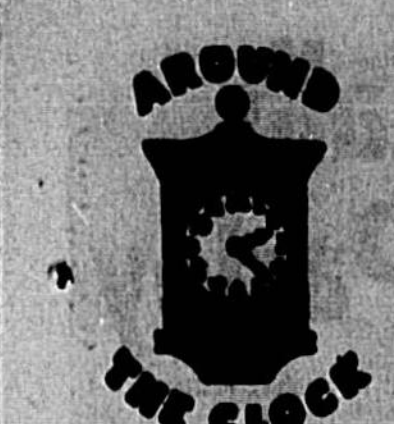

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill to raise Social Security taxes to pay for the new program will be passed by the House before Thanksgiving, according to a source familiar with the bill's progress.

The bill, which would raise the Social Security tax from 3.1 percent to 3.6 percent, is expected to pass the House by the end of the month. The Senate is expected to act on the bill by the end of the year.

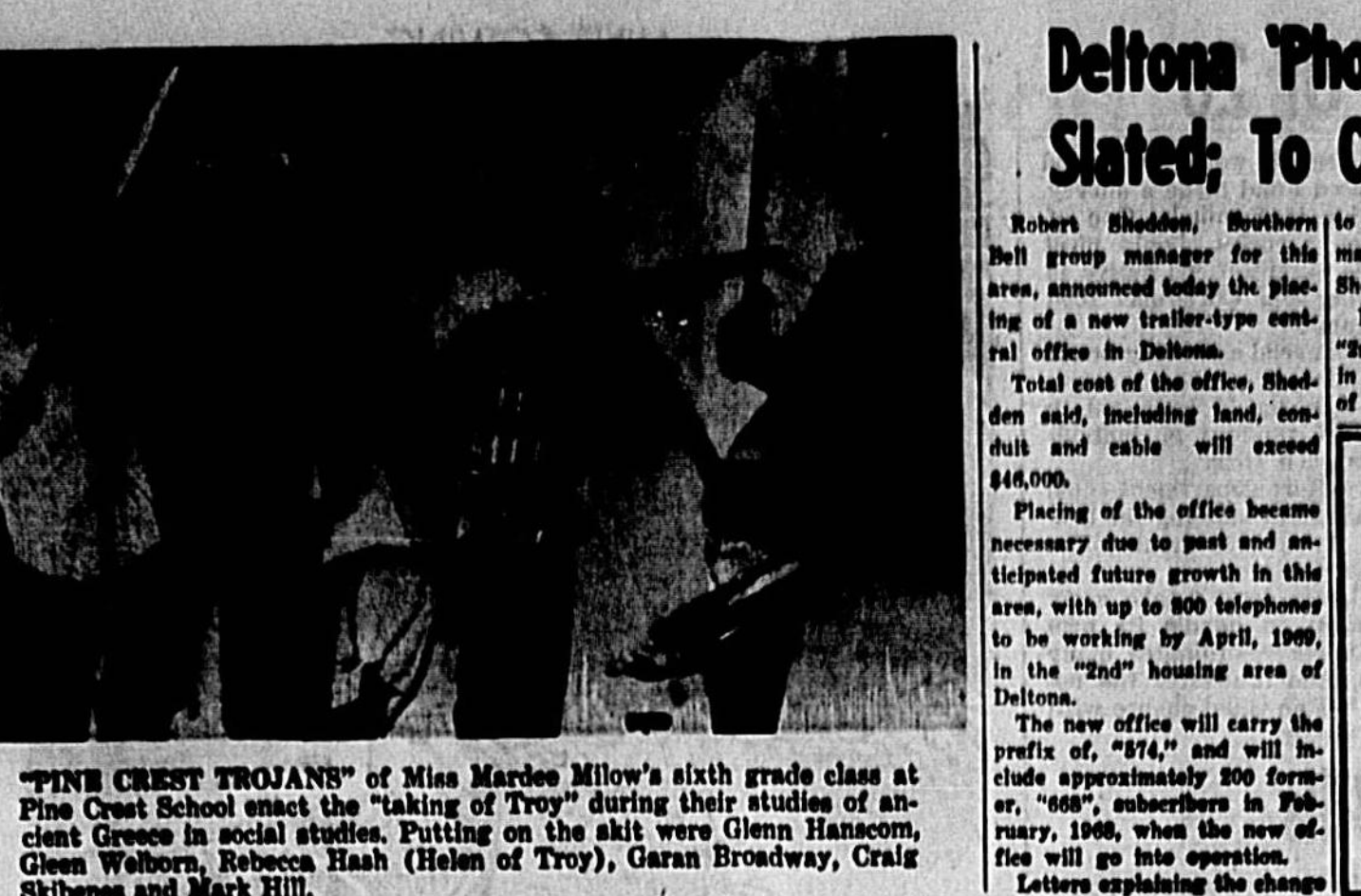
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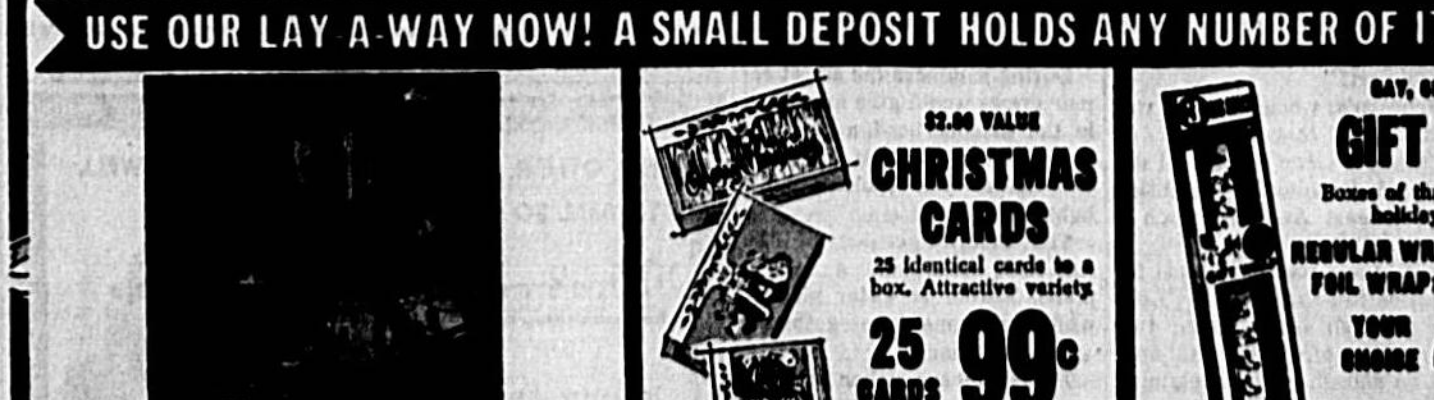
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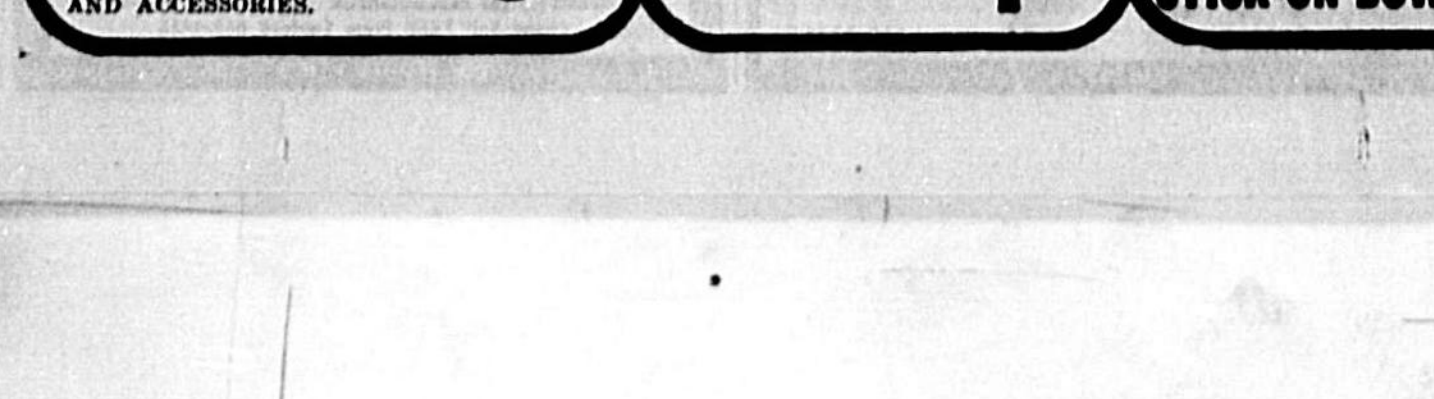
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Deltona Phone Office

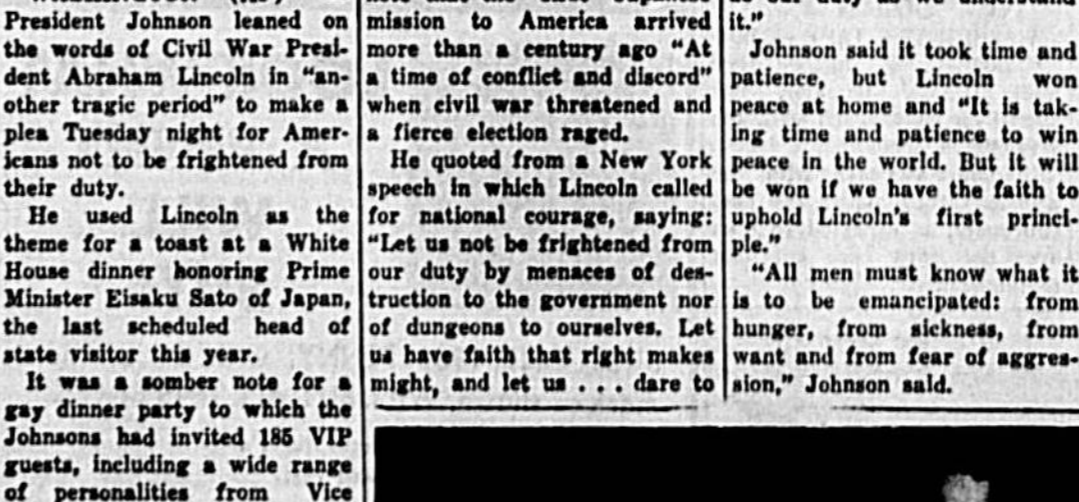

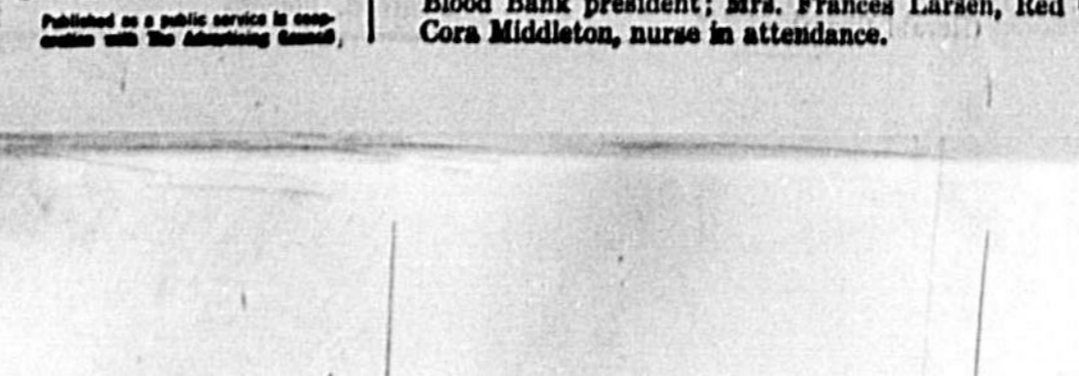

At 7:30 p.m., there will be a Sharing Service and evaluation of the weekend.

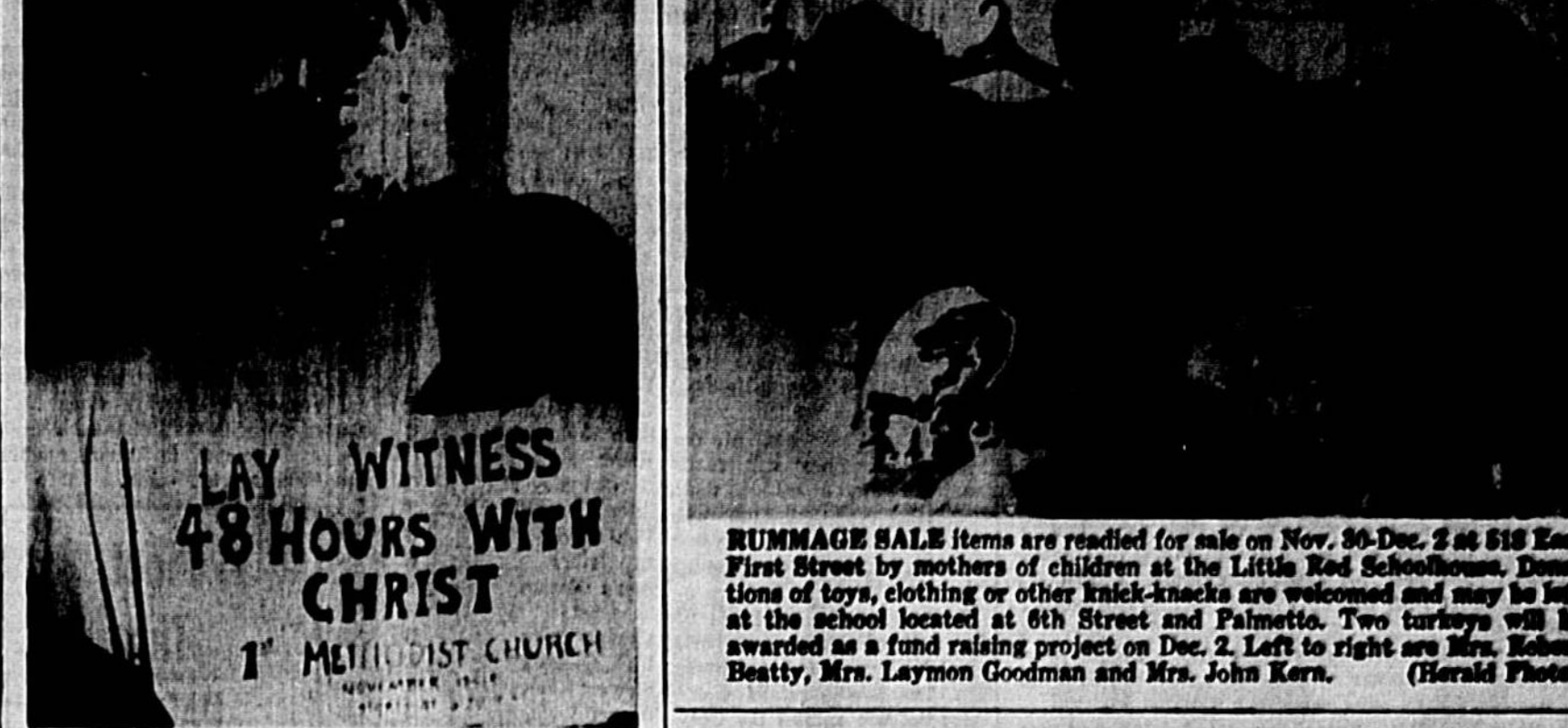

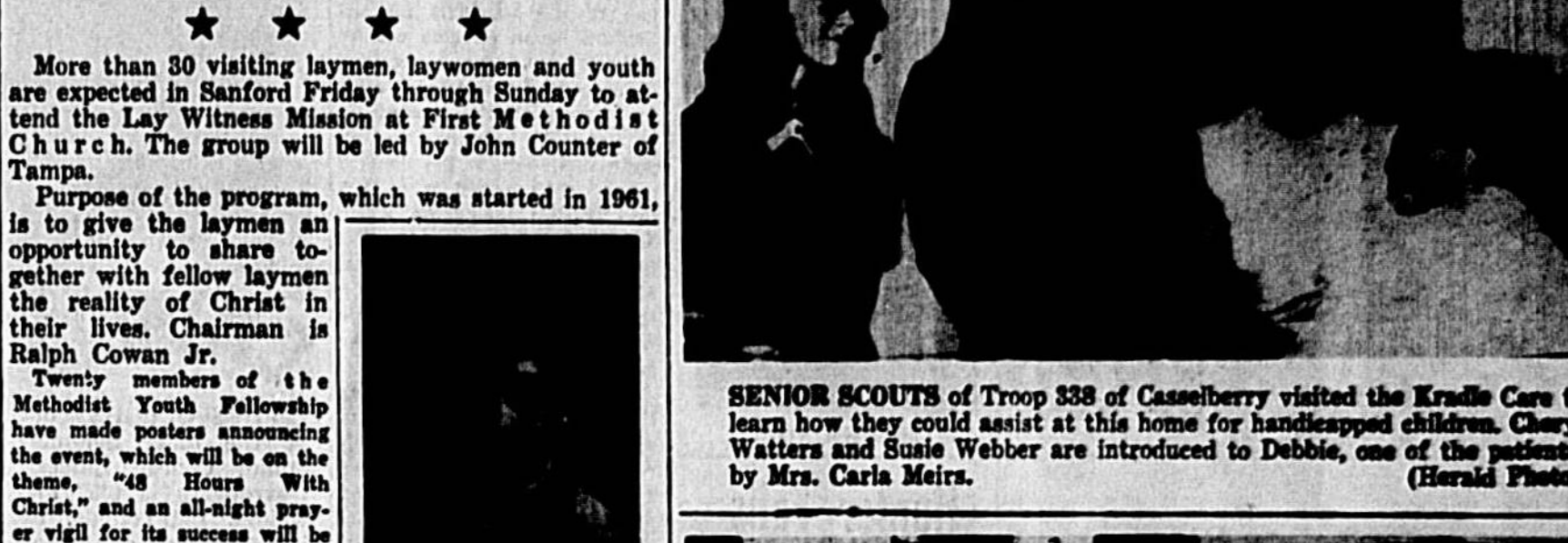

He stressed that the psychologists are seeking to understand the situation and not a way to diagnose or treat the illness by psychology. But physicians presumably would find their data important.

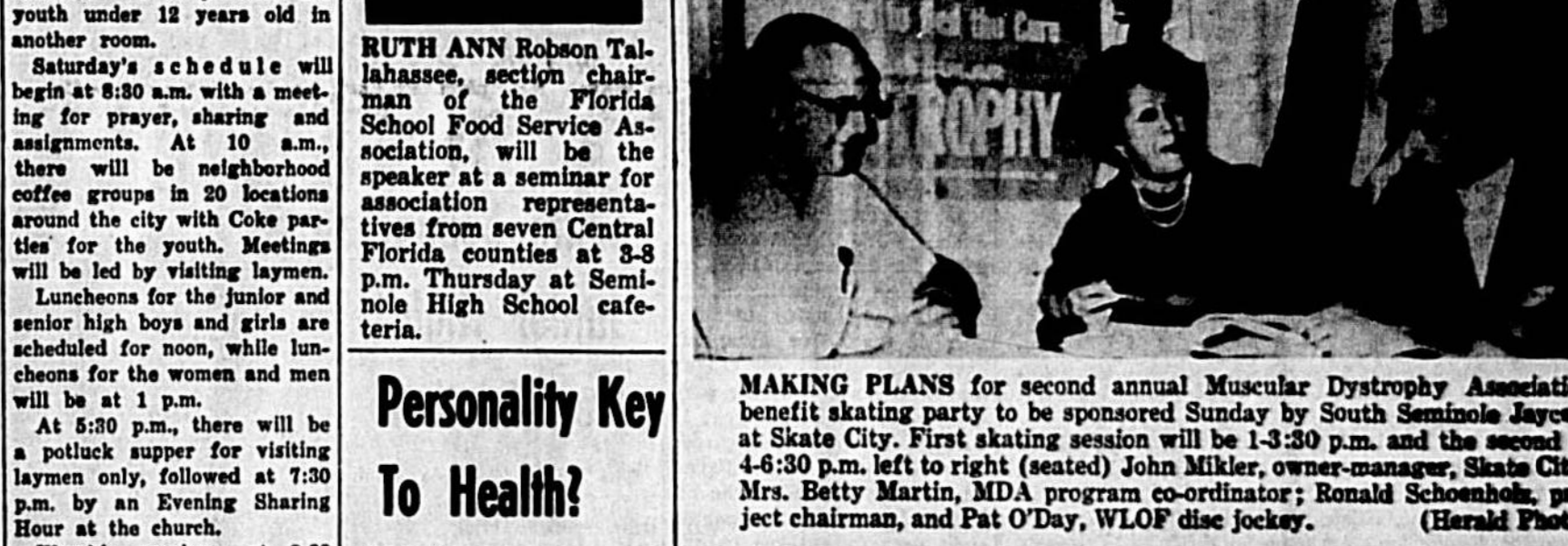

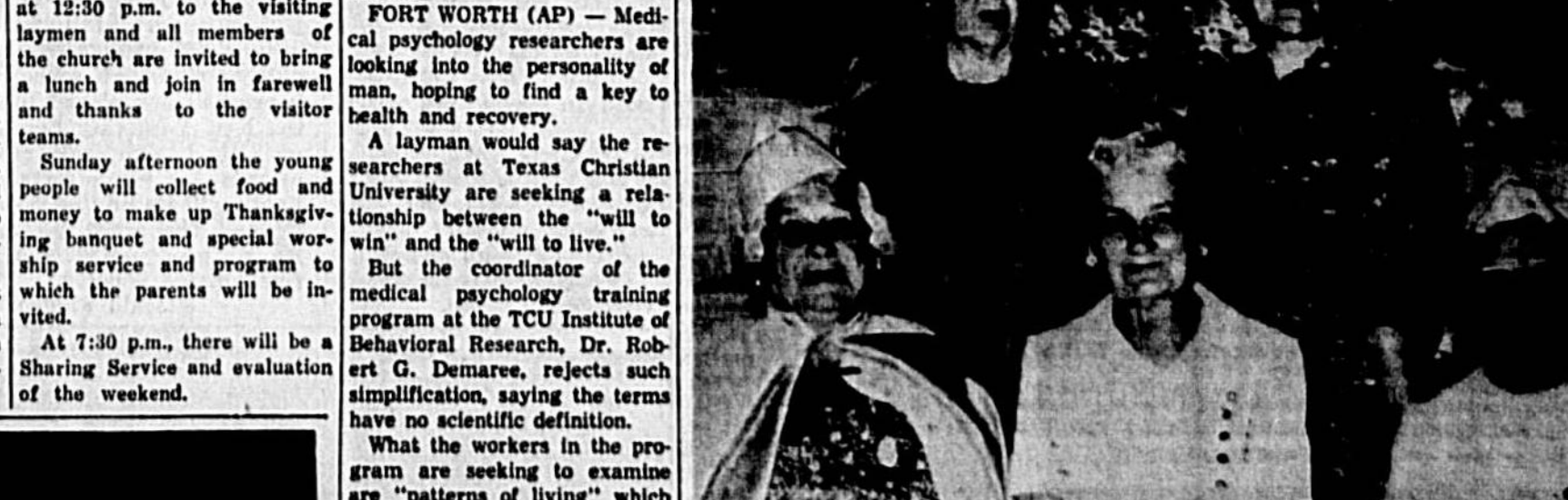

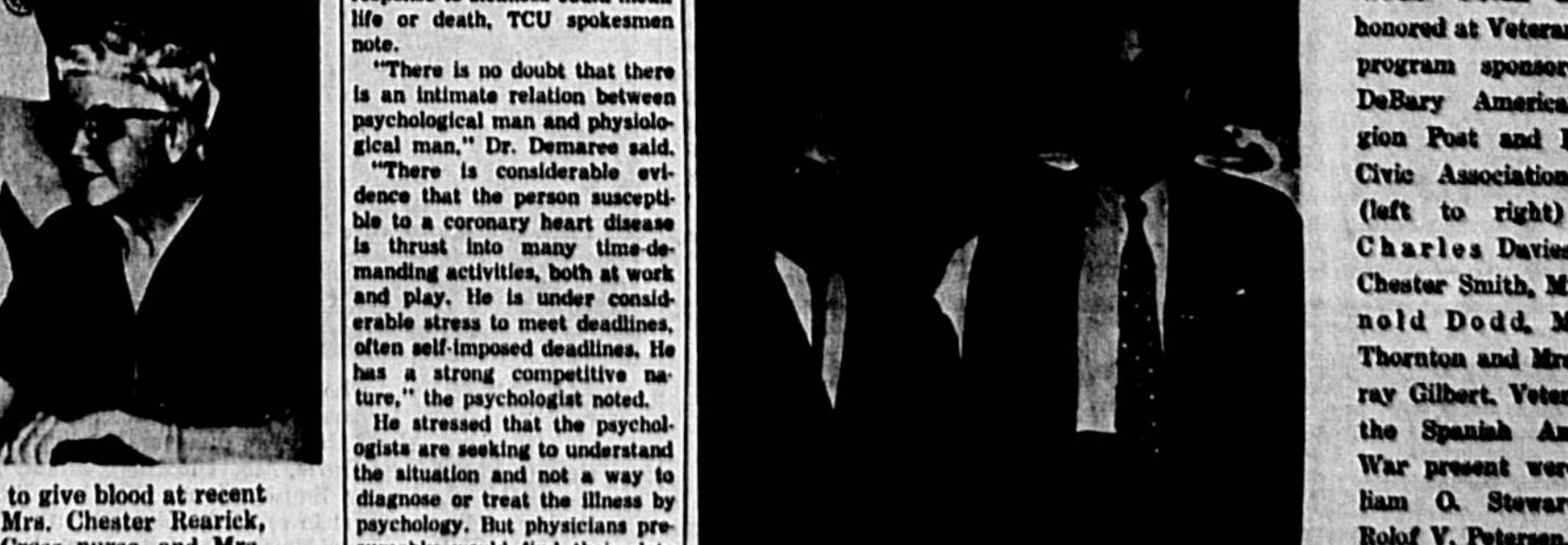

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Johnson 'Leans On' Abe Lincoln

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's speech to the world of Civil War President Abraham Lincoln in "another tragic period" to make peace Tuesday night for Americans not to be frightened from their duty.

He used Lincoln as the theme for a toast at a White House dinner honoring Prime Minister Eisaku Sato of Japan, the last scheduled head of state visitor this year.

It was a somber note for a dinner party to which the Johnsons had invited 195 VIP guests, including a wide range of personalities from Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey to St. Louis Cardinals pitcher Bob Gibson and singer Tony Bennett.

Johnson made the historical note that the first Japanese mission to America arrived more than a century ago "At a time of conflict and discord when civil war threatened and a fierce election raged."

He quoted from a New York speech in which Lincoln called for national courage, saying: "Let us not be frightened from our duty by menaces of destruction to the government nor of dangers to ourselves. Let us have faith that right makes might, and let us dare to do our duty as we understand it."

Johnson said it took time and patience, but Lincoln won peace at home and "it is taking time and patience to win peace in the world. But it will be won if we have the faith to uphold Lincoln's first principle: "All men must know what it is to be emancipated: from hunger, from sickness, from want and from fear of aggression." Johnson said.

Personality Key To Health?

EDITOR'S NOTE: Psychologists at Texas Christian University are probing the relationship between personality and heart disease and cancer victims. Here is a report on their studies.

FORT WORTH (AP) — Medical psychology researchers are looking into the personality of a man, hoping to find a key to health and recovery.

A layman would say the relationship between the "will to win" and the "will to live."

But the coordinator of the medical psychology training program at the TCU Institute of Behavioral Science, Dr. Robert G. Demaree, rejects such simplification, saying the terms have no scientific definition.

What the workers in the program are seeking to examine are "patterns of living" which are a person prone to heart attacks. They also want to test out personality traits which determine how a patient reacts to illness.

Such patterns of living and response to sickness could mean life or death, TCU spokesman said.

"There is no doubt that there is an intimate relation between psychological man and physical man," Dr. Demaree said.

"There is a considerable evidence that the person susceptible to a coronary heart disease is thrust into many time-demanding activities, both at work and at play. He is under considerable stress to meet deadlines, often self-imposed deadlines. He has a strong competitive nature," the psychologist noted.

He stressed that the psychologists are seeking to understand the situation and not a way to diagnose or treat the illness by psychology. But physicians presumably would find their data important.

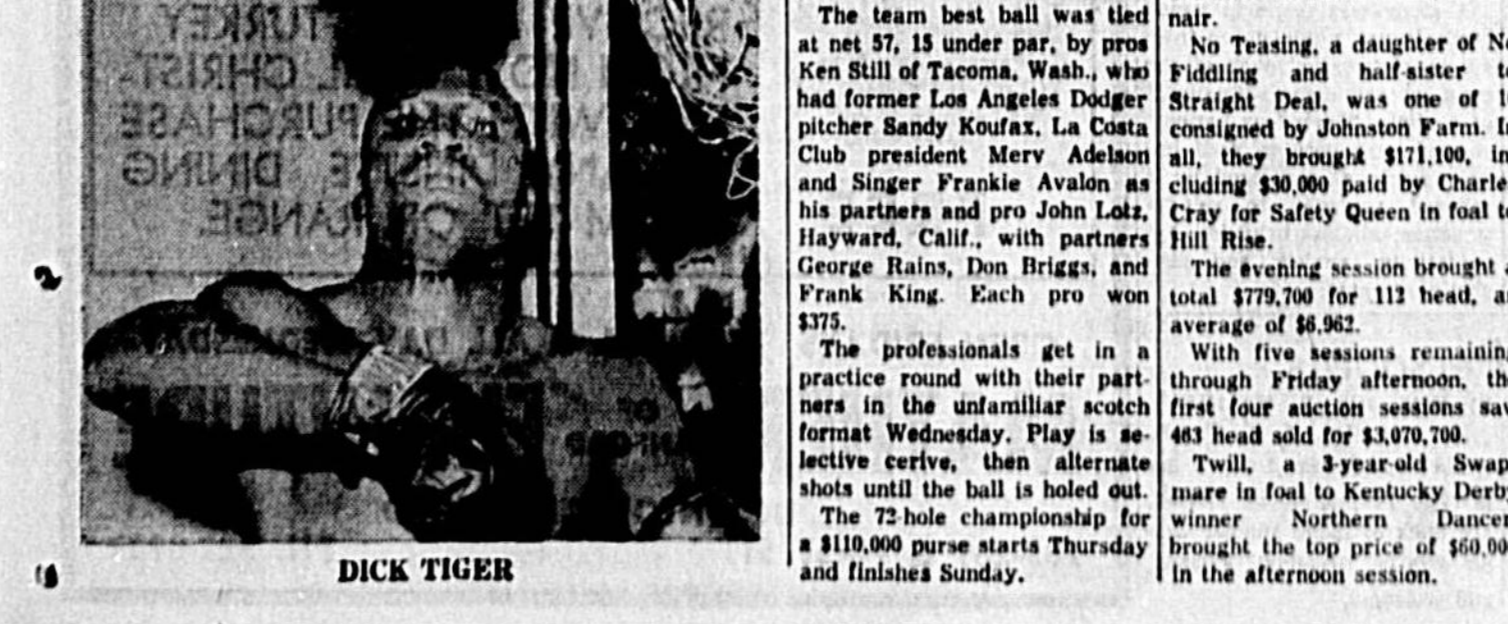

**What To Do
If Freezer
Conks Out**

If the power goes off, how long the food in your freezer will stay frozen depends on the amount of food in the freezer, the kind of food, the temperature of the food and the freezer itself.

Food will usually stay frozen in a fully loaded cabinet two days, but in a cabinet with less than half a load, not more than a day. The colder the food, the longer it stays frozen.

If you have reason to believe the freezer will be off for a considerable time, there are several things you can do—keep the freezer closed, move the food to a cooler place, add dry ice if you can get it, or can the food if necessary.

In the event you plan to take the food to the locker plant, call to see if it is operating and, if so, whether it has room for your food.

If space is available, wrap the food in newspapers and rush it to the locker plant.

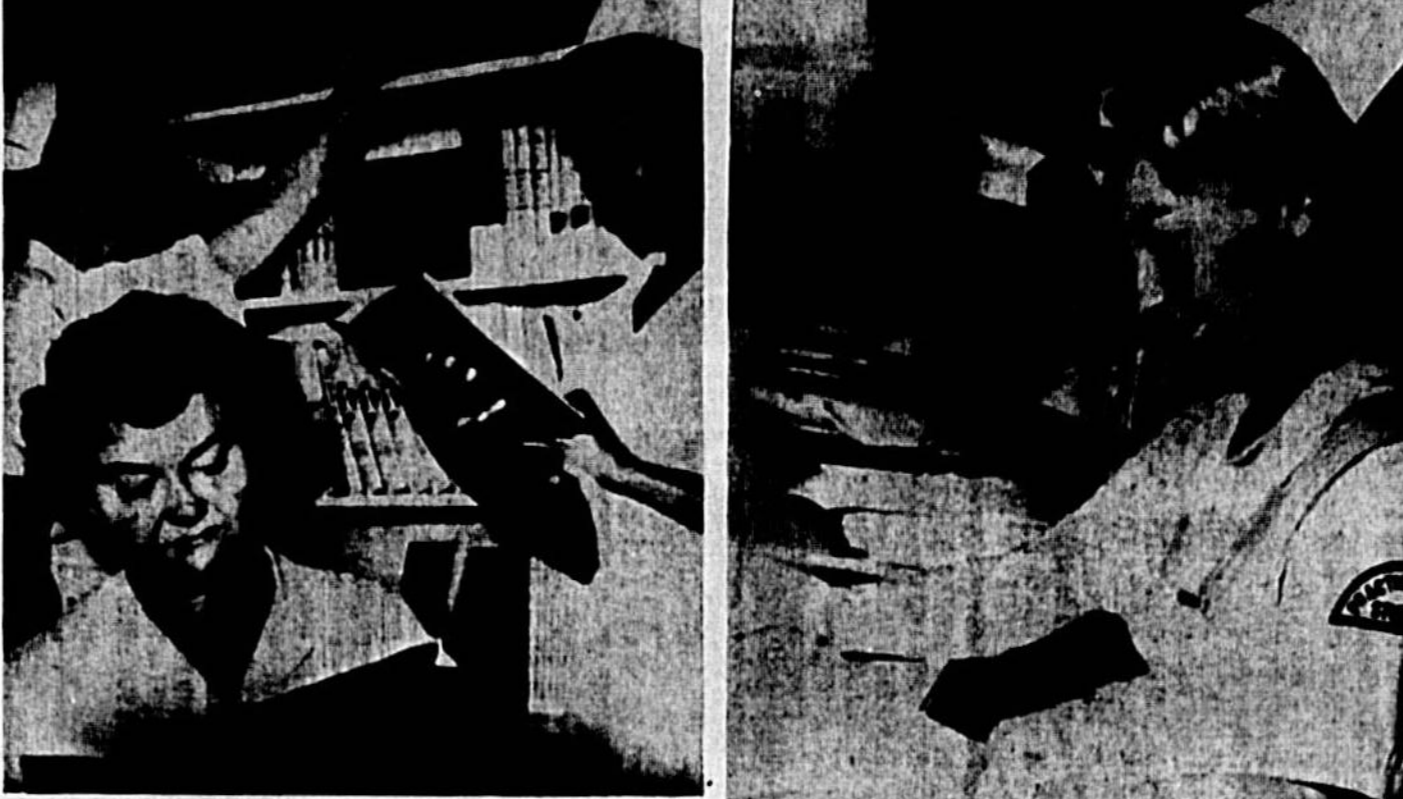
