittman said the plane had been inspected in December and no problems were found.

"It was one of our aircraft." said Pittman. "The crew of seven was based in Atlanta and they were Americans.

Pittman said the plane was on approach to the Santa Maria airport and had been cleared to descend to 3,000 feet when the control tower lost contact with the airliner.

"No distress signals were sent from the airplane, and no radio killing 47 people.

but that it was not known if the traffic indicated any problems."

"I'm shocked. I'm some kind of hurt," said Pittman, who bought the 15-year-old charter company four years ago. "We have not had a serious accident before this, and of course, it hurts us all."

Pittman said the charter company, which owns two planes and has 60 employees. had been flying passengers from Bergamo to the Dominican Republic in the Caribbean once a week for about three months on trips organized by tour companies in northern Italy.

The director of the Orio Al Serio airport in Bergamo, in northern Italy near Milan, said all 137 passengers aboard the plane were Italians headed to resorts near Punta Cana in the Dominican Republic.

The chartered plane left Bergamo at 11 a.m., two hours behind normal departure time because it was late in arriving at Bergamo, the officials said.

Lisacte Cabral, a spokeswoman for the city of Vila Do Porto, told UPI by telephone the Boeing 707 crashed into the mountain about 1:30 p.m. local time (9:30 a.m. EST), three or four minutes before it was to land. She said city officials dispatched 20 to 30 rescue workers to the scene.

Two Portuguese naval frigates and rescue alreraft were also on their way to the Azores.

It was the third crash of a Boeing Jeiliner in less than two months. A Boeing 747 jumbo jet was blown apart by a bomb over Scotland Dec. 21, killing all 259 people on board and 11 on the ground. A Boeing 737 crashed 30 miles north of London Jan. 8.

#### Violence flares in uprisings 15th month

JERUSALEM - Four Palestinians died from gunshots and a Jewish settler burned to death when his car was ignited by a suspected gasoline bomb in one of the bloodiest days since the Arab uprising in the occupied territories began 15 months ago.

While Israeli officials reacted Wednesday to U.S. charges of wounded by military gunfire in a prison riot and during clashes in the occupied territories.

Army Radio said the Jewish settler died when flames engulfed his Peugeot van as he was driving to his home in the West Bank settlement of Alfe Menashe.

"I saw that he was in the car and it was impossible to get him out," a witness told Army Radio. The victim was identified as Albert Gerast, 38. Doctors said

Gerasi burned to death.

An army spokesman said the settler was killed when a gasoline bomb ignited his car. But a late Army Radio report said experts investigating the scene failed to find evidence of a gasoline bomb.

The army clamped a curiew on at least three Palestinian villages in the area and declared Alfe Menashe and the nearby human rights violations, another. Arab town of Kalkilya closed of Jerusalem, fired on inmates 28 Arabs were shot and military zones. Army Radio reported that troops began searching the area for the possible assailant.

Settlers began gathering at entrances to Kalkilya shortly after Gerasi's death. Palestinian sources said. Army Radio reported residents of the settlement of Ariel arrived at the Arab village of Biddya apparently with the intent of harming residents. but soldiers turned them away without incident.

In recent months settlers in-

creasingly have called for tougher measures against Palestinians involved in violence during the uprising, known in Arabic as intifada. Settlers also have rampaged through several Palestinian villages in the region of Alfe Menashe after attacks on Israelis.

Earlier Wednesday, guards at Megiddo prison, 60 miles north rioting against a temporary halt to their visitation rights, killing one Palestinian and wounding at least 18 others. A reserve duty officer also was wounded, an army spokesman sald.

The army said rioting erupted when the head of the detention center ended meetings between Palestinian inmates and visiting relatives who began waving outlawed PLO flags and vandalizing cars of reserve duty


