Flying Opportunities

Young men of Sanford and other Central Florida towns who have been complaining, not without instiffeation, that the world of today offers few opportunities, should not overlook the flying school which opens in Sanford July I and continues throughout the summer. Here, at almost no expense to themselves, they can learn to fly under expert instructors and the sponsorship of the Civil Association.

under expert instructors and the sponsorship of the Civil Aeronautics Authority.

The school is open to citizens of the United States between the ages of 18 and 26 who are residents of Florida. There are no educational requirements except that one must not be enrolled in college at the present time. For college students other air training provisions have been made. The only charge for the Sanford course is the \$6 for physical examination which is refunded to them if they win one of the ten flight instruction scholarships.

These ten are awarded a private pilot's license upon

These ten are awarded a private pilot's license upon completing the course and the entire training course does not cost them a penny. Others in the school may also get a private pilot's license upon completing the course but would have to pay a very nominal charge. All those who receive a private pilot's license at this school are eligible for advanced training as cadets in the Army or Naval air corps upon completion of which they would be commissioned in the air corps reserves.

In this connection it is worth while to note that young men taking this training are not increasing their likelihood of having to fight for their country, but instead are diminishing it, because if we have a large air force with a large reserve of trained pilots there is much less chance of this country's being attacked than if we are not thus prepared. And in the event of war the universal draft would require the services of all young men regardless of whether they had had any previous avia-tion or military training.

It should also be remembered that the more flying hours which a pilot in a doglight has to his credit the less chance there is of his being shot down.

Enfety First On The Fourth

In order to avoid the usual nationwide carnage on the Fourth of July which the United States celebrates next week, the National Safety Council in Chicago has adopted a slogan, "Safety First on the Fourth," Highway accidents, drownings, fireworks annually take a toll of life which is nothing less than appalling. The Herald joins the National Safety Council in urging greater cauturn,

"Last year," the Council said, "the nation piled up a July accident toll of 8,800 dead and 800,000 injured. The cost was \$800,000,000. Each year America chooses the Fourth of July to stage a jambores of carelessness. The Fourth of July is a day of fun, but the Fifth is a day of reckoning. Ironically, this bondage to suffering and tragedy comes as the country celebrates the birth of its Independence.

"On the highways, in the homes, on the beach and picnic grounds—everywhere men, women and children are killed off by the score, even as they celebrate. There is no rhyme or reason to this wholesale alaughter. It must be stopped! In these days when our minds are filled with the horrors of war, it is well to remember that the traffic death toll for the last two years greatly exceeds the American dead in the World War, and that traffic deaths in the last seven years have been greater than the total number of Americans killed in all the wars in the nation's history."

Thirty national organisations are co-operating setively with the National Safety Council in the nationwide campaign to cut down the Fourth of July and summer vestion toll. Governors are helping. So are mayors, police chiefs, motor vehicle administrators, ministers, business leaders, local safety councils, civic organisations. In a resolution entitled, "Put Bafety First on the Fourth!" the executive committee of the Council states:

"This mass slaughter on Independence Day can be stopped if every one of us uses caution and common sense. The things that cause these tragedles are things we can control—haste, selfishpess, thoughtlessness, the desire to show off.

"The Council calle on all America to join in a new Declaration—of Independence—independence from annual tribute of shousands of lives needlessly userificed.

"It sake Americans to remember that it is not only ironic but cruell to celebrate the right to life, liberty and the pursuit of tappiness by bringing about death, diability and tragedy.

"Life is cheep today on the battlefields of the werld, but it is still precious in Americal"
