City now to decide fate of chief, captain

LONGWOOD - Cheers and tears greeted an announcement Tuesday that a majority of the Police Review Board ruled the evidence presented failed to sustain charges brought by the city against suspended Police Chief Greg Manning and Capt. **Terry Baker.**

Manning and Baker were in-undated by hugs and congratulations from supporters after the five-man panel closed the hearing at noon. Relieved at having been exonerated by their fellow law enforcement officers. Manning and Baker are aware their ordeal is not over yet.

They are still awaiting the final decision of Acting City Administrator Don Terry, who said he is going to reconsider his decision to fire Manning and suspend Baker five days without pay and place him on six months of probation.

Terry suspended the two police officers and Manning's secretary, Val Hockenberry, on Feb. 22 for "probable cause" of misappropriation. misfeasance and violation of the employees' code of conduct, based on a report on the handling of Police Benelovent Funds prepared by management consultant Jeff Etchberger.

The more serious charges of misappropriation and intsfeasance were withdrawn by Terry Friday when he announced the disciplinary action. "We'll see what Don (Don Terry) does." Baker said, "It's

up to him now." Manning said. "The reason I kept my mouth shut during all this is I knew my time would come. My time is here now, They're (city officials) going to do what they're going to do. Mr.

Terry's going to have to make a decision. He'd better hope he makes the right one. He's going to have to live with it. They're not going to stand behind him."

William Barfield, a former Longwood policeman who was attorney for Manning and Baker. said of the results of the hearing. "I'm costatic, I'm tickled the

Chairman of the group, Jack Stuckey of 411 Dancey St., Longwood said there is a small nucleus of people involved now, but he expects to have about 20 in the group. He said he has received several phone calls about people who have heard about he movement and want to be a part of it.

NASA budget hearings underway

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A congressional committee said Tuesday there was "no way" it could approve the space agency's \$11.5 billion fiscal 1989 hudget request, but NASA Administrator James Fletcher said choosing where to cut would be like deciding which of his children to murder.

At the start of three days of hearings on the NASA budget proposed by President Reagan. the House appropriations subcommittee said the agency's request was competing with other compelling needs, such as clean lakes and aid to the homeless.

"There is no way we can deliver \$11.5 billion for NASA in 1989," said Rep. Edward Boland, D-Mass., chairman of the Subcommittee on HUD and Independent Agencies.

Bomb threats are not uncommon. Law enforcement and fire officials receive numerous such calls throughout the year.

Fire Chiel Tom Hixon said his department alone responds to about 100 bomb threats a year.

"Usually, they are just someone with a grudge against someone or an owner." said Hixon. The key word is "usually."

The following answers to the raised questions came after interviews with Sanford Police Chief Steven Harriet, Hixon, Seminole County Sheriff John Polk and Seminole Assistant Fire Marshal Ray Pippin.

Each was interviewed separately and asked the same questions. Each department has simi-

lar written guidelines to follow when responding to a bomb threat

An owner/manager of an establisment cannot stop fire. police or sheriff's personnel from conducting a search and/or evacuating a building if they deem the threat to be real.

However, there is an exception. The owner of a private residence can deny a search or evacuation.

Responding personnel can "override" an owner/manager of a private business and conduct a search and/or evacuation of a building, especially when there are several lives at stake.

SANFORD - is the former attend the meeting, which will Seminole High School at 1700 should be renovated and preserved; or should the 62-year-old building be torn down to make way for a new school?

Dan Petham, principal of Sanford Middle School, which is housed in the former high school, said Tuesday he wants to see the main building demolished as part of a massive construction project at the school.

Several area residents including Lorriane Florelli and other members of Sisters, Inc., a Sanford women's organization. believe the building should be preserved. They have gained the support of the Florida Historical Trust, and some members of the state legislature.

The controversy has generated enough interest that the Seminole County School Board has scheduled a special work session for 9 a.m. Friday to consider all sides of the issue. The public is encuraged to



IN BRIEF Deputies investigate two rapes reported by Seminole women

SANFORD - Seminole County sheriff's deputies today are investigating the reports of two unrelated rapes.

In one case, an 18-year-old Sanford woman told sheriff's deputies that she was awakened at about 3:30 a.m. Tuesday by a man she had allowed to spend the night on her living room sofa. She said he raped her in her bed. despite her resistance. After the attack the suspect reportedly left the victim and went back to the living room. She gave deputies a first name of a suspect in the case.

In the other case, a 24-year-old Altamonte Springs woman told deputies she was raped at about 12:30 a.m. in a home in the Sweetwater Club area of rural Longwood. She said she agreed to drive an apparently intoxicated man home alter she met him at TOI Friday's in Altamonte Springs. They traveled to the man's home in his car and entered the home.

The woman said the suspect made sexual demands, and she refused to have sex with him. She alleges he raped her and then had a friend take her back to the bar. The woman was unable to locate the home of the suspect and only

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - A man, who was facing a theft charge March 26 in connection with the theft of a motorcycle and fled from Altamonte Springs police, has been nabbed. Today, he remains jailed and faces charges of battery to a policeman in addition to an auto theft charge.

When the suspect fled from police he allegedly punched one officer in the face. A second policeman pursued the suspect and wrecked his own motorcycle in the chase. That officer suffered a broken ankle and other injuries.

SANFORD - A suspected rapist was caught by Sanford police this morning as he allegedly walked nude out of a bedroom in the home officers had been called to. However, after the suspect was allowed by officers to put his pants on, he escaped and was recaptured later with the aid of a police tracking dog. Roosevelt Walker, 25, of 111

Cedar Ave., Sanford, remains jailed without bond today. charged with two counts of sexual battery, false imprisonment, aggravated assault and

resisting arrest without violence. Walker was arrested at 3:33 a.m. after a police dog ferreted him out from under a home at

111 Maple Ave., Sanford. Sanford Police said they were alerted to the rape as it was occurring. The victim's 26-year-old boyfriend, who had been with her in Walker's home where the rape occurred, ran from the home after the rapist punched him, doused him with lighter fluid and tried to set him aftre, police said. The boyfriend ran to a convenience store and called police.

The boyfriend told police that he and his girlfriend, who don't

live in Walker's home, were asleep there when Walker knocked on the bedroom door and asked the boyfriend to come out to talk. The boyfriend said when he came out of the bedroom Walker allegedly punched and kicked him and doused him with lighter fluid. which he tried to ignite. Police said today they don't know yet why the couple was sleeping in Walker's home.

The female victim awoke, came out of the bedroom. Police said Walker allegedly forced the 20-year-old girl into the bedroom, using a screwdriver as a weapon. The boyfriend ran for

help. He called police from the 7-Eleven, 100 N. French Ave. When officers arrived at the scene of the attack at about 2:45 a.m. and entered the home, the suspect walked out of a bedroom nude when the door was opened.

Geneva family left homeless by fire

GENEVA - An early morning fire today destroyed the mobile home of a Geneva family, according to Seminole county fire officials. Although details were sketchy, Rita Sheehan, owner of the Geneva General Store, who is taking care of the family, said the 30-year-old handicapped son of Doris Ratliff discovered the fire as he emerged from the shower.

Ronnie Ratliff discovered the fire in a back bedroom of the mobile home, according to firemen. He reportedly received minor burns but was not taken to the hospital. The mother, son, and 23-year-old daughter. Diane Ratliff, barely escaped with their lives. Sheehan said. However. two family dogs died in the fire and it is believed a third dog also died, although its body has not

yet been found, liremen said.

Ronnie Ratliff told Sheehan he did not have time to get dressed. He yelled to wake his mother and sister. Diane Ratliff knocked out a back door in order to escape from the blazing trailer. The three said the residence was so filled with smoke they could not see anything. The daughter pushed her 60-year-old mother out the door, she told Sheehan. According to Sheehan the son

declined treatment although he has some blisters as the result of the fire and a sore throat due to inhaling smoke. He was able to alert his mother and sister to get out of the mobile home, then get out himself in spite of his handicap.

He suffered leg and hip injuries in a car accident when he was 18 and has been unable to work since that time. Sheehan said.

When the lamily escaped they sought shelter at a next door neighbor's, about 500 feet away. and there they also called Shechan, a family friend since 1979. Diane Ratliff had started working at the store last week. according to Sheehan.

Although the family escaped the burning mobile home, they lost all their belongings, including some money they were intending to use to pay bills. Sheehan said.

Sheehan mid she will accept donations for the family at the Geneva General Store. Seminole Battalion Chief W.T.

Schaffer said three-quarters of the mobile home was burned. The walls are standing in the remainder of the trailer, he said. adding that the remaining section is not habitable. He noted that once a mobile home is aftre. It can be destroyed within seven

to 12 minutes, the fire department was notifed at 5:11 a.m. and firemen were on the scene at 5:22, according to fire reports. The fire was extinguished by 5:48, Schaffer said.

Schaffer said the cause of the fire is not known and that the incident is still under investigation.

Four units and eight firefighters responded to the call. he added.

LONGWOOD - The city's management consultant Jeff Etchberger gave the fire department high marks in a management study and evaluation presented at Monday night's city commission meeting.

His report calls the department "well organized and gencrally managed in a competent and professional manner." It recommends increased funding to correct deficiencies he attributes to poor decisions on the part of prior city commissions and a lack of leadership on the part of prior city administrators. Currently, the department's operating budget for the 1987-88

fiscal year is \$973,662, with salaries and fringe benefits accounting for \$838,312 of this amount. The capital budget is \$25,581.

Recommended increases for one-time capital outlays include: upgrading the computer system at a cost of \$15,000; purchase of a combined aerial/pumper truck to replace two existing pieces of equipment at \$350,000; and possible renovation of Station 15 at cost of \$150,000, for a total capital budget of \$540,581. No increases are recommended in the operating budget.

The total number of alarms received by the department during 1987 was 1,969 as compared to 425 in 1976. Emergency medical calls (1,180) make up 59.9 percent of the alarms. The total number of fires In 1987 was 126 (6.4 percent of calls). There were 103 alarnis as a result of malfunctioning mechanical fire alarm systems. or 5.2 percent of all calls. Blood pressure checks make up 5.4 percent of the calls.

Ten malicious false alarms were received, and six bomb scares where no bomb was found were called in.

The workload is evenly distributed between the two existing stations. Etchberger said, with Station 15 receiving the most because the rescue squad is assigned there.

Overall, he said, the city's fire department is one of the most active among those stations participating in the first response system with Seminole County. Each of the city's two stations receive approximately 2.5 alarms per day. Only five stations in the county showed a higher incident rate in 1987.

Levels of service were found to be excellent in providing most residential and business properties in Longwood with the best possible basic services possible, as measured in terms

than 1.25 miles from fire stations).

Sixteen buildings in the city exceed the department's fire protection. They include Lyman High School, Longwood Elemen-tary School, Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club and various local businesses. Five others exceed the department's fire protection capabilities because of their size. but are not considered a high hazard with the present occupants.

It is recommended that the city's existing fire code be amended to require the installation of sprinkler systems in structures in excess of 50,000 cubic feet of open space or those with more than two stories or 25 feet in height. If such changes are made, the fire department could meet initial and sustained attack requirements on all new buildings in the city. Etchberger said.

Because of the highly skilled nature of the functions of the department, he said, high priority should be given to completion of additional training and testing programs currently under development. Once completed all personnel should be required to pass competency and physical Icsts.

Longwood contracts with Seminole County to maintain the fire department vehicles. But since the county has transferred this task to the general vehicle maintenance section, there is concern about the quality of the work, Etchberger said. Because of maintenance problems, he

recommends investigating alternative maintenance facilities for the fire equipment and an attempt by the city administrator and fire chief to resolve problems with the county.

The report recommends the city extend an offer to Seminole County to relocate existing station 15 to the area of West State Road 434. The offer is on a joint (50-50) funding basis with the county through an interlocal agreement. If the city commission decides not to do this or the county rejects the idea. Etchberger said the station should remain in its West Warren Avenue location. Projected cost for needed renovations would be \$100.000-\$150,000 in that case.

The city's other station is located at 400 Wayman Ave.

He said the facility is too small and poorly maintained. It was initially constructed for a cost of 998,000, well below standard costs. "It is another example of poor decisions by previous city commissions for the sake of keeping costs low." Etchberger said.

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EDITORIALS The next oil crisis

The world may be awash in oil-with prices low and the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries in disarray-but America is not.

Oil output in the United States has been steadily falling in recent years, and the experts say there simply are no more major domestic oil fields to discover, except in places like the ocean, where it's too expensive to drill.

At the same time, domestic oil consumption is rapidly rising in response to those low world prices and the cancellation of various government conservation programs.

In consequence, America is now importing more oil than at any time since the Iranian oil crisis-40 percent of its consumption, up from 30 percent only a few years ago.

Oil alone accounts for nearly a third of the country's troubling foreign trade deficit.

And the situation can only be expected to grow worse in the future.

The usual proposals have been put forward by the domestic industry-an oil import fee, tax incentives for exploration-but they aren't generating much political enthusiasm. nor should they.

Both would cost the public a great deal in the short run, for no noticeable long-term advantage.

If anything, they would speed up the depletion of American reserves by encouraging their development when the world oil price is still low and it makes no economic sense to tap them.

What's needed is a policy that more or less ignores the supply side-where government intervention has been demonstrated in the past to do more harm than good and which. in the long run, can't be changed anyway---and concentrates instead on demand.

Demand, experience here and abroad has shown, can be dramatically reduced with little pain.

Even a substantial gasoline tax, for instance, would only bring the public's gas expenditures up to where they were a few years ago, before falling prices, inflation and better-mileage cars effectively reduced those expenditures to historic lows.

Yet the result would be a significant reduction in oil consumption-by far the largest American use of oil is to power cars and trucks-as consumers responded to gas prices by buying more fuel-efficient vehicles and reducing unnecessary car use. By the same token, the government must reimpose fuel-efficiency requirements on the auto industry, so that even when gas prices are relatively low conservation gains could continue.

ANTHONY HARRIGAN Trying to clean up the rail labor mess

WASHINGTON-The nation's major railroads operate under legislation-the 61-year-old Railway Labor Act-giving the few hundred thousand rail workers privileges enjoyed by no other group in the work force. They are guaranteed 100 percent of pay, plus wage increases for a period equal to their length of service up to a maximum of six years, if their employers find it necessary to reduce their work force.

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Because of the special privileges accorded under the Railway Labor Act. rail workers receive compensation that exceeds that of almost all other industrial workers in the country, Frank N. Wilner, an official of the Association of American Railroads, reports in Trains magazine that the annual compensation package for train and engine service employees exceeds \$51,000, while trucking companies' employees average about \$34,000.

These high wages are paid to rail workers at a time when rail service is shrinking because of economic conditions. The deindustrialization of the United States in recent years has cost the railroads much of its business. Track ownership

has been cut by 10 percent since 1980. The railroads' share of intercity freight, Wilner reports, is now less than 17 percent. Car loadings of heavy materials are down by as much as 50 percent since 1980. The railroad industry faces keen competition from a highlyefficient trucking industry, much of it nonunion.

Railroad managements have achieved tremendous efficiencies in recent years. They have introduced new technologies. Shortline railroads have been created without archaic operating rules. But rail unions continue to insist on such outdated costly practices as excessive manning of trains and a day's pay for every 106 miles traveled-a rule left over from the days of 19th century steam railroading. And, the 11 rail unions want to extend these practices of yesteryear to shortline railroads, many of which would be killed by such policies. The unions oppose rationalization of work rules. though the competitive situation of the industry demands this take place. They relish the fact that the courts permit them to employ the secondary boycott, a practice forbidden other unions.

The national rail labor negotiations open in July. One hopes the unions will begin to understand they can't continue to receive unwarranted privileges when railroads have seen a severe drop in earnings. Wages have to be related to the overall economic condition of a company and an industry. Today, wages consume nearly 47 percent of every railroad revenue dollar. This is an intolerable burden on the companies in the industry. It is bound to produce disinvestment.

Realistically, one can't expect the unions to give up their unjustified privileges. They'll likely insist on retaining them even if this drives railroads into bankruptcy and abandonment.

What's needed, of course, is scrapping of the outmoded Railway Labor act so rail workers receive no more and no less consideration than other employees of a business or industry. Congress, however, must proceed to create conditions of fairness and common sense in the railway labor situation.

WASHINGTON WORLD Byrd sees no chaos in Senate

WASHINGTON (UPI) - From his vantage point, which gives him a considerable but perhaps myopic view, Democratic leader Robert Byrd feels that if there exists a problem with the Senate, which he is not ready to concede, it lies not with the body but with its 160 individual parts.

Certainly no single man is more qualified than the 70-year-old West Virginia senator to judge the Senate. Byrd has been writing a history of the Senate for eight years, has been the Democratic leader for almost 12. and has served for 30.

Yet Byrd's assessment that there is nothing radically wrong with the Senate conflicts with the view of critics, some of them in the Senate. who feel that the august body is increasingly atflicted with a highly virulent strain of paralysis.

His contention that the problem, if there is one, is basically the fault of the members, rather than the mstitution, avoids the conclusion that the Senate, rules, procedures and traditions notwithstanding is no more than an ever-changing collection of 100 people free to guide their own destiny.

If there is a problem with senators, then there must be a problem with the Senate. At a news conference, announcing

that he would not seek re-election as party leader but run for a seventh term from West Virginia, Byrd said, "The problem is never with the Senale

But Advertiser publisher Bruce Anderson stuck by his story. For more than a week he swore it was true and that he had himself listened to the tape.

SCIENCE WORLD New hope treating epilepsy

BOSTON (UPI) - Many epileptics who have not had a seizure for at least two years may be able to discontinue their medication, according to a new study.

Dr. Nocl Callaghan and his colleagues at the Cork Regional Hospital in Cork. Ireland, studied 92 epileptics who slowly stopped taking drugs after they had been free of seizures for at least two years.

In findings published recently in The New England Journal of Medicine, 31 of the patients relapsed and began having seizures again. But the remaining 61 patients remained seizure-free for an average of nearly three years.

About one in every 200 children. in the United States suffers. epilepsy, which causes periodic involuntary spasms and convulsions. The cause is not known. The seizures can be controlled with drugs, but long term use can cause side effects, including neurological damage

Previous studies have suggested that some epileptics can discontinue their treatments without suffering scizures, but it has been unclear. how to identify the patients who would be able to do this

North's notebooks reveal anxiety

WASHINGTON - The secret notebooks of L1. Col. Oliver North reveal that the gung-ho Marine was afraid of someone blowing the whistle on him for nearly a year before his arms-for-hostages game was finally exposed.

That is because we had the goods on North's scheme and his notebooks show that he knew it.

Independent Counsel Lawrence Walsh and the grand jury tried unsuccessfully to legally get their hands on North's notebooks. The congressional investigating committee, which provided North limited immunity, got thousands of pages under subpoena, but only released a few pages to the public. The rest are officially classified as secret."

We have seen a few of those classified pages which make it clear that North was sweating over how

much we knew and how much we would print about the arms-forhostages dickering with the Ira-

Here is a chronology:

ntans.

December 1985-Dale Van Atta confronted the Pentagon's top man on terrorism, Noel Koch, about the involvement of Gen. Richard Secord and ex-CIA official Thomas Clines in the sale of arms to Iran through Israel in return for hostages. During the tran-contra hearings. Roch testified that Van Atta had the facts straight. "He came to me and asked me about it. ... I simply said. 'Would you please drop it? I think if you go with this story ... you may get somebody killed."

Dec. 12-An associate of North's on the National Security Council called our office to chew us out for a column which said the CIA station chief in Beirut, William Buckley, had been tortured to death in Iran. At the time, the United States was sticking to the story that hostage Buckley was still alive.

Feb. 21, 1986-North wrote in his notebooks that an associate of his was "called by Dale Van Alta re-Second/Tom Clines in Israel rehostages.

Feb. 24-In an interview with Van Atta, President Reagan confirmed the arms-for-hostages story and asked that the information remainsecret until the hostages were free. Adm. John Poindexter. Reagan's former national security adviser. later testified in the Iran-contrahearings that he was "very nervous" that Reagan had been so candid.

April 28-June 29-We published a series of four columns giving the bare outline of the arms-forhostages deal. In early July, Northwrote in his notebooks that our knowledge of the deal had been discussed at a staff meeting.

July 10-North sent a secret message to Poindexter including references to our information. "It is disturbing that the visit (Robert McFarlane's visit to Tehran) may also be common knowledge.

Aug. 20-A Washington Post reporter asked North's nominal boss. Howard Teicher, if our columns were true. Teicher said no. He later told us he was concerned that he would risk the lives of hostages if he confirmed our story.

Sept. 17-North wrote another secret message to Poindexter making a case for keeping Secretary of State George Shultz in the dark on one aspect of the arms-for-hostage deal. North speculated that the leaks of information to us started with Shultz-that Shultz would confide in someone, who would tell someone else, who would tell someone else. The person at the end of the chain "could well be the source of the Jack Anderson stuff we have seen periodically," North wrote.

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Dukakis's grip on nomination tightened by New York win

NEW YORK (UPI) - Michael Dukakis, a man of deliberate demeanor, used quiet efficiency to conquer New York's rowdy primary and began to put a stranglehold on the Democratic presidential nomination with the contest shifting to nearby Pennsylvania.

The low-key Massachusetts governor waltzed through almost all segments of the boisterous Empire State Tuesday, scoring an easy win over civil rights leader Jesse Jackson that put him firmly in front of the Democratic White House race.

With 99 percent of New York precincts reporting. Dukakis had 783.568 votes or 51 percent to Jackson's 573,112 or 37 percent to Gore's 156.052 or 10 percent.

Dukakis also corralled the lion's share of 255 delegates to the Democratic National Convention that were at stake. United Press International found him heading for 152 delegates, with 88 for Jackson and 15 for Gore. That would give the front-runner 900 of the 2.082 delegates needed for nomination to 769 for Jackson and 418.5 for Gore. Some Democratic delegates vote fractionally.

Bus wreck scatters children

ROCK HILL, S.C. (UPI) - The driver of a bus that flipped over and left "kids scatter everywhere" along a busy highway was cited by police for driving too fast as he returned the children from a school field trip.

Driver Howard V. Boles, 31, apparently was distracted Tuesday by children playing on the bus. South Carolina Highway Patrol Cpl. Jerry Ferrell said.

Forty-one children and seven adults were treated at area hospitals, officials said. Two were hospitalized in serious condition with head injuries suffered in the accident. Tuesday. Boles was not injured.

Girl killed in gang violence

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Two seemingly trivial disputes. one involving a baseball cap and the other talk between teenage boys and girls, have left three people dead in the latest round of gang revenge shootings.

Gunfire from a speeding car hit 16-year-old Alejandra Malgoza in the chest and killed her as she stood on a street corner about noon Tuesday with her older sister. Hilda. and a friend. The others were not hit.

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

Kuwaiti officials said the missile fell harmlessly in the desert. Diplomatic sources said the weapon was apparently aimed at a Kuwaiti off field but fell short of its target.

A senior Kuwaiti spokesman said the Iranian Sovietmade Scud missile hit about 50 miles south of Kuwait city at 3.15 a.m.

Arafat may attend funeral

DAMASCUS, Syria (UPI) - Supporters gathered today for the burial of assassinated PLO deputy chief Khalil Al-Wazir amid reports Yasser Arafat set conditions Syria would have to meet for him to attend the funeral.

Palestinian sources had said Tuesday that a five-year feud between Syria and the PLO was easing. But PLO leader Arafat has put conditions on his attendance at the burial of Al-Wazir, the Palestinain sources said today.

The sources said Arafat, in contact with Palestianian leaders in Syria, demanded that he be received at Damascus airport by senior Syrian leaders, and that a meeting between him and President Hafez Assad be arranged as conditions for his visit to Syria.

The body of Al Wazir, also known by his nom de guerre Abu Jihad, was to be buried at the "martyrs' cemetry" at the Palestinain refugee eamp of Yarmouk outside Damascus today.



Weighty problems for Heyward

NEW YORK (UPh - Craig "Ironhead" Heyward shed nearly 30 pounds in anticipation of the NFL draft. Now he must convince skeptics the weight is gone for good

Last year. Heyward rushed for 1,655 yards - second best in the nation — and finished fifth in the Heisman Trophy race as a 6-foot. 260-pound Pattsburgh Panthers red-shirt junior. By mid-winter, Heyward's weight ballooned to 282. By the second week of April, after two months of three-a-day workouts with a trainer in Phoenix, Ariz., his weight was down to 253.

"I lost all that weight without anyone pressuring me." said Heyward, who had threatened to sue the NFL if he was declared incligible for the April 24-25 draft. "I get up by 6:30 (a.m.) and I'm usually in bed by 12 (midnight) but the key was not eating after 6 p.m.

For some NFL teams however, Heyward's weight-loss may not be enough to expect him to be another Earl Campbell, who

became the protoype modern power running back in his prime years with the Houston Oilers.

FOOTBALL

"We think he's a good player. but we're concerned about his lack of discipline in regard to his weight," said Gil Brandt, Dallas Cowboys vice presidentpersonnel development. "A 250-260 pound runner that doesn't have real exceptional speed will be running against players who are bigger and stronger than those in college."

Brandt has reason to question Heyward's weight control. Panthers Coach Mike Gottfried once challenged the tailback, who had said his favorite food was whatever's available at the time," to a dicting contest. Gottfried lost 49 pounds -Heyward gained 5.

"People are conscious that you play at a certain weight to prolong career longevity." Brandt said. "Look at the trouble many boxers have when they try

to get down to a certain weight."

"He's displayed enough ability against the top level of college talent. He's shown enough nittiness to clude people. (Heyward's weight) is a major concern, but it goes along with the territory.

Weight fluctuation isn't the only blotch on Heyward's record. Heyward, who was given his nickname by childhood friends for being obstinate, salout 1985 for disciplinary reasons after allegedly assaulting a student with a crutch.

"I've had a pretty successful football career." the four-year veteran said Tuesday at a news conference. "I still have some goals I set for myself that I didn't accomplish and 1 don't think 1 can accomplish them with the Rams organization."

Brown, 27, whose 1984 signing bomus included a \$1 million personal services contract, earned a base salary of \$200,000 last year. The Rams reportedly offered Brown between \$225,000 and \$250,000 for next season.

"Eve had an opportunity to see how Rams management dealt with other players," said Brown, a member of the U.S. 4 x 100-meter relay team that wonthe gold in the 1984 Olympics. Because of that, it made me feel like it was my turn. A holdout, 1 didn't want to be part of that. Controversy, I didn't want to be part of that."

Brown shook his head when asked if the Rams could change his mind. "It's an absolute done deal," he said.

Los Angeles was involved in ugly contract disputes with Eric Dickerson and LeRoy Irvin last year. Dickerson was dealt to Indianapolis, and Irvin has hired Dickerson's agent, Charles Chin, and requested a trade.

"Ron Brown is a very good football player and we are sorry to see him retire," Los Angeles Coach John Robinson said in a statement. "But if his decision is irrevocable, we wish him well in any future endeavor."

Brown, who twice won the NFL's Fastest Man Competition. said he got the urge to return to track following Johnson's stirring victory over Carl Lewis in the 100 meters at last summer's championships in Rome. Last weekend. Brown was reinstated by the International Amateur Athletic Federation.

"Ben Johnson is known as the fastest man in the world," said Brown, whose personal best is 10.06. "I watched him at the World Championships and wondered what it would feel like to put a race like that (9.83) together. I want to be known as the fastest man in the world.

"I think my chances in the Olympics are real good. I feel better than I've ever felt and amronning faster than Lever have."

Brown said he will compete in Sunday's meet at Mt. San Antonio College.

Orioles lose again, skid hits 13 games

MILWAUKEE (UPI) - The Baltimore Orioles, plagued by poor hitling and pliching this season, have found a new shortcoming. Shabby defense accounted for four unearned Milwaukee runs Tuesday night as the Brewers took advantage of two passed balls and four errors en route to a 9-5 triumph over the downtrodden Orioles, whose 13th loss tied a major-league record for losses at the start of a season.

"Our fielding wasn't very good to-night." said Baltimore Manager Frank Robinson. 0-7 since taking over for the fired Cal Ripken Sr. "We just didn't do the things we need to win the ballgame." Baltimore tied the 1904 Washington Senators and the 1920 Detroit Tigers for most defeats at the start of a season.

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

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

When figured on an annual basis, the March upsurge in the **Consumer Price Index was 6.4** percent, according to the Labor-Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics. Other major contributors to the increase last month were higher prices for food. beverages and transportation.

Prices rose 0.2 percent in February and 0.3 percent in January.

Former city commissioners Larry Goldberg and Harvey Smerilson, and former city administrator David Chacey testified Monday afternoon that former city officials had been aware of the Police Benevolent Fund and gave it their blessing. They also knew funds raised by the police department through sale of surplus and confiscated goods and fees from fingerprinting, and copies of police reports. which the city said are public. money, was being deposited in the Police Benevolent Fund until 1985 when the city auditor became aware of the practice

and recommended it be halted.

Terry, who was called to testify Tuesday by Barfield, has been acting city administrator since former city administrator Ron Waller resigned under presourc. Terry said he was not involved in politics and was acting in good faith when he suspended the three employees.

He said the police fund was not managed properly because public and private funds were co-mingled and records were not properly kept. Terry denied that he had been pressured by the city commission or Etchberger. or told what to do regarding Manning, Baker or Hockenberry. He said he had never suggested Manning and Baker had

done anything criminal nor was their ever a suspicion of that, but there was an appearance of impropriety.

Waller's testimony Tuesday morning strengthened accusations that the investigation and the attempt to oust Manning were politically motivated and a "vendetta" by Mayor David Gunter.

Under questioning, Waller said he talked to the incoming commissioners in December as well as the two carry-over commissioners. He said, "Gunter wanted me to investigate the Police Benevolent Association Fund, which he said contained public monies. He said the police

In most instances, firefighters do not search for bombs. Police. and sherriff personnel usually dothe actual search and evacuation. Their job is only to locate the device. Firefighters are on standby in case of explosion during the search.

The bomb unit in Seminole County officially consists of one man. Sheriff's Department Lt. Marty LaBrusciano. He is not usually called in unless it is determined that the threat is legitimate.

However, he is notified of all threats and is on a standby at all times, his department said.

If LaBrusciano is not available, the bomb technician from Altamonte Springs is contacted. If he is unavailable, the Orlando Police and Orange County. sheriff's departments also have bomb squads.

Different foods demand different china

I have been served grilled sirloin steaks on dark brown plates and scrambled eggs on bright yellow breakfast china. But worse than food you can hardly find on the plate is the heat-tempered, green tinged glass coffee cup meant to be stylish by leaving you with the feeling you are about to be scalded by an under brewed cup of coffee - and all coffee looks underbrewed in a glass cup. Aside from the purely func-

tional role plates and glasses serve, there is an equally important secondary role: to accent. garnish, enhance and enliven the food being served. This is something that cannot

be accomplished with a set of

that any one color or pattern in half a dozen different sizes and shapes will always be served is wrong. Different kinds of foods demand different kinds of plates.

But it made everything that my mother ever nerved on it look dull and uninteresting. Pale blues and grays are particularly difficult to use effectively with food, no matter how well they blend with the room.

Most people, according to a Bloomingdales' china expert, are like my mother. They choose sets of china "to match the dining room furniture, the wall paper, or even the carpet."

It's just one of those small domestic decisions that I believe most people make for the wrong reasons.



Prescription drugs require informed use, proper care

DEAR READERS: Yesterday, I published a letter from a reader who requested a rerun of information about the interaction of certain foods with prescription drugs. She was wisely concerned that she might be "eating some loods that would be harmful to her medication."

Today I will deal with what you should tell your physician before he or she prescribes any medication:

1. If you have ever had any allergic reactions or side effects to certain drugs in the past.

2. If you are taking any medication on a regular basis, such as contraceptives or insulln; or if you use a nonprescription drug on a regular basis.

3. If you are being treated for a



different condition by another doctor.

4. If you are pregnant, or a heavy smoker, or a heavy drinker.

5. If you are on a special diet or are taking vitamins and mineral supplements.

Some tips to help you use prescription drugs safely and effectively:

1. If a drug is not doing what it is supposed to do for you, check with your physician. You may need a different dosage or a different drug.

2. If you have an unexpected symptom-rash, nausca, dizziness, headache-report it to your physician immediately.

3. Don't stop taking your medicine just because you're feeling better. You may prevent the drug from doing its work completely.

4. Check drug labels for specific instructions or warnings such as, "Do not take on an empty stomach" or, "Do not take with milk."

5. Check the label, or ask your pharmacist, for storing instructions. Some drugs should be refrigerated: others must be

Ground beef has long been one of the basic ingredients in many of our family meals, perhaps because of its versatility and its economy. When planning meals that are lite and nutritious we can continue to use this kind of beef if we purchase ground beef that is marked as lean or extra ican. The cost is alightly higher but you will be getting considerable less fat (cholesterol) and more protein for your money.

Stuffed vegetables, zucchini. peppers or cabbage are good foods to use to extend a pound of ground beef. This recipe makes 12 cabbage rolls. Serve with bran muffins and fresh fruit for a weil-balanced "lite" meal.

STUFFED CABBAGE ROLLS

2 cups water 12 cabbage leaves 1 pound lean ground beef 1 small onton, chopped I can tomato sauce % cup cooked rice 2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper Sauce: I can (8 ounce) tomato sauce

14 cup brown sugar (packed) 14 cup lemon juice 4 cup cold water 2 tablespoons cornstarch

M/W on 100 percent power in a 2-quart batter bowl 5-6 minutes or until boiling. Add cabbage leaves, covering with as much water as possible; cover with plastic. 


