10 Million Catholics Affected In Mexican Ban Against Clergy

Placing Of New Laws
Into Effect May
By Shooting Affair
And Other Disorders

Ten Are Wounded
At Mexico City

Calles Reiterates De-
termination To En-
force Law To Letter

MEXICO City, July 31. (AP)—Ten million or more Catholics throughout Mexico today were without the ministrations of the clergy.

The putting of the government's new religious regulations into effect was marred by isolated shooting affray, the stoning of officials on the turning of fire hoses on crowds, these occurrences starting last night when officials began to take control of articles in church buildings other than the churches themselves.

Ten persons were wounded in shootings in the capital. Spanish General Ortega was shot. Officials stoned as they were closing the annex of St. Gerardo's Church. Disturbances cured also in several other sections of the capital.

The priests had been ordered by the Episcopate to withdraw from the churches today as a test against the regulations. An effective today was an occasion for the National League for Defense of Religious Liberty. Catholics are requested to spend money on anything except on absolute necessities, being object being to bring about economic crisis which will force the government to rescind its religious attitude.

Officials reiterated today that it was the intention of President Calles and Government to actively enforce the constitutional clause with regard to religion which have virtually a dead-letter for years.

A view to preventing disturbances, the government has ordered troops to strategic points.

The police attempted vainly to disperse a large crowd of shopkeepers before a church last night on the ground that it was a religious meeting held in violation of the Mexican law. The shopkeepers refused to bud, and a fireman began playing the organ upon them, the worshippers retaliating with sticks and stones.

NEW YORK, July 31. (AP)—The Evening Post today publishes a statement from President Calles of Mexico defining the position of his government in the present religious crisis in Mexico. The statement, sent in reply to an inquiry follows:

"The boycott has no importance. The government has never tried to close the churches and will not try to do so. If the churches are abandoned by the Catholic priests they will remain open under the care of a committee of ten townsmen appointed by the protection of the town according to law. The priests merely stop preaching without committing any violation of the law they will not be punished."

Churches' Attitude
Persecution is threatening religious freedom. The church denies it has meddled in politics.

Pope Pius does not desire to interfere unless absolutely necessary. He has requested the faithful throughout the world to pray tomorrow for their Mexican co-religionists.

Bishop George Miller, resident bishop of the Methodist-Episcopal church in Mexico, says there is no religious persecution and that Mexico was forced to use drastic means because "the Roman Catholic priests in Mexico have refused to comply with the law of the land and have persisted in meddling in politics."

Through The Everglades Told By Member Of Party

(By L. CHURCH)

The east of our camp and four miles off by the unbroken Everglades, but as this Saturday and we were tired, decided not to enter them until Monday morning.

The ox team we had sent before from Fort Myers was waiting at Shakerford when we came and that afternoon went down the water's edge and unloaded the boats and things loaded on it. To mark our camp, and render it conspicuous for some miles around, Mr. Newman hoisted to the top of one of the highest pines, a large flag made from a piece of canvas, on which he marked in black ink the Plant Investment Company's emblem, a M. in a circle.

That afternoon we were visited by the old squaw and her children. They had seen in their camp that morning we fed them as well as our larger would permit, and the old woman (Nancy) grew very talkative for an Indian. She was much amused at the idea of our going to Miami, and when we asked how long it would take us to get there, Larched and said: "In about two days a white man, it says."

Pointing to the North she advised us to go that way, for north of Okcehobee she said we could take our wigwag to Miami. She told us she had been to Miami and that it was a "100 miles from Shakerford, but we knew she was mistaken in the distance, for in a few days we were only about one half of that distance.

"This old woman said she had been Jumper's squaw, but that a few days before our arrival Jumper had got big drunk, and falling out of his canoe, had been drowned. It also that she lived with Billy Comanche, or Little Billy, who had married her daughter. That all her men were at Chickahatchee hunting, and her daughters had gone to the nearest trading post some 25 or 30 miles away. Finally, about dark, finding we had nothing more to give her, she and the two children took their departure.

The next day was Sunday, and as there was little work to do we had plenty of time to do as we pleased some hunting, some exploring the surrounding country, but most of us were well pleased to

sleep, eat and chat, thoroughly enjoying the rest and quiet after our 80 mile walk from Fort Myers.

In the evening the old squaw came back again, this time bringing with her two younger women, her daughters, and a half dozen or more little children. The two younger women, were rather better looking than I expected, but had the usual Indian features, black, beadlike eyes, straight, linky colored hair, and low forehead. They were dressed in saroues and skirts of bright-colored calicoes, very much as white women dress, except that the saroues and skirt did not quite meet, which omission left a small rim or zone of the native and primitive Indian in view, giving the idea that each woman wore a belt.

Possibly alligator-skin belts were in style there, and if so these might have been excellent imitations of the genuine article; or maybe the dress reform lecturer had instilled some of her principles into the outcast natives and this was a new system of civilization just out. The most pleasing features about these women were their soft voices, although of course accustomed to speaking to the open air, their tones were low and musical, and very distinct to our ears. They left us about 8 o'clock that night, having amused us very much, and promising to bring us some children early next morning before we got off.

That night I wrote in my diary: "From what squaw Nancy says, I judge there is nothing between Miami and here but saw grass and an occasional hammock island." (To Be Continued)

CAMPAIGN QUIZ MAY BE ENDED NEXT TUESDAY

Committee Adjourns Hearings Over The Week-End; No Other Probes Are Planned

Gifts Of Utilities To Be Considered

Smith Campaign Was Aided By \$170,000 Gift From Utilities

CHICAGO, July 31. (AP)—Although a formidable array of witnesses remain in the Illinois campaign funds quiz, the Senate Investigating Committee hopes to conclude its inquiry next week, after resuming activities on Tuesday.

The committee believes that it has uncovered the principal matters involved in the senatorial contest. Chairman Reed said he had no plans for further inquiries.

While members of the committee would not discuss the evidence pending their report to the Senate next December, it was known that they had been more impressed by the free contributions by public utilities officials than by the amount spent in the contest, which now totals \$941,113.47 for the senatorial, Cook county and other tickets.

As the record is now written, officials of three different groups of public utilities in the state contributed a total of \$170,000 to the senatorial campaign fund of Frank L. Smith, who still is chairman of the Illinois Commerce Commission, the authority of which over public utilities in Illinois is comparable to that of the Interstate Commerce Commission over railroads.

Samuel Inzell of Chicago, head of a number of utilities, gave \$125,000 directly to Smith's funds and spent in addition, \$33,735.10 in a propaganda campaign against the world court, which Smith also opposed.

Allen F. Moore, Illinois Republican National committeeman, and campaign manager for Smith, has testified to total expenditures for Smith of \$254,647.51, of which \$170,000 was given, he stated, by the public utilities officials.

Veteran St. Johns River Captain Visions Sanford As a Great City In 5 Years

Sanford should become the distributing point for Central Florida in five years, Capt. Charles E. Rice of the Lake Monroe Transportation Company, who has operated ships of all descriptions on the St. Johns River for the last 10 years sincerely believes this prediction will come true.

Twenty-eight years' experience in the shipping industry and water transportation business has given this veteran of the St. Johns River a keen insight into the possibilities of water transportation making a city bigger and prosperous.

"Sanford is the only inland city that has a deep waterway to the ocean," he said. "What is there to prevent Sanford from becoming a distributing point in Central Florida with water freight facilities? Jacksonville is too far away to be the distributing point. Sanford is well located. It is about half way between Jacksonville and Tampa, two important cities in Florida. Everything is in favor of Sanford. It has a beautiful lake, fine back country, and has always been substantial."

Ran Away From Home at 12
Capt. Rice ran away from home at the age of 12 years, and "ship ped" behind a four-masted schooner at Miami. He never returned to his home at Palatka until five years later. His ship visited South American ports, and he became interested in seeing the world. His desire was gratified, and he made the principal ports of the world, before coming back home.

While a boy of 12, he became interested in his school teacher, it was one of those school boy attachments for his teacher. He was large for his age, and one day while in the company of the teacher he loved, the school principal came along.

The principal was fond of the same teacher, and this budding romance did not set well with him. Later, with the assistance of a male teacher, young Rice was given a severe beating. After he had been freed, he picked up a slate and brought it down on the principal's head. The boy pupil ran headlong through a glass window and made his escape.

He decided never to return to school as he felt he would be expelled. He made his way to a schooner in port and asked to be taken along. His wish was granted.

Wants Millionaires Interested
If a few northern millionaires could be interested in Sanford and its possibilities, as others have been in several Florida cities, it would mean much for the city's future, Capt. Rice said. He has operated yachts, houseboats and smaller craft for several wealthy men who make their home in Florida in winter, and is familiar with their methods and dealings.

Seventy-Nine Cases Investigated In Home Program During Past Month; Dental And Throat Work Stressed

Steady progress is being made in the county health department according to the July report of Miss Abby Doudney, county nurse. During the month of July, 79 cases were investigated in the home work program that has been outlined by Miss Doudney. Many persons took advantage of the chance to secure treatment.

"Our main work during the summer consists in the study of the ill of the children of the county and in the correction of these by the health department. A complete investigation of the living conditions of the children of the county is being made and will be in readiness for the coming school year when the greatest amount of the work is done."

Dental and throat work is being stressed by the county nurse this summer. Miss Doudney, who has been county nurse for the past three years, recently resigned from her office, her resignation to take effect in September.

"The past year has been the best in the three years I have held the position of county nurse," she said. "Health conditions in this community have improved immensely, and there is in general a better spirit of cooperation among the people than has been characteristic in other years."

MUCH PROGRESS IS NOTED IN WORK OF COUNTY NURSE

NOTED CRIMINAL INVESTIGATOR AT WORK IN CANTON

Joseph R. Roach Begins Operations As Advisory Counsel To Acting Chief Of Police; McDermott Is Still Sought

CANTON, Ohio, July 31.—(AP)—Joseph R. Roach, the man who sent 147 Terre Haute, Ind., public officials and gunmen to the penitentiary for mixing crime with politics, today began his operations in Canton as advisory counsel to Acting Chief of Police Earl W. Hexamer.

Those who see the darker side of the situation in Canton believe Roach has a job of similar importance before him here.

Charges of political protection to commercialized vice and illicit trafficking in liquor and narcotics have been leveled about freely since Don B. Mellett, publisher of the Canton Daily News, who was shot down in his garage July 16. Mellett himself frequently made such charges editorially and periodically in putting some of those involved behind the bars.

As Roach prepared to begin his work today, investigators into the murder of Mellett, headed by Detective Ora Sater, awaited returns from their broadcast yesterday of pictures and information concern-

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ing Patrick Eugene McDermott, of Cleveland, wanted for questioning in the inquiry.

Experiences Of First Trip Through The Everglades Told By Member Of Party

(By I. CHURCH)

Next morning we were up early after bidding the Hendrys and who were to go back with wagons to Ft. Myers road-by, set our compass and ran S. 32 towards the Everglades.

Tom Boyd, one of the men from Myers, who had agreed to go with us, became frightened the prospect before him and decided to go back with the wagons.

When we reached Miami many a man wished he had swapped his water for some of Tom Boyd's discolored in this matter.

After rotating about four miles on our course we struck the Everglades. As far as the eye could reach a vast expanse of saw grass and water was seen, dotted here and there with islands here and there.

Part of our force was detailed to set up the canvas boats, store provisions and equipage they were to carry, while the rest of us went on with the survey. Where we entered the glades the water was only ankle deep, clear except for a slight turbidity by some movement of the ground was not so boggy as we found it later on. The saw grass seemed to be stunted, for it was only four or five feet high, and lay in detached bushes and not solid masses as we found it further in. On all sides small clumps of moss or islands could be seen, and we felt confident that if they were so numerous as this all the way across we would always be able to find a camping place.

My first experience with saw grass was not very encouraging, but that day in forcing my way through some of it I had my right hand cut severely in several places, and after being tied up in a cloth and greased with mutton suet it gave me very little trouble.

We camped that evening about a mile from land on a little cypress

island hardly above the surrounding water, and after bringing up all the wood we could find for our camp fire, made a place for our beds. Each bed was fixed for two and when practicable we always had a foundation of ferns or leaves of some sort. On top of this mattress we put the oil cloths to keep the moisture from the ground away, and then the blankets, one to lay on and the other to cover with. As soon as our bed was made the mosquito bars were hung, and for this purpose four sticks were necessary.

After we had made camp that day those who were not too tired waded out to explore the neighboring islands. On their return they reported they had seen a deserted Indian village about which was growing a lemon grove and on another island what appeared to be a bear's den, but no bear could be discovered. That night all were in good spirits except Handley, who vomited and seemed to be threatened with an attack of fever. The bare idea of any of the men falling sick in this wilderness made me faint at heart, and that night I could not help feeling uneasy on that account.

HIGHWAY BOARD WILL OPEN MORE ROAD BIDS SOON

Program Includes Expenditure Of Eighteen Millions During Next Year, Dr. Hatha Board Chairman, Declares

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., July 31.—Close upon the heels of the largest single letting of contracts for road construction in the history of the State Road Department, comes an announcement from Dr. F. A. Hathaway, chairman of the department, that bids for still more work will be received and opened by the department on August third, tenth, and twenty-fourth, the necessary advertisements having been inserted.

The rapidly with which bids are being invited and contracts let, tends to bear out the prediction of the chairman that the department's operations will involve a program of eighteen millions of dollars by the close of the present year.

Projects which are being advertised for bids are:

For August 3.—Project 669 V, road number 27 (popularly known as Tamiami Trail) Collier county, length 11.91 miles, clearing, grubbing and grading; Project number 592, road 10, Franklin county, from the Gulf county line to Apalachicola, approximately 7.80 miles in length, clearing, grubbing and grading.

For August 10.—Project number 666, road 1, Madison county from the Suwannee river to Madison, approximately 16.99 miles in length to be paved. Alternate bids will be received on concrete, sheet asphalt, bituminous concrete and bituminous macadam. Project 669 X, road number 27 (Tamiami trail), Collier county, 9.39 miles in length, clearing, grubbing and grading to consist of forming a rounded embankment of material obtained from canal on north side of road bed.

For August 21.—Project number 673 R, Gadsden county road 1, bridge across Little river, 80 foot low steel truss span on concrete piers with concrete pile trestle approaches, 336 feet in length. Project 11, Santa Rosa county, road 1, Milton six miles east, construction of concrete shoulders on both sides present brick pavement. Project 677 A, Levy county, road 13, from Alachua county line to Bronson, approximately 6.95 miles, clearing grubbing and grading and necessary drainage structures. Project number 676 C, Levy county, road 19, from end of present work to Marion county line, approximately 13.30 miles in length; clearing,

In elaborating on this announcement, Chairman Hathaway said, "While the letting of contracts is proceeding with unusual speed, there has been no let up in the care which the department always exercises in letting a contract for road construction. Efficiency is not being sacrificed to speed; the same scrutiny with which the department observes all bids is being exercised, but the organization having been tightened up, is able to proceed more expeditiously. I am more than ever confident that the close of the year will find us with operations in progress aggregating eighteen millions of dollars."
