Astronauts Will Photograph A Unique 'Space Spectacular'

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Apollo 13's three moon explorers, streaking home for a Saturday splashdown in the Pacific Ocean, have unique seats at a space spectacular today.
 As the earth exerts more and more of a pull on their space ship Endeavour, David R. Scott, James R. Irwin and Alfred M. Worden will view and attempt to photograph a phenomenon which can be seen only by space crews: an eclipse of the sun by the earth.
 Only twice before have space men been in a position to see the huge ball earth slide across the face of the sun. The Apollo 12 crew and an earlier Gemini flight were also in the right place at the right time.
 The three astronauts also play an hour-long news conference today with newsmen covering the mission and another experiment seeking information on mysterious cosmic lights which all Apollo crews have reported.
 The Apollo 13 crew will do mainly in darkness, because of the potentially harmful effect they might have on astronauts on long space flights.
 During the hour-long news conference from deep space, the astronauts will give news into personal observations into their 13-day flight, which ends Saturday with splashdown at 4:46 p.m. EDT north of Hawaii.
 Mission Control will relay questions to the Apollo 13 crew. The session will be televised to the Manned Spacecraft Center, but will not be carried by the television networks.
 The conference starts at 3:34 p.m. EDT.
 Newsmen will question Scott and Irwin about their findings on the moon; about the rocks they think may date back to the solar system and which now rest in Sample Bag No. 194 in one of their rock chests; about the layering they reported in Hadley Rille and on the sides of the Apennine Mountains; about the operation of their moon buggy; and about observations of what they thought were lava flows.

10 More Are Arrested In Local Dope Dragnet

 Sheriff's deputies in lightning raids Thursday night and early today arrested 10 youths on drug charges to bring to 13 the number of persons arrested within the past 24 hours as Sheriff John Polk's crack-down on illegal drug activities continued.
 Arrested on charges issued by Circuit Judge William Akridge last night and early today were Davis Richard Lawrence, 18, of 101 Alma Drive, Longwood, on three charges involving the sale and possession of cannabis (marijuana). His bond was set at \$10,500 total.
 Mark Edward Goldman, 17, and John Philip Neilson, 17, both of Mobile Manor, Longwood, were with Lawrence and deputies charged the pair with possession of narcotic paraphernalia. Bond for latter two was set at \$500 each.
 Two Sanford youths were among those arrested; Michael Carl Hamm, 19, of 141 Maple Avenue, and Thomas James Clark, 18, of 203 Laurel Drive, were jailed in lieu of \$2,500 bond each. Hamm was booked for possession of hallucinogenic drugs and sale, while Clark was charged with possession and sale of cannabis.
 Two Altamonte Springs teenagers were charged with possession and sale of cannabis. Jerome Paul Crowley, 17, of 502 Bianca Court, and Richard K. Blonfield, 18, of 311 Harvard Court, were bonded at \$10,500 each on the charge. Crowley was booked on an additional charge of possession and sale of narcotic drug to bring his total bond to \$35,000.
 Two other Longwood youths were charged with possession and sale of marijuana: Kirk D. Riley, 19, of 184 East Bay Street, and Michael Patrick Whelan, 19, Arden Street, were jailed in lieu of \$25,000 bond each.

\$1 Million Offer Refused

CASSELBERRY — The possibility of the city acquiring the privately owned and operated City of Casselberry and South Seminole Utilities Company (CASSICO) appeared hopelessly Thursday night. The Utility Authority, created by the city to acquire and operate the system serving the municipality, agreed to a one week cooling off and consideration period before negotiations for purchase and called an end to further negotiations. City Attorney Kenneth McIntosh said he was given the impression from the telephone conversation with officials of the company that the door is open "just a crack" for continued talks.
 If the authority is "wed" to its \$1 million offer and feels it is in the best interest of the city, the most the city can afford and all the utility is worth, further negotiations are under the attorney said.
 He added that the owners of the company have made it clear that figure is unacceptable and predicted offers of \$1.5 million or \$1.5 million would also be rebuffed in like fashion. At the same time McIntosh said should the city purchase the system for anything near the \$2.7 million, the owner's original asking price, it "would be an albatross around the neck of the city forever."
 Alternatives discussed and quickly discarded were (1) construction of a parallel system with federal money, (2) acquisition of a governmental body court proceeding would require the city to post its appraisal value of the system, \$1.7 million, which the city does not have.

Biggest In So. Florida Car Theft Ring Broken

MIAMI (AP) — Thirty men in three states and Puerto Rico were arrested today in a pre-dawn raid which cracked the largest auto theft ring that has ever operated in south Florida, the FBI announced.

The arrests in New York, New Jersey, Florida and Puerto Rico climaxed a five-month investigation which also resulted in the recovery of 43 automobiles valued at \$75,000 said Kenneth Whittaker, special agent in charge of the Miami FBI.

U.S. Atty. Robert Rust said 30 persons were named last Friday in a sealed federal grand jury indictment returned here. Those arrested were charged with interstate transportation of stolen motor vehicles, receiving, concealing, storing, harboring or disposing of the vehicles, or conspiracy to commit the various offenses.

Rust said the 30 arrested would be afforded bond hearings before a U.S. magistrate later today.

Conviction under any of the charges carries a five-year prison term, or a \$5,000 fine or both on each count of the indictment, Rust said. A conspiracy conviction provides for imprisonment of up to five years or a \$10,000 fine, or both.

Many of the alleged ring members were employed in automobile sales, service, junkyards or related occupations, Whittaker said. Wrecked cars were purchased in New Jersey and Florida from junk yards, insurance companies and auto rental companies, Whittaker said, to obtain vehicle identification plates, license tags and titles.

Then identical vehicles were stolen and sold under the titles, tags and plates of the wrecked car, the agent said.

"Workmanship on the converted automobiles was so expert that only trained specialized investigators would be able to detect the stolen nature and true identity of the vehicles," Whittaker said.

CAP Will Fight Airport Eviction

Civil Air Patrol (CAP) squadron stationed at Sanford Airport has requested time on tonight's Sanford City Commission agenda. This was disclosed this morning by City Manager W. E. Knowles, who said the CAP commander, Don Knight, had dispatched a note to city hall today asking that the Commission hear a CAP delegation.

Presumably the CAP will answer charges made before the Commission July 26 when it voted to evict the air group from airport building 17.

The action that precipitated the eviction notice came after J. S. (Red) Cleveland, airport manager, advised the Commission of the problems he had experienced in dealing with the squadron.

Cleveland in a July 16 letter to Captain Knight, said someone had entered a building adjacent to the CAP structure and removed portions of tile from the ceiling. Cleveland stated, "I now find the same kind of the cut-up and nailed to the ceiling of the building occupied by the CAP."

The airport manager stated he previously had asked that CAP control the actions of its members; keeping them out of other airport buildings, and discontinuing taking materials and equipment of others.

Captain Knight has taken the position that Cleveland should furnish proof that a CAP member was responsible for the tile loss.

Knight is expected to explain the CAP's situation regarding the charges leveled against it at tonight's session.

(Slim) Galloway, all singles.

Sheriff John Polk was catcher for the senior team with Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce manager John (Crazy Legs) Sheriff as pitcher.

John Moyle, chairman of the Democratic state committee, served as umpire through most of the game. During one play when he exchanged spots with Sheriff Polk, he was slightly injured when a ball struck his face just beneath his left eye. "I hope it doesn't give me a black eye. I'd have a hard time explaining that to the Governor," Moyle quipped.
