#### Finest Waterfall

The least known great waterfall in the world, and the most impressive, is the way Edward C. Rashleigh described the Paulo Affonso on the Sao Francisco river in Brazil. Rashleigh is a British geographer who has seen most of the world's great cataracts and some years ago wrote a book describing them, "Among the Waterfalls of the World." They have now been brought to American attention by the visit here of President Dutra of Brazil, who reports that Paulo Affonso is to be harnessed to make a

Brazilian TVA. The falls and the river on which they are situated are equally unfamiliar to most Americans. Yet the Sao Francisco is over 1800 miles long, and is reckoned the 16th or 17th largest river in the world. Paulo Affonso is located only 200 miles from its mouth, which is unusual, as most waterfalls are found early in a river's progress. It is her-alded by tremendous rapids which Rashleigh calls incomparably the most magnificent in the world, even surpassing Niagara. This is certainly the highest praise possible. The falls are about 200 feet high, higher than Niagara, and have the fourth largest volume of water of any of the world's great cataracts. #### Finest Waterfall

The least known great waterfall in the world, and the most impressive, is the way Edward C. Rashleigh described the Paulo Affonso on the Sao Francisco river in Brazil. Rashleigh is a British geographer who has seen most of the world's great cataracts and some years ago wrote a book describing them, "Among the Waterfalls of the World." They have now been brought to American attention by the visit here of President Dutra of Brazil, who reports that Paulo Affonso is to be harnessed to make a

Brazilian TVA. The falls and the river on which they are situated are equally unfamiliar to most Americans. Yet the Sao Francisco is over 1800 miles long, and is reckoned the 16th or 17th largest river in the world. Paulo Affonso is located only 200 miles from its mouth, which is unusual, as most waterfalls are found early in a river's progress. It is her-alded by tremendous rapids which Rashleigh calls incomparably the most magnificent in the world, even surpassing from the University of Washing-Niagara. This is certainly the highest praise possible. The falls are about 200 feet high, higher than Niagara, and have the fourth largest volume of water of any of the world's great cataracts.
