British infantry have met and hurled back the "Adolf Hitler division" in northern Greece, London announced today, while the Yugoslav army reported counter attacking the Nazi-blitzkrieg invaders in the mountains 180 miles southeast of captured Belgrade. .

It was the same Yugoslav army the German High Command officially listed as "destroyed" ast week. Again today a Nazi communique asserted: "In Yugo-slavia, the mass of enemy forces which epposed the German troops

are destroyed." Countering the Nazi claim, London declared, it had "good reason to believe that the Yugoslava, have captured Durazzo,

A spokesman at the Danish legation said the order for De Kauffman to return obviously was seen by the foreign office "under duress and the minister feels it his duty to remain here."



Power Commission

WASHINGTON, Apr. 18—47

Because of all the mammoth power projects we have been hearing about for years, you may be as shocked as I was to know that, the Federal Power Commission is talking about a shortage of electricity.

It is potential—not imminent even in the areas where the drain has been greatest—but it is going to take some kilowatt juggling to avoid it, Unless the power 'production program is stapped up to top speed in the danger somes, says the commission, there may be—within two years or sooner, when national defense swings toward maximum capacity—blackouts of whole cities. Remember the "lightless nights" of the World War?

The last complete national report on the situation was made the first of the year, but the power commission says the altuation is getting worse, not better. Here's what the commission has to say:

"In about half of the supply areas, there is installed or scheduled for operation this year sufficient capacity to supply suticipated demands. In other areas, it appears that anticipated demands can be met by eneroaching on reserves or by additional capacity made available through inter-connections with systems in adjacent areas.

"In nine important war material areas, the demand was 53 parcent more (in December) than estimated three months before."

Locations available for a summer feeding program include church schools, public playgrounds and summer camps for underprivileged children. The field is wide open for any form of program that is not based to profit.


