

PRESIDENT'S BUDGET FOR 1948



WITHIN THE NEXT MONTH, the 1948 budget recommendations of President Truman will be heard before the Joint Committee on the Budget. That is still an considerable time away, but it is generally expected that the President's report will be accepted. It would require an increase in taxes of about \$1.5 billion. Some would say it is down to 30 billion dollars. Naturally, the expenditures would have to be stopped accordingly. It is likely that the first time a budget measure of this kind is passed by Congress will be the Atlantic Energy Commission. The above chart is based on figures as presented in President Truman's report to Congress.

Colder Weather Penetrates Into Central Florida

Small Craft Warnings Are Posted Front Moving East

Florida is due for a general thaw of tonight and Wednesday according to the Weather Bureau. Near freezing temperatures are expected in the North and Central parts of the State and scattered frosts are forecast in the low ground around Tallahassee.

The Weather Bureau in Miami advised small craft warnings today for both the East and West Coasts of the State. Winds are expected to reach 25 to 30 miles an hour.

Small boats were ordered to leave the coast and seek shelter in the West Coast and south of Jacksonville in Mobile Bay on the East Coast.

A new cold wave responsible for the thaws today and is headed toward the Atlantic Seaboard. Temperatures a few days ago are forecast to drop to below zero in the North and upper New York tonight. A heavy rain is forecast for the southern states through the middle of next week.

The new field has spread quickly through the plain states and eastward across the central states. The heavy rain is expected to move inland in Missouri, with some snow in that state showing signs that the winter season is being considered in Washington by the Weather Bureau and other agencies.

Talmadge Says White Majority Backs Him; 1,000 Students March

Herman Talks Before State Legislature; Would Take Chance With White Voters

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 21.—(AP)—Herman Talmadge told the Georgia State Legislature today that the majority of the white people in the state are behind him in his determination to be governor. His opposition persists, Talmadge said, will call for the majority of the white people to come to Atlanta and show them what he termed "a real demonstration." Talmadge spoke to a joint session of the General Assembly.

In his prepared text, Talmadge termed "absolutely false" accusations that he had seized the governorship with a military coup d'etat. He said the opposition led by Governor Ellis Arnall and Lieut. M. E. Thompson is calling upon the people of Georgia to stage an uprising. He added: "They are advocating anarchy." Talmadge offered to meet any candidate for the governorship in a democratic primary. He said he would be willing to put the issue up to the white democratic voters after the legislative committee is organized. Earlier, Lieut. Thompson had offered to run against Talmadge in a general election. To the governor-elect, Thompson said he would support him in any capacity.

The first threat of a coup in state operations came when the state superior court in Tallahassee, Fla., announced that it would enjoin Thompson, not Talmadge, as the acting governor. Talmadge said that he would honor any requirements for support from the officials appointed by Talmadge.

Only 51,000 Vets Use Up 52-20 Rights

WASHINGTON—Only 51,000 veterans of World War II have drawn their full quota of the \$20 a week readjustment allowance payable under the GI bill of rights.

Under the law, veterans who served less than 18 months had more than 90 days to draw the allowance. Veterans who served less than 12 months had 60 days. Veterans who served less than 9 months had 30 days. Veterans who served less than 6 months had 15 days. Veterans who served less than 3 months had 7 days.

Only slightly more than one out of every hundred veterans discharged a year ago have drawn the full duration allowance. Tennessee has the highest rate percentage. Almost five tenths of every hundred Tennesseans who were veterans a year ago have used up the works.

But the record shows that Tennessee is far behind Puerto Rico. More than 40 percent of Puerto Rican veterans have used up their allowance. Low wage scales in Puerto Rico are given as one reason.

Largest single month's expenditure in the program occurred in April, when up to \$100,000,000 every month was paid to unemployed veterans. California has the lowest percentage of used-up bene-



Rollins' Animated Magazine To Be "Published" Feb. 23



CORAL GABLES, Jan. 21.—University of Miami, which revived baseball on an informal basis last year and then started its current campaign with only one veteran returning, gets catapulted into the middle of the nation's big-time basketball circuit with the announcement that the Hurricanes will appear in at least four of the most notable college basketball double headers ever staged.

S. D. Feinberg, who has been promoting collegiate double headers in Cincinnati and Louisville, will offer at least four out of four twin bills in Miami's famed Orange Bowl this winter. A court will be built in front of the stadium area between the 90 yard lines, and all bleachers will be built along one side of the court and seats for some 25,000 fans will be available.

Since big time basketball is just being introduced into Miami this year, Mr. Feinberg will be satisfied if he can average 4,000 fans per game but he hopes that eventually the game will catch on here as it has elsewhere and with the early projected enlargement of the Orange Bowl, tens of thousands of more Miami basketball double headers, which would make Miami the nation's basketball capital.

Miami will face such foes as Tulane, Miami U. of Ohio, Cincinnati and Villanova in the twin bills and the Hurricanes, pretty much a freshman outfit, can only hope to make things interesting for their more experienced rivals this year but in another reason for two boys, Ed Campbell of Caldwell, N. Kidnapped Girl Returns Home After Escape

Police On West Coast Hunting Abductor; Girl Is Unharmed After Long Ordeal

LODI, Calif., Jan. 22 (AP)—A 17-year-old high school student is safe at home today while police search the West Coast for her kidnapper. The girl, Althea Dean Devine, disappeared Monday night when she went to a photograph studio. Police officials said she escaped from a cabin in a tourist camp near Sacramento yesterday afternoon while her abductor was absent, presumably trying to arrange for the collection of \$10,000 ransom.

The entire West Coast is being searched for a man police say used the names Everett Weir, Stiles and William Giles while posing as an agent for an eastern publishing house. Police said Miss Devine told them the man bound and gagged her after leaving the photo studio and drove to the camp with her.

The owner of the motel where Miss Devine said she was held overnight by a kidnapper was interviewed. He said that there were several unexplained complaints about the girl's story which puzzled him. Joe Shinsky, the motel's court owner, said, "You'd think a kid who'd been held in one of my rooms here would have said something about it or told me about being kidnapped."

The girl herself told her story today. She said that she did not know the man who was arrested. Her latest version of the 26-hour ordeal is that she was taken to a room in which she was quoted by California highway patrolmen in Sacramento as saying that she struggled fiercely with the abductor.

Cold Weather Freezes Eastern Half Of Country

CHICAGO, Jan. 22 (AP)—The cold wave that swept across the Midwest Tuesday and the eastern half of the nation and chilled the Gulf of Mexico, has now reached the Gulf. In some eastern cities, temperatures dropped well below freezing, a drop of 40 degrees in some cities compared with Monday's springlike weather.

In Atlanta, the thermometer dropped to 21 degrees and it was 14 at Nashville, Tenn. Even in Jacksonville, the mercury was only a few degrees above the freezing mark.

In the West, Pittsburgh and Cleveland were in the red with readings of two above zero. Cincinnati and Harrisburg, Penn. had a above, Philadelphia 11 and New York and Washington 14 above. It was below zero in northern Maine but Boston was a crisp 17 degrees in contrast to 48 on Tuesday.

In the Midwest where the cold wave started, the mercury dropped as low as 24 below in parts of Minnesota today. The federal weather bureau is predicting moderate temperatures for tomorrow in the north central region.
