

Probe Commission LBJ's First Mistake, Say GOP

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Republicans are saying in guarded tones that President Johnson has made his first mistake. The appointment of a Federal Commission to investigate the assassination of Mr. Kennedy is described as a blunder.

Johnson's plan is one that sets the Federal establishment to investigate itself. The FBI and Secret Service were responsible for Mr. Kennedy's safety, and the failure ought to be deeply explored. But the idea that a President will appoint a group will ruthlessly sift even a well-deserved blame on one agency which represents the Justice Department or another which represents the Treasury Department is not very plausible.

Then, there's the matter of U. S. foreign policy. Under Mr. Kennedy, and now under his successor, we are committed to cultivating Khrushchev and tolerating Castro. Would this Commission fearlessly take a position against these lines of policy? Dare it reveal information that would queer the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty? Or clutter the Wheat Deal? And unless a Commission has no inhibitions at all about uncovering the truth, what good is it?

Consider some of the stories on the town. A reputable anti-Castro Cuban has one which attempts to explain Lee Harvey Oswald as a gunman for Fidel. The story is that Oswald attended a sabotage school near Miami, but that the Russians considered him too erratic to be useful to them, whereupon he applied for a similar job with Castro, who can't afford to be choosy.

Castro was worried because Russo-American plans for a detente call for replacing him with a Tito-type Communist in Cuba. Under this arrangement, the Western World would give aid and trade to

Cuba, and the Soviets would be able to cut down their assistance to the failing Cuban economy. The implication is that Castro had a motive for wishing to remove the American President—and, in Oswald, had an accomplice.

This is one of the many fantastic "explanations" of the Dallas tragedy which a Congressional committee would like to probe. Witnesses would be called, cross-questioned and their testimony evaluated. If the story has any veracity at all, it ought to be bare. If it has none, the story ought to be scotched. But Congressional hearings are the proper place for such work, and a Federal Commission is the wrong place. Congressional hearings often lend themselves to sensationalism, but seldom to suppression. Federal investigations are circumspect, but their history has frequently been one of quiet burial or ceremonious whitewash.

Had not the Un-American Activities Committee exposed Hiss after the Federal Government, including President Roosevelt, had pooh-poohed what Whittaker Chambers was willing to tell, we would never have known Hiss as a hidden Communist. If the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee had not kept after Owen Lattimore, who was a close worker with Federal agencies and personalities, we would never have known what he was up to.

The President hopes to get a quiet, orderly and believable report from his Commission, but Congress is composed of influential Southern chairmen and of ambitious Republicans who are not easily satisfied. The GOP will be desperate next year for something to blame on the Johnson Administration. It is as certain as the coming buds of May that the harrowing memory of Mr. Kennedy's murder will be revived in the spring, and that the 1964 election will ring with unseemly charges of cover-up.

Two of the Commission's members are vulnerable to

attack on their past records. Dick Russell can be said to represent the conservatives whose extremist flank is being used to discredit the whole respectable right wing. The President's motives are irreproachable. They certainly include a determination to repair our reputation in the eyes of the watching world, and to spare the feelings of Mr. Kennedy's family by giving this gruesome investigation a format of dignity.

Civil War In Bolivia Feared

ORURO, Bolivia (UPI) — Virtual martial law was in force today in this two-mile-high mining center, a key front-line position in a conflict between the government and Communist-infiltrated opponents which could explode into civil war.

It was not certain what would happen later today when time runs out on an ultimatum presented to the government Monday by rebellious tin miners demanding the release of three imprisoned Communists within 24 hours.

The miners, backed by a sizeable militia, are holding four Americans and 13 others in the nearby town of Catavi as hostages for the release of the prisoners, two of whom are charged with homicide and one with embezzlement.

Col. Jorge Soruco, commander of the Oruro Military District, replaced the mayor of the city Monday, assuming control of civilian activities as well as the army garrison.

Meat May Be Last Tax Bill Witness

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Finance Committee was taking testimony from Chairman William McCleary today on the last public witness on the \$11 billion tax cut bill.

Passed by the House, the bill would provide an across-the-board tax cut beginning Jan. 1. The cut would affect about 51 million taxpayers and 87,000 corporations.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., said that the bill would be the last public witness on the bill.

Other congressional news: Economy: House Republicans claimed today to have helped save \$7.5 billion this year. They promised to look for even bigger savings next year.

Rep. Frank T. Bow, R-Ohio, chairman of the so-called economy task force, said that Republicans were "chided" when they announced in January that they planned to seek appropriations cuts.

He said that while not all money bills for the current 12 months have been acted on, bills approved by the House so far have been trimmed \$5.4 billion. When all have been passed, Bow said the cuts would reach \$7.5 billion.

Ald. Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., sought Senate support for a last-ditch effort to send the compromise foreign aid bill back to conference. The \$3.6 billion authorization bill was passed by the House Monday on a narrow 186 to 164 vote. Morse said the bill had been "gutted" of Senate-approved policy restrictions by the conferees.

Rights Bill Fight Heats Up

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Leaders of the effort to force early House action on civil rights expect their campaign to hit the rough ground today or Wednesday.

The measure, designed to fight racial discrimination in voting, education, employment, public accommodations and in the use of federal funds, has the support of both Democratic and Republican House leaders.

The proposal to take the civil rights bill out of the hands of the Southern-led House Rules Committee got the support of 131 members Monday. That number was expected to swell to 185 or 170 today or Wednesday, but still would fall far short of the 218 needed to get the bill to the House floor.

Though the bill is supported by the leadership of both parties, the procedure adopted by the Democratic leaders—use of a discharge petition to pry the bill away from the rules committee—does not have the backing of senior House Republicans. They have endorsed the proposal of rules committee Chairman Howard W. Smith, (D-Va.), to start the bill toward floor action "reasonably soon in January."

As a result, signatures will be hard to come by after the northern Democrats and liberal big city Republicans have signed.

The support of moderate and conservative Republicans from small towns and rural areas is vital to the discharge petition, and this group tends to follow the GOP leaders.

In any case, civil rights supporters do not expect to get the necessary signatures in the next few days.

Russians Smuggling Arms, Exiles Charge

MIAMI (UPI)—Cuban exiles told the Organization of American States Monday that Soviet submarines and ships are smuggling arms, narcotics, counterfeit money and subversive agents into Latin America from Cuba.

The exiles said their intelligence reports showed that pro-Castro agents in Mexico also were being supplied by airplanes flying from an American-built air base in Pinar Del Rio Province to the Yucatan Peninsula.

One key supply base for the subversive agents in Mexico, they said, was a ranch belonging to former Mexican President Lazaro Cardenas to which clandestine flights are regularly made. Cardenas is a strong supporter of the Castro regime.

The report was made by the

Cuban Revolutionary Council, an exile organization headed by former Cuban Premier Manuel A. De Varona. It was sent to OAS council Chairman Juan A. Lavalle of Peru and OAS Venezuelan Investigating committee Chairman Rodolfo A. Widemann of Argentina.

Widemann's committee is investigating a charge by Romulo Betancourt of Venezuela that three tons of Cuban arms which were found in his country recently were smuggled in by Castro to aid Communist terrorists.

The exile report said more than 100 Soviet fishing trawlers and an unspecified number of submarines were being used to export the Communist subversion from Cuba.

In addition, Castro was also employing "more than 150 fast fishing boats" and an unspecified number of airplanes.

Reds Debate \$46 Billion Plan

MOSCOW (UPI)—The leadership of the Soviet Communist party today began debate on Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's \$46 billion plan for a speedy buildup of the chemical industry, possibly with the aid of entire plants purchased in the West.

The party central committee held its second plenary session in the Kremlin Hall of Congresses, with chemical experts, party and government planners, and industry officials speaking on Khrushchev's plan, which was virtually certain of approval.

Khrushchev said the seven-year program "unprecedented in world practice," would regenerate a falling agricultural industry and also help satisfy demands for more consumer goods.

He disclosed in his long speech to the opening of the party meeting Monday that Soviet collective and state

firms delivered 21 per cent less grain to the state-controlled markets this year than last. He defended his decision to buy more than \$700 million worth of wheat in the West and said Stalin let people starve during bad harvest years while continuing to export wheat.

Then he outlined the seven-year program to increase farm yields and make such grain purchases unnecessary in the future.

Khrushchev's plan for the chemical industry was double what had been expected. He goals and details included:

- Tripling the output of the chemical industry by 1970.
- Investing \$46 billion, including more than \$25 billion for the plants themselves.
- Producing 70 to 80 million tons of chemical fertilizer by the end of the plan, which would make it possible to double present grain and fodder production.
- Buying entire plants in the West if the equipment is not available in the Soviet Union or its satellites.

MOVING? CALL

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Would Stabilize Economy

Seminole County's chances of landing the proposed East-Central Florida University increased by leaps and bounds last week when the State Board of Control, meeting in Boca Raton, reduced the number of possible sites to four — two in this county and two in Orange.

This, of course, provides Seminole County with no less than an even chance to land the university within its geographical limits. But for all practical purposes Seminole's possibilities of getting the engineering institution, to be operated as an extension of the University of Florida, are somewhat better than those appearing on the surface.

One of the Orange County sites — known as Desert Farms and located in the southeastern section of the county — escaped elimination by the barest of margins. The Board of Control, deadlocked at three-to-three on whether to keep the site under consideration or eliminate it, acted in favor of retaining the site only when Chairman Baya Harrison cast the deciding vote.

But local observers contend that for all practical purposes this action virtually eliminated Desert Farms because of three unfavorable votes. Therefore, Seminole County's possibility of landing the institution is more or less a two-to-one proposition rather than merely a 50-50 chance.

Seminole's primary competition will come from Orange County's efforts to promote the Bluestone site which is located four miles south of the Martin-Orlando plant and only a mile north of the Osceola County line.

Meanwhile, the Board of Control last Friday — and rightly so — announced that the selection of a site for the university is much too important to be rushed. And this attitude set the stage for further consideration of the advantages of the four remaining locations.

Last Saturday Orange County authorities raised a note of mystery because of a remark made by the Board of Control's chairman that the members would entertain considera-

tion of additional sites if anyone wanted to offer them.

However, the chairman was contacted by one of The Herald's newsmen on the scene at Boca Raton and was assured that his remark was made as just a matter of conversation. Actually, the Board of Control set a deadline in October for the submission of all sites to be considered.

Either of the two Seminole sites, most local observers contend, stand about an equal chance of being selected. The Lake Ada location — fronting on U. S. 17-92 just south of Seminole High School — perhaps offers most of the advantages for a school of this kind. Transportation would be no problem, its accessibility is almost perfect, and its location relative to population, churches and schools could be considered no less than ideal.

On the other hand, the Lee Ranch site has much to offer in that more than 2,000 acres are involved with the state taking its choice of either the east or west 1,000 acres. The site is north of Chuluota and south of the Econlockhatchee River which would provide the northern boundary. If the site were chosen the university would have four miles of frontage on the river and the entire area is abundant with natural beauty. And this has impressed most of the board's members.

A choice between the two sites might be determined largely by whether the board is looking ahead for some 10 to 20 years or 50 years. Presently the Lake Ada site perhaps would be the most favorable. But at the same time, consideration on a long range basis might make the Lee Ranch site more favorable.

Regardless of which site is chosen, if the Board of Control selects a Seminole location, the university would soon become the largest single industry — if it can be called that — in this county.

The Herald is convinced that not only does the university need Seminole County and what this area has to offer, but also Seminole needs the university because it will stabilize this county's economy forever.

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Helen Fuller Says

International Affairs

WASHINGTON — "Let's pray that he doesn't try to transfer his way of working at home into the foreign field," the General said. My old friend across the luncheon table was talking, of course, about the new President and Mr. Johnson's high-pressure method of dealing with the United States Senate when he served as its Majority Leader.

The General had flown to Germany with the recent Operation Big Lift and continued on a circle tour of visits with Allied military and civilian leaders. He had come home with the strong conviction that trying to push European leaders toward greater unity too fast could bring the NATO Alliance tumbling down. As one who shares former President Kennedy's firm belief that Atlantic partnership is essential to our security, the General shuddered at that possibility. His fear was that in his driving desire to get things done President Johnson might press too hard at a critical time in the life of the Alliance.

Many others who are not aware of how much caution lies behind Lyndon Johnson's boue are expressing the same concern. And there is reason for doubt because a battle for the new President's mind on the subject of Atlantic Alliance is already taking shape.

The battle is between those who believe that the U. S. must continue to assert the position of leadership we have occupied in Europe since World War II and those who believe that we are no longer needed or able to occupy such superior status in a now-thriving Europe. Among those involved, in addition to Secretary of State Rusk, Secretary of Defense McNamara and Presidential adviser on national security affairs McGeorge Bundy, is former Secretary of State Dean Acheson. Mr. Acheson, who is generally considered as belonging in the first category, served as Mr. Johnson's foreign policy adviser in the 1960 campaign.

The difference in attitude between the two groups comes out especially clearly in the case of General De

Gaulle. Those who would have us force our leadership on Europe blame our declining influence there on De Gaulle's insistence on building national military forces rather than a unified NATO defense. Those who think we should relax, without in any way withdrawing support from the Western Alliance, and let Europe take the initiative again view De Gaulle's nationalist pride with more sympathy.

Bound up in all this are decisions which President Johnson must make sooner or later. They center on equal sharing of the burden of maintaining the necessary forces in Western Europe. In recent years both Presidents Eisenhower and a Kennedy have struggled to extract larger contributions in men and material from NATO countries now well able to

make them—with little result. The question is whether to demand more support within a definite time limit, to continue to bear a disproportionate share of the load ourselves, or to change our role in European affairs. It is widely believed that President Kennedy had decided to reassess our position in Europe, but had hoped to defer the reassessment until after the 1964 election. Time might help. The present governments of Italy, Belgium and the Netherlands, for example, are so unsteady that to agree to a demand for more military expenditures at this moment might topple them.

Some of the wisest of the believers in effective international cooperation here and abroad are saying to the new President that this is no time to hurry the horses.

Blue Monday For Stumpf
Head Coach Ralph Stumpf had reason to be blue Monday. His 1963-64 edition of the Seminole High varsity cage squad dropped both of their outings so far this season. Saturday night the Tribe took it on the chin from the Titusville Terriers after losing their opener with Daytona Beach Mainland last Thursday night.

But before you start shedding any tears, too, remember that Monday Stumpf had several additions to his hardwood squad when a number of Seminole gliders reported for basketball workouts. Barry Barks, Billy Higgins, Mike Glad and John Ray reported along with Lloyd Freeman and Buddy Burton.

Of course, Stumpf has warned all along that he's not anticipating any miracles this season, particularly since he's running into some of the best competition in Central Florida.

We didn't see the Titusville affair. However, we did watch the Tribe tangle with Mainland. And we were amazed to learn that this was the initial outing of the season for the Buc. They were a well coached, well paced, and smoothly running machine.

You would have thought they'd had no less than four or five games under their belts by the tone of their performance.

After the game we ran into an old Daytona Beach friend, athlete, and Stetson star, Lanier Smith. He has a youngster on the Buc squad this year. Lanier gave the "whys" which accounts for the spit and polish of the Buc five. They've been drilling since school began. At Mainland none of the youngsters on the football team participate in basketball.

... And Without Shoes, Too!
From Gainesville comes word that Hal Seymour's intuition prompted his return to a shoe-less punting style for the University of Florida in 1963, and final statistics reveal he was correct.

"I never punted with shoes on until this season," says Seymour. "The first four games I wore shoes, and didn't punt very well, so I just decided it couldn't be any worse without shoes, even if somebody stepped on my toes."

Seymour punted 21 times for 788 yards with shoes this year. His average was 37.5.

As a barefoot he booted the ball 31 times for 1326 yards, an average of 42.8, one of the highest marks in the nation.

This raised his overall average to 40.7 for the season. "It's difficult to raise that punting average once it gets down in the mid 30s," says head coach Ray Graves. "This is an indication of what a great job Hal did in late season."

Seymour turned in one of his best punting days against FSU, although earning an average of only 38 per kick. He punted the Gators out of a hole on one effort, the ball going some 53 yards in the air into the Seminole end zone, and causing him to lose 20 yards when it was brought out to the 20-yard-line.

Another time, he set down a 35 yard kick dead on the FSU 10-yard-line.

"Seymour, with work, will become one of the finest punters in collegiate football," says Graves. "He had a good sophomore year, and now he can work on becoming a real punting artist this spring. He's also starting to learn how to place the ball where he wants it down near the goal line."

Graves credits tremendous leg snap as Seymour's secret for consistently long and high punts.

In Monday night's action at the fronton, Pedro and Rafael were winners of the daily double, paying \$47.00 on a 1-1 combination.

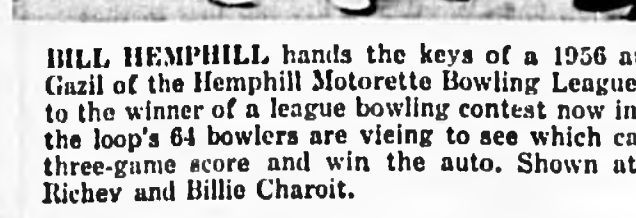
Pedro, in winning the third game, scored six straight points from the post one position to lock up his victory before any other players had a chance to get on the board.

Jimmy Viles helped himself to the high game honors with 202 as Team No. 5 grabbed a three point decision over the Cavanaugh Tire Service team.

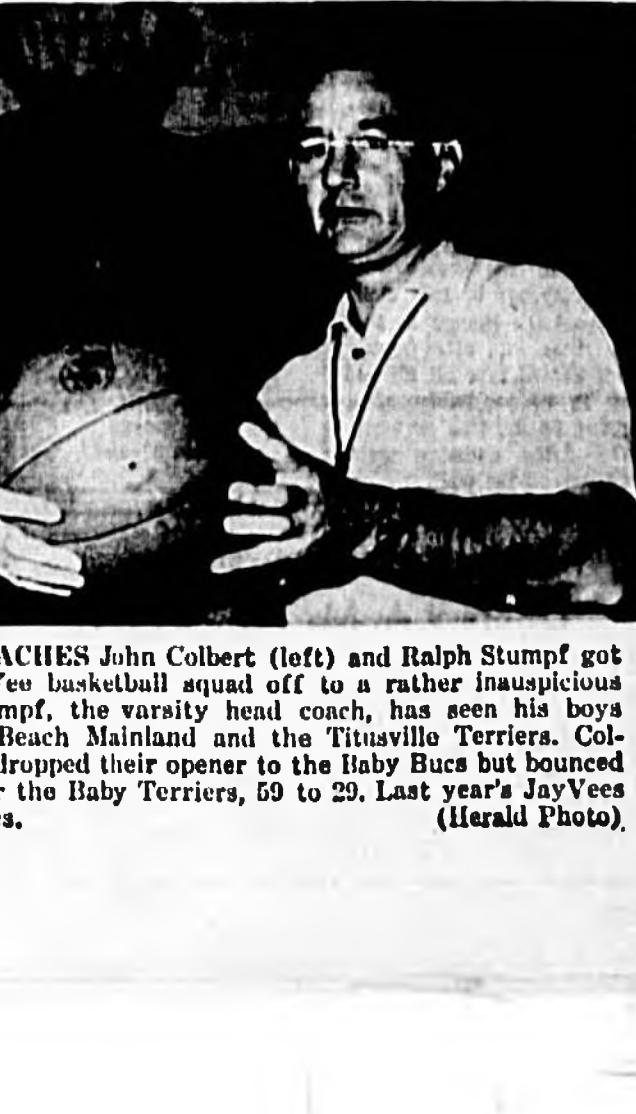

Low Back Pain Frequent Health Complaint

Except for the common cold, low back pain may be the most frequent health complaint in America today.

There are many causes and descriptions of low back pain and they almost always are the result of injury, usually a ridiculously simple one.

Lifting heavy objects, twisting suddenly, or straightening from a bent over position, or shoveling snow, trying to shove a stuck window all are open a stack window all are examples of the simple, every-day moves which can trigger the difficulty.

What actually happens is a twist, sprain, or strain of the sacro-lumbar joint or lumbo-sacral joint. And, like sprains or strains anywhere else in the body, they take time to heal. The outlook for complete recovery from a single attack is excellent, but people who have had recurrent episodes are likely to continue having them.

Although surgery sometimes is necessary in extreme cases, conservative treatment is successful in most of the cases. Most patients need posture training and special exercises to strengthen affected muscles. Good physical condition is most effective.

Before Painting Clean Walls

Clean those walls before painting.

In cases where a paint job is contracted, make sure that the painter's estimate includes a preliminary washing. Or, you may save on labor costs by doing the washing yourself.

Remember that paint won't cling to greasy or dirty walls. Here's a simple recipe for a wall and woodwork cleaner: Mix 1/2 cup of washing soda, 2 quarts of water, 1/2 cup of vinegar and 1/2 cup of ammonia. Or, you can find commercial cleansers that will do a good job.

Apply to the walls with either a sponge or soft cloth. Wring out the sponge so that area, rinse with clear water. This should take all oil and there is no possibility of it dripping on the wall or woodwork. After cleaning each dirt film off the wall.

Bitter Hearing On FEC Strike Ended

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—A federal investigating board ended a bitter nine-day hearing on the Florida East Coast

Railway strike Monday night and began sifting more than 1,000 pages of testimony for a report to President Johnson.

The hearing ended on a note of discord with FEC lawyers refusing to back a board request to extend its Dec. 19 report deadline by 10 days.

Railroad attorney William Devaney said the FEC could not approve the extension due to two injunction suits filed by the Justice Department to force the railway to abandon recently-adopted work rules and put more than 1,000 strikers back on the job for 30 days after the report is submitted.

Board Chairman Harry Platt protested that the suits had nothing to do with the hearings and asked Devaney to explain why the FEC would not grant the extension. He said the government wanted the extra time to study some 1,400 pages of transcript and write the report.

Devaney said he could not say "on the record" why the FEC protested, "but I will tell the board privately if you like."

"I'm sorry you can't state it for the record," Platt replied, but did not ask for the private explanation.

The strike, which began last January when members of 11 non-operating unions walked off the job over a 10.25 cents an hour wage hike, has forced the FEC to halt all passenger operations on its tracks along Florida's east coast.

The railroad has just about gotten freight service back to normal with outside workers despite numerous cases of vandalism — including dynamite and derailings—which have marred the strike.

The special board was ordered to look into the strike by the late President John Kennedy when an earlier investigating committee reported that the walkout was affecting the nation's space effort in the then Cape Canaveral area (now Cape Kennedy).

State Court Takes Up Religious Case

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The State Supreme Court will hear arguments today for the second time on how far Florida schools can go in observing religious practices outlawed by the nation's high court in Washington.

The U. S. Supreme Court ruled last year that it is unconstitutional to read the Bible and recite the Lord's Prayer in public schools.

At that time, it sent a Florida suit back to the state court for a change of opinion. The Tallahassee court had upheld a state law in August, 1962, which requires daily Bible readings in the schools.

Florida schools, on recommendations of State Supt. of Schools Thomas Bailey, have

continued daily Bible readings and the Lord's Prayer pending a final decision on the Florida law.

Asst. State Atty. Gen. Ralph Odum will urge the justices to hold that children in public schools are not automatically prohibited from the voluntary exercise of religious.

Leo Pfeffer of New York, general counsel, will ask the Florida court to ban all religious practice and observances.

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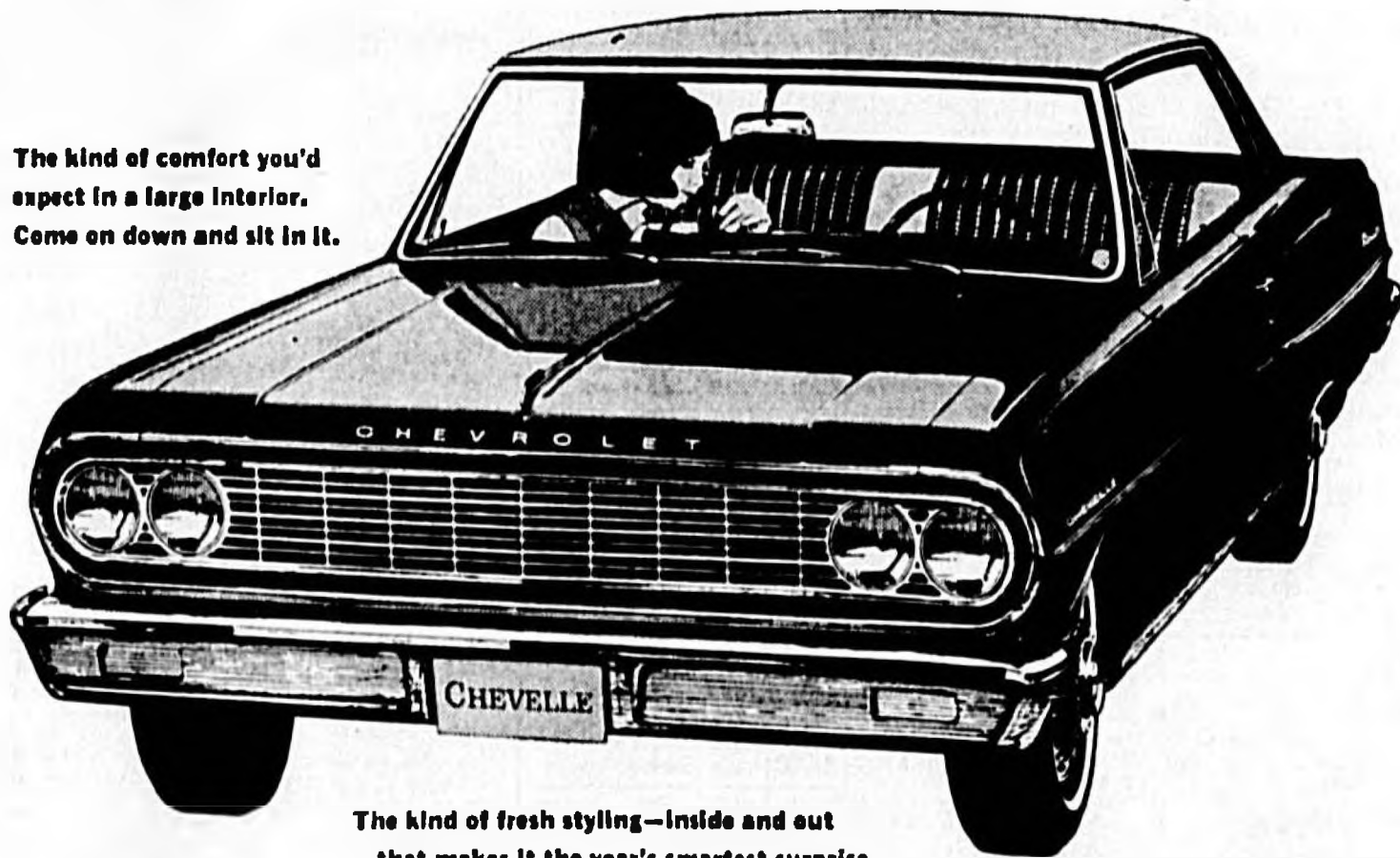
