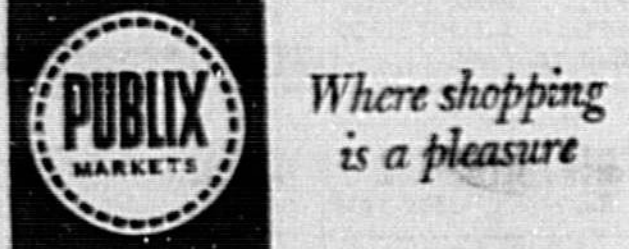

'Nothing Cooking Now' On Huge Land Deal

Speculation of an impending land development involving 3,200 acres of Lake County property owned by 38 shareholders was denied today by Ernest Southward, trustee of the Magnolia Tract property.

Southward said, "There was nothing cooking concerning the property right now" when questioned about a rumored sale of the tract for developmental purposes.

Southward said the acreage located across Wekiva River Bridge and north of SR 46 near Blackwater Creek had been put together four years ago.

The property is located near the area recently bought by state for creation of a public park.

Persons holding shares in the tract include Jeno Paulucci, Dr. Vann Parker, Russell Firestone Jr., Thomas McDonald and Dr. William Epps.

In the meantime, another real estate deal involving a reported 2,000 acres of property near Goldenrod and Casselberry is expected in the immediate future.

It was noted that a recent acquisition of 200 acres of land in the area by William J. Goodman and N. A. Rossman of Orlando would be used according to Goodman "for residential development in the near future."

Goodman was questioned by The Herald concerning the larger transaction and would only say "we have nothing to announce at this time."

He did indicate that an announcement might be forthcoming in the near future concerning housing projects.

The telegram also requested that Red Bug Road, Wekiva River Road, SD 46 east and

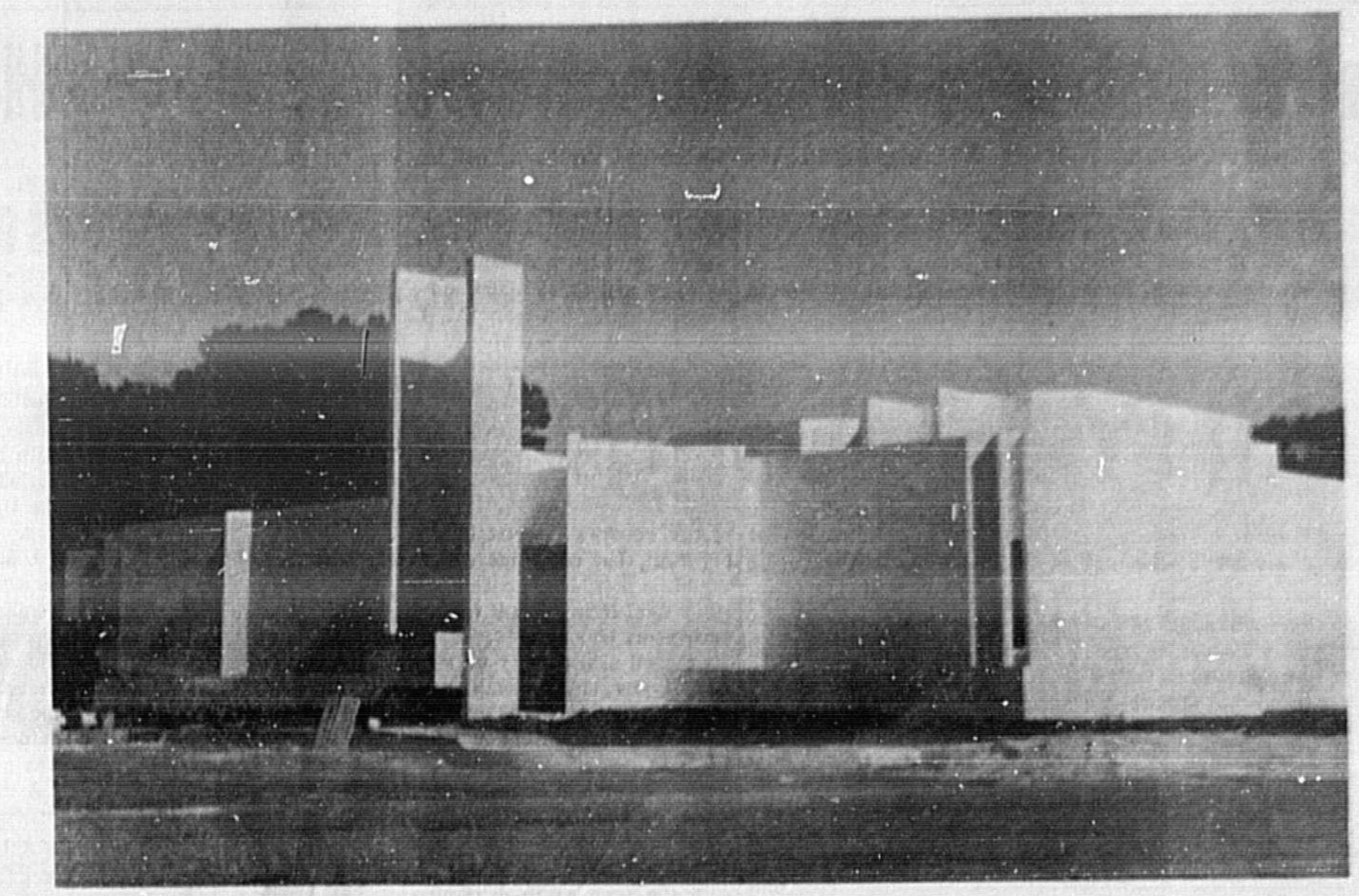
5419 be included in the proposed 16-year road program.

Casselberry Police Vacancies

Fireworks almost fired again last night at a Casselberry city council meeting over an apparently former employee and a police department.

Councilman Richard Wirtz, questioned why the police department had three vacancies which had not been filled, especially with the Christmas season now underway.

Casselberry Mayor Curtia Blow replied that he had not received any applications that had been fully processed by city police chief Donald Brumley.

The mayor said that he requires FBI clearance on each police applicant, a favorable recommendation from the applicants' former employer and a polygraph test.

With the existing vacancies not being filled, the department was overworked according to Blow, putting in as much as 100 hours overtime per week.

In his defense Brumley explained one particular incident to the council, after being questioned about an officer who had hired on a temporary basis until receipt of employment references. Blow claimed that he had not seen these references and this is why the officer was still on a probationary status.

Brumley countered that he had the references along with the application to the mayor when the individual first asked for employment.

Blow was on hand at the meeting to ask for a probationary okay for three prospective patrolmen and a radio operator when the bickering broke out over the procedure used to hire police.

The Casselberry police had agreed with councilman Wirtz that the vacant posts must be filled to insure city security and this is why the officer was over the procedure used to hire police.

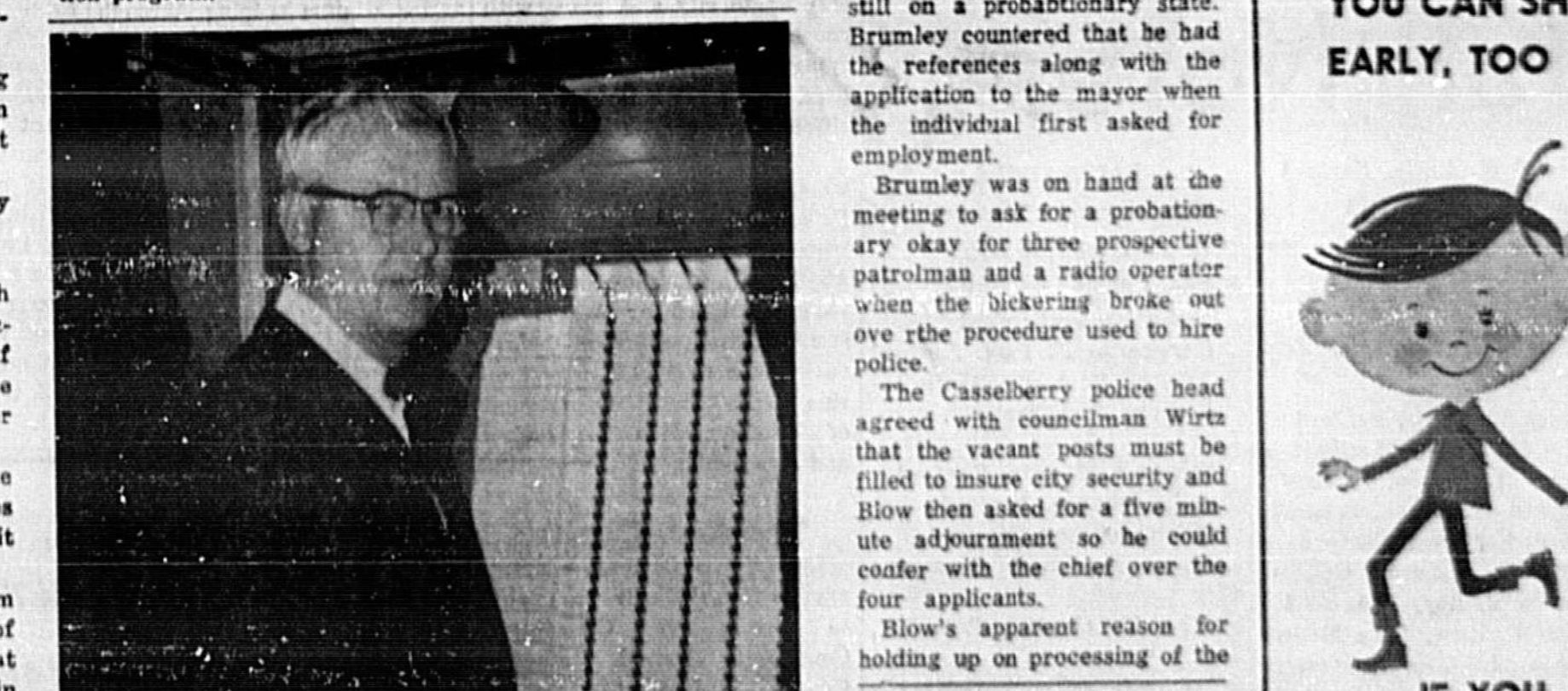

Calloway Given Six Months

Trials began in Circuit Court yesterday, and were presided over with such precision and dignity that Judge E. Thom Humberger commented to jurors that several cases were adjudicated during the morning session which normally took two weeks.

Elizabeth Calloway, who was charged with second degree murder in the death of her small daughter entered a plea of guilty to the lesser charge of child neglect. The child was found dead by brothers and sisters in a vermin infested home. Mrs. Calloway was given the maximum sentence of six months, four of which were suspended. She will serve 48 days in jail, and then be placed on probation for 3 1/2 years. Should she violate the terms of probation, she will serve the suspended sentence. Public Defender, Ned Julian, termed the case an "indictment against the welfare system of Florida."

Harry Waters Jr., entered a plea of guilty to possession of marijuana. His attorney, Mike Sigman, of Orlando, gave an impassioned plea for leniency of the court. Sigman said that the 27 year old youth was not "a bad person, only did a bad thing." The defendant served four months in jail, after which he spent eight months at liberty at his parents home. The defendant ran a business for an invalid father, and led an uneventful life, according to his attorney. However, the youth broke probation by being out after hours a week ago.

Sigman said that the defendant had learned his lesson, and that he "would never appear in court again, if given a second chance." Judge Valle Williams Jr. granted the plea to six months on the sale. Judge Williams sentenced the youth to six months for four years at Raiford.

In other cases heard before Judge Humberger, Earl Dupree was charged with escape entered a guilty plea and was sentenced to 6-20 months.

National Lottery Fixes Draft Of Young Americans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Men from 18 to 26 years old born on Sept. 14 who have last names starting with the letter J will be the first ones drafted next month under the nation's first

Selective Service lottery in a generation. In less than an hour and a half Monday night, all 365 days of the year plus Leap Year's birthday will be called for the first time in a big glass laboratory jar from which names are drawn at random from a list of 10 million young men.

The order in which they emerged, rolled up in blue plastic capsules, determines the order in which men with matching birthdays will be called for the draft next year — or, for those now deferred or exempt — in any future year when they become "1-A."

Rep. Alexander Pirnie of New York, ranking Republican on the House subcommittee on the Selective Service System, took turns drawing the rest of the dates. The second one drawn was April 24; then came Dec. 30; then Feb. 14, Oct. 18, Sept. 4, Oct. 25, Sept. 7, Nov. 2, Dec. 6, and so on.

Kirk Appeals To Solons For Funds

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Here are excerpts from Gov. Claude Kirk's speech Monday before a joint session of the Legislature on its opening day of a 10-day special session on roads and primary election dates.

"Many of you have asked—

and others of you may wonder—whether there is really an emergency in road development."

"In the months which have elapsed since you last adjourned—and even before that—I have traveled throughout the state. I have listened to the people's de-

mands for more roads... I am here today to appeal to you. I come in the role of the chief of the executive branch to recommend to you, the legislative branch, a solution to one of the greatest problems confronting the economic future of our state."

"In my view, the problem is nonpartisan. It is just as serious and just as nonpolitical as was the production of a new constitution."

"Truthfully, I cannot find it in my heart to believe that any member of the Legislature would seriously defend our present road system as adequate."

"I must assume—or I would never have issued this call—that the majority of the Legislature recognizes our present highway transportation system for what it is—a patchwork of neglect and unfulfilled dreams caused by a lack of long-range planning."

"It is my earnest hope that you are fully aware of the emergency..."

"In order to speed up our action for today and to move toward the requirements inevitably coming in the future, you are here to consider a 15-year plan."

Moore, Higginbotham Face Run-Off Skop Challenges Entire Vote

Lee P. Moore and Earl Higginbotham will face each other in a run-off election on Dec. 16 for mayor-commissioner of Sanford. Canvassing board early this afternoon counted 19 absentee ballots; Moore, 10; Higginbotham, 8, and Skop, 1. Moore missed by five votes winning yesterday's election by a majority.

A defeated candidate in Tuesday's municipal election raised the question today whether the voting was legal since the City of Sanford failed to publish a sample ballot as required by law. An adverse decision also could invalidate the municipal elections held Tuesday at Altamonte Springs, Casselberry and Longwood.

Harry Skop, low man of three running for mayor-commissioner of Sanford, cited paragraph 101.20 (2) of the election laws of Florida, which reads, in part: "Upon completion of the list of qualified candidates, the board of County Commissioners shall publish in a newspaper of general circulation, in the county at least seven days before any primary or general election of whatever nature, a sample ballot form..."

Sanford Run-Off Set Dec. 16

Skop was presenting his argument before the Sanford vote canvassing board early this afternoon at City Hall. Unofficial count gave incumbents Lee P. Moore 363 and Earl Higginbotham 297, and Skop 276. Moore lacked 11 votes to tally a majority plus one to clinch the election. Canvassers were making the official count, plus 19 absentee ballots. Moore needs 15 of the 19 absentee ballots to avoid a run-off with Higginbotham on Dec. 16.

A disappointing 2,028 persons, or less than 40 per cent of registered city voters, chose a Sanford insurance man to run for mayor-commissioner.

Voters in Altamonte Springs, apparently pleased with accomplishments during the last nine years with "no new taxes," returned Mayor W. Lawrence Swafford to office for his fifth consecutive term with a 177 vote majority. With 19 absentee ballots remaining to be canvassed, the tabulation stands at 432 votes for Swafford and 273 for his Republican contender, John Falkenberg Jr.

Incumbent councilman, Keith Nixon, from District 1, also won handsily over his opponent, Kenneth Plank. Nixon gathered 629 votes to Plank's 288. Mrs. Helen Keyser, unopposed candidate for the District 2 seat presently held by William Nichols, received 388 votes.

Altamonte 'No New Taxes'

No apathy existed in the election, with 729 of Altamonte's 875 registered voters going to the polls, exceeding all expectations at 83 per cent.

Swafford was the object of considerable controversy in the weeks. Council authorized city attorney, S. Joseph Davis to collect a sum of \$306 incurred in out-of-town expenses by Swafford. If the amount was not collected Davis was authorized to institute suit for recovery.

Swafford was also the target of criticism in an audit by State Auditor, Ernest Ellison in which several expenditures were in question. In both instances Swafford contended that expenses were legitimate and that he had no intention of re-imbursing the city.

An elated Longwood housewife and mother of two, Mrs. Sandra Thompson, became the first woman in the city's history to be elected to the city council in yesterday's municipal election when she garnered 198 votes.

Mrs. Thompson's two young daughters were her principal motivators for seeking the office as she felt on the council she could more effectively work for the kind of a town for her to grow up in. One of her goals is to work for a civic center where young people as well as old may gather for their activities.

Longwood 'Mother' In Politics

Casselberry voters, some 651 strong out of the city's total registration of 1,262 eligible voters, turned out yesterday and voted apparent solid approval for the city's incumbent mayor and two incumbent councilmen.

In the majority race, incumbent Curtis Blow faced opposition from real estate broker Raymond Morris and service station operator Arthur Lego. Lego was a former Casselberry city councilman and was bidding for re-election after an absence of two terms.

In the race, Blow overwhelmed his two opponents by receiving 255 votes compared to second running Morris who garnered 181 votes while Lego tallied 126 votes.

In the city council race, incumbent chairman Dr. Edith Duerr proved to be the city's top vote-getter, netting 459 votes. She was followed by incumbent councilman and barber shop operator William Grice, who tallied 245 votes and was also returned to his office.

Dr. Duerr and Grice faced opposition from youthful Stuart Thompson and William Meyerhofer. Thompson rolled up 231 votes in his initial election bid while Meyerhofer picked up 137 votes and ran fourth in the council race.

During the city campaign, Mayor Blow pointed to several projects which had been started under his administration and asked for the voters to return him for completion of these projects. These projects included the proposed city utilities takeover by Casselberry and a joint animal control proposal that could be used in four of South Seminole's municipalities including Casselberry, Longwood, Altamonte and North Orlando.

The two incumbent councilmen, Dr. Duerr and Grice, pointed to their records of watching tax dollars and being the people's voice in all city matters.

This will mark Dr. Duerr's third term on the council while Blow and Grice will be returning to the city body for their second terms.

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Nursing Home Buy Is Hit

A Sanford doctor has opposed the purchase of Seminole Lodge nursing home by Seminole County for use by Seminole Memorial Hospital as an annex and holding center for mentally ill patients awaiting transfer to state hospitals for treatment.

Dr. W. Vincent Roberts, Sanford obstetrician and city commissioner, is a strong proponent of the purchase. He said he had prepared a statement for a joint meeting of the hospital board and trustees last night, said he felt the reported \$126,000 selling price for the nursing home should be applied to the hospital addition.

"If the hospital trustees and the County Commission are considering additional hospital beds, they should be interested in the future and all the citizens of Seminole County that these facilities be added to the present hospital or development of a second hospital in the southern part of the county or both," Roberts stated.

The physician said he could not see the expenditure of this large amount of money for an initial purchase followed by additional money for renovations, equipment, etc., so that "we can go into the nursing home business."

Dr. Charles Park Jr. indicated that the expenditure of this amount will be held in two weeks when a decision from doctors on prospective purchase will be required.

Schirard said the proposed transaction was waiting on the doctors' opinion before proceeding with purchase. He indicated the nursing home acquisition might not proceed unless there is an overwhelming doctor approval.

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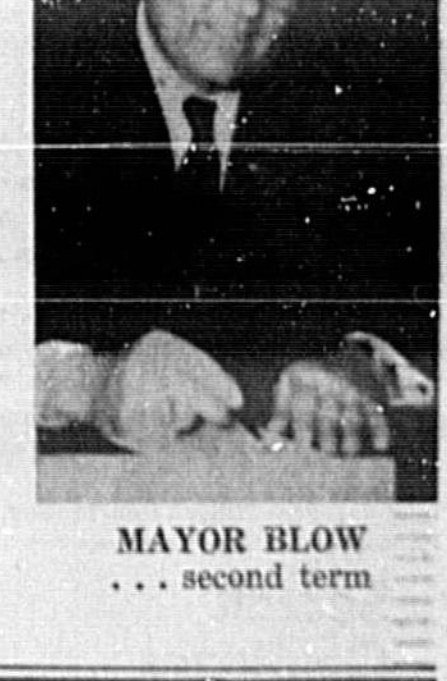
