And they are not about to let the new Governor forget that Mrs. Reubin Askew is a native of Sanford. (Well, dear reader, that's the way politics works.)

Fiorida's Senate traditionally has been a spawning ground for higher office and, with plenty of encouragement in the results of the 1970 elections, indications are it will be even more so in the future.

Look at the lineup after the 1970 general election: -Former Senate President pro tempore Reubin Askew (D-Pensacola) is now governor-elect. -Former Sen. Lawton Chiles (D-Lakeland) has won one of Florida's two seats in the U.S. Senate, while former Senate Minority Leader C. W. (Bill) Young (R-St. Petersburg) has won election to Congress.

-Come January, former Sen. Richard Stone (D-Miami) will be sworn in as secretary of state. Former Sen. Robert Shevin (D-Miami) will take over as state attorney general. These successes have made an impression on Senate members left behind, and it is known that already several are looking toward higher office.

Askew's election might have upset some timetables. Many Democrats view Askew's tenure in the governor's chair as not for four years, but for eight-barring some political disaster that prevents his election to a second term. A look at the present Senate lineup shows some members who are considered future gubernatorial candidates. Senate President Jerry Thomas (D.Jupiter) has considered the possibility but says he's not thinking about it now. "I don't know that I'll ever run for another state office."

The 34-year-old Harvard lawyer doesn't encourage talk along this line. His job now is to do a first-rate job as state

senator, he says. Graham's father was elected to the State Senate Nov. 3,

1936, and Graham--who comes to the Senate after experience in the House-grew up in a political environment. In 1944, Graham's father ran for governor, finishing third behind Millard Caldwell and Lex Green. "The best way you advance in politics," Graham said. "is doing the best with the position you hold." Congressional redistricting is sure to draw attention and

arouse some political ambitions among several members of the Senate. The 1970 federal census will allow Florida to have three more congressional seats. Senators expected to take a hard look at how congressional redistricting goes include veteran Sen. Louis de la Parte (D-Tampa), Sen. Frederick Karl (D-Daytona Beach), Sen. Welborn Daniel (D-Clermont), Eddie Gong (D-Miami) and Lee Weissenborn (D-Miami).
