

Yanks Boost Lead To 12 Games As Hemsley Blasts Apple In 10 Inning Win Over Cleveland

CLEVELAND, July 23, (AP)—Joe DiMaggio didn't get a hit yesterday but Rolly Hemsley, selected four and New York Yankees scored four unearned runs in the 10th inning to stretch their winning streak to 11 games at the expense of the Cleveland Indians, 5 to 1, incidentally boosting their league lead to 12 games. British Strike At Invaders In Fight In Egypt

Armored Forces Consolidate Positions Won In Two Days Of Heated Battling

In Egypt, British armored forces lanced at the Axis on Alexandria's outlying defense line west of El Alamein today, while consolidating the positions they won on the northern and central sectors in two days of sharp fighting.

A shimmering dust haze kept planes of both sides on the ground during the early hours today, but British fliers were poised to rear into action when it lifted, as they did yesterday when German planes, mostly dive-bombers, also returned to the fray after a brief absence.

RAF News Service revealed that United States Air Force heavy bombers and RAF medium bombers had weather to carry out devastating raids on Axis Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's string of coastal bases before dawn yesterday.

British quarters emphasized that Rommel's supply route, taking such a pounding, the Imperial force was hard-pressed to hold the attack in all areas, keeping his available strength dispersed and on the defensive.

However, Rommel apparently had envisioned just such an attack and during the two weeks' stalemate on the El Alamein front had due in his positions strongly with the result that it was slow work reducing them.

A German communiqué broadcast from Berlin said that German and Italian forces with effective air support yesterday repelled British counter-attacks by British and Italian forces which were repulsed many times by day and night.

The Germans claimed 1000 Imperial prisoners, mostly New Zealanders and Indians, were captured and 131 tanks destroyed while Axis fliers shot down nine enemy planes.

Jap Troops Get Third Toe-Hold On New Guinea

Between 1,500 to 8,000 Japanese troops were dug in last night at their third toe-hold on New Guinea, the great island just northeast of Australia, posing a tantalizing new threat to Port Moresby, the most advanced Allied base in the South Seas.

One landing was at Buna, 110 miles across the narrow neck of Papua from Port Moresby on the eastern peninsula of New Guinea and on the northern shore. Allied fliers inflicted heavy casualties, sinking a transport and landing barges and destroying a seaplane, a communiqué said.

With at heavy cost, the new Japanese incursion will be difficult to exploit because virtually impenetrable jungle-clad mountains, in which Owen Stanley range rises to 18,000 feet, separate the invaders from the U.S. and Australian troops on New Guinea's south shore. No vehicle roads exist and only a few footpaths which are extremely tough going are curved through the lush tropical growth.

At the same time he warned the remaining neutrals that their professions of neutrality were "abhorrent and suicidal" in the face of the world-wide conflict and called upon all people who prize liberty to fight for it as their own.

Highly outlined post-war projects are some of the most specific ever made by a responsible official of the United Nations and are to be submitted to the U.N. General Assembly.

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'Largest' Convoy Of U. S. Troops Lands In England

British Government Refuses To Reveal Second Front Plans

LONDON, July 24. (AP)—The government of Prime Minister Winston Churchill refused yesterday to reveal its plans for a second front to the tenor of its statement coupled with an announcement that Britain was digging deep into its resources.

Further, it was officially disclosed that another British convoy, one of the largest ever to cross the Atlantic, had brought many more U.S. soldiers and arms to a general British division now in the British Isles.

Thousands of men arrived, including American pilots, ground crews, engineer troops, and other forces, a large corps of nurses, and a number of equipment and supplies to make a safe crossing of the Atlantic.

The second front was the major political-military topic in all British news from London, especially in the highest quarters.

It was clear to people and government that their fate is bound up with that of Russia.

London, July 24. (AP)—British Prime Minister Winston Churchill gave the members of the government to understand the government would not tip the hand to a frequent government友邻 Labour-American liaison.

Churchill questioned the wisdom of planning for a summer recess, when the country was agitated over the government's military intentions after Cripps had announced the proposal recess later.

Several Hundred British Bombers Blast Hamburg

Devastating Results Are Described In Attack Which Cost RAF 29 Warplanes

British Bombers Several hundred bombers hammered at Hamburg, Germany's greatest submarine building center, today with results described as "better than the 1,000-bomber job on Bremen."

Twenty-nine RAF planes were lost. British airmen also raided the low countries and shipping. German warplanes scattered points in England.

Seven U. S. Army fighter pilots joined the British in a wide fighter sweep over northern France Sunday. A special communiqué disclosing their participation was not disclosed, but the American air force fighter pilots are now operating from the British Isles.

The planes hit at military objectives in the area between Gravelines, St. Omer and Abbeville. One of the American planes did not return.

In addition, the American squadron, flying one flight or sweep over the occupied area, successfully bombed and machine-gunned a German torpedo boat about a mile off Calais, the British air ministry reported.

While scores of buildings were wiped out before them 50-ton "block destroying" bombs Saturday night at Duleburg, German railway and shipping center, and Sunday afternoon the GAP destroyed the legend of a new Nazi super-plane in a nine-timers fighter victory over another.

Three fires now left raging in the largest river port in the world, Rotterdam.

The continuing of the Luftwaffe bombing of the Ruhr, which attacked Ruhr industries in daylight raids this morning, caused smoke from the fires to spread over the Ruhr.

"A great force of Lancasters, Stirlings, Halifaxs, as well as many two-engined bombers" participated in the attack on Quievrain, the air ministry said.

It acknowledged 14 bombers and one fighter were missing from the operations (indicating a force of between 220 and 300 bombers as the RAF in the past has lost less than five percent of its bombers on such large raids.)

Cripps Criticizes Gandhi For Stand On India Problem

LONDON, July 27. (AP)—Sir Stafford Cripps, whose independent mission to India failed last spring, today criticized Mohandas K. Gandhi's stand against Britain's withdrawal of the British rule from India and declared the actions of a "visionary" must not be allowed to thwart the United Nations' drive for victory in the east.

Early in July the country was allowed a 2½ bicycle quota for two months period. However, this was changed to five during July. The August quota is not known. Further information may be obtained from the office of the National Board at the Admiralty.

Allied Pilots In Egypt Again Attack Tobruk

Battle Has Shifted Almost Entirely To Air As Troops Dig In Along Line

(By Associated Press) The battle of Egypt shifted to almost wholly to the air. The heavy Allied air force plastered Tobruk again today, also Sidi Barrani, as Axis troops dug in on the Alamein line amid a lull in ground action.

After mid-week clashes in which both sides lost heavily, a lull has come in the desert war and the Germans are furiously digging in all along this front 75 miles west of Alexandria, from El Alamein to the Qattara Depression.

Action during the last 38 hours has been little more than an occasional exchange of artillery fire, day and night patrols and the dropping of mines by British and American Air Forces overhead as they continue to strike at Marshal Rommel's sea and air bases.

Bundes' Cairo communiqué said the heavy bombers of the United States Army Air Force and British Americans swept across the Mediterranean last night and attacked Crete and that another force struck at Tobruk again.

Light bombers continued to place themselves, drop, tank and vehicle concentrations, and anti-aircraft and anti-aircraft.

Meanwhile, capital hill expressed great satisfaction over Nelson's week end report disclosing that America's war production in June was 200 times as high as last November, the month before Pearl Harbor. Many members said the production gains constituted a "vote of confidence" in Nelson's efforts.

The production chief's eight-month review placed output of aircraft at near 1,000 a month, artillery and anti-tank guns, approximately 2,000 a month, machine tools, more than 50,000 a month, sub-machine guns, more than 80,000 a month, and tanks, more than 150 a month.

Senator Allen J. Ellender (D-La.) declared that Nelson has done a "remarkable" job.

"There's only one criticism I can make," Ellender said. "He should be more careful not to do too much on his subordinate's back. He should let me do my work."

"I don't know of anybody else in this country who could do the same job as rapidly."

"What we want him to accomplish in the next eight months are practically miracles," Pepper said.

"Nelson himself can't perform miracles of production, but America's the man who can and must make us do it. He is becoming more and more the master of his job."

Argentine And U. S. Relations Are Cool

BUENOS AIRES, July 27. (AP)—Although it is now six months since Argentina and other American republics signed the Rio pact committing themselves to a severance of diplomatic relations with the Axis, this nation's foreign policy today is the same as before that conference and there is no indication that it will change.

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
