Talmadge Says White Majority Backs Him; 1,000 Students March

Herman Talks Before State Legislature; Would Take Chance With White Voters

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 21.—(AP)—Herman Talmadge told the Georgia State Legislature today that the majority of the white people in the state are behind him in his determination to be governor.

Talmadge said he will call for the majority of the white people to come to Atlanta and show them what he termed "a real demonstration."

In his prepared text, Talmadge accused "Communists" of "black propaganda" and "false accusations" that he had organized a "military coup d'etat."

The opposition led by Governor Ellis Arnall and Lieut. M. E. Thompson is calling upon the people of Georgia to stage an uprising.

Talmadge said: "They are advocating anarchy." Talmadge offered to meet any candidate for the governorship in a democratic primary. He said he would be willing to put the issue up to the white democratic voters after the legislative committee has selected a candidate.

Earlier, Lieut. Thompson had offered to run against Talmadge in a general election.

To the governor-elect, M. E. Thompson announced that he would accept the governorship if Talmadge accepted the program as a barter for the program with a glass eye and also accompanied M. E. Thompson.

Second on the program were bills introduced by W. R. Conley and Miss Rosemary Dunbar.

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Marshall Sworn In; Repudiates All Talk Of Political Nature

Takes Oath In White House Ceremony; Says He Is No Political Candidate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Secretary of State George C. Marshall was sworn in today at the White House.

It was a brief ceremony, but those watching it included the highest men in the government. President Truman, members of the Cabinet, and top-ranking foreign policy leaders in Congress.

In that crisp sentence, Secretary Marshall defined the attitude he will take in his new position.

Turning to Mr. Truman and the other officials, Marshall said: "I am not a political candidate and the complement of your confidence, I'll do my best."

News and radio correspondents reporting on the ceremony, which took place in the White House, said that Marshall's office as General Marshall took over from the office of the President's Secretary of State, succeeding James H. Doolittle.

Earlier today General Marshall declared emphatically that he never would permit himself to be drafted for political office. He said that the statement as he got off a train in Washington when he was inducted into the service had included the statement that he would not be drafted for political office.

He said: "I will never become involved in political matters and therefore I cannot be considered a candidate for political office."

He added that the popular conception that a person can be drafted as a candidate for political office is a misconception and that he would not be drafted for political office.

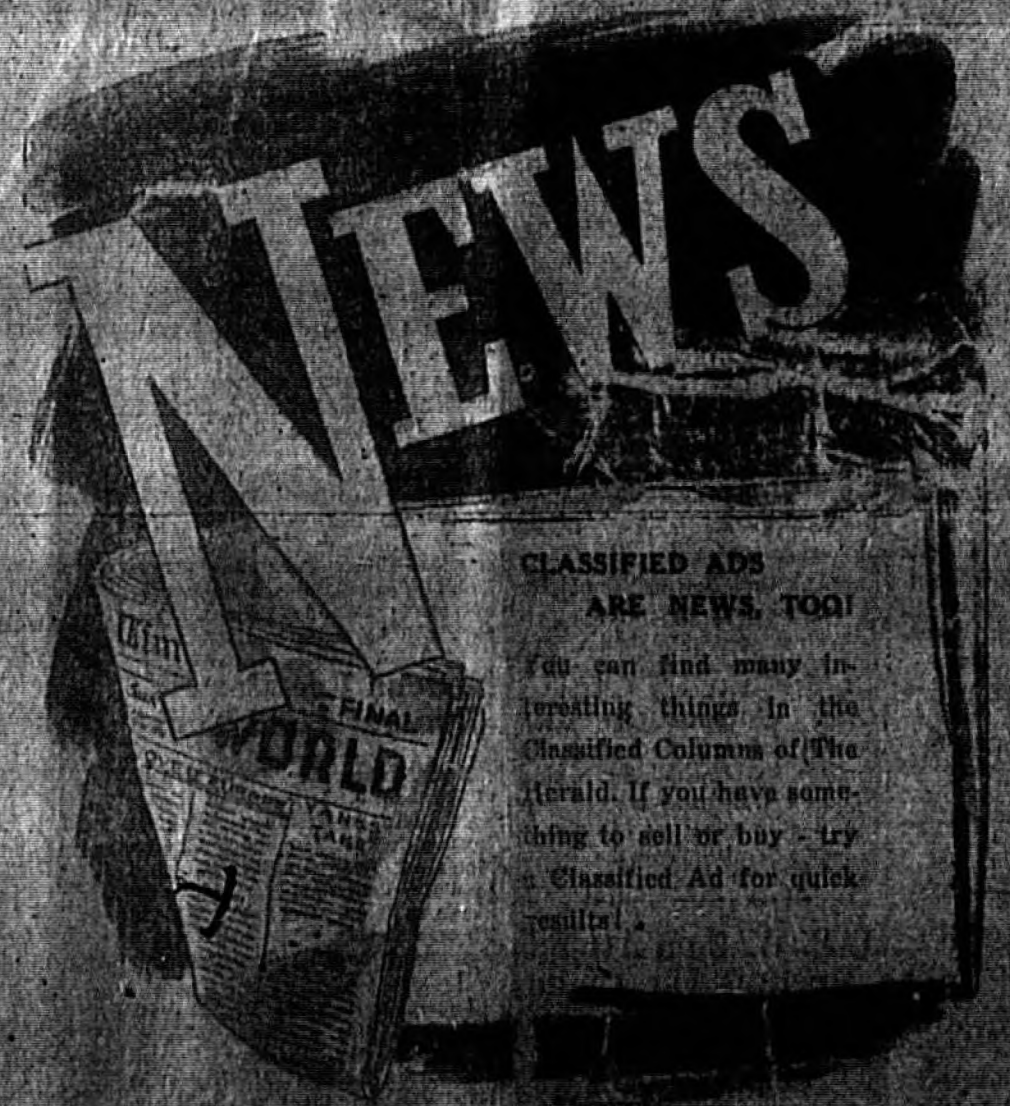

Only 51,000 Vets Use Up \$2-20 Rights

WASHINGTON.—Only 51,000 veterans of World War II have drawn their full quota of the \$20 a week allotment of the GI bill of rights.
Under the law, veterans who served less than 18 months had more than 30 days to draw the allowance. Some called unemployment pay a proportionately longer length of time.
The 51,000 who have already exhausted their \$20 benefits are only about four tenths of one percent of the more than 4,000,000 World War II veterans, almost all of whom are eligible. Of those who actually began drawing allowances—soon enough to have exhausted them—they are 22 percent.
More May Follow.
Actually, few of the 11,000,000 who have exhausted their right to the allowance. The demobilization program was just getting underway a year ago and didn't reach its peak until mid-winter. Other veterans don't know how well on the way they are to the allowance.

Tennessee Was High.
Tennessee has the highest rate percentage. Almost five tenths of every hundred Tennessee veterans who were a year ago have used up the works.
But the record shows that Tennessee is far behind Puerto Rico. More than 40 percent of Puerto Rican veterans have used up their allowance. Low wage scales in Puerto Rico are given as one reason.
Largest single month's expenditure in the program occurred in April, when up-month was paid to unemployed veterans received \$140,074,500. During the first week in November the number actually drawing the allowance fell below the million mark. Effects of the coal strike and consequent work stoppages may reverse the downward trend.

"A lady of love and devotion of seventy and seventy was told yesterday by Mrs. Edith Bell, a missionary and her two children, Mary, 14, and Robert, 11, who drifted from 19 to 20 days on a tiny raft shared by 14 others after the ship bringing them home from Africa had been torpedoed."
"The suddenness of the attack, coupled with the rapidly with which the vessel began to sink, rendered useless all of the life boats and forced both passengers and crew to use foot rafts that had been about. Most of the passengers gained the raft only after floundering about in the water for some time. Mrs. Bell said. The raft later drifted apart, and the three others that appeared."
"Response to the elements and the hardships of the raft, the occupants of the raft, who consisted of 17 members of the crew and two children of another missionary family, as well as the Bell family."
"After two weeks at sea on these spotted rafts and through no visions. Happily contemplating an immediate rescue, the party celebrated by drinking most of their remaining water. The next day a ship was seen looking two them but apparently was unable to locate the rafts. However, when the party came to replenish their depleted water supply, they were rescued by the survivors."
"Two tragically occurred during the three weeks. The vessel's "apple," Rev. Gullerupson, a small man, lost of shoes and exposure shortly after the torpeding."
"On the nineteenth day a large conveyer was sighted. Southern people that they were saved. However, frantic signaling by the men brought the United Nations warship close by to make the rescue."
"Mrs. Bell will tell the story to her own words during the Convention. The service is at 7:30 p.m. and the public is cordially invited to attend."

Alcoholism in Women

Alcoholism among women has risen alarmingly during the past year, declares Dr. Robert Selinger, member of the psychiatric staff of Johns Hopkins Hospital. In the Reader's Digest for February, among every ten alcoholics, when the author began his practice, not more than one was a woman. Now women average four in ten.

Selinger's article, condensed from Woman's Home Companion, says that women in all walks of life, ranging in years from 18 to 70, are afflicted. Nearly one-third of the women who are in jail in America are there because of drunkenness. But alcoholism, far from being confined to the lawless, is making its deepest inroads among our most intelligent and sensitive women...

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"Controlled social drinking" can become pathological, warn women alcoholics of this group are fewer than those who drink to escape an intolerable situation of real life. There are "red lights" to warn the social drinker. Selinger says. If he needs a drink in the morning, if he prefers to drink alone, if liquor interferes with her work or home life, or if she drinks to bolster her self-confidence, it is time for her to stop drinking.

Future Teachers There is hope in sight for those who are alarmed about the present shortage of well-trained teachers. In many high schools and colleges an organization has been sponsored which is known as the Future Teachers of America. These promising youngsters are taken on tours of inspection to schools of all ranks and are given practical teaching assignments, as well as having regular teaching assignments a certain number of times a month. They are under the guidance of experienced teachers and are chosen not only for good grades, but also for the qualities of temperament and character which go to make good guides for the young.

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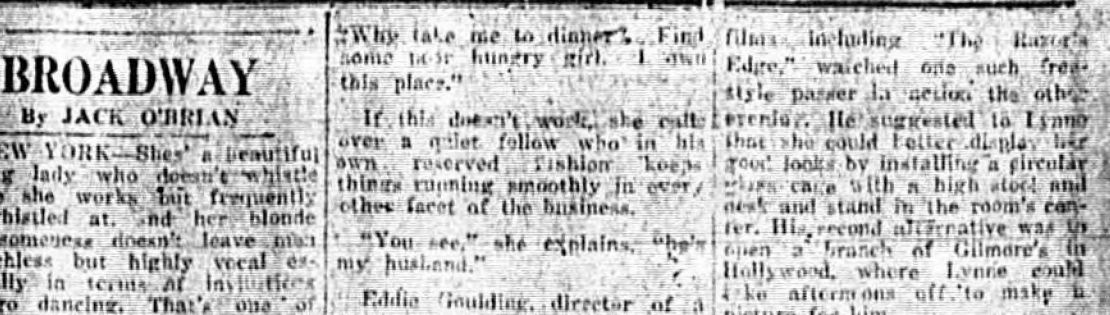

Special School Health Program To Be Instituted

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 21 (Special)—The state health department announced today that it will receive a special grant of \$70,000 from the Federal Public Health Service for a special school health examination and instruction program and 25 young medical doctors will be ready in a few weeks to begin the most ambitious task of this kind ever sponsored in Florida. Funds for the program, a total of \$70,000 from the Children's Bureau, have been made available to the state health department on the basis of an application of Health Officer Dr. William T. Sawyer made when on a recent trip to Washington.

The physicians are men who have just graduated from medical colleges and will not be able to begin their internships until next July. Most of them will be from medical schools in the South. They will be under the clinical supervision of Dr. Grace Hardy, pediatrician.

It is expected that at least 50,000 school children, mostly grade-age youngsters, will be examined between now and July. The physicians will work in teams of two and directly through the organized health departments. However, not every school will be surveyed in the chosen counties. First, they will be checked as to the degree of the local health officer.

Defects such as eye aches, hearing postures, possibly nose insects, and mild nutritional deficiencies which show up in the skin will be looked for. Cases will be referred to private physicians, and to

Teachers Will Be Trained To Give Driving Lessons

NEW YORK, Jan. 21 (Special)—High school teachers from nine central Florida counties will receive special instruction in the teaching of driver education and safety when two teacher training institutes are held in late January and early February, it was announced today by the National Conservation Bureau, accident prevention division of the Association of Casualty and Safety Executive, the sponsor organization.

The first three-day institute will be held at Clearwater on Jan. 25, according to Harold R. Danford, director of National Conservation Bureau. The second will open at Orlando on Feb. 7.

The Clearwater institute will include high school teachers from Pinellas, Pasco and Hillsborough Counties. Counties represented at the Orlando institute will include Orange, Lake, Seminole, Brevard and Volusia. Mr. Danford said.

In addition to high school teachers, the Orlando institute will include several Chief Scout officials who will be permanent instructors in the current driver safety program being conducted by Girl Scout organizations.

Chairman of the training institute at Clearwater is Dr. H. C. B. Fink, principal of the Clearwater High School and chairman of the Pinellas County Safety Council. Superintendent of Orange County Public Schools, will preside at the Orlando institute.

Besides Messrs. Danford, Fink and Walker, instructors in the classes will include local school, police and city officials.

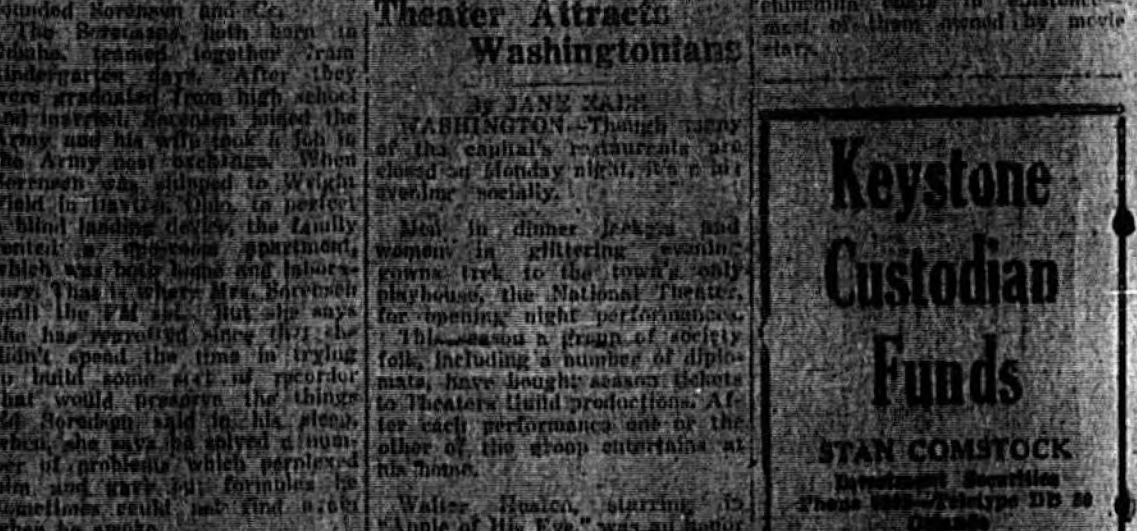

Kidnapped Girl Returns Home After Escape

Police On West Coast Hunting Abductor; Girl Is Unharmed After Long Ordeal

LODI, Calif., Jan. 22 (AP)—A 17-year-old high school student is safe at home today while police search the West Coast for her kidnapper. The girl, Althea Dean Devine, disappeared Monday night when she went to a photograph studio. Police officials said she escaped from a cabin in a tourist camp near Sacramento yesterday afternoon while her abductor was absent, presumably trying to arrange for the collection of \$10,000 ransom.

The entire West Coast is being searched for a man police say used the names Everett Weir, Stiles and William Giles while posing as an agent for an eastern publishing house. Police said Miss Devine told them the man bound and gagged her after leaving the photo studio and drove to the camp with her.

The owner of the motel where Miss Devine said she was held overnight by an abductor was interviewed. He said that there were several unexplained complaints about the girl's story which puzzled him. Joe Shinsky, the motel's court owner, said, "You'd think a kid who'd been held in one of my rooms here would have said something about it or told me about being kidnapped."

The girl herself told her story today. She said that she did not know the man who arrested her. The latest version of the 26-hour ordeal is that she was taken to a room in which she was kept by California highway patrolmen in Sacramento as saying that she struggled fiercely with the abductor.

Cold Weather Freezes Eastern Half Of Country

CHICAGO, Jan. 22 (AP)—The cold wave that swept across the Midwest Tuesday and the eastern half of the nation and chilled the Gulf of Mexico, has now reached the Gulf. In some eastern cities, temperatures dropped well below freezing, a drop of 40 degrees in some cities compared with Monday's springlike weather.

In Atlanta, the thermometer dropped to 21 degrees and it was 14 at Nashville, Tenn. Even in Jacksonville, the mercury was only a few degrees above the freezing mark.

In the West, Pittsburgh and Cleveland were in the red with readings of five above zero. Cincinnati and Harrisburg, Penn. had a above, Philadelphia 11 and New York and Washington 14 above. It was below zero in northern Maine but Boston was a crisp 17 degrees in contrast to 45 on Tuesday.

In the Midwest where the cold wave started, the mercury dropped as low as 24 below in parts of Minnesota today. The Federal Weather Bureau is predicting moderate temperatures for tomorrow in the north central region.
