Lovefeast To Signify Fellowship

Traditional Moravian Lovefeast and Candlelight Service will be observed by the Rolling Hills Moravian Church at both the 4:30 and 7:30 p.m. services Christmas Eve.

The Christmas Eve Lovefeast is one of the most beautiful services of the Moravian Church. The Candle Service originated in 1747 as a means of illustrating the Christmas Story to children.

The custom comes from the early days of the Christian Church when the disciples and early converts gathered together to share a congregational meal. The early Christians called these meals "agape" meals and the term lovefeast comes from translating the Greek term into English.

These congregational meals were dropped by the Church in the fourteenth century and were not revived until 1727 when the Moravian Church revived the practice to signify their fellowship and Christian love.

On Land Deposit Sanford May Get Petition

Sanford housewife Stella Woodhouse is scheduled to present petitions to city commissioners at their Tuesday 7 p.m. session objecting to any and all "piecemeal" disposal of city-owned lakefront land.

Mrs. Woodhouse, who unsuccessfully opposed a Commission Gordon Meyer in his bid for re-election earlier this month, said the citizen's group she heads "feels a master plan for the lakefront area should be developed by the city commission before there are any sales of city-owned property."

Saturday Mrs. Woodhouse said the group is circulating 10 copies of the petition and had gathered nearly 200 signatures so far during the holiday rush.

If the petitions bear signatures Tuesday of a large number of city property owners

it could have a bearing on the pending sale of a city-owned lot at North Myrtle Avenue and Semnole Boulevard.



Editorial Comment

Things Are Not What They Seem To Be

Just what is truth? Truth, according to Webster's Dictionary, is the state of being true or accurate; reality. Actually antonyms of the word better defines what is untruthful-false, erroneous, incorrect, inexact.

Most newspapers (I wish I could say all of them) believe the people are entitled to the whole truth about any matter of public concern, not the truth which has been twisted, varnished or sugar-coated to make it more acceptable.

All this leads up to a happening which occurred in the City of Longwood this week. The City Council adopted a resolution affirming participation in a joint sewer plant in the City of Altamonte Springs - a regional plant. It seems the two terms were used interchangeably.

And at least two members of the City Council left the meeting believing a sewer system for Longwood is just around the corner. This was the impression given. However, the two members of Council should have been listening to the words of its consulting engineer rather than feeling an impression.

For months meetings were held and the concept of a joint sewer plant was sold time and again. A sewer authority was talked about - an authority which would govern the joint sewer system, an authority composed of equal numbers of persons from Longwood and Altamonte Springs.

This past Monday a lengthy explanation was given to the City Council on the requirements of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and comprehensive studies done by the engineer over a two week period. It is amazing that the engineer could complete a study of the Orange-Seminole County areas sewer needs through 1990 in a two-week period. Even the most uninformed layman would probably think a study of this scope would require several months to say the least. Of course, there was some assistance from the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council.

The study determined that the best route for Longwood and Altamonte Springs to go would be through a joint sewer plant. The word "joint" appears to be open to interpretation. And the engineer told Longwood officials plainly if the city refused to go along, Altamonte Springs would get the federal funds and Longwood would get none. "There is no merit to going ahead on your own," he said.

The word "joint" sewer plant ended up being an "expansion of the Altamonte Springs sewer system," already in operation. Apparently, that city's sewage treatment plant would be renamed

a "regional" one and all the financing - some \$3.4 million worth from federal grants - would go "through Altamonte Springs rather than an authority type thing," to quote the engineer's word.

And Longwood will build pumping stations, force mains and interceptors so that its people will have sewer service "if" it receives federal funding next year. Service will be provided in the city 18 months to two years "after funding is received."

Longwood is to build the main to Douglas Road and SR 434 at which point Altamonte will construct the line to its sewage treatment plant bounded by I-4 and the Orange County line.

Altamonte over the past few months, has delayed several times, building a line on Douglas Rd. with costs borne by land developers.

Wordings in the Longwood resolution was unusual, to say the least. The words mentioned were a request for aid in expansion of the city's sewer system. Since Longwood has no sewer system, how can it expand it?

So many questions have been left unanswered. While the engineer assured Altamonte will not charge Longwood on a bulk rate basis anymore than residents of Altamonte are paying, what is the rate to Longwood citizens going to be when costs of amortizing a loan for sewer line construction is added as well as costs of processing billing.

Why couldn't the "regional" plant have been built in Longwood. What kind of connection fees and front foot assessments are Longwood people going to have to pay?

UN Takes Unworldly Approach

The United Nations resolution on the Middle East was one of those stanzas of indignation that strike a high moral tone but are useless or even harmful in the world of realism and power conflict.

Surely, the United Nations, however idealistic or theoretical, could not expect to advance the cause of peace in the Middle East by insisting that Israel must retreat to the pre-1967 boundaries without any guarantee of secure borders. Nor is the distant day of detente advanced by a U.N. resolution which seeks to impose a commercial and military boycott upon Israel unless she endangers her security by such concessions.

The hostilities of the Middle East will not be resolved by a naive belief in the good intentions of the combatants, but by projections of hard reality. The reality is that the Arab nations are dealing from weakness. If they had strength, they would obliterate Israel whatever the boundaries. The reality

also is that Israel is dealing from a position of superior military strength combined with a high degree of national motivation - hoping that the breaks will continue coming its way if it remains vigilant.

The role for outside powers with interests in reducing hostilities in the Middle East is to find a middle ground on which weakness and strength can compromise. The middle ground is not a United Nations resolution favoring either combatant.

Indeed, the U.N. might well ponder whether or not its exercises in futility regarding the Middle East are not pushing matters to a point where an organization apart from the U.N. itself will be formed to act as a neutral broker - as has been the case farther north in Europe.

That might advance tranquility in the Middle East but would continue the downward slide of the U.N. - and thus presumably the cause of world peace which it seeks to serve.

U.S. Now Appeals To Foreign Capital

Even with rising production and growing recovery, the tendency here in the United States is to view the economic outlook with some foreboding - more inflation, an unfavorable balance of payments, high unemployment.

Reports now coming in suggest that this is not the view of moneywise investment men in other major nations. European bankers, and particularly the astute Swiss, had been deeply concerned about the dollar, a worry that apparently resulted in a major decline in new foreign investments in this country for a period, and, in some very important cases, resulted in an absolute decline in holdings.

This shift, of course, was the absolute test of a lack of confidence. Of late, the picture has been changing. Contacts who have been in touch recently with major European bankers, including the Swiss, and worldwide, say that these men in the main believe this country now has its dollar problem in hand. The same story comes out of Japan.

Questioned, some of these major investment men, who handle very large amounts of other people's money, say that the best investment prospects these days are in the United States - better even than in flourishing Japan and West Germany.

There is proof that these men mean what they say. For some time now, it is reported, foreign investments in this country have been on the rise. The belief is that the increase is going to grow even more sharply.

A number of these European money men say that in their opinion the United States is nearer to control over inflation in the long pull than other major countries. As a result, they expect U.S. production costs to go up more slowly than elsewhere, putting this country into a more competitive position.

In this regard, recent studies on wage rates in a half-dozen leading countries indicate that foreign wages have been rising at a much higher rate than American wages for more than a decade. Foreign wages, of course, have come up from a much lower base, and on average continue to be well below American. Nevertheless, insofar as the foreign wages are rising at a faster rate than American, this differential in the rate of increase inevitably helps to put this country in a better position to meet foreign prices.

Figures brought together by William D. Nordhaus of Yale University report U.S. manufacturing wage rate increases of 4.1 per cent in 1966, 3.9 per cent in 1967, and 5.1 to 6.1 per cent increases in the years from 1968 through 1971.

By contrast, Japanese wages gained by 11.5 to 15.9 per cent a year during the 1966-1971 period. Manufacturing wages in Sweden moved up 6.2 to 12.3 per cent a year, French wages from 5 to 11.7 per cent, and Canadian wages from 5.9 to 8.5 per cent, and United Kingdom wages, except for one 3.2 per cent year, shifted up from 5.9 to 11.9 per cent each year.

West German manufacturing wages rose 3.9 per cent in 1967 and 4.0 per cent in 1968 and from 7 to 11.2 per cent a year in the other years from 1966 through 1971. Those are quite significant differentials.

One Man's Opinion Organized Crime In The Art Picture

It may be some consolation to know that along with more crime in this country, we're getting a better class of criminal - thieves with taste, culture and artistic discrimination.

The theft of fine art from museums, dealers and private collections is reaching "epidemic" proportions, said experts at a recent seminar conducted in New York by the Inland Marine Underwriters Assn. And knowing a good thing when it sees it, organized crime is very deeply into the great art rip-off.

Art thieves are now in a special echelon in the crime hierarchy. Detective Marie Curie, a member of the NYPD's recently established Art Identification Team, told the seminar they have "achieved status within the crime community that is to be envied by the common 'goon'."

As for organized crime, the return on stolen art is better than fencing hot jewelry or almost any other stolen item. Often a piece is ransommed back to its owner, who will sometimes pay as much as the actual market value and won't get the police involved.

According to Alan Haer, director of The International Art Registry, which uses a newly developed coding process to establish the identity of art works, art thievery is epidemic throughout the world. For example:

On May 19, 1972, a \$200,000 painting was stolen from the Paris Opera Museum. In June, the Woolworth mansion in Maine was relieved of 51 works of art valued in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

In 1971, a painting was stolen from the Queen's Gallery at Buckingham Palace in London. Two paintings worth \$3 million were recently stolen from a church in Italy.

At the same time, old-fashioned art fraud is still flourishing, with at least one new wrinkle. This is the confidence swindle in which the victim is led to believe he is getting something that was shadily acquired or "slightly stolen." Like a "smuggled jade elephant that once belonged to the Czar of Russia" that turns out to have been purchased in the bargain basement of a department store.

In either case, whether the items are genuine art or fake, the success of the art crooks depends a great deal upon that not-so-little bit of larceny or greed in the hearts of "honest" people.

Wallace Victory Picked Top 1972 State Story

The March 11 presidential primary which gave George Wallace his largest bloc at the Democratic National Convention has been chosen as the state's top story of 1972 by Florida editors in a poll conducted by The Associated Press.

The survey of newspaper and broadcast editors showed the election story edging the national political conventions for first place among Florida's top 10 stories.

Others ranked high were re-imposition of the death penalty; a violent hijacking of a Southern Airways jet; and the murder trial and subsequent defeat of Lake County Sheriff Willis McCall.

In order, here are the 10 top stories as chosen by the editors: 1. The primary - George Wallace pulled 42 per cent of the vote in outrunning 10 other Democrats to capture 72 of the state's 81 delegate votes to his party's political convention.

Courthouse Telephone Complaints

Telephone service at the recently occupied new courthouse in Seminole county, is not quite yet, all that the users in the building would really like it to be.

Tom Isom, representing the Southern Bell Telephone Company which installed the service, was present before the Board of County Commissioners Tuesday to hear complaints and to explain why the complaints are necessary, and how the company plans to "cure these ills."



"We just can't use this service," he then specified exactly what he wanted as far as service to his office is concerned and when Isom said that it was all a matter of budget, Herring told him to get the service in and it would be paid for. "I'll find the money for it."

Isom was instructed by the Board to make a survey of all the problems and come back before the Board with an estimate of time and cost to make the service workable.

In following up on the suggestion that the attending at the switchboard in the lobby has too little information about county personnel and office title and location, the Board of County Commissioners asked the press if it would be possible to publish a copy of the department directory which could be clipped out and placed in private telephone directories for reference.

The game Lakers continued to trouble the Knights throughout the first half and would not let the Orlando school break the game open. Tech's largest lead in the first 20 minutes of play was six markers. At the intermission the Knights held a five point advantage, 23-18.

Tech built a nine point lead late in the second half at 45-36 for their largest margin of the evening. In the final three minutes the Knights resorted to a slowdown of their own to insure the victory.

Leading the Knights' first championship were Hall with 17

points on five hoops and seven of eight from the line. John Smith with 14 points and 13 rebounds; and Pete Haas with 10 points and nine rebounds.

In addition to Hall being named the tourney MVP, he and Haas were named to the All-Tournament team along with Gene Sims of Racine, Barry Jones of Texas College and Cal Saunders of Elmhurst.

Florida Tech's Mike Clark, who ripped for 26 points in the first game of the tournament was held to nine points by the tenacious Laker defense which was keying upon the Knights ace.

It was not an especially good overall performance by the Knights who wound up shooting only 30.7 per cent from the floor (21/71). They did force Racine into 20 turnovers. Racine shot 32 per cent, hitting 20 of 63 shots.

The victory pushed the Knights record to 6-3 on the season. They will next see action on Saturday night, Jan. 6 when they host Renaissance Poly Tech of New York at the Lake Highland Prep gym.



Bayou Gator Hunt Termed A Threat

Louisiana's "premature" reopening of the alligator to hunting may undermine public confidence in the whole federal endangered species program, charges an article in the forthcoming January issue of AUCIBON, magazine of the National Audubon Society.

Author George Laycock visited Louisiana last fall after an experimental 15-day hunting season on alligators was conducted in a restricted area. Laycock branded the experiment a failure that has threatened the future of the alligator and that didn't even arouse much enthusiasm among Louisiana's hunters.

National Audubon for years has been a leader in the fight to save the gator from extinction. The problem has been poachers. Laycock points out. After alligator hunting was banned under state laws in all the states where it occurs, and the federal government passed a law making it a federal of-






Here she attended grade school and graduated at the tender age of 12 years. She enrolled in high school and at the same time, took a separate course in designing and dressmaking.



Parent Relates Adoption Experiences

"Would I love a child of my own flesh and blood as much as I do Michele?" the father of an adopted child asked, not comprehending the question asked by the reporter.

"I would probably love a natural child almost as much as Michele, but remember Michele is a special child, she is really something uh-uh special."

The query made to the father of the adopted little girl was whether he would still love his adopted daughter as much if he had a child of his own. The question didn't get through because it appeared to be completely foreign to him as he discussed his "special" little girl and his and his wife's experiences when they "chose" her.

The Moore family (a name used to protect their identity) after being married six years and finding for health reasons that Darlene could not have a child, decided on adoption.

Knowing personally a couple who had adopted a child through the Children's Home Society, the Orlando office was contacted and an appointment made to discuss the matter.

A comprehensive application was filled out by both husband and wife and a lengthy interview in which all sorts of personal questions were asked was conducted by a social worker.

"She wanted to know why we wanted to adopt a baby and we explained how we love children and couldn't have one ourselves. She was very kind and thoughtful. The question that was most difficult to answer was whether we believed a child should be told he is adopted."

"Darlene couldn't think of an answer right off hand. But I remembered when I was a child knowing of a family friend's little boy who was adopted. My mother cautioned me that I should be careful not to reveal to the little boy he was adopted because this was a secret. When the boy grew up, he found out he was not the natural child of the couple and this mixed him up good. He was really hurt," Bob said.

"I told the counselor I believed an adopted child should be told that he is adopted above all others. We left the agency office not knowing whether we had made a good impression."

"During the next two weeks, we heard from friends and relatives that they were being questioned about us, our backgrounds and reputation."

"The caseworker next came to our home and asked why we wanted a baby girl. I grew up in a family of boys and so did my father. We wanted a girl very much."

"After waiting some more, we got a call from the Orlando office that they had found a baby girl for us and would be willing to travel up-state to bring her home. Of course we would and Darlene and I began sterilizing our new car to get ready for the big occasion. We scrubbed it down with disinfectant and were all ready."

Bob continued a little emotionally describing the big day in his and his wife's lives. Traveling up-state wasn't easy. He felt a little sick in his stomach and was suffering with dizzy spells. At the agency office, the couple were taken to a pale blue room furnished in a homey manner to provide the right atmosphere.

"The social worker brought the baby to us and left us alone with her for 15 minutes. We undressed her and examined each little toe and finger. She was the most beautiful baby I

ever saw. She had beautiful dark hair and I felt really strange."

"One moment I had no child and the next I had my own little girl for the rest of her life. She was and is a very special child. She was dressed in a pretty little outfit we have since framed in glass."

"We told the agency the name we had chosen and it was typed on the application form for the birth certificate. We were given a complete medical history. Michele had delivered by forceps. You know, and she cried immediately after birth."

"You cannot understand the feeling I had. I felt like a real man - a real father - and my wife broke down and cried. As Michele got a little older, we told her she is a chosen child."

Michele, who was with her father, at six years old is very pretty, charming, well-mannered and obviously adores her dad. And the very bright youngster bears a striking resemblance to her father. During an early discussion of her "Daddy" she is quick to tell one and all how very smart and strong he is and, of course, her mother is very pretty, she says.

Now the Moore's would like another child and the adoption experience of six years ago cannot be repeated. Despite the fact, the couple has good standing in the community and "could provide a home filled with love" for another child, there just "ain't" any babies available for adoption.

"There are so many who want to adopt a child and there are no babies to adopt," Bob said, sadly.

Michele Is A Special, Chosen Child

Tell Child He's Adopted

Should an adopted child be told he is adopted? This question was posed to Miss Dorothy Pearson, executive of the Central Florida division of the Children's Home Society, which serves the counties of Orange, Seminole, Lake, Osceola and Sumter.

Her answer was an unqualified, "yes." "I feel the adoptive parents should start off in the very beginning using the word, adoption. When a child is little he does not comprehend the meaning of the word, but it becomes a household one and hopefully the child will equate it with love and being wanted."

"Many others know a child is adopted so it is much better that the child be given the information very early rather than attempting to make a secret of it," Miss Pearson said.

"In pre-school years, the child may start asking specific questions and then hopefully the parents will explain how the child is loved. Many booklets

have been written on the subject and are helpful to 3, 4 and 5 year-old children.

If the parents have kept a scrapbook beginning with the baby's arrival in the home, this also can be helpful. Most importantly, the maternity homes usually have their own doctor and hospital plan.

If the girl wishes to stay near home, a living plan in the area

the general questions of if the parent indicates the questions are of no importance, the child will turn him off."

Continuing, Miss Pearson noted some parents do come back to the Society for counseling in this area years after the adoption and some adolescents also come in for information. The Society does not reveal names and places but attempts to help the youngsters feel a sense of "self."

Adopted children seldom go back to the society seeking to find their natural parents. Quite often, however, she said, children of late adoptions, who were five or six or older at the time and do have some recall, in adulthood do seek out natural parents or siblings.

"In cases like this, we contact the natural parents or siblings to find if they want to be placed in touch. If the siblings or natural parents agree, we exchange addresses for them," she said.

"We believe if parents are honest with children, the children feel they can trust them. If a parent to a child does not know the answers to

There is an avenue of aid open for teenage girls who find themselves pregnant and faced with the decision of whether to submit to an abortion or to carry their baby through until birth.

The decision is hers. It is very unlikely any doctor would perform an abortion on a girl if she does not want it. And whether a girl is 12 or 20 only she can sign the final papers for adoption of her child.

Even if her parents do not want the child put out for adoption and the girl has chosen this course, she is still the person legally responsible for the final disposition of the child.

Counseling for pregnant teenage girls is offered by the Children's Home Society on a regular basis in certain area high schools and an appointment to discuss the matter.

Help Is Available For Troubled Girls

There is an avenue of aid open for teenage girls who find themselves pregnant and faced with the decision of whether to submit to an abortion or to carry their baby through until birth.

The decision is hers. It is very unlikely any doctor would perform an abortion on a girl if she does not want it. And whether a girl is 12 or 20 only she can sign the final papers for adoption of her child.

Even if her parents do not want the child put out for adoption and the girl has chosen this course, she is still the person legally responsible for the final disposition of the child.

Counseling for pregnant teenage girls is offered by the Children's Home Society on a regular basis in certain area high schools and an appointment to discuss the matter.

A comprehensive application was filled out by both husband and wife and a lengthy interview in which all sorts of personal questions were asked was conducted by a social worker.

"She wanted to know why we wanted to adopt a baby and we explained how we love children and couldn't have one ourselves. She was very kind and thoughtful. The question that was most difficult to answer was whether we believed a child should be told he is adopted."

"Darlene couldn't think of an answer right off hand. But I remembered when I was a child knowing of a family friend's little boy who was adopted. My mother cautioned me that I should be careful not to reveal to the little boy he was adopted because this was a secret. When the boy grew up, he found out he was not the natural child of the couple and this mixed him up good. He was really hurt," Bob said.

"I told the counselor I believed an adopted child should be told that he is adopted above all others. We left the agency office not knowing whether we had made a good impression."

"During the next two weeks, we heard from friends and relatives that they were being questioned about us, our backgrounds and reputation."

"The caseworker next came to our home and asked why we wanted a baby girl. I grew up in a family of boys and so did my father. We wanted a girl very much."

"After waiting some more, we got a call from the Orlando office that they had found a baby girl for us and would be willing to travel up-state to bring her home. Of course we would and Darlene and I began sterilizing our new car to get ready for the big occasion. We scrubbed it down with disinfectant and were all ready."

Bob continued a little emotionally describing the big day in his and his wife's lives. Traveling up-state wasn't easy. He felt a little sick in his stomach and was suffering with dizzy spells. At the agency office, the couple were taken to a pale blue room furnished in a homey manner to provide the right atmosphere.

"The social worker brought the baby to us and left us alone with her for 15 minutes. We undressed her and examined each little toe and finger. She was the most beautiful baby I

ever saw. She had beautiful dark hair and I felt really strange."

"One moment I had no child and the next I had my own little girl for the rest of her life. She was and is a very special child. She was dressed in a pretty little outfit we have since framed in glass."

"We told the agency the name we had chosen and it was typed on the application form for the birth certificate. We were given a complete medical history. Michele had delivered by forceps. You know, and she cried immediately after birth."

"You cannot understand the feeling I had. I felt like a real man - a real father - and my wife broke down and cried. As Michele got a little older, we told her she is a chosen child."

Michele, who was with her father, at six years old is very pretty, charming, well-mannered and obviously adores her dad. And the very bright youngster bears a striking resemblance to her father. During an early discussion of her "Daddy" she is quick to tell one and all how very smart and strong he is and, of course, her mother is very pretty, she says.


Now the Moore's would like another child and the adoption experience of six years ago cannot be repeated. Despite the fact, the couple has good standing in the community and "could provide a home filled with love" for another child, there just "ain't" any babies available for adoption.

Four Basic Brokerage Methods

If you and the little lady have decided to put your home or perhaps another property you own on the market and you have concluded that you will retain a real estate broker to find a buyer, there are several ways in which you may choose to list your real estate with broker you select.

While there are numerous methods of listing your property there are basically only four. And, we believe it is important that you know the advantages and disadvantages of each. The one you choose, however, will depend largely upon your own situation and the ramifications thereof.

Let's start with the "open" listing.

This simply means that you visit two or more real estate offices and list your property with them. The first office to submit to you an acceptable contract makes the sale and at the closing table the broker receives his check for the sales commission. If, however, you should find your own buyer you are usually not obligated to pay any commission or a portion thereof to any brokerage office.

The major disadvantage of the open listing is that you must visit quite a few real estate offices to "spread" your listing around the city.

The second method of listing your property is known as the exclusive agency listing.

Employing this method means that you deal with one real estate broker but you retain the right to sell the property yourself without paying a sales commission to the listing broker. As far as the homeowner is concerned this is one of the finest ways to list your property.

Using this method means that you deal with one real estate broker but you do not retain the right to sell the property yourself and even if you do you still pay the broker a sales commission. This is the type of listing that every real estate broker strives to obtain. The big advantage to you is that if you give your broker an exclusive right of sale listing it is this listing that he and his sales associates will first bring to the attention of his customers when they come to his office to be shown homes for sale.

Also, the exclusive right of sale listing is the listing the broker will spend his hard earned dollars for advertising in the classified sections of the newspapers.

Exclusive Listings

Should you employ the exclusive agency or the exclusive right of sale type of listing you can always ask that the listing broker share his listing with other brokers. Normally, a listing broker will be happy to do this immediately or if he has a large sales force he will agree to do it after perhaps 10 or 15 days. This period gives his associates time to contact their customers who are looking for various or specific type homes and your home may fall into one of the categories for which a sales man has a customer.

The final method is the Multiple Listing Service in your area. This method calls for the listing broker to submit his listing to the central MLS office along with a photo of the property. The photo and pertinent listing information is published once a week in the MLS book which the MLS office prepares and distributes usually on a weekly basis.

The multiple listing service in this area is operated by the Orlando-Winter Park Board of Realtors. The Seminole County Board of Realtors does not have a multiple listing service. The local Board of Realtors established an MLS operation with offices here in Sanford back in 1965. However, just as the service got underway the announcement came from the Defense Department in Washington that the Sanford Naval Air Station would cease operations here in 1968. For a period of some two and a half years it was next to impossible for a real estate broker to sell a home because a buyer could easily find for himself a homeowner who would be more than willing to give a buyer his equity in a home and let the buyer pay a rather small transfer fee and assume the existing mortgage.

No County Multiple Listing

Since then there has been no effort on the part of the Seminole County Board of Realtors to re-establish a multiple listing service since many of the real estate brokers operating in south Seminole County, although they belong to the Seminole County Board have also become members of the Orlando-Winter Park Board of Realtors and participate in the latter board's MLS operation.

At the present time there are only two real estate offices in Sanford affiliated with the MLS operation in this area.

If you should choose to go the MLS route you are usually required to sign a listing agreement for six months. Also, should a buyer who has shown the property prior to the expiration of the agreement go ahead and purchase the property within a 90-day period after the expiration of the listing agreement you — the seller — must still pay a sales commission.

Consequently, all of these types of listings have advantages and disadvantages.

If you, perhaps, have attempted to market your property yourself and now wish to list it with a real estate broker, it is possible that you might have shown the property to one or more parties who may have been interested in the home. Even though you decide to use the exclusive right of sale listing method you still have the privilege of reserving the right to sell to your previous prospects in the event they return and decide to purchase your real estate.

Provide Broker Information

But you should be sure that you provide this information by names to your listing broker at the time you give him the listing so it can be included in the listing agreement and eliminate any unpleasant problems at a later date.

And, since you and the Missus have chosen to list your property be sure that the listing broker or brokers have all the pertinent information. There's an old adage in the real estate business that a property properly listed is already half-sold.

Another thing, if you list your property on an open listing basis be certain that you give the listing brokers the same sales price. Should you reduce your price, be sure to notify all brokers.

'Birdlen Woods' Starts In June

Northwest Seminole's First Large-Scale Exclusive Residential Development With 598 Lots on Total 285 Acres.

Pending final plat approval by Seminole County Commissioners, phase one construction of homes, is tentatively slated to begin in June in "Birdlen Woods"—northwest Seminole's first large-scale exclusive residential development.

Developer George Davis of Birdlen Development Enterprises Ltd. said his firm expects land preparation, streets and utilities for the 598 lot development on 285 acres north of State Road 46, south of Orange Boulevard and west of Oregon Avenue and Interstate 4 to cost \$5 million.

Homes of a wide variety of designs will be constructed by many builders and construction firms in the \$45,000 and up price range, according to Davis. Completion of the entire development is expected to be within four years.

First phase of Birdlen Woods will be west of the main entrance to the community on Oregon Avenue.

Sewer and water service is to be provided by Monroe Utilities.

The overall concept of the development, designed by Hartman Hanson Inc., Orlando, centers an 8 1/2-acre park and community recreation center.

Davis said Birdlen Woods has been planned with small clusters of homes forming distinct neighborhoods which will enable residents to maintain a sense of place and identity within the small exclusive and peaceful atmosphere.

Residential lots average over one-third acre in size, with a density of two units per acre.

The development will feature all underground utilities and is described by Davis as "the first beautiful development in the Sanford area of R-1AAA homes in a sanctuary of nature, blended with winding streets, courts and cul-de-sacs."

The virgin tract is covered with dense, lush vegetation and trees including pines, oaks, magnolias, Sweet Gum and Sabal Palms. "As many of the trees as possible will be preserved in order to keep the natural beauty of the site and maintain an attractive rural atmosphere," Davis said.


Access to Birdlen Woods will be from both Orange Boulevard and Oregon Avenue. The two main streets will intersect near the recreation and park area that will feature a community building, tennis and shuffleboard courts and open field recreation area.

Sidewalks will border the winding streets, with such names as Thrush Circle, Birdlen Way, Parakeet Lane, Sparrow Court and Roadrunner Circle, and soft low level street lighting is planned.

"The gently sloping tract provides no construction difficulties and drainage problems which might have been encountered have been alleviated by acquisition of off-site drainage easements which provide positive outfall," Davis said.

The name "Birdlen" was derived using parts of Davis' wife Birdie's name and that of an associate, Helen.

Davis came to Florida two years ago from Michigan and has been the builder of a number of exclusive homes in Spring Lake Hills, Sleepy Hollow, Brantley Harbor and Sweetwater Oaks.

Market Square Building Soon

Construction is to get underway soon after the first of the new year on the Market Square Shopping Center to be located in the northeast quadrant of SR 436 and Howell Branch Road, Casselberry.

The 11.2 acre tract was annexed to the city last summer and final approvals for the development are expected to be given at a continued meeting of the City Council Wednesday.

Agreement for payment for modification of traffic signal at the intersection by developers, Howerrd and Connolly Inc., has been reached as has agreement for the developers to donate 20 feet for an additional traffic lane on Howell Branch Road and for donation of another eight feet in the future should it become necessary.

To be built on site are three chain stores — and 18 smaller stores to have 20,000 square feet.

Some 542 parking spaces are to be available, nearly 100 more spaces than required by the city's zoning ordinance at 450.

Architectural design of the exterior of the buildings is of bleached wood and stucco. Drainage from the development will be retained and percolated on site.

Commonly, in an appearance before the City Council, agreed to donate an appropriate sum toward the city's planned purchase of a \$75,000 ladder fire truck. Architects are Schweizer Associates of the Environmental Design Group, Winter Park.

Orlando Park Site Is Acquired By Vantage

ORLANDO — The Vantage Companies, commercial real estate developers and managers, have acquired a prime development site in Orlando Central Park, which is a master-planned business community in Orlando, Fla.

Ultimate investment is expected to approximate \$5 million.

Vantage purchased the property from Orlando Central Park, Inc., developers of the master-planned business community. Jim Brown, vice president of Orlando Central Park, Inc., represented his firm in purchase negotiations with Vantage.

Purchase of the new development tract marks Vantage's third major move in the fast-growing Orlando area.

Earlier this year Vantage started development on Sand Lake Service Center, a 300,000-square-foot warehouse-distribution complex, and Plaza Central, a 230,000-square-foot office-showroom-service facility. Both are located in Orlando Central Park.

Sand Lake Service Center and Plaza Central will represent a \$10 million investment by the Vantage Companies upon completion. Over the next ten years, Vantage expects its commercial real estate investments in Florida to reach \$50 million, Eulich said.

The Orlando Central Park developments bring to 42 the number of business and industrial parks across the nation in which Vantage has developed various properties. Vantage investments in business parks, office-showroom-service buildings, high-rise office towers, motor hotels, and major distribution and light manufacturing facilities now total more than \$300 million.

Headquartered in Dallas, Texas, Vantage has full-time regional offices in Houston and Arlington, Texas, as well as in Memphis, Tenn., and Orlando.

Sales Top \$2 Million

Sales topping the \$2 million mark for its first eight months of operation are reported by American Heritage Builders, Inc.

Rick Anglickis, sales manager for the Lehigh building firm, said the sales total represents actual sale of 62 new homes since the company's grand opening at the end of January.

"We currently have 31 homes under construction in Lehigh," he said. "At the same time, the company has broken ground for phase one of its Cypress Lake Garden condominium project in South Ft. Myers, our first venture outside of Lehigh."

Anglickis said 30 units, valued at \$300,000 are involved in the initial Cypress Lake complex which eventually will be a 142-unit, single-story garden type condominium. Units will sell for \$19,995.

The project will include recreational facilities such as swimming pool, lighted tennis courts, shuffleboard courts, horseshoe pits, outdoor gardens and a park area.

Earlier this year, American Heritage unveiled six model homes at its display in Lehigh, ranging from the "Patriot", a 2-bedroom, 1-bath home priced at \$15,900, to the top-of-the-line "Heritage", a 4-bedroom, 2-bath offering at \$38,000.

Real Estate Question Box

Editor:
It should verbally agree with a real estate broker to list my property with him for a specified amount of money and he finds a buyer for my property, is that agreement binding?
—CEB, Sanford

Dear CEB:
In some states, no. But, in Florida, yes. If that real estate broker, based on your oral agreement with him for a specified amount, brings you a signed contract from a buyer for the amount you were asking, substantiated with an earnest money deposit (commonly known as a binder), the listing agreement is binding.

Not too long ago a lady called a local real estate office and listed her property by telephone, saying, "If you can get me a net of \$25,000 for my acreage go ahead and sell it."
A salesman in that office showed the property to a prospect and got an offer, backed by a binder, which would have netted the owner \$24,000. The owner asked 48 hours to make a decision. Two days later she called and declined to accept the offer, saying, "I've been looking at other sites and can't find one I like any better than my own and my husband and I have concluded that we had better keep this parcel. So please cancel my listing."

The owner had a perfect right to do this. However, if the real estate salesman had submitted an offer which would have netted her \$25,000 as stipulated in the oral listing agreement she would be liable to either sell the property or be subject to paying the real estate office with which she was doing business a full 10 percent commission.

Editor:
How does the City of Sanford, for example, arrive at a millage rate?
—Mrs. AMJ, Sanford

Dear Mrs. AMJ:
This is a very good question even though the answer is quite simple and we will try to keep it basic and uncomplicated.

Each year the City Manager is charged with formulating a proposed budget for the following fiscal year. He will consult with heads of the various departments and put together all of these individual budgets and present them to the City Commission. The commissioners will go over each line item in the budget in an effort to accomplish what is known as "removing the fat."

When this is done they will arrive at a figure of what the City must have from taxes to operate the next fiscal year. The City will then ask the County Tax Assessor to provide the total assessed evaluation of all taxable property within the City.
The amount of money to be raised from property taxes is divided by the assessed evaluation and the result is the millage rate.

MGIC stands for Mortgage Guaranty Insurance Corporation which is a privately owned agency that operates similarly to FHA. If your proposed buyer is a very good risk and he does not have sufficient cash to pay roughly 20 percent down in purchasing your home he can get MGIC insurance and buy your home for about 10 percent down.
The buyer, however, must pay a premium for this insurance. At closing he is charged about one percent for the first year. After that he pays one quarter of one percent of the annual loan balance, payable monthly when the mortgage payment is made.
MGIC has been an important factor in assisting many homeowners in selling their property and, by the same token, helped many buyers in purchasing their homes.

ON THE HOUSE

Balky doors are not confined to those which are difficult to open and close because they stick or bind around the edges. Some doors open and close quite easily but simply will not stay closed. That's because the latch bolt in the door no longer fits into the strike plate on the door jamb. This misalignment is due to any one of a number of reasons, including the fact that the hinges on the door have come loose and require retightening or resetting. Curiously, the failure of the latch to fit into the strike plate on the door WERE retightened in any case, whatever the reason, make sure the door hangs properly before you attempt to do something about lining up the bolt with the strike plate.
Since it is a difficult and almost impossible job to do anything about moving the bolt, the hinges into the front edge of the door, something must be done about the strike plate. And before that can be done, it must be determined whether the plate is too high or too low on the door frame.
Most of the time there will be scratch marks or a worn part on the plate showing where the bolt is hitting it instead of going into the opening. If this is not quickly apparent, close the door slowly while you shine a flashlight into the area to see where the misalignment is. And if that doesn't work, rub some chalk on the end of the bolt, close the door open it and see where the chalk marks are.
When the bolt fails to fit into the opening by only a tiny fraction of an inch — an eighth or sixteenth of an inch — you may be able to file the metal to make a larger opening to accommodate the bolt. This filing usually can be done more easily if the strike plate is removed by taking out the two screws that hold it in place.
If the misalignment is more than indicated in the previous paragraph or if filing is impractical or difficult, the strike plate must be relocated slightly on the door jamb, moving it higher or lower as necessary. Remove it from the jamb, then use a wood chisel to enlarge the mortise so that the strike plate will be in the proper position.
Enlargement of the mortise means cutting away some wood, necessitating patching. After the strike plate has been replaced, fill the gaps with wood putty or plastic wood, smooth when dry and touch up to match the surrounding surface. You also may have to use wood putty or plastic wood to fill the old screw holes if they interfere with placement of the screws into their new locations.

Tips When Freezer Stops

Extension Home Economics Agent
How long will it be before the food will spoil if it is left in the freezer? Common sense tells us that the larger the freezer, and the more nearly loaded it is, the better insulated it is. A 4 to 6 cubic foot freezer with a door kept closed is apt to keep food frozen several days, while a half-loaded freezer may not stay frozen more than half a day.
Using dry ice can be a life saver for food. About 50 pounds should keep the temperature of food in a 20 foot cabinet 3 or 4 days; in a half-loaded cabinet, 2 or 3 days. Replenish supply every 24 to 36 hours until power is resumed.

Mistletoe A Weed To Forester



The word MISTLETOE may have a romantic sound to the average American, but not to the forester or nut grower. To him, it means a peculiar bothersome weed, — a weed that still has no sure and easy control.
Mistletoes are unusual because they grow on woody plants rather than in soil. They are parasitic plants that extract water and nutrients from their hosts. Thus, trees are robbed of nutrients and water from both land weeds, and mistletoes. In addition to competing for nutrients and shading the trees, mistletoes also cause abnormal growth like witches broom and other tissue disorders.
The unusual nature of the mistletoes has long been recognized. Early Anglo-Saxons called them "mist-tan" meaning "different twig." They were credited with mystic and medicinal power in many parts of the world. In fact, European mistletoe was prominent in medicine and pharmacology until the middle of the 19th Century. When growing on the sacred willow in Japan, it is venerated and regarded as a medicine for many diseases. In Malay villages, certain mistletoes are used in child-birth and for such things as ringworm and snakebite. Indian women in the Southwest drank a tea made of juniper twigs, often bearing mistletoe to promote muscular relaxation prior to childbirth.
Mistletoes are relied by livestock and deer. California Indians placed branches of the mistletoes in strategic places to lure deer for shooting.
A protected plant in Norway, mistletoe is a major forest pest in other countries. It causes greater dollar loss than any other parasitic flowering plant. Dwarf-mistletoes are second only to heart rot in damage to coniferous forests in western North America, destroying 1 billion board feet annually in the United States alone.



Christmas Cards From Long Ago

About a hundred years ago, Christmas card messages were apt to be expressed in rather quaint verse. Here are several reprinted recently in the *Illustrated London News*.

From an elaborate card of the 1880's:
Come welcome again
The King of Seasons all
For Christmas both reign
With hearty good cheer
Success to next year
Re-echoes from wall to wall

This one is from a card of 1878:
Happy Christmas to thee, dearest
Dwelling in thy happy home
And we wish for thee, how fondly
Many long bright years to come
May such friends be thine as ever
Seek thy pleasure as their own
And if sorrow must come nigh thee
May'st thou never weep alone.

And here's another:
'Tis now a bright and jovial time
For friends together meeting
But those whom fate hath separate
Must take a friendly greeting
Then let me hope my message may
Serve as a welcome token
Of all the loving words I'd say
Couldst thou but hear them spoken!

Land, Jerusalem, draw Christians from all around the world. They find, in Bethlehem, the Church of the Nativity, traditional birthplace of Christ. Visitors can see, from the Mount of Olives, where Jesus knelt and wept, the strange beauty of the Holy City.

The Garden of Gethsemane, where the Son of God prayed the night before he was killed, is close to Jerusalem. Also near by is the tomb of Mary, mother of Christ.

The heart of the Holy City is the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, erected over the place where Jesus was crucified and buried. These are but a few of the shrines and holy places.

Any tendency to believe that the deep religious meaning of the "Mass of Christ" is waning is refuted by the significance of this annual renewal of faith in Christian traditions.

Benign and glorious, it fills the hearts of young and old alike. The joy and wonder, promise of "Peace on Earth," message of new hope, new life are expressed in many ways, on different days.

The glow of candles, reflecting the light of "The Star," the sound of voices singing carols, collected from the world over; the pageantry, the music, the prayers — all salute His heritage of the brotherhood of man.

Yet, there is still no absolute proof of the date of the Birth of Christ.

Christmas celebrations have been held variously in January, March, April, May, October, November, December. Every month has been established by some scholar as that in which "the biggest Christian event occurred."

Quite a few even estimate the date as falling in late August or early September. Comparisons of archaeological and historical data with biblical references project a probable date before 4 B.C. Thus, the present year would have to be 1978 of the Christian era, not 1977.

The reign and death of Herod support those findings. An eclipse of the moon in that year, in coincidence with a Jewish religious festival, enabled historians to set the death of Christ close to that time. And, according to the New Testament, when Herod died, Joseph and Mary and the young Jesus were living in Egypt.

Other deductions from discoveries by archaeologists disclose the Birth occurring as early as 7 B.C.

Most researchers concur, however, that the real date and year of Christmas are lost mysteriously in the past. No matter the varied conclusions, the exact day, month and year are and will remain disputed.

This won't be 3-year-old Kirsten Charles' first Christmas with her daddy, but it will be her merriest and the one she will remember best.

Daddy is Navy Lt. (jg) Norris Charles, a Navy flier and one of three American war prisoners freed by the Communist North Vietnamese Sept. 17. Charles was shot down over enemy territory last Dec. 30.

The Navy has instructed Charles to say little if anything publicly without moving through channels. But that didn't include talking about Christmas.

"It's sure to be our happiest one yet," he says. "We have a lot of plans, but my wife is making them. It's really going to be a family Christmas this year."

Charles' wife, Olga, who traveled to Hanoi to accompany her husband home, says little Kirsten remembers last Christmas vividly — a Christmas celebrated only five days before Charles' plane was brought down by anti-aircraft fire.

"She remembers her daddy, too," says Mrs. Charles, "but of course she doesn't associate him with Christmas yet. She will after this year, though."

Mrs. Charles is planning a double-barreled family reunion for the Yuletide holidays.

"We're going to visit Norris' parents in Tampa, Fla., and my parents in New Orleans, La.," she says. "This year — Thanksgiving and Christmas are being wrapped into one for us. We have plenty to be thankful for, now that Norris is home again."


Mrs. Charles says she especially is grateful that her 27-year-old husband was returned to freedom in such sound health.

The lieutenant's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Charles of Tampa, traveled to San Diego, Calif., to be with their son as he underwent a routine series of medical checkups which turned up no ill effects from his nearly nine months of imprisonment in a North Vietnam prison camp.

"You can't imagine how happy we are about Norris' return," said his father. "At first I wouldn't believe it. It seemed too good to be true. Now that we're all together again, Christmas is going to have a new meaning for all of us."

Olga says any family Christmas celebrations they plan either in Tampa or at her parents' home in New Orleans are going to include prayers of thanks.

"Both our families feel that their prayers and mine must have had something to do with Norris' liberation," she points out. "So if our prayers were answered, we owe the Lord some prayers of thanksgiving."





Lady ghosts in Italy, elves in Scandinavia and wooden shoes filled with hay in Holland all have one thing in common — they are part of the ways that people celebrate Christmas around the world.

If you were able to fly around the world on Christmas Eve, you would see dozens of odd and sometimes amusing Christmas sights, from Scandinavian Santas gobbling porridge as they listen for the footsteps of overzealous children to huge candle-lit processions of Christians of all sects, of course, will be honoring the birthday of Christ at Bethlehem.

An archbishop will lead the traditional procession from Jerusalem to Bethlehem on Dec. 24. He will carry a statue of the baby Christ, and be flanked by altar boys and singers and preceded by musicians.

Solemn High Mass will then be celebrated at midnight in Bethlehem's Church of St. Catherine.

Roman Catholics will be granted special permission to enter the Greek Orthodox Church of the Nativity, where the site of Christ's birth is marked by a marble and silver star.

Around the world, various countries will be celebrating Christmas in their own ways.

In the United States, the chubby figure of Santa Claus will talk to children in hundreds of department stores, promising them, "that, yes, he will fly to them with presents, carrying the gifts in a huge sleigh drawn by reindeer."

Over in Holland, Saint Nicholas will bring gifts to all good children who leave their wooden shoes on their doorsteps. There's a catch, though. The shoe must be filled with hay for "Sinterklaas" to see.

Tom, an elf, is the Christmas gift-giver in most Scandinavian countries. Tomes must be appeased with a bowl of porridge left on the doorstep. If he likes the porridge and eats it all, he will give many gifts.

Christmas is nearly three weeks long in Latin American countries. In Mexico, festivities, including many processions, begin on Dec. 16 and continue until Christmas Eve. If you were to fly to Mexico on Dec. 24, though, you wouldn't see any gift-giving. The official date for that is Jan. 4, "Little Christmas" or the Feast of the Epiphany.



Old 12th Night Traditions

Twelfth Night is the popular English name for the Feast of the Epiphany, which falls on January 6, just 12 days after Christmas. The word "Epiphany" comes from a Greek word meaning "appearance," usually used in reference to the appearance of a deity in visible form.

By the beginning of the 4th century, orthodox Christians in the East were observing the festival as a triple celebration. It became an all-inclusive feast, honoring the birth and baptism of Christ, and His first miracle at Cana of Galilee.

Arrival of the Magi

In the West, however, the particular commemoration assigned to Epiphany was the visit of the Magi. During the Middle Ages, the Epiphany festival was widely observed by the performance of miracle plays in the churches about the Three Kings or Magi. Particularly in England, the day was marked by dramatic productions, though not necessarily religious ones, and this custom survived into the Elizabethan period.

Shakespeare took the popular name of Twelfth Night for his play of that title, which was written to be performed on that date.

Since Epiphany concludes the Yuletide festivities, and its date coincides with many ancient pagan customs, it was often celebrated with strange ceremonies in which those customs mingled with Christian rites. Some of these old ceremonies still exist in parts of Europe, where fixed rituals may have origins, often

with an overlay of magic, that are lost in the past.

Up-Helly-Aa Is Norse

Still celebrated in the Shetland Islands is an old Viking ceremony known as "Up-Helly-Aa." The name means "end of the holiday," indicating that the event comes some time after Christmas, actually at the end of January.

The ceremony itself is very dramatic, since it takes place at night, by torchlight. Men in the old wild Viking costumes, complete with high horned helmets, tow a huge 30-foot Norse longboat through the town, while the old invocation, or prayer, to the tree, is sung.

Wassailing the Trees

This unusual torchlight ceremony still is observed in certain parts of England on January 17, which is the date of "old 12th Night." It's another survival from very ancient times, when prayers were made to the god of trees and fruit.

A glass of cider is thrown on the trunk of an old apple tree, while toast soaked in cider is fastened to the tree branches. Then guns are fired through the branches, while the old invocation, or prayer, to the tree, is sung.

Ethiopia Christmas Rites Ruled By Coptic Church

Ethiopia is a land which has been Christian for some 1600 years. The Ethiopian Orthodox Coptic Church, which has much in common with other Eastern Rite churches, such as the Greek and the Russian, is the established church of the nation. In its interesting and unusual customs, which are a blend of Christian, Hebrew, and pagan traditions, there are many unusual rites and ceremonies, centering on the important Christmas and Epiphany.

Today, in Ethiopia, customs of the Western celebration of Christmas are beginning to find popularity, so that Santa Claus is becoming a familiar figure. Christmas trees are being set up and decorated, and gifts are being exchanged. All this is done, however, according to the dates of the old Julian calendar, which is the one followed in Ethiopia, so that they celebrate Christmas on January 7th.


In this connection, it is interesting to know that the year in Ethiopia consists of 13 months, starting on September 11, when spring begins. There are 30 days each, plus a short month of 5 days, known as Pagumen. This comes just before the New Year.

However, westernized the Ethiopian Christmas may become, the people are not likely to change their observance of important religious festivals. In the month of January, known as Tir, the Coptic Church observes 4 festivals—the first being Christmas, but even more important is Epiphany, or Tinket. This has, as its main feature, the blessing of water and the sprinkling of it on the assembled faithful—a re-enactment of Christ's baptism by John the Baptist. On the previous day, all is made ready. Bells ring, trumpets blow, and drums roll as the priests carry the sacred "Tabot" out from the church to a special carpeted tent, where it remains overnight until time for the priests to bring it forth for the ceremony.

Make It for a Party: Eat It Later



Don't let the Marshmallow Wreath look good enough to eat! It really is!

Make a Marshmallow Wreath like our photo to use as a centerpiece on a holiday table. It would be very attractive encircling a big candle. The base of the wreath is a large styrofoam ring, which you can buy at the dime store, or glue together from smaller pieces of foam (often used as packing material). Or substitute any porous material—foam rubber, leftover plasterboard, etc. Cut marshmallows in half with scissors, wrap each marshmallow in damp cloth after each marshmallow is cut, to keep blades clean. Cut off 1/2 the length of each toothpick, and use the longer piece, inserting it into marshmallow. Place marshmallow on foam ring and push toothpick through marshmallow and into ring.

THE BEAN KING

In parts of France, Spain, and Mexico they still eat a special 12th Night cake, in which a single bean has been concealed. The finder of the bean is hailed as Bean King—a survival of an ancient pagan custom which chose the King of the Saturnalia by lot in this way.

SWEDISH CROWN OF CANDLES

In Sweden, the Christmas season traditionally begins on December 13, when a young girl in each house assumes the role of St. Lucia, wearing a white robe and a crown of lighted candles. The custom goes back to Viking times when, under the old calendar, the night of December 12-13 was the longest of the year. The Lucia girl symbolizes returning light.





Dutch Celebrate Feast of Sinterklaas

Patron Saint of Amsterdam Was Born in Asia Minor; Famed as Child Benefactor

For centuries, the Feast of Sinterklaas has been unique as a Dutch and Flemish event, honoring St. Nicholas' Calendar Day on December 6, but celebrated on the eve, December 5.

Why is St. Nicholas' influence so strong in Holland? Primarily because he was the patron saint of merchants and sailors. The actual Saint lived from 271 A.D. to December 6, 342 or 343, so that his Calendar Day honors the date of his death. He became famous as the Archbishop of Myra in Asia Minor, and performed many good and saintly deeds. Legend tells us he performed miracles as well, such as calming stormy seas, dropping dowries into the shoes of penniless maidens, and saving children from dire harm. He is now the patron saint of the city of Amsterdam.

All Dutch children believe that Sinterklaas, as the saint is now known, lives in Spain, where he spends most of the year recording the behavior of all children in a big red book, while his servant Piet (Pete) stocks up on presents for the next December 5. After mid-November, Sinterklaas mounts his milk-white steed, Piet swings the sack full of gifts over his shoulder, and they board a ship to sail for Amsterdam harbor and a formal welcome by the Mayor and prominent citizens. Then comes a fabulous parade through town, watched live and on TV by people all over the country.

At night Sinterklaas rides across Holland's rooftops and Piet distributes gifts and candy — in exchange for the hay or carrot which children leave for the horse in each little shoe that's left by the fireplace.

A Sinterklaas present is not a bit like an early Christmas present. Dutch tradition demands that all packages be camouflaged in some imaginative way, and that each gift be accompanied by a fitting poem. For the essence of Sinterklaas is sheer fun — with kidding expedited between all ages and social groups. Presents are often hidden all over the house — and those who get them must be willing to work hard for their surprise. The poems that come with the gifts are expected to play good-natured jokes on the giftees and they must be read aloud. Afterward, each person says a loud "Thank you, Sinterklaas!" which is indeed the way the Hollander feels about this merry and very special Christmas festivity.

Yuletide New England Traditions

BOSTON — Remove from the Christmas season the notable contributions made by New Englanders — and the list of "firsts" is a long one — and there would be little left of the joy, magic and enchantment of the universal holiday.

Well known is the fact that Louis Prang in Boston introduced the first religious Christmas cards in the United States in 1874. Also known to most everyone is the fact that the lyrics of the song "O Little Town of Bethlehem" were written in 1865 by Philip Brooks, Episcopal bishop of Boston and that window candles first glowed in a home on Beacon Hill.

But perhaps, less well known, is that Massachusetts claims the first department store Santa Claus, forerunner of the thousands of white-bearded old gentlemen who greet millions of children in shopping centers and stores each year across the nation.

James Edgar of Brockton was the first to appear as Santa Claus in a store. He was the owner of The Boston Store which he opened in 1878 and operated until he died shortly before World War I.

Well-suited for his role at that Christmas season in 1878, Edgar had a snow-white beard, a lady laugh and round body. Furthermore, the store owner loved children.

Legend has it that he would stand on the roof of his store and scatter pennies to children who gathered in the street, delighting in seeing them scoop up the coins.

Each Fourth of July he footed the bill for a picnic in the park for hundreds of children, hiring every available trolley car to transport the youngsters.

At those outings Edgar dressed in various costumes to amuse the children. He once appeared as George Washington, another time as Uncle Sam and once as an Indian chief.

His costume for his first appearance at Christmas time was that of a clown. This made such a hit that he decided on a different approach for Christmas in 1890. He wore a Santa Claus uniform and for hours wandered through his store talking with children and asking them what they wanted for Christmas.

A writer at the time described the scene, saying, "You can't imagine what it was like. There had always been sketches of Santa Claus but when you went to The Boston Store there he was right in front of you."

"It was like a dream come true, you were actually talking to Santa Claus."

The number of children increased every year and they came from places as far distant as Boston to see their friend, Santa Claus, in person.

Edgar's "act" caught on and before long there were Santa Claus stores across the nation — an American tradition that got its start in a small Massachusetts store.

Probably not generally known is that the famous Christmas poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas" was written by New Englander Clement Clarke Moore of Newport, R.I.

Christmas Card Custom Has Spanned Centuries

And, in this year's vast variety of cards can be found reflections of all of the styles of the past.

A change in postal rates occurred in England shortly before the first 1,000 cards were mailed. The penny post was introduced in the United Kingdom in 1840, putting postage within the financial reach of many. By 1850, the sending of cards had become an established English custom.

During the 1860s, when the first commercial firms began publishing cards in London, Kate Greenway became the favorite artist. Her designs, featuring darling children exquisitely dressed in Victorian fashion, were widely imitated.

By 1870, cards are many charming children, some of them little girls in billowing skirts, bonnets and muffs. In the 1870s, holiday motifs gave way to greetings illustrated by landscapes, flowers, birds, animals and fish. The same subjects will go through the mails this year.

Cards sent in this country were imported from England until early in the 1870s, when Louis Prang of Boston set up the first American greeting card firm. It was he who perfected the lithographic process of multicolor printing and was the first to make religious interpretations of Christmas popular. The popularity has remained steadfast, as other trends enjoyed only temporary peaks.

As the last century neared its end, penny postcards made in Germany dominated the American Christmas card market, overshadowing Prang's colorful creations and holding their lead until the beginning of World War I.

The postal cards used today by many who have the talent to design and reproduce their own original greetings. America began taking hold of the industry around 1920,





Great Egnog Ideas For Yule Party Time

Christmas time is party time. Time for eggnog, mistletoe, cards and good cheer. And what better way to make sure the cheer is all good than with some delightfully delicious, mouth-watering eggnogs.

Forget this stuff the milk-man brings or you buy at the supermarket. These readily-made varieties can't hold a Christmas candle to concoctions you can create in the confines of your own kitchen. For instance:

BALTIMORE EGGNOG
It's guaranteed to give you the kick of a colt.
— Beat 12 egg yolks until they're thick and pale in color.
— Add two (2) cups of sugar and continue to beat mixture until the yolks are thick and light in color.
— Chill the mixture.
— To serve, pour the egg mixture into a punch bowl and slowly stir in one-fifth (1/5) Cognac, one-fifth (1/5) golden rum, and one (1) cup peach brandy.
— Add six (6) cups chilled milk, three (3) cups chilled heavy cream and 12 stiffly beaten egg whites.
— Makes 25 servings.

GOURMET'S EGGNOG
You'll feel like galloping over for another.
— Beat 12 egg yolks until they're light.
— Add gradually one and one-half (1 1/2) cups fine granulated sugar and continue to beat until the yolks are thick and light in color.
— Add two (2) cups of sugar and continue to beat mixture until the yolks are thick and light in color.
— Chill the mixture for two (2) hours.
— To serve, pour the batter into a punch bowl and slowly blend in two-fifths (2/5) of bourbon and one (1) cup each of golden rum and Cognac.
— Add two (2) cups of chilled milk and six (6) cups of chilled heavy cream and pour it into a punch bowl.
— Pour in two-fifths (2/5) of Cognac slowly and blend thoroughly. Fold in the egg whites and sprinkle the mixture generously with grated nutmeg.
— Makes 25 servings.

SOUTHERN EGGNOG
The South has risen to new heights.
— Beat 18 egg yolks until they are light.
— Add gradually two (2) cups of fine granulated sugar and continue to beat until the yolks are thick and light in color.
— Whip in one (1) quart of milk and one (1) quart of heavy cream and add very slowly one and one-half (1 1/2) quarts of bourbon and one (1) pint Cognac, stirring constantly.
— Fold in 12 egg whites, stiffly beaten, and sprinkle the surface of the punch with one-eighth (1/8) cup of Jamaica rum and grated nutmeg to taste.
— Makes 25 servings.

KENTUCKY EGGNOG
If Daniel Boone had tried this he'd have killed more than one bear with his bare hands.
— Beat 18 egg yolks until they are thick and pale in color.
— Add two (2) cups fine granulated sugar and continue to beat the mixture until the sugar is dissolved.
— Chill the mixture for two (2) hours.
— To serve, pour the batter into a punch bowl and slowly blend in two-fifths (2/5) of bourbon and one (1) cup each of golden rum and Cognac.
— Add two (2) cups of chilled milk and six (6) cups of chilled heavy cream and pour it into a punch bowl.
— Pour in two-fifths (2/5) of Cognac slowly and blend thoroughly. Fold in the egg whites and sprinkle the mixture generously with grated nutmeg.
— Makes 25 servings.

WILLIAMSBURG EGGNOG
This is the perfect punch for a yuletide bicentennial celebration.
— Beat 18 egg yolks until they are thick and pale in color.
— Add two (2) cups of fine granulated sugar and continue to beat the mixture until the sugar is dissolved.
— Very slowly add one-fifth (1/5) of Cognac and set the mixture aside.
— Beat 18 egg whites with one-half (1/2) cup sugar until they are very light.
— To the egg yolk mixture add one (1) quart each of milk and heavy cream and pour it into a punch bowl.
— Pour in two-fifths (2/5) of Cognac slowly and blend thoroughly. Fold in the egg whites and sprinkle the mixture generously with grated nutmeg.
— Makes 25 servings.

If you're planning a more intimate get-together, say for two and you prefer something with a Continental flare to take the chill of a winter evening, why not try this:

ITALIAN EGGNOG
Mamma mia! That's a spicy eggnog!
— Combine one (1) cup milk and one (1) egg.
— Beat or shake vigorously.
— Add one (1) ounce of Brandy and one (1) ounce Liqueur Galliano.
— Pour into a brandy snifter and chill in the refrigerator.
— Garnish with chocolate curls or chopped nuts before serving.
— Makes one serving.

If eggnogs (heaven forbid, aren't you thing but you'd like to drink something different over the holidays here are a couple wintry delights.

SNOW DROP
— One-half (1/2) ounce Liqueur Galliano.
— One-half (1/2) ounce Vodka.
— One-half (1/2) ounce Triple Sec.
— One-half (1/2) ounce White Creme de Cacao.
— One (1) ounce light cream.
— A dash of egg white.
— Mix in a blender with a small quantity of crushed ice and serve in a champagne glass.

SNOWFLAKE
— Three-fourths (3/4) ounce Liqueur Galliano.
— One-fourth (1/4) ounce Cointreau.
— One-fourth (1/4) ounce Yellow Chartreuse.
— One and one-fourth (1 1/4) ounces of cream.
— Shake with ice, serve in a champagne glass and top with a slice of cherry.

How to Make A Christmas Scrapbook

Here's a great idea for salvaging those used or left-over Christmas gift wraps.

You may use a regular 3-ring loose-leaf notebook, or cut cardboard to any size you like, for the covers. If you make your covers, you can punch holes in them later and put covers and inside pages together with left-over Christmas ribbons (press them smooth first). Cover notebook or cardboard with gift-wrap paper. You can press used or left-over Christmas wrap paper smooth with an iron, set on very low heat. Measure notebook, taking the height and width of front and back covers. Add 1/2" overlap to all four sides. Cut out of one piece of paper, or two if you use two pieces of cardboard. Notch the corners. Using rubber cement, or any household glue, glue paper to outside covers of notebook, centering between the notched corners. Then glue covers to inside of covers. Measure exact dimensions of inside covers. Cut out one piece of gift wrap for each (this could be a contrast pattern) and cement into place, covering overlaps. Select a scene from a Christmas card and glue to the center of front cover. Trim the edges. If you like, with leftover ribbon, gold braid, or tape.

For the inside pages, use your imagination!

Mistletoe Holds Special Spot

What is mistletoe? It's legend, poetry, reality, the holy and the unholy, the peace mediator, the "Golden Bough" of Virgil, the ritual plant of the Celtic Druids — but mostly now the pearl-berried Christmas greenery known as a universal license for kissing during the holiday season.

The recorded history of mistletoe goes back 25 centuries. It appears in the back-

ground of nearly every religion and civilization, from the days of the Egyptian pharaohs, when sprigs of the green were placed in the tombs to assure everlasting life in the hereafter.

Probably the best known legends associated with mistletoe have to do with the Celtic Druids' ritualistic cutting of the mysterious parasitic plant, as reported by Pliny in his "Natural History." The Druids made quite a rite of cutting down the sacred plant,

with the Archdruid catching it in his flowing white robes, so that it should not have its mystical properties spoiled by touching the ground.

It is probable that the custom of kissing under the mistletoe originated with the Druids, for during their winter solstice festivals, sprigs and greenery were hung over the doorways of all homes, with the idea that only good could enter under it.

An old Norse legend tells of how Balder, the sun god, was slain by an arrow made from mistletoe. The god of evil, Loki, who had been out to get Balder, discovered that Freya (or Frigg), queen of the gods and loving mother of Balder, had overlooked the insignificant mistletoe when extracting pledges from all of the elements, all animals and plants, that they would do nothing to harm the golden god.

With this knowledge, Loki took up whittling, carved an arrow from the mistletoe plant, and — zing — one dead sun god. Whereupon the gods got together and figured out a way of bringing Balder back to life. In converse commemoration of the occasion, Freya proclaimed that mistletoe should always be a symbol of life and happiness.

In Taoist, Confucian, Hindu and Moslem religions, mistletoe has played its role. And in Judaism, the Star of David has been shown in a field of

wheat sheaves, grape clusters and mistletoe sprigs.

But nowhere has this winter greenery played a greater role than among Christians. Medieval monks brewed a tea from its bark, which was supposed to cast out devils. Re-naisance churches were decorated with mistletoe at both Christmas and Easter.

However, Martin Luther and Oliver Cromwell, each in his turn outlawed the dainty plant as conducive to pagan practices. It is not known whether they ever realized that trying to turn off mistletoe is like trying to turn off

people, but it is obvious that their condemnation met with no lasting success.

Aside from the myriad myths and historical background, just what is mistletoe? A plant of a thousand varieties because, as a parasite, it takes on the individual qualities of whatever tree it chooses to call home. If it grows on a coniferous tree, for instance, its berries may be pink and its leaves like pine needles.

The mistletoe which grows in abundance from North Carolina on down the eastern coast of the United States is commercially unsaleable, for it has a rough, gnarled, masculine quality, as opposed to the Central Texas variety, which is a delicate, feminine, light green plant with pear-like berries. There is some mistletoe on the West Coast, but not in sufficient quantities to warrant any large scale commercialization.

In spite of its fragile look, Texas mistletoe takes on from the mesquite and Spanish oak trees on which it grows — a hardiness which allows for its holding up through packaging, shipping and merchandising throughout the country. These days fresh mistletoe is mostly shipped by air, and Love Field at Dallas is piled high with cartons of both packaged and bulk mistletoe in the brief (2½ weeks) shipping season.



Christmas Gift Wrapping Important For Protection

The saddest part of Christmas is when you open that big box from your wealthy Uncle Albert and find a cracked blue vase in it.

Uncle Alberts (or Harolds or Bobs) are always smart; they had to be to amass that fortune that you always hope will result in a really beautiful present some time. But they can never seem to package their Christmas gifts so that they arrive looking the way they did in the store.

There is a way to get revenge, however. For all those who wish to imitate their Uncle Albert and send him a cracked vase in a broken-down cardboard box, we have compiled a list of ways not

package Christmas gifts: — Always pack fragile items in cardboard boxes 10 times too big for them, and don't put anything in to keep them from rattling around. You can get things, like styrofoam plastic chips, at any gift shop and they will insure fragile blue vases. Or you can go the old-fashioned route and pop a lot of popcorn, which makes an excellent buffer. Or even use crumpled-up newspapers.

If you do, however, Uncle Albert will get his present in good condition, which will destroy the whole point of what you're trying to do.

— Always put Uncle Al-

bert's name and address on a stick-on label, but make sure that the label is at least a year old so that the glue is no good. This will make it almost certain that the label will fall off during shipment, and Uncle Albert will never get his present.

Post office employees always tell you to put Uncle Albert's address directly on the wrapper, and tie a strong cord around the box to hold the wrapper on. They also tell you to put Uncle Albert's address on a piece of paper inside the box. This is a bad idea, since Uncle Albert will get his present in good condition.

— Always put Uncle Al-

houses full of Christmas gifts, left there because the sticker or wrapper fell off. If you follow this rule, Uncle Albert's present will soon be among them.

— Wait until two days before Christmas before shipping off your present to Uncle Albert. This will insure that he will not receive his present until after Christmas, if at all.

If Uncle Albert lives in New York and you live in Los Angeles, it will take three weeks for Uncle Albert to get his present, so he will receive it just about the time he's breaking his last New Year's resolution.

If Uncle Albert lives in Los Angeles and you live in San Diego, he will receive his present a day or two after Christmas. This is good, since it will confuse Uncle Albert and make him wonder whether the cracked blue vase he's receiving is a Christmas gift or a few samples from a pottery company. This is especially good if the wrapper you failed to tie on is so completely disintegrated that he can't make out the return address.

It gets trickier if you're mailing a package overseas. If Uncle Albert is in the service, say a general, then you can send a package at the special serviceman's rate.

Candles Light The Way Throughout The Ages

Although it has been said there was no candle to light the manger in the stable at Bethlehem, still from early times people have placed tapers in windows to light the way for the Christ Child and welcome Him.

In many countries, anyone coming to the door at Christmastime was invited to enter. For some believed that Christ Himself would appear at a house with a candle, concealing his identity, to learn the extent of their kindness.

Candles have inspired men throughout the ages, linking their bright glow with the beauty of faith. Research by Hallmark candle expert John Sinden reveals that candles were generally used at Christmastime as far back as the 11th Century. Until the 18th Century they were made primarily from tallow or beeswax. The latter was preferred, as an emblem of Mary's purity, for wax is the product of virgin bees. Many persons believed that

bees came from heaven, and it was not unusual for religious institutions to keep swarms of them. According to an early writer, the wax represented Christ's body; the wick, His soul; and the flame His divine nature.

The religious symbolism of the candle grew through the centuries after early Christians, huddled in the damp, chilly catacombs of Rome, used lighted candles as a source of comfort.

New Candle Materials

In 1750 a substance from the head of the sperm whale was found to be superior to tallow and beeswax. Later, in 1850, paraffin was developed and combined with stearic acid to make candles of the modern type.

Bayberry candles with their delicate scent are especially popular at Christmas, and they are said to bring good luck to the home. The bayberry candle is uniquely American. Bayberry bushes grew in great

abundance in the new world, and after learning to extract the greenish wax from the wild bayberries, the Americans used it to make candles.

So Don't Get Careless Christmas Often Burglar's Friend

Police methods vary from American city to city and state to state. But law enforcement officers across the nation agree on this rather grim axiom: The Christmas holidays can be the burglar's best friend unless homeowners shut him out of the house.

About this time of year, as the Yule season approaches, big city police departments traditionally come up with precepts for Harry the Homeowner, aimed at outwitting the burglar.

Most of the anti-burglary edicts are just plain common sense and apply all year. But police have found that some-

how the professional burglar takes delight in blighting the Christmas festivities of care-less families.

For one thing, they point out, you're inviting misfortune if you leave the curtains open in front of the Christmas tree and all the tempting packages stacked around it. It's like sending an R.S.V.P. invitation to the burglar, who often drives down residential streets to find out which homes are loaded heaviest with gifts and are the most vulnerable.

If you're going Christmas shopping even to the nearby store, don't leave the front door unlocked. It takes the

burglar only a few minutes to ransack the house. And you may return home to find him inside. The cornered burglar can be dangerous.

Be especially neighborly around Christmas time. If you see a stranger roaming the neighborhood, notify police, especially if you know one of your neighbors is away from home.

And don't be timid about questioning people seen removing property from neighbors' homes if you don't recognize them as friends or relatives. Be sure to record license numbers of strange cars parked in the neighborhood or seen cruising by slowly.

Thefts from cars — locked or unlocked — climb during the Christmas shopping season. So don't leave packages lying in plain sight on the seats. Put them in the trunk or on the floor and cover them. The professional thief can open your car door in a matter of seconds if he spies something of value inside.



Christmas Shopping In 1924 'Revisited'

"I cannot but remember such things were, that were most precious to me." — William Shakespeare, in Macbeth.

This may have been the Bard's forerunner of a phrase which has been used by many of us, as when a conversation begins with "I remember when ..." or, when undiplomatically directed at friends or kinsmen of more tender years, "now, when I was your age. ..."

There is no gambit better designed to set up the barrier we know as the Generation Gap.

And actually, unless you belong to, say, the under-30 brigade, the Decade of the Twenties doesn't really seem so long gone. (Does it?) But as Christmas approaches, some references thereto may not be entirely out of order. Take, for example, getting ready for Christmas in the year 1924 A.D.

This is not necessarily chosen as the epitome of what is recurrently referred to as the "Good Old Days," but because there are at hand some copies of a newspaper dated in December of that year.

Be advised that eating out was not unknown back in 1924. People planning to dine out then could have turkey dinner "with all the trimmings" for 85 cents. A hotel recommended its own chicken dinner at 85 cents a plate. There was no problem about whether to have cocktails or wine before dinner, because those were Prohibition days. Remember Prohibition?

To cater to the sweet tooth (that sounds much more sugary than sweet teeth, for some reason) peanuts were being sold at 30 cents a pound and chocolate almonds at 50 cents a pound.

For those who planned to duck out to a holiday movie the newspaper advertised Patsy Ruth Miller in "The Girl on the Stairs," plus vaudeville, at a local theater. A coming attraction called "Excitement" starred Tom Mix.

All rated "G," without a doubt.

How about shopping? One store offered dainty gifts like bloomers and step-ins, \$1.85 to \$6.50; fancy garters, \$1.50 to \$2.50; and men's neckwear, 50 cents to \$3.50. Another store had bargains galore. Neckties were 35 cents, linen tablecloths were \$2.98, ladies' silk hose were 75 cents a pair, and silk teddies were \$3.45 "and up."

Teddies? Still another store had "100 hats at \$2.50" and silk teddies at \$1.95 and \$2.75.

The big spender could get a Ware Motorcylinder Receiver for \$98.50. It was boasted that "60 families" had bought this superb radio, which was "years ahead of its time."

A furniture store had gas ranges for "35 and up" and leather rockers for \$22.50.

An auto store catered to the motorist, and gift suggestions included a Motometer at from \$2.90 to \$7, or an onyx ball to top the gear shift at only \$1.75.

Dinner at home? There was help for the budget. The Grovetta had bacon at 25 cents a pound, Swift's Premium ham at 29 cents a pound, coffee at 42 cents a pound, and 12 pounds of Burbank potatoes for a quarter. Beef pot roast was 15 cents a pound and fresh-ground ham-

burger two pounds for a quarter. Another market was pushing pork roasts at 18 cents a pound.

Turkey? The restaurants must have cornered the market. The butcher shops weren't advertising it.





Green beans with pimento

Snowy raspberry angel cake
Coffee

STUFFED CHERRY TOMATOES
1/2 cup low fat cottage cheese
1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon basil
24 Cherry tomatoes
1 small can of anchovy fillets
Spring of parsley or watercress to decorate
Mix low fat cottage cheese, Worcestershire sauce and basil. Scoop out center of cherry tomatoes and fill with mixture. Decorate top with 1/2 anchovy fillet.

MARINATED ARTICHOKE AND DILL PICKLES
Simply drain jar of marinated artichokes. They are ready to serve. Drain and cut dill pickles and arrange all 3 kinds of appetizers on a tray to serve with beverage before dinner.

BAKED HAM WITH PINEAPPLE BROWN SUGAR GLAZE
Lean pork may be eaten occasionally on a low-saturated fat diet. Select a lean "ready to eat ham." Remove casing and cut off all but a very, very thin layer of fat. Score with a knife into a diamond pattern. Put ham on a rack. Roast at 300 degrees for 3 hours. Pour off all the fat in the pan. Apply half of the sugar paste on all surfaces of the ham. Decorate with canned pineapple pieces and whole cloves. Return to 300 degree oven for another 1/2 to 1 hour.

BROWN SUGAR PASTE FOR GLAZE
1/4 cup prepared mustard
1/4 cup brown sugar
3 Tablespoons flour
1 Tablespoon pineapple juice
Reserve half of the sugar paste to serve hot with the ham slices.

SWEET POTATO PUFFS IN ORANGE CUPS
Heat drained canned sweet potatoes, mash, add polyunsaturated margarine and hot pineapple and orange juice, and salt lightly. Pile hot mashed potatoes into cleaned orange shells. Sprinkle with nutmeg. Bake in 400 degree oven for 1/2 hour or until hot.

GREEN BEANS WITH PIMENTO
Cook two packages frozen green beans according to package instructions. Drain and saute in two Tablespoons of oil; season with salt and pepper. Add a small can of chopped pimento or decorate the hot vegetable platter with stripes of pimento to form a star, or tree, etc.

GINGER GRAPEFRUIT MOLDS
1 package of orange gelatin
1 cup hot water
1 teaspoon grated grapefruit rinds
2 grapefruit
1/2 cup gingerale
1 small banana
salad greens
ginger dressing
Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Cool to room temperature. Grate grapefruit rind. Stir gingerale and grapefruit rind into cooled gelatin. Chill until slightly thickened. Slice banana. Fold banana and grapefruit sections into gelatin. Turn into 54 individual molds and chill until firm. Unmold onto salad greens and serve with ginger dressing.

GINGER DRESSING
1/2 cup low-fat yogurt (plain)
2 Tablespoons mayonnaise
1 Tablespoon ginger marmalade or 1 Tablespoon chopped candied ginger
1/4 Teaspoon grated grapefruit rind

Illness Finally Takes Truman

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Harry S. Truman died today, conquered finally by the infirmities of age.
The nation's 33rd president died at 8:50 a.m. EST. His wife and daughter were notified at their home.
Truman was 88. (See Related Story, Photo, Pg. 12A)
The hospital attributed death to the "complexity of organic failures causing a collapse of the cardio-vascular system."
Truman entered the hospital three weeks ago today and had been in a coma since early Saturday.

As his condition worsened Christmas Day, Truman's daughter, Margaret Truman Daniel, returned from her home in New York. She saw him for about 20 minutes Monday night.
Death came quietly to the former president. Dr. Wallace Graham, his physician from the White House days, was at his side.
A family spokesman, Randall Jessee, said the 87-year-old Mrs. Truman stood up well to the announcement.
The former president will lie in state for 24 hours, beginning Wednesday at noon EST, in the rotunda of the library that houses the memorabilia of the


Truman presidency. Burial will be at 4 p.m. EST Thursday at a spot on the library grounds visible from the window of Truman's long-time office.
Truman had been vice president for only 82 days in the closing days of World War II, when he became president on the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt.
During his eight years in the world's most powerful post, Truman set the United States against global communism, aiding countries that were threatened by the threat of Russian domination.
One of the most momentous acts of his presidency was to

order the dropping of the atomic bomb on Hiroshima.
He returned to the solitude of the family home in Independence, spending the first decade after leaving the White House by lecturing on college campuses.
He was 60 years old when he became president and was 69 when he left the capital in January 1953.
His death leaves Lyndon B. Johnson as the nation's only living former president.
The former president will be buried in the courtyard of the library, an imposing limestone structure less than a mile from his home.

Two Dead, One Injured Shootings Are Probed

Somebody put this one on my desk. Knowing how much I appreciate the service from the U.S. Post Office, I shall let it pass without comment, thank you. (And I don't know how I can, really...)

Seminole Sheriff's investigators today continued probes in three separate weekend shootings in which two women were killed and a third injured. (Related photos page 2A).
Mrs. Christine Hunter, 32, 16 Hammond Drive, Apopka, was listed in satisfactory condition this morning at Florida Hospital, Orlando.
Investigators said Mrs. Hunter was shot five times in the head with a small caliber pistol while she was in the laundry room of 8 Days Inn, Wymore Road at Interstate 4 Sunday afternoon.
The woman's husband, Curtis Hunter, surrendered this morning to Apopka Police. Capt. L. J. Kriz said, and Kriz and detective Sgt. John Wright Jr. went to Apopka to return Hunter to Sanford to face a charge of assault with intent to commit murder.
Capt. Kriz said there have been no arrests in the Monday shooting death of 50-year-old Ethel Mae Whitaker, Main Street, Midway.
Sheriff's reports said the woman was shot in the side shortly after 8 a.m. in the back yard of her home. An autopsy performed this morning by medical examiner Dr. G. V. Garay showed death from internal hemorrhaging, according to Capt. Kriz.
Samuel Whitaker, 53, told deputies he shot his wife accidentally while trying to shoot a dog that had been eating his chickens.
Deputies recovered a .32 caliber revolver at the shooting scene.

Investigators today reported recovery of a gun from a wooded area near Geneva where a 22-year-old woman was fatally shot early Saturday in her trailer home.
Gary Douglas Morrison, 20, remained in County Jail today without bond charged with first degree murder in the death of his wife, Karen Gilbo Morrison. Officers said Morrison called authorities shortly after 1 a.m. Saturday and said "someone had murdered his wife."
Responding deputies David Hall and Glen Trombley arrived at the Morrison trailer, located on Lake Harney Heights Road in an isolated area east of Geneva, and found Mrs. Morrison's body just inside the doorway.
Authorities said the woman was shot at least one time in the head.
A search of nearby woods and ponds for the death weapon turned up a gun but detective Sgt. Tony Calangelo, in charge of the investigation, today declined to reveal the type, or caliber of the gun found.
Morrison was arrested at his residence on a disorderly conduct charge early Saturday after he "began struggling with deputies." Several hours later Sgt. Calangelo charged Morrison with first degree murder in his wife's death.

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)—Official sources confirmed today that survivors of an Andes plane crash had eaten the flesh of dead comrades to avoid starvation during a 69-day ordeal.
The official source said 16 survivors, either players or boosters of an Uruguayan rugby team, had made a solemn pact that they would not discuss the matter until they returned to Montevideo, Uruguay, and then they would make a collective statement.
Three have already returned to Montevideo. The other 13 have remained in Santiago to recover but plan to fly back to Montevideo in a day or two.
The plane had 45 persons aboard when it hit an Andean peak Oct. 13. By the end of October, 29 were dead.
There had been rumors that those who survived might have eaten human flesh to live through the bitter mountain blizzards, but the reports could not be substantiated until today.
The sources said that one of the young men, not identified, compared the group's decision to use the cadavers as "similar to a heart transplant." His explanation: In a transplant operation a heart is taken from a person at death to maintain another's life, and in the same manner portions of bodies had been used to maintain the living.
