Investigation Of Long's Dictatorship Voted By Congress

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—An investigation of Senator Long's Louisiana dictatorship last night was reported on capitol Hill to be a major purpose of a prize bill voted by the House just before adjournment.

It was agreed in the House by vote of 179 to 165, that the Senate should serve as the investigating committee. Informed representatives of both houses supported the resolution.

The House adjourned to recess for a conference between Chairman Frankland, and that said authority for the investigation was granted to House Administration leaders on the understanding that members from Louisiana who are opposed to Long and his political control of the state,

should be given full rights to speak.

But new charges reportedly inserted at the urging of anti-Long members, was denied yesterday to have extorted powers of the investigating committee far beyond statutory limits.

Not only was it made certain that the committee authority would embrace the January Louisiana election, but this new assistance appeared in a campaign expenditure resolution for the first time.

"Said committee is hereby authorized to act upon its own initiative and upon such information which in its judgment may be reasonable and reliable."
