WRECKAGE OF DEATH PLANE FOUND IN SNOW





Democrats Strive To Choose Leader For Lower House

O'Connor And Rayburn Claim Victory On Initial Ballot; New Meet Slated

Republicans To Stand By Snell

Robinson Will Lead Administration Force In Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—

(AP)—Democratic House members strove to agree on floor leader today in order to permit swift organization of the new congress, confronted by administration requests for immediate action on Spanish neutrality and relief measures.

Selection of a party chieftain, who will be the right-hand man of speaker Bankhead, Atlanta, Georgia, in directing House legislation, was a final preliminary for the opening of the heavily Democratic Congress at noon tomorrow.

The major party's 332 representatives, chosen in the second Roosevelt landslide, were summoned to make a choice at a caucus late this afternoon. John O'Connor, New York, and Sam Rayburn, Texas, both claimed a victory on the first ballot. The contest was so heated that some whispers of a possible dark horse compromise spread through the capital. Speaker Bankhead has no opposition.

A handful of Republicans will have their New York as flood leaders.

Young Joseph Robinson, of Georgia, will be Democratic leader in the Senate while 10 Republican senators will rally behind McNary of Oregon.

County Motorists Purchasing Tags, Avoiding Delays

Appeals for the early purchase of 1937 automobile licenses have resulted in considerable response. Tax Collector Jno. D. Jenkins said today, but there are still hundreds who have failed to buy plates.

"Persons who wait until the last minute will find themselves greatly inconvenienced by a long walk to get near the tag window," he asserted. "This week it should be a simple matter to buy a tag without a tedious wait."

Jan. 15 has been set as the deadline when all 1936 licenses will no longer be in force. There has been no indication that an extension will be granted to the 15 days of grace already allowed.

Chairman C. B. Treadway of the Road Board and Chairman Carl G. Rose of the Racing Board already had resigned but members of both Boards followed suit.

Road Commissioner J. H. Sullivan and J. B. Newell, secretary to Governor Shultz and secretary of State Boards, also resigned. Cone closeted himself in the room preparing a speech for tomorrow's ceremonies. He declined to see newsmen.

There are more than 200 species of birds in this county, and 114 of them were positively identified in a census which was taken last month. A number of species known to exist in this country could not be found at that particular time and certain migratory birds are here only during certain seasons of the year.

There are two different kinds of buzzards in this section of the State, Mr. Mason stated, and neither of them, he added, are protected by law though they ought to be. Thought at one time to be responsible for the spread of hog cholera, laws protecting them were lifted. But, Mr. Mason added, while it was later discovered in "unhandled" an Orlando newspaperman, the State experimental laboratory, that buzzards had nothing to do with the spread of this disease, nothing was ever done about changing the law.

"Owls and hawks are protected by law," Mr. Mason said. "They are often shot at by hunters because of the mistaken impression that they are responsible for the shortage of game birds. If it not true that the only good hawk is a dead hawk. Both owls and hawks kill rodents, snakes, and other animals which are destroyers of game birds, and in that way do much more good than harm."

Mr. Mason also explained the tremendous increase in the number of egrets which has taken place since they came under the protection of state laws. Twenty years ago, these beautiful birds, whose plumage during the nesting season brought fancy prices in the market of the world, had become almost extinct. Their drainage laws were passed by the State, and today they are very plentiful being found almost everywhere in the County.







Nazis Issue Ultimatum To Loyal Spain

Give Government 3 Days To Return Cargo Of Vessel Captured By Navy

Madrid, Spain, Jan. 5.—(AP)—
Nazi Germany today gave Spain just three days to hand over the cargo of one German ship held by Spaniards for two Spanish ships held by Germans.

The ultimatum was flashed to the Spanish Government from a German warship by radio.

Germans said they would give

the two Spanish ships to Spanish insurgents unless the Socialist Government returned the cargo it took from a German freighter recently.
