# Stadium plans aired

SANEORD After several years of consideration regarding the future of the Sanford Memorial Stadium, it now appears as though it will again become a major focal point for Central Florida sports activi-

Listening to Randy Johnson. president and CEO of the Central Florida Sports Authority. one may get the opinion that Sanford's stadium will soon be drawing thousands of players and supporters to the area. possibly more than ever be-

According to Johnson's estimates, if the stadium is put back into the scope of use predicted by the authority, it could see an estimated economic inpact of \$1.2 million by the 1999 season.

Johnson made an appearance at the Sanford City Commission work session Monday afternoon, explaining what may be expected at the stadium if the city enters into a full-partnership agreement with the Central Florida Sports Authority

The Authority is a non-profit organization created to attract international, national and regional events, as well as sports-related business and activities to the Central Florida area. It is funded by five counties, Seminole, Orange, Osceola, Lake and Volusia. along with the cities of Altamonte Springs and Oviedo With approval by Sanford a third city would be added to the conglomerate.

The widening, now estimated to begin in approximately two years, is from Lake Mary, past Sanford, to the Saxon Boulevard exit in Deltona. 

## Get shots now for 7th-graders

## Special to the Herald

Middle school nurses and guidance counselors in Seminole County are working together to inform current 6th graders of changes in immunization requirements for 7th graders in the 1998-99 school vear.

The Department of Health and Department of Education changes mean it can take up to 6 months to complete the Hepatitis B series.

The requirements are: T.D. booster (tetanus, diphtheria) unless a booster has been given in the past five years. This booster is not optional. Second measles (preferably MMR) Hepatitis B series (#1 given - #2 due 1 month later -#3 due 5 months later)

These immunizations must be completed before students can enter 7th grade next achool year.

Students should take the completed Florida Certificate of immunization (680 blue form) to his/her Middle School by May 1, even if the shot series is in progress.

These immunizations can be given by your family healthcare provider or the Public Health Department located at the following addresses: Public Health Department, 400 W. Airport Blvd., Sanford, Fl 322-2724 or Public Health Department, Wilahire Plaza - S.R. 436, Casselberry, 331-4020.



# Prosecutors want boy, 14, indicted for Murder One

SANFORD - Jonathan Arce, 14, could be tried as an adult for the murder of 68-year old Jean Stillman. Prosecutors are asking a grand jury presiding over the case to handle Arce as an adult and to indict him for first degree murder,

Arce is being charged with the murder of Stillman, who was slain in her garage on March 10. The Oviedo police are still investigating the scene of the crime to try and formulate a motive that the boy may have had at the time of the at-

Over two dozen wounds were found on the woman's body. The assatlant used anything from a kitchen knife to a variety of garden tools. The medical examiner ruled that Stillman died from a wound to her

Prosecutors are trying to get a life-in-prison sentence for Arce. Because the boy is under the age of 16, state law

prohibits him from being sentenced to the electric chair. He is presently being kept at the county's Juvenile detention fa-

cility. According to Arce's statement. Stillman was upset with him and she wanted him to come into her house so that she could confront him. The boy said that she came at him with a knife.

Stillman left a list on a table in her home of missing items that the police discovered. When police gained a search warrant, they found some of the items on the list in Arce's possession.

Arce's peers at Oviedo High School said that the boy was involved in gang activity at his former home in Miami. He joined the student body at Oviedo this past October, but skipped school a lot, according to students. A teacher at the high school told the Seminole Herald that Arce wore his collar up, a sign of possible gang

# Golf course lease plans at a standstill

Harrison referred to Warren E. "Pete" Knowles having appeared before the commission twice in recent times, to request consideration of the lease agreement. "But he never received any satisfaction," Harrison said.

Mayor Larry Dale quickly responded that Knowles had not appeared before the commission on two occasions. "He was only here once," Dale said, and the proposal was never given to the city where it could be placed on an official agenda. Mr. Knowles only brought it up from the floor during citizen participation. It was never an agendized item."
"Nonetheless," Harrison con-

tinued, "the purchaser's letter

of intent time limit ran out and we have been unable to get an extension of the letter of intent." He added that the letter of intent had been in his hands since December.


"Then why didn't we even see the letter until February 23rd?" Dale questioned.

He added, "From what I have seen, this proposal called for the assignment of a clear title to United Golf, and I couldn't recommend it. I suggest the matter be tabled."



# The NIMBY attitude

Sanford doesn't need just one new hotel, such as that proposed for the Fort Mellon Park area. It needs two or three hotels, with convention facilities as well.

The SeminoleHerald editorials have mentioned this before, and will, no doubt, bring it up again in the future. Hotels bring people and people bring improvements in the local economy. Overall, everyone will benefit --from our local governments to businesses and individual residents.

There are many organizations which conduct conventions on an annual basis. For example, the Florida Association of Circuit Court Clerks. Each year that group draws over a thousand people for three days. Circuit Court Clerks rotate in various locations across the state, almost always in cities which are county seats. But they can only hold these conventions in areas where there are adequate convention facilities. Surely, it would be impossible to hold it in Sanford.

Look at what is happening. Our high schools are all going out of the area for their major events such as graduations. The Central Florida Zoological Park holds its annual fundraising galas out of the area. Local fund-raising events draw hundreds when they could draw thousands.

There could even be difficulties with the proposed improvements at the historic Sanford Memorial Stadium. Should predicted influxes of sports events blossom as expected, where would teams, supporters and fans stay while events are under way? Yes, we have some outstanding places to stay, but not to house thousands of visitors.

Look at what could be done if we had adequate hotel and convention facilities. Most conventions offer spare time. People staying in Sanford could visit the zoo, take a cruise on the St. Johns River, go for comfortable walks along the lakefront, even make a fishing trip.

Yet people object. They say the city doesn't need a major hotel. In effect, they are actually saying they don't want to see the city, its merchants and its citizens prosper. While most would deny it, they simply don't want progress, although they constantly scream for lower taxes, better paved streets, better street lighting and more places at which to

Progress cannot come and will not come to our area as iong as citizens continue to take the "NIMBY" approach (Not in My Back Yard).

Sapford is a great city in which to live and work. It will become even better, but unfortunately, until we eliminate this NIMBY attitude, it may take so many years to accomplish, that none of us alive now will ever prosper from the changes.

With this perspective, it is easy to see the direction of the chamber. Weinberg and that 50 percent of the people who live in Seminole County work there but they live here and they spend here. # Slow-pitch to return

# SAC to offer girls' slow-pitch softball this fall

SANFORD Starting next year, there's a good chance there will be two Seminole Athletic Conference Softball champions each season.

County athletic directors and school administrators have approved adding fall slow-pitch softball to the list of sports offered by Seminole County schools. Slow-pitch Joins girls weightlifting and girls' wrestling as new sports being offered under federal gender equity laws.

Play will begin in September and Oviedo Athletic Director Paul Greer said it is probable that the FHSAA will sanction the sports and recognize state champions. (Editor's note \_ The FIISAA recently tabled a vote on whether to sanction slow-pitch softball for 1998).

Greer said that one-third of all state schools must participate in order for the sport to be sanctioned as an official state title sport.

Seven schools in Seminole County, including Lake Mary, lake Howell, Lake Brantley, Winter Springs, Oviedo, Lyman and Seminole, will offer

Lake Mary Athletic Director Doug Peters said that even if the sport isn't offered as a statesanctioned sport, it would be a conferencerecognized sport, much like boys volleyball which crowns a VolleyFest champion each fall. Greer said the credit belongs to Seminole Athletic Director and baseball coach Mike Pow-

"Mike Powers came up with the idea and we all have to give him full credit," Greer said. Powers has already put together a schedule for next fall, including a tournament involving each of the county teams to be held at Lake Brantley on Sept. 12. All games would be played on Saturday's at one site, with each school hosting on a rotating schedule (i.e., Seminole one week, Lake Mary the next, etc.).

Seminole County schools played slow-pitch until five years ago when the county switched to state-mandated fast-pitch. Oreer said that since most college programs only offer fast-pitch the change was made to ensure a better opportunity to receive athletic scholarships.

With federal gender equity laws requiring an equal number of opportunities for males and females and the inclusion of a large number of football players into the equation, athletic directors have been scrambling to even the playing field.



# Canada offers 'belly buster' dinner

New Brunswick Roast Chicken and Bread Stuffing with White Wine Gravy

I first crossed paths with this "belly buster" dinner at a small mountain inn outside of Mount Careton Provincial Park in northern New Brunswick, Canada.

The preparation and cooking takes about 2 hours which makes it more suitable for a weekend or day off cooking. This recipe will feed 4 to 6 people depending on how many belt loops they want to loosen. Ingredients:

5-6 lbs. whole roasting chicken 1/2 cup each finely chopped onion, celery, green bell pep-

2 cloves fresh garlic chopped very fine 6 slices bacon

2 cups seasoned bread crumbs I large egg

I tap, poultry seasoning 1/4 tsp. each onion powder, white pepper

5 tbs. butter I cup white wine [Zinfandel or Chablts]

Note: Do not buy or use cooking wines. If you don't want to drink it, don't cook



5 baking potatoes cut in quar-

6 carrots but into 3 inch pieces 5 medium onlons cut in quar-

4 ths. Roux (see tip of the 1/4 tsp. paprika 1 chicken bouillon cube

Btock: Wash chicken completely. Remove organ pack. In 1-1/2 cups of water dissolve bouillon cube and boll neck, gizzard, heart and liver for 4.5 minutes. Put aside to cool.

Stuffing: Sauté chopped onion, pepper, garlic and celery in 1 ths. butter until onlons are slightly transparent. Partially fry bacon and chop into small (3/8 (nch) pieces. In a large mixing bowl mix egg, bread crumbs, sauté vegetables, 1/2 tsp. poultry seasoning, 1/4 tsp. each pepper, onion powder, and bacon. Add 1/2 cup stock and mix, stuffing should be a sticky dough conalatency.

Chicken: Preheat over to 350 degrees. Stuff both body and neck cavities with stuffing mix. Paint chicken with 1 tbs. melted butter and sprinkle lightly with poultry seasoning and paprika. Pour 1/2 cup each of wine and stock into bottom of a large covered roasting pan. Place chicken with vegetable pieces surrounding chicken into pan, cover and cook for 1 hour. Remove cover and cook for additional 45 minutes. (Note: cooking times are approximate, always use a meat thermometer to check internal temp.) If chicken starts to get too brown replace cover and continue cooking until internal temp. teaches 170 degrees.

Gravy: When chicken is finished cooking pour all dripping from roast pan into a large fry pan. Add 1/2 tsp. poultry seasoning, 1/2 cup each wine and stock. Bring mixture to a light boil and stir in roux. Continue to stir until gravy thickens.

Serve: Place chicken on a large serving platter surrounded by baked vegetables. Serve gravy separate. Add your favorite green vegetable as a side dish. With dinner rolls and a small salad this meal will satisfy your biggest eaters.

Cost Breakdown: Chicken, Food Lion \$.69/lb. - \$4.14; Onton, Pepper, Carrots, Garlie, Winn-Dide - \$1.60; Bread crumbs, Merita Bread Store -\$.40, all other ingredients approximately cost \$2.50 - Total Cost \$8.84.

pan. Repeat layers, ending with cheese. Pour egg mixture over each layer as it is completed. Cut reserved tortilla into 3/4 inch wide strips, brush with a little egg mixture. Arrange strips over strata. Bring foil over top and refrigerate 8 hours or overnight. To bake, preheat oven to 350 degrees F. place strata on cookie sheet and bring foll straight up to uncover and to support





# Microwaved food is safe

DEAR DR. GOTT: Is there any health hazard from eating food that has been cooked in a microwave oven?

DEAR READER: None whatsoever. In fact, such food may actually be more nutrillous because the cooking time is lessened.

For example, if you boil your vegetables (rather than steaming or microwaving them), they will undergo many minutes of preparation. This prolonged exposure to heat may leach out vital minerals and nutrients. Contrast this to microwaving, in which food can be prepared in seconds or minutes. Moreover, because microwaves contain no X-rays, they do not cause any potential health haz-

I like to microwave my vegetables because the process is environmentally more responsible than standard oven cooking. My baked potatoes are ready to eat after five minutes of microwaving, compared to 45 minutes in a customary oven. This uses less energy — and it's fast.

When I was growing up, the pressure cooker was the appliance of choice: It cooked food in minutes. Now the microwave is in, although I continue to pressure-cook artichokes, a favorite treat

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am an 82 yearold woman with an elevated blood level of alkaline phosphatase. It has progressively increased annually for the past three years and is now 454 units per liter. Should I worry about

DEAR READER: In my opinion, yes. The alkaline phosphatase is an enzyme manufactured in the liver and in bone. The normal value is 30 to 120 units per liter. Although the level often increases as we age, this increase is usually trivial. Similarly, levels in adolescents are often elevated, reflecting rapid bone growth.

More important, increased amounts of the enzyme often indicate serious bone or liver diseases, including metastatic cancer, Paget's disease, gallstones and cirrhosis. Some malignancies, especially lung tumors and lymphoma, are associated with high alkaline phosphatase levels, as are heart failure and blood clots in the lungs.

While some authorities discourage testing in elderly patients with isolated increases in alkaline phosphalase, most of my patients want answers and

are willing to undergo moderate testing to identify any treatable problems. Such testing should, in my view, include blood tests of liver function, a blood count, chest X-ray, and a bone scan. Ask your doctor about this. Your alkaline phosphatase is quite high. I suspect that you have Paget's disease DR. GOTT PETER GOTT, M.D.

of bone, a common and treatable disorder that causes weak spots which may easily fracture. Therefore, I think that further testing is advisable.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Every time I urlnate in the toilet, I leave a pink ring in the bowl. This has been going on for about a year. Should I be concerned? DEAR READER: Although such a

discoloration could be caused by a substance in the toilet water, I suspect that the ring you described may actually be blood in your urine. Because even small amounts of urinary blood could reflect a serious underlying disease - such as a tumor or a dangerous kidney disease - I urge you to bring this symptom to your doctor's attention. With blood and urine tests, he should be able to determine if the pink ring is coming from you (and needs treatment) or from the water supply in your bathroom (in which case, a plumber is in order).

## The oft overlooked danger

When beginners are learning how to play in a suit contract, they are taught to count losers. Fine, as far as it goes. But in my experience, they tend not to worry about third-round losers, usually with fatal consequences.

For an intermezzo, after partner opens one heart, what would you respond with the North hand in the diagram? Next, for the concerto, how would you plan the play in four hearts after West has led the spade king?


If you (wisely!) use the limit raise, you have no problem: You respond three hearts. But if you play the forcing raise, you have a big problem. You overbid (or misbid) with four hearts, being down to three.

If, after winning trick one, you lead a trump immediately, you lose four consecutive tricks: the heart ace, two spades and the club ace.

You must do something to eliminate | West one of those spade losers. In other circumstances, leading a club at trick . A two, establishing a club winner for a discard, would be fine. But here that play is too slow; the defenders still get four tricks.

There is only one chance of success. Immediately play a diamond to dummy's ace, then finesse your diamond jack. True, if the finesse loses, you go two down when you could have settled for one down.
