

Dodd relayed a Communist demand for 1,000 sheets of writing paper and a "hospital representative." The paper was stacked outside the gate. But Brig. Gen. Charles F. Colson, newly named prison camp commander succeeding Dodd, allowed neither paper nor medic to pass through the gates.

Instead, Colson demanded the Reds release Dodd forthwith. The North Koreans ignored the de-
