Needs To Tell The World But Cannot

Jim Lee: A Man With A Problem

Jim Lee is a man with a problem. He needs to know how to tell the world he is succeeding at his work. He gets little public recognition for a job well done... but, when his work efforts fail, he is subjected to public scrutiny.

Of these, only 2,908 probationers were revoked, with all the rest successfully completing their time. This amounts to an 87 per cent success. As to parole, its success is illustrated by the fact that, since the creation of the commission, a total of 18,192 individuals have been released from prison under supervision. Of these, 79.8 per cent have succeeded on parole or are in the process of doing so.

It does not mean necessarily that the Court has been very lenient to the defendant when a probation term is granted. "How am I going to show the public we do help?" Lee asks. "A man successfully completes his probation, he builds a good and useful life for himself, finds a fine place in his community... I can't come along and say 'Look, this man was a criminal, but now he's a fine upstanding citizen. Failure to do so could result in the loss of his freedom.'"

Indeed, probation may really be regarded as a sentence to the taxpayers, the offender's creditors and his family. The family ordinarily suffers the most through pure financial deprivation alone. Recognizing this fact, judges having original criminal jurisdiction have made increased use of probation as a dispositional measure. During the past fiscal year in Florida, 2,966 offenders were placed on probation, representing an increase of 8.2 per cent over the previous fiscal year.

Currently the Sanford office of the Florida Probation and Parole Commission has 180 active cases on file. How many of these will actually complete their probation or parole? "That is hard to answer," says Lee. "It's a little like insurance statistics. You can't predict anything like that on such a small sample."

Rather, suggested Lee, like a look at the overall statewide statistics. Since the Commission was established in October 1961, probation and parole statistics show a decrease in 12 per cent, from 3,400 in 1961 to 3,000 in 1965. This decrease is due to a number of factors, including a decrease in the number of offenders placed on probation and parole.

Bad Check Artists Ready For Holidays

NEW YORK — (NEA) — The voice at the other end of the line said in a confidential manner worthy of Eliot Ness, "I'll meet you in the building lobby." HIS office doesn't have a name on the door.

As the phone receiver settled in its cradle, this bemused reporter thought "the guy" the criminal investigator cop-and-robbers shows on television." However, a white telephone cord connected the office of a detective agency off the "hook" book.

The detective agency, revealing a properly bleak hallway in an East Side office building, and "the door" did not have raised goldleaf lettering to indicate to other tenants the tops business conducted in the small office.

John J. Janssen, head of criminal identification for Bureau Detective Agency, explained the blank door. "We have informants and plainclothes detectives who don't want to be recognized."

It is now the time for all his current phase of criminal investigation, though, is not as dangerous as the hush-hush makes it sound. He specializes in tracking check forgers after 20 years on the Scranton, Pa. police force where his assignment ranged from patrolman to fingerprint technician.

Janssen threw out the figure of \$1 million annual loss from forged and fraudulent checks as a reason for his work. He said he had been working for the past several years for the insurance and protective committee of the American Bankers Association, says the amount could be as high as \$10 million based upon a projection of bad checks returned through the Federal Reserve Bank.

This unobtrusive detective agency comes from the basic problem Janssen, and others working in the field face. "Many firms refuse to prosecute or police courts to track out small check forgers because the books are just too full. Businesses turn the problem over to their insurance companies."

Meanwhile, Owens points out a need for watchful eyes now. "The approaching holidays," he explains, "are a very vulnerable period for merchants and banks as the tempo picks up." Most of the losses, he says, are sustained by hotels, motels and merchants, although, with banks having an estimated 5 to 10 per cent loss through bad checks as people "try to get a little more for Christmas."

Professional check forgers strike all the time. They, too, take advantage of the increased flow of money and confusing bustle during the holidays.

It is Janssen's task to track the pros and see they discontinue their coast-to-coast swindling. His firm's criminal division processes some 10,000 worthless checks a year. Phony check artists, he explains, increase the odds of being arrested with each check. Yet, the person who makes a living with forged checks follows the same pattern and leaves his signature trademark. Janssen noted toward a woman sitting near Appalachia, Va.

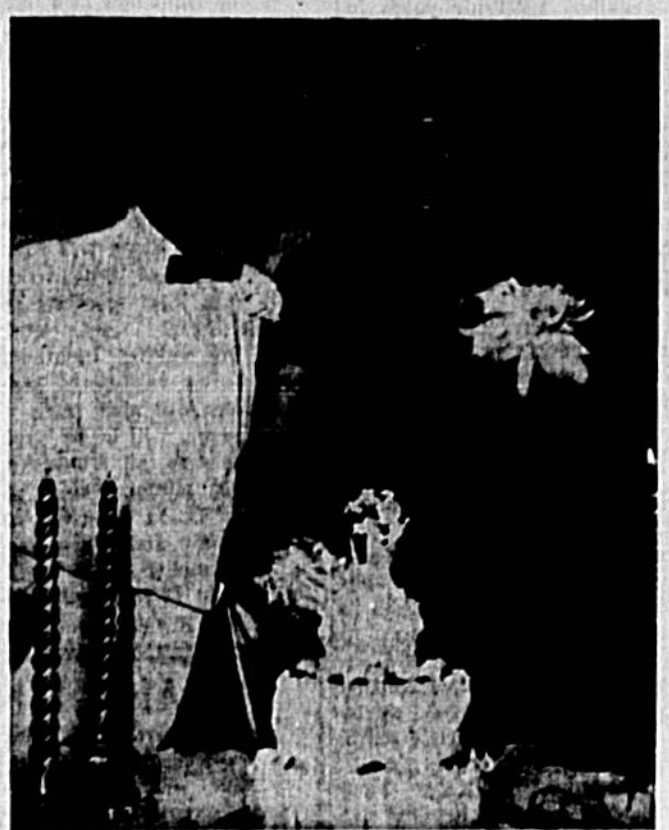

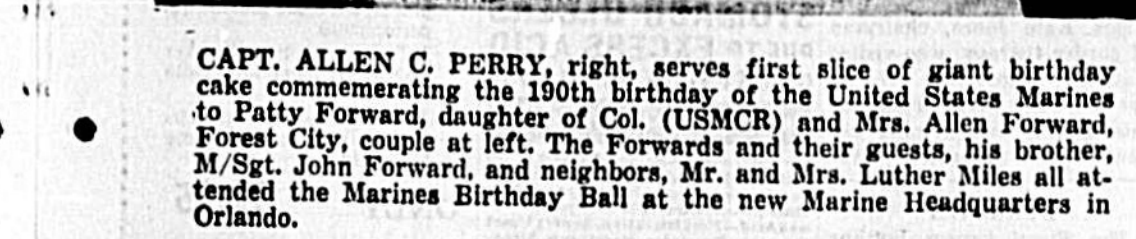

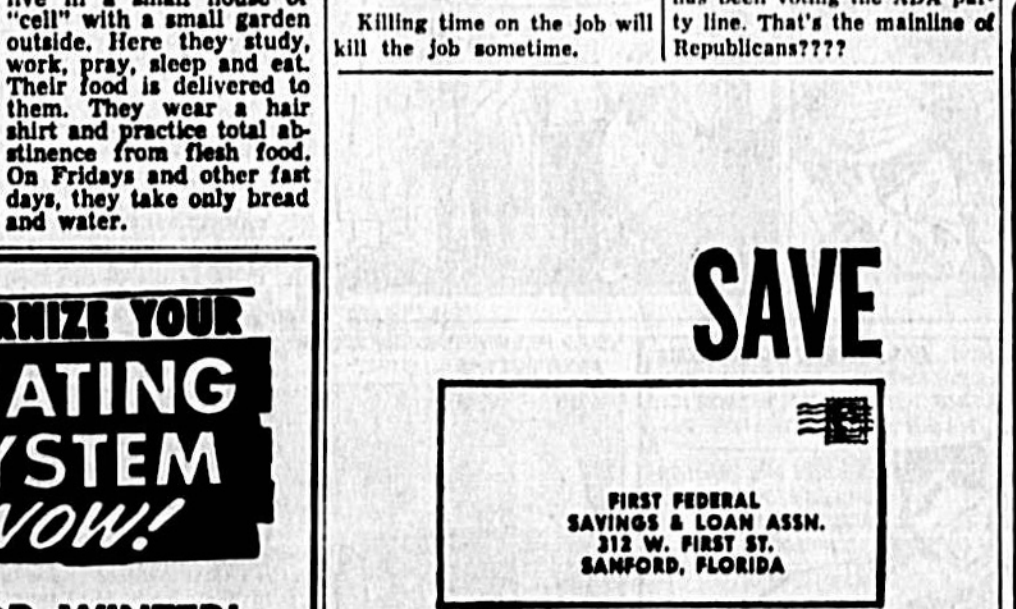
