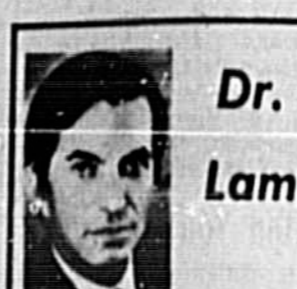

I have read that testosterone would help. Does it? I would like to know how the remaining prostate and cause more trouble to develop. Is anything better in the hormone line that can be taken to remove the impotency?
DEAR READER—There are many causes of impotence. Some young men have it on a psychological basis, often from impotence and lack of confidence.
Impotence can also be caused by many other medical problems besides psychological factors. Diabetes is a classic example. By affecting the nerves necessary to a response, impotence develops. 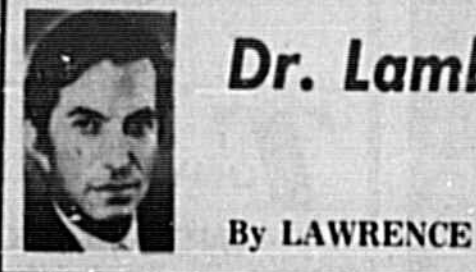

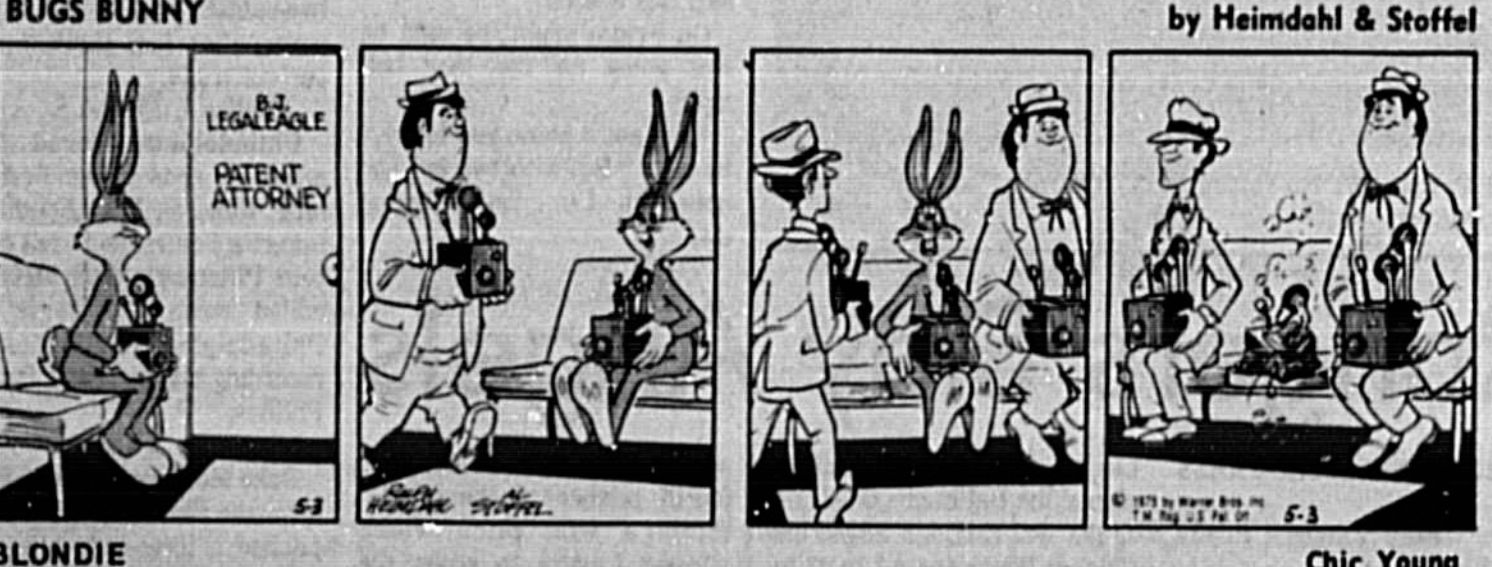
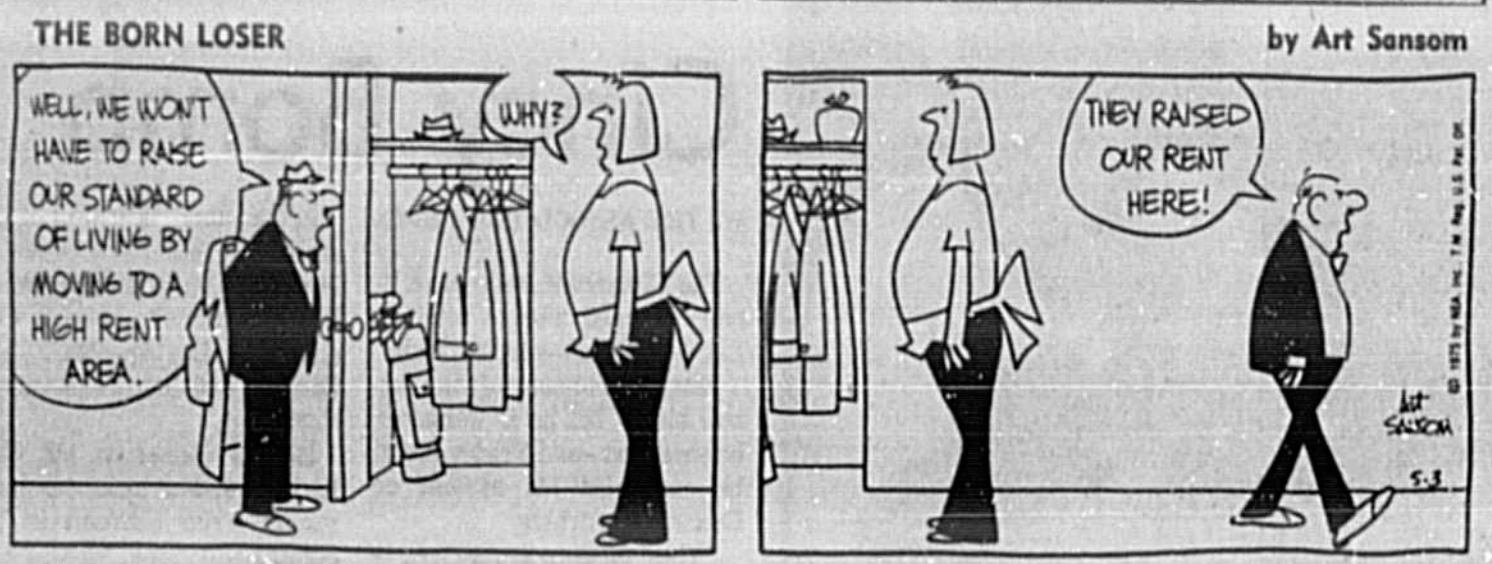

One glance and you know - this was no ordinary classroom. To start with, the teacher, a petite young woman informally dressed in slacks and sports shirt, cradled a baby on her hip as she spoke animatedly with her students.

And those students, young men and women for the most part, were not lined up behind desks with books and pencils as the ready, but instead lounged comfortably on pillows strewn about the large space cleared in the center of the carpeted room.

Most remarkable of all, however, were the women students, for each was an expectant mother well into her first six weeks of pregnancy.

Peggy Gocken is the teacher. A Registered Nurse and mother of three children, she gives instruction in "natural" or "prepared" childbirth at the Deltona Methodist Church one night a week in a continuing series of six-week courses.

The students are expectant mothers from the Sanford-Deltona area. Many of the women are accompanied by their husbands, all of whom participate actively in the classes.

There was a time when women had no alternative but to suffer agonies during childbirth, but this is no longer true. Today medical science has developed a variety of drugs which sedate or anesthetize a woman during labor and delivery, reducing much of her fear and discomfort. At the same time, however, these medications tend to reduce a woman's control over the birthing process in varying degrees and can cause partial or total amnesia of the entire event.

The objective of "natural" childbirth is to teach a woman special techniques which will enable her to remain in control during all phases of childbirth with little or no medication. Through a learned pattern of responses, she is able to keep her discomfort to a minimum and experience to the full the miracle of childbirth. In many instances, husband participation can lend invaluable support during the long and arduous hours of labor, and even during delivery.

Obviously, not all expectant mothers will favor "natural" childbirth, nor are all husbands psychologically or practically equipped to assist. However, it is a method of childbirth which is stirring interest and gaining devotees nationwide, and whether or not the technique is used during childbirth, the education gained during preparatory classes is of great value to most expectant parents.

"The parents become useful members of the obstetrical team. With their understanding of their roles in the birth process - a husband can help by simply keeping his wife clean, dry and comfortable. "Parents take great satisfaction in knowing they have worked together to give their baby the best start in life, and the greater understanding and participation in childbirth enhances this momentous and memorable event in their lives," she concluded with unflagging enthusiasm.

# Colonial Houses Remain Lexington Still Concerned About Bicentennial Days

LEXINGTON, Mass. (AP) — Two hundred years ago, Nathan Monroe scurried out of his stately clapboard house and did battle with the British on Lexington Green.

Monroe's house still overlooks the green. Now when there is a commotion outside, its current occupant, Marjorie Weerts, opens the screen door a crack and peeks out suspiciously.

She too is worried about the British. But also the Americans, the Canadians and the Mexicans. They are all tourists now, and as the bicentennial approaches, she and her neighbors fear they will launch an all-out assault on their privacy.

"The other day, I was vacuuming in the kitchen, and I smelled a cigar, and nobody in our vicinity smokes," she said. "I found a dozen people in the front yard, a couple of families just gawking away. I was very cross."

Despite a discreet plaque over the doorbell button that reads, "Not open to the public," people frequently try to force their way in. Mrs. Weerts firmly tells them to get out.

Some who do not get in content themselves with peering in the windows. "It happens quite regularly," she said. "You never have breakfast in your nightgown."

The problem is she lives in an elegant two-story white house with an historic marker on the front. It's right across the street from Lexington Green, that spacious triangle of grass and shade trees where the redcoats exchanged gunfire with the Minute Men early on the morning of April 19, 1775.

The brief exchange was the first battle of the Revolutionary War. President Ford will be among the 120,000 visitors expected to help commemorate it on Saturday.

Directly across the green from the Weerts' house is Buckman Tavern, where the Minute Men gathered to await the British. The rambling building has been restored and is open as a museum of colonial artifacts.

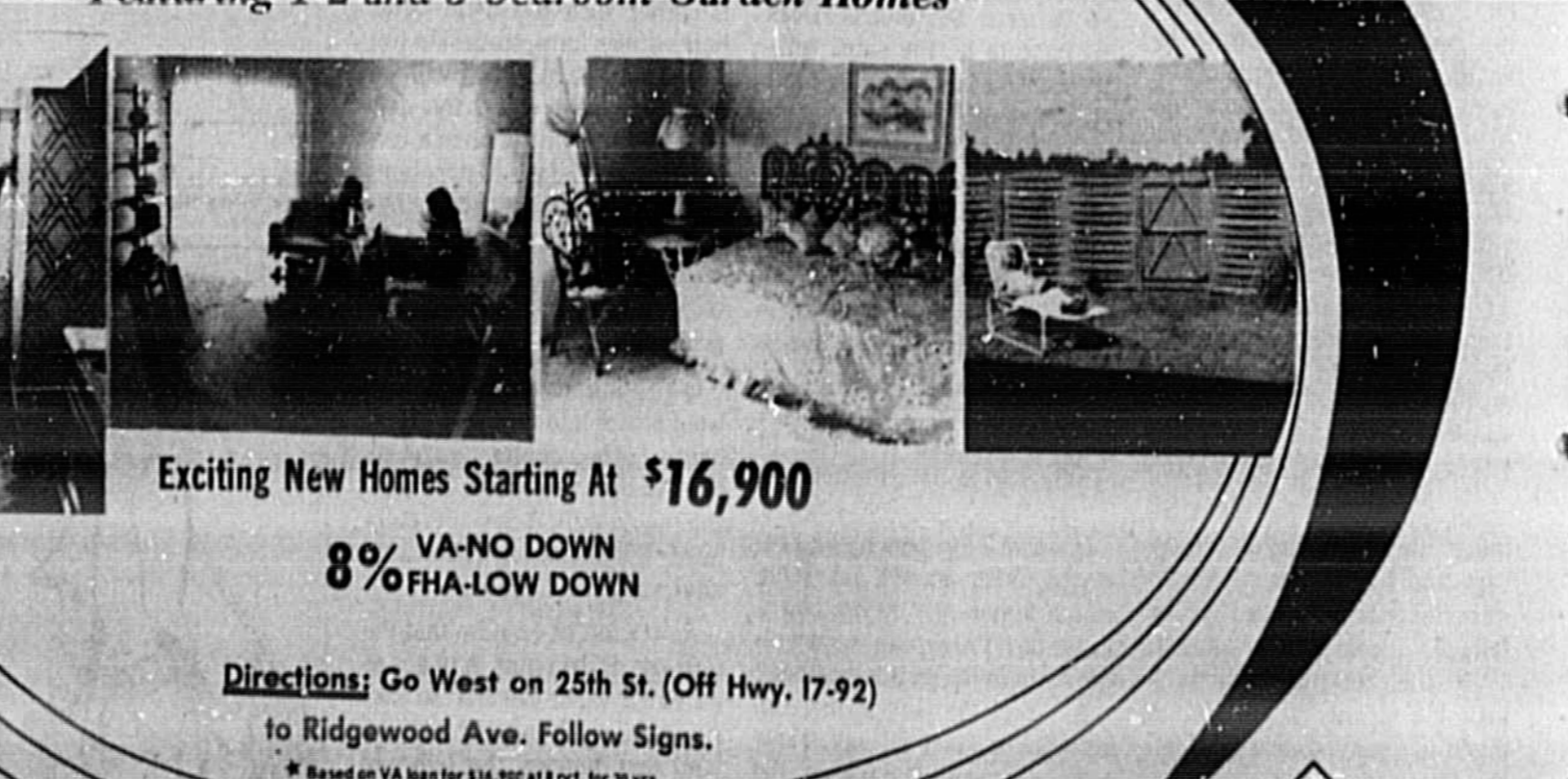

# Loose Chair Joints Should Be Fixed

The joints of a wooden chair sometimes come loose over a period of years. Whatever the cause — humidity problems or just wear and tear — the failure to make a proper repair can be responsible for an accident. It's the kind of repair that should be made when the trouble is first noticed; if it can't be, the chair should be kept out of service until it can.

Most common of the joint troubles is a loose rung. If both ends are loose, the rung should be removed, but very carefully so as not to cause further damage or mar the finish. If only one end is loose, it may be necessary just to remove that end from its socket.

## Terrace Building Season Is Here

Now is the time for all those do-it-yourselfers who have been talking about building terraces to get their projects under way. If you plan to use fill, it may take a while for the ground to settle.

Planning a terrace may lead to arguments within the household, whether it is to be a small or large do-it-yourself job or one that might involve a builder, architect, mason or all three.

A big problem solver can be a book, especially one with good illustrations that will preclude those uncertainties, the "that-is-not-what-I-mean" kind of thing. "The Complete Terrace Book" by Stanley Schuler provides information and illustrations needed to design, build, furnish, plant and enjoy a terrace, patio, lanai, deck porch and atrium.

Before doing anything you should decide why the terrace is wanted, the author suggests, and whether it will do what you want it to do where you want it. For relaxation and eating, you'll want sun and shade, protection against wind and a pleasant outlook.

You may need to make some adjustments to achieve your goal — perhaps you will need to cut a door through the back of the house or you may need to provide a screen or whatever to help serve the purpose when you get a terrace where it is best suited.

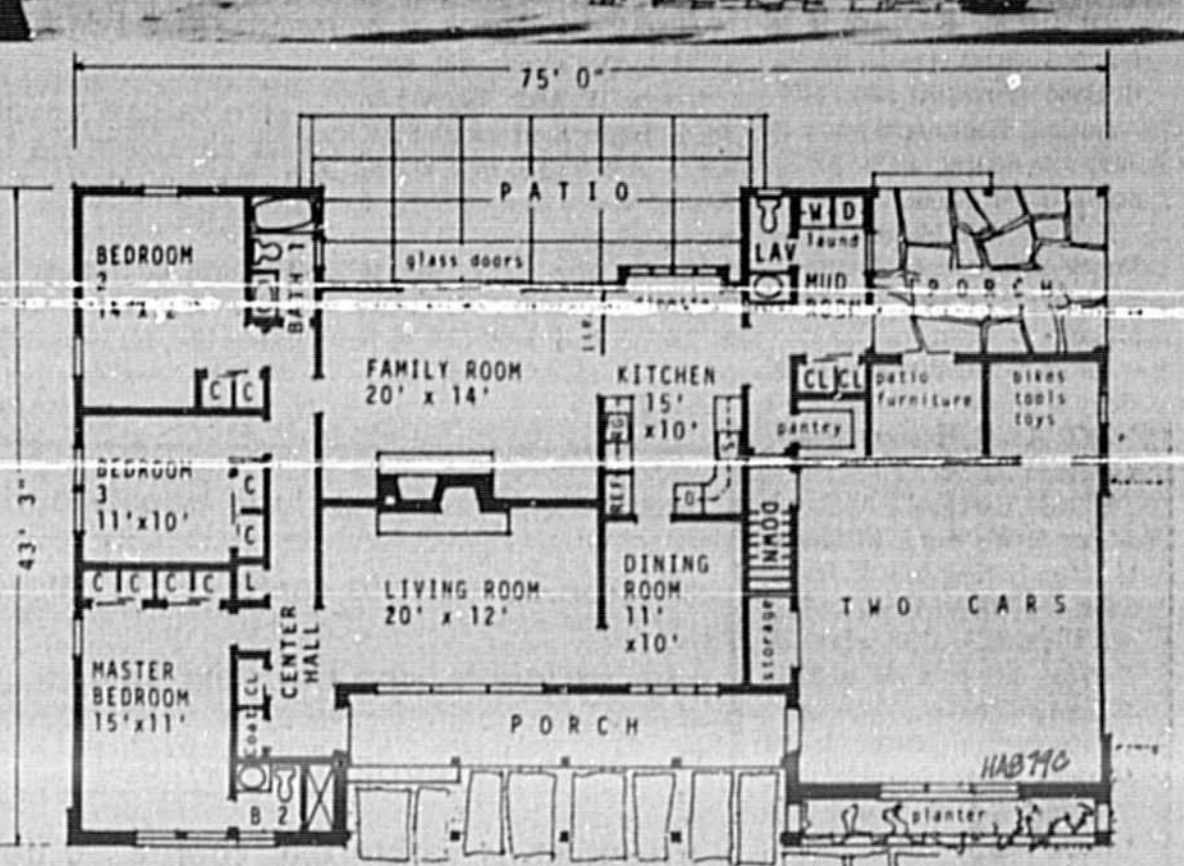

When he retires, the quick excision from his work routine leaves him slightly dazed, and he really doesn't know what to do with all that time at his disposal."

Her husband surrounds himself with books that advise him how to make money at home, how to live longer, how to invest what he has (and has not) and how to stay healthy, a bit of a paradox. He suspects he has every illness he reads about even though he refuses a medical checkup.

"My husband has read so much about heart disease that suddenly he is afraid to walk to the mail box," she said. "It is as if he had been sent home from his job on permanent disability. Sometimes I think imagining his malaise makes him feel better about not going off to work every day."

# Multi-Colored Daylilies Survive With Light Care

Daylilies are one of the loveliest herbaceous perennials grown in Florida. Not only do they survive under minimum care but they are also available in a wide selection of colors from oranges and yellows to pinks and purples.

Daylilies can be classified into three groups according to their growth habit, deciduous, semi-evergreen, evergreen, which have mild winters. Evergreen varieties generally do well in South Florida.

They will survive in Northern Florida but do not receive enough cool weather in south Florida. Although some dormant varieties may grow in South Florida most do not do well. The evergreen varieties, which have foliage which remains green during winter, generally do best in areas

You clean the hall closet... that you may have put too much clutter in the wash water for the socks... that you juggle the check book and stash some bills from one month to another... the frequency of club luncheons and meetings. It is almost as if he never knew you belonged to a bowling club, even though he once bragged about your trophies.

Her husband's favorite phrases have become "where are you going?" and "where have you been?" When she is on the telephone he asks, "to whom are you speaking?"

The woman whose husband had been retired longest (four years) and she has taken on a volunteer job working with youth; others are interested in golf and fishing. In fact, one of my friends complained that she sees less of her husband now than when he was working.

She advises women to restructure their own lives before their husbands retire, especially if they are much younger than their husbands. She suggests: "Several years before he retires the couple should become active with other couples. Gourmet clubs, bridge clubs, golf clubs, country club, political club and church groups offer such opportunities."

If you are a typical clubwoman with many clubs which require volunteer services, phase that part of it out gradually. You don't want your husband to feel that he has no activity to match yours. If you notice that he does have things to occupy his time during the day, you can always restructure chairmanships for your organization or whatever.
