Bush campaign plans stop at SCC

Texas governor will be joined by Sen. John McCain during rally

SANFORD — The crucial battle for Florida's 25 electoral votes takes on a local flavor in Seminole County today.

Republican nominee George W. Bush is scheduled to make a campaign stop tentatively scheduled for 1 p.m. this afternoon at the campus of Seminole Community College in Sanford.

Accompanying Bush will be Arizona Senator John McCain, whom Bush defeated for the Republican party nomination.

According to Seminole County Republican party chairman Jim Stelling, Bush's campaign message during his SCC visit will focus on issues relevant to seniors.

Bush will deliver his message at the Health & Physical Education Building on

the SCC campus, preceded by other republican speakers and entertainment. Doors open to the public beginning at 11:30 a.m. Those wishing to hear Bush speak must have a ticket issued by the State Republican Party. Tickets became available late Monday afternoon and

remain available today at the door on a first-come, first-serve basis.

The Texas governor's visit is part of a two-day swing through the Sunshine State that began Tuesday with a fly-in to Jacksonville and bus caravan to another campaign stop in Daytona Beach. The Bush contingent will likewise bus from Volusia County today to the SCC stop and then head for another appearance in Tampa.

Stelling said word of the visit came

Litton begins search for new chief

Lake Mary's top cop expected to be picked for local talent

LAKE MARY — The search is on for the city's next police chief.

"The position should be filled by the end of the year," City Manager John Litton said. However, no hiring deadline has been set.

"We certainly want the position filled as quickly as possible," Litton said. "But, time is not as important as making a choice that is in the best interest of the department."

In July, Lake Mary Police Chief Richard Beary announced he was running as an independent for Seminole County sheriff. Last month, he took a leave of absence from the police department to spend more time campaigning for the November election.

Due to state law, Beary is not allowed to withdraw his resignation and remain as Lake Mary police chief if he loses the election. However, he has agreed to come back and help with the transition before his departure from the department.

According to Litton, in-house advertising for the position began as soon as Beary informed the city manager about his leave of absence. The job was advertised in the newspaper over the weekend and is also posted on the Internet.

"I don't plan on doing a national search," Litton said. "I think we can fill it with someone from this area."

City ready to serve up new tennis complex

LAKE MARY — After more than two years of discussion, the city of lakes may soon be the home of a state-of-the-art tennis facility.

The Lake Mary's tennis complex will go to bid in two weeks, Parks and Recreation Director Bill Carrico said. Once a bid is accepted, it will take about four months to complete the facility.

"A lot of tennis players in the city have felt like the red-headed step child to golf," City Commissioner Al Crump said.

"The tennis complex will be a first-class facility that should generate good publicity and be a big drawing card for our city."

Plans for the tennis complex began more than two years ago when money was allocated in the city budget to build the facility. The original design

for Phase II of the Lake Mary Sports Complex, located on Rantoul Lane, included five hard tennis courts with a con-

cession stand. Several months ago, Carrico approached City Commission with revised plans for the facil-

ty. He replaced the five hard courts with seven soft courts and the concession stand with a small clubhouse.

"From past experience, I realized people prefer to play on soft courts rather than hard courts," Carrico said. "They are cooler than hard courts, less severe on the body — especially to the knees — and many people prefer the slower court."

After discussing the facility with numerous people, including tennis professionals, Carrico also realized the facility needed six courts to be capable of hosting tournaments. The seventh court will be used as a championship and teaching court.

By changing the design, cost estimates for construction of the complex increased by only \$50,000 — from \$650,000 to \$700,000.

"Before I made the changes, I

Mica secures funds for rail project

ORLANDO — Hopes for an alternative transportation system to alleviate congestion on Interstate-4 received a boost Monday.

U.S. Rep. John Mica, R-Winter Park, announced the Central Florida region has secured \$3 million in funding for continued study of a commuter rail system that would link Orange, Seminole, Volusia, and Osceola counties, serving as a building block to any future mass transit systems in the area.

The funding is part of a Transportation Appropriations Act signed into law Monday (October 22) by President Bill

Clinton. The transportation measure also includes \$4.5 million for enhancing local bus

fleets and passenger amenities around the State of Florida.

"This keeps us in the mass transportation mix and contains strong language that retains our eligibility for future funding," said Mica.

The funding will permit rail planners to examine the feasibility of utilizing 53 miles of existing CSX Transportation tracks to haul passenger rail

cars throughout the four-county area.

Mica and others have been pushing for a commuter rail line after a light rail proposal failed to garner support last year in a vote by Orange County commissioners.

The total cost of the proposed commuter rail project could reach \$70 million, depending on whether rail cars would be purchased or leased, and platform design of the sys-

Cartoonists against violence

For many years, artists who draw comics for newspaper publications have dedicated Oct. 25 as the day for anti-crime cartoons. There is a nationwide organization called Cartoonists Against Crime, and its motto is "We Draw Cartoons — Not Guns."

Over the years, many cartoons have taken this seriously and have drawn special comic strips specifically mentioning crime fighting or other related matters designed for children (and many adults) who read the comics.

Gasoline Alley, Blondie and Dagwood, and many others that have been around for a long time can generally be expected to take this opportunity to come up with a special strip.

Adrienne Koopersmith with Cartoonists Against Crime said the purpose is to employ comic art as an educational tool for implanting seeds of safety prevention into the minds of viewers/readers.

Of course, Prince Valiant and Hagar the Horrible still fight with swords, but lately, Hagar has had more problems with married life than with the enemy. The Phantom also has a tendency to use his pistol from time to time, but is becoming less of a focal point in the comic strip.

In my opinion, it's too bad this drive by cartoonists — even for this single day — doesn't expand to other forms of entertainment. Could we possibly have just one day a year when there are no crime shows on television or in the movies? Methinks it would be impossible.

Television and movie makers know full well there's always big money to be made in stories about crime and violence. Why should they stop, even for a single day.

Of course, stopping for a week, a month or even a year would be ideal, but that is a utopian situation, and we'll never see it happen.

Movie makers and television producers have had a number of meetings over the years, supposedly trying to "reduce violence" in their showings. They often testify before congress and promise to do more. In this regard, their "promises" have less value than promises given constituents by politicians.

There are times when writing a column such as this is a futile effort. I'm not going to even make a dent in these problems. But I want people to know that at least cartoonists (and not all of them) will be trying to do some good on this date. For that we can be thankful.

Cyclist killed
One of the four persons killed in motorcycle accidents during last week's Biketoberfest in Daytona Beach, was a Seminole County resident. The Florida Highway Patrol reported Wayne L. Kimmons, 38, was killed when his motorcycle was struck by a sports utility vehicle on SR-415 near Osteen Saturday. The FHP said the motorcycle burst into flames on impact.

Robber shot
One man was shot in an armed robbery Saturday in the 1000 block of Ballard Street in Altamonte Springs. According to Franklin Yi, owner of the EZ Way store, two black males with their faces covered, entered the store armed with a hatchet demanding money. They reportedly grabbed Yi and began battering him, demanding more money. Police said Yi then grabbed his gun from

under the cash register and shot one of the suspects, Samuel Butler, 25, twice. While he reportedly attempted to shoot the other robber, the man, identified as Alarick Whitted, 29, fled from the store but was later apprehended on Lavon Street and placed under arrest.

Butler was transported to Orlando Regional Medical Center and is listed in critical but stable condition.

Suffering in Silence

Far right waits for George W. Bush to win

This has no doubt been a challenging election season for James Dobson, Pat Robertson, Jerry Falwell and other icons of the ultraconservative wing of the Republican Party. They've had to keep their mouths mostly shut, stay mostly out of sight, and watch as George W. Bush publicly repudiated or distanced himself from much that the fringe right has stood for over the last two decades.

What a change from just four years ago! Then, every major Republican politician was required to kiss the rings of those self-anointed arbiters of morality and family values. These days, Bush and his vice presidential nominee, Dick Cheney, regard any public recognition of Dobson, Robertson, et al. as the kiss of death.

But egotistical, power-hungry and publicity-seeking though they may be, Robertson and his right-wing brethren have dealt with it. They have resisted the temptation to chastise Bush too loudly or too often, to demand a public vow of fealty, or to do anything to frighten off the independent voters Bush needs to win the White House.

They are much too desperate for that. After eight years of wandering in the wilderness of presidential politics, the religious and social right believe they are within a hairsbreadth of having in the White House a man who will do their bidding. Even if Bush has given them the stiff-arm lately, they believe they can control him if he wins.

There's no reason to believe that Bush harbors the same harsh and narrow social views that they do; he seems genuinely dedicated to diversity and sincerely tolerant. But there's also no reason to believe that Bush would do anything to stop the fringe right from pushing its gay-bashing, woman-hating agenda into law were he to be elected.

After all, the most outrageous exaggeration that Bush has offered during the campaign (among a host of his distortions that the Washington press corps has chosen to either ignore or downplay) is his insistence that he will lead. Of all the characteristics that mark Bush's tenure as governor of Texas, leadership is not among them. As head of a state with a weak-governor system, Bush mostly went along to get along.

He never took on the Texas death machine, despite reams of evidence that the criminal justice system there is riddled with racism, incompetence and error. He never challenged the Texas Republican Party, whose official platform would repeal all minimum wage laws and abolish Social Security, and declares that "homosexual behavior is contrary to the fundamental unchanging truths that have been ordained by God." He never stood up to the big-business interests that dirty the air, pollute the water and defy regulation.

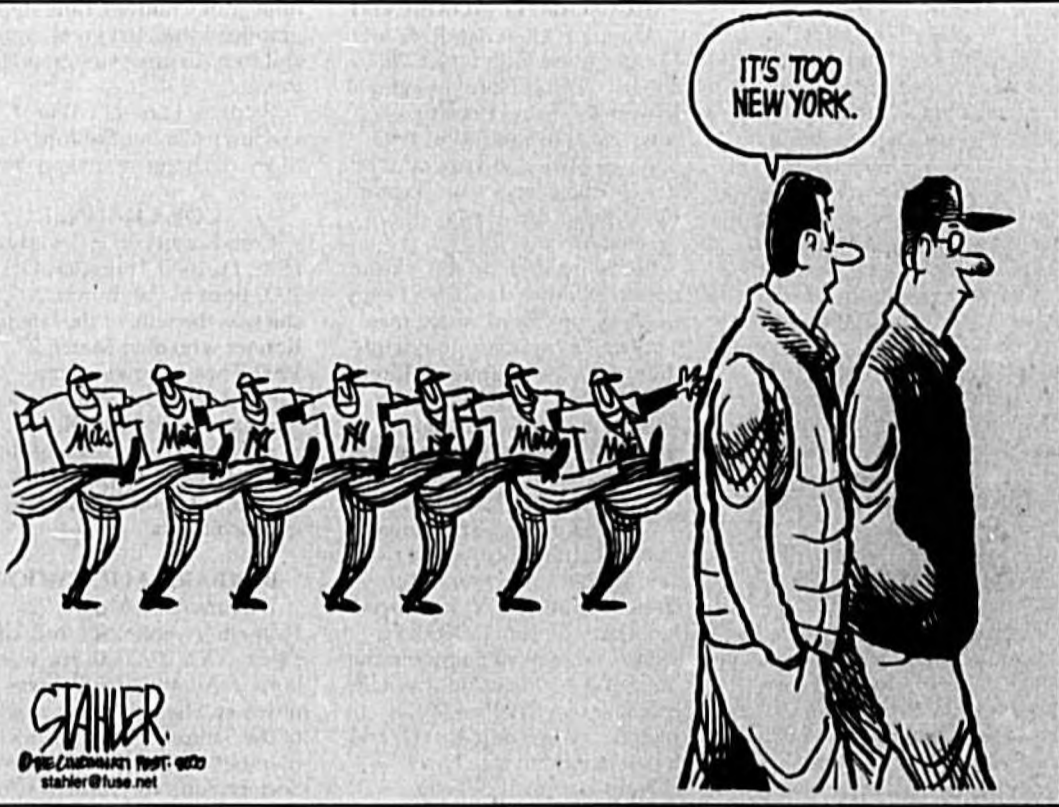
Given Bush's record and wimpishness, the retro right feels certain it can pull his strings. So they have mostly stayed silent when he declared that he would not attempt to outlaw abortion until "a lot of minds" are changed or that he wouldn't try to revoke the Federal Drug Administration's approval of RU-486. (They knew he was prevaricating on the second point, anyway. Just a week or so earlier, a Bush spokesman had said that Bush would try to overturn FDA approval of the drug.)

And they pursed their lips and grit their teeth when Bush and Cheney, whose daughter Mary is lesbian, refused during debates to mimic the religious right's reflexive condemnation of homosexuality as "an abomination." Indeed, Cheney went so far as to say that "people should be free to enter into any kind of relationship they want to enter into."

That probably provoked private fits from Falwell, who once took out after a PBS puppet aimed at toddlers as an agent of the "homosexual agenda." But he and his fellow travelers were able to mute their rage, confining their dissent mostly to comments on the Web sites of their respective right-wing organizations.

They figure that if Bush can just hold on and not mangle any more syntax or mix up any more world leaders, the fringe right will have, as a National Rifle Association executive once put it, "a president ... where we work out of their office." And they're probably right.

Which candidate can get things done?

After 10 months of nonstop campaigning by both George W. Bush and Al Gore, after the two party conventions, after the three presidential debates, the polls tell us that 10 percent of Americans remain "undecided" as to whom they prefer to sit in the Oval Office for the next four years.

As a gesture of empathy with those "swing" voters, agonizing over their choice or vacillating between the candidates, let us boil the contest down to its essentials. As they weigh the merits (and demerits) of the Republican and Democratic candidates, they should ask themselves the following questions:

Whom do I trust? The moral relativists in the political media, as well as their comrades-in-arms in the academy (the preponderantly left-leaning political scientists whom they are always quoting in their campaign stories), have given short shrift to the character issue.

But it matters. For the very last thing the American people want is another scandal-ridden White House; another president who will bring further disgrace upon the highest office in the land.

Gore brings heavy baggage to this election as far as trustworthiness goes. Indeed, he clearly broke campaign fund-raising laws during the last presidential election. Most seriously by soliciting contributions out of his White House office and raising loot at a religious institution (his infamous visit to the Buddhist temple).

What particularly disturbs, in these two cases in particular, is that to this day, the vice president denies any wrongdoing. Like his current boss, Bill Clinton, the vice president operates under the premise that, if you haven't been formally indicted for a crime, you haven't broken the law.

Who will be easier on my pocketbook? Both Bush and Gore promise to lower taxes if elected. But there's a big difference in their plans. Bush proposes across-the-board cuts in marginal tax rates. Gore proposes so-called "targeted" cuts.

The differences were delineated in the third debate in St. Louis when audience member Lisa Key asked the vice president: "How will your tax plan affect me as a middle-class single person with no dependents?"

Well, said the vice president, "If you make \$60,000 and you decide to invest \$1,000 in a savings account, you'll actually get a tax credit, which means in essence that the federal government will match your \$1,000 with another \$1,000. If you make less than \$30,000 a year, and you put \$500 in a savings account, the federal government will match it with \$1,500."

Now here's what the vice president didn't tell the Missouri woman: If she doesn't put money into an individual retirement account, for whatever reasons (like maybe she has a company retirement plan) she doesn't get a tax cut under his plan.

Nor do the taxpayers who don't have a child in day care or a kid in college or a sick parent in a nursing home. For Gore has decided that only select taxpayers will get a tax cut if he becomes president.

Under Bush's plan, by contrast, everyone pays lower taxes (whether or not they have an IRA). "If you pay taxes, you ought to get tax relief," said Bush. "I don't think that's the role of the president to pick, 'you're right, and you're not right.'"

Who will strengthen the military? During the eight years that the Clinton-Gore administration has been in the White House, the military has shrunk by a third. Yet the armed forces have been deployed three times as often as they were during the previous Republican administration — mainly for "peacekeeping" and "humanitarian" missions.

The result of this overuse of the military is that preparedness is not nearly what it was before Gore assumed the vice presidency. In fact, the retiring commander of U.S. forces in the Persian Gulf said that, today, the military would find it considerably more difficult to fight and win a conflict like the 1991 Gulf War.

Meanwhile, morale is low among the men and women in uniform (6,000 of whom are living off food stamps) and the military is having difficulties with both recruitment and retention.

Gore promises to shore up the military. But the men and women in uniform are to be forgiven for wondering why he hasn't stepped up for them long before now.

Who will get things done in Washington? Among the major accomplishments for which the vice president's Web site gives him credit are welfare reform ("Gore helped overhaul the welfare system") and the balanced budget ("Gore helped lead efforts to turn record budget deficits into surpluses").

But what Gore neglects to mention is that he and his boss, Bill Clinton, fought Republican efforts to enact welfare reform and balanced budget legislation. (In fact, Clinton vetoed GOP welfare and budget bills when they crossed his desk.)

Only when Clinton and Gore concluded that, like the

Democratic-controlled House and Senate in 1994, they might be turned out by the voters unless they embraced these two Republican initiatives in particular did they acquiesce to welfare reform and the balanced budget.

And that's been the MO of both Clinton and Gore. Rather than reaching out to the other party in an effort to get things done — such as implementing much needed Social Security and Medicare reform — the president and vice president have consistently chosen to demonize the other side.

And so it continues with Gore, who has reduced practically every issue into an "us vs. them" confrontation. He's on the side of angels. His Republican opponent and Republican party members are on the side of evil.

Well, Gore may think that makes for effective campaign strategy. But it sure doesn't help when it comes time to govern and to get things done. To address the problems that confront the next president, it is important to have a writer in the White House, rather than a divider.

Swing voters ought to have a pretty good idea which candidate better fits that bill.

early Monday and as with home stretch campaigning, some details of Bush's visit were still being worked out at press time.

"Unlike some of the polls, I don't think that Florida is a toss-up state, but you can't win the presidency without it," Stelling said. "Governor Bush is coming to Central Florida to shore up his base and reach out."

Stelling said that with two weeks to go before the election, this would likely be Bush's last campaign trip to the Central Florida area but added, "You never know."

SCC president Dr. E. Ann McGee said the college got word of a possible Bush visit this past weekend.

"We can thank Mr. Stelling for steering Gov. Bush to our campus. We are thrilled he's going to be here. It gives us a chance to showcase SCC."

McGee said visits by presidential candidates can send host facilities scrambling but felt confident of hosting the visit.

"Our troops have everything under control."

McGee and trustee DeDe Schaefer are expected to have at least some time for a one-on-one discussion with Bush during his visit.

"If we do get the chance to bend his ear I'll be talking a lot about education and particularly about educational funding," she said.

McGee added that she hoped a visit by a presidential candidate would prompt a 100 per-

cent voter turnout Nov. 7 by SCC's student body.

"They need to exercise that right and privilege," she said.

Both Bush and Democratic rival Al Gore have targeted Florida heavily since their third and final presidential debate a week ago as polls continue to show the state a virtual toss-up. Vice presidential nominees have also played a significant role in courting Florida voters.

discussed it with people who will be using the facility to get their thoughts and concepts," Carrico said. "If you don't go to the people who will be using it, you are bound to make some major mistakes."

Carrico said fees to use the facility have not been established yet, but they should be three times less expensive than other tennis clubs. Memberships will be offered, but those not wanting to join the tennis club can pay on a per-use basis. However, there will be a limit to the number of members at the facility.

"We will not have so many members where nobody can get

on the courts to play tennis," Carrico said. "The number of members will be determined by myself and a tennis committee, which was established several months ago."

The fees will be used to support the daily maintenance and operation of the courts. A tennis pro will also be hired to maintain, operate and teach tennis at the facility.

"This is a new concept," Carrico said. "The tennis pro will be responsible for bringing in members and promoting daily play. He or she will be given all the money made for teaching lessons and a percentage of all fees."

A social area is planned for

the complex, which includes a small clubhouse that can be used for gatherings.

"You don't have to be a tennis player to enjoy this facility," Carrico said.

It will take about a month for contractors to respond to the bid process, Carrico said. Construction, which includes all aspects of the complex, should take about four months, and the facility should be open in spring 2001.

"Hopefully, the complex should be open this upcoming spring," he said. "We want people to say its one of the best in Florida, and, excitement is already at a fever pitch."

As of Monday, several people have inquired about the position, but Litton said he has not received any applications.

Although no applications have been submitted by in-house personnel, Litton said he would prefer to have someone from Lake Mary fill the position.

"If there is a tie between two candidates in about all aspects, we will go with known quality," Litton said. "I want someone who has demonstrated leadership ability and can continue to grow the department as Chief Beary has done."

"I also want someone who is innovative."

After Litton screens the applications, he plans on conducting an assessment center, which will include a review board of local law enforcement personnel not in the running for the position. The city manager said he would also like to involve residents and business leaders in the search process.

Once Litton finalizes his selection, he will make a recommendation to City Commission for approval.

"This is a great opportunity with a chance to take a department that is still really in its

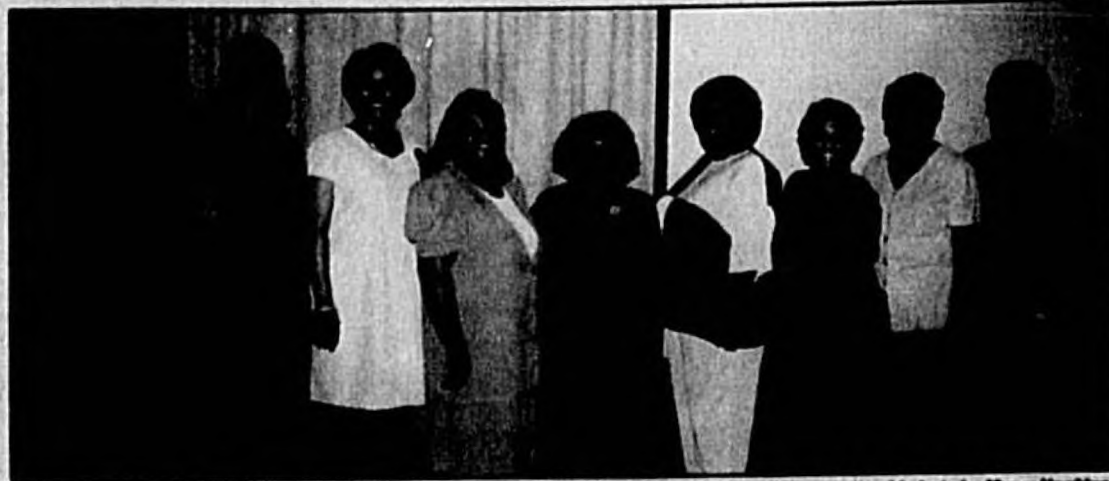

One thing is certain: He will never make it as a stand-up comic. He should put more effort into his daytime job.

DEAR ABBY: Until January 1997, I thought I was destined to die weighing more than 350 pounds. Losing weight seemed like an insurmountable challenge. However, a health crisis got me started, and with the motivation, information and fellowship provided by the weight-loss support group TOPS (Take Off Pounds Sensibly), I have literally become half the person I used to be.

I'm proud to report that I'm at the goal weight prescribed by my doctor. I now wear clothes nine sizes less than I did three years ago. Abby, I can now walk up to four miles without stopping

instead of one block, and I'm able to climb 10 flights of stairs without breathing hard. I'm sharing this personal information to encourage others who struggle with being overweight to consider joining a chapter of TOPS for help.

TOPS differs from commercial weight-loss organizations. Goals and food plans are not set by TOPS; members get their food plans and goals from their physicians. Ours is the oldest international, nonprofit weight-loss support group, and our philosophy is that change comes from within. By helping one another, TOPS members make that lifesaving change. I owe my life to TOPS, and I

know from personal experience that it can be a godsend to many of your readers. Please let people know about it, Abby.

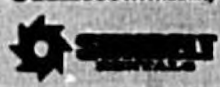
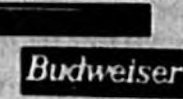
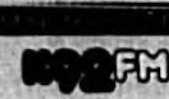

Low cost makes ligustrums most common landscape plant

Ligustrums are one of the most commonly used landscape plants. Their low cost, availability, rapid growth and wide adaptability make them a popular choice for the landscape. They are widely used as landscape shrubs, hedges, and specimen trees. Many species and varieties are available with a diversity of leaf colors, leaf forms, and growth habits. Ligustrums are very tolerant to heavy pruning and for that reason are frequently used as hedges. Because of a rapid growth rate, many require pruning to control their size. The white flowers are attractive during late spring and

early summer.

Types

The most common ligustrums grown in Florida are Japanese or wax privet, glossy privet, and Chinese privet. Japanese privet and glossy privet are often confused. Japanese privet has thick, evergreen, glossy leaves 3 to 4 inches long. The leaves have four to five pairs of veins and leaf tips have a wide-angled, blunt point. Japanese privet is a vigorous compact shrub or small tree reaching a maximum height of 15 to 18 feet, but is easily pruned to maintain any desired height. The Japanese privet "Gold Tip", is very popular. Glossy privet grows rapidly and can become a small tree 30 to 40 feet tall. The dark evergreen leaves are 4 to 6 inches long, with six to eight pairs of veins and narrow, elongated

tips. Small white flowers are borne in compact terminal clusters in spring. The small mature black berries persist much of the year. The variegated Chinese privet has small white to yellowish variegated leaves about 1 1/2 to 3 inches long. Ligustrums are used as foundation plantings, hedges, shrub borders, accent shrubs, specimen and patio trees. Most ligustrums are not well suited for home foundation plantings because of their rapid growth and large ultimate size. Frequent and severe pruning is necessary to prevent these shrubs from overgrowing designated areas. Ligustrums are ideally suited for hedges because of their large mass of foliage and ability to tolerate heavy shearing as well as

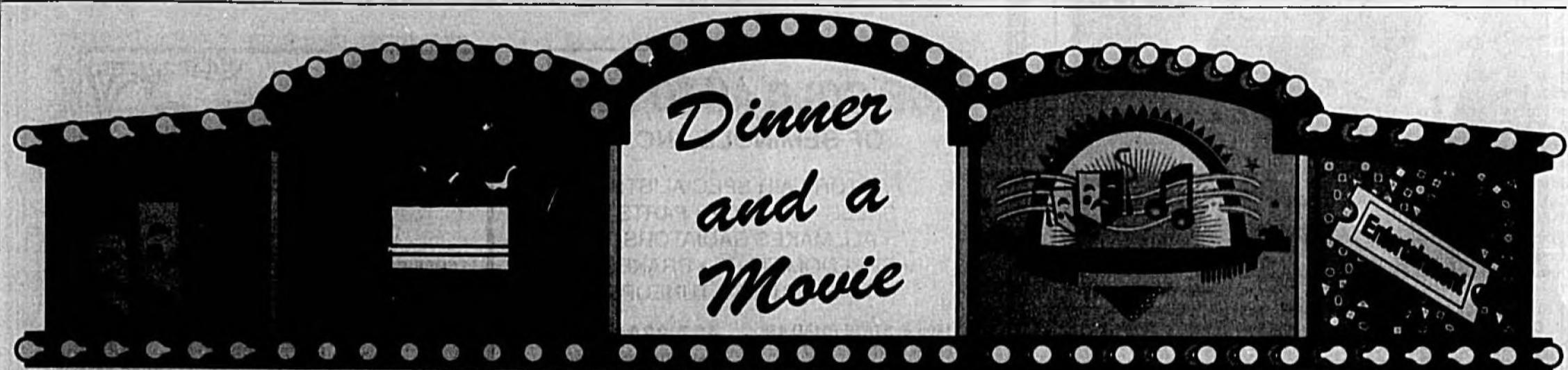
neglect. Hedge plants should be spaced 2 feet apart for low formal hedges and 4 feet or more for medium to tall hedges. Ligustrums can be propagated through-out Florida with little fear of cold injury. They are also tolerant of the wide diversity of Florida's native soils and can be grown in full sun to partial shade. Japanese and glossy privet are moderately salt tolerant but should not be used where subjected directly to salt spray. Regular pruning is required to promote desired growth and maintain desired size. Fertilization of ligustrum depends upon plant size and desired rate of growth. Established plants should be fertilized two to four times a year. If only two applications are used, fertilize in early spring and mid-summer for best results.

Additional applications can be made in late spring and early fall to promote faster growth. A 6-6-6 or 8-8-8 fertilizer can be broadcast in shrub beds at 2 to 4 cups per 100 square feet. Single plants may be fertilized with 6-6-6 or 8-8-8 at rates of 1/2 to 1 cup per plant. Ligustrums can be propagated from cuttings, grafting and seeds. Desirable plants must be propagated by cuttings or grafting to maintain the desired leaf and growth characteristics. Softwood and spring hardwood cuttings of most ligustrums root easily. About eight weeks are required for rooting. Aphids, scales, whiteflies and spidermites frequently affect ligustrums. Severe injury can easily occur before being detected.

Insecticides should be applied when populations begin to build and before the leaves are damaged. Usually two applications of an insecticide five to seven days apart will provide acceptable control. Nematodes are also important pests on ligustrum, large populations of them can damage their root systems reducing plant growth, causing leaf drop, and sometimes death. A leaf spot caused by the fungus of the genus Cercospora is very common on ligustrum. This fungus can be controlled with fungicide sprays early in the rainy season. Board tables action on lobbyists ordinance

SANFORD — Saying it wasn't broad enough in some areas, and too cumbersome in others, Seminole County commissioners voted 5-0 Tuesday to table action on a proposed ordinance regulating lobbyists' activity in Seminole County.

Under the ordinance framework presented by assistant county attorney Stephen Lee, lobbyists would have to pay a \$20 annual registration fee, disclose whom they are working for, and file forms identifying matters and issues being discussed with commissioners.

Violations of the ordinance could result in lobbyists losing their privileges, or possibly being charged by state prosecutors with breaking a county ordinance, resulting in maximum penalties of 60 days in jail or a \$500 fine.

Universally, board members felt the proposed ordinance, brought forward by county staff and modeled after a number of other county and state provisions regulating lobbyist activities, came up short in terms of what they felt was appropriate for Seminole County.

Specifically the proposed ordinance deals only with board members, and one provision would require them to keep a log

book with notations with all discussions pertaining to county business.

"I think this needs a lot more input from individual commissioners, and I think we would develop a matrix to examine how the state, other counties and cities deal with lobbyist regulation," said board chairman Carlton Henley.

He also questioned, as did commissioner Daryl McLain, whether the ordinance should apply to lobbyist contact with the county manager, deputy county manager department heads and city staff.

"I don't think there's enough information provided in this

plan," McLain said. "Key staff people who draft regulations should be included, not just the Board of County Commissioners. I want to know who is lobbying county staff, when they meet, and what they talk about."

Commissioners Grant Maloy, Randy Morris, and Dick Van Der Weide also expressed reservations about the draft ordinance.

"Disclosure is not a bad idea," Maloy said. "I think it's important for citizens to know what goes on behind the scenes. We also need to address a cooling off period for former county employees before they are allowed to come back and lobby the board."

Morris said he felt the ordinance should be addressed from a "top down" perspective, and possibly include volunteer board members who sit on various county boards such as the board of adjustment, planning, and zoning.

"We need to come up with a matrix that covers a variety of areas," he said.

Van Der Weide said ordinance language would have to be crafted to be more inclusive in terms of who lobbyists have communication with.

"It's certainly important to have the board operating under a regulatory ordinance, but let's also take a look at who is being

left out."

He added that one example of ordinance language suggested by county staff would require commissioners to carry around a notebook, logging all communication with lobbyists.

"I don't want to walk around with a notebook in my hand 24 hours, seven days a week," Van Der Weide commented. "If a commissioner forgets to write someone's name down that we might bump into at anytime it could cause unreasonable problems."

Board members instructed Lee to develop a more comprehensive ordinance draft addressing their collective concerns.

tem. "We can't put the cart before the horse but this reflects our commitment to a new program and gives Central Florida another chance to stay alive in the mix for future transportation appropriations from the federal level," Mica said.

Federal law requires that 20 percent of all federal gas tax funds be used only for mass transit purposes. The Federal Transportation Administration last year pledged \$345 million in federal funds for the Orlando light rail project. A total of \$46 million was spent on studies and planning for the project, but when Orange County commissioners voted down the light rail issue, the FTA was required to return over \$20 million in residual funds, which in turn were reallocated to other communities included in the

Transportation Bill.

Mica said his focus on future funding will be to develop an infrastructure that accommo-

dates commuters in the four-county triangle and building a system that would link Orlando with the Tampa area.

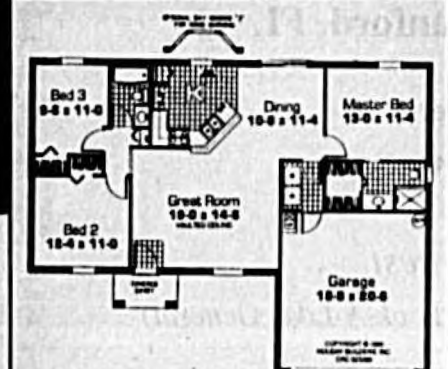

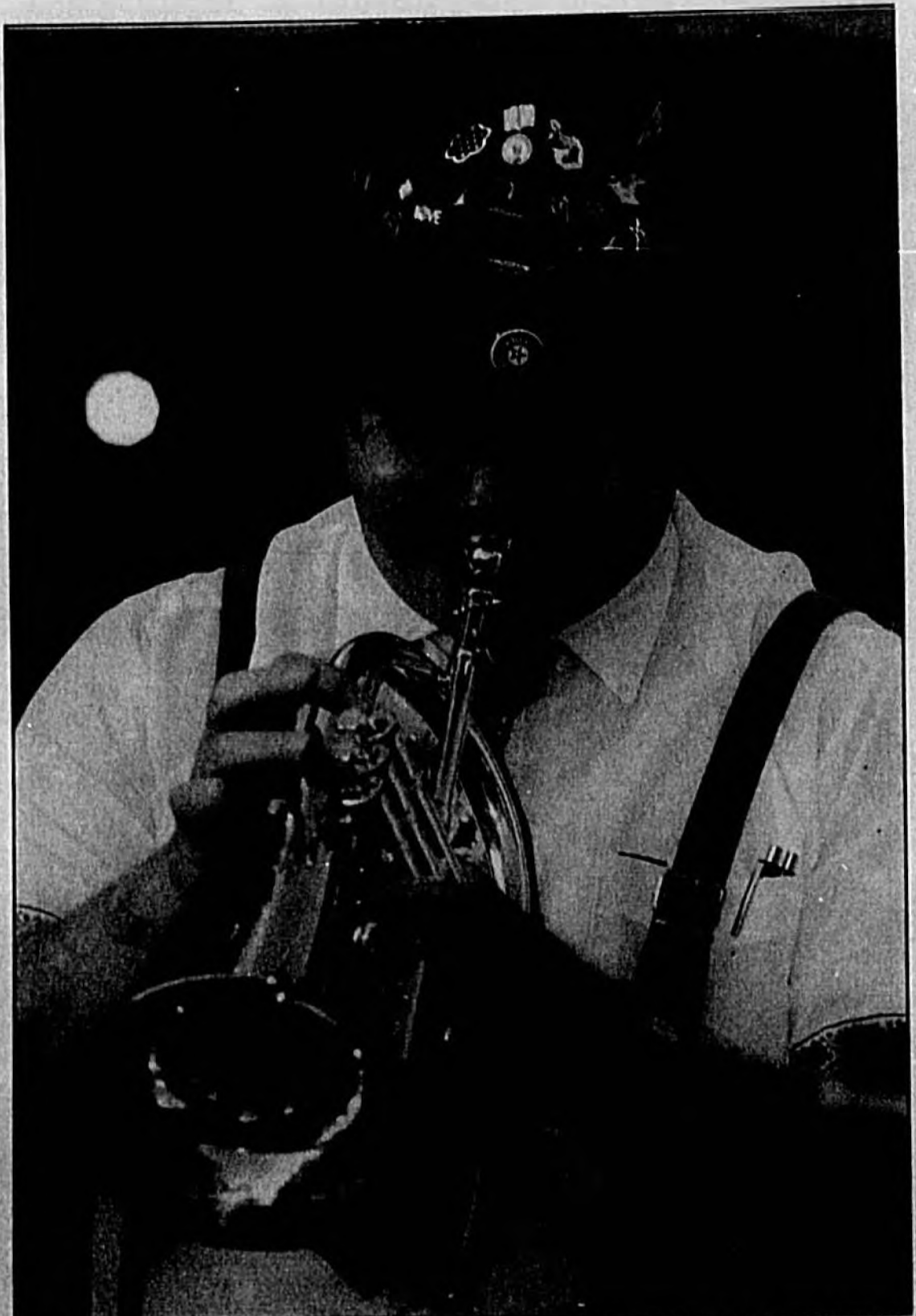

Cope claims fourth win in Florida's Governor's Cup

SAMSULA — Jimmy Cope waited for late non-race related action to end and won the 35th Annual Florida Governor's Cup 200 Saturday night Oct. 14th at New Smyrna Speedway, posting the most cup victories.

For Cope of Pinellas Park, driving the Myakka Brokers Chevrolet, it was a record setting Governor's Cup performance. The win gave Cope the most cup victories with four. Cope won at Golden Gate Speedway in Tampa, in 1982 and Desoto Speedway in Bradenton, in 1986 & 1987.

Father and son duo Dick Anderson and Wayne Anderson of Wildwood, dominated early action with Wayne Anderson leading for 68 laps and Dick Anderson for 85 trips around the one-half mile track. But Cope led when it counted, the final 25 laps, after steadily moving to the front.

A late race incident in lap 152 ended Wayne Anderson's strong run when it appeared David Rogers of Orlando, touched the right rear of Wayne Anderson's Race Car College Chevrolet sending it into the back straightaway wall in a large piece of twisted sheet metal. The two drivers had several paint-scraping incidents during the race, but neither were the worse for wear.

It didn't end there as Wayne Anderson then came around turn three and headed straight for

Rogers TM Ranch Dodge slamming into it in turn four causing extensive rear end and spoiler damage. That ended Rogers strong run as he no longer could keep pace.

It was short track racing at its best until the incident, but it turned ugly at the pit gate, pit road and later in the pit area. The incident is under review by track officials, who offered no comment at this time.

Cope started 15th with fast qualifier Mike Franklin Jr. of Homestead, setting fast time by turning the track in 18.125 seconds, in the U.S. Trucking ride and led a 36 car field to green.

Wayne Anderson took the lead in lap seven holding it until lap 67 when Dick Anderson rode to the top-spot in his Chevrolet. The younger Anderson then resumed the lead in lap 86, but a major pit stop by the leader put Ricky Carlton of Homosassa, up front during lap 91 in the McNatt Plumbing machine.

Carlton held the point for 14 laps and Wayne Anderson then took over for a single circuit and then Dick Anderson retook the lead. Things ran smoothly until a lap 172 caution. Cope, running second since the fiasco in lap 152, was now ready to challenge Dick Anderson.

taken from now through February. Use large shiners if you are serious about a wall-hanger, and fish them near floating mats of water hyacinths or around river structure such as deep bends, slough mouths, etc. My favorite stretch is from Puzzle Lake south to Lake Winder, as this area receives less fishing pressure.

Sebastian Inlet has good snook action, along with flounder, redfish, and trout. Large live shrimp or small baitfish are good for all species. Work the baits slowly across the rocky bottom.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports that offshore fishing is touch and go with high seas. King mackerel can be found on 8 A Reef and Pelican Flats, along with scattered cobia. Bottom fishing will improve with cooler weather. A few tripletail are still in the

buoy line, while sheepshead and flounder are dependable inside the Port. Trout and redfish are rated as fair in the Banana and Indian rivers.

Ponce Inlet has fast action with sheepshead, drum, redfish and small bluefish. Live or dead shrimp is a good bait for all species. Sheepshead, however, cannot resist fiddler crabs. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.

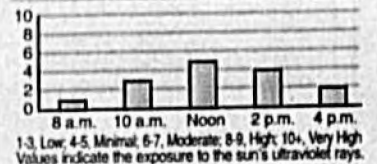
