Both candidates have stepped up the number o appearances and the vigor of their attack. In fact i seems now that there has been a deplorable switch from the affirmative to the negative.

#### **Bad News Killed**

Newspapers constantly are charged with printing 'bad news" only, and often are accused of making bad matter worse by printing unpleas-ant facts, especially on the local level.

We recall an incident here some years ago. There was a wave of vandalism. The Greenville papers reported it, with pictures. Meetings re-sulted. Some corrective measures were suggest-ad and implemented. Vandalism declined drastically. But the newspapers were accused widely of printing bad things about Greenville's young people, just to be sensational.

One good friend, a minister who since has gone to another area, visited our office to complain about the news coverage. He was one of those who worked zealously to stop the vandalism and to provide recreation for young people. In the course of our conversation, we asked this question : "Would corrective measures have been taken unless you knew about the trouble?" "No," was his reply. And how did you know there was trouble?" we asked. 'I read it in the ..., oh, I see what you mean about publicity," our minister-friend said.

Now comes evidence about what happens when newspapers don't or can't publish 'bad" information. Charlottesville, Va., recently had a similar round of vandalism, which Charlottesville authorities somehow managed to hide from the news media.

They figured that if there were no publicity at all, the vandalism would go away. Not so. It got progressively worse. Finally the authorities acknowledged what was going on. ' There is no substitute for an informed public

in dealing with public matters, even the bad This is why the Greenville newspapers print bad news as well as good, trying to present it factually and in a balanced perspective so as to bring about corrective action without inflam-ing emotions.-Greenville (S. C. News)

What voters should be concentrating on is the ability of each to define the issues, to speak clearly on their attitude towards them and cite facts and records to persuade those who will vote to do so with a maximum of partisanship and a maximum of reason.



tificial corneas into the eyes of 60 persons in the last 311 years. and at least half are able to see "The results are the most gratifying I have had in my career as an opthalmologist. Girard said in explaining the technique at a news conference.

The surgery uses a tiny shaft of clear plastic which acts as a thick lens. It has skirts or projections of mesh which hold it in place through the cornea. The persons s own eye tissue

can adhere to the mesh to keep it firmly placed. To achieve this, the mesh is covered with human eye tissue, sciera and conjunctiva, taken from the other blinded & e or from donated human eyes he said
