Era of 'Easy' Gains for Independence May Have Ended by Fourth of July Celebration Finds Trend Still Upward

GUATEMALA (AP)—Guatemala's new military government went to work today on a program of rooting out Communists and punishing 'criminals' responsible for atrocities alleged to the Red-backed regime of ousted President Jacobo Arbenz Guzman.

More than 1,000 Communists and fellow travelers were reported to be held in Guatemala City, the central pentecity. Most of the country's top Reds had escaped to far-flung hideouts. Col. Carlos Castillo Armas, the victorious rebel chief and No. 1 man on the live-man governing junta until July 11, when it is scheduled to name a permanent president.

Under the peace agreement signed with Castillo in El Salvador last Friday, Col. Eliezer Manzanera, the junta's chief of staff, is scheduled to name a permanent president. Though Castillo disclaimed any desire for the presidency, his followers were openly disgruntled with his secondary position in the new setup.

WASHINGTON—American Independence Day—July Fourth—has become "Freedom Day" around the world and again an inventory of movements toward self-government during the last 12 months shows that freedom is on the march, even though the comparatively easy gains since World War II may have taken up the slack and the aspirants now face harder going.

Celebrations of the Fourth are scheduled this year at many points beyond the borders of the United States. Denmark, in a tradition of 11 celebrations honoring the United States on its birthday, will stage another this year at Aalborg. A wreath will be laid on the Marquis de Lafayette's tomb in Paris. The British, having swallowed any bitterness stemming from the unpleasantness of the first Fourth, will hold a celebration. Other ceremonies are scheduled in Rome, Tokyo, Karachi, and Havana.

Some older and more settled parts of the world also figure in freedom's picture. Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, West Germany has set 1954 as the year of independence of non-Nazi Germany in England itself there is a movement by the Welsh to get the same status as Scotland.

EVEN the United States itself has figured in at least one controversy. When India at the United Nations challenged the listing of Puerto Rico by the U. S. as a self-governing country, Chief United States Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge announced that he was authorized by the President to say that if Puerto Rico ever demanded independence it will get it.

Not all the trends are toward independence, however. Denmark has announced that Greenland in two years whether to join the rest of the kingdom. Britain has denied dominion rule to Malaya. Nor has the path of freedom been completely smooth this year.

Whole sections of the globe are embroiled in controversies over its

philosophy gaining every day. The Central African federation continues to demand dominion status, to include Northern and Southern Rhodesia and Nyasaland, and so does the Gold Coast.

John E. Lambie, president Florida association of districts will welcome the 300 or more delegates and visitors. He will also serve as chairman of the finance committee. Supervisors of the Bay district, Panama City, will be host group.

J. F. Hollingsworth, Acadia, a supervisor of the Peace River district will be on the program to discuss "How My Soil Conservation District Gets the Job Done." A. D. Holmes Jr., Southeastern vice president of the national association, will be on the program to discuss "How My Soil Conservation District Gets the Job Done."

Turner Wallis, secretary, the Central and Southern Florida Soil Conservation District, of West Palm Beach will be a member of a panel discussing water problems. He will be an adviser to the small watershed committee. H. T. Guppin, chief engineer, State Road Department, Tallahassee, has been invited to serve as an adviser to the public lands committee, which will consider operation of soil conservation districts and county and state high way departments.

Sam A. Thompson, chairman of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts, will be in charge of the parley. He is executive secretary of the Mississippi Water Resources, Inc., Hattiesburg, Miss. Dr. H. N. Young, director, Virginia Experiment Station, Blacksburg, Va., and Dr. B. B. Bury, water rights specialist, Soil Conservation Service, Berkeley, Calif.

All local supervisors, county engineers and other officials of the district are urged to attend this meeting.

Surgeon's Wife Brutally Slain In Ohio Village

CLEVELAND (AP)—A well-to-do neurosurgeon told today how he found his wife backed to death, was beaten himself, then grappled with one or two intruders as he pursued them to the beach near his fashionable lakeside home at Bay Village, west of here, today.

His story and two human tooth fragments were the chief clues in the brutal slaying yesterday. The tooth chips were found in the bloodstained bed of Mrs. Marilyn R. Sheppard, 31, whose pretty face, framed by light wavy hair, was chopped almost to pieces.

Dr. Samuel H. Gerber, who said the four-month pregnant woman had not been sexually assaulted, stated that 25 wounds caused her death from skull fractures at a brain laceration, but the teeth in her mouth were intact. She was clad in light pajamas.

Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard, a husky 30-year-old pathologist at the Bay View Hospital, was often vague as he tried to recall details. He was found yet and dared in the living room of the home. He brought the body to the hospital where his father, Dr. Richard A. Sheppard, is chief of staff, and his two brothers also practice.

Police posted a 24-hour bedside guard for his protection. His 6-year-old son, who lay asleep in the next bedroom while his mother was murdered, was sent to his father's home.

The coroner said he doubted robbery was a motive, though police recovered a bag of Dr. Sheppard's personal jewelry in back yard weeds and his medical bag had been ransacked. He said he would speculate that someone might have been in search of narcotics.

Through pulled lips he told police that while doing, he suddenly suddenly awoke when he vaguely sensed his wife was screaming, and after dashing up the stairs, was stunned by a blow on the back of the neck.

He recalled running out to the Sheppard's beach house, fronting on Lake Erie, where he grappled with someone. He later said there may have been two men.

Governor Says On Trail Of Top Ballot Racketeer

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—On the eve of Oklahoma's primary election set for tomorrow, Gov. Johnston Murray announced he's hot on the trail of the "big fish" involving the state's absentee-ballot-selling racket. The vote scandal prompted Murray to throw five eastern Oklahoma counties under martial law election day. Five officers and four troops will supervise precincts in Adair, LeFlore, Sequoyah, Cherokee and Pittsburg counties.

Trooper Issues Warning At Least 376 Dead In Nation

Not a single accident of any consequence had occurred in Seminole County up until today, according to police reports, since the Fourth of July holiday weekend began last Friday night.

Trooper R. D. Harrison of the Florida Highway Patrol said there had been no accident of any nature on the highway, but that several drunk drivers had been pulled off the road before they did any harm in Sanford, only a minor parking infraction occurred, according to his police report. He said he would be especially careful tonight when roads will be crowded with homecoming cars.

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. With another day still to go in the long Fourth of July weekend, 15 persons have died violently in Florida.

Automobile crashes, as usual, have taken the heaviest toll. Ten have been killed on crowded highways. Four drowned and another died of a heart attack while wading in the surf.

A strong tide engulfed and drowned Mr. and Mrs. Roy King of Miami yesterday when they tried to keep their 5-year-old daughter, Pamela, from being swept out to sea on an inner tube.

As the parents did the treacherous currents carried Pamela's inner tube back to the shore and watchers on the beach pulled her to safety.

The Kings were fishing from a small boat at the foot of Palm Key Bridge near Marathon and Pamela was paddling around the boat on the inner tube when the tide began to carry her out.

King dove into the water to go after the child, witnesses on shore reported, and the boat capsize. However, Mrs. King pulled the water. They were quickly caught by the heavy tide and swept under their bodies were soon recovered but efforts to revive them were futile.

At 11 a. m. Lawrence E. Berry of the Palm Beach Air Force Base was rescued as he floundered in the sea at the Negro beach near Jupiter. Not until Berry was rescued at a hospital did it become known that a companion swimming with him had drowned.

Berry said his friend, Airman 3rd Class Edward J. Brody, 23, was in the water for about 10 minutes when Berry went to his aid, both men sank. Brody drowned without being noticed by other swimmers, but an unidentified civilian saw Berry and pulled him unconscious from the water.

As a search was started for Brody, his body washed ashore yesterday. Traffic on the beach included R. W. Wolfley and his daughter, Jo, 6, of Panama City. They were injured fatally in a collision with a car. Lt. Lawrence E. Berry of the Marine detachment at the Jacksonville Naval Air Station was killed when he stepped out of his car on Beach Boulevard to check his tire and was struck by another automobile.

Other victims were Tony Masari, Tampa grocer, who died when a car smashed into a concrete structure, and a woman who died when a car crashed into a concrete structure.

By PETE OSBORNE. Visiting London and Paris was for many years the dream of Mrs. Ruth B. Scott, receptionist at the Sanford Atlantic Bank. But Mrs. Scott didn't stop with just dreaming—she did something about it and today cherishes the fond memories of a month-long trip to the other side of the world. She flew from Orlando to New York shortly over a month ago, and then it was on to London where she joined her nephew, Thomas B. Bolt of Sanford, Bolt is stationed in England with the U. S. Air Force.

"London was as cold last month as our winters are," Mrs. Scott said. "And the people seem very poor." In London, she visited the Tower of London and saw the famed English royal jewels. They tell a story about the only time anyone has ever tried to steal the crown jewels. One of the thieves just spent too much money and someone up to robbing the crown jewels. Of course, I don't know how it was, but that's what the guide told me. Mrs. Scott journeyed through the city and on to Edinburgh, Scotland. It was just beautiful!

1st Federal's Resources Up Nearly Million

In the past twelve months the resources of the First Federal Savings and Loan Assn. increased almost a million dollars according to the statement as of June 30, the jump being from \$3,533,428.48 on June 30, 1950, to the present figure of \$4,441,348.25.

Savings accounts in the local thrift organization climbed from \$3 1/2 million at mid-year 1950 to \$4 1/2 million at the end of the year. The availability of these savings permitted the handling of an increase of 18 1/2 per cent in loans which on June 30 statement amount to \$3,590,171.19. It was said these loans have been made to Seminole county citizens to build, buy or improve their homes.

The continuing acceptance of Sanford and Seminole county by people moving to Florida as a fine place in which to live indicates a good selling job by the Chamber of Commerce as well as the enthusiastic way in which present residents tell their friends the advantages of living here as against existing in some other place, according to George Touhy, executive vice-president.

In keeping with the established policy of increasing reserves, the directors during the period under report added 4.3 per cent to the reserves and surplus account which now total \$272,030.87.

Asked about the outlook for the future, Mr. Touhy said that he was convinced that this area would continue to forge ahead. The extent of the advance will depend on the continued enthusiastic selling that is being done by business men and people who live in the county, he said.

"We have always had good churches, but they, too, are getting larger and their influence is being felt in ever widening circles. This appealing element is getting support now from an upsurge in our school system, which, according to Mrs. Scott says, "they were arguing over the fate of England the way they carry on. They were debating like mad just over whether or not to allow whiskey advertisements on TV." But the trip, she says with enthusiasm, "was wonderful."

\$15,000-A-Year Job Unpopular

ASUNCION, Paraguay (AP)—A U. S. government job worth \$15,000 a year and allowances is going begging.

It is the post of ambassador to this smallest South American nation. The job has been vacant since last October.

In recent years most of the work has fallen on a series of councilors of embassy—Archibald Ross, John Shillock and now David H. Maynard. But they have lacked the rank to deal most effectively with tough problems.

Wealthy U. S. campaign contributors looking for a likely embassy quickly pass over Asuncion after one hurried look at the State Department's report on the post. The capital has a bare 300,000 population and the nation only 1,500,000. There is almost no public entertainment, no good hotel, no good restaurant. Water comes from private wells, and there is no public sewage disposal system. Electricity and automatic telephone function irregularly. Mail, radio, telegraphic and telephone communications to other countries are slow.

To fill such an unattractive post in a hot, sea-level community, the State Department may have to draft an unwilling career man for the ambassador's job.

Paraguay is friendly to Uncle Sam, who has poured funds into the country for a tuberculosis hospital and for valuable farm projects to help raise the nation's low standard of living. This friendship has stood the strain of a violent April revolution, the subsequent selection of a provisional president and the nomination of a new strongman, general Alfredo Stroessner, for the remainder of the presidential term.

Negro Envoy Says Change Can Be Made

DALLAS (AP)—Dr. Ralph Bunche, noted Negro diplomat, said yesterday that the Southern states' attitude toward Negroes "is more reticent than prejudice." He predicted this attitude can be changed.

He admitted that Southern whites may be shocked the instant they find themselves next to Negroes on public conveyances and in eating places. But he found comfort in "the ease with which so many white citizens of the South accept Negroes without prejudice or qualification outside of the South and increasingly in the north."

Dr. Bunche, trusteeship director of the U. S., addressed the closing convention session of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People.

He said the South always had been in the forefront in patriotism and battle courage. "And the black sons of the South have always been there fighting and dying shoulder to shoulder with their Southern white brothers."

"Who, therefore, better than the white Southerner can understand the Negro's burning desire to become an American in full, to win acceptance, to be permitted to make his maximum contribution to the nation that is his own."

Accused of dilatory by two Negro ex-Communists whose charges were found unfounded, Dr. Bunche said: "There have never been more than a handful of Negro Communists and there has never been a Negro traitor against his country, though there have been more than enough against their own race." He hit at Negroes who say they prefer segregation and added: "They are entitled to their views, but not to our respect."

Dr. Walter White, NAACP executive secretary, earlier scored details of two Texas Negro college students' expulsion from Prairie View College, for saying Negroes prefer segregated schools. "How low can men sink to hold their jobs?" he asked. Dr. Bunche, speaking of social relations, said "In gross social relations, and prejudices are stubborn."

SAVN TROOPS WILL STAY

SEOUL, (AP)—Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor said today there were "absolutely no plans" to withdraw all American troops from South Korea.

He returned to his post as 8th Army commander after a four-week visit to the United States. He said he noted "a concentrated interest and effort being expended in developing a unified Asian policy which I feel will bear fruit when codified."

Word has been received from Tallahassee that two Sanford girls, Terrells Jean Nelson and Barbara Brown, were elected to offices in the 1934 session of Florida Girls State which was held June 25-July 2 on the campus of Florida State University.

Miss Nelson was elected as a city commissioner of Ocoee, one of the 16 mythical cities of Girls State, and as a senator in the legislature. Miss Brown acted as a member of the House of Representatives.

In the legislature both girls participated in an American program set up by the American Legion which sponsored Girls State, and in the presentation and passage of legislative bills which girls and their counselors considered throughout the course of Florida.

It is reported that 275 outstanding high school students, rising seniors from all parts of Florida attended this year's program.

"That's the reason we started Old Maids Day. Some people thought we did it to get a man. It's nothing like that at all. It's just to get some presents."

The old maids in Denton—with the good humor to admit it—got together and set Aug. 15 as Old Maids Day. They figured that date, which had many meanings, was the biggest money-spending time, income tax deadline and Christmas and they'd be likely to get more presents.

For four years they have celebrated with a tea at the country club. The local theater has a free picture show where popcorn, peanuts and soda pop are on the house. A local florist furnishes a corsage for each. Then friends give them parties and presents.

The old maids in Denton have been in on the fun. Old maids come in from little North Texas towns around Denton. The Denton chronicles of the party are in Commerce and the local merchants make a big to-do about it all.

The resulting publicity has been terrific. Old maid celebrations have sprung up across the country, but Miss Babbs and her friends have no ambition to make it a national holiday. They're just having fun.

"We don't intend to stop our celebration," says Miss Babbs. "To some of the women this site is really and truly something. But don't call it a convention. I couldn't stand a convention of just old maids. I want to have some men around."

"Energetic with graying hair cut in a modified poodle cut, and weighing a trim 118 pounds, Miss Babbs is known as the original Old Maid around here because she started it all.

Letters addressed to "The Old Maids' Friend, Denton, Tex." find their way to her mailbox. She has never counted the proposals she has received in letters since the first celebration.

Her students get a big kick out of them.

"They think they can get me off the subject just by mentioning it," she says. "And I tell them, look here, you can forget all the Latin you know, but you better not forget Aug. 15."

Three or four of their original group have married since that first Old Maids Day.

"We're just glad they got out," Miss Babbs says.

And as for any advice for old maids.

"I'll tell them that quotation about 'Gather ye rosebuds while ye may.' In other words, you better go on."

HOLLYWOOD — After two years of making pictures all over the globe, Gregory Peck is just about ready to settle down in his native land again.

Not quite though. First of all he has to go to Ireland, Wales and England to film "Moby Dick." The lanky actor is back in Hollywood for a brief visit with his estranged wife and their three sons. I visited him at his house and found him a shade more sophisticated for his worldly travels. He has also acquired a fine set of chin whiskers, which help him in portraying Captain Ahab.

Concerning his domestic situation, he was mum. But since I talk with him his lawyer has issued a statement that there is to be a divorce. Peck's Finnish wife Greta will file the suit and Greta Ballans are under way for a preliminary settlement. The decision follows a long separation.

Two years ago Peck left Hollywood behind to search for knowledge and God. He admits "I have not had some success in the former quest."

"A man would have to be pretty stupid to travel as much as I did and not absorb a bit of knowledge," he observed. "I visited some wonderful places and got the point of view of many peoples."

The money situation was not so successful. He was one of the stars who went abroad to cash in on the 18-month income tax exemption for Americans working out of the country. But his timing was poor. He left too late.

"I made only one picture before the law was changed," he commented. "That was 'Roman Holiday' and I didn't even profit to the fullest on that one. Instead of taking my usual salary, I took a smaller amount, plus a percentage of the profits. So I didn't get in on the gravy."

"Roman Holiday" was filmed in Rome. He followed that with "Night People," which was made in Berlin and Munich; "Man With a Million," an English-made film; and "Purple Plain," shot in Ceylon and London. Although the latter two were made by European companies, Peck was paid by an American company, United Artists.

"That was lucky," he remarked. "I understand the English tax on my salary would have been 95 percent. As it is, I only have to pay 92 percent in the United States."

Peck leaves this week to report to John Huston, who is making the "Herman Melville" picture. The actor will be back in the fall or winter, and then he may be settling down here for a stay.

"I've got one more picture to do for Fox under my old contract," he said. "That will be my next one. Then I start another contract with Fox. It calls for five pictures to be made over a period of eight years. It's sort of security to have in my old age."

Pinafiores A Must For Little Girls In Summer Heat

Pinafiores are a summer must for little girls.

When hot weather comes, an active moppet can be tough on clothes and mother's nerves. Garments that can take a beating breeze through wash day and still look pretty. Women who sew know that the pinafiore is the answer in all categories, and start early to stitch up a summer supply.

Any commercial pattern book offers several pinafiore patterns, but local sewing center experts suggest a couple of tricks for easier sewing and longer wear.

Select a pattern with a straight strap over the shoulder. Then instead of having a single non-adjustable strap cut the piece about six inches longer than the pattern calls for and cut it in half. Finish the edges and tie the ends in a rabbit-ear knot on the shoulder.

For the first summer it gives a betsy look and opens fast for quick ironing. For the next year, can be fastened by buttons or snaps on the ends. In this way the waistline as well as the overall length is dropped to allow for growth.

Wise mothers also save time and trouble by using the simple technique to make several pinafiores at once. Cut all the same pattern at the same time in the different fabrics of approximately the same weight so you can do all machine stitching without changing thread or tensions.

Buttresses make delightful tidbits to serve with a vegetable juice cocktail or a cold soup on a summer supper menu. Roll out your best pie dough cut in squares, put a spoonful of filling in the center of each square and then fold into small triangles. Bake in a hot oven until lightly browned. Finely chopped cooked chicken or ham mixed with a little mayonnaise and prepared mustard make delicious fillings. Or fill with delicious grated cheese or a liver spread.

bridge near Punta Gorda, and Joyce Dunnington, 17, killed in an auto-motorcycle collision near Crestview.

A 75-year-old vacationer from Gary, Ind., Frederick W. Comford, waded into the surf at Fort Myers Beach to cool off. The excitement was too much for him and he dropped dead of a heart attack.

The going-home traffic held the answer today whether the Fourth of July weekend toll of highway accident deaths would fall below last year's 262.

There no longer was any chance of achieving President Eisenhower's hope that the number would be cut in half. On the other hand there seemed small chance that the highway slaughter would reach the record 430 predicted in an advance by the National Safety Council.

With some 18 hours to go of the three-day holiday weekend, at least 231 persons had died in traffic accidents. The total of all accidental deaths was 376, including 110 deaths and 43 in a variety of accidents.

The last day of the holiday weekend saw traffic fatalities still rising at Miami, a car crashing MacArthur Causeway in Miami Beach left the roadway and crashed into a tree.

Two men died. They were Edward Lee Gill, 38, a hotel doorman, and Kenneth L. Anthony, 32, Miami Beach. A woman companion, Eleanor Moran, 38, was badly injured.

Nation's Traffic Deaths Running Under Estimate; 18 Dead In State

Safety Council Admires Drivers For Good Sense

The nation's traffic deaths over the long Fourth of July weekend today appeared to be running around 100 below the estimates of safety experts. The death toll in automobile accidents from 6 p. m. Friday to midnight Monday was 333. This figure compared to the National Safety Council's estimate of 430 traffic fatalities for the 75-hour period. Late reports may boost the death toll but the council expressed admiration for the "good sense" demonstrated by the nation's motorists during the holiday weekend.

NATO Command Soon To Stage Big Sea Exercise

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department announced today a major maritime exercise will be staged by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's Channel Command July 16-25. Ships and aircraft of the NATO forces will be provided by Belgium, France, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom. They will include about 20 destroyers, escort vessels and patrol craft and 40 minesweepers, as well as some 30 naval vessels and auxiliaries making up convoys. There will also be merchant ships in the convoys.

No Injuries Over Weekend In This Area

Not a single accident of any consequence occurred in Seminole County over the Fourth of July holiday weekend, according to police reports. The area did not contribute a bit to the toll of deaths and injuries resulting from traffic accidents in Florida and over the rest of the nation. Trooper R. D. Harrison of the Florida Highway Patrol pulled several drivers who had been drinking off the road before they did any harm, he said, while the county sheriff's office commended the drop in holiday drunk driving. Police Chief Roy Williams remarked the absence of accidents is a "fine record."

President Jacobo Arbenz Guzman and would refuse to deal with the Soviets or their Iron Curtain allies.

Soviet Retaliates With Charges Against U. S. Officials In Moscow

WASHINGTON (AP)—Three Russian diplomats — one of them attached to the Soviet delegation at the United Nations — have been thrown out of the United States during the past six months on charges of spying. The Russian government, the State Department claims, has now retaliated by making espionage charges against two members of the U. S. diplomatic mission at Moscow and forcing their withdrawal.

Surgeon Has Neck Fracture From Murder Night Melee

CLEVELAND (AP)—The brother of Dr. Samuel R. Sheppard said today the osteopath suffered a broken neck and is not yet "ready for questioning" on the slaying of the latter's comedy play. Dr. Sheppard, acting as his brother's physician, said X-rays had shown a slight fracture of the vertebra at the base of his brother's neck and he would have to wear a brace for six to eight weeks. The injured man told police he was hurt in a fight with the slayer, his wife, 31-year-old Marilyn Sheppard, whose pajama-clad body was found early Sunday in her bed at the suburban Bay Village. Her face was smashed by a blow from a heavy—but still un-identified—weapon.

Building Permits Upped By Three
