

Oviedo '11' May Win A Game


After five weeks of drought on the gridiron, tonight may be the night that the prolonged dry spell for the Oviedo Lions may come to an end as they trek to New Smyrna Beach and take on the Barracudas.

It will mark the end of the season for the Barracudas and also will be their annual homecoming game. It will be the fifth homecoming game that the Lions have participated in this year and of the four previous they have not won a single contest.

Many things account for the hapless showing of the Lions on the pigskin field this year. Since their opening game with Seminole High School they have repeatedly been racked with injuries of one sort or another and all of them have been to starting personnel. This has left head coach Tony Wise with a paramount dilemma that is hard for any coach to contend with, but particularly so for Oviedo. The team as a whole is young and relatively inexperienced and lacks the necessary depth to overcome the problem of injuries to key personnel.

Wise has done his best to compensate for losses of starting players by shuffling positions around to put the best where it is needed the most. One prime example is the loss of quarterback Lyn Burch who was injured three weeks ago. Alan Daniel, the Lions talented punting specialist Joe Mikler, has maintained nearly a 40-yard average for the Lions all season which makes him one of the top in the central Florida area. With proper protection quarterback Burch and Daniel can both put together a reasonably good offensive effort for Oviedo. Throughout the season the Oviedo line has more often than not been out-sized and out-weighted, but in directions are that the Barracudas are in both inexperienced, young and probably as small or smaller due to the fact they have had to draw on the talents of the JV team to fill gaps left by injuries.

Some depth has been added to the Oviedo eleven as several members of the Baby Lion team have been moved up to the varsity squad since the completion of their season. Most notable of the new faces is Carlton Brundage who has been starting for the varsity. Despite problems encountered by Wise and his aspiring pigskin players victory is not out of reach for the Lions tonight and it may well prove their best opportunity to better last season's grid performance.



Jump Rope Contest Is Tomorrow

The Greater Oviedo Recreation Association will sponsor the Second Annual Long Jump Rope Contest tomorrow morning at the Oviedo Shopping Center parking lot. Judy DeShazo is in charge of the event for the Recreation Association.

According to Mrs. DeShazo 15 separate events comprise the contest will be divided into two age groups, junior high age and elementary age. There is no entry fee and all girls are welcome to participate.

Ribbons will be given for the most points in each group. Five places in each age group will receive ribbons based on the number of points given for each event. The long jump rope is 20 feet in length and will have one person maintaining each end of the rope.

The rules for the event are:

1. Rope turning front door: Run in, jump five times and out on opposite side. 3 pts.
2. Rope turning back door: Run in, jump five times and out on opposite side. 3 pts.
3. Rope turning, front door: Run in, make one complete turn in circle with three skips. 3 pts.
4. Rope turning, front door: Run in, jump five times and out on the same side you ran in. 5 pts.
5. Rope turning, front door: Run in, jump ten times, alternating front from left to right. one point for each successful trial; only on trial allowed; use of the wrong foot is considered a miss; if the rope is stopped by the person or their clothing it will be considered a miss; and any style of step may be used except in the events where a particular step is indicated.
6. Rope turning front door: Run in, jump five times on right foot, five times on left foot. 5 pts.
7. Rope turning front door: Run in, jump ten times in squaring position. (The player back must be straight) 5 pts.
8. Rope turning front door: Run in, jump five times holding right foot in front with left hand. 5 pts.
9. Rope turning front door: Run in, jump five times holding left foot with right hand. 5 pts.
10. Rope turning front door: Run in, jump ten times blindfolded, run out with eyes open. 7 pts.
11. Rope turning front door: Run in, jump up and down length of rope once, touching rope thrower's free hand, jump back to center and out on opposite side. 7 pts.
12. Rope turning front door: Run in, jump Hot Pepper, fifteen times. (Thrower spells H-O-T, then starts Hot Pepper. 7 pts.
13. The player stands in the center of long rope with a short rope in hand jumps five times, both the large and small ropes starting together. She then runs out. 10 pts.
14. With the two ropes turning inward "Double Dutch": The player runs in, jumps fifteen times and runs out on opposite side. (The running out is not required for Middle) 15 pts.
15. With the two ropes turning outward, "French Rope": (One rope at a time): The player runs in, jumps fifteen times and out on opposite side. 15 pts.



Marquette from Coosa, State Project Chairman of the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs, was guest speaker at the Home Life Department meeting of Sanford Woman's Club, Tuesday, Nov. 17. A group of civic minded club members listened sympathetically as the speaker described the Hacienda Girls' Ranch, a home for destitute girls who through no fault of their own have been neglected or abandoned by delinquent parents. With public donations, a temporary building for eight girls has been erected and was dedicated Oct. 4. Eventually a home for 50 additional girls, 12 to 16 years of age, will be built in Brevard County. The ranch may in time become the nucleus for other ranches. Mrs. Marquette emphasized that the occupants are good girls who should have a home, attend local schools and not be subjected to the impersonality of a large institution. FFWC members seek help through donations to their project which Judge Kev, of Orlando Juvenile Court, has termed to be of major importance in Florida. During the brief business session, Mrs. James Wade, department chairman, reminded club members to sign up for the departments they prefer to do special work with. Arguments Held Over Alignment Army Continues Canal Study

 The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will proceed with the study to realign the St. Johns River Canal channel between Lake Monroe and Lake Harney, despite the verbal assault on the project by various ecology and conservation groups Friday at a public hearing.

The hearing helped to give both the proponents and opponents of the canal a chance to express themselves in accordance with their beliefs and desires but actually did little to impede or add impetus to the ultimate position of the Corps of Engineers to study the realignment of the channel to avoid spawning grounds.

Congress appropriated \$50,000 to complete the study within the next two years and apparently will decide at that time whether the existing project should be further modified.

Actually, the only subject under consideration at the Civic Center Friday was the realignment of a channel in the St. Johns River, and not the canal itself, but it was evident that certain participants on both sides of the question were confused into thinking the canal itself would hinge on the outcome of the study.

There were quotes against the channel alignment and for the project from representatives of the same state wildlife agencies, according to speakers.

G. Edward Carlson, a director with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, is reported to have said "any canal project in the St. Johns River flood plain will have profound effects on fish and wildlife resources, even if only the dredging and spoils are considered."

O. E. Pyle, State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission director, indicated his department had also endorsed the statements of Carlson in its summation of the situation.

However, other statements from letters written to the Canal District from James R. Fielding and W. L. Towns, both regional directors with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, indicate that the canal district's resolution provides satisfactory assurance that proper safeguards to protect fishery resources are included.

Raynolds Smith-Hill's engineering report on recreational boating implies that initial demands of \$1.7 million "will be exceeded in 1971 from recreational boating between the two rivers, that involve seven counties. The engineering report forecasts by the year 2000 the monetary benefits will reach \$2.7 million a year, which exceeds the cost of the entire project."

Altamonte Building Sewers

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — The municipality's \$1,784,500 sewer system is "all systems go" with all three phases approved. Lines are presently being installed in Glen Arden Heights and on the south and east of Lake Oriata.

The system is being funded by a federal loan in the amount of \$950,000, a federal grant in the amount of \$341,500 and a grant from the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration. The city is required to furnish funds in the approximate amount of \$500,000. This will be paid through connection charges.

Contracts for construction of the system were recently awarded to Smith-Sweger Construction Company, sewer lines, \$331,882.50; Tech Corporation, lift station, \$223,000, and Chilton Construction Company, sewer treatment plant, \$205,701.

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
