Necessity for Rationing Fuel Oil—Joel Dean, Director of the Fuel Rationing Division of the Office of Price Administration, pointing out that the people should be informed as to the reasons for the necessity for the rationing of fuel oil, has written the following: "It is true that there is no actual shortage of fuel oil in the United States at present. Even this ample supply, however, is quite useless if it is distributed to markets in every village and crossroads in the country and to every landing depot of our armies and allies abroad.
