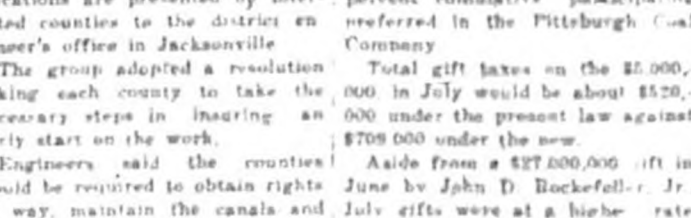

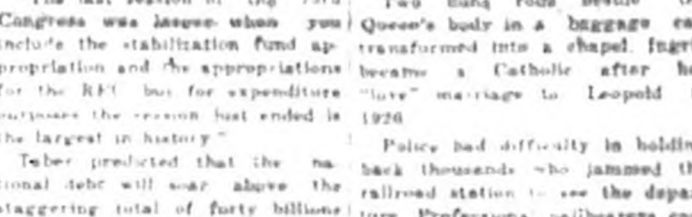

Marx Wilcox—Investigator

Mark Wilcox, whose Municipal Bankruptcy Act has turned out to be anything but a municipal bankruptcy act because of various amendments inserted into the original act by Senate committees, and who thus far has been thwarted in his efforts to obtain federal aid for over-burdened local governments, has recently been honored with an important appointment made in the closing hours of the recent session of Congress which has to do with a subject very close to his heart—municipal indebtedness.

"Congressman Wilcox has been placed in charge of the Congressional investigation of municipal bondholders' committees. In designating him, Representative Babin, dean of the House, said the appointment was because of his eminent qualifications for this work. He is author of the municipal bankruptcy bill passed in the 73rd Congress and is probably better informed on the subject of municipal indebtedness than any member of Congress. His able and energetic handling of the municipal bill before the House of Representatives demonstrates his fitness for this work and I predict that the information which he will develop as a result of these investigations will be of great value not only to Congress but to the country at large."

"Mr. Wilcox, as city attorney for West Palm Beach for a number of years, gained familiarity with municipal indebtedness problems through this work and thyught his activities in the Florida League of Municipalities, which also was studying the question. His appointment to this committee recognizes his ability on the subject.

"In accepting the appointment, Mr. Wilcox remarks that the beneficial effects of the municipal bankruptcy bill have been practically nullified by 'self-appointed bondholders' committees.' It is to be presumed, of course, that despite any feeling he may have in regard to this, he will proceed in unbiased fashion, giving fair hearing and treatment to all. This is as it should be.

"If, on the other hand, the bondholders' committees have no secrets to hide, they should welcome the investigation and be glad to find in charge of it a man who understands the complicated problems of municipal indebtedness.

"In any case, the investigation is to be made. Mr. Wilcox is in charge and the appointment pays tribute

Garibaldi Looks For War Between Italy, Continent

Ethiopian Argument Held Secondary To Greater Conflict

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 30.—(AP)—A true Italian patriot, Gen. Giuseppe Garibaldi, at his home in Gulfport, dismissed the present Italian-Ethiopian situation as a matter of secondary importance and predicted that real trouble would arrive soon between his native land and Great Britain and France.

Echoling the philosophy of his famous family, whose members have fought and died for a unified and progressive Italy, Gen. Garibaldi sanctioned the propriety and right of Italy to make war on Ethiopia to obtain raw materials and colonies for her ever increasing population.

"We must expand to live. If we stay at home we die," the grand and famous man said.

"Italy's quarrel in Ethiopia is her own and not a quarrel to involve any other nation in Europe in war. Great Britain and France, the nations complaining the loudest against Italy's actions in Africa, look all they wanted in that continent by ruthless warfare and sacking who are they to complain of my country's plan?" he said.

"Although I do not believe wholly in Mussolini's policies and plans, I do believe in the life in Africa which he thinks Italy needs," he said.

Gen. Garibaldi pointed out that Italy annually produces a surplus population of 600,000 people and that it is an absolute necessity for that nation to get foreign colonies.

"I sympathize with the Italian Ethiopians, but it is a matter of life and death which Italy must win. Italy is not going to allow itself to be made a plaything of the British and French. Roosevelt Broke All Job Hand Out Records At Session

President Offered 14,998 Names, Had All But 72 Okeyed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—President Roosevelt broke all nomination records in the session of Congress just closed.

A final check Tuesday by the Senate executive clerk, Lewis W. Bailey, showed 14,998 names submitted and 14,926 confirmed.

The number of appointments exceeded by more than 5000 the total for the ten sessions of the first Roosevelt Congress.

The President also had an unusually high average of confirmations.

Of the 14,998 appointments, only 12 were rejected, all but one being postmaster nominees. 25 were withdrawn by the White House before Senate action, and 55 were not acted upon.

For the first time in history, the Administration at this point ordered letters when necessary, warning the rule that all appointments not acted upon must be returned to the White House. The 35 will remain in their present status until next session, and the President will not have to make recess appointments. Those named will draw pay until disposed of next winter.

The 25 included 22 postmasters and three other civilian nominations. The three civilians are Edwin R. Holmes of Mississippi to be federal judge of the fifth circuit, and works progress administrators C. H. Treadway of Florida and E. W. S. Key for Oklahoma.

Army nominations led the list of confirmations with 6709. Over 1000 of these were submitted in one block as a result of the new law accelerating promotions and removing a "hump" in the promotion list created by the World War.

Postmasters were next, with 2054 confirmations. Other classes included naval, 1968; civilian other than postmasters, 641; and marine, corps, 561.

Long's Filibuster Put New Dealers In Temporary Hole

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30. (AP)—Out of the money talk that filled a White House conference Tuesday came word that most of the New Deal projects endangered by the adjournment filibuster of Senator Long, (D., La.), would be saved.

The third deficiency bill, carrying funds for the Administration of eight new acts, died under a barrage of words from the Louisiana senator.

Senators and House members emerging from a long conference with President Roosevelt yesterday, at which they reviewed the problem of finding cash elsewhere under the watchful eye of Comptroller General J. E. McCard, said they were confident that funds would be obtained to start the Social Security Act to going, but perhaps minus aid to crippled children, mothers and the blind.

No definite decision on the source of the money was announced, but indications were given that most of it probably would come from the \$2,500,000,000 relief fund.

To what extent this might be diverted was the chief question. Representative Buchanan (D. Texas), chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said as he emerged from the talk:

"We'll be able to take care of most all of the most important sections, except for aid to the blind, to crippled children and to mothers. That's what Huey Long did."

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, and Speaker Byrns agreed that virtually all of the principal items carried in the deficiency bill would be made up.

"McCard did not appear unfavorable," one conferee said. Several of the measures, like the bus and truck regulation, the alcohol control, utility regulation, and the Bankhead Act, fall under regular departments or long established agencies. It was indicated that sufficient funds already allocated to these agencies might be used.

Bus and truck regulation will be handled by the Interstate Commerce Commission, alcohol control by the treasury, utility regulation by the Securities and Power Commission and the Bankhead Act by the AAA. Officials said each of these agencies could lend money from their appropriation for the fiscal year to set the new work going and be repaid after Congress meets.
