The Sanford field laboratory of Florida's marine research program may be phased out along with the entire project within four-six weeks, it was reported today by Associated Press out of Tallahassee. The local lab, at the Florida Power & Light Company plant on the St. Johns River, has completed a lengthy study of shad spawning and juvenile life and was

about to launch into a further two-year study of the shad, tied in with a similar study of sturgeon on the West Coast, Roy Williams and Curtis Myhree are biologists with the Sanford

AP quoted Ed Joyce, director of a state marine laboratory at St. Petersburg, that what was once regarded as one of the best state-supported marine research programs in the nation only has from four to six weeks to keep from going broke.

Already five of the Marine Science and Technology Bureau's 50 research employes have been given pink slips, and field laboratories at Crystal River, Fort Walton Beach and Key West shut down because of the economic pinch, said Joyce.

He said the royalties are a 'diminishing source of the bureau's unusual method of funding. It derives nothing from general state revenues, but must rely 100 per cent on federal funds and royalties paid to the state from the dredging of oyster shells used in

He sai dthe royalties are a 'diminishing source of revenue" especially since one major firm in the business recently moved out of Florida.

"Of course, since the federal funds are matching funds, when we lose state money we lose federal money as well," said Joyce.



Starting today the junior United States Senator from Washington - vigorous and outspoken Henry "Scoop" Jackson is exposing himself and his view to the public and the politicians in the Sunshine State.

Projected against his national record and with the background of the current spate of astounding developments in Washington and at the UN in New York, what he says is important.

Yet if the words were the important aspect of such political tours as this, then the voter could read them as the meetings are reported, We believe that Floridians have a much more valuable opportunity if they make a point to attend the rallies, public meetings and unscheduled gathering where Senator Jackson and his fellow Democratic

presidential hopefuls appear. This parade has only started. It will increase in size and tempo as the primaries get near. Now, however, is the period during which the politicians can

Persuasion Best

Americans concerned with the flow of narcotics into the United States from abroad can be sympathetic to Postmaster General Winton Blount's plea for "forceful" action to halt the

Blount charged that France was not trying hard enough to cut off the shipment of illegal heroin to this country. He urged a boycott of French goods until

France took more effective measures to halt the illicit distribution. But diplomatic considerations support the more restrained approach taken by the Nixon

administration, which seeks cooperation through persuasion. United States relations with foreign nations, already strained by the surcharge on imports, would not be enhanced by action against France. As stated by Dr. Jerome Jaffe, the President's top drug control enforcer, it is not "in our

best interest to advocate a boycott." And as Jaffe pointed out, recent arrests in France indicate that liaison in the multi-nation drug war is "improving" - without boiling already muddy international waters.

Warnings that population growth must be controlled to keep us all from going hungry would be more forceful if American farmers were not always proving that they can produce more than we can eat.

Agriculture Secretary Clifford Hardin believes the government may have to spend up to \$2 billion next year in subsidies to head off rising surpluses in corn and other grains. The over-abundance of farmlands in some

parts of the world and the meager production of foodstuffs in others remains a tragic para-Efforts to lift the burden of hunger from

much of the world's population are progressing as slowly as efforts to lift the burden of farm subsidies from the American taxpayer.
