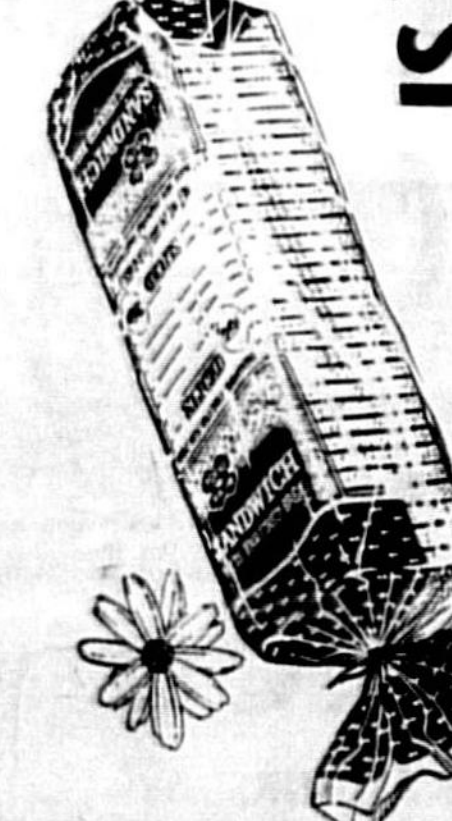

Ambulance Service Ready

Herndon Ambulance Service is ready to go into business in Seminole County tonight as agreed, Gen Herndon told The Herald today.

The company and County Commission agreed Tuesday on a subsidy program whereby Herndon will have two stations in the county with staff and ambulance at each and backup vehicles from Winter Park office for transfers and emergencies. Subsidy agreed upon

on the 90-day trial period is \$2,000 per month with option for annual contract at \$25,000. The subsidy will defray differences between fees charged to patients and expenses of the service.

Herndon said two houses on adjoining properties have been rented for two of his family members at 2406 Magnolia and 1413 Park Avenue in Sanford and that he is continuing to try to rent a suitable site on

SR 456 in the south end. "Due to the last minute time, it has been impossible to get a telephone hookup between the Sanford area and the Winter Park office," Herndon said advising that persons needing ambulance service should call any of the police departments in the county or the sheriff's department before the time being.

He also said that it is expected telephones will be installed shortly. He further expects to make temporary arrangements for a south end station in the next few days.

No increase in ambulance rates is anticipated at this time, according to Herndon. Rates are posted in every ambulance and are the same rates currently charged in this county as well as in Orange County. Payment for the service will remain to be made directly to the company.

How To Avoid Voters' Rush

Altamonte Fights Four Law Actions

Cost of defending the City of Altamonte Springs in the four lawsuits recently brought against it by three business people and a group of citizens will be several thousands of dollars minimum, City Attorney Joseph Davis Jr. told the Council last night in answer to a question.

Davis, after receiving authorization to defend the city in the suits, assured he will take action with the intent of bringing the matters to trial at the earliest possible time.

The attorney and the Council went into executive session following the meeting to discuss his strategy in the suits. The attorney brought the City Attorney Studio to force the city to allow it to continue the action of the Council last night, granting a temporary injunction to the City Attorney.

At conclusion of a public hearing, the Board voted three to two to grant the requested variance until Sept. 30, 1969.

A 13-year-old youth was treated at the county health clinic for severe bites about the body said to have been administered by another boy.

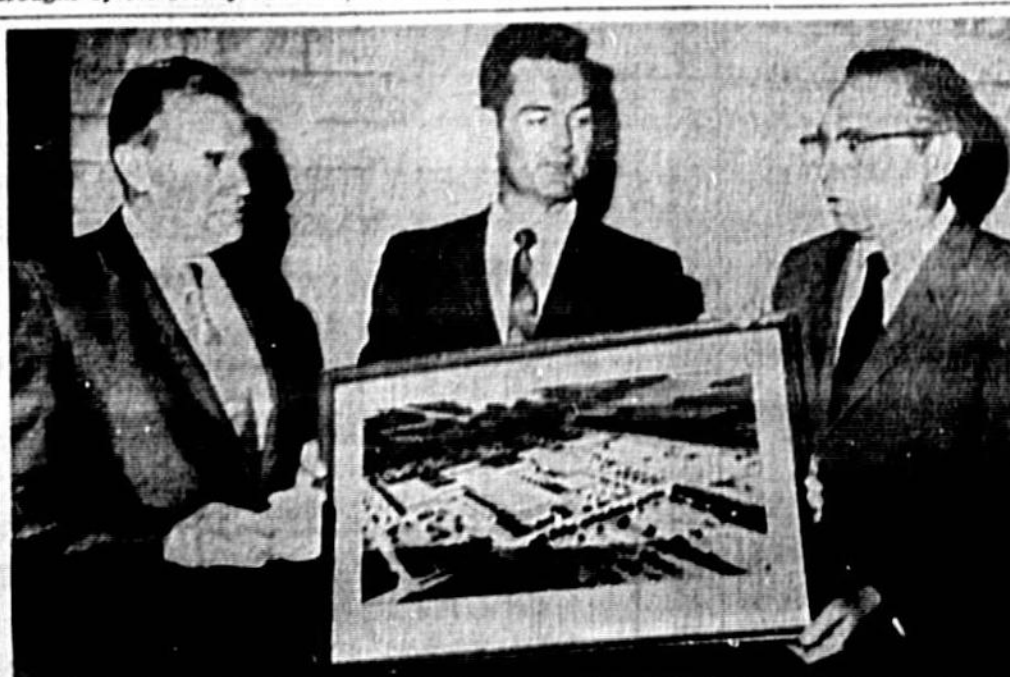

U. S. Mum On Peace Effort

SAIGON (AP) — Despite worldwide speculation that a U.S. order halting the bombing of North Vietnam is near, South Vietnam's President Nguyen Van Thieu said today that North Vietnam has not agreed to the U.S. terms.

Following a ceremony honoring South Vietnamese war dead, Thieu told newsmen "we cannot

decide to halt the bombing" unless there is some sign of reciprocity from the North Vietnamese. "I don't see any respect (response) from Hanoi," he said.

Thieu said another stumbling block is Hanoi's insistence that the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front be treated as a separate delegation at any expansion conference. He said his government could not approve of this.

Expectations of a bombing halt were fueled by President Johnson's secret meeting early this week with Gen. Creighton Abrams, the U.S. commander in Vietnam, and by statements from several officials of governments with troops in Vietnam.

At least once a week the group meets at one of the homes for rehearsal, much to the delight of the neighbors.

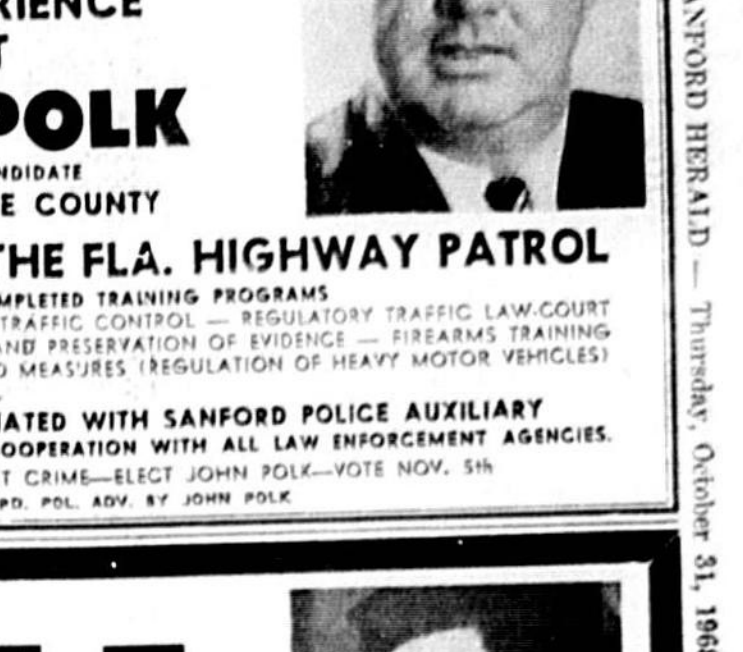
The Deltona Combo provides music for private parties, weddings, and dances in the Seminole and Volusia areas.

White Way Gets Boost

The "White Way" project of providing street lighting on U.S. 17-92 from Interstate 4 around the lakefront to Sanford received a boost in a Tuesday action of the county commission.

Another thrust forward came later in the day when Sanford City Manager Warren E. Knowles revealed he had located an aluminum pole, classified as a break-a-way type, needed to meet requirements of Bureau of Public Roads, a federal agency, which recently decreed that power poles to be located 14 feet off public pavement must be the breaking type.

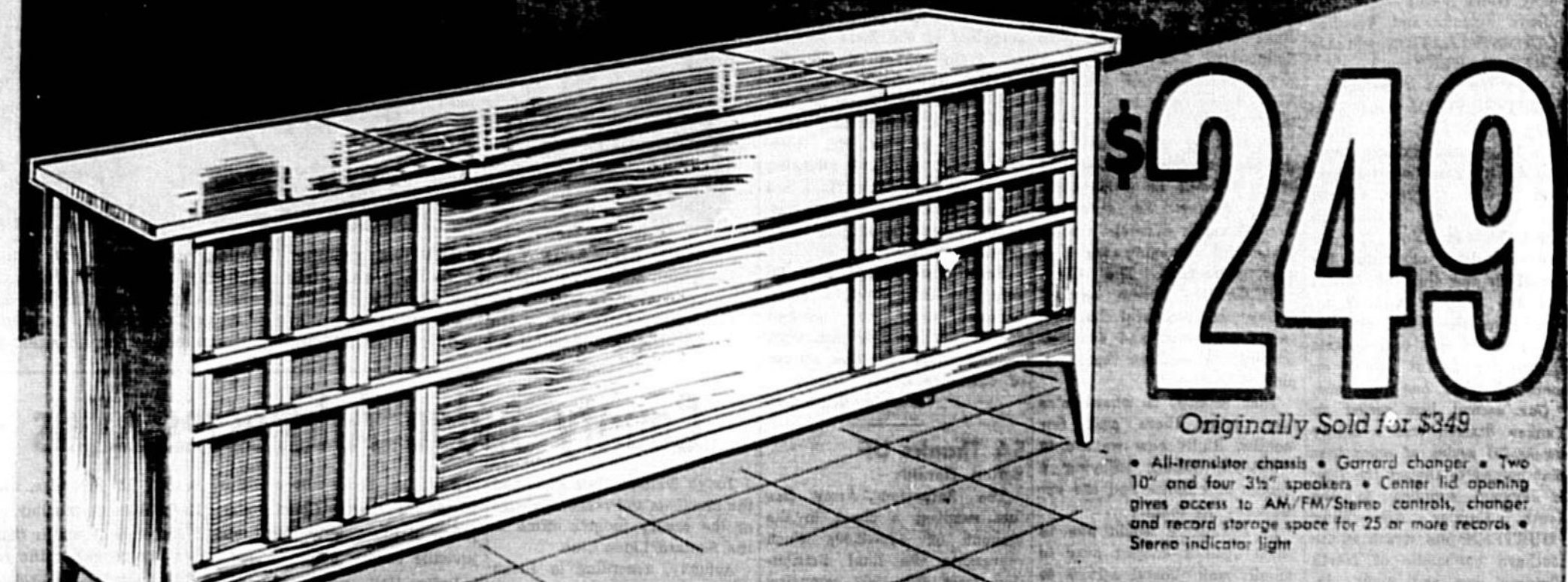

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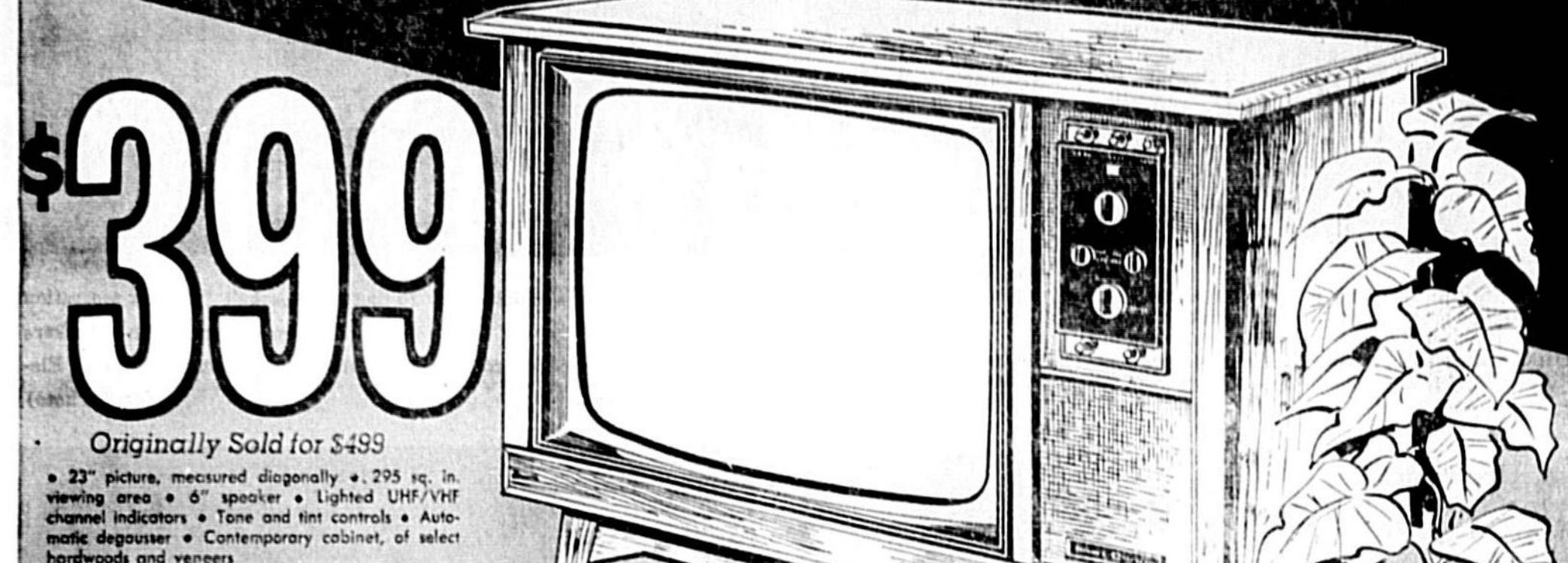

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Consumers Puzzle Economic Experts

NEW YORK (AP) — What has become of the inflation issue, and more broadly, of the entire consumer issue?
A sampling of opinion seems to indicate that a new and thick layer of skin has grown over the passions so raw and irritated just a few months ago. The consumer seems to be jaded or insured.
Adding to the puzzle are some good reasons for expecting that consumer issues—such as rising prices, product quality, poor service—would have risen in tempo and become bigger election issues.
Prices, as an illustration, continue to rise. It now costs \$12.23 for household purchases that cost \$10 in the 1957-1959 period, and more increases are in prospect before the year's end.
Since consumers are voters, normally you might believe that pocketbook issues would make good campaign material. They have, but in a rather mild way. The most puzzling testimonial to consumer indifference to rising expenses is the near total disregard for the 10 per cent surtax on incomes. Many consumers continue to spend as if the tax doesn't exist. Why so?
—First, many workers have received pay increases that tend to offset the surtax. Take home pay for many breadwinners continues to reach all-time highs, despite higher taxes.
—People are slow to react. Spending patterns that were developed over a period of years are difficult to change. We know that many Americans even took money out of the bank to maintain their standards of living.
—An inflationary psychology is taking root. Instead of putting off purchases until prices come down, some consumers now are buying to avoid even higher prices in the future.
A peculiar aspect of great emotion about consumer issues seems to emanate from the political campaigns, although the differences in candidates' attitudes are sharp and seem to contain the ingredients for a good argument.
Hubert H. Humphrey has been very explicit, advocating an independent office of consumer affairs to represent the consumer before other agencies of government.
The Rev. Robert McEwen of Boston College, president of the Consumer Federation of America, announced two weeks ago a drive to bring consumer issues into the campaign.
Father McEwen said he wanted to end "the policy of silence and avoidance" practiced by candidates in regard to consumer issues. But he has had much less success than he had hoped for. "A most baffling thing," he

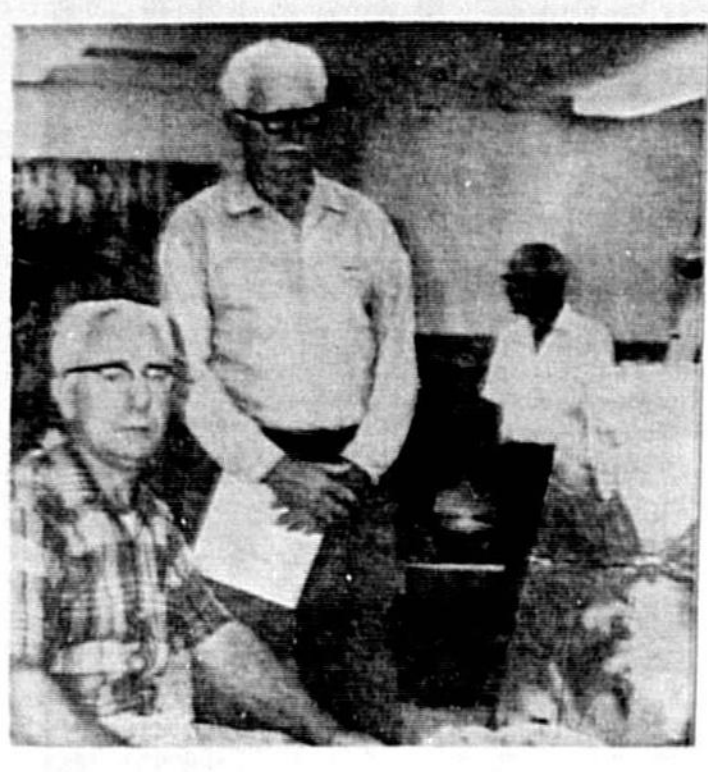

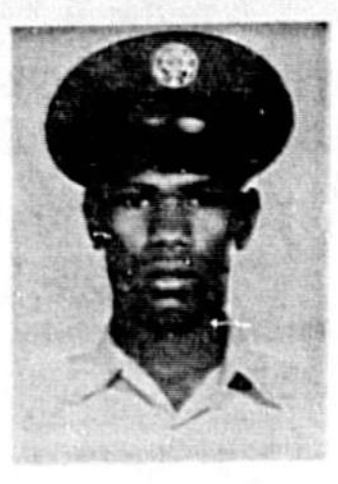

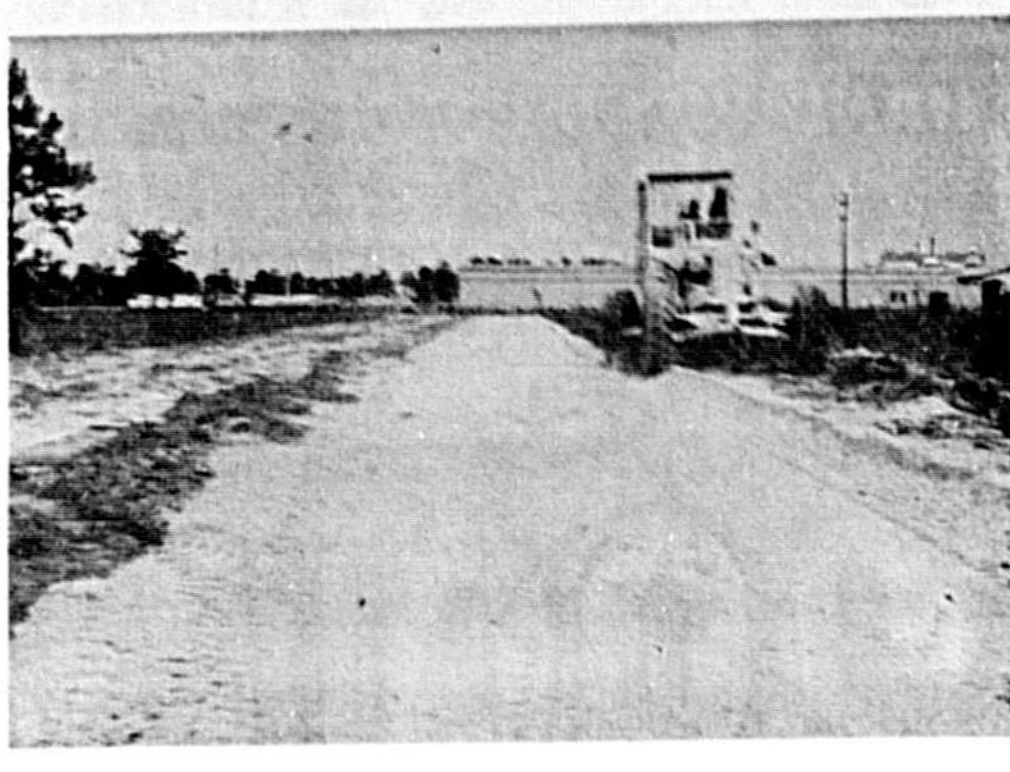

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New Hope For Blind Persons

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—A few dozen people blind for years now are seeing again through a new method of restoring the windows of their eyes, a specialist reported today.

One man passed his driver's license test a few weeks ago and Dr. Louis J. Girard of Baylor University College of Medicine in Houston, Tex., said.

A woman, blind for 44 years—since childhood—now is able to see the children she raised.

The operation putting an artificial cornea or window into the eye might help 10 to 15 per cent of the millions of blind people throughout the world, Girard said.

It appears only to those whose eyes normally have been damaged by chemical burns or other injuries or certain diseases or who have congenital defects affecting the cornea, he said in a report for the American College of Surgeons.

He predicted that most ophthalmologists at eye specialists should be able to perform the operation, which takes up to 1 1/2 hours.

Girard said he has placed an artificial cornea into the eyes of 60 persons in the last 2 1/2 years, and at least half are able to see. The results are the most gratifying I have had in my career as an ophthalmologist.

Girard said in explaining the technique at a news conference.

The surgeon uses a thin shaft of clear plastic which acts as a thick lens. It has skirts or projections of mesh which hold it in place through the cornea.

The person's own eye tissue can adhere to the mesh to keep it firmly placed. To achieve this, the mesh is covered with human eye tissue, sclera and conjunctiva, taken from the other eye of a donor or donated human eye, he said.

Girard is professor and chair man of the department of ophthalmology at Baylor University and director of the Eye Institute at Texas Medical Center.

U.S. To Buy Grapefruit

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP)—U.S. Department of Agriculture plans to buy canned grapefruit sections from Florida growers, which will help in the successful marketing of this season's crop, according to an industry leader.

"Although we had anticipated this move last month, I am glad it has become a reality," said Robert W. Ruppel, executive vice president of Florida citrus mutual.

The USDA indicated Tuesday it will buy about 400,000 boxes of canned grapefruit, one-third more than its purchase last season, if the supply and prices are right. The fruit is sold in the national school lunch program.

Bids by canners must be received in Washington by Dec. 18. The fruit used must be that received subsequent to the actual awarding of contracts.

But this says the handsome, 54-year-old Winter Park lawyer, should surprise no one. Since he first arrived in Washington in 1962, the Democrats have been in control of Congress. Gurney says, and "as a conservative Republican I am honor-bound to oppose whatever the liberal Democrats advocate."

After Tuesday's election, he predicts, there will be a Republican administration in the White House and the GOP will control the House. He expects to be one of 18 new Republicans elected to the Senate.

"Then," he says, "with the help of a few conservative Democrats from the South, we'll be able to pass the legislation we want. Then I'll be 'out' and the liberal Democrats will be 'against.'"

Gurney, a tall, lanky native New Englander who still has traces of a Yankee accent, gives this definition of a liberal: "He has an utterly irresponsible fiscal policy. He spends tax money recklessly. He is soft on criminals, racists and demonstrators. He supports a foreign policy which is weak—if you can call it a foreign policy."

"A conservative," he adds, "believes in responsible fiscal policy. He believes in law enforcement, a firm foreign policy, and he wants to tackle the problems facing America through private enterprise instead of massive, deficit government spending."

Gurney says his Democratic opponent, LeRoy Collins, is part of the "liberal Johnson-Humphrey administration." Collins retorts that he is an "independent" thinker and says Gurney is a right-wing extremist.

One of the most outspoken Hawks in Congress, Gurney says the United States should take the offensive in Vietnam.

LeRoy Collins Standing On His Record

LeRoy Collins, a veteran of many political wars in Florida, likes to stand on his six-year record as governor in his drive for a political comeback in the U. S. Senate.

Those were good years, he said—years marked by rapid growth, economic progress and racial peace. His Republican opponent, Edward J. Gurney, preferred to concentrate on Collins' activities since he left Tallahassee—

when he served by appointment of President Johnson as a racial troublemaker and then as Undersecretary of Commerce. These jobs, Gurney insisted, made Collins a part of the Johnson administration and he referred to him on the campaign trail as "liberal LeRoy."

Bristling at this tag, Collins called it "a list of campaign fodder." He added, "I'm independent. I say what I think is right. I'm not partisan in service, and I don't plan to go to Washington to join a machine."

He favors the election of Hubert H. Humphrey as president, but he said, "I'm not a cocktail rider." Collins, son of a Tallahassee grocer, graduated from the University of Florida, served in the Navy in World War II, and was a stand-out legislator for 18 years before his election as governor.

As permanent chairman of the Democratic National Convention in 1960, he made such an impression on the national television audience he was named president of the National Association of Broadcasters.

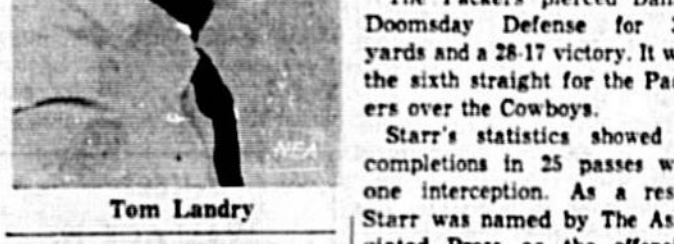

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Medical News

You don't have to be an alcoholic to damage your health by drinking. You can do it by tipping a few martinis at lunch, downing a couple on the commuter special home after a trying day at the office, then having an aperitif before dinner, and ending the day with a nightcap.

A Health Insurance Institute report of a medical study shows that alcohol is poisonous to the liver and can, over a period of time, cause "lethal liver damage."

In the study, a group of volunteers drank what was considered a typical executive's intake. The equivalent of seven ounces of 40-proof whiskey for four days, then 11 ounces for two days, and finally 14 ounces for two to three days. This group, it was found, showed a five-to-13 fold increase in its liver fat level. Although fat level increases and cell damage were reversible after a few days or weeks of abstinence, one physician-researcher emphasized that "steady damage over a long period may be irreversible."

He warned that social drinkers may look and feel well, never get drunk, yet harm themselves seriously in the long run.

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How Do Women Measure Up At The Polls?

In spite of chronic finger-pointing and headbanging by politicos and political pundits — all ineffectually — male-about what they consider a pitiful performance by women on election days, the truth is that the women's voting record is getting steadily better, and the men's may be getting worse.

In the days before women's suffrage, which came in 1920, the percentage of voting was of the high, with a peak in the 1916 election of 83.8 per cent. In the last presidential election in 1964, it was 62 per cent.

After the 19th Amendment was passed, the first election day was a historic occasion for the girls, but only about 25 per cent of them had the gumption to exercise their right. It didn't help things that the polls often were stashed in the back of posthalls and other undesirable places to discourage "nice" women from performing the un-ladylike chore of marking a ballot.

Over the years increasing numbers of women have become voters until the 1966 election when, according to Department of Commerce statistics, more women voted than men, 31.8 million women to 30.7 million men.

The rub, of course, lies in the percentages. There were 60 million women of voting age compared with 52.8 million men, which means that 58 per cent of male voters went to the polls, compared with 53 per cent of women.

But however you look at it, women are becoming an ever more potent power at the polls. All kinds of people from politicians to sociologists to those of special interests blocs are finding the woman voter a fascinating creature. They are busily surveying, observing and analyzing to discover how she arrives at the decision to do what ever she does in the voting booth.

They think they have come up with some clues to the voting habits of American women, whom they think are generally pretty ill informed about political facts.

Women voters, they say, think for themselves (although) discreet wiles let it be known they voted the way their husbands did, not all go along with their spouses once they're in the booth), are generally less interested in foreign than in domestic affairs (for example, the issue of the war in Vietnam doesn't bother them as much as law and order at home), are more interested in candidates than issues, have a conservative bent, are more isolationist than men, vote as individuals and not as a bloc, and have less party loyalty than men.

Although there is supposed to be no such thing as "the woman's vote," the stubborn notion persists that women are influenced by such emotional considerations as a candidate's looks, voice and skill at baby-kissing.

Mrs. Bruce Benson, of Amherst, Mass., national president of the non-partisan League of Women Voters, says: "It's terribly important for all citizens to vote. They have a responsibility to vote because they're people, not because they're men or women and it's self-defeating to keep pointing out their differences."

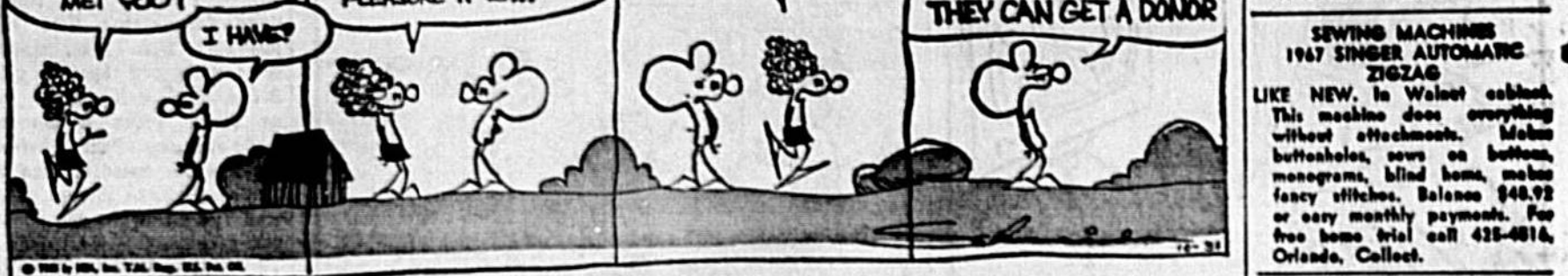
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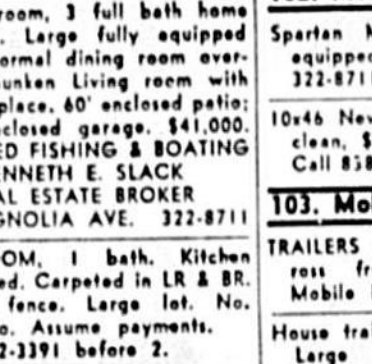

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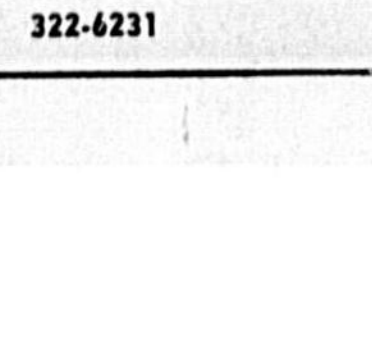

U. S. Doles \$5.5 Billion In Highway Funds

ROSES JOHN APPEBY POTTED PLANTS

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Department of Transportation has appropriated \$5.5 billion in Federal aid for highway funds starting next July 1.

The bulk of the new funds—\$4 billion—is earmarked for expansion of the interstate highway system, for which the total about \$775 million more than was made available for the current year, the department announced Wednesday.

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The fiscal 1970 federal apportionment for primary, secondary and urban highways totals \$1.22 billion, an increase of \$225 million over this year's total. Under these programs, most states match federal grants on a 50-50 basis.

The apportionment includes \$495 for primary roads, \$530 million for the secondary system of farm-to-market and feeder roads and \$275 for urban portions of the primary system.

Next year's federal highway aid total includes \$200 million to increase the capacity and safety of streets and roads—a program designated "Topics"—and \$100 million for a new program to provide advance acquisition of rights-of-way.
