Library Is Famous Home Of Rare Books

SAN MARINO, Calif. — Gary Kurutz, a graduate student with the clean-cut campus look of the 1950s, unlocked a fireproof steel door and nodded for me to follow him into the rare books stacks of the Huntington Library. It was like leading a blind man into the dark. The Huntington collection is so vast that it is estimated that there are more books in the Huntington than in all the libraries of the United States combined. His briefing was casual. The stacks are three-story piers independent of the building walls so as to minimize earthquake damage. Temperature and humidity are controlled meticulously, the result of one of California's earliest air-conditioning jobs. Kurutz waved in some embarrassment toward his own cluttered desk among the stacks. Spread across his nearby worktable was a diary written by the priest Francisco Geronimo de Anza on his 1,600-mile colonizing march up from Mexico to Monterey. That date was 1776, a year when the 13 Colonies were too busy to ponder the roamings of a few Spaniards and priests on a remote western shore. To a Californian, documents like Font's map seem ancient, yet

Arsonist's List Included Several Sanford Firms

Several Sanford air-conditioning firms were on a list to be "hit" on plumber's union orders, a self-professed demolition expert told the Air Flow arson trial jury today. "Sock it to 'em," Benjamin Franklin Haines recalled as the reply of a high union official after Haines read him a list of companies in both Seminole and Orange Counties he claims was drawn up at the instigation of Daniel Evans, an organizer for Plumbers and Pipefitters Local 803, Orlando. Haines, 39, the father of nine,

The firms were targeted because they refused to unionize, he said Evans told him. The testimony came in the fourth day of Evans' Circuit Court trial on charges he hired Haines to burn Air Flow Air Conditioning Company's 27-truck fleet Sept. 19. Telling the jury the target list was so "numerous" he couldn't remember all the names, Haines said he recalled one Sanford firm scheduled to be burned—Wall Plumbing and Heating Inc., 1007 S. Sanford Ave.—because he worked at Wall five years ago. Haines admitted stealing power tools and selling them, and said he "enjoyed fleeing."

Councilmen Call Longwood Meet

LONGWOOD — Three councilmen have called a special city council meeting for 7:30 p.m. today to authorize legal defense in the civil law suit filed by Mayor Eugene Jaques to void sections of the 1923 city charter and to remove Thomas Hennigan as police chief. Circuit Court Judge William G. Arledge earlier this week entered a default order against Longwood after the city offered no defense to Jaques' suit. Councilmen with a 2-2 hung vote refused to authorize City Atty. Joseph Davis to defend the action. Councilmen June Lormann and Don Schreiner voted for a defense while Councilmen B. H. Ferrell and B. L. Helms, both noting they are Jaques' supporters, opposed. With Council Chairman E. E. Williams hospitalized the deadlock could not be broken. Williams came home from the hospital Wednesday afternoon and he, Mrs. Lormann and Schreiner called tonight's meeting at the Williams residence, 881 E. Lake Ave., Longwood. Davis ruled last week that Williams acting in his capacity of chairman could not call a meeting outside city hall, but that the council could call a meeting anywhere it chose. Schreiner said this morning the police department was delivering meeting notices to all five councilmen, Jaques and City Clerk Omie R. Shomate. In addition, Schreiner said public notices of the meeting were posted on the bulletin board in front of city hall, at the post office and at the police station. Jaques in the lawsuit asks the circuit court to define his responsibilities and powers as mayor, to void a charter provision permitting override of a mayor's veto by simple majority, to stop councilmen from repealing ordinances giving him additional powers and a \$10,000 annual salary. Jaques is also claiming in the suit that Hennigan was illegally hired as police chief by the city council and only the mayor has the power of appointing the head of the police department. The city charter says the mayor shall appoint a town marshal which Jaques said

'We're Suckers' Stone Says Of Russian Phosphate Deal

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — While banks are raising prime interest rates to 10 per cent, the U.S. Import-Export Bank is providing a \$10 million low-interest loan to help pay interest on a \$100 million loan to Russia with phosphate needed in the United States, a Florida official says. "It is amazing to me how the Export-Import Bank, an agency of the U.S. government, can make an unsecured loan to the Soviet Union for \$100 million at 1 1/2 or seven per cent interest," Secretary of State Richard Stone said Thursday. ammonia nitrates over a 20-year period. Both resources are primarily used for different type fertilizers. Stone said the loan from the tax-supported bank in Washington was to help finance \$400 million in materials and equipment for Russian plants. Forty million will come from the Soviets and another \$100 million will come from a consortium headed by the Bank of America. The agreement was worked out by U.S. industrialist Armand Hammer, board chairman of Occidental Petroleum Co., he said. Hammer also helped negotiate the 1972 Russian wheat deal sale. Stone contended that the phosphates are needed in the United States where farmers have complained of shortages in phosphate-based fertilizers. "Phosphate is in such short supply that we could have gotten gold, or oil, or rubles or anything we wanted," he said. He also said the exchange will force food prices up, as did the wheat deal. Most of the phosphate will come from north Florida, primarily in Hamilton and Columbia counties where Occidental has state permission to expand its mining operation, Stone said. Florida is one of the world's major producers of phosphate. The deal requires Russia to build plants to make ammonia nitrates from natural gas.

Don't Fret, Your Gripe Gets Heard

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — If you have a beef with a state agency's rule that directly affects you, you may soon be able to do something about it after all. The House Governmental Operations Committee unanimously passed a bill Thursday that would revise procedures for state agency rule-making and allow a review of all existing rules. "This requires that rules that have been adopted thus far will be subject to challenge for one year by persons affected by the rules," said committee chairman Rep. Kenneth Mackay, D-Orlando. Rep. Robert Hector, D-Miami and chairman of a subcommittee that drafted the bill, stressed that a person had to have a direct involvement to challenge an existing rule. "You have to be affected by the rule, not just somebody off the streets because some people would rather go to a hearing than go to the movies," Hector said. He said the bill would create an office of hearing examiner — providing independent arbitrators who would hold hearings on challenged rules and proposed new ones. If the examiner agreed that a challenge was valid, he could order a revision, Hector said. The bill must go to the House Appropriations Committee before it reaches the floor of the House.

Pope, Despite Illness, Will Make Pilgrimage

ROME (AP) — Despite his recent illness, Pope Paul VI will make his annual way-of-the-cross pilgrimage tonight, carrying a six-foot cross of light wood through the ruins of the Roman Forum. The frail, 76-year-old Roman Catholic pontiff will also carry out the rest of the annual Good Friday ritual, which requires him to kneel in the open for more than half an hour. The procession is the Pope's main Good Friday activity. His Easter schedule has been limited as a "precaution" because of his recent attacks of the flu. He is not attending the Good Friday Mass in St. Peter's Basilica or the Saturday night Easter vigil there, Vatican officials said. They brushed aside suggestions that the Pope is seriously ill but said he is "extremely frail" and often in pain from arthritis, a stiffening of the joints, especially in the back, that makes both sitting and standing painful. Pilgrims Follow Last Walk. JERUSALEM (AP) — Christian pilgrims from around the world followed Christ's last walk through the holy city of Jerusalem on Good Friday, guarded by reinforced Israeli police units. Armed police and border police patrolled the narrow, twisting alleys and stood guard on the massive Turkish walls as thousands thronged the Via Dolorosa leading to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. A police spokesman admitted the Israelis had called in additional security forces following Thursday at the northern Galilee town of Qiryat Shimonah. Many of the faithful carried heavy wooden crosses as they followed Christ's route to his final agony on Calvary. Catholic and Protestant celebrations coincided this year with those of the eastern rites.

Like The Christ He Loves, Father Of Six Is Crucified

Philippines (AP) — For the sixth year, Juanito Piring, a laborer who earns about \$7.50 a week when he works, was nailed to a cross today as a Good Friday act of sacrifice. Piring, 33-year-old father of six, did not utter a sound as Medina Pamposo drew a silver painted, three-inch spike into the palm of each hand, especially in the back, that makes both sitting and standing painful. Marco, the Roman soldier who drove the nails into the body of Jesus Christ. Piring, in a white loin cloth, a curly wig and a crown of thorns, represented Christ. At the foot of the cross dozens of flagellants, their naked backs scarred with their own blood, lashed themselves with bamboo scourges, splatting members of the crowd closest to the cross. More than 7,000 persons thronged the huge church and hundreds stood outside in wet, windy weather as the Pope washed the feet of 12 youths, half of them police victims.

Downfall Of A King Who Killed Boyle Guilty In Yablonski Deaths, Lawyer Vows To File Appeal

MEIDA, Pa. (AP) — W.A. "Tony" Boyle has eaten the hard rock dust of the Montana coal fields, and he also knows the unpleasant practices that went with the presidency of the United Mine Workers union. But his once-labor leader career as a spectacular actor is already over Thursday when a jury convicted him of three counts of murder in the slaying of UMW rebel Joseph "Jack" Yablonski and his wife and daughter.

The verdict came more than four years after a trio of hired gunmen shot the Yablonskis to death in their beds at their Clarksville, Pa., farmhouse. Yablonski once had been in Boyle's inner circle, but his defection over the issues of miners' health, safety and welfare led to one of the most bitter internal struggles of the labor movement.

It was 11 years ago that Boyle gained the union presidency as the hand-picked heir of John L. Lewis.

Born in Montana in 1901, the son of Irish immigrant parents, Boyle went to work as a coal miner after graduating from high school.

Boyle was elected president of the Western States District 27 in 1948.

Lewis made Boyle an assistant in 1948 and Boyle worked in the shadow of his boss until Lewis' retirement in 1960.



White House Facing New Tape Subpoena

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House, facing a House Judiciary Committee subpoena for tapes and documents, says it will turn over at least some of the materials.

Presidential Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler on Thursday said President Nixon would give the committee materials "consistent with his constitutional responsibilities."

Ziegler said the materials, to be turned over within two weeks, would bear out the President's past explanations of his Watergate role and "receive the support of the House."

Ziegler declined to say that the response would comply fully with the demand by the House committee.

The committee staff's brief said, "Realistically, the President probably cannot be compelled to comply with a subpoena by use of the processes of either the House or the courts."

That realization prompted Rep. Edward Hutchinson, R-Mich., the senior committee Republican, to cast one of the three votes against issuing a subpoena. The others voting were Reps. Charles Wiggins, R-Calif., and Trent Lott, R-Miss.

NATION TODAY

Ehrlichman, Colson

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell set June 17 for the trial of former White House aides John D. Ehrlichman and Charles W. Colson and four other men accused of conspiring to violate the rights of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist. The judge declined to hold a separate trial for Ehrlichman, who is charged in addition to conspiracy with four counts of making false statements.

Federal Relief Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation which would provide increased federal aid to victims of last week's tornadoes in the South and Midwest has been put off until after the 10-day Easter recess of Congress. The House unanimously passed a substitute to the Senate's disaster-relief measure, and the differences will have to be resolved in a House-Senate conference committee. Meanwhile, President Nixon added Illinois and West Virginia to the list of states eligible for existing disaster aid.

Care In Heart Treatment

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — New experimental findings about the heart's built-in pacemakers suggest the need for greater caution in the drug treatment of the many elderly people affected by abnormal cardiac rhythms.

This was reported today by Dr. Jay Roberts, chief of the pharmacology department of the Medical College of Philadelphia, at Philadelphia. He said the elderly patients potentially involved are those chronically affected by disturbed rhythms of the heart — called "arrhythmias" — that commonly follow coronary heart attacks. He said the drug most commonly used is quinidine, which is taken orally, and that the research he reported specifically suggests new caution in the use of this drug in the elderly.

'Can't See Straight'

BOSTON (AP) — Optometrists will be eyeing the eyes of runners in Monday's Boston Marathon to see if there is any truth to the old saying "I'm so tired I can't see straight." Staff members and technicians from the Massachusetts College of Optometry plan to test the eyes of about 50 competitors in the marathon to see what changes show up before the race and after it — when the runner is tired.

Watergate Tax Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — The special Watergate prosecutor has been authorized to proceed with tax investigations involving more than a dozen persons, Atty. Gen. William B. Saxbe says.

But presidential tax lawyer Frank DeMarco, the only person identified by Saxbe, said he has not been contacted by anyone from the prosecutor's office or the Justice Department.

Saxbe told reporters Thursday that Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski inquired about a week ago as to whether his jurisdiction covered tax matters and DeMarco, who prepared President Nixon's tax returns for 1969 through 1972.

The Internal Revenue Service and a joint congressional committee reported last week that Nixon owed more than \$400,000 in back taxes for those years.

Pennies Passe?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans won't have aluminum pennies in their pockets in the near future after all, and they soon may not have enough copper pennies, either, the U.S. Mint says.

The vending machine industry has killed the aluminum penny idea, and hoarders apparently are buying up the copper coins faster than they can be produced.

Tax Talks Snag

WASHINGTON (AP) — A last-minute snag threatens to prolong steel industry contract negotiations into the Easter weekend.

A committee representing 800 locals of the United Steelworkers union, which must ratify any proposed agreement, had been scheduled to meet Thursday.

Search For Plane

HONOLULU (AP) — The search resumes today for a sightings plane which disappeared with 11 persons aboard during an inter-island flight.

The pilot, in his last radio contact, said he was taking the plane to the Kilauea Volcano area, the Federal Aviation Authority said.

Derailment Investigation

CHICAGO (AP) — The chairman of the Chicago Transit Authority says a special commission will be set up to investigate the derailment of a elevated train that injured 23 persons.

The two-car train lurched off the rails above a downtown intersection Thursday, and one of the 80,000-pound cars dangled precariously over the edge of the tracks at a 45-degree angle.

Commodities Commission

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House has voted 281 to 43 to create a commission armed with sweeping authority over the commodities exchange industry, a booming business with an impact on prices of food and other basic products.

The five-member commodity Futures Trading Commission would watch over exchanges where contracts for the future delivery of products are bought and sold.

Israeli Towns Demand Army Avenge Arab Attack

JERUSALEM (AP) — The people of Qiryat Shmonah demanded today that Israel's army avenge the deaths of 18 of their neighbors massacred by three Arab guerrillas from Lebanon.

Amid widespread expectations of a retaliatory Israeli raid into Lebanon, Premier Golda Meir warned the Beirut government that Israel held it responsible for the outbreak of the fighting. She said Israel's army is "ready to fulfill its task."

Eight children, five women and five men died after the three Arab gunmen slipped across the Lebanese border early Thursday, invaded the town of Qiryat Shmonah in Israel's northern panhandle and blasted their way to the top floor of an apartment building.

The gunmen were killed in a hail of small arms and recoilless rifle fire that set off their explosives.

Other persons were wounded in the attack.

Angry residents of Qiryat Shmonah, used to guerrilla attacks but never of this ferocity, gathered in the streets and shouted for increased army protection and revenge.

"I don't care how weak the government is," roared one man. "We have to hit back."

Viet Reds Take Base

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — Thousands of North Vietnamese troops overrun a strategic South Vietnamese base 60 miles north of Saigon that had been besieged for almost 14 months, the Saigon military command reported. The Tong Le Chan base was manned by 250 to 300 rangers whose fate was unknown, military sources reported. A government spokesman said the base was of strategic importance because it was on a Communist infiltration and supply corridor leading toward Saigon and also toward An Loc, a provincial capital 10 miles to the north.

Japanese Rail Strike

TOKYO (AP) — The worst transport strike in Japan's history ended of slightly today as three private rail lines reached agreement with their unions. The one-to-five-day walkouts that began Thursday affected an estimated 6 million people today, about half the population and 5 million less than on Thursday. The nationwide strikes climax Japanese labor's annual spring wage offensive. The unions this year are demanding pay hikes of 30 to 35 per cent to counter a 24 per cent increase in the cost of living. They also want anti-inflation allowances and the right to strike for government employees.

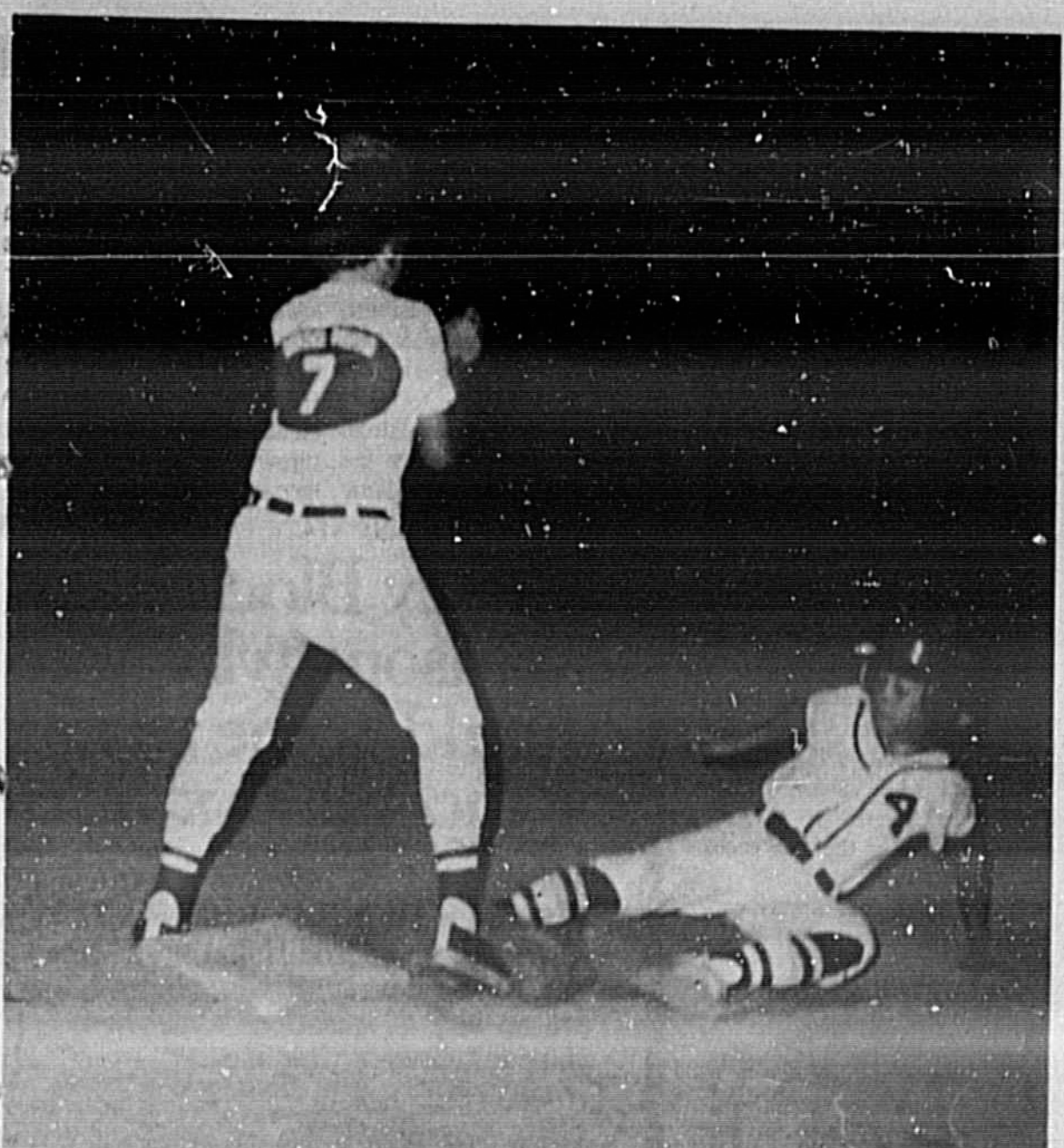

There's a new item called "FUEL ADJ" on our electric bills. It stands for fuel adjustment. It is a part of the rate structure since 1925. We started itemizing it on your bills last December to help you better understand your monthly charges.

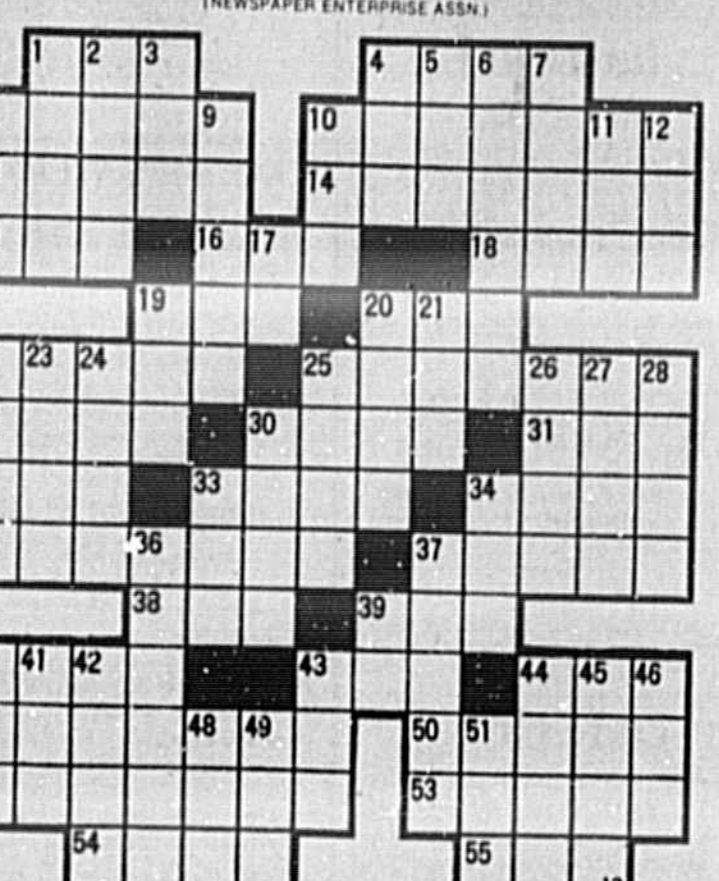

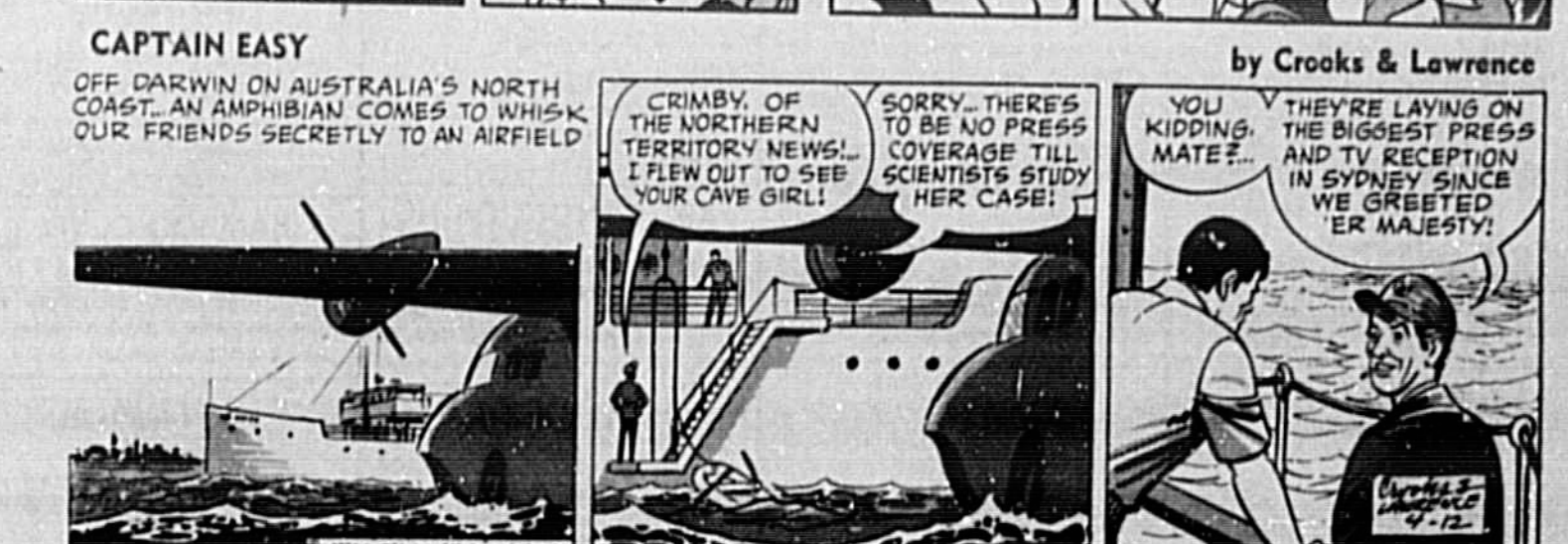

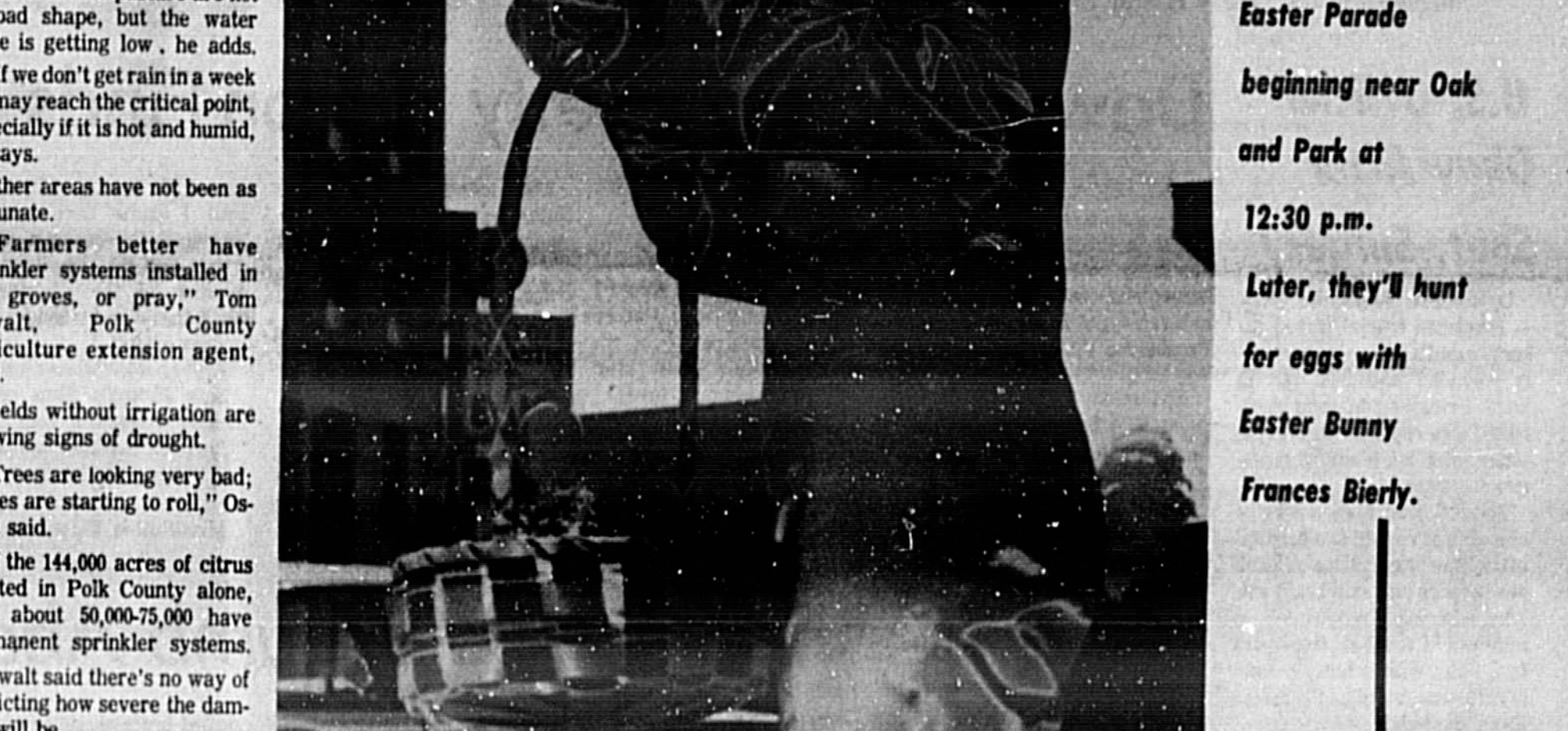
