Kennedy Opposed To Branding Nazi Group Subversive

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Ally, Gen. Robert F. Kennedy has informed a senator that he opposes branding the American Nazi Party as a subversive group because it would give the Nazis free publicity.

Kennedy said in a letter to Sen. Kenneth B. Keating (R-N.Y.) that the Justice Department and "all sensible Americans" despise the Nazi doctrines. The party is being watched closely, he said.

But the Cabinet officer said that steps to place the Nazis on the attorney general's list of subversive organizations would give party leader George Lincoln Rockwell a public forum to spread his "obnoxious doctrines." Kennedy said the practical way to deal with Rockwell and his followers was for local authorities to prosecute them when they violate the law.

High Seas Crime To Be Charged To Latest Hijacker

MIAMI (UPI)—The FBI said today it will charge a globe-trotting graduate of European reform schools with crimes on the high seas for hijacking a Pan American World Airways jet plane and taking it to Cuban Premier Fidel Castro.

Castro, described as "morlified" over the seizure of the big DC-8 on a flight over Mexico Wednesday, sent the plane and its 80 occupants back to the United States Wednesday night.

Left behind was the hijacker, Albert Charles Cadon, 27, an itinerant artist from Paris who said he hijacked the American passenger plane to protest Washington's "handling" of the Algerian crisis. He was placed under arrest at Havana by militiamen.

The FBI said Cadon, born in France, had worked as a restaurant employe in New York City recently. The agency said his wife, Charlotte, of 339 East 9th St., New York, told federal agents Cadon had been committed to Bellevue Hospital for mental observation last fall and later released. He had a quarrel with his wife in New York last week and told her he was going to Mexico on a bus, the FBI said.

Cubans In Gun Battle On Plane

HAVANA (UPI)—Anti-Castro Cubans fought soldiers in a wild gunbattle aboard a speeding Cuban airliner Wednesday in an unsuccessful hijacking attempt. Three persons were killed and six wounded.

Authorities said the pilot of the plane, which was bound from Havana to the Isle of Pines off Cuba's southern coast, was killed but the co-pilot managed to make a forced landing in a sugar plantation near the town of Guira de Melones, 30 miles south of the capital.

The other dead were one of the hijackers and one of the two military guards aboard the plane.

As details of the frustrating hijacking were made public today, a bomb exploded about 7 a. m. outside the Fin del Siglo department store in Havana.

No casualties were reported but one of the store's windows was shattered. It was the first bombing in many weeks.

Authorities quelled the surviving military guard aboard the plane, a DC-3 of the nationalized Airways, as saying the hijacking attempt occurred a few minutes after take off about 2 p. m.

He said he saw a woman passenger take a pistol from her purse and hand it to a man, presumably her husband. At this point several passengers shouted "hands up" to the military guards and began pounding on the door leading to the pilot's compartment.

Another group of passengers moved toward the rear of the plane. One of the guards was in the compartment with the pilot. The other was in the rear of the plane. Shooting broke out immediately and the pilot was killed along with the soldier guarding him.

One of the hijackers was shot and killed after the plane had made the forced landing.

East Germans Hint At Law Halting Refugees

BERLIN (UPI)—The Communists hinted today the East German parliament will pass a law Friday to halt the mass flight of refugees to West Berlin.

East German propaganda organs announced that the "people's chamber" has been flooded with demands it take action against refugees and nonusers.

Officers Probing Rash Of Break-Ins At Lake Monroe

A siege of break-ins and robberies at four homes in the Lake Monroe area and at the Lake Monroe School have taken place since Monday, Seminole County sheriffs deputies reported today.

Sheriff's officers, who with Constable Bob Carroll are investigating the robberies, say that entries are made in occupied homes sometime after midnight while the residents are sleeping.

The latest break-in under investigation took place Wednesday at the Lake Monroe School where the law officials found the screen cut but glass still intact on a rear window. Carroll said that as far as could be determined at this time, nothing was taken from the school.

Money and small household items of apparent value were reported stolen from the homes.

Cash Register Pried Open

The cash register at Hunter's Ice and Fuel Co. on W. 13th St. was broken into sometime Wednesday with an estimated \$45 stolen, police said.

Police said that the ice house was entered and the cash register pried open.

The County School Board today shaved off one quarter of a mill from the support and maintenance budget and adopted the 1961-62 budget calling for spending of \$5,605,000 and a levy of 7.25 mills.

The board trimmed the tentative budget off a quarter of a mill based on a \$7 million increase in non-exempt property over last year.

The tentative budget called for raising the millage one additional mill over last year.

The new budget is \$125,727 above this year's \$5,479,273.

The support and maintenance budget will be increased to \$3,991,101 as compared with \$3,730,447 this year. The interest and sinking fund schedule will rise from \$290,673 to \$314,716.

The board had agreed to review the budget two weeks ago after a chamber group and interested citizens protested the increase in millage.

"This is the only concession we can afford to make," Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee said this morning at the meeting. "If we cut the budget more we would end the year in the red."

The tentative budget has been based on the current tax roll figure of \$175,000,000. However, last week, the tax assessor submitted the estimated new roll at over \$182,000,000.

Milwee today emphasized that the construction program will be hurt because of lack of funds and told the board that the cafeteria at the new proposed junior high school will have to be ruled out.

Milwee again stressed that the main factor for the millage jump is an anticipated loss of some \$122,000 in federal assistance for pupils of government connected families, an increase in enrollment this fall and the hiring of 46 additional teachers.

The school board dropped its budget levy from 30 mills to five mills in 1959-60 after a county-wide reappraisal. The levy was raised 1.5 mills last year in pay off bonded indebtedness, according to Milwee.

Sanford Man Dies In Mishap

Wilbur R. Keeling, 34-year-old Sanford man was killed early Wednesday morning in an unexplained shooting accident still under investigation by the Orange County Sheriff's Dept.

The shooting occurred at the home of Mrs. Vester Hedges, 44-year-old Orlando legal secretary who also was seriously injured in the accident and is reported to be in poor condition today at Orange Memorial Hospital according to an Orange County deputy.

Keeling, a mechanic at McKellar Cadillac in Orlando was born April 19, 1927 in Sanford. He was a member of the Congregational Christian Church and a World War II veteran.

His survivors are his wife, Mrs. Marion Keeling; three children, Debra, Dale and Cynthia; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Keeling; a brother, Harold Keeling; and three sisters, Mrs. David Van Ness, Mrs. J. J. Nicholson Jr. and Mrs. J. R. Davis, all of Sanford.

Funeral services will be held at 4 p. m. Saturday from the Gramlow Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Joseph Stock and Ruth Stafford officiating. Burial will be in Evergreen Cemetery.

Followers are to be Lloyd Wilson, Nadine Sanford, Ollie Davis, Tom Mallory, Dave Brown and Jimmy Richardson.

Cubans Propose Reciprocal Pact

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Cuba has proposed a reciprocal agreement with the United States for automatic release of planes or boats hijacked to either country, the State Department said today.

The note, dated Aug. 4 was received by the department this morning after a long, slow trip via Switzerland.

Officials said it implied but did not say outright that Cuba would release the Eastern Air Lines Electra hijacked to Havana July 24 if an over-all agreement is reached.

Officials said the note also demanded as a condition return of a Cuban patrol boat, the SC13, brought to Key West by anti-Castro defectors.

UN Boycott By France Seen

PARIS (UPI)—France will boycott any United Nations General Assembly debate on the Bizerie crisis, Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville announced today. De Murville told the National Assembly's foreign affairs committee that France "has no intention" of taking part in a UN General Assembly debate on Bizerie, if one is held.

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September Draft Call To Soar

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Defense Department today announced that the Army will draft 25,000 men in September as part of President Kennedy's military build-up program.

The September call is 12,000 more than the revised draft for August. It will bring to 2,600,000 the number of men drafted since the Korean War started in June 1950.

In his July 25 speech to the nation, the President forecast that draft calls would double and triple as the Army built up from 870,000 men to about one million.

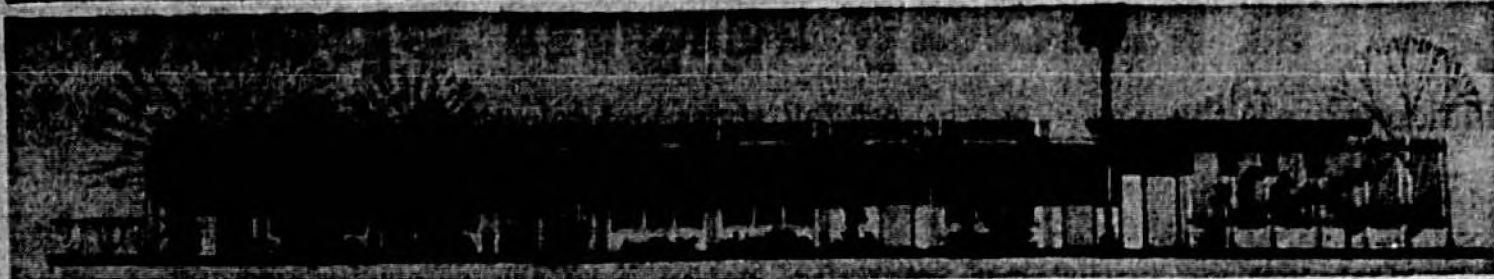
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Although it's not listed in the budget, the 55 mills for the Seminole Hospital District will bring in \$95,161.

Dutchman Creates Beauty

A transplanted "red-headed" Dutchman is putting a lot of hard work and ingenuity in beautifying the area of his business and home on Upsala Rd. with results which are proving to be a drawing card to an increasing number of Central Florida residents.

John R. Lommerse, born in Bennebrook, Holland, came to America with his parents and five brothers and sisters in June 1918. The family established a new home in Monroe, Mich., where Lommerse met and married his wife, Irene.

Moving to Sanford in 1937 he began in business here as an employee at the W. E. Kirehloff Gladious Nurseries, a job for which he had lifetime experience since his family had a bulb farm in their native Holland, specializing in tulips, hyacinths and daffodils.

More recently he and his wife have opened their own business, The Dutch Mill Nursery, at the

Upsala Rd. location and have transformed it into an area attraction.

Outstanding is the large grotto built around an alabaster statue of The Virgin Mary which was constructed by the landscape artist in a week's time during the evening hours. The woodwork frame, reinforced with iron, was shaped with hardware cloth and covered with a mixture of cement and veracite. Its interior he painted a soft blue and English Ivy grows around its base. Each evening it is lighted and Lommerse says that the landscaping around the attraction will be redone completely with the change of seasons. Presently, summer annuals, including brilliantly colored zinnias and marigolds, are in use.

In speaking of his educational training, Lommerse said that in Holland he and his brothers and sisters walked a mile-and-a-half each morning to attend a church school from 9 a. m. until

noon, home to lunch until 1:30 p. m. and then back to school until 3:30 p. m. There were no classes on Wednesday afternoons but students were required to attend a morning session on Saturdays. And, this schedule was carried out for 11 months of the year. Vacation was during the month of August and for two weeks each at Christmas and Easter. However, the equivalent of America's 12 year high school education was received in seven years there.

At night, the Lommerse children attended classes to learn landscaping design, studying from 6 p. m. until 11 p. m. and the Sanford member of the family said that he eagerly rushed through the evening meal in order to get at his books.

Since coming to America he has attended night school to further his knowledge of the landscaping arts and to learn book-keeping.

Mr. and Mrs. Lommerse say they are proud to be the parents of three "Florida Crackers" and their daughters, Virginia, four, Frances, three, and adorable, doll-like Annette who just had her first birthday, add much to the beauty of their home.

Yardner's Corner

By ERNIE LUNDBERG

For years people have wanted a chemical that would kill destructive nematodes on the roots of their plants and not harm the plants. At least two chemicals which will do just that are now available.

The nematocides are Nemagon and VC-13. Both come as emulsion concentrates; Nemagon containing 48 or 70 percent and VC-

13, 75 percent active ingredients by weight. They kill nematodes but not weeds and fungi.

Nemagon may be injected into the soil, used as a soil drench or applied broadcast in granular form. Use four to six pounds of technical nemagon per acre. VC-13 is used as a soil drench at the rate of 27 gallons per acre.

Apply both materials very carefully, warns Dr. Miller, as an overdose may cause some damage to plants. The soil must be thoroughly wet so the materials may penetrate to the root zone. If soil is compact, loosen with a spade fork or other tool to aerate root area.

As a soil drench, both materials may be applied with a sprinkler can, hose-on sprayer or overhead sprinkler. Used at recommended rates, neither nematocides will harm foliage. However, when sprayed on foliage, they should be washed off onto the soil where they will be most effective.

After uniformly broadcasting granular Nemagon, immediately scratch it into the top inch or two of soil and wet the soil to a depth of five to six inches. Do not apply granular Nemagon at soil temperatures below 50 degrees.

On established plants or nursery beds, repeated applications of Nemagon should be made. VC-13's low volatility and chemical stability results in long residual nematode control. A second application of VC-13 may be made to established plants, if needed, after six months.

East-West Summit Meet Seen This Year

PARIS (UPI)— Betting among Western diplomats in Europe is that there will be an East-West summit conference before the year is out.

Nikita Khrushchev has made it clear he wants one. The Western government heads are far from enthusiastic. But if Khrushchev keeps forcing the pace on Berlin, officials believe the West may find itself pushed into such a meeting as the only hope, perhaps the last hope, of heading off a shooting war which neither side wants.

Summit or no summit, the next three months are likely to be one of the busiest periods of diplomatic talks and travel in recent years.

U. S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk and the British, French and West German foreign ministers more or less agreed at their Berlin crisis talks here last weekend that they would meet again during the United Nations General Assembly in September for another review of the East-West situation.

According to present plans the West would make no move before that to invite the Russians to the conference table.

The next step, which is regarded by Western officials as a virtual certainty now, would be a meeting of President Kennedy, British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, French President Charles de Gaulle and probably West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer — if Adenauer is given another term in the Sept. 17 West German elections.

The summit leader would take the final decision whether—and, if so, how—to approach the Russians for talks on Berlin.

The French are particularly reluctant to make the first move, arguing that simply to offer talks means giving away one tactical point. De Gaulle also argues that negotiations can only weaken and certainly cannot improve the Western position.

Explain Divorce To Your Children

As the New York Times Magazine tells it, a group of children in a prosperous suburban community were asked to write their views on adults — parents, teachers, etc. Without identifying themselves by name, they did so. One view was:

"My mother and father got divorced. And I didn't know why because they never told me. So sometimes when I am lonely I ask my father but he says I wouldn't understand, but I do understand when they tell me things."

And so he would have understood all he needed to understand had his father said:

"Mother and I got divorced because we stopped liking each other the way we used to. This can happen to grownups just as it happens between children. Though grownups don't stop liking their children, they sometimes stop liking each other and can't live together any more."

But divorcing parents can seldom settle for their child's incomplete understanding.

Overwhelmed by their need to justify themselves, they want him to understand everything—their sexual hurts, their dogged but futile efforts to recover communication, their remembered humiliations, loneliness and despair—the whole torturous complex of

resentments which pile up between a man and a woman who have lost meaning for each other. Knowing that the child can't give total comprehension, they will prefer to say nothing or to make mysterious hints at the cause of their marital failure.

This is, of course, very rough on the child who is left to struggle alone for some comprehension. Yet the truth is, that whole

tangled complex of adult experience which leads us to end a marriage can be boiled down to the simple statement: "We stopped liking each other the way we used to."

So, if there's a divorce coming up which you have not discussed with your child, please start looking at the cause of your silence.

Is it not your wish for his complete understanding — your yearning for total self-justification to him? If so, get rid of the wish and the yearning. In this world nobody is ever completely understood. The need of parents to wring complete comprehension from the bewildered child of their divorce is a dream from which it is both wise and kind to wake up.

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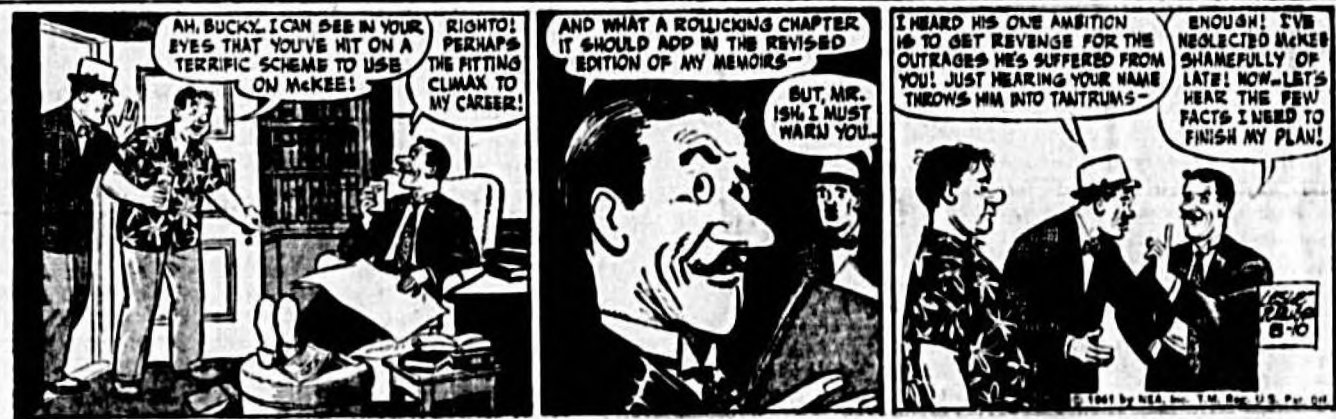

He ruffs the second club, cashes the ace of spades, ruffs a spade, returns to his hand with the ace of diamonds, ruffs another spade, cashes dummy's king of diamonds, ruffs another club, ruffs his fourth spade, ruffs dummy's last club, ruffs his own last spade and eventually makes his ace of trumps.

A cautious player will content himself with 10 tricks. He won't try to cash dummy's king of diamonds.

West should open a trump. He has massed spades in back of declarer and should anticipate that cross-ruff.

A report from Fasula, who said that letter surveys had been made by both Southern Bell Co. and the Winter Park Telephone Co., revealed that of the 128 subscribers in the area, 73 preferred service from Sanford's exchange while 53 desired the Winter Park service. Eight residents of the

Ranch Homes also preferred the Winter Park exchange. The mayor said that he had been advised by Southern Bell Sanford Manager Bob Shedd that his company will not install any more telephones in the community until a decision is made on which company will service the area.

Village officials will meet with those of both firms on Friday to try "to work the matter out." Contract specifications for expansion of the sewer and water plants were ordered sent to five area contractors with the return bids expected within two weeks. Money for the expansion program is being held in escrow.

Fasula said, and as soon as the bids are returned and the contract let, work will begin immediately. He also reported that the Village last week signed a resolution accepting responsibility for damage done to utility lines within the municipality during the resurfacing of the Longwood-Orlando Rd.

W. W. Anderson, president of the North Orlando Civic Assn., reported that a survey of water department records, made to determine the feasibility of reducing the rates, indicated that such a reduction is impossible at this time. Officials making the survey, Anderson said, advised him that "the company now is losing money on the gas because the residents aren't paying their bills."

However, Anderson continued, he was told that as soon as 100 additional installations are made, the people can petition the State Railroad and Public Utilities Commission for a rate reduction.

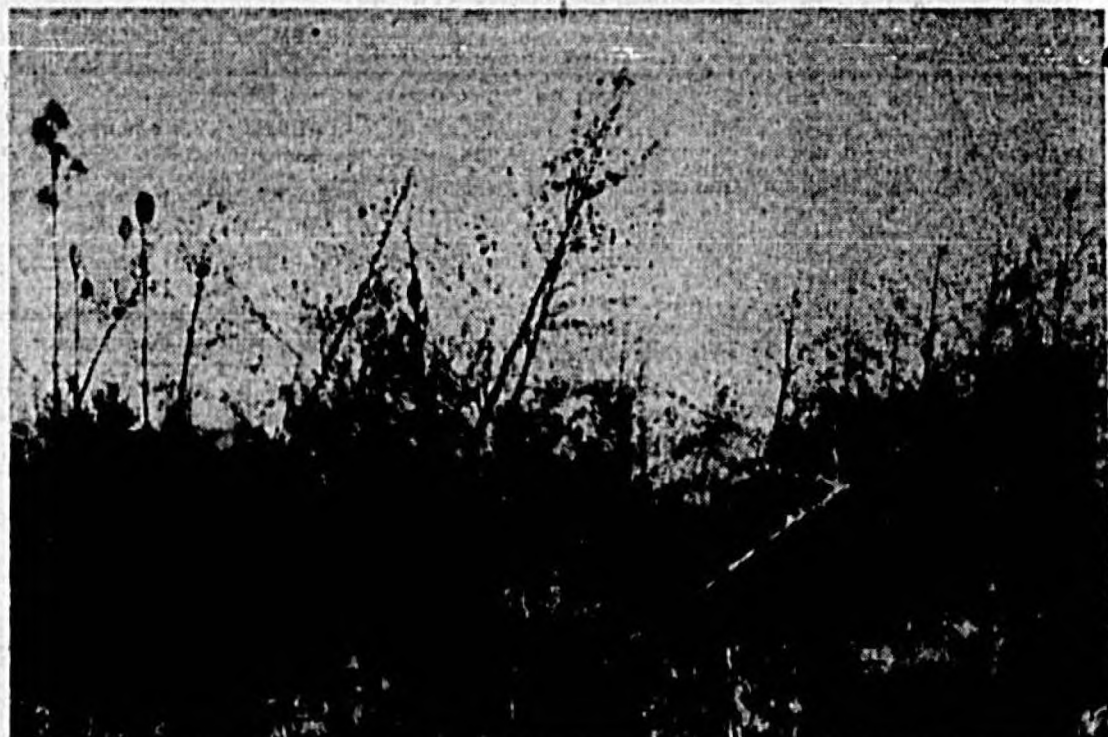

While there she received one week's training in majorette routines and one week in twirling instruction.

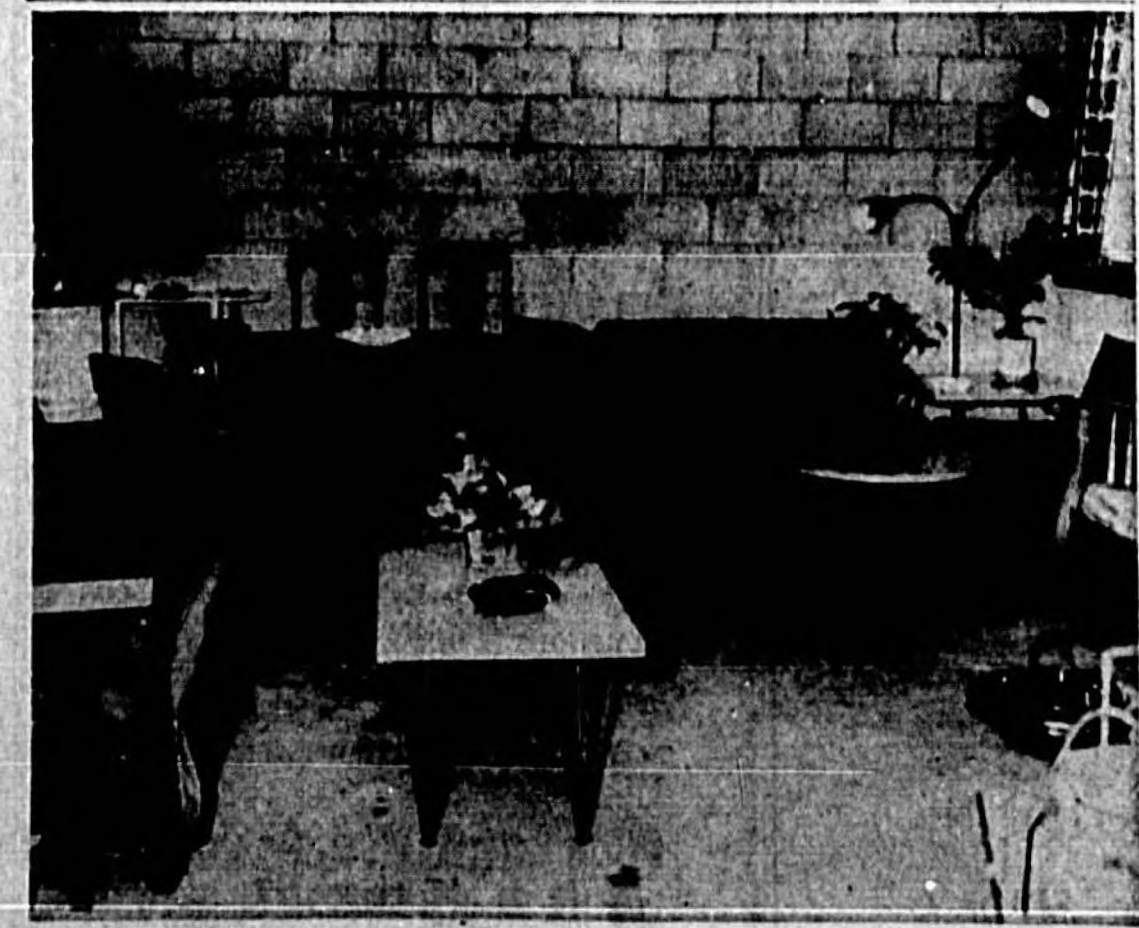
And, almost immediately upon

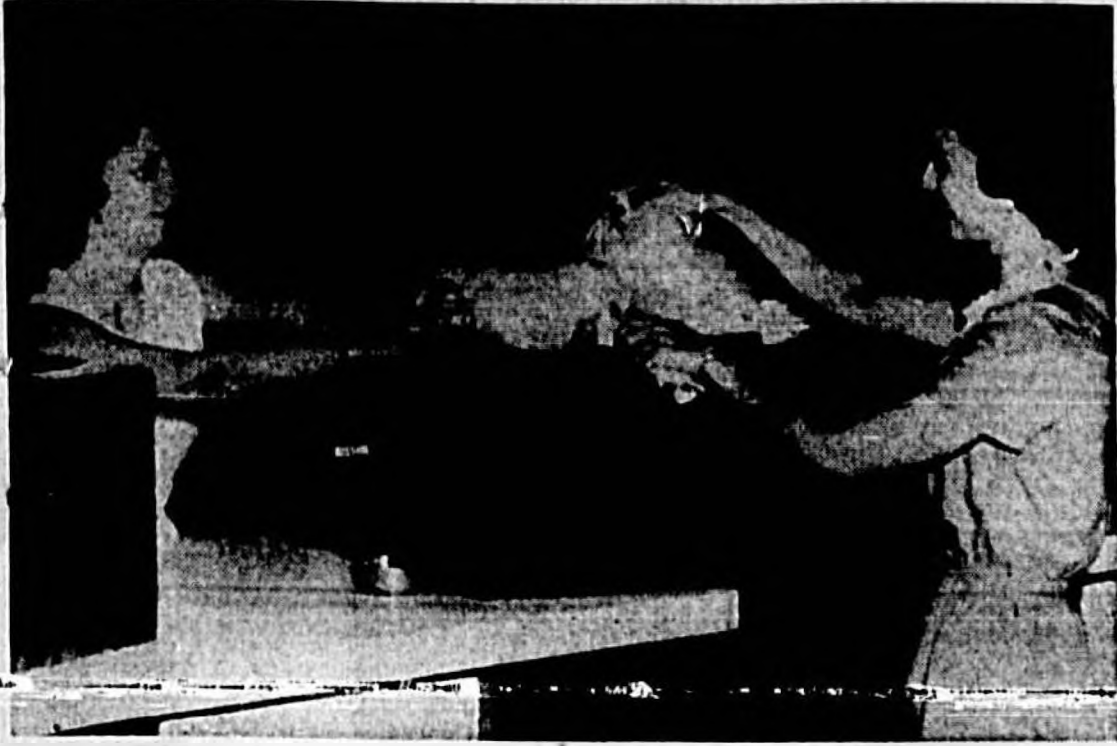

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City Takes Civil Defense Initiative

The City Commission in special budget session Thursday night, took the initiative over the County government in Civil Defense by authorizing City Manager W. E. Knowles to work on plans for a CD headquarters shelter in case of any emergency. Knowles also was authorized to

set the wheels in motion to establish a chain of command organization in case of any disaster so the city organization can function properly. The city already has included \$6,000 in its utility budget for surplus generators to aid in civil defense and additional money may

be included to bring the city's CD mechanism in high gear. Meanwhile the County has appropriated only \$3,000 for civil defense thus far in its tentative budget.

Plans for a CD headquarters shelter for the city will include an underground operation. The present CD headquarters is in the police building. The plan to spruce up CD operations here is a continuation of a program whereby the city already has installed 10 mobile two-way radio units under Civil Defense

with the fire and police departments; A partial warning system with a large siren on the water tank at 13th St. and French Ave. and whereby 80 city employees have been put through a survival CD course given last year under the direction of Tom Richey.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress Thursday gave President Kennedy his full defense money request and for the first time provided funds to launch a nation-wide shelter program for civilians.

Thursday, as the stepped-up drive for civil defense continues, Congress approved federal assistance in CD for fallout shelters. War Means U.S. End - Nikita

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev threatened today to "crush" the United States' allies if war starts.

But at the same time, Khrushchev offered to settle the Berlin problem by negotiation, assured his audience that "we are against war" and predicted that "all mankind" will go Communist without war.

The meeting honored the visit here of Romanian Communist Chairman Gheorghe Gheorghiu-Dej.

Khrushchev, bursting with confidence after a series of spectacular diplomatic and space moves, called the Communist bloc "a family of nations" that opposes war and is "blasting a road to a bright future."

The meeting honored the visit here of Romanian Communist Chairman Gheorghe Gheorghiu-Dej.

In a worldwide Communist society, he said, "man will be brother to man, and not wolves to man, as in a capitalistic society."

It was the third time this week that Khrushchev has made speeches which contained belligerent threats to crush the West if war starts, combining each threat with offers to negotiate the Berlin and German issues. His terms have been those rejected in the past by the West.

Khrushchev said he personally told Italian Premier Amintore Fanfani and the Greek ambassador to Moscow that the Soviet Union will blast U. S. bases in their countries if a war starts.

Rights-Of-Way Budget Slashed By Commission
