

Turkey Develops Tourism

ANKARA—Take it easy with the rest (to potent drink), see the sights—and there are plenty—get out of town to Cappadocia for a view of spectacular ruins and you will enjoy your self in this tense city of martial law.

The Turkish government has come a long way in the last 15 years in developing tourism but still has a long way to go before it reaps the financial rewards that it should. However, even with the streets filled with soldiers patrolling with automatic weapons under the tight restrictions that include martial law, the visitor can find much to do and see sights he might not see closer to home—although there are more of them, in a more vivid sense, as one travels further south.

Flying in to Ankara, the growth of the city can be seen. If for no other reason, by the thick cloud of smog hanging over almost every area except the solemn hills that hold the tomb and memorial of Mustafa Kemal Ataturk, founder of the Turkish Republic, and the Presidential Palace of President Cevdet Sunay. Both are high enough to escape both the smog and the acrid smell of poor grade coal burning in many buildings.

Things are not all bad here, despite the common fear of a coup, terrorist activity or revolt as expressed by a Turk editor, Nezir Ozyun, who said, "My Vice President Agnew was here and there was lots of talk about NATO (the North Atlantic Treaty Organization) and Russia. That's not what I worry about. I wonder each night what will happen here in the morning."

Optim perhaps was being overdramatic because there are quite a few tourists in the city.

They are engaging in girl watching, and some of the girls rate close scrutiny, with everything from tight-fitting dresses, hot pants, deceptive veils and the walk that inspires male appreciation of the opposite sex. There is good food—fish and other kabobs, some with yogurt—and plenty of night life, in the new house grill room of the Bayrak (Grand) Hotel offering one of the more interesting evenings.

Hotels are reasonable—a fine double room in the Bayrak coming at about \$10, and food is within reason. There is something for everybody—busy traffic and fast city life, or the sight of peacefully grazing sheep and cattle in the suburbs, and lockasses (four-legged) to be had in abundance. There aren't many dogs—pets are too expensive for most Turks—but there are new factories all over the place, and Pepsi Cola and 7-up bottling plants.

The smog comes mostly at night, and this moved Vice President Agnew to say, "It looks worse than in Los Angeles." Cars park on the sidewalks and the Turks are not person enough to have modern buses to replace the antiquated ones that moved about the city until a few years ago. There is a U.S. Laver here, two-bumper, complete with long hair and sleeping bags strung over their shoulders.

But, there is delightful sight-seeing, with Ataturk's hillside tomb as the top attraction. The spirit of soldiers in being picked for honor guard duty at the mausoleum can be seen in their eyes and every visiting dignitary must lay a wreath at the memorial, usually at sunset. Finished in 1953, it is of the purest classical style. The Tower of Liberty rises at the right of an impressive staircase, and the Tower of Independence is at the left. The theme of the memorial is "Victory and Peace" in the recognition of Ataturk's leadership in the revolution of the early 20's. A solemn quiet prevails throughout the memorial area.

There also is Ataturk Blvd. and many other statues of the hero throughout the city, including one of granite and another outlined in neon lights near the palace, visible from most areas of Ankara at night.

The palace grounds also are a place of beauty—an edifice of marble with impressive gardens and wooded areas, gladioli, geraniums, cacti, pine, white fir, begonias, palms and many other flowers this knowledge on flora could not identify.

For 85-Acre Longwood Tract \$18 Million Project Is Unveiled

LONGWOOD—Plans for a \$18 million planned unit development (PUD) to be constructed on the 85-acre tract of land bounded by Fairy Lake, First Street west, Marvin Avenue and Seminole Boulevard were submitted to the city's planning and zoning commission Thursday night.

But little chance appeared that procedures for approving the development and adoption of a PUD ordinance would meet the Monday deadline which the developer, C. A. Hobbs, Inc., and the company's planner, James Zimmerman, of Tallahassee said is the final day for exercising an option for purchase of the land.

Zimmerman said plans for the development on the "prime" land would have a density of 15 units per acre with a total of 1,100 to 1,200 living units. Using the figure presented by Zimmerman of expected population in the development of 2.5 persons per unit would give the city, if the plan were approved, some 2,800 new citizens, almost as many new persons as currently living in the municipal city.

Zimmerman said the plan is to use city water and to build a package sewage treatment plant on land across from the Sanford Orlando Kennel Club. He saw no reason why the owners "would not be willing to donate all the sewer improvements to the city."

The planer said the cluster homes, apartment buildings with large areas in the city, are planned with green belt and recreation area. In answer to questions about the possibility of Fairy Lake being swamped with the large numbers of people in the development, Zimmerman said only "passive" recreation would be available at the shoreline while tennis courts and a large pool would be available for active recreation.

Zoning board Chairman H. H. Ferrall assured the developer that the zoning board will call a joint meeting with the Council in the next couple of weeks to discuss the matter. Ferrall said while the board wishes to cooperate as much as possible with the developers, all regular city procedures must be followed and the procedure, by necessity, will take more time than the deadline mentioned.

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Rec Plans Display Is Slated

NORTH ORLANDO—Interested residents of the municipality may view preliminary plans for the new recreation area at Monday's meeting of Village Council at 7:30 p.m. The drawings have been prepared by Florida Land Company at the request of Councilman Troy Pineda. The area will include a swimming pool, bathroom, football field, open play area and community building.

The community building funding is being undertaken by the newly formed community association. The city has indicated interest in the improvement of the recreation area, with possible funding available from government grants. These will be explained by the city's newly hired fiscal agent, Logan Browning, at a late date.

There will be a public hearing on a rezoning request by Al Schachter from R-1 to PUD (planned unit development). Schachter's property, encompassing 100 acres adjacent to the PUD area of Florida Land Company on Sheppard Road, was recently annexed into the city under R-1 zoning.

There will be several recommendations of the Planning and Zoning Board resulting from a Thursday meeting. Also on the agenda are the monthly council reports.

Suspect Flees Police, Hurt In Car Crash

Four men have been arrested, three by county deputies and one by Sanford police in the past 24 hours on a number of charges ranging from burglaries to indecent exposure.

Wayne Thomas Jarvis, 23, Seminole Trailer Park, is under arrest in Florida Hospital with a dislocated right hip, after a 1972 Chrysler in which he was riding and believed stolen earlier from Jim Lash, Chrysler Plymouth in Sanford was wrecked while being chased by Orlando police.

Det. Sgt. William Lykens, who investigated, said Jarvis admitted the Chrysler he entered Lash's lot on 11:32 and took the vehicle, valued at \$7,500.

A multi-ke and several pieces of office machinery also were taken in the same break in, according to the detective.

Deputy Jay Leman and Det. Raymond Parker teamed in arresting two youths, caught by Leman near a service station in Forest City and charged with vagrancy and improper parking.

Sanford City Manager, W. E. Knowles, at the direction of the City Commission, compiled the following information on the proposed \$4 million drainage bond issue to be voted on at Tuesday's municipal elections.

A city-wide drainage improvement bond issue will appear on the ballot Dec. 7 at the Civic Center. In order to pass, a majority of those voting must vote in favor of the issue.

The total estimated cost of this project will be close to \$4 million when all costs of construction, engineering, surveying, right-of-way acquisition, legal, and fiscal are included. Part of this cost may be obtained from federal grants. This could approach 90 per cent of the cost.

If a bond issue is approved on today's market and a 30-year repayment program, the increase in the debt tax millage would be 3.93 mills, or nearly 44 on every \$1,000 assessed valuation. This means a home valued at \$10,000 would pay \$39.30 more on each year's tax bill for 30 years. A \$30,000 home would pay \$117.90 annually, etc.

If a federal grant is approved, these cost figures could be reduced up to as much as a half the cost and work are based on a 1968 study to provide the major storm drainage interceptors and waterways to carry the run-off away from the low and level areas into Lake Monroe. It does not include the smaller street drainage or collection systems. The entire program covers the city from 23rd Street north to the lake and from the west city limits to the east city limits.

The City of Sanford is divided into five drainage basins as follows:

- MILL CREEK BASIN: This area covers east to Olive Avenue and the east side of Country Club Manor. It extends from 23rd Street north to the lake. The work consists of reshaping an open ditch and paving it. From West First Street south to Eighth Street with large piping from Eighth Street to the lake. From Eleventh Elementary School area, from Eleventh to 23rd Street with large piping from 23rd Street north to the lake. This is an area covering 24th Street north to the lake between (Cont. Sanford Candidates Woo Votes On Issues

SANFORD—Tuesday night select two men to fill vacancies on the City Commission and approve or reject a \$4 million bond issue to provide city-wide drainage.

There are six men, three in each race, running for the two open seats on the five-man governing board. One of these is incumbent Dr. W. Vincent Roberts, who has six years of experience as a commissioner.

He is being opposed in Group 1 by educator Carey Gager and real estate broker A. A. McClanahan, both political newcomers.

In the race for the group 2 Commission seat, being vacated by J. H. Cropps, are three men vying for the office.

One of these is former Mayor Earl Higginbotham, a veteran of 11 years on the Commission but a loser in the last two city races.

Rev. J. Edward Connelly, minister, and John Morris, abstract company manager, are running for the same seat as Higginbotham. Neither Morris or Connelly has previous Commission experience.

In attempting to glean information on the attitudes and feelings of these six men on issues important to the City, The Herald asked each candidate to express himself on four subjects: Annexation, drainage bond proposal, city beautification and whether the Commission should meet weekly as opposed to the present semi-monthly sessions.

Roberts' position on annexation: "I feel the Commission should rely heavily on the recommendations of the city zoning and planning board in determining feasibility of annexing large areas into the city." Roberts said the zoning board should study each annexation request and make its recommendation to the Commission regarding taking in additional property. "After all, that is one of the functions of the planning and zoning board," Roberts added.

Roberts' position as outlined in a Wednesday Commission meeting indicated the commissioner had some misgivings over the bond proposal, which will ask city property owners to tax themselves four additional mills to provide a drainage system.

On the drainage bond referendum, Roberts said he opposed the issue and explained it was placed on the ballot only to be an opinion of the people.

He said the \$4 million issue will not pay for the entire drainage program and added that additional millions would have to be spent by the city to provide feeder lines to convey the water to the larger lines.

Weekly Commission meetings are favored by Roberts and his motion to amend the city charter to provide some has been tabled until a new charter has been devised by the commission.

Gager's position on annexation: "I am for controlled city growth if it will help improve the city and if the people involved have received registered letters and are aware of the proceedings and provide city services are available without cost to the present taxpayers."

Gager said, "I believe in a practical, reasonable approach to drainage along with a common sense approach, such as straightening culverts, enlarging pipes and cleaning out ditches, but I am 100 per cent opposed to the bond issue."

"I very much favor beautification and have pushed such things as a Tom Sawyer beautification day, support landscaping, tree planting and the elimination of all unsightly buildings."

Gager supported weekly commission meetings and further would give thought to starting the sessions a half-hour earlier (Continued on Page 6A, Col. 1)

Sanford Is State Terminal Auto Train Is Coming

 Sanford will find its own unique spot on the national map Tuesday when the first Auto Train pulls into its new terminal on Perimeter Avenue and unloads approximately 400 northerners and their 100 automobiles.

The first train is scheduled to leave its northern terminus, Lorton, Va., 12 miles south of Washington, D. C., at 8 p.m. this evening. It is due to arrive here at 11 Tuesday morning.

Aboard also will be company officials and representatives of various news media from the north. They will be greeted by 10 Seminole Junior College coeds, who will dispense free oranges and free orange juice in welcoming these visitors to the state. Local dignitaries also will greet the visitors.

The Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce will be host to the visiting newsmen, company officials and local county and city governmental officers and other dignitaries at a 1 p.m. luncheon at the House of Steaks. Top guests will be Auto Train Corporation officers: Eugene Garfield, president, and Kenneth Howes, Richard Tolbert, Jules Van Markson, and Richard Goldstein, all vice presidents.

Regular nonstop auto-train service will be inaugurated Tuesday, with trains leaving Sanford and Lorton at 8 p.m. and arriving the next morning at the opposite city at 11 a.m.

During the overnight 15-hour ride, passengers will ride in newly designed bi-level dome passenger coaches. The dome areas have been fitted with reclining leg and foot rest seats, designed and built especially for the Auto-Train. Bedroom accommodations complete with color television also are available.

Upon boarding the Auto-Train, passengers will be treated to a complimentary buffet featuring Beef Wellington and Lobster Bellevue, which will be served in two newly designed dining cars. A complimentary continental breakfast will be served at the seats the following morning. Complimentary hors d'oeuvres will be served in the lower lounge areas of the dome coaches. Following the buffet, free first-run movies will be shown in the dining cars.

Passengers also will be able to relax and enjoy themselves in a bi-level dome night club car. Complete with piano, the car will have a starlight lounge and intimate cocktail room.

The automobiles will be carried in fully enclosed bi-level dome trailers. Auto-Train attendants will load the automobiles before departure and will deliver the automobiles to the passengers upon arrival.

Seven Arrested In Drug Shootout

 A combined force of Seminole, Volusia County and U. S. Bureau of Narcotics undercover agents captured seven persons, including a woman, after an arranged drug purchase early Saturday backfired in a true "cops and robbers" shoot-out.

In what appeared to be an actual plot written for television or the movies, county and undercover agents had arranged to purchase from an Orlando-based drug ring, believed to be part of the so-called "Dixie Mafia" led by Errol B. Bessih, under sentence to death in the murder of a police informer.

According to Sheriff John Polk, the "buy" was supposed to have taken place in a rented panel truck at a Longwood parking lot. Nervous "hoods" met agents there at a pre-arranged time and wanted to see the \$60,000, used by agents to purchase 1,000 pounds of marijuana.

After the initial meeting, agents followed the man to the rented truck at K-mart shopping center on U. S. 17-92 at Fern Park, where the "deal" was to have been completed but, instead of marijuana, narcotics agents were confronted with four men, three with shotguns and the fourth with a 20-30 rifle. The fifth man, who led officers to the scene, produced a pistol.

Lt. A. F. Davis, Seminole undercover agent, who opened the door to the truck, shouted, "It's a rip-off" and slammed the door shut in the face of the four guns.

Nearly cars containing eight other agents quickly arrived on the scene as bullets sprayed the parking lot from both sides.

Miraculously, no one was hit. It was at this point that a car containing Weyman Gerald Glover, 30, Orlando, and Joyce Kay Woodbury, 25, 1726 Wyandotte Trail, Casselberry, arrived on the scene. They quickly fled north on 17-92, turned onto Semoran east with agents in pursuit.

Describing Glover as "the Mr. Big" of the drug ring, Duane Harrell, chief deputy, said Glover's car was stopped after agents pumped bullets into the

AROUND THE CLOCK Kidnaper Of Girl Shot, Captured

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — A shotgun-wielding man abducted a mid-clad college girl from her home at dawn today, holed up in a woods, demanding \$1,000, and was shot and wounded when he tried to pick up the ransom. "He didn't hurt me. Jesus was with me," the girl, Geraldine Givens, 17, said following the hour-long ordeal. She was uninjured.

Andrew Jackson, who lived near the Givens home in rural east Tallahassee, was hospitalized for treatment of a wounded right forearm, said Leon County Sheriff Ray Hamlin.

Hamlin said Miss Givens' father, Gerald Givens, was wiping dew from a windshield at 7:20 a.m. when a shotgun-carrying man stepped from behind an oak tree and said, "I need \$1,000."

Givens told him he didn't have it, but would get it. Inside the house, Geraldine and her mother, Azura, a language professor at Florida State, telephoned the sheriff's office.

By the time the first deputy had arrived, the man had taken Geraldine, an FSU freshman, 100 yards into the woods at gun-point. Hamlin's men and city and state officers sealed off the area and brought in Bloodhounds.

Minutes later, said Hamlin, a call was received at the Givens home from the girl, who said her abductor wanted \$1,000 in cash left behind a horse barn at the rear of the house.

It was the fourth raid on migrant workers in central Florida within a week, Woytych said. More than 180 migrants were taken into custody following arrests in Lakeland, Bartow and Orlando.

Woytych said the migrants had been released and were instructed to leave the U.S. voluntarily. He said the workers would be placed on homeward bound flights by border patrol agents.

Foreign Migrants Deported

APOPKA, Fla. (AP) — Sixty-six migrant workers, including a woman and two teen-age children were arrested in a labor camp near here Sunday by border patrol agents and charged with violating U.S. immigration laws.

Robert L. Woytych, district director of the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, said 64 of the migrants were from Mexico and two from Jamaica. He said the workers would be returned to their own countries.
