





# Lake Mary Hopes To Hire Police Chief

LAKE MARY - City council here hopes to hire a new police chief Wednesday night at it's regular monthly meeting, barely a month slice its former chief resigned.

It will also consider a proposal to reform city purchasing and bookkeeping practices as well as a measure which will strip its fire chief of most of his Council members met Friday and Saturday to

interview prospective applicants for the \$10,500 year police chief post which was vacated Jan. 14

when Gerald Fitzgerald resigned. At Wednesday's meeting, Mayor Walter Sorenson is slated to call for the city to institute a purchase requisition system with an eye to eventually hiring a purchasing agent.

He told The Herald in an interview, "There is no order to the (bookkeeping) system now," and "b okkeeping methods need to be improved." "With a budget of \$150,000 plus," the city needs to adopt "normal, sane business practices,"

Council will also consider a proposal calling for the creation and appointment of a five-man com-

mission composed of volunteer firemen to overseee Fire Chief Chuck Smith's spending.

All expenditures over \$150 of city funds proposed by the chief would have to be reviewed and approved by the Fire commission if the proposal is

Sorenson said no one "big thing" prompted his decision to call for the purchasing reforms except the discovery, during a recent budget review, that it is "hard to figure out what is being spent." That budget review revealed the city had a surplus of about \$20,000 in unallocated and unanticipated





### **Developer Raps Agnew** Over Partnership Break

EVANSVILLE, Ind. (AP) - Real estate developer Walter J. Dilbeck Jr. says former Vice President Spiro T. Agnew made a lot of money and connections during their partnership and left Dilbeck all the problems. Agnew announced Friday he was terminating his one-year, \$100,000 contract with Dilbeck because Dilbeck exploited their business relationship and defaulted on a final \$25,000 installment. However, Dilbeck says Agnew is the exploiter. "I haven't received a dime from him and he's taken \$75,000 from me. I gave him a free ride. Everybody knew he was broke when I hired him," Dilbeck said.

### Vacation Plan Works

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - Some senior citizens who live on fixed incomes in low-income public housing can now take vacations they couldn't afford before. They do it by swapping homes in an federal experiment called the "Vacation Residential Exchange" program. Portland is one of six cities involved in the program, sponsored by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Beginning April 21, twenty senior citizens living in two housing authority high-rise structures will swap places with 20 others from Sacramento, Calif., for 10 days. Travel will be by plane and train. The project includes an exchange of apartments, beds and bedding, and friends in what HEW officials hope will be burgeon into a nationwide program.

### Simon Sees Late Upturn

WASHINGTON (AP) - Treasury Secretary William E. Simon says he expects the nation's economic upturn will begin in the final three months of the year, which is later than earlier administration forecasts. Simon and other administration economic advisers had predicted until recently that the nation's economic slowdown would reach bottom in midyear, with an economic recovery beginning in the second half.





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

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# Clean Air Goals Essential Items

The word "strangulation" has been a common one in international dialogue in recent weeks as oil consuming nations assess how far oil exporting countries can push them toward the brink of insolvency before they react with force.

Strangulation again became a subject of discussion - indirectly - when the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency said that catalytic converters being installed on 1975 automobiles will create a new respiratory health hazard within three years. The converters are installed to reduce the volume of nitrous oxides that auto engines produce. EPA says that they also will manufacture intolerable levels of sulphuric acid mist. The magnitude of the problem is evident in the

fact that catalytic mufflers are the primary tool that American automobile manufacturers will use to meet the clean air standards established by federal law.

Again the citizen of the United States of America is caught between a rock and a hard place. If he values his health and his natural surroundings, a citizen should insist that provisions of the federal environmental law should be followed strictly. The law requires that exhaust pollution must be reduced by 90 per cent from 1970 levels in about a year.

On the other hand if the citizen places his economic well-being first, he should support efforts in Washington to delay imposition of clean air deadlines for another five years.

The dilemma is not new in the United States. Few persons in the nation probably remember that the first clean air laws in the United States were passed in 1955 - fully 20 years ago - when Congress appropriated \$5 million to support air pollution studies. The first Clean Air Act was approved in 1963 - and endowed with more teeth in 1965, 1967, and 1970.

Each of the years was an environmental milestone and, during each of the years, citizens again debated the proper compromise between wholesome environments and economic needs.

After spending hundreds of millions of dollars in studies, subsidies, enforcement and administration, it is apparent that the solution still



# Author Followed By CIA

JACK ANDERSON

WASHINGTON - Philip Agee, who wrote the latest quit-and-tell book about the Central Intelligence Agency, has complained that the CIA constantly watches his movements.

We can confirm his complaint; we can also report what the CIA has found out about him. Sources with access to the surveillance reports say that Agee was observed meeting with Cuban intelligence agents in Paris during the 1971-72 period and that he has made four trips to Havana.

This is significant, say our sources, because Agree spent 10 years as a CIA field officer in Latin America. He worked against the Cuban DRI which, by formal agreement, is the intelligence arm for the Soviet KGB in most Latin American countries.

By his own admission, Agree helped foment a diplomatic break between Cuba and Ecuador, supervised operations against Cuban diplomats in Uruguay and helped monitor Soviet-Cuban contacts in South America. No one with this background could visit Cuba,

our sources contend, unless he has made a deal with DRI. He would have had to satisfy the Soviet-Cuban spy apparatus that he not only was divulging full information about his past CIA activities but that he was not a double agent seeking to ingratiate himself with the opposition, our sources say.

Agee has said he turned against the CIA because it was "promoting fascism around the world." As a CIA operative, he felt he was partly responsible for the brutal tortures that various Latin American police practiced on their
