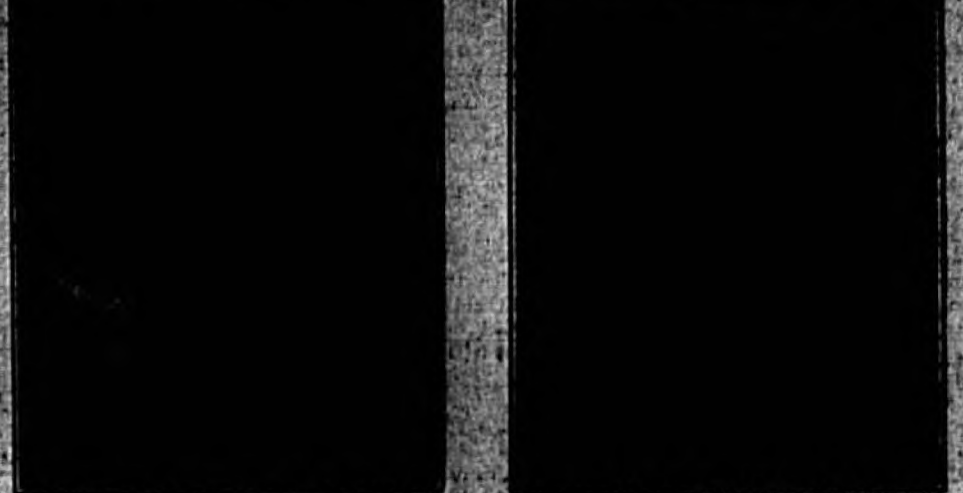

## Jury Acquits E.E. Brady Of Embezzlement

### Not Guilty Verdict Returned In Less Than Hour After Charge By Court

## Brady Accused Of Illegal Mule Sale

### Defendant On Stand Testified That He Had Loaned Mules

E. E. Brady was acquitted early this afternoon of the charge of embezzlement, the jury of six men returning the verdict in less than an hour after receiving the charge of the court.

Mr. Brady is a member of the State Legislature from Seminole County, but the indictments were brought against him in his capacity as a dealer in mules. The prosecuting witness was E. K. Gorman, who testified that the defendant embezzled two mules.

Introduction of testimony was completed late yesterday afternoon, and most of the morning session was taken up with arguments before the jury. Assistant State Attorney Boyle opening and closing the argument for the prosecution, and Attorney E. E. Housholder presenting the argument for the defense.

The jury was composed of Chris S. Thompson and J. A. Brown of Sanford, L. E. Stevens of Lake Monroe, E. M. Gelfer of Geneva, W. H. Williams of Orlando, and T. L. Shroyers of Geneva. Palms, Sheriff of Seminole County, was called upon to try the case and returned a verdict in less than an hour.

Mr. Brady said today, however, that the dismissal by the defense of A. M. Stewart as a juror was against his wishes.

Following the termination of the State's case Wednesday afternoon Mr. Brady took the stand in his own behalf and denied evidence presented by the prosecution and part of that evidence was supported by two other witnesses.

## Unlicensed Slot Machines To Be Seized By State

### Tallahassee, Dec. 19.—All unlicensed slot machines covered by the 1935 Slot Machine Act will be seized and confiscated when found by inspectors who will be ordered into the field immediately by Comptroller J. M. Lee, he announced yesterday.

The Comptroller sent the following telegram to all operators: "This is to advise that all unlicensed slot machines covered by Chapter 17277, Acts of 1935, found by inspectors will be seized and confiscated and operators of such machines will be prosecuted as provided by law. Only strict compliance with the law will save penalties."

The comptroller has made it plain that while he is not in agreement with slot machines, he will enforce the law fairly and will not comply with the law if it makes it plain that the law is to be enforced to the letter.

The following information was furnished by the Comptroller: "The law provides that any operator of a slot machine who is found to be in violation of the law shall be fined not more than \$500 and imprisoned not more than six months, or both."

## Florida Motorists Pay Highest Tax Of Any In Nation

Motor vehicle operators in the United States paid a tax of \$45.21 per vehicle on a national average last year, a study of automotive taxation by states just completed by the American Petroleum Industries Committee reveals.

The highest automotive taxes are paid in Florida, where each vehicle registered in the state paid an average of \$72.39. Motorists in the District of Columbia, where automotive taxes are cheapest of anywhere in the United States, paid slightly less than \$27 each.

In announcing results of its study, the committee pointed out that property taxes paid on motor vehicles were not included. The data used in making the computations were the official figures received by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, which gave the number of vehicles registered during 1934 as 24,932,403, the state gasoline tax collections as \$565,027,000, the federal gasoline and oil taxes collected as \$194,947,000, license fees as \$304,923,000, and federal and state gasoline taxes exclusive of those on gasoline and oil as \$67,384,002.

The heaviest levies on motorists were found to be in the form of gasoline taxes, which amounted to \$20.48 per vehicle. Of this sum \$22.66 was paid in state gasoline taxes and \$7.82 in federal gasoline and oil taxes. In Florida total Federal and State gasoline taxes amounted to \$56.91 per vehicle. License fees, including registrations, drivers licenses, etc., totaled \$12.23 per car, while \$2.70 was paid to the federal government in automotive excise taxes, exclusive of those on gasoline and oil. These excise taxes are paid automatically on new automobiles and trucks, but for simplicity the total amount collected was divided among all cars, old and new, the committee pointed out.

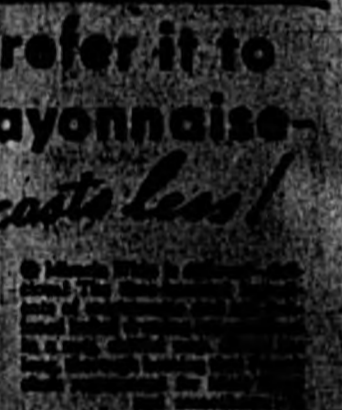

## Growers Warned Of 30 Degree Weather Predicted Tonight

### Cold Wave Spreading From Great Lakes Into South States To Invade Florida

### Citrus Expected To Escape Frost

Drop In Temperature May Not Be Severe If Winds Continue

The cold wave spreading southeastward from the Great Lakes region gave the Middle West and other sections a severe touch of winter today. It was colder from the Dakotas southward to the Rio Grande valley and the Texas coast and eastward to the Atlantic Ocean. Minnesota felt the full fury of the West, and sub-zero readings were fairly general in sections of Wisconsin and Iowa.

Much colder weather is forecast for Florida tonight and Saturday, but the Weather Bureau at Lakeland which issues frost bulletins said "present indications are that northerly winds will continue most of the night in the Central Florida district, thus preventing a fall in temperature to extremely low levels." Meteorologist Ellison said tender, truck crops may suffer, but citrus probably will escape damage. He warned truck growers to take precautions. His prediction of temperatures for truck on ground included: Sanford, Plant City and Winter Garden, 30; Pinellas Park and Osceola, 34.

The U. S. Weather Bureau forecast a generally fair and clear day with a high in the 60's and a low in the 40's. In the northern portion, freezing in central portion, frost to extreme south portion if winds subside, Saturday fair and colder in extreme south portion. Extreme northwest fair and slightly colder, heavy frost to coast. Temperatures 24 to 32 tonight, Saturday fair.

## Former Governor Of North Dakota Set Free By Jury

### 2 Other Ex-Officials Acquitted Of Conspiracy, 3rd Trial

BISMARCK, N. D., Dec. 20.—(AP)—A federal court jury on Thursday acquitted former Gov. William Langer and two other former North Dakota officials of conspiracy charges.

Freed with Langer were R. A. Kiser, former chief secretary, and Frank Vogel, former state highway commissioner. They were charged with conspiracy to obstruct federal relief legislation by soliciting political contributions from workers paid with federal relief and highway funds.

A fourth defendant, Oscar Erickson, publisher of The Leader, for support of which the contributions allegedly were sought, was freed two days ago on a directed verdict.

The jury found innocent every one on trial for the third time. They were convicted at the first trial, in June, 1934, but won a new trial upon an appeal. A second trial last month, ended in a jury disagreement.

Langer was removed from office as governor following his conviction in June. Subsequently renominated as Republican candidate for office, he withdrew in favor of his wife, Lydia, who was defeated by Thomas Moody, Democratic. Moody subsequently was disqualified for failure to fulfill constitutional requirements and was succeeded by the lieutenant governor, Walter Wolford, a Republican.

## Dinner Not To Raise Party's Election Fund

### Young Democrat Club To Observe Jackson Day, But Cut Price Of Proposed Meal

The Young Democrats Club of Seminole County will observe Jackson Day on Jan. 8 by serving a banquet in the Mayfair Hotel that evening, but the affair will not be for the purpose of adding to the war chest of the party, as suggested by James A. Farley, national chairman. The charge is to be only \$1.50 per plate, officers of the club decided at a meeting last night, and the balance that will be left over after expenses of the dinner are paid will not be large. J. Alex Sharon, appointed to attend to publicity in connection with the dinner, said today.

In correspondence with the club the suggestion was made by Mr. Farley that a charge of at least \$3 per plate be made, but this price was cut in two by the officers attending the meeting. In larger cities, according to press dispatches, a charge as high as \$10 per plate was suggested by the national chairman as a means of helping raise a campaign fund.

The national committee has arranged for souvenirs to be given every person attending the Jackson Day dinners throughout the nation, but the local club has not been advised as to the nature of these souvenirs.

Gordon Barnett was named general chairman of the Jackson Day affair and he will arrange for the installation of a public address system in the Mayfair so all the guests can hear the address to be delivered during the dinner hour by President Roosevelt. An out-of-town speaker will be engaged, and it is probable that short talks will also be made by members of the Young Democrats Club which number many new voters on its roll.

The club hopes that several hundred persons, both men and women, will go to the Jackson Day dinner. While it is a Democratic function, Mr. Sharon, who will be in charge of ticket sales, said that tickets will be offered to Republicans as well as Democrats and that "old" voters in both parties will be "more than welcome," even though the affair is being staged by the younger element.

According to political writers in the national press, the address will be the "opening gun" of the campaign, and the Young Democrats Club is anxious that every voter hear the nation's executive set forth the leading issues of the 1936 campaign.

## Mart, Canning Kitchen's Put Up To Pynchon

### Michael And Dawson Are In Conference With WPA Director On Local Projects

E. A. Pynchon, state director of the FERA, failed to stop in Sanford yesterday on his return from a conference with District Director Swopes in Orlando, so Market Manager J. G. Michael and County Agent C. R. Dawson went to Jacksonville today to confer with Mr. Pynchon.

Mr. Michael was to consult with the WPA officials about the Farmers Market in Sanford, and Mr. Dawson was to talk with him about the canning kitchen. Both of them hoped to be able to convince Mr. Pynchon of the necessity for pushing both projects without delay.

While in the City a few days ago Mr. Pynchon told H. M. Penworth and R. L. Glenn that he could "assure" them that the roads about the market would be paved at once, but he was not in a position to give any information as to when the paving project would be built. Mr. Penworth is chairman of the supervisory committee of the market, and Mr. Glenn is chairman of the County Planning Board.

Market Manager Michael said that the construction of the loading platform, for which WPA funds have been allocated, is especially desired as it will make possible the assembling of fruit and produce for broken cart shipments to northern cities.

County Agent Dawson said he hoped to get Mr. Pynchon to authorize work on the canning kitchen. The old canning kitchen in Sanford is "entirely too small," he said, and those at Oviedo and Geneva need improvements. The Sanford kitchen is so small that last year those desiring to use it had to make application a week in advance, Mr. Dawson said.

The WPA cannot be expected to provide equipment, according to the County agent, so he will go before the County Commissioners again at their January meeting and ask them to offer the price of \$300 asked for the equipment. The equipment was offered the County for \$300 and the Commissioners made a tender of \$200, but that price was rejected.

Mr. Dawson said that the canning kitchen equipment belongs to the old Rural Rehabilitation department, superseded by the Rural Resettlement Administration, but the RRA has no appropriation for such kitchens.

## Plutarco Calles, Ex-President Of Mexico, In Danger

### Return Of 'Iron Man' Is Protested By 50,000 Workers

MEXICO, CITY, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Gen. Plutarco Elias Calles' return to the country from his exile in San Francisco, focuses attention on a huge demonstration against the former president which Mexican labor leaders have called for Sunday.

Fifty thousand organized workers are scheduled to participate in the mass protest against Calles' return to the country from which he departed last Spring because of what he termed President Lazaro Cardenas' "march of radicalism."

Bitter attacks on Calles by labor leaders organizing the demonstration, and the declaration of the newspaper La Prensa that "the government may be unable to give Calles guarantees" of safety, caused speculation and expectancy over Sunday's possible developments.

Most guards had been withdrawn from Calles' home, only a small force remaining in the city, and if the demonstrators marched there they would find the former president virtually unprotected unless the government took precautions.

Frequent visits in the past few days to both President Cardenas and Calles by Aaron Saenz, former high official and close friend of Calles, led to the reports that negotiations are under way for the ex-president to leave the country despite his statement that he would remain unless expelled forcibly.

## Supreme Court Acts In Tampa Flogging Case

### Lower Court Ordered To Grant Hearing To Six Policemen Now Under Arrest

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today ordered Circuit Judge Harry N. Sandler of Tampa to give an immediate hearing to six policemen charged with the flogging murder of Joseph Shoemaker. The high court granted the order to Attorneys Pat Whitaker and Charles F. Blake, defending the six prisoners, who said that Judge Sandler refused to hear arguments on a writ of habeas corpus because State Attorney Farrior was not in court yesterday. Whitaker said he will present the order to the court tomorrow and ask an immediate hearing. The men are being held without bond on warrants based on affidavits by the sheriff and the chief of detectives that they premeditated the death of Shoemaker. The six had been suspended prior to their arrest on charges they raided the house where Shoemaker and his companions were holding a meeting without having a warrant for the raid.

TAMPA, Dec. 20.—Joseph Shoemaker and two others were abducted outside city police headquarters on Nov. 30, and carried away to be flogged, tarred and feathered. Shoemaker, organizer of unemployed workers here and former state committeeman of the Socialist Party in Connecticut, died Dec. 9.

The police officers under arrest were suspended by Mayor R. E. L. Chancey, along with three other city employees, pending investigation of Shoemaker's death. They are Sergeant C. A. Brown, Crosby and F. W. Switzer, and special officers B. L. Chappell and C. W. Carlisle.

Investigating officers have promised more arrests.

## Britain Seeks New Alliance Fearing Attack From Italy

### Remains As Premier



The fall of Premier Laval of France was believed almost certain yesterday to result from his agreement with Sir Samuel Hoare of Great Britain on the discarded peace plan, an agreement which forced Hoare's resignation as British foreign secretary. Today's dispatches, however, state that Laval will remain at the head of the French government.

## Laval To Remain French Premier

### Warriors Celebrate Victory: Fighting Halts Temporarily

The British government, abandoning the Franco-British plan for peace between Italy and Ethiopia, was described in London today as trying to mobilize other members of the League of Nations to meet a possible attack from Italy. The disclosure, from a high British source, indicated that British envoys are already attempting to get iron-clad guarantees from other nations of support in case of military hostilities. Although the potential allies were not named, it was assumed they are all Mediterranean powers.

Prime Minister Baldwin's successful negotiation of a stormy Parliamentary sea was followed by the official announcement that Premier Laval of France also would remain in office. It had previously been rumored he might resign.

The possibility that the Italian government might attempt to place both England and France in an embarrassing position was indicated by spokesman for the British government. He said Italy still regards Great Britain and France as bound by the Franco-British peace plan, pending decision by the League of Nations.

On the actual battlefield, spirited fighting of three days was halted as 2000 Askari warriors celebrated victory dances in the Mai Tinchet valley near Addis Ababa. Casualties of the Ethiopian flank attack and the resultant Italian counter-attacks were set at more than 1,000 in force hand-to-hand fighting. The Ethiopians lost more than 500 and the Fascist dead numbered about 300.

## Japanese Troops Invade Mongolia Peoples Republic

MOSCOW, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The official Tass News Agency reported in a dispatch from Ulan Bator, Mongolia, that 200 Japanese and Manchukuo soldiers had invaded the Mongolian Peoples Republic, killing a Mongolian soldier and several soldiers.

The Tass agency said the invasion was considered the most serious act of Japanese and Manchukuo troops to occupy Mongolia since 1931.

The invading army trucks accompanied by an ambulance, 111 and an automobile carrying two Japanese officers and one Russian white guard.

Each truck was loaded to have been equipped by soldiers armed with rifles and machine guns.

## Blind Solon Remains In Unconscious State

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Thomas D. Schall, 58, blind senator from Minnesota and New Deal critic, lay in a critical condition in Casualty Hospital today, struck by an automobile almost on the eve of the reorganizing Congress. Fifteen hours after the accident he was still unconscious, injured internally, skull fractured and left leg crushed almost flat below knee. Secretary Oren Leen was also hurt, but not critically.

Police arrested a man they said was L. O. Humphries, of Hyattsville, driver of the car, charging him with reckless driving. He later was released on his personal bond.

Police said witnesses told them that Schall, riding to his home, Wyncrest, with friends had stepped out of the car and was hit as he crossed the road to his house.

## Thomas Stanley Delk Died Late Yesterday

Thomas Stanley Delk, 72, died Thursday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock in the Fernand-Laughton Memorial Hospital. He had been ill only a short time. Funeral arrangements are being withheld pending word from relatives.

Mr. Delk was born in Sanborn, S. C. on May 14, 1863, and came to Sanford 18 years ago, making his home at 408 Holly Avenue. He was a retired salarier.

Surviving relatives are a mother, W. D. Delk, and a sister, Mrs. Dora Hunt, both residents of Sanborn, S. C.

## Teddy's Grandson Is Injured In Accident

BOSTON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Kermit Roosevelt, Jr., 20, of Oyster Bay, Long Island, grandson of the late President Theodore Roosevelt, was injured as his automobile skidded from the road into a tree today. With him was William Burnham, 20, of Brookline, classmate at Harvard. Both were taken to a hospital with lacerated faces and bruises, but hospital authorities said neither was seriously hurt.

## Confidence Vote Given Baldwin British Premier

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin transformed political peril into victory last night when he won a sweeping vote of confidence on the government's revamped foreign policy, abandoning the Peace Plan.

The House of Commons, which earlier had heard Baldwin humbly apologize for the "blunder" of his resigned foreign minister, Sir Samuel Hoare, voted endorsement of a strong League of Nations policy, 397 to 165.

The 165 presumably represented those who listened with sympathy and agreement today when Sir Samuel—speaking as a private individual—made a fighting defense of his attempt with Premier Pierre Laval of France to end the Italo-Ethiopian war.
