

Yanks Boost Lead To 12 Games As Hemsley Blasts Apple In 10 Inning Win Over Cleveland

CLEVELAND, July 23, (AP)—Joe Dimaggio didn't get a hit yesterday but Rolfe Hemsley collected four and the New York Yankees scored four unearned runs in the 10th inning to stretch their winning streak to 11 games at the expense of the Cleveland Indians, 5 to 1, incidentally boosting their season lead to 12 games.

Till the overtime stanza the contest was a tight hurling duel between Alcy Donald of the Yanks and Lefty Al Milner of the Indians.

Cleveland's big southpaw not only ended Dimaggio's hitting string at 19 consecutive games, hitting him with a pitch once and walking him on his first turn at bat in the 10th, but limited the world champions' scoring in the regulation distance to one run—Charley (Kine Kong) Keller's 12th homer of the season.

He also got the first two men out in the 10th, but then let Tom Henrich single and passed Dimaggio. At this point Joe Gordon rounded to shortstop Oscar

Grimes, who fumbled it, and kicked it around the infield three times over Catcher O to Denning, who as Henrich scored. Dimaggio went to third and Gordon caught the second.

Keller was intentional to load the bases, and Dimaggio singled for the fourth hit and second out. He scored Kells.

It was the 10th inning that the Yankees won the game. Little catcher, who was released last week by Cleveland because he had made only one out in 113. He now is batting .100 for the world champion.

Sid Hudson Holds Tigers To 5 Hits As Senators Win

DETROIT, July 23, (AP)—Tall Sid Hudson, achieved his long goal after fifth victory yesterday by holding the Detroit Tigers to five hits in a twilight game. The Senators won 2 to 1.

Hudson, seeking No. 5 long before he was named to the American League rotation, pitched a perfect game for the first time in his career. He pitched only three hits to add to his record of 10 wins in the fourth when Barney McCoskey opened with a double moved up on Roger Brannan's sacrifice and scored on Hudson's long fly.

Nazis Announce Capture Of Rostov; Russians Admit Battle Reaches City

Germans Threaten Reds' South Life- Line To Allies In Middle East Area

London, July 24 (AP)—The Russians are preparing new defenses south of Don today where they plan to meet the triumphant German armies in a crucial clash for the Caucasus and British military experts said these have had no independent confirmation of the German claim to Rumania but said it is doubtful if Marshal Timoshenko is trying to make a desperate stand hold it itself Austria has no military value the

The Hitler command today announced the capture of Rostov, the northern Caucasian capital on the main railway and pipeline tapping oil and mineral wealth deep in the Caucasus. The Russian, while not acknowledging the fall and the battle line, ordered the evacuation of the city.
