Exterminators Subject Of Probe

STONY BROOK, N.Y. (UPI) - Authorities say criminal charges could be filed against several exterminating firms accused of contaminating as much as 113 homes, one of which had to be torn down, and almost 200 more homes may be involved.

The pesticides, chlordane and aldrin, which are suspected to be carcinogenic when inhaled, ingested and other unpleasant symptoms when found at high levels inside homes.

State regulations require that they be injected into the ground around the foundations of houses with precautions taken to assure that none of the chemicals get inside the houses through cracks, holes or heating vents.

On March 31, it was reported that an East Islip, N.Y. Jeffrey Leaver, had his home torn down with all of its contents because of high levels of aldrin. The work was done in because of high levels of aldrin. The wreckage was taken to a landfill.

The next day, the state Department of Environmental Conservation disclosed seven other homes in various parts of Long Island had been found to be polluting children, a less toxic pesticide than aldrin. The Department of Health and Senior Citizens said it was not in touch with the exterminators.

At least, the DEC reported the number of homes involved had risen to 111, including the Leaver home. In three of the other cases were in Suffolk County and the other seven were in Nassau County.

Last week, the DEC was flooded with thousands of protest letters mostly to ignore the risky rebidding, up by the state. Worried homeowners inquired as to whether exterminating jobs performed in their homes during their years ago, possibly were still being done.
