NASA budget hearings underway

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A congressional committee said Tuesday there was "no way" it could approve the space agency's \$11.5 billion fiscal 1989 budget request, but NASA Administrator James Fletcher said choosing where to cut would be like deciding which of his children to murder. At the start of three days of hearings on the NASA budget proposed by President Reagan, the House appropriations subcommittee said the agency's request was competing with other compelling needs, such as clean lakes and aid to the homeless. "There is no way we can deliver \$11.5 billion for NASA in 1989," said Rep. Edward Boland, D-Mass., chairman of the Subcommittee on HUD and Independent Agencies.

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Board rules in Manning's favor

City now to decide fate of chief, captain

LONGWOOD — Cheers and tears greeted an announcement Tuesday that a majority of the Police Review Board ruled the evidence presented failed to sustain charges brought by the city against suspended Police Chief Greg Manning and Capt. Terry Baker. Manning and Baker were inundated by hugs and congratulations from supporters after the five-man panel closed the hearing at noon. Relieved at having been exonerated by their fellow law enforcement officers, Manning and Baker are aware their ordeal is not over yet.

They are still awaiting the final decision of Acting City Administrator Don Terry, who said he is going to reconsider his decision to fire Manning and suspend Baker five days without pay and place him on six months of probation.

Terry suspended the two police officers and Manning's secretary, Val Hoekemberry, on Feb. 22 for "probable cause" of misappropriation, misfeasance and violation of the employees' code of conduct, based on a report on the handling of Police Benevolent Funds prepared by management consultant Jeff Eitberger.

The more serious charges of misappropriation and misfeasance were withdrawn by Terry Friday when he announced the disciplinary action.

"We'll see what Don (Don Terry) does," Baker said. "It's up to him now."

Manning said, "The reason I kept my mouth shut during all this is I knew my time would come. My time is here now. They're (city officials) going to do what they're going to do. Mr.

Terry's going to have to make a decision. He'd better hope he makes the right one. He's going to have to live with it. They're not going to stand behind him."

William Garfield, a former Longwood policeman who was attorney for Manning and Baker, said of the results of the hearing, "I'm ecstatic. I'm tickled. I'm

Group formed to recall mayor and deputy mayor

LONGWOOD — A group of city residents have filed notice with city hall that they have formed a recall committee for the purpose of recalling Mayor David Gunter and Deputy Mayor Lynette Dennis.

Chairman of the group, Jack Stuckey of 411 Dancy St., Longwood said there is a small nucleus of people involved now, but he expects to have about 20 in the group. He said he has received several phone calls about people who have heard about the movement and want to be a part of it.

He said the committee will attempt to get 400 signatures on a petition to put a recall on the ballot. The petition will be presented to city officials. "I hope our action will make the commission aware that we're not happy about what they're doing," Stuckey said.

Commission to get study of Lake Mary salaries

LAKE MARY — Lake Mary city commissioners will receive a consultant's study Thursday night which says the city may be paying its employees at levels about 10 percent below the pay scales of other municipalities in Seminole county.

Police Chief Charles Lauderdale said portions of a study being done by Long Associates of Fort Lauderdale were submitted to the city last week and that he plans to discuss the findings with city

commissioners during their regular meeting Thursday.

Lauderdale said the city has received one copy of Long Associates findings. Only a portion of the study, dealing with compensation, has been submitted to the city, and Long Associates is still working on job analysis studies, he explained.

Lake Mary, as any other city, has minimum and maximum pay levels for each position, according to Lauderdale, who is acting as staff coordinator while City Manager Bob Norris is recuperating from open heart

surgery. He said the consultants recommend that the city increase its minimum pay levels by an average of 16 percent and its maximum pay levels by an average of 12 percent.

The current salary range for the city planner is \$20,256 to \$30,400. Suggested salary levels for city engineer, city clerk and police chief are between \$22,203 and \$33,439.

According to Lauderdale the city manager's salary was not incorporated into the study because the city manager nego-

What happens if the bomb threat is real?

SANFORD — Most bomb threats turn out to be nothing more than a scare called in by immature pranksters aiming to cause problems for the owner of a private business, or who watch on the sidelines as a public building is evacuated and searched. That's it, most of the time, just bomb scares.

But what happens if a bomb threat is real?

The Sunday evening bomb threat at the Barn nightclub on busy U.S. 17-92 in Sanford with an estimated 450 patrons inside and the owner's suggestion that a police/fire search or evacuation of the building was unnecessary

raised several questions:

- Can the owner/manager of an establishment stop fire, police or county sheriff's department personnel from searching or evacuating the building?

- If no search or evacuation is conducted in such cases, who is liable if a bomb does exist... and explodes, killing or injuring several people?

- When fire, police and sheriff's department personnel respond to a bomb threat, who has authority and in whose jurisdiction is it?

- What and who determines that a search and evacuation are necessary?

- Who actually searches for the bomb?

Bomb threats are not uncommon. Law enforcement and fire officials receive numerous such calls throughout the year.

Fire Chief Tom Hixon said his department alone responds to about 100 bomb threats a year.

"Usually, they are just someone with a grudge against someone or an owner," said Hixon.

The key word is "usually." The following answers to the raised questions came after interviews with Sanford Police Chief Steven Harriet, Hixon, Seminole County Sheriff John Polk and Seminole Assistant Fire Marshal Ray Pippin.

Each was interviewed separately and asked the same questions. Each department has simi-

lar written guidelines to follow when responding to a bomb threat.

An owner/manager of an establishment cannot stop fire, police or sheriff's personnel from conducting a search and/or evacuating a building if they deem the threat to be real.

However, there is an exception. The owner of a private residence can deny a search or evacuation.

Responding personnel can "override" an owner/manager of a private business and conduct a search and/or evacuation of a building, especially when there are several lives at stake.

In the case of the Barn Sunday evening during a Johnny

Paycheck concert that packed the house, Barn owner Dale Gustafson said he had things well under control even before police and firemen arrived.

"I got notified by a Sanford police sergeant that there had been a bomb threat. He told me where the call came from, and I immediately put into effect a standard operating procedure we follow where we conduct our own search without alarming the patrons. Furthermore, there happened to be a policeman in the audience and I got him to help with the search.

"By the time police and firemen got here, we had things all but finished. Then I talked

Old Seminole High: preserve or raze?

SANFORD — Is the former Seminole High School at 1700 French Ave., a part of the community's heritage that should be renovated and preserved, or should the 62-year-old building be torn down to make way for a new school?

Dan Pelham, principal of Sanford Middle School, which is housed in the former high school, said Tuesday he wants to see the main building demolished as part of a massive construction project at the school.

Several area residents including Lorraine Fiorelli and other members of Sisters, Inc., a Sanford women's organization, believe the building should be preserved. They have gained the support of the Florida Historical Trust, and some members of the state legislature.

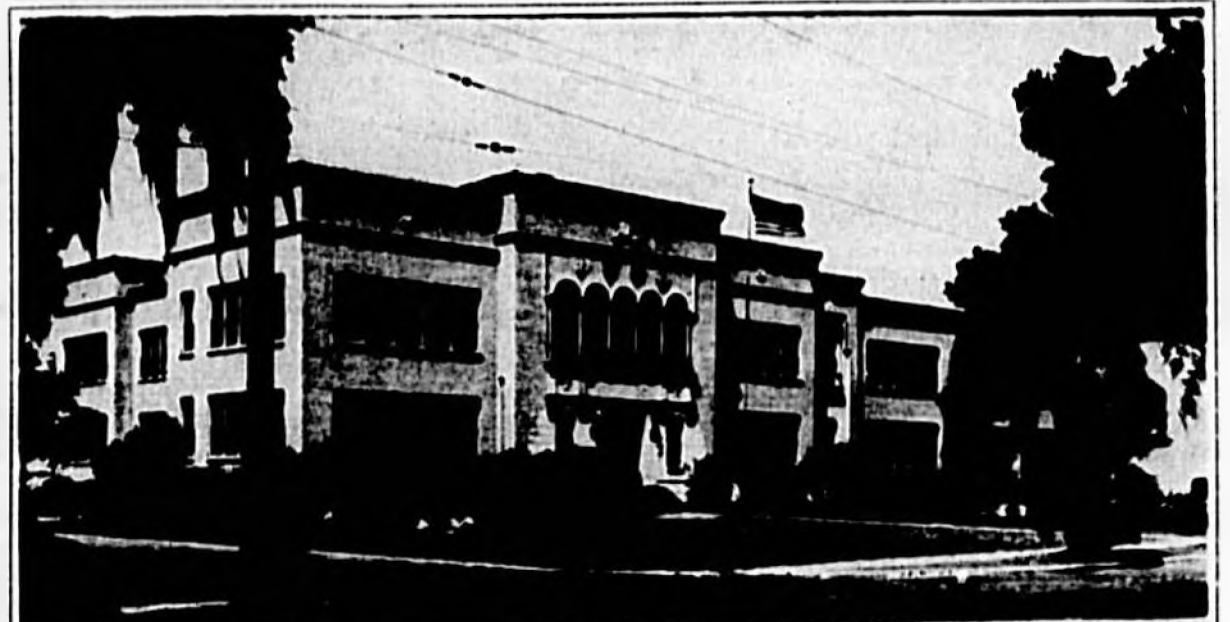
The controversy has generated enough interest that the Seminole County School Board has scheduled a special work session for 9 a.m. Friday to consider all sides of the issue. The public is encouraged to

attend the meeting, which will be at the school board offices, 1211 S. Mellonville Ave., according to Karen Coleman, Seminole county schools spokeswoman.

Fiorelli says if the school board will contact George Percy of the State Division of Historic Resources, he will explain how the school board may be eligible for state funds to help renovate the building.

She said she wrote State Sen. Pat Collier Frank of Tampa, who has been instrumental in helping to preserve other historically significant school buildings in the state. The senator replied that State Sen. John Vogt of Merritt Island is also interested in the issue, and that Rep. B.L. "Bo" Johnson, chairman of the House Education K-12 Committee, is sponsoring legislation which would permit school boards to qualify for state dollars to renovate historic school buildings.

Fiorelli is eager to point out that the building is considered worthy of preserving by Phil

Friday to consider whether to tear it down to make way for a new building, or try to find funds to restore it to preserve part of the city's heritage.

Werndli of Florida Preservation Services, who recently completed a survey of Sanford's historic buildings. Werndli's report says the building "is an outstanding example of the Mediterranean Revival Style and could be considered for listing in

the National Register of Historic Places."

Pelham says he doesn't oppose communities preserving their historical heritage. However, he points out the building was not the first high school in Sanford. "Somewhere, we have to apply

some realism and logic," he said. "Sentimental value doesn't do anything for our boys and girls."

On the other hand, Fiorelli says the present main building on French Avenue was constructed during the time most

Deputies investigate two rapes reported by Seminole women

SANFORD — Seminole County sheriff's deputies today are investigating the reports of two unrelated rapes.

In one case, an 18-year-old Sanford woman told sheriff's deputies that she was awakened at about 3:30 a.m. Tuesday by a man she had allowed to spend the night on her living room sofa.

In the other case, a 24-year-old Altamonte Springs woman told deputies she was raped at about 12:30 a.m. in a home in the Sweetwater Club area of rural Longwood.

The woman said the suspect made sexual demands, and she refused to have sex with him.

Rape suspect nabbed by K-9

SANFORD — A suspected rapist was caught by Sanford police this morning as he allegedly walked nude out of a bedroom in the home officers had been called to. However, after the suspect was allowed by officers to put his pants on, he escaped and was recaptured later with the aid of a police tracking dog.

Roosevelt Walker, 25, of 111 Cedar Ave., Sanford, remains jailed without bond today, charged with two counts of sexual battery, false imprisonment, aggravated assault and

resisting arrest without violence. Walker was arrested at 3:33 a.m. after a police dog ferreted him out from under a home at 111 Maple Ave., Sanford.

Sanford Police said they were alerted to the rape as it was occurring. The victim's 26-year-old boyfriend, who had been with her in Walker's home where the rape occurred, ran from the home after the rapist punched him, doused him with lighter fluid and tried to set him

live in Walker's home, were asleep there when Walker knocked on the bedroom door and asked the boyfriend to come out to talk. The boyfriend said when he came out of the bedroom Walker allegedly punched and kicked him and doused him with lighter fluid, which he tried to ignite. Police said today they don't know yet why the couple was sleeping in Walker's home.

The female victim awoke, came out of the bedroom. Police said Walker allegedly forced the 20-year-old girl into the bedroom, using a screwdriver as a weapon. The boyfriend ran for

help. He called police from the 7-Eleven, 100 N. French Ave. When officers arrived at the scene of the attack at about 2:45 a.m. and entered the home, the suspect walked out of a bedroom nude when the door was opened, police said. The victim came out of the same room and reportedly told police she had been sexually assaulted twice by the suspect, who held her against her will. The suspect was told to put his pants on and after he did he was taken outside. He ran from police, who ultimately tracked him to the Maple Avenue location where Walker was arrested.

Geneva family left homeless by fire

GENEVA — An early morning fire today destroyed the mobile home of a Geneva family, according to Seminole county fire officials. Although details were sketchy, Rita Sheehan, owner of the Geneva General Store, who is taking care of the family, said the 30-year-old handicapped son of Doris Ratliff discovered the fire as he emerged from the shower.

Ronnie Ratliff discovered the fire in a back bedroom of the mobile home, according to firemen. He reportedly received minor burns but was not taken to the hospital. The mother, son, and 23-year-old daughter, Diane Ratliff, barely escaped with their lives, Sheehan said. However, two family dogs died in the fire and it is believed a third dog also died, although its body has not

yet been found, firemen said. Ronnie Ratliff told Sheehan he did not have time to get dressed. He yelled to wake his mother and sister. Diane Ratliff knocked out a back door in order to escape from the blazing trailer. The three said the residence was so filled with smoke they could not see anything. The daughter pushed her 60-year-old mother out the door, she told Sheehan.

According to Sheehan the son declined treatment although he has some blisters as the result of the fire and a sore throat due to inhaling smoke. He was able to alert his mother and sister to get out of the mobile home, then get out himself in spite of his handicap.

He suffered leg and hip injuries in a car accident when he was 18 and has been unable to work since that time, Sheehan said.

When the family escaped they sought shelter at a next door neighbor's, about 500 feet away, and there they also called Sheehan, a family friend since 1979. Diane Ratliff had started working at the store last week, according to Sheehan.

Although the family escaped the burning mobile home, they lost all their belongings, including some money they were intending to use to pay bills, Sheehan said.

Sheehan said she will accept donations for the family at the Geneva General Store.

Seminole Battalion Chief W.T. Schaffer said three-quarters of the mobile home was burned. The walls are standing in the remainder of the trailer, he said, adding that the remaining section is not habitable. He noted that once a mobile home is afire, it can be destroyed within seven

to 12 minutes, the fire department was notified at 5:11 a.m. and firemen were on the scene at 5:22, according to fire reports. The fire was extinguished by 5:48, Schaffer said.

Schaffer said the cause of the fire is not known and that the incident is still under investigation.

Four units and eight firefighters responded to the call, he added.

Consultant: Fire department A-OK

LONGWOOD — The city's management consultant Jeff Etchberger gave the fire department high marks in a management study and evaluation presented at Monday night's city commission meeting.

His report calls the department "well organized and generally managed in a competent and professional manner." It recommends increased funding to correct deficiencies he attributes to poor decisions on the part of prior city commissions and a lack of leadership on the part of prior city administrators.

Currently, the department's operating budget for the 1987-88 fiscal year is \$973,662, with salaries and fringe benefits accounting for \$438,312 of this amount. The capital budget is \$25,541.

Recommended increases for one-time capital outlays include: upgrading the computer system at a cost of \$15,000; purchase of a combined aerial/pumper truck to replace two existing pieces of equipment at \$350,000; and possible renovation of Station 15 at a cost of \$150,000, for a total capital budget of \$540,541. No increases are recommended in the operating budget.

The total number of alarms received by the department during 1987 was 1,969 as compared to 425 in 1976. Emergency medical calls (1,180) make up 59.9 percent of the alarms. The total number of fires in 1987 was 126 (6.4 percent of calls). There were 103 alarms as a result of malfunctioning mechanical fire alarm systems, or 5.2 percent of all calls. Blood pressure checks make up 5.4 percent of the calls.

Ten malicious false alarms were received, and six bomb scares where no bomb was found were called in.

The workload is evenly distributed between the two existing stations, Etchberger said, with Station 15 receiving the most because the rescue squad is assigned there.

Overall, he said, the city's fire department is one of the most active among those stations participating in the first response system with Seminole County. Each of the city's two stations receive approximately 2.5 alarms per day. Only five stations in the county showed a higher incident rate in 1987.

Levels of service were found to be excellent in providing most residential and business properties in Longwood with the best possible basic services possible, as measured in terms of response times (with the exception of properties more

than 1.25 miles from fire stations).

Sixteen buildings in the city exceed the department's fire protection. They include Lyman High School, Longwood Elementary School, Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club and various local businesses. Five others exceed the department's fire protection capabilities because of their size, but are not considered a high hazard with the present occupants.

It is recommended that the city's existing fire code be amended to require the installation of sprinkler systems in structures in excess of 50,000 cubic feet of open space or those with more than two stories or 25 feet in height. If such changes are made, the fire department could meet initial and sustained attack requirements on all new buildings in the city, Etchberger said.

Because of the highly skilled nature of the functions of the department, he said, high priority should be given to completion of additional training and testing programs currently under development. Once completed all personnel should be required to pass competency and physical tests.

Longwood contracts with Seminole County to maintain the fire department vehicles. But since the county has transferred this task to the general vehicle maintenance section, there is concern about the quality of the work, Etchberger said. Because of maintenance problems, he

recommends investigating alternative maintenance facilities for the fire equipment and an attempt by the city administrator and fire chief to resolve problems with the county.

The report recommends the city extend an offer to Seminole County to relocate existing station 15 to the area of West State Road 434. The offer is on a joint (50-50) funding basis with the county through an interlocal agreement. If the city commission decides not to do this or the county rejects the idea,

Etchberger said the station should remain in its West Warren Avenue location. Projected cost for needed renovations would be \$100,000-\$150,000 in that case.

The city's other station is located at 400 Wayman Ave.

He said the facility is too small and poorly maintained. It was initially constructed for a cost of \$98,000, well below standard costs. "It is another example of poor decisions by previous city commissions for the sake of keeping costs low," Etchberger said.

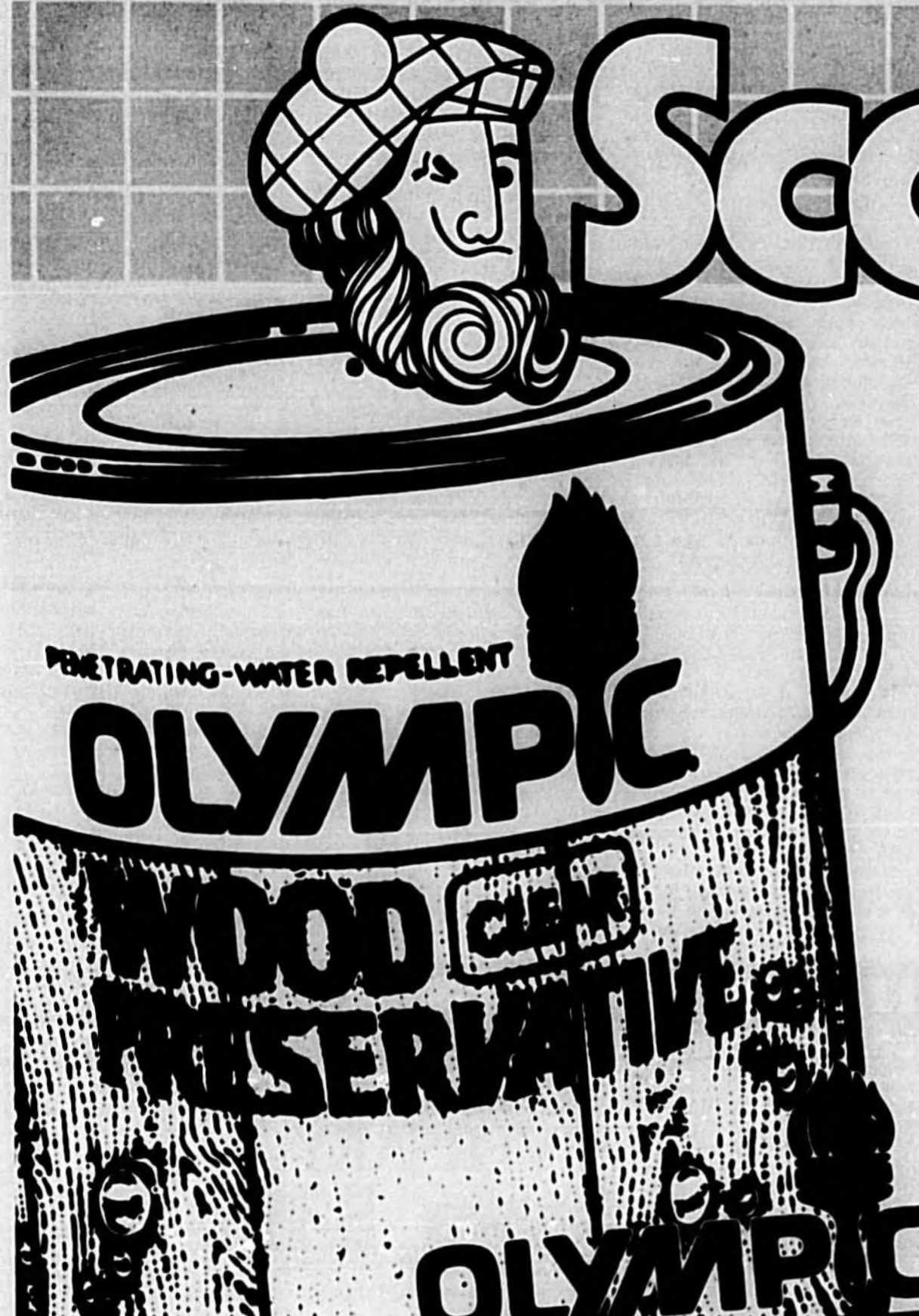

Dukakis's grip on nomination tightened by New York win

NEW YORK (UPI) — Michael Dukakis, a man of deliberate demeanor, used quiet efficiency to conquer New York's rowdy primary and began to put a stranglehold on the Democratic presidential nomination with the contest shifting to nearby Pennsylvania.

The low-key Massachusetts governor waltzed through almost all segments of the boisterous Empire State Tuesday, scoring an easy win over civil rights leader Jesse Jackson that put him firmly in front of the Democratic White House race.

With 99 percent of New York precincts reporting, Dukakis had 783,568 votes or 51 percent to Jackson's 573,112 or 37 percent to Gore's 156,052 or 10 percent.

Dukakis also corralled the lion's share of 255 delegates to the Democratic National Convention that were at stake. United Press International found him heading for 152 delegates, with 88 for Jackson and 15 for Gore. That would give the front-runner 900 of the 2,082 delegates needed for nomination to 769 for Jackson and 418.5 for Gore. Some Democratic delegates vote fractionally.

Bus wreck scatters children

ROCK HILL, S.C. (UPI) — The driver of a bus that flipped over and left "kids scatter everywhere" along a busy highway was cited by police for driving too fast as he returned the children from a school field trip.

Driver Howard V. Boles, 31, apparently was distracted Tuesday by children playing on the bus. South Carolina Highway Patrol Cpl. Jerry Ferrell said.

Forty-one children and seven adults were treated at area hospitals, officials said. Two were hospitalized in serious condition with head injuries suffered in the accident Tuesday. Boles was not injured.

Girl killed in gang violence

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Two seemingly trivial disputes, one involving a baseball cap and the other talk between teenage boys and girls, have left three people dead in the latest round of gang revenge shootings.

Gunfire from a speeding car hit 16-year-old Alejandra Malgoza in the chest and killed her as she stood on a street corner about noon Tuesday with her older sister, Hilda, and a friend. The others were not hit.

Hilda Malgoza said she believes the shooting was in retaliation for her sister's association with teenage boys from rival gangs.

Hijacking siege ends suddenly; hostages released, terrorists gone

ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI) — Hijackers who killed two hostages during 16 days of terror aboard a Kuwait Airways jumbo jet released the last of their 31 captives today in exchange for safe passage out of Algeria.

Kuwaiti sources in Algiers said the air pirates left on a special plane shortly after they ended the hijacking without achieving their goal of freeing 17 terrorists jailed in Kuwait.

After vowing in a pre-dawn statement to continue their failed mission another day, the Arabic-speaking hijackers apparently slipped from the plane about the same time the 24 captive passengers and seven crew members of Kuwait Airways Flight 422 were freed.

Iranian missile hits Kuwait

KUWAIT (UPI) — An Iranian Scud missile apparently aimed at a Kuwaiti oilfield landed in the desert 50 miles south of the city of Kuwait today and there were no reports of damage or casualties, officials said.

Kuwait officials said the missile fell harmlessly in the desert. Diplomatic sources said the weapon was apparently aimed at a Kuwaiti oil field but fell short of its target.

A senior Kuwaiti spokesman said the Iranian Soviet-made Scud missile hit about 50 miles south of Kuwait city at 3:15 a.m.

Arafat may attend funeral

DAMASCUS, Syria (UPI) — Supporters gathered today for the burial of assassinated PLO deputy chief Khalil Al-Wazir amid reports Yasser Arafat set conditions Syria would have to meet for him to attend the funeral.

Palestinian sources had said Tuesday that a five-year feud between Syria and the PLO was easing. But PLO leader Arafat has put conditions on his attendance at the burial of Al-Wazir, the Palestinian sources said today.

The sources said Arafat, in contact with Palestinian leaders in Syria, demanded that he be received at Damascus airport by senior Syrian leaders, and that a meeting between him and President Hafez Assad be arranged as conditions for his visit to Syria.

The body of Al Wazir, also known by his nom de guerre Abu Jihad, was to be buried at the "martyrs' cemetery" at the Palestinian refugee camp of Yarmouk outside Damascus today.

Stuckey said Gunter and Dennis, in the second year of their two-year term, are the only members of the commission who have been in office long enough to qualify for recall under the law. The other three took office in January.

Stuckey, who has lived in the city for 13 years, said he started

the recall effort because "nobody else seemed to be doing anything." He said his feeling about the city officers goes back to Gunter's suit against the city to stop construction of the police station. "I was astounded the people chose to elect him after that," he said. "I don't go to city hall very often. When Gunter and Dennis were first elected, they were outvoted and couldn't do anything, so I thought I would wait to see what they would do this year. But then they tried to get rid of Mr. Manning. I don't think they should spend money like that. It seems to be a personal matter."

Zoo hires new director

SANFORD — Pam MacConnell, a member of the Central Florida Zoological Society Board of Directors since August, has been hired as the zoo's executive director.

MacConnell will assume the position about the middle of May, said Wayne Weinberg, president of the zoo's executive board. He said she was hired from among 145 applicants for the position.

The executive director position has been vacant since the executive board fired Al Rosen last summer.

MacConnell, 38, was director of marketing for MetLife HealthCare Network of Florida, Inc. Weinberg said MetLife has become a major underwriter of zoo fundraising events, largely through MacConnell's efforts.

MacConnell will report to the

executive committee of the society's board of directors. As spokesperson and director, she will be responsible for staff management, long range planning, setting fundraising goals, in-park sales, memberships and promotions.

"She consistently exceeded sales forecasts as MetLife's marketing director, and won recognition for engineering the company's largest contract," Weinberg said. "We are pleased to have such a high-profile corporate executive, community leader and longtime zoo supporter as our new executive director."

A frequent public speaker, MacConnell was an elementary teacher early in her career. Weinberg said MacConnell's background as a teacher is considered an important asset because the board wants to expand its educational pro-

grams.

She is also experienced in the areas of corporate advertising, public relations, sales training, planning, and implementing policies and procedures, Weinberg said.

The new director was recently cited as an "Up & Comer" by the *Orlando Business Journal*. She is currently on the board of directors of Florida Executive Women.

Last February the board hired Bob Heckel, a retired business professor, to be the zoo's development director and fundraiser. Ed Posey is director of operations at the zoo and has direct responsibility for the zoo's day to day operations and its animals.

With the hiring of MacConnell, the zoo's management staff is now complete, Weinberg said.

MacConnell said the Central Florida Zoological Society has been "one of the focal points of

tates his salary with the city.

Lauderdale noted that the study came about largely at his recommendation. He said eight months ago he began complaining to the city, telling officials that he was losing police officers due to low pay. Four of his officers left Lake Mary to become Seminole county deputies, he said. He is still trying to fill those positions, he said.

Lauderdale said he can offer new police officers a maximum of \$15,000. He would like to be able to offer \$18,000.

In recent months he hired three officers, however, one quit after three days and one quit before the city had finished completing his background check. Lauderdale said both left because they were offered better paying positions elsewhere, he said.

However, Lauderdale said that he doesn't think his department is the only one having problems

due to low salaries. The city has been looking for a new finance director for several weeks with no possibilities in sight, he noted.

Six candidates from the top ten applicants were selected for interviews, according to Lauderdale. However, two of those candidates politely told the city "Thank you. We're not interested," once they were told the salary range, he said. The salary proposed by the city for a finance director is between \$22,000 and \$33,000.

According to Long Associates most city employees are paid within the recommended salary range, but about a dozen are not. It would cost the city a about \$14,000 a year more to pay those 12 workers the proposed minimum pay, according to the consultants report. The city is now about halfway through the current fiscal year.

In addition to raising salaries, the consultants also recommend that the city establish a merit pay raise system to provide incentive.

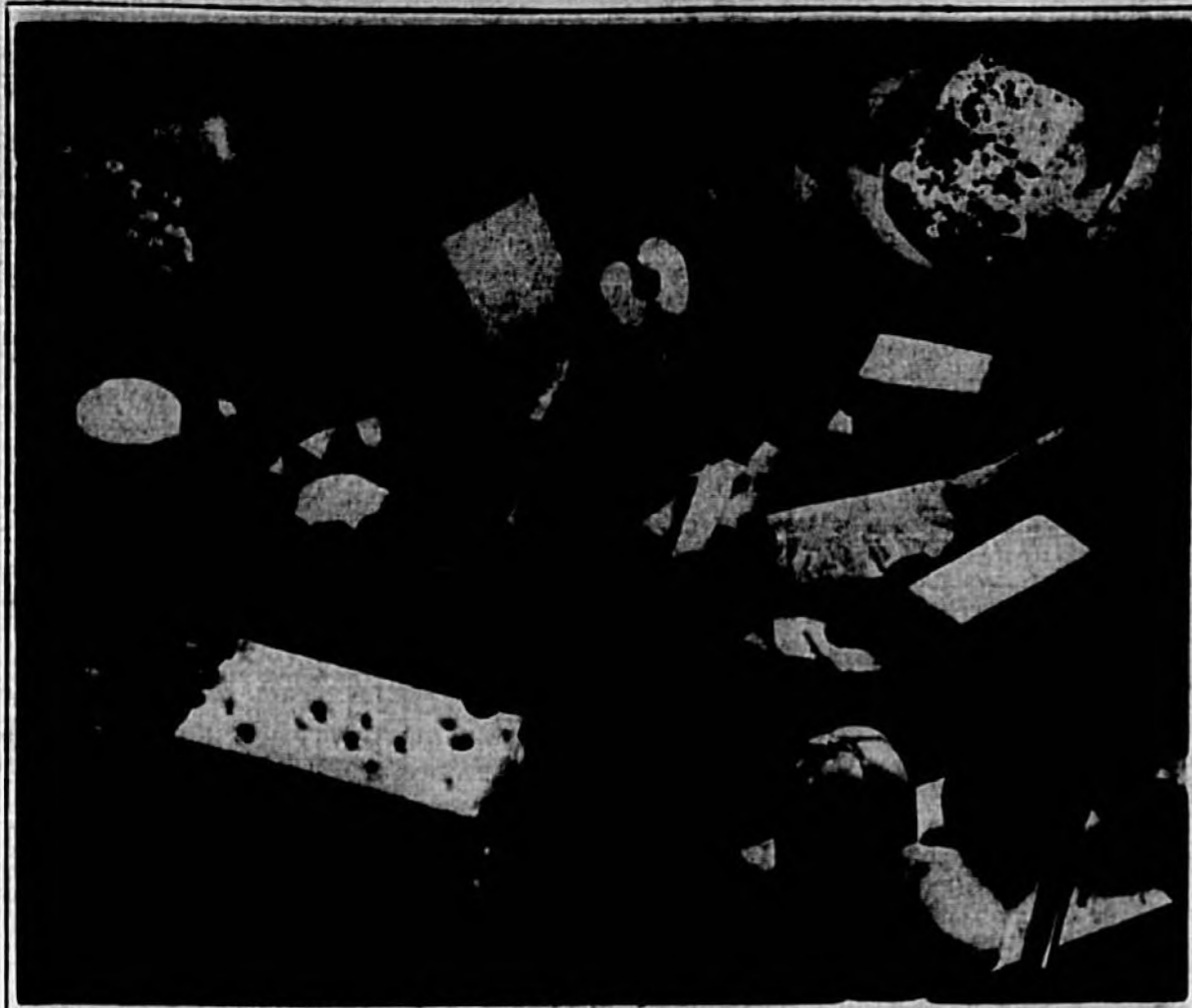

Prescription drugs require informed use, proper care

DEAR READERS: Yesterday, I published a letter from a reader who requested a rerun of information about the interaction of certain foods with prescription drugs. She was wisely concerned that she might be "eating some foods that would be harmful to her medication."

Today I will deal with what you should tell your physician before he or she prescribes any medication:

1. If you have ever had any allergic reactions or side effects to certain drugs in the past.
2. If you are taking any medication on a regular basis, such as contraceptives or insulin, or if you use a non-prescription drug on a regular basis.
3. If you are being treated for a

different condition by another doctor.

4. If you are pregnant, or a heavy smoker, or a heavy drinker.
 5. If you are on a special diet or are taking vitamins and mineral supplements.
- Some tips to help you use prescription drugs safely and effectively:

1. If a drug is not doing what it is supposed to do for you, check with your physician. You may need a different dosage or a different drug.

2. If you have an unexpected symptom—rash, nausea, dizziness, headache—report it to your physician immediately.

3. Don't stop taking your medicine just because you're feeling better. You may prevent the drug from doing its work completely.

4. Check drug labels for specific instructions or warnings such as, "Do not take on an empty stomach" or, "Do not take with milk."

5. Check the label, or ask your pharmacist, for storing instructions. Some drugs should be refrigerated; others must be protected from light.

6. Always keep medicines out of the reach of children.

7. Never let another person use your medicine, and never take medicine prescribed for anyone else. (This includes birth control pills.)

8. Never take medicine at night without turning on the light.

9. Do not transfer medication from the original container to another. The original container is designed to protect the drug. Also the instructions for taking the medication are on the original container.

Readers, for further information about prescription drugs, send for the free booklet published by the Food and Drug Administration in cooperation with the National Council on Patient Information and Education. Stuff vegetables with versatile ground beef

Ground beef has long been one of the basic ingredients in many of our family meals, perhaps because of its versatility and its economy. When planning meals that are lite and nutritious we can continue to use this kind of beef if we purchase ground beef that is marked as lean or extra lean. The cost is slightly higher but you will be getting considerable lean fat (cholesterol) and more protein for your money.

Stuffed vegetables, zucchini, peppers or cabbage are good foods to use to extend a pound of ground beef. This recipe makes 12 cabbage rolls. Serve with bran muffins and fresh fruit for a well-balanced "lite" meal.

STUFFED CABBAGE ROLLS

- 2 cups water
- 12 cabbage leaves
- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1 can tomato sauce
- ¾ cup cooked rice
- 2 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon pepper

Sauce:
1 can (8 ounce) tomato sauce
¼ cup brown sugar (packed)
¼ cup lemon juice
¼ cup cold water
2 tablespoons cornstarch
M/W on 100 percent power in a 2-quart butter bowl 5-6 minutes or until boiling. Add cabbage leaves, covering with as much water as possible; cover with plastic. M/W on 100 percent 5-6 minutes or until almost tender. Let stand while preparing meat filling. Combine ground beef, onion, tomato sauce, rice, salt and pepper. Mix well.

Drain cabbage leaves. Rinse with cold water until easy to handle; drain. Place ¼ cup meat mixture in each cabbage leaf. Fold in sides and roll up, around filling. Place in a 12x8-inch glass baking dish. Combine 1 can tomato sauce, brown sugar and lemon juice and mix well. Pour sauce over cabbage rolls. Cover with plastic wrap. M/W on 100 percent power 5-6 or until sauce is steaming hot, then reduce power to 50 percent and M/W 30-35 minutes or until cabbage rolls are tender. Place cabbage rolls on serving platter.

Combine water and cornstarch, stir into sauce in baking dish. M/W on 100 percent power 1-2 minutes or until sauce boils and thickens, stirring once. Serve over cabbage rolls.

A vegetable soup using lean ground beef is "lite," easy and economical. This makes a good family meal. Serve with crusty bread.

VEGETABLE-BEEF SOUP

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 2 medium carrots, diced
- 1 large potato, peeled and diced
- 1 cup celery, chopped
- 1 cup rutabaga, diced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- ¼ cup water
- 1 can (16 ounces) whole tomatoes
- ½ teaspoon instant beef bouillon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- 3 cups water

Add carrots, potatoes, celery, rutabaga, garlic and ¼ cup water. Cover. M/W on 100 percent power 12-15 minutes or until vegetables are almost tender, stirring once. Add tomatoes (cut into small uniform pieces) juice, bouillon, salt,

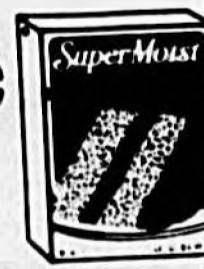

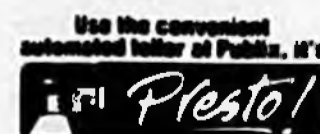
