County remembers Deputy Pfeil

20 years after shooting

SANFORD - The flags were at half-staff Monday at the Sheriff's Office and Seminole County jail in memory of Sheriff's Deputy George Pfeil.

Pfeil was killed in the line of duty 20 years ago (Dec. 29, 1977) during a robbery at the Longwood Village Pharmacy in Longwood Village Shopping Center on State Road 434.

"George Pfeil was a laid-back, easy-going guy who took law enforcement to a personal level," said Seminole County Sheriff's Deputy Jerry Riggins. "He'd ask 'how can I help you? Really a warm individual.'"

Pfeil was on his way home when he stopped at the pharmacy to pick up a prescription for his wife. Two men were robbing the store and a third waited outside in a getaway car.

During the robbery, Pfeil was shot and killed. The three men escaped but were apprehended after an intensive search and investigation.

The shooter, Terry Sims, was convicted of first degree murder and is currently on death row at the Florida State Prison. The other two men - Curtis Baldrice and Bebe Hainell - are dead. They were part of a ring that specialized in robbing pharmacies.

Pfeil is one of four Seminole County Sheriff's deputies who lost their lives in the line of duty. The other three are Cleveland Jacobs, Robert O. Moore, Jr. and Hugh Thomas.

"No one knows the challenge he or she may face each day or night," said Seminole County Sheriff Don Ealinger. "There is constant danger. Unknown challenges."

The Southeast U.S. has the most officer casualties for several reasons, the most obvious being weather. "It attracts the criminal element," Ealinger said. "Fugitives, felons uproot and come here."

Reports from the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) help not only provide details of the deaths of law enforcement officers but help prepare others. By studying how an officer was lost, an-

Lawmen Hunt Pair Who Killed Deputy

Sanford, Fla. (AP) - Law enforcement officials are hunting for two men who are believed to be responsible for the shooting of a Seminole County deputy sheriff.

The Sanford Evening Herald of Dec. 30, 1977, devotes the front page to the heinous crime that took the life of Deputy George Pfeil. Three men were arrested. One is currently on death row and two are dead. Pfeil is one of four deputies to be killed in the line of duty since 1903.

Man learns hunting at night is a crime

SANFORD - A man was arrested Monday for hunting deer at night illegally using a light, deputy sheriffs said.

Keith Kempke, 27, 5648 Deer Path Lane, Sanford, was arrested shortly after midnight for violating the state's law concerning hunting with a light at night, according to sheriff's spokesman Ed McDonough. It is illegal to hunt from one hour after sunset to one hour before

sunrise.

"We get sporadic complaints from rural areas especially during hunting season," McDonough said. "We've also been out to Chuhota."

Kempke was charged with one count each of possessing a gun and light at night and attempting to take game after unlawful hunting hours, McDonough said. Both charges are first degree misdemeanors, which carry a maximum penalty of one year in jail and/or a

African Americans celebrate creation with Kwanzaa holiday

Kwanzaa is celebrated by African-Americans during a seven-day observance which began Dec. 26 and goes through Jan. 1.

The "Nguzo Saba"; the seven day principles of Kwanzaa are Umoja (unity); Kujichagulia (self determination); Ujima (collective work and responsibility); Ujamaa (cooperative economic); Nia (purpose); Kuumba (creativity) and Imani (faith).

All a part of the Kwanzaa celebration and a part of many African-American families; it is a cultural holiday, not a religious one.

The creator of Kwanzaa was Maulana Karenga; a professor of black studies at a university in California. It is based upon the holiday of honoring what he described as "the

creator", and creation of life. Early literature explains the holiday.

It is designed to pay homage to African-American cultural roots. Values and principles of Kwanzaa are from people from all parts of Africa; north, east, west and south.

A candle is lit each day for each of the seven principles named. The observance ends with the exchange of handmade gifts and a big family feast or a small celebration to improve this community.

In observance of Kwanzaa, the United States Postal Service has continued its holiday celebration stamp series with the issuance of the Kwanzaa stamp which commemorates the African-American festival of families, communities, and culture.

This stamp was designed by the noted artist Synthia Saint James. The artist has many accomplishments, one among her 40 book covers, is the cover of a bestseller book, "Waiting To Exhale."

And as Kwanzaa ends, the observance of the Emancipation Proclamation is held on Jan. 1. The day is given the presidential proclamation which made history in the United States. This was issued by Abraham Lincoln during the Civil War. This 1863 proclamation declared all "slaves in any state then in rebellion to be forever free."

The interdenominational minister alliance will reaffirm the Emancipation Proclamation on Thursday, Jan. 1, 1998 at a 10 a.m. program to bring together the communities for a firm commitment of unity in which we can improve our city and community needs. The

In cooperation with Sprint Yellow Pages, the CFBD is holding its Most Red Blood Drive from Dec. 22 through Jan. 2, in selected locations throughout the county. The goal is to collect 3,400 pints of blood in 12 days, according to Katherine Vaccaro, customer relations manager at Sprint.

"That's two times more than last year," Vaccaro said, adding that, so far, "things are going extremely well. We have an ambitious goal."

Vaccaro said this is the toughest time of year to get blood because many people are out of town and also because many people have scheduled operations for the end of the year and there is a greater need for blood.

In appreciation for their time and efforts, Vaccaro said donors will receive either a free T-shirt or a certificate for a

free day trip to Fort Lauderdale.

Vaccaro, a 10-gallon blood donor herself, said the process is simple and very safe taking no more than 45 minutes. Before blood is taken, donors are tested. The blood is retested before it is transported to the blood bank. It takes about a day and a half for the body to replace the blood, she said.

Vaccaro said she feels better and more in sync after she donates blood. She also noted that preliminary research shows giving blood may be physically beneficial to the donor.

Some research, she said, indicates that in men donating blood may prevent heart attacks.

Other blood donor facts include: After processing, each pint can save up to five lives.

One donation can transfuse up to four premature babies.

Accident victims use up 4 to 100 units of blood.

Open heart surgery, 6 to 8

units; orthopedic surgery, 2 to 8 units.

Every pint of blood goes through 18 hours of processing and is usually transfused within 36 hours after it is drawn.

Every pint of blood is subject to 10 screening tests before being used.

One of the benefits of donating blood, is that people can feel like part of the community knowing that they are helping, Vaccaro said.

Anyone that donates blood in Seminole County will have their name on a ribbon that will be placed on the Christmas tree at Seminole Towne Center.

"We're hoping there are a bunch of ribbons on that tree," she said.

Potential blood donors must be in good health, weigh a minimum of 110 pounds, and be at least 17 years old. There are blood donor centers in Altamonte Springs, Longwood and Sanford. To find the closest center or bloodmobile, call 849-8100 or 1-800-852-0348.

\$1,000 fine.

Although the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission usually handles calls of this nature, McDonough said the sheriff's office will respond to calls from time to time. Also at the sheriff's disposal to help track poachers, is a helicopter equipped with infra red equip-

ment that can detect heat. The helicopter, McDonough, said, was not necessary for this particular case.

In response to area residents' complaints of deer poaching at night, deputies Mark Fore and Dave O'Connor had organized a stakeout in the wooded area off Delaware Street near Sanford. McDonough said his office received several phone calls on

the night of the stakeout. "People heard shots and saw the lights," he said. "It's easy to know what was going on."

According to McDonough, the deputies saw Kempte use a light and fire a shot at a deer, however, no deer was found after the arrest.

"They saw him fire at the deer but apparently didn't hit it," he said.

Kempte was released after posting \$600 bond.

Sanford City Commissioner Dr. Velma H. Williams, also a graduate of Crooms Academy class of 1956, brought greetings from the city of Sanford.

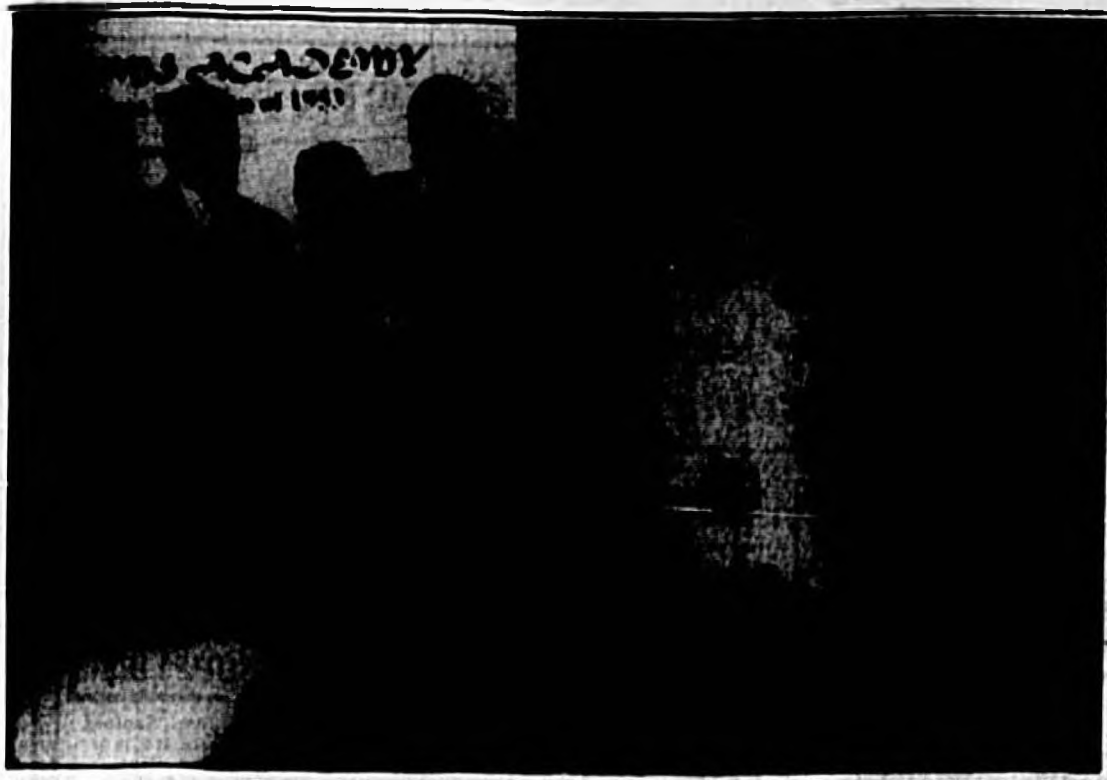
The message was delivered by the Honorable Congressman Alcee Hastings, member of the United States House of Representatives Florida District 23.

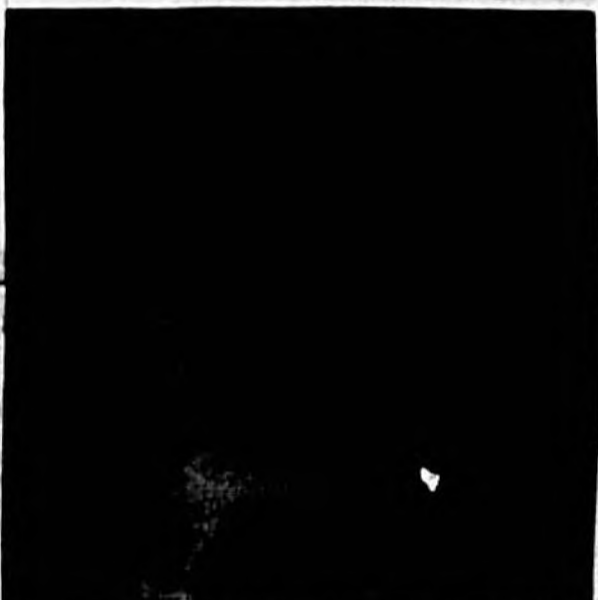

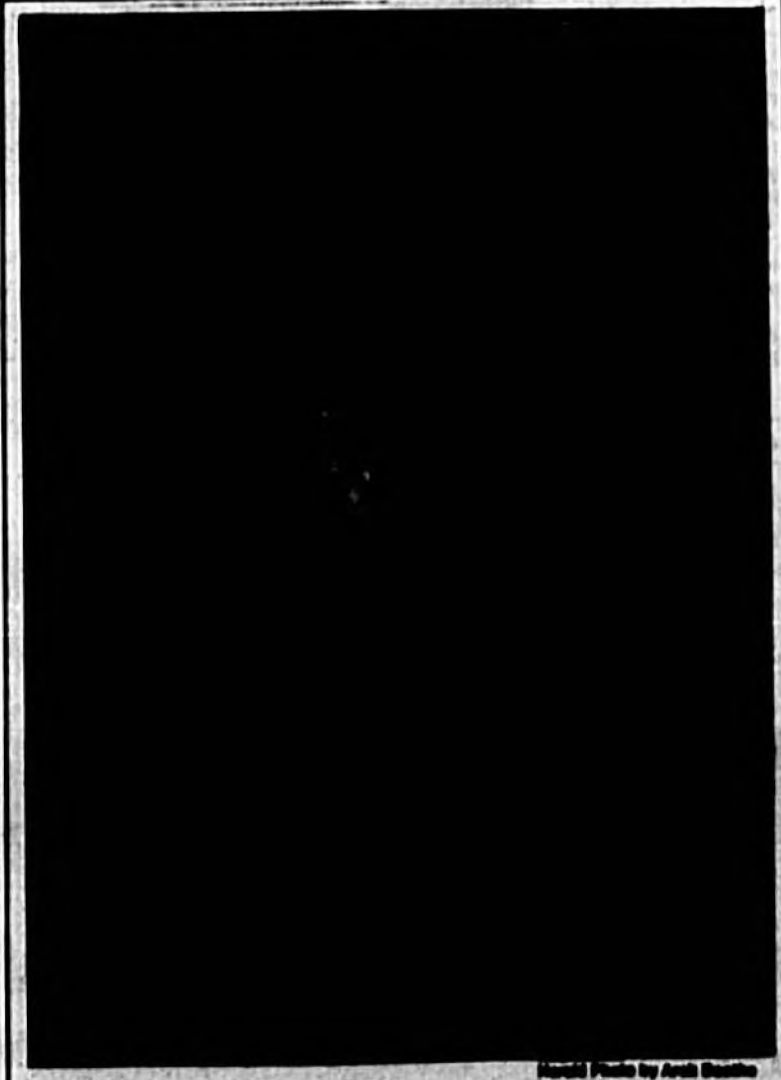

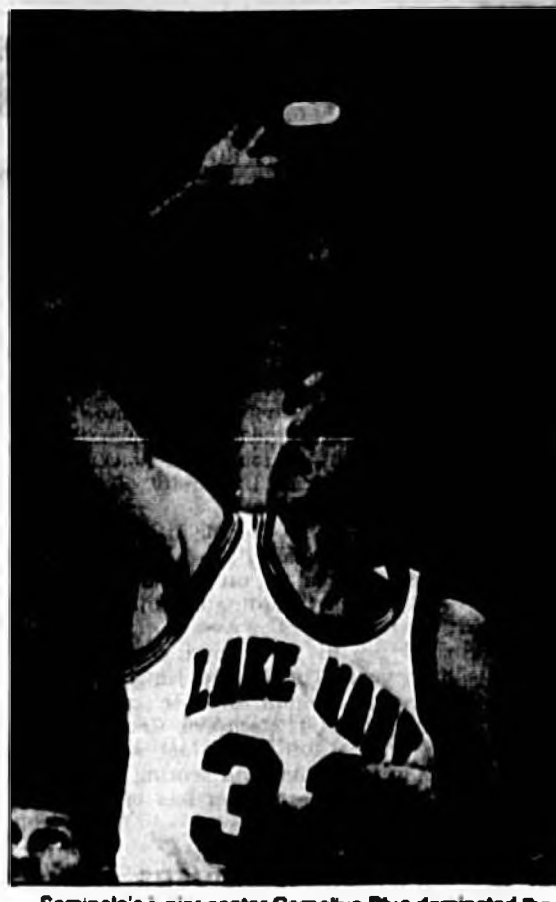

Protect citrus trees from cold weather

Citrus trees do not enter a dormancy period like temperate-zone deciduous trees such as peaches or apples. They do, however, develop some cold tolerance as temperatures reach the 40-60 degree F. range for a period of about two weeks. This cold tolerance is influenced by environmental conditions, mainly cool temperatures, but also by tree health, its rootstock, and the citrus specie.

How trees freeze: As a general rule, a citrus tree will freeze from the top to bottom and from the outside to the inside. Flowers are the first tissues to freeze, followed by tender new growth such as leaves and twigs. Younger tissues will be more affected than older tissues, and smaller-diameter wood before larger-diameter wood. Young developing fruits will freeze before mature fruits. The smaller the size of the fruit, the faster it will freeze. Fruits with thin peel will freeze faster than fruits with thick peel. Freeze damage occurs when ice forms inside the citrus tissues.

Predisposing factors: Citrus trees are more susceptible to

will occur when temperatures fall below 28 degrees F. for at least 4 hours. If mature fruits freeze, they can still be used for juice if harvested promptly.

Site selection: Trees should be located on the south and west sides of the yard. The reasoning behind this recommendation is that south is the warmest area and west is the next warmest area in a given landscape. Other places to locate trees is near or between buildings, south facing slopes, next to other large trees, or near large bodies of water such as lakes.

Cold protection with sprinklers: The principle behind the use of sprinklers to protect trees from freezing is that heat is released when water changes from liquid to ice, a phenomenon known as heat of fusion. When water is freezing, its temperature will be near 32 degrees F. This temperature, known as the triple point, is in equilibrium between vapor, liquid and ice. If sufficient water is applied, and all leaves and branches are covered with ice, protection can be expected. If only partial coverage of leaves or branches

is accomplished, damage can occur and the damage will be more severe than if water had not been applied. Do not stop sprinklers until temperature is 32 degrees F or above and water is dripping from all parts of the plants.

Soil banking: One of the cheapest methods to protect the trunk of young citrus trees from cold damage is the practice known as soil banking. It consists of mounding soil around the trunk of the tree as high as possible to protect it from cold temperatures even as low as 12-15 degrees F. Soil banks must be made before freezes occur and should be removed as soon as temperatures start to warm up because it can predispose the trees to diseases and pest problems. Tree wraps are also effective in protecting young trees from freezing damage; the effectiveness of various wraps depends upon its insulation capacity. Polyurethane wraps have been found to be effective protecting the trees, but this method is less effective than soil banking. Unbanking should be done around the end of February.

Inventor finds Internet to be useful

DEAR BRUCE: In one of your columns, you answered a question from someone who had an invention but did not have any money to further it along. I am an inventor, and I have two products being manufactured that are soon to be released. It has taken nine years of persistence and money of my own to get to this point. I found the money by using a web page on the Internet. The manufacturer contacted me. DEAR I.B.: Any stockbroker can look up the symbol and the exchange where this stock is listed, assuming it is a listed security. If there is no symbol, call the company itself. They probably have a stockholder line to tell you what the shares are worth today. If all else fails, call the transfer agent listed on the certificate.

DEAR BRUCE: I have a mortgage, and I send my payments in on time. This month I received a refund check from the escrow account. I always advise them to put any overpayment toward the principal balance. How can I get the mortgage company to put the extra funds against the principal automatically? I want to pay off the loan ahead of time. — Z.W., Topeka, Kan.

DEAR Z.W.: If you are unable to get the attention of their accounting department regarding refunds, just accept the refund check and write out a personal check for a similar amount of money (or rounded sum if required).

DEAR BRUCE: In a recent column, you said that U.S. savings bonds were a terrific investment. I think I've done pretty well. I know the interest rate was not so good, but it equaled other things. Mutual funds may be good, but

I lost money on them. At one time I tried the stock market and only made 6 percent. I am not so sure that your information is all that good. — P.W., Sedalia, Mo.

DEAR P.W.: I am sorry that you have lost some money in the market-place, but that is what it is all about: For every dollar lost by one person, somebody else gains a dollar. The fact that you may not have done a great job in picking a mutual fund or equities doesn't obviate the fact that the average returns in those areas are substantially higher than the pittance you're receiving on U.S. savings bonds. The problem with savings bonds today, which was not necessarily the case some years ago, is that you are being paid short term interest on long term instruments. In short, you are being had. Those people who have an absolute fetish about taking no risk whatsoever are going to be the victims of very low interest, not much above the inflation rate. With risks go rewards. I am not suggesting you go out and invest in something extremely risky, on the other hand, to have large sums of money for long periods of time in low-interest bearing instruments makes little sense.

Can a cut'n'curl be dangerous?

DEAR DR. GOTT: A friend of mine recently had what seemed to be a temporary stroke while having her hair washed at a beauty salon. How could this happen?

DEAR READER: When a person hyperextends her head — for example, over a sink — she may experience dizziness, blurred vision, speech difficulty and other symptoms. According to the November 1997 issue of the Harvard Women's Health Watch, the condition has been dubbed "beauty parlor stroke syndrome" and is believed to be due to obstruction of blood flow in the vertebral arteries, which already may be partially blocked by arteriosclerotic plaque. The two vertebral arteries supply blood to the back of the brain. When they are compressed during the hyperextension maneuver of hair-washing, circulation may be reduced or small blood clots may be carried to the brain, resulting in neurological symptoms that are transient — or can sometimes be permanent. Beauty parlor stroke syndrome has been newly reported and can also occur in a dentist's chair, during yoga exercises or on a chiropractor's table.

The Harvard publication urges any woman who experiences symptoms in such situations to change position immediately. To date, there is no way to predict who is at risk, nor is there any specific treatment.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a 47-year-old woman who recently experienced sudden numbness of my arms and difficulty speaking. One doctor said it was stress without examining me. A second physician diagnosed migraine, although I've never had headaches. I had a normal cardiac ultrasound, but I believe that I need an MRI. My brother died at 46 of a brain aneurysm, and I think that my symptoms suggest a TIA. What should I do?

DEAR READER: Find a doctor who will order an MRI scan. There are many possible causes for your symptoms, including transient ischemic attack (mini stroke), migraine equivalent or cerebral aneurysm. It seems to me that you won't know the cause of your difficulty until you have been thoroughly tested. Such testing should, in my opinion, include an MRI or CT scan.

Given your family history, I worry that you — like your brother — could have an aneurysm. Certainly, this is not likely, but you probably will not be satisfied until this possibility is ruled out by appropriate testing. An MRI is expensive, but it is safe, painless and (if normal) would be a relief to you. Therefore, I recommend it. If the test is normal, you can then address other

Station, New York, NY 10156. Be sure to mention the title.

DEAR DR. GOTT: When my son was diagnosed with Lyme disease, he was prescribed tetracycline because the doctor said that the Lyme microorganism is similar to the parasite that causes malaria.

DEAR READER: This is sheer foolishness. Not a single Lyme authority advises therapy with anti-malaria drugs; rather, doxycycline and amoxicillin are the antibiotics of choice. Your son should be under the care of another physician who is more familiar with the treatment of this tick-borne infection.

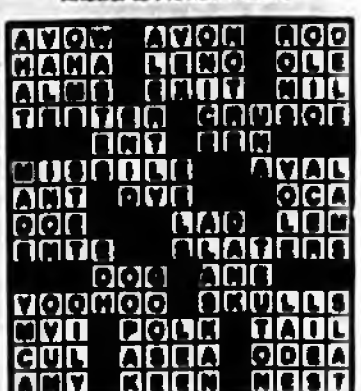

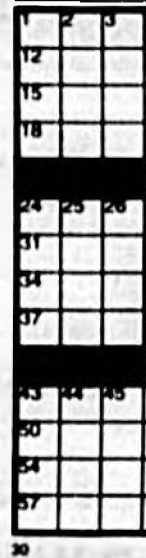

The unluckiest of the year

To get full value from this black comedy, you must look only at the West hand. It was held by George Jacobs, from Burr Ridge, Ill. He was playing in the third round of the Spingold Knockout Teams in Albuquerque last July. The dealer at favorable vulnerability, Jacobs opened one club. He was hoping to reach three no-trump and watch partner run his lovely club suit. North overcalled one spade. East passed, and South advanced with two no-trump! This surprised Jacobs. Did South really have five clubs to the 10? Well, there wasn't much he could do. Clearly partner had a bust. Jacobs passed. North mused for a while, then leapt

all the way to six no-trump! It was passed back to Jacobs. Should he pass or double?

Clearly he could beat six no-trump, but if he doubled, would they run to seven spades? If so, could he do as well against seven spades doubled as he could against six no-trump undoubled? Judging that he shouldn't tempt fate, or shoot at sitting ducks, or some other cliché, Jacobs passed. Now look at the full deal. As you can see, Jacobs appears to be going plus 500 for five down. And seven spades doubled would be only two down: the same 500. Well, appearances can be deceptive. Jacobs led the club queen ... and his partner discarded a spade! The revoke was corrected, but the spade was now a major penalty card. Declarer could require or bar a spade lead. Guess which he selected. Six no-trump bid and made! Jacobs has to be the unluckiest player of the year — unless you know dif-
