The Russo-Japanese Treaty

The signing of the Russo-Japanese neutrality treaty is of the greatest importance to the United States. It is a mistake to assume that because international treaties are broken so frequently, they are meaningless. Invariably they do mean something, but never what they seem to mean. So in this instance it does not necessarily mean that Russia and Japan will respect each other's neutrality; rather that Japan has designs hostile to the American interests which Russia hopes will result in war with the United States.

Japan did not dare move against Singapore, the Dutch East Indies, or the Philippines, as long as Russia might attack her from the rear while the southern operation was in progress. Japan knows that this neutrality pact is no guarantee, but hopes that Russia may thus be encouraged to protect her own interests in the Balkans and while engaged in a war in that area would be in no position to attack Japan. Matsuoka in reality is locking his backdoor by sacking the Soviets elsewhere.

The Russians are willing to accept their role in this great international drama because they have very vital interests in the Balkans and the Near East which are endangered by the German thrust to the southeast. Either they are thinking of going to war against Germany or they know that the war may soon come to them and are anxious to have their own backdoor in the Far East securely locked before they become engaged in a death struggle in the West.

The Russians also know that this treaty with Japan is in itself no guarantee against aggression from that source. But they are hoping that it will give the Japs courage to expand to the south, thus immediately becoming engaged in war with Britain, soon with the Dutch and possibly with the United States. While thus engaged Japan would be in no position to threaten Russia no matter how exposed the European war might leave her in northern Asia.

No doubt too the Russians are doing everything in their power to get the United States into the war against the Axis powers, just as we are hoping that Russia may in some way become involved on the British side. Japanese aggression in the South Pacific, the Japs undoubtedly hope, will be "understood" by the United States while the Russians hope it will be resisted. If it is, the United States automatically enters the war against all the Axis powers all of which are in reality enemies of Russia.

Of one thing we can be sure that this treaty between Japan and Russia means that the Japs will soon again be on the march, this time in regions dangerously close to American possessions. And the people of this country will have to make up their minds what they are going to do about it.

Nazis In South America

The defense of South America against foreign aggressors would be less difficult if United States firms doing business in South American countries would be more particular in the agents they select to represent them. This is the conclusion to be drawn from a report by Nelson A. Rockefeller, co-ordinator of Commercial and Cultural Relations Between the American Republics, as published in Foreign Affairs, which reveals the following facts:

1. That United States business firms are frequently represented in Central and South America by firms and individuals now known to support and promote anti-American objectives.

2. That these representatives often use advertising appropriations of United States business firms to force newspapers and, in some instances, radio stations, to adopt anti-American editorial policies.

3. That many employees of United States companies or their relatives in Central and South America are known members of local anti-American organizations.

4. That many anti-American firms, which formerly sold only European products, have now succeeded in obtaining agencies for United States business.

5. That many of these agents who now represent United States firms are obtaining through this medium confidential trade information which is made available to anti-American powers.

6. That profits thus derived from representation of United States firms are being used to finance operations of propaganda agencies in Central and South America.

7. That many of the firms representing United States companies also serve as centers for distribution of anti-American literature and propaganda.

8. Many of the larger anti-American firms have established their own purchasing agents in the United States and with the goods obtained in this market remain in business.

9. Officers and employees of a number of firms, representing United States businesses in the other American Republics, are officers of anti-American powers.

The Co-ordinator's office in co-operation with the Department of Commerce, has begun notifying the United States firms found to have been represented by anti-American personnel, and the results so far have been most encouraging, states the article.

Greenland Bases Are "Invalid," Danes Say

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, (Via Berlin), Apr. 14.—(AP)—The Danish foreign office declared invalid Sunday the agreement for the United States to establish air bases in Greenland because, it asserted, the Danish king and government had not collaborated in the accord.

The foreign office contended furthermore that King Christian X and his government had not been informed of the agreement signed in Washington by the Danish minister.

It was disclosed that the Danish foreign minister had charged the foreign office with the question of involving Greenland's sovereignty without giving him a chance to act in behalf of Denmark and over the proposed establishment of American bases there.

Denmark Minister's Defiance Is Backed

WASHINGTON, Apr. 14.—(AP)—The United States was expected to tell Henrik de Kauffmann today that it will continue to recognize him as minister of the Danish people and back his defiance of a Copenhagen "foreign office telegram ordering him home."

De Kauffmann received the recall order, signed only "foreign office," three days after he signed an agreement for establishment of American air bases in the Danish island of Greenland. Previously the minister had ignored instructions from German-occupied Denmark to protect the American seizure of 23 Danish ships.

A spokesman at the Danish legation said the order for De Kauffmann to return obviously was sent by the foreign office "under duress" and the minister feels it his duty to remain here.

Capital Limelight Again Shines Upon Bernard M. Baruch

WASHINGTON, Apr. 14.—(AP)—Baruch, the capital has a way of coming back to him with renewed brilliance on the white hair of tall, smiling, statesman Bernard M. Baruch.

Years ago, when the term "speculator" (applied to a Wall Street operator) was one of considerable opprobrium, Baruch gathered it onto himself. I'm just a speculator, he said, don't call me anything else. Yet "Bernie" Baruch, to his accomplishment, confidence, respect, and admiration of—has been adviser to more presidents than any other man who has ranged the "Street."

He didn't like the title and by word, written and spoken, has frequently pointed out that in some other war years, it was President Wilson, not Baruch, who applied the pressure that guided the industrial horse—so much so that when it was all over, Von Hindenburg paid tribute to his accomplishments with this remark: "The war was won in the American industrial centers. They understood war."

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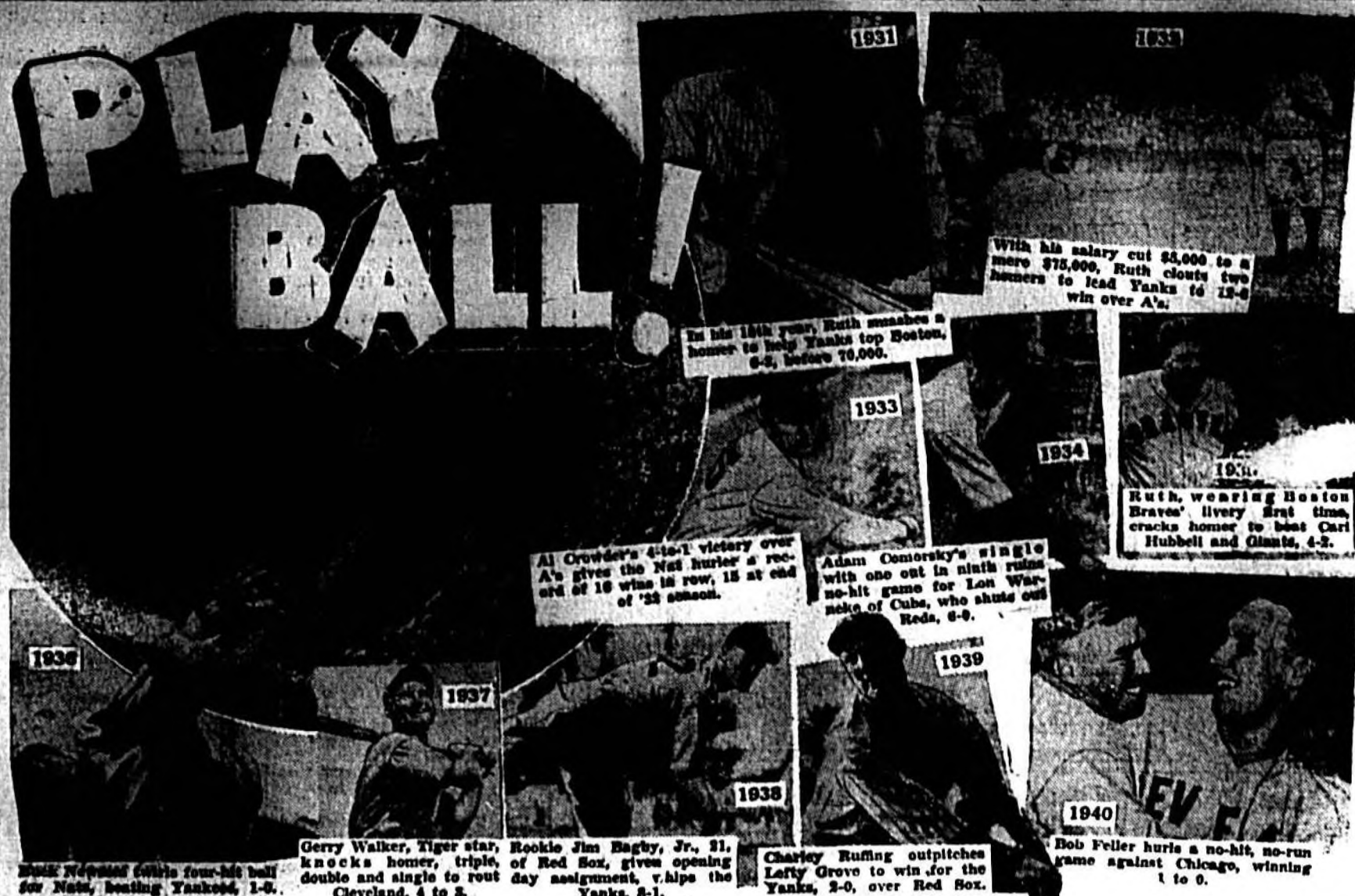

Secretary Stimson Warns That Crisis May Be Prolonged

Subordinating Civilian Needs To Rush Defense Supplies Seen By Official

WASHINGTON, Apr. 14.—Secretary Stimson today warned a Senate subcommittee that the United States is facing a "dangerous situation" which "may be prolonged."

He indicated that in future negotiations to meet this emergency, the nation's civilian needs may be further subordinated to the military program to produce war supplies.

Stimson advised the War Department is making the defense program as complete as possible, and that the production of civilian goods will be restricted to the minimum.

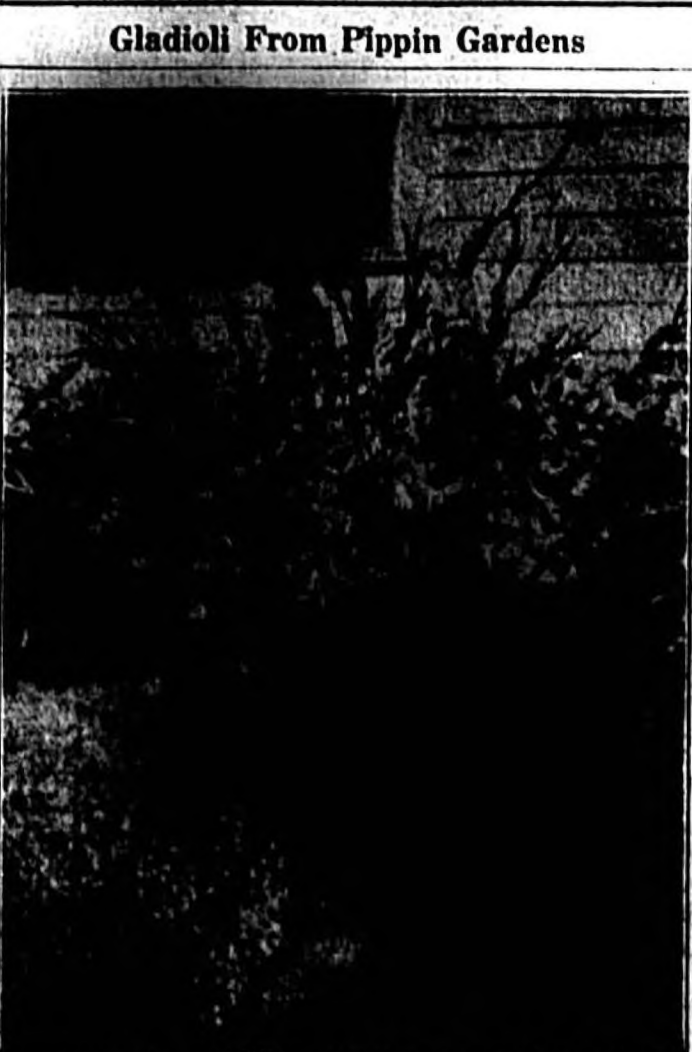

BERLIN, Apr. 14.—(AP)—Authorized military and diplomatic sources today denied any knowledge of any Yugoslav request for an armistice as reported in Rome.

British troops were reported to have thrown back a series of thrusts by Adolf Hitler's panzer divisions on the right flank of the Greco-British defense line, after the Allies withdraw to a deeper front on the center. The Greeks acknowledged the Germans were advancing in the center.

Berlin asserted the Luftwaffe had discovered undoubted proof that the British are preparing a hasty retreat from Greece. London, however, said "strong" reinforcements are now moving to the front lines in Greece.

On the North African battlefield, thousands of British imperial troops released from the East African war zone were reported to be moving to the defense of Egypt in a race with Nazi mechanized columns driving toward the Suez Canal.

The Germans asserted Monday night the British army is leaving Greece, after only nine days of blitz fury in the Balkans, and boarding troopships "just as at Dunkerque" under a blasting hail of Nazi bombs.

The committee's report, based on a hearing in Washington, said the plane was "apparently" the fault of a ground crew member who "misheard" the instructions of a pilot.

A hearing on the crash of a Lockheed Constellation plane which had occurred the night before, and three crew members were injured, none fatally, when the plane cracked up while landing in a marsh.

Harry Hopkins Is Named Go-Between

WASHINGTON, Apr. 14.—(AP)—Harry Hopkins today turned down a proposal to be named go-between in a dispute between the United States and the Danish government.

The Danish government at Copenhagen is demanding German reparations and is without authority to accept the agreement. Danish officials in Washington are working to bring the two nations into agreement.

Thousands Of Seminole County Flowers Shipped Out Of State

Flowers grown at the Pippin Gardens, located on West First Street, were shipped all over the South and as far North as New York last week for the Easter trade, Roy R. Pippin, who operates the nursery with his wife, said today in reporting the "best Easter trade in several years."

Mr. Pippin estimated that about 2,500 dozen flowers of all varieties were shipped from Sanford to Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and other points.

There were tall gladioli, velvety carnations, colorful gerberas (carnations, dainty Queen Anne's lace, blue, delphinium, and baby's breath white as snow in the shipments, which went to both retail and wholesale florists. A crew of nine workers was kept busy all week cutting the flowers, and averaging about 400 dozen daily, Mr. Pippin said.

The Pippin Gardens do an extensive out-of-state business, and in the past Sanford-grown flowers from this nursery have gone to Baltimore, New York City, Washington, D. C., Philadelphia, Memphis, Atlanta and other cities.

Several Central Florida cities, including Leesburg, Orlando, Mount Dora, DeLand, Daytona and Eustis, also patronize the Pippin Gardens.

"Do northern florists prefer their flowers raised in Florida, and if so why?" Mrs. Pippin was asked the question.

"Indeed they do like Florida flowers better," she replied. "Of course during the winter there is little grown in the North and florists must turn to this state and to California to supply their needs. But they like flowers that have been grown in the sunshine rather than in a hot house, because they are much healthier and last longer."

Easter, contrary to what you'd think, is not the busiest time of the year for the two Pippins. Their peak season comes in January and February, when the tourist crop is at its height.

When most people in Florida grow their own flowers, our biggest market is with the winter visitors," Mrs. Pippin explained.

Mrs. Pippin presides over the nursery and retail end of the business, and her husband handles the wholesale and shipping side of it. Together they began operations in their home business.

Senate Okeys Bill To Take Odd Cent Break At Tracks

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 14.—(AP)—The Senate passed 38 to 1 and sent to the House today a bill to give the odd cent break from horse race track betting pools to old age assistance.

Supporters of the bill, which was backed by Governor Holland, said it would produce about \$300,000 a year to be matched by federal funds.

The House passed unanimously a bill providing punishment up to 10 years imprisonment and \$10,000 fine for anyone advocating the overthrow of the government. The measure seeks to outlaw the Communist Party and the German-American Bund.

Governor Holland said yesterday that several counties had specifically endorsed his proposed plan for reallocating the gasoline tax to increase revenues for the Road Department and guarantee county and district road bonds with a constitutional amendment.
