Handling Fee Is Voted By Florida House

Levy Would Produce From \$600,000 To Million For General State Fund

Administration Supported Bill

Act To Keep Solons From Working At Race Tracks Loses

TALLAHASSEE, May 24.—(AP)—Without a dissenting vote, the House today voted to charge all special funds handled by the state treasury a 3 percent handling charge to produce \$600,000 to \$1,000,000 for general operations of the state government.

The House, on recommendations of its finance committee, went Governor Holland one better and voted a 3 percent levy where he had asked only 2 in a special tax message to the Legislature.

With this administration bill out of the way, the House awaited action of the finance committee early next week on the remainder of the Governor's financial program—creating a state tax commissioner and lightening county tax assessment and collection procedure.

This program met stern opposition and a determined fight against it was predicted for the final days of the session.

The House, meeting while the Senate was in recess until Monday afternoon, voted down 44 to 10 a measure that would have prohibited from working at the state's race tracks.

The proposed measure, which would have prohibited from working at the state's race tracks, was defeated by a vote of 44 to 10.

Governor Holland's proposal for a state tax commissioner drew full-blast opposition yesterday from State Comptroller Lee Higgins before the House finance and taxation committee.

Lee described the proposal as "locking the stable after the horse is gone" because the state no longer has any ad valorem taxation revenues.

Governor Holland wrote to the committee that "people who have been paying their taxes heretofore are willing to fear this system."

The proposed commissioner would have broad supervisory powers over the assessment of property by county tax assessors.

The hearing produced the loudest committee crowd of the 1941 Legislature, as lawyers, real estate dealers, bankers and business men gathered themselves.

Resolution Aids Use Of Woodruff Creek

Copy of a resolution introduced by Congressman Lee Higgins, asking for a review of the alternate route, Woodruff Creek, on the St. Johns River, dredging of which is provided for in the pending Rivers and Harbors bill, has been received by Edward Higgins, chairman of commerce committee.

The bill before the House includes deepening of the St. Johns River from Palatka in Sanford to a depth of 10 feet, and maintenance of a five-foot channel from Lake Monroe to Lake Harney.

Mr. Higgins' resolution, in effect, would have the engineers review the route between Lake Monroe and Lake Harney with an eye toward dredging Woodruff Creek, thereby making use of the short-cut.

Chamber Drive Totals \$2,208 Higgins Reports

Campaign Declared Most Successful Since Year 1931

Edward Higgins, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, making a final report on the membership drive recently conducted by the trade body, announced that the total of \$2,208 had been collected in cash and \$221 in pledged pledges which will be collected by the Chamber.

"About 850 members were signed in the best campaign conducted since 1930-31," Mr. Higgins declared.

Returns on the drive have been "very gratifying," the secretary said, "and it was a pleasure to the officials of the Chamber of Commerce to experience the enthusiasm and co-operation with which the people of the county have responded to the membership drive."

"Those who have not yet been called on for a membership are asked to send their subscriptions in to us," Mr. Higgins said.

Commenting further on the results of the campaign, Mr. Higgins asserted that "the response to the drive is an indication that the people of the county have realized the importance of developing the resources of the county and this is their offering of financial and moral support to the Chamber of Commerce to have this wonderful support."

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Knox Warns Nazi Defeat To Be Costly

Secretary Declares Sacrifices Needed For War To Control High Seas

WASHINGTON, May 24.—(AP)—Secretary of the Navy Knox said yesterday defeat of the Axis military might will entail a long, costly effort and warned that new sacrifices will be required of the United States unless there is a swift change in the war situation.

He told the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers that this is a war for control of the high seas. Victory for the democracies, he emphasized, is "going to take a long time and it's going to be at an awful price."

"But it will be worth the price," he exclaimed. "We are going to forget our bookkeeping. We are going to turn into the common pot of all of our profits. We are going to have to surrender some of our capital assets before we are through."

Unless the fortunes of war change swiftly in favor of the British, Knox said, the people of this country will be called upon for sacrifices that will match any sacrifices that have been made by any previous generation in this country. He dismissed peace agitation with the declaration that there can be no security against war "unless we are prepared to unleash the power to control the high seas and the air above them."

Knox's address reflected the growing seriousness with which the administration regards recent war developments, including the closer "collaboration" between Germany and the French Vichy government. President Roosevelt has pressed conference bearing on the international picture.

Survivor Of Zamzam Claims Being Shot At

FRENCH-SPANISH BORDER (Delayed)—May 24.—(AP)—An American woman survivor from the Egyptian motorship Zamzam, sunk by a Nazi raider in the southern Atlantic, asserted she and six children were machine-gunned after they had taken to a lifeboat.

Mrs. Elmer Danielson of Lomborg, Kas., an expectant mother, said she swam with one child under her arm and five life preservers tied to her, until a lifeboat from the raider picked her up.

She asserted the raider was flying a Norwegian flag.

Stopping Of French Quislings Supported

LONDON, May 21.—(AP)—Headquarters of General Charles De Gaulle's "Free France" forces, allied with Britain, pledged approval to "any action taken by the British government which would frustrate the plans of the French quislings."

They asserted that French Premier Jean Darlan's broadcast yesterday threw "no light on engagements he has undertaken to the French people, but it clearly proves the French people want no (with Adolf Hitler) on behalf of war with Britain, want no action by the French fleet, and want no German interference in the French colonial empire."

English Naval Squadron Destroys German Group Drowning 5,000 Troops

Furious Battle Rages At Malemi

London Admits Situation Is "Not So Good" On Island

Britain's mightiest warship, the 12,100 ton battleship Hood, was hit in a magazine and blew up during the British-German naval battle off Iceland today. The British acknowledged the loss shortly after the Nazi high command suddenly and sensationalized announced the Bismarck, Germany's newest battleship, had fought the British near Iceland and sunk a battleship, "apparently the Hood."

Normal complement of the Hood is 1,511 officers and men, nearly all of whom perished in the explosion which sent the floating fortress to her doom.

BERLIN, May 24.—(AP)—The German High Command today announced a unit of the German navy had destroyed a British battle cruiser, probably the huge H. M. S. Hood, in a battle with heavy forces of the British navy off Iceland.

The German radio asserted that the new 35,100 ton German battleship Bismarck destroyed the Hood, one of the most powerful warships afloat.

British naval forces against Axis convoys attempting to carry men and guns to Crete and Allied defenders today as the battle of the eastern Mediterranean entered its fifth and perhaps climactic day.

The British admitted some of the surviving German troops might have eluded the sea patrol to reach Crete, but expected about 10,000 of the troops and equipment they carried would be annihilated by the resistance of the island.

The German convoy has been destroyed by a British naval force, the British asserted, in a three-hour attack in which some Nazi troops were drowned and an Italian destroyer, two fighters and 40 small sailing vessels were sunk.

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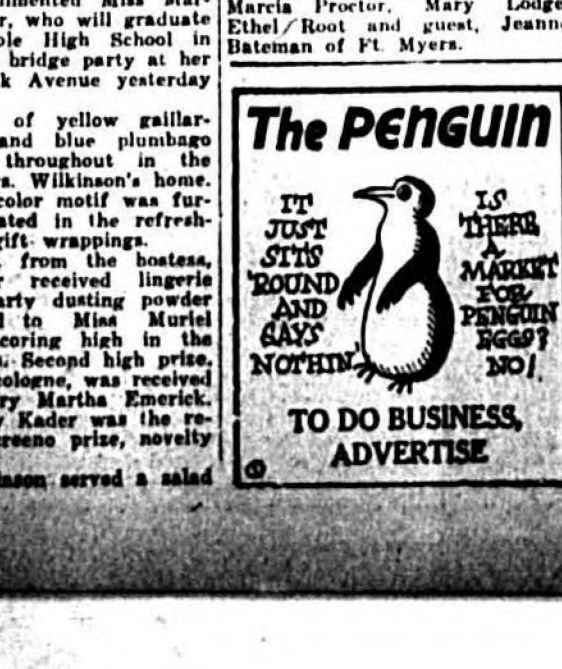

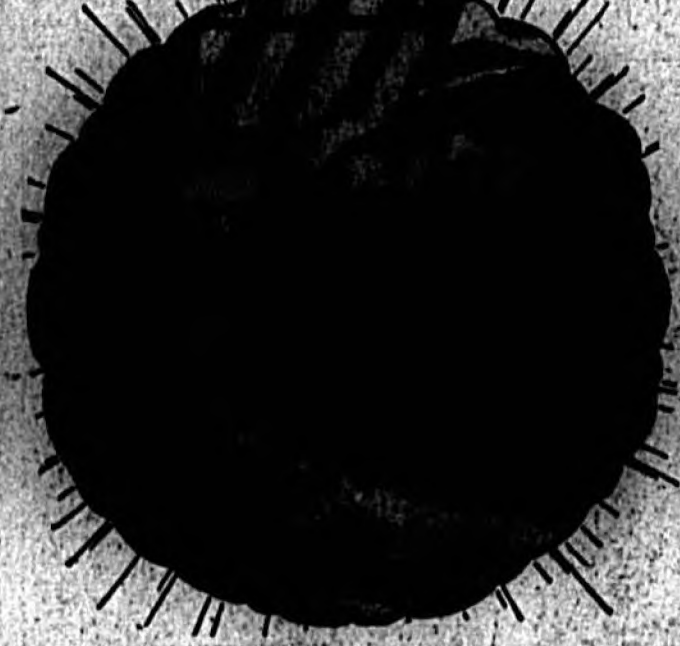

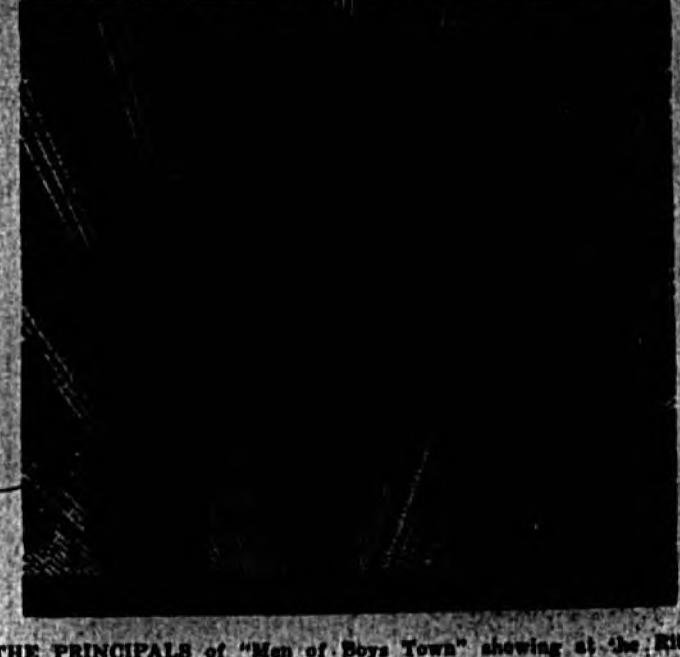

TALLAHASSEE, May 26.—(A.P.)—The House today adopted, 48 to 42, a \$3,771,000 old age pension rider to the general appropriations bill.

DUBLIN, May 26.—(A.P.)—Prime Minister Eamon De Valera today denounced a British proposal to apply conscription to neighboring northern Ireland as a "grievous attack" on a "fundamental human right."

Addressing the Dail Eireann (parliament) at a special session, the lanky, American-born premier asserted:

"There could be no more grievous attack on a fundamental human right than the plan to force a country to which he objected to belong."

Dublin has maintained a neutral stand in the war. Enlistment in the British cause in northern Ireland heretofore has been on a voluntary basis.

Alderman James McCourt declared at a Londonderry military conscription protest meeting yesterday that "a conscription bill in Churchill's face, if he wants war he can have it."

P. Maxwell, a member of Parliament, asserted at the same meeting that opposition to the proposed conscription in Ireland should be carried out "by unconstitutional means if necessary" while in Belfast, the labor party and a Nationalist republican group were both registered protests against the conscription plan.

BERLIN, May 26.—(A.P.)—The British Mediterranean fleet has suffered a "devastating" blow in matching its strength with the Luftwaffe in the battle of Crete and "important reverses no longer are reckoned with by Germany," the highly placed commentary Dienst Aus Deutschland asserted today.

Authorized military spokesmen asserted the Germans and Italians actually had wiped out the cruiser section of the Royal Navy's Eastern Mediterranean fleet. Of 12 cruisers the Germans said were known to have been based at Alexandria, the High Command reported 11 had been sunk.

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
