



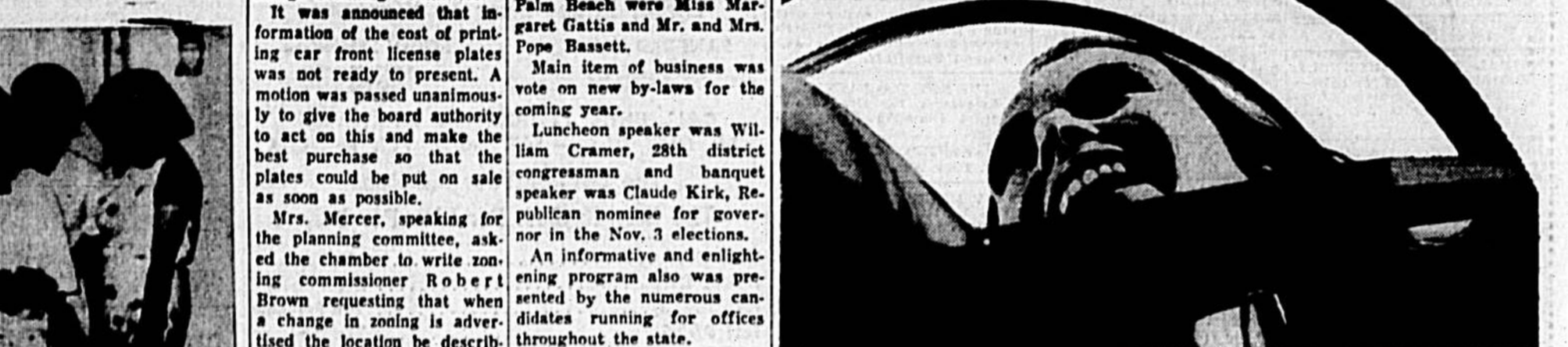

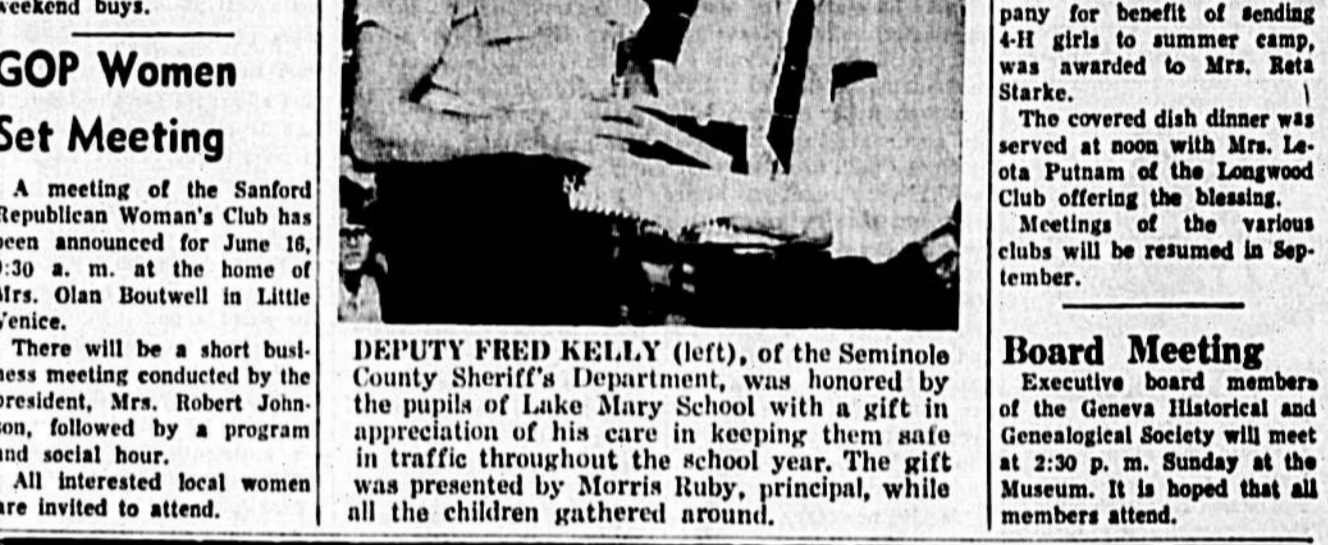
# Homemaker Club Enjoys Picnic

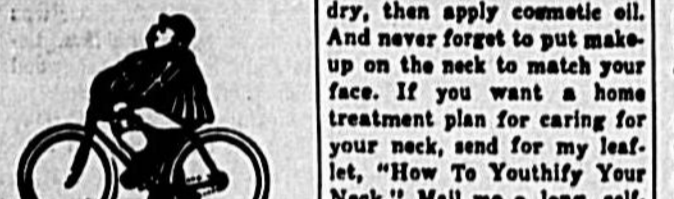
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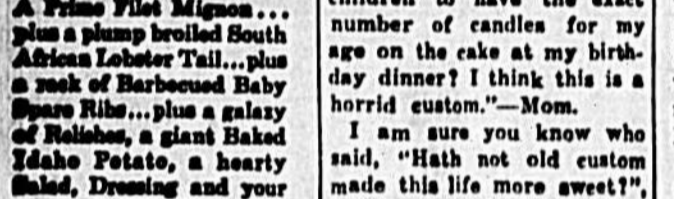

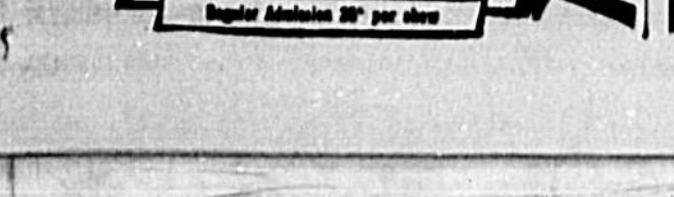

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# Sanford, Casselberry Open Legion Play

## Local Team Plays No Games at Home

The American Legion Post 21 team, Sanford's baseball champions, begin a 16-game district schedule this evening against Winter Park.

Not one of the 16 games will be played in Sanford as no field is available for Coach Frank Thomas' team, who two years ago were the district champs.

This evening's game will be at 8:30 p. m. on McCracken Field, next to Timber Field in Orlando.

The Sanford team has a single game slated Saturday afternoon against Colonial at the Carter Street Field in Orlando and then Sunday the team is marked down for two games against Bishop Moore at 1:30 and Orlando Post 184 at 7:30.

The Sixth District this year is composed of eight teams. The other seven are Evans, Edgewater, Boone, Winter Park, Bishop Moore, Post 184 (Jones High), Casselberry and Colonial. The Orlando American Legion posts have completed their season to sponsor a game for every high school.

All games will be played at McCracken, Carter St., Timber, Bishop Moore, and the Casselberry fields. Coach Thomas said he was trying to begin his season this evening at Cooper Field in Casselberry against American Legion fops of the Boone High School baseball team.

Manager Howard Wiltoughugh and Coach Art Leggs will field a starting team composed, for the most part, of Lyman baseball players.

Chief among the starters will be first baseman Larry Miller, third baseman Larry Miller and right fielder Don Paulsen. The two men will depend on these three boys for most of their hitting punch.

Miller hit .258, Baker hit .350 and Paulsen rapped at a .227 pace for Coach Jim Payne's Lyman High team this spring.

Other Lyman players expected to be on the starting line are second baseman Mike Leggs, shortstop Brent Helms and left fielder Rusty Brande.

Charlie Newell, who compiled a 4-2 record with a 2.00 ERA for Lyman this year, has been tapped as a starting pitcher in tonight's contest.

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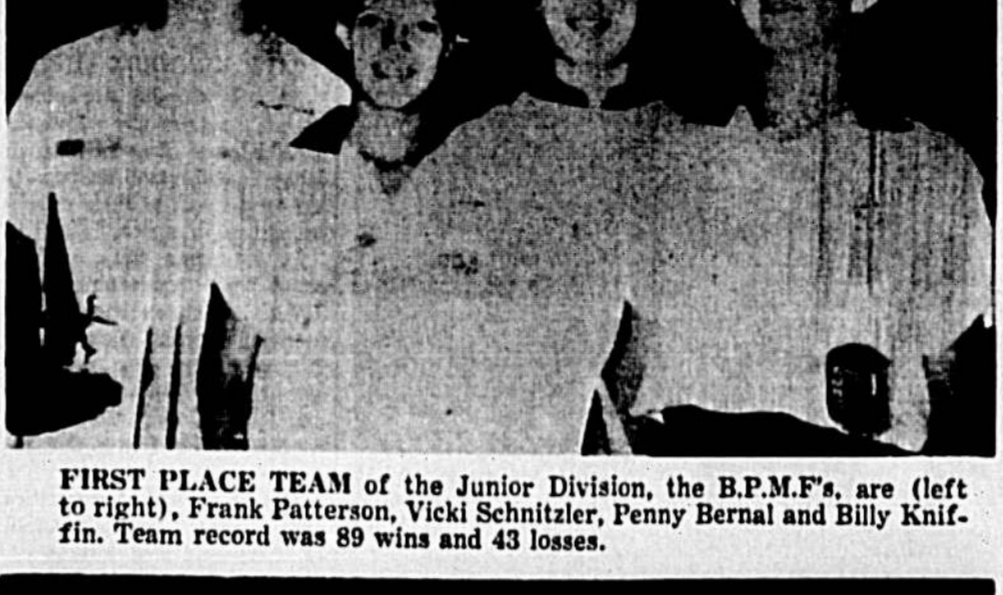

Surveyor Given A Vacation As Condition Tested

PARADISE, Calif. (UPI)—Surveyor took the first of two days rest today from its task of photographing the moon as scientists around the world conducted extensive tests on the craft.



While the robot was vacationing, scientists at tracking stations in Johannesburg, South Africa, and Canberra, Australia, look over operation of the mooncraft. They were checking Surveyor's condition and testing its various secondary communications equipment.



Measurements of temperature around the craft also were being made. Scientists hope eventually to derive a profile of temperature and humidity on the lunar surface from these measurements.



Measurable, scientists and technicians at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory here said there were three primary reasons for the decision to give Surveyor a two-day break from its picture-taking duties.



—Fatigue of the operators who have been busy guiding the spacecraft's activities since it made its "perfect" soft landing on the moon last Wednesday.



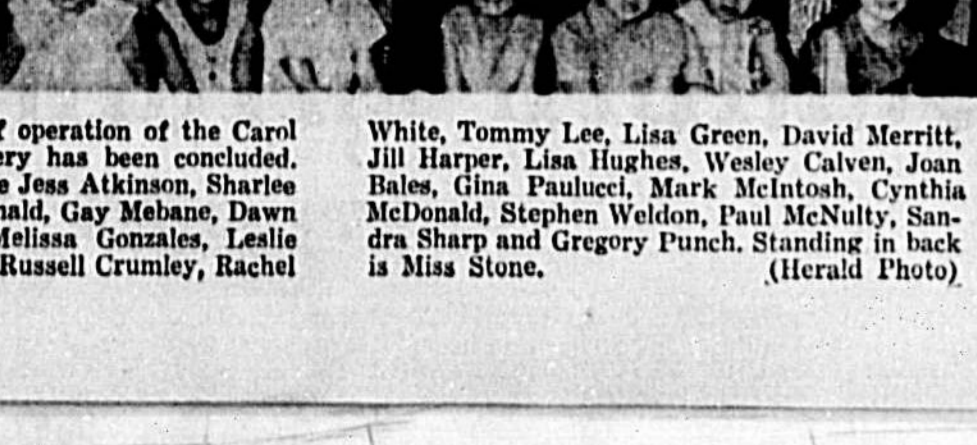
—A considerable amount of glare that made picture-taking impractical at this time.



—The camera no longer is in the shadow of its antenna. The photographing will resume late Thursday night, scientists said.



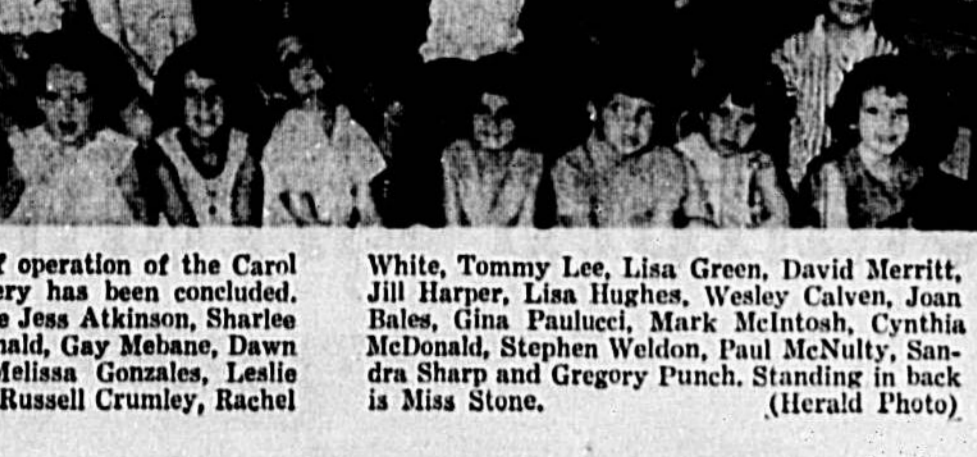
During the five picture-taking missions since landing, the craft has relayed 4,000 "beautifully clear" television pictures.



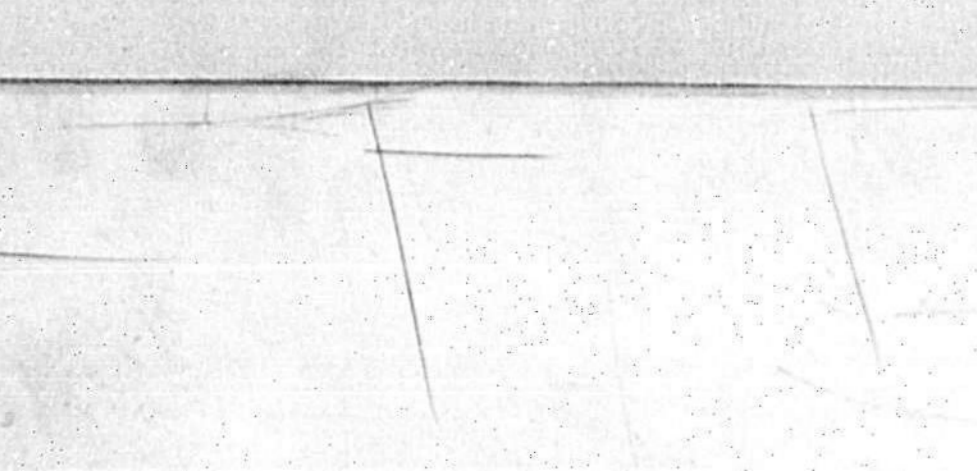
In its final mission before the vacation which begins early Tuesday morning, Surveyor transmitted 1,048 photos after responding to more than 8,246 commands from the JPL.

U. S. Superiority Revealed Over Russian Missiles

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Russia now has close to 100 intercontinental and submarine-launched ballistic missiles compared with 1,480 in America's land and sea-based arsenal, U. S. sources reported today.

These sources provided fresh details to show the extent of America's superiority in the premier weapons of the nuclear age, despite a modest increase in Soviet missile power over the past year.

Only rarely do specific figures on estimated Russian rocket strength become available.

The most recent official statement, on last May 24, said only that there had been "an expected modest increase" in Russian intercontinental ballistic missile force (ICBM) but that the United States superiority remained intact.

Now that the elder Atlas and Titan I missiles have been dismantled, all America's ICBMs—two versions of the Minuteman and the Titan II—are in the underground. Most stand on vulnerable, above ground launchers.

On the controversial question of defense against ballistic missile UPI was informed that American intelligence experts are deeply divided over the merits of Soviet progress in this area.

Some authorities believe the Russians have developed an operational anti-ballistic missile (ABM) system to defend their cities and bases.

Equally competent judges assert such is not the case at this time.

There also is a running dispute about the likely effectiveness of the ABM system that Moscow admittedly has been developing.

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Human Error Responsible In 9's Problem

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—With one Gemini 9 problem solved, astronauts Thomas Stafford and Eugene Cernan today concentrated on reporting on the rest of their daring adventure in space.

At the same time, technicians were proceeding with plans to launch Gemini 10 astronauts John Young and Michael Collins July 18. Crews were expected to complete the erection of the Gemini 10 booster on its firing pad today.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) said that human error was responsible for the failure of a protective shield to jettison as planned from Gemini 9's largest satellite after it reached orbit.

As a result, Stafford and Cernan were unable to look up with the makeshift satellite — one of the major objectives of the hard-land mission.

NASA said in a reply to a query that workmen following proper directions failed to attach lanyards to the satellite's separation mechanism.

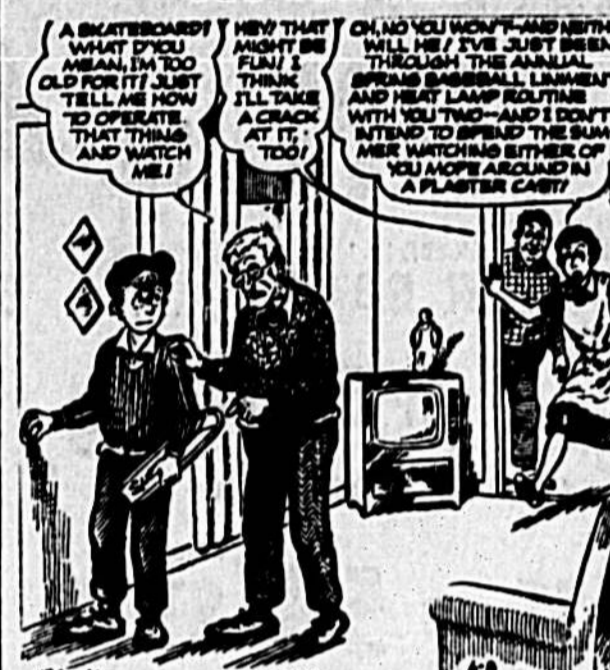

### House Wives: Stop Worrying About Stamps

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Florida housewives who have been reading the small print in the back of their trading stamp books with knitted brows can stop worrying, Atty. Gen. Earl Faircloth is on your side. Faircloth ruled that the stamp companies can restrict the use, disposal and transfer of their stamps but they cannot impair the rights of the customer to redeem them for merchandise. He made the ruling for Controller Fred O. Dickinson. Faircloth said any limitations on use of the stamps must be included at the time of issuance and not added by a subsequent change in its contract with customers. The question arose over conditions contained in the stamp books of some stamp companies which prohibit exchange of the stamps for other trading stamps through "stamp exchanges." Faircloth said that the conditions are contained in saver books of Merchants Green Stamp, Gold Leaf Stamp and Triple-S Blue Stamp.

### GOP Leaders Meet June 18

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Two candidates for chairman of the Florida GOP and the legal representative of a third met today to "iron out" procedural matters and try to agree on a person to preside at the crucial election officers at the June 18 state meeting in Tampa. Former state Rep. Charles Holly of St. Petersburg and Tallahassee attorney Wilfred Varn met with a representative of Bill Martin of Stuart. All three are seeking to succeed state chairman Tom Faircloth Brown of Tampa, who is stepping down. Holly said it is important that the three candidates reach accord on a fair-minded Republican to serve as temporary chairman of the session until the new officials are chosen. Democrats are just as determined not to lose control of the State House—and even the conservative state senators from the Florida Panhandle are beginning to edge to the left for the Democratic nominee, Robert King High of Miami, considered the most liberal man ever nominated for the governorship of this state. # U. S. Soul-Searcher

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara has been saying some extremely thoughtful things of late. In Montreal, speaking before the American Society of Newspaper Editors, he roamed over such matters as the real bases for peace in this world, the uses of military and economic power, the challenge of the merging nations, bridge-building between us and China.

He endorsed the idea that the inequities of the present Selective Service system be remedied by asking every young person to give one or two years of service to his country in some capacity.

The man who his critics allege has a computer where his heart should be waxed philosophical over the nature of man.

"He is a national animal—but with a near infinite capacity for folly... He draws blueprints for Utopia but never quite gets it built. In the end, he plugs away obstinately with the only building material really ever at hand: His own part-comic, part-tragic, part-cursed but part-glorious nature."

These are not the words of an unfeeling efficiency expert. Nor are these:

"Coercion, after all, merely captures man.

"In Pittsburgh a few days later, McNamara said something that should be posted on the wall of every classroom in the country.

"Let us be perfectly clear about our principles and our priorities. This is a nation in which the freedom of dissent is absolutely fundamental."

Even as he spoke, anti-Vietnam

war pickets marched and chanted outside the building.

Can anyone imagine the secretary's counterpart in the Kremlin, or anywhere else in the Communist world, talking in this manner about war and peace, the nature of man, the necessity of dissent? For that matter, can anyone imagine the picketing?

It is good to criticize ourselves for our collective faults and failings, to expose our mistakes and conscientiously reexamine the direction of our policies and programs—in short, never to cease our national soul-searching.

But we also need to be reminded once in a while that there is a fundamental difference between totalitarian and democratic societies. It is a difference measured by the ideals each society cultivates, the degree of human liberty each affords, the demands for informed responsibility each makes on its citizens, the scope for the realization of individual aspirations each allows.

Not least of all, it is a difference that is apparent in the type of leadership each produces and the kind of words they can say.

Thank you, Mr. McNamara, for reminding us. Now, about the mess in Vietnam...

## Foreign News Commentary

### Israel's Growing Influence

By Phil Newsum

Relatively unnoticed by the West but a source of annoyance to Moscow and Cairo is the growing influence of Israel in Black Africa.

Capitalizing on this carefully constructed popularity, Israeli Premier Levi Eshkol current is on a three-week tour during which he will visit seven of the 37 African nations receiving Israeli aid.

Unimpressed by the charges doled out to them by the Moscow and Cairo radio, these nations have come to rely more and more upon Israel for technical aid for a number of reasons.

—Israel, a small state herself, represents no threat to African states such as might come from the former colonial powers.

—Israel aid has been without strings.

—In a comparatively few years Israel has overcome many of the same problems now facing the African states.

Primarily, the Israeli campaign is economic. It also has political advantages. By leapfrogging the ring of hostile Arab states surrounding her and pressing to expand friendly relations among both African and Asian states, she naturally also hopes for their support against the Arab boycott of Israeli goods and against Kippur's denial of the Suez Canal to Israeli use.

And indication of success is the increasing refusal of Black African nations to support anti-Israel resolutions sponsored by the Arabs.

And an indication of the extent of Israeli activities is evident in the fact that from April, 1965, to April, 1966, 1,200 African visitors arrived in Israel for study. In that same period, Israel sent 480 technical experts to Africa.

Included in Eshkol's present tour are Senegal, The Ivory Coast, Liberia, The Malagasy Republic, Uganda,

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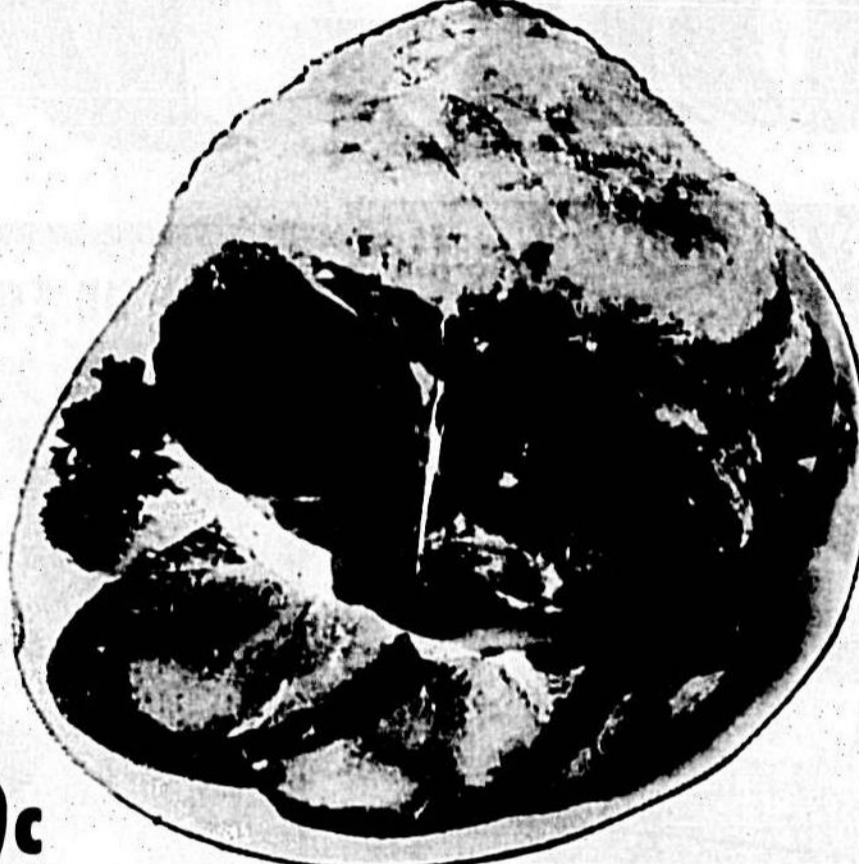

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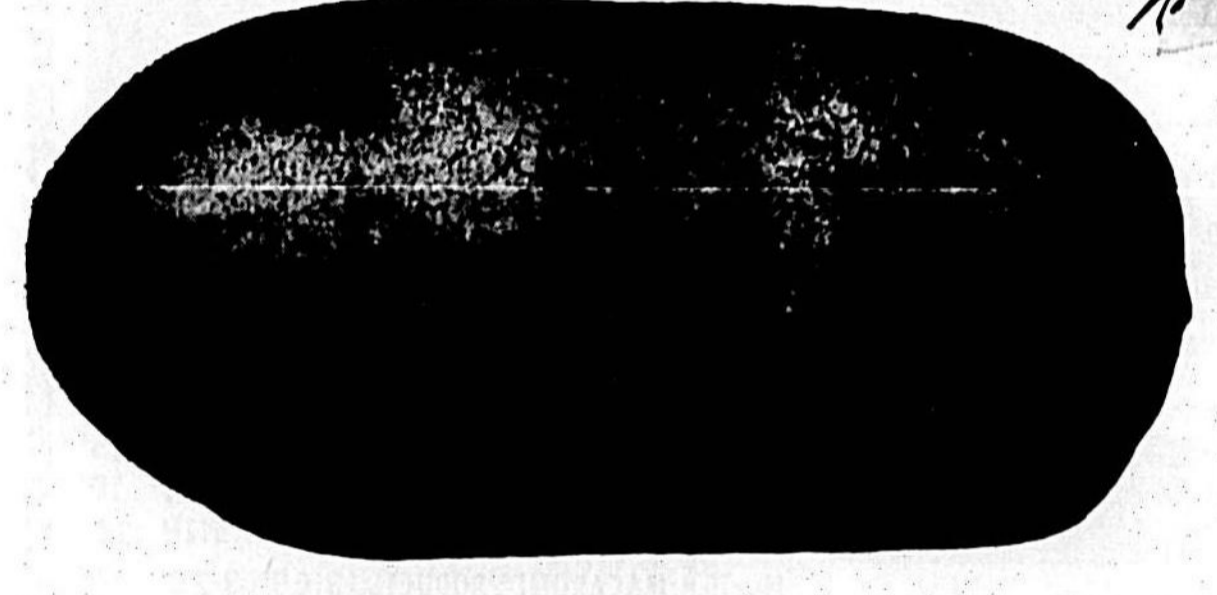

"Recent articles in the news media have served only to confuse many residents of the village concerning the fire department."

News items: "the truck offered by the Forest Service would give added protection" and "homesteaders want to know why the council proposed to buy a fire truck when the Florida Forest Service has offered to give the fire department a truck," have brought these comments from Chief Hahn.

"At no time has there been any talk, either by the council or the fire department, to purchase a fire truck. The only truck in question is one that the department had made application for several months ago to the Florida Forestry Service. This truck, if obtained, will be leased to the fire department through the village council. It will be subject to answer calls from Forest Service when the need arises. Any homesteader who was told by anyone that there was a proposal to purchase a fire truck was badly informed."

In regard to the statement "two fires in the past seven years in the village," Chief Hahn further comments: "This is false information. The log-book records three structural fires and six grass or brush fires in the past year alone."

Hahn also replied to the inference that present fire fighting equipment is adequate. "This would be true if the truck was in better condition and, perhaps, not so old. As it is, however, the truck is old and in constant need of repair and maintenance. This does not indicate to me that a fire department is adequate unless it is able to depend on stand-by of mutual aid departments every time there is a fire in the village. Yes, a second truck would definitely give the village added protection, and applying for one from the Forest Service is the most economical method I know of, even with the expense of equipping it ourselves."

# You Name Cause ... There's A Button For It

**NEW YORK (NEA)**—The current passion for identification (Who am I?) and communism (How Lenin Here?) is not limited to young radicals, civil rights demonstrators and union pickets.

People who would scorn their credit cards than carry a placard in public have succumbed to the latest fad of wearing slogans on their sleeves, labels, handbags or over their heads.

The practice used to flourish only in election years when campaign buttons glorifying "I Like Ike" or "All the Way With LBJ" served as a handy device to separate Republicans from Democrats.

The scope of slogans has now been extended to include advice on foreign policy ("Bomb Hanoi!" "Get Out of Vietnam!" "Make Love, Not War") dress status ("Hot" or simply individual attitudes ("I'm Happy," "I'm Sad," "Drop Dead").

The simplest is the roundest button that identifies itself as "Button."

According to psychologists, people wear such badges to attract attention and get their message across without speaking; some people wear them to identify themselves with a large group or cause; others find them convenient conversation openers.

When such a trend is in the making, cut Madison Avenue by far behind!

Advertisers have swiftly capitalized on the craze, adding a refinement of their own to permit even wider

mass distribution of the sales promotion gimmick. Instead of using the traditional metal pins, they are saturating the market place with inexpensive die-cut labels that stick to nearly any surface with finger-tip pressure.

One of the most successful slogan promotions — 18 million "We Try Harder" buttons in 21 languages given away by Avis, Inc. — switched to peel-off labels after spending \$125,000 for 5 million plus adhesive-backed stickers cost

approximately one-tenth as much as metal pins, according to Allen Hollander Company, Inc., of New York, which manufactures such stickers.

The success of the Avis Try Harder button, which found its way into such unlikely places as church pews and Army artillery units, was recently piggy-backed (with Avis permission) by Embassy Pictures. The film company simply erased out "try" and made its button read "We

Try Harder" to promote the motion picture, "The 2nd Best Secret Agent in the Whole Wide World."

The new type of sticker buttons has really grabbed the irrepressible Pepsi Generation. If the demand for "Come Alive" labels is any criterion, the bright red, white and blue slogan poppers on books, go-go books, jackets, hats, walls, lamps — practically anywhere. A Pepsi-Cola salesman reported that he saw a "Come Alive" button

affixed to the gate of a cemetery.

Shoppers are most appreciative of one type of label provided for their own use by thoughtful management in some stores. Dispensers are set up near an entrance and customers may select a blue and white sticker that informs sales people "I'm Just Browsing" or a red and white sticker that states "I'd Like Sales Help."

An increasing number of wearers of all — Rotarians,

Kiwianians, Lions, fraternal groups and conventioneers — are switching to pressure-sensitive labels for instant identification. Not only are these peel-off badges less expensive and more original in design, but they come in strips and can be filled out by hand, typewriter or high-speed computer.

And they stay put in unplaceable places, even above a lady's low-cut formal gown.

# Americans Bring The Written Word To Peruvians

**YARINACUCHA, Peru (NEA)** — And, suddenly, in the heart of the sticky Peruvian rain forests, you stumble upon a suburbia, U.S.A.

The rambling, screened-in ranches, the swimming hole, the 10-plane airport, the laundry, the "only automated telephone system in Peru," the dozens of lowland children gamboling in the meadow, re-

mind the visitor of a perennially green Shaker Heights or Gross Pointe.

Only the 250 residents of this planned community are not garden-variety suburbanites. The suburban trappings are there, true, but the life-time work of these Americans is a bit unusual.

Since 1948, they have been analyzing and putting on paper some 80 Indian tongues which for centuries have been unwritten.

The place is called the Sum-

ner Institute of Linguistics at Yarinacocha. The dedicated men and women who live there are missionaries of the written word.

Although, as missionary Bill Nyman says, the "Linguistas" major goal is to spread the message of the Bible to the millions of primitive Indians throughout Peru, the Institute is one of about 17 similar missions around the world sponsored by the Wycliffe Bible Translators, headquartered in Santa Ana, Calif. Nyman says about 1,400

translators and back-up staffs are at work.

The project, which is expected to last at least another generation, has the warm endorsement of the Peruvian government. When the Institute celebrates its 20th year in the jungle in June, President Fernando Belaunde Terry will be on hand to praise.

The Institute is one of about 17 similar missions around the world sponsored by the Wycliffe Bible Translators, headquartered in Santa Ana, Calif. Nyman says about 1,400

as long as six months at a stretch.

"The full cycle of work is to send linguists to the tribes to 'break' the language, create a writers alphabet, then help establish schools to teach the Indians to read and write primers and textbooks printed by the Institute at the base.

As Nyman explains, "Translators are permanent residents of the base but are air-lifted by our own airline deep into the bush where they work in primitive Indian villages for

in their efforts, they may be doing more harm than good."

Without this breakthrough, they would not be able to cope with encroaching civilization, would become demoralized, de-tribalized, and be forced to retreat from civilization into ultimate degradation."

That's what the linguists say, anyway. But some observers of their work do not exactly agree. A Peruvian physician from Lima maintains that while the translators are certainly noble and sincere

in their efforts, they may be doing more harm than good. What Peru needs now, he points out, is unity. Nearly half of its people do not speak Spanish, the state language. Instead of bringing the Indians together by giving them a common tongue, the linguists are, in effect, splintering them even more by offering them a grammar in their own language.

Though the missionaries claim to be non-sectarian, another critic points out, they

are, in fact, fundamentalists who feel the Bible alone can help these poor Indians who are without decent food, health, housing, education and just about everything else.

What particularly rankles the Linguistas' neighbors is the relative luxury in which the translators live.

"Can you imagine the negative effect their estate has on the Indians and mestizos who live in wretched poverty on its fringes?" a competing missionary asked.

Such comments do not bother the Linguistas. They are dedicated, single-minded people who apparently believe in what they are doing.

"Eventually," Bill Nyman says, "we will evangelize the world."

11 Persons Die Due To Hurricane

APALACHICOLA (UPI) — The eye of Hurricane Alma collided with the Florida panhandle; it hammered the coastline with high winds and tides, carrying heavy rains through Florida and into Alabama and Georgia.

Alma, which claimed a total of 11 lives in a pass over Cuba and glancing blows at the Florida Gulf Coast, finally plunged directly ashore on the U. S. mainland at noon when its 10-mile-an-hour central winds were felt at this fishing city.

The Weather Bureau warned that the storm would be severe in 10 feet could be expected to storm the shore along the Apalachee Bay area with winds as high as five feet as far south as Sarasota.

The petition states "such annexation rights of way would only circumvent the intent of the law requiring contiguous territory to be annexed individually and separately, rather than in a lump."

The petition also requested annexations south to a portion of levee 21E and two of the Orange County levees, which by the purpose of Seminole sale of alcoholic beverage.
