

Eckerd eyes 1st Street site

SANFORD — A Tampa development company has met with city officials about the possibility of the Eckerd Corporation building a store in downtown.

Should the national drugstore chain move forward with construction, it would be the first major retailer to move into Sanford's downtown in more than three decades.

"We're in the preliminary stages," said David Martin, vice

president of the Capstone Group Inc., the development company that would build the store. "The property is under contract. We hope to be through with our research in the next 30 days."

Martin said Eckerd officials are tweaking their market research, and his company is meeting with the city of Sanford's development review team to identify possible hurdles in the approval process.

The proposed site is located at the northeast corner of 1st Street and U.S. Highway 17/92. A.D. Rosier Plumbing and Well

Supplies currently occupies most of the property, and the Rosier family owns the entire block.

Stanley Rosier confirmed Capstone has approached his family about selling the property.

"The contractor has made an offer, but there's still a lot to be worked out between the developer, the city and Eckerd," Rosier said. "I'm not counting my chickens before they're hatched."

The city received conceptual drawings two weeks ago, said Jay Marder, Sanford's director of engineering. See Eckerd, Page 6A

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Jasmins face no formal charges

LAKE MARY — Jacques and Marie Jasmin won't have their day in court — much to the relief of mother and son.

The State's Attorney's Office announced Monday there is insufficient evidence to pursue charges of child sexual assault and misconduct in court. The conclusion of the 10-week investigation follows Jacques spending more than 30 days in jail and Marie having her daughter taken away and then returned to her by the Department of Children and Families.

According to Assistant State Attorney Stewart Stone, there was not enough evidence to prove beyond reasonable doubt that Jacques, 19, assaulted four children in Marie's foster care. Forty-one foster children, who were at one time assigned to the household, were interviewed by the Lake Mary Police Department, Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the Seminole County State Attorney's Office, but officials could not find substantial evidence to file formal charges against Jacques or his mother.

In March, four of Marie's foster children, ranging in age

Mortgage incentive program approved

SANFORD — City Commissioners approved the final reading of an ordinance to establish a police mortgage incentive program.

Introduced in March by Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard, the program provides incentives for police officers to live in the city. Each qualified officer will receive \$200 or 20 percent of their monthly mortgage payment, whichever is greater, with a maximum monthly payment of \$250.

The program would be limited to 35 officers. Currently, 17 officers live within the city limits.

"This is a great victory for our men and women in blue," Lessard said. "We're making a commitment to public safety in Sanford. The mortgage incentive program will be a tool for Chief (Brian) Tooley to recruit top-quality officers."

During the meeting, resident Ubangi Hajj-Mak told commissioners he agreed in

Commission OKs Mica's proposal for commuter rail

SANFORD — Seminole County Commissioners became the first county in Central Florida to officially support Congressman John Mica's plan for a Central Florida commuter rail.

Mica introduced the proposed 40-mile commuter rail plan earlier this year as an alternative to Interstate 4 during construction. On Tuesday, MetroPlan Executive Director Harry Barley presented a detailed plan with preliminary financials at the county commission meeting.

The proposed route would run on existing CSX lines from DeLand to Orlando with eight stations, including one in Sanford. Four train sets of Diesel Motorized Units (DMUs), a relatively new technology, would run three times in the morning and three times in the afternoon. The proposed price tag for DMUs is about \$21 million, however, Mica plans to get 100 percent federal

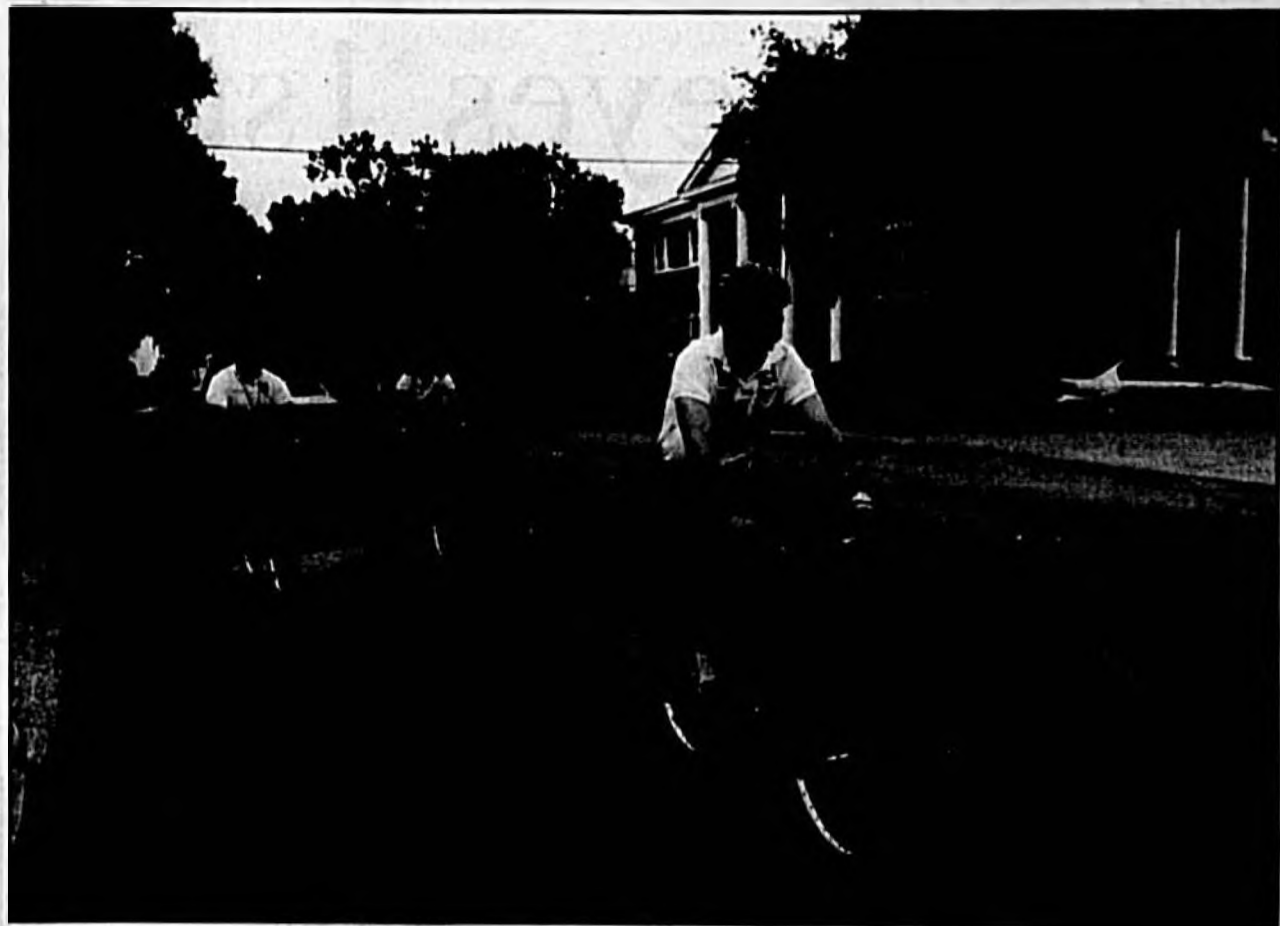

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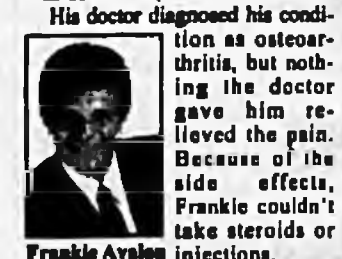

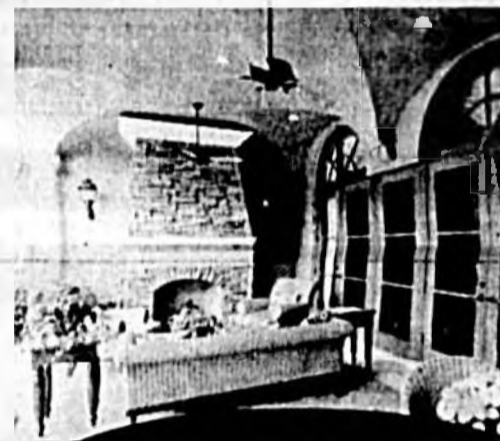

neering and planning. He said city staff already have made preliminary comments and returned those to Capstone.

"My understanding is that they want to move very, very fast," Marder said.

Robin Kendall, a project manager with EMK Consultants of Florida Inc., has overseen the construction of "numerous Eckerd's stores." He said the company is "very interested" in the downtown location and would move quickly to complete construction.

"Knowing Eckerd, once they get the go ahead on the site, they'll be pushing me to get the construction drawings to the city," Kendall said.

Depending on how smoothly the preliminary review phase goes, Kendall said a site plan

could be ready for the Planning and Zoning Commission's meeting in July. Once approved, construction would take about six months.

A spokesman from Eckerd wouldn't confirm the company is considering a downtown location.

"It's too premature to talk about a store in your area," said Tami Alderman, Eckerd's public relation manager. "We work with real estate development companies all the time to find compatible sites."

Eckerd has 2,650 stores in 20 states, mostly in the Northeast, Southeast and Southwest. The company opens or relocates about 100 stores a year.

News of Eckerd's possible location in downtown delighted Sanford Main Street Executive Director Marlene Frith.

"From an economic development standpoint, it's a real plus," Frith said. "It also mirrors what the Rollins (College) survey indicated about the need for a pharmacy downtown."

"This could be the catalyst to other 'chain-type' retail stores locating in downtown," Frith added. "Eckerd has obviously done their market research and determined that this is a viable location for them."

Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard said he was "cautiously optimistic" about Eckerd moving to downtown.

"It would be a boon for that corner and could draw additional retail into downtown," Lessard said.

Both Lessard and Frith said they want to ensure any development on that corner fits with the area's historic character. The

design of the store would be prototype of Eckerd's new design for 2002, said Kendall.

"We may be adding some architectural features because it's part of the gateway to the historic downtown area," Kendall said.

Frith said she intends to meet with Kendall and the city's review team to ensure the design is compatible with downtown.

"Primarily I'd like to know the types of materials, color schemes and other architectural features that can best fit in an historical downtown," Frith said. "We'd like to be able to do some type of entrance feature for 1st Street in that area, as well, because this really is the gateway to downtown."

The Eckerd Corporation is based in Largo, Fla., and is a subsidiary of J.C. Penney

Company. For the accounting year ending Jan. 26, the company generated a \$208 million operating profit on sales of \$13.8

billion. Its gross sales were up 5.8 percent from the previous fiscal year. Eckerd employs 75,000 people.

from 4 to 7, accused Jacques of sexual assault, including one alleging she was raped by the 19-year-old. The teen-ager was arrested and held in the Seminole County Jail without bail until he was released 33 days later. Marie was arrested for ignoring the children's allegations, but was released from jail on a \$1,000 bond.

Marie's daughter was also removed from the 55-year-old's custody several days following the pair's arrest and placed into foster care. However, the child

was returned to her mother last month.

During the criminal investigation, authorities searched for 67 foster children identified as living with the Jasmins during the last six years. Forty-one, ranging in age from 4 to 14, were found and interviewed.

With no other children indicating abuse had occurred, the state was left with the original allegations from the four children. With discrepancies in later interviews with the four, prosecutors said there was not a strong case against the Lake Mary family.

board members Polk, Joan Breslin and Pam Carols, who recently decided to create a non-profit organization focused on increasing educational opportunities in the county. Through Osborne Books, a division of Education Development Corporation, the group plans to host book fairs at various schools and groups.

Polk said the organization is seeking not-for-profit status with the state. While waiting for the status, Seminole Reading Partners is operating under the umbrella of Seminole Volunteer Enterprises Inc.

Plans for the group began several years ago while Polk was working on her father's biography. A friend suggested she write a children's book, which resulted in the creation of Reading Rozie.

Polk, a former publisher's representative, said after creating Rozie she began researching ideas for a not-for-profit organization to benefit at-risk children. She eventually concluded reading was an area that needed the most help.

"There seems to be a real need for it," Polk said. "Especially with what the schools are facing now with the budget."

Initially, the group plans to focus on book fairs. Through Osborne Books, which has an inventory of more than 1,000 children's titles, schools, classrooms and even parents will be able to earn free books for children.

For example, for every \$100 raised during a book fair, \$50 is awarded to the group or individual for additional books, Polk said.

Book sales is only one aspect of

funding for the engines.

"This could be a project of national significance," Barley said noting the DMUs are in operation overseas, but not here in the U.S.

The entire project is estimated to cost about \$45 million, which includes a \$9 million contingency fund. Barley expects the local burden will be in the neighborhood of \$6 million, with the state also chipping in \$6 million. County commissioners were most interested in the annual operating costs.

Although preliminary, annual costs for Seminole, Volusia and Orange counties are between \$800,000 and \$1.6

million. If cities add to the pot, the burden could be less for each county, Barley said. Several essential financial issues remain including developing an agreement with CSX. MetroPlan Chairman and County Commissioner Dick Van der Weide said he is spearheading that initiative.

"This has been a long time coming," said Van der Weide. "We've studied this and studied this. We are going to succeed this time."

Several years ago, Mica offered a similar project to Central Florida. Residents of several southern cities including Winter Park balked at the idea of having additional trains run through their towns

and the chance for federal funding was lost. Commissioners echoed those concerns to Barley.

"I am extremely concerned if Orange County and its cities are in support of this," Commissioner Randy Morris said.

Enthusiasm is very strong for the project, Barley responded. MetroPlan and Mica presented the proposed commuter rail plan to Volusia County officials Monday and are hoping they too will officially support the project at their next board meeting.

"Time will tell, but this could be a giant step in the right direction," Van der Weide said.

principal with the program but said officers should be required to live in the city for at least five years. Officers who move before five years should be required to repay the incentive money, he said.

"We ought to be getting a lot of bang for the money," Hajj-Mak said.

Lessard said since the program paid incentives monthly rather than a lump sum, the benefits to the city would correlate to the mortgage payments.

"Officers are only eligible for the time they live in the city," Lessard said.

Commissioner Art Woodruff asked if guarantees

could be put into the program.

"There's no guarantee that this will last past next month," Woodruff said. "If we want to attract officers, they need some guarantee that this isn't going to go away on a whim."

Lessard said his concern with instituting a guarantee was violating state law by binding future commissions to a financial commitment.

"I've talked with the officers and they're fully cognizant that at some point the city may not be able to afford this," Lessard said. "I'd hate for future commissions to be tied to this commitment when the city can't afford it."

City Attorney Bill Colbert said there are ways for the city to enter into contracts that don't violate state law. He also noted that commissioners could approve the program and later add a resolution instituting a time period the program would be in place.

In other business, the commission:

- Approved a license for the owners of the Lake Monroe Inn to construct a boat dock over and across city property. The dock would be located across from the Lake Monroe Inn at 2385 U.S. Highway 17/92.

- Approved a Scope of Services to hire a consultant to amend the Schedule S codes of the Land Development Regulations. The S Codes primarily impact downtown and the Historic District.

- Adopted a resolution to pay 41 percent of the costs to reconstruct the railroad crossing at 13th Street and U.S. Highway 17/92. Forty-one percent of the crossing is on city right-of-way, the remainder crosses state land.

- Approved on second reading a revised Planned Development Master Plan for Venetian Bay subdivision.

- Awarded an \$8,800 contract for lawn maintenance to American Services Inc.

- Approved an agreement with the Amateur Softball Association of America Inc. to host the Men's Slow Pitch National Tournament at Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium Sept. 12 through Sept. 15.

- Authorized city staff to proceed with negotiations to design and build Fire Station #2 on Airport Boulevard near the GreeneWay. Stottler Stag/Michael Cooper Construction was the highest ranked firm. The base contract is \$742,777.

Florida is the place for birds

OCALA — The neotropical migrants are back and they're taking Florida by storm!

Well, not exactly by storm, but there are lots of migrating birds around right now as they pass through our state heading back to their northern homes. That means great birdwatching for Floridians and visitors.

Neotropical migrants, also known as snowbirds (not to be confused with the human variety), are the birds who leave the country each fall to spend the winter in the tropical regions of Mexico, Central and South America, and the Caribbean, and then return each spring to nest in the United States and Canada when it's warm.

Florida is lucky in that it not only is a destination for some of these migrants, it is also located right smack in the path many birds take - known as flyways - as they migrate north and south.

"That's one reason Florida is such a great place for bird-watching," said Joni Ellis, conservation education specialist with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC).

Anyone who has been feeding birds throughout the fall and winter has noticed that the types and numbers of birds at their feeders have changed as the warm spring progresses. The birds that came here to spend the winter are heading back up north, while the ones who spent the colder months even further south than central Florida are returning here or passing through on their way to their northern nesting grounds.

The beautiful and colorful painted bunting is one such bird that returns to nest in the coastal portions of northeast and central Florida. Purple

martins, who typically spend the winter in South America, have returned to Florida, others, such as the American goldfinch,

has left its wintering grounds in Florida for its nesting areas in more northern states.

The wonders of migration continue to mystify biologists, but it is thought that birds are able to navigate on these long, arduous flights by using a combination of visual landmarks, the Earth's magnetic field, the sun and stars, and their sense of smell.

Although they've all got predetermined destinations, migrating birds use different flight strategies to get where they're going. Many use slow, steady wing flaps until they arrive. Others, such as turkey vultures, use a soaring technique where they ride the thermals high into the sky. Thermals are updrafts of air caused by solar heating, which provide the birds with a sort of free ride. Soaring birds travel during the day and only over land.

Some birds lap their wings for a few beats and then glide along with outspread wings for awhile. What is described as a flapping and gliding style of flight. Still others combine flapping with a closed wing glide and look like they're sort of bounding through the air. Both of these types tend to lose elevation and appear to fly in and up-and-down flight pattern.

Migratory birds are fascinating to watch and learn about, and here a few more interesting ecological facts about our feathered friends:

• Most birds do not mate for life, but instead switch mates every year or even between nesting attempts in the same year.

• The parasitic brown-headed cowbird is known to lay its own eggs in the nests of nearly 250 other species.

• Predators destroy about half of all nests.

• The typical adult songbird makes 4-10 trips to the nest each hour, for 12 or more hours a day, to feed its nestlings. This often results in the young

weighing as much or more than the adults by the time they leave the nest.

• Most small land birds place insects into their nestlings' gaping mouths, but many adult water birds (which regurgitate food) open their beaks and let their young reach into it to receive food.

• Most small land birds defend a breeding territory of 1 to 3 acres in size, while many hawks and eagles range over several square miles.

"Birds are fun to watch and easy to attract at home by providing food, water and shelter," said Ellis. "Many people use a variety of birdfeeders and seeds to attract birds, but it is even more beneficial to plant the types of vegetation that provide birds with a natural source of food, cover and nesting sites."

For example, the Southern magnolia provides excellent cover for songbirds, as well as providing fruit that is eaten by woodpeckers, red-eyed vireos and others. The spring flowers of a blooming Florida privet attract insects during spring migration, which in turn attract many warblers to the area. In addition, the small, dark fruit produced by the privet is consumed by a number of bird species. The red tubular flowers of the coral honeysuckle vine produce the nectar needed by hummingbirds.

For more ideas on how to landscape to attract wildlife, as well as information on building nest boxes for different bird species, and what types of plants will attract which species of birds, pick up a copy of *Attracting Birds to Southern Gardens*, by Thomas Pope, Neil Odenwald and Charles Fryling Jr.

Another book, *Birders Handbook*, by Ehrlich, Dobkin and Wheye, is loaded with information about North American birds. And, to find some great public places to watch birds, get the *Florida Wildlife Viewing Guide* by Susan Cerulean and Ann Morrow. It breaks the state into regions and provides a wealth of information on where to go, how to get there and what to see. All three books are available through bookstores.

For some great birdwatching opportunities, plan to visit some of the sites along the Great Florida Birding Trail - a network of birding sites linked by highways around the state. For a Great Florida Birding Trail map and guide, call the FWC's Ocala regional office at 352-732-1225 and ask for the Office of Informational Services.

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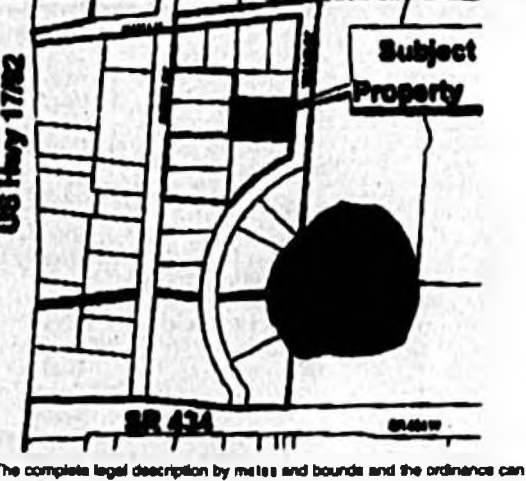

Most SHA fires reported to insurers

SANFORD — An investigation into whether insurance claims were filed for fires at the Sanford Housing Authority shows that five of the eight fires were reported to insurance officials.

Claims for the remaining three fires may have been filed, said SHA director Audris Billberry, but the Federal Bureau of Investigations still has boxes of records it seized last April during the government's investigation of former

director Timothy Hudson's management practices.

"I am not convinced that the Sanford Housing Authority did not file claims," Billberry said indicating the records that prove so could be in Washington D.C. At the April 18 board meeting,

Commissioner Ross Bieling asked the director to investigate the whether claims had been filed for fires at housing authority facilities since 1999. Billberry researched the matter and notified commissioners at Thursday's board meeting that she has identified only three inci-

dents that the insurance company does not show claims filed.

Her investigation was aided by Sanford Fire Marshall Mike McGibeny. McGibeny identified eight fires that occurred at various SHA complexes between 1999 and 2002. The largest of the suspected insurance claims not filed is from an Oct. 17, 2000 blaze at 19 Lake Monroe Terrace. Investigators estimated damage to be about \$40,000.

FP&L OKs deal with housing authority

Utility charged agency for lights that didn't work

SANFORD — Working toward a brighter future, Sanford Housing Authority commissioners unanimously approved a deal with Florida Power & Light Thursday to replace 39 vandalized streetlights.

FP&L has had a lease agreement with SHA, dating back to 1989, for the 100 400-watt streetlights within the boundaries of Lake Monroe Terrace, Cowan Moughton Terrace, Edward Higgins Terrace, William Clark Court and Castle Brewer Court.

Many of the damaged lights have been inoperable for quite some time, according to Commissioner Ross Bieling. Unfortunately, the housing authority and electricity provider have been at odds over who is responsible for the costs in replacing the lights, said Director Audris Billberry. FP&L Customer Project Manager Mark Pollock informed the board that every one of the lights in question was vandalized. In some cases, the entire light fixture is missing. It's FP&L policy to charge costs associated with vandalism to the leasee, Pollock said.

District 5 Commissioner Daryl McLain announced April 30 that he intends to resign his position to challenge Florida Speaker of the House Tom Feeney in the Republican primary for the newly created 24th District congressional seat.

McLain has yet to officially resign, though he has begun organizing a campaign for the congressional seat. He is listed as an active candidate on the Florida Division of Elections Web site for the seat and must file a formal intent no later than July 19.

Lessard was considered one of the front-runners for what is expected to be a crowded race to replace McLain. The first-term Sanford mayor said Thursday he intends to complete his term, which ends April 1, 2005.

"Ms. Irwin was the first to call about participating in the initiative," said Eloise Dilligard, Front Porch's program coordinator for elderly outreach. "This is going to be the model house for what we are able to do."

Dilligard said there are more than 10 other homes needing minor home repairs on the Council's list. The residences were selected through a process of prioritizing.

"We had to look at what homes needed immediate repairs," she said. "If it was an emergency, the home became a priority."

Oscar Redden of Brother's Keepers said his group became

involved in the senior outreach program through a natural partnership in the community.

"We were already helping people in the community, so Front Porch began partnering with us," Redden said. "It was only proper to get us involved."

The home repair program is one of the first projects for the Council. The governor's Office of Urban Opportunity last year

announced Goldsboro had been selected as a Front Porch Florida community. The state program is a revitalization initiative that targets key urban neighborhoods for improvement.

Seven months after the announcement, the local council secured a \$98,000 grant to

Student apartment woes for the Seminole County Commission apparently will not subside any time soon.

A new master plan approved Thursday by the University of Central Florida Board of Trustees includes few campus housing improvements for the future. In the past two years, county commissioners have wrestled with five hotly debated student apartment complexes in the university area.

The 10-year master plan includes a new fraternity park

in the northwest corner of the campus and several new housing structures to the south, which will hold about 1,700 beds.

In a previous discussion about student apartments, Commissioner Carlton Henley blamed the problem of student housing on UCF citing the school's refusal to add housing to the campus. Local elected officials, however, shouldn't hold their breath for the new campus housing, suggested university executives.

"We have to make sure there

Man dies of electrocution

Steven Corey Griffin, 22, of Sanford was electrocuted Wednesday morning. It happened at about 8:45 a.m. at an office and warehouse complex, located at 227 Power Court near Sanford. A work crew from Lambert Erectors was installing flashing near the roof of the building. Griffin was moving his 25-foot aluminum extension ladder when it apparently encountered a power line. The line carried more than 7,600 volts of electricity. Co-workers called for emergency personnel and tried to render aid. Emergency personnel rushed the victim to Central Florida Regional Hospital in Sanford, where he was pronounced dead.
