Vote Draws Large Turnout Democrats Re-Elect Rod Cable

By a landslide vote, Seminole County Democrats last night re-elected Rod Cable chairman of the party's executive committee.

The second election — held at the courthouse in Sanford — was called after Florida Democratic Chairman Ann Cramer ruled Cable's initial election was illegal because party members weren't given the required 10 days notice.

Party regulars called this morning said no opposition surfaced at last night's meeting.

Of 49 precincts, Cable received the okay from about 35 precinct members present at last night's session. In all, some 85 persons turned out for the

Altamonte Springs, said, "It looks like we've got a united group. We're very pleased to have him."

Commission Examines Sheriff's Budget

Three Seminole County commissioners yesterday delved into a \$2.6 million budget request from Sheriff John Polk, poked around for a while and then gave the request to the county Office of Management and Evaluation (OME) to provide some figures for further study.

The commissioners — John Kimbrough, Mike Hattaway and Dick Williams — met in two work sessions yesterday morning and evening with county financial operations personnel to review OME's analysis of the sheriff's request.

Kimrough said this morning that there "no way" the sheriff's total budget request will be approved.

"It would be fiscal irresponsibility to approve the total request," Kimbrough said. "We're looking at it from a "hold the line" position.

"We looked at what we had appropriated in salaries and what the sheriff had paid in salaries. We also looked at the new positions he is requesting money for, and also the positions we provided money for last year, but were never

The Commission has to reach a decision and return the budget to Polk by Aug. 1. Polk then has the authority to appeal the budget to the State Department of Administration if a compromise can not be worked out between himself and the Commission.

Commissioners Harry Kwiatkowski and Chairman Sid Vihlen Jr., did not attend the work session yesterday and will have to confer with the rest of the commissioners before the adjusted budget is returned to the sheriff. Kimbrough said today that he will attempt to schedule work sessions during the weekend to work on the budget.

City Pay Hike Debate Expected

A debate over a five per cent across-the-board pay increase for city employees was expected to erupt today between Sanford City Commissioner Julian Stenstrom and City Manager Warren "Pete" Knowles at the Commission's first budget hearing.

Stenstrom said, prior to the opening of the day-long work session, that he planned "to ask a awful lot of questions" about the pay increase, pointing out that he was in favor of "those making \$8,500 and less getting a raise, but not the five figure employees."

increase in pay, at this time" Stenstrom said. "I'm going to ask a lot of questions."

Stenstrom said he also felt the City Commission would quiz Knowles heavily on a proposed cut of one and a half mills from the city's debt retirement millage.

"One mill we might go for, but I'm not certain the full cut will be approved," Stenstrom declared. "I want to be sure everything is covered when we cut that mill."

The commissioner said his concern about both the mill cut and the pay increase proposal stemmed from the economic situation in the community.

"The proposed city budget requests \$1,559,274 for the next fiscal year, some \$18,000 higher than last year's \$1,541,274. However, the budget proposal is still \$57,000-plus short of balancing with estimated revenue for the coming year.

Knowles requested a cut of millage from the present 8.7 mills to a proposed total of 6.37, but elimination of any debt millage tax.

Deputy Director Hiring Gets Priority County Agrees To Push Updating Of Civil Defense

In the 1960's, civil defense meant fallout shelters, gallons of stored water, boxes of soda crackers and the threat of a nuclear holocaust.

Now, the image of a civil defense program is changing, becoming localized, and Seminole County is attempting to update its neglected CD program.

With a push from Gary Kaiser, director of Public Works, the County Commission has agreed to hire a deputy director for the county's CD program on a priority basis. Kaiser has the title of CD director along with that of County Fire Administrator.

Kaiser says the county has a lot of catching up and updating to do before the program can reach an effective peak. One individual is needed to take charge of co-ordinating the program and the BEOP (basic emergency operation plan), according to Kaiser. The BEOP is a procedure for getting word of a local disaster to the proper authorities and to insure immediate relief action.

But Kaiser, the 30-year-old man who took charge of the new county fire department last October, says that both the county's and city's emergency equipment and facilities have greatly changed in the last year and a complete reorganization is needed.

"The CD people are the fire department, police, the Red Cross volunteers. It's here," he says. "It's just a case of using it. The program exists but it needs coordination."

Without countywide coordination, should a large disaster occur — such as a hurricane or tornado — Kaiser expects some problems.

"Undoubtedly there would be delays and awkward situations of coordination," he explains. "It all boils down to doing the best you can. What really matters about civil defense is to be able to react to local disaster in a minute amount of time with the greatest accuracy and effectiveness."

But the holdup on reevaluating the program is obvious: no one man to devote full time to taking charge of the program, Kaiser says.

The county's program also has caught the attention of the area coordinator for CD out of Wildwood, who sent a memo to Kaiser last week citing the Seminole CD program as being out of date since 1968 and calling for the county to initiate action to pull the program up-to-date.

The letter, plus Kaiser's urgings, have caused the Commission to search for a CD deputy director, a man responsible for the countywide program and

with the chore of reporting directly to the Commission.

Currently, Kaiser and the personnel board are screening six applicants for the \$10,000 a year job. Kaiser said he expects hiring of the person to get immediate attention from the Commission.

In January, Kaiser says he expressed the need for a fulltime CD director, because he says he "could not place the emphasis on it (CD) that it should have."

Since becoming fire administrator, Kaiser says he has not had enough time to properly handle the

Zoo Society Hears Road Paving Offer

The dusty entrance road to the new Central Florida Zoo will be paved within weeks by members of the Central Florida Paving and Road Builders Association, an association member said today.

The association, meeting yesterday in Orlando, agreed to undertake the estimated \$48,000 project, which has been a thorn in the side of Seminole County officials.

Fred DeWitt, association member and vice president of Amick Construction Company, said that "one or two of the material contractors had to check with their bosses" before committing their services to the project, but the problem would "not kill the project."

Al Rozon, executive director of the Central Florida Zoological Society, appeared before the association yesterday to outline what was needed to pave the 1.2 mile road leading from U. S. 17-92 to the zoo site. Rozon, the man responsible for the development of the more than 10

acre Park and Zoo site, also signed up \$250 in society memberships.

The commitment from the association, takes the county off the book for paving the road, but Rozon said he would still "be looking for the county to pave the parking lots" and the deceleration lane on the highway.

The association consists of area construction firms.

DeWitt said the only problems he could foresee in the paving project would be "coordination" among the different contractors.

The society's need for assistance in the paving project was directed to the association by Orange County Commissioner Lamar Thomas three weeks ago, according to DeWitt. DeWitt said that the association then began considering the project.

"Everybody agrees that the zoo is a great thing," DeWitt says. "We agreed to the project mainly as a contribution on the part of the association."

NATION IN BRIEF

Butterfield Said CIA's White House Contact

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former presidential aide Alexander Butterfield, who revealed the existence of former President Nixon's taping system, was a contact officer for the Central Intelligence Agency while he served in the White House, a former CIA liaison officer for the Air Force said today.

Shortly after the liaison officer, retired Col. L. Fletcher Proby, made the disclosure on television, an informed source said Proby had given the information to the House intelligence committee in recent days.

Butterfield gained national prominence nearly two years ago when he disclosed to Senate Watergate investigators the existence of then-President Richard M. Nixon's White House tape recording system.

Bumper Grain Crop Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. grain harvest should be so huge this year that retail food prices through late 1976 will increase at a slower rate than they have in the past two years, government officials say.

Less clear, however, was how much impact a possible large-scale purchase of U.S. corn and wheat by the Soviet Union would have at the supermarket checkout counter.

Launch Sites Buzzing

CAPE CANAVERAL (AP) — Activity quickened at launch sites half a world apart today as Russian technicians began joining a Soyuz spaceship with its booster rocket and American astronauts continued rehearsals for the U.S.-Soviet space mission set for Tuesday.

Wilson Inflation Remedy To Limit Pay Hikes

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson announced an anti-inflation plan today that imposes a ceiling of 13.20 a week on pay raises for the next year for British workers.

Wilson, acting to curb the worst inflation rate in Europe of 25 per cent a year, told the silent, packed House of Commons there would be no increases for those earning more than \$10,000 a year.

He rejected as "not realistic" a request from the trade unions for a general price freeze to accompany the pay curbs. But he said plans to phase out subsidies that reduce the cost of food would be delayed.

Rabin Doubts Quick Accord

BOONN, West Germany (AP) — Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin today ruled out another agreement with Egypt any time soon, telling a news conference "there are no magic deadlines."

"It's a process of negotiations. We are in the middle," Rabin said at a news conference in the West German capital.

Rabin warned against expectation that an accord can be settled in one meeting or by a certain date.

Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger was arriving in Bonn late today for talks with Rabin on Saturday, and the prime minister said: "I expect many outcomes."

But he said the negotiations must be conducted "very carefully, very patiently."

County Takeover First Feared

Lake Mary To Begin Talks On Wilco Buy

LAKE MARY — The City Council has authorized Councilman Harry Terry and Martin Bacon Sr. to begin talks with Wilco Utilities on the possibility of the city purchasing its water and sewer plants in Greenbush.

Terry recommended the action, noting strong rumors that the Seminole County Commission is trying to buy the utility. "We can't lay down and play dead," Bacon said, adding, "If we do, Lake Mary will be trapped." The city in recent weeks signed an interlocal agreement with the County Commission to have Wilco Utilities serve the new Scott Electronics Plant.

Included by the county within the agreement was a provision that the county would receive all "grants-in-aid" given by developers free of charge in the event it purchased the utility system.

An identical section guaranteeing Lake Mary the same right was ordered stricken from the agreement by the County Commission.

Terry, recommending investigation of the possibility of a city

purchase, said he is not sure the city has a chance of getting it or if the city can even raise the funding necessary for the buy. "But, we should try," he said.

In other business with utilities, Terry reported some 200 customers of the city's newly acquired water system have paid their first utility bills to the city.

Since yesterday was service cut-off day for those who had failed to pay their bills, Terry said the delinquency period has been extended for 10 days. He said customers who have not posted service deposits may arrange with the city to pay half this month and the balance in August.

Mayor Walter Sorenson named Terry and Council member Lillian Griffin to a special committee to look into the possibilities of getting water for firefighting purposes to Lake Mary Elementary School.

The action came after a motion by Council member Virginia Mercer to create a citizens advisory committee to look into the possibility of opening roadways into Lake Crystal for the Fire Department died for lack of a second.

Griffin had earlier reported to the Council that opening all streets into the lake would not be feasible. She noted some areas, such as Seventh and Lakeside would be difficult and costly, up to about \$1,500, to open while opening Floyd and Ridge Road into lakes would be easier, but cost about \$1,000 each.

Sorenson said the volunteer fire department's plan was to pump water directly from the lake to fires and Mercer said the department's particular concern is the lack of adequate water for firefighting purposes if a fire occurs at Lake Mary School.

The Council took no action on Mercer's report that the fire department is willing to provide its own labor to open the streets.

Griffin said the labor involved was not the only consideration, rather a goodly amount of fill dirt would be needed.

Bacon said opening the streets by raising trees could destroy the environment and cause the washout of soil into the lake.

Possum Slim Pleads Guilty, Released In Friend's Custody

TAVARES (AP) — A 106-year-old man who said he would "hate to end my time on this earth in jail" after the shooting death of a neighbor has pleaded guilty to manslaughter and been released in the custody of a friend.

Ed "Possum Slim" Myers of nearby Sorrento originally was charged with second-degree murder in the death of neighbor Louise Stewart, 51.

But Thursday, a defense attorney and prosecutors told Circuit Judge W. Troy Hall Jr. that they had agreed the interest of justice would not be ill-served "if the frail, old man was allowed to plead guilty to the reduced charge of manslaughter."

As Myers steadied his shaking hands on a cane, Hall ordered a pre-sentence investigation and permitted the social security recipient to remain in the custody of long-time friend Oscar Robinson.

Tornado Touches Down

TITUSVILLE (AP) — A tornado that first touched down behind the police station and then skipped through town resulted in scattered property damage but no injuries, officials say.

Police spokesmen said the twister struck this Florida East Coast city near the Kennedy Space Center at about 5:30 p.m. EDT Thursday.

The tornado came no closer than 15 miles to the site of next Tuesday's launch of the American portion of the U.S.-Russian space flight, space agency officials said.

Police spokesman Charles Ball said no injuries were reported but several homes and garages had roofs and windows damaged by winds and uprooted trees.

Release Bid Fails

PENSACOLA (AP) — An attempt by The Rev. H.K. Matthews to regain his freedom pending a July 23 sentencing on an extortion conviction has failed.

Attorney Paul Shimek, representing the black civil rights leader, argued Thursday that Circuit Judge Kirke M. Beall had illegally revoked the minister's \$20,000 bond, resulting in the Wednesday night arrest of the Rev. Mr. Matthews.

Shimek contended that although a jury found Matthews guilty June 10 after a two-day trial, the judge had not formally found him guilty.

Comparison Survey Under Way

Hospital Rate Hike Probable

Seminole Memorial Hospital trustees were told yesterday that room rates may soon rise again for the second time this year.

Hospital Administrator Bob Besserer warned trustees that a survey of rates charged at Central Florida hospitals is under way.

"You who have been trustees know what's coming next," said Besserer, adding that trustees will be asked to "do something at the next meeting."

Asked if a hike in the price charged for rooms is imminent, trustee Andrew Carraway said, "I imagine. Bob mentioned it."

Chairman John Evans said rates at the Sanford facility are "still the lowest in Central Florida."

At present, a day's stay in the ward is \$45, a semi-private room \$55 and \$60 for a private room.

Historically, Besserer runs a survey to determine if Seminole Memorial's rates are in line with other Florida hospitals. If they're lower and hospital funds are dwindling, Besserer asks trustees for an increase.

Earlier this year, an increase was granted. Two increases were put into effect last year.

Besserer also presented a report by the State's Joint Commission on Accreditation. The hospital received a "whole bunch" of criticisms from the Commission, according to Carraway.

And Evans directed Besserer to report on ways to correct negative findings at next month's meeting.

Carraway said none of the criticisms were serious enough to "endanger anyone's health."

"Some criticisms are valid. Some are not," Besserer said.

Vote Tightens Mayor's Reins

Energy Issue Covered By Smog

The energy legislation sought vainly by Congress these many months, if it is to be indeed "comprehensive," must have two objectives — to conserve the fuel supplies now available and to encourage development of new energy sources.

The controversial bill proposed by the House Ways and Means Committee focused on conservation measures, eventually missing the mark, and disdained realistic incentives for increasing the production of domestic oil and natural gas and perfecting alternative energy techniques.

The political instincts of Congress are befuddled unhappily in the energy puzzle by the overlapping uncertainties of the economy, environmental issues and public opinion.

Fearful of creating huge profits for the oil companies, the House Rules Committee refused to allow amendments to the House bill to decontrol domestic oil prices, despite industry claims that price ceilings discourage exploration and development of new fields.

Fearful of arousing the ire of their constituents, House members stripped the legislation of proposed tax levies on gasoline aimed at reducing consumption.

And fearful of being bamboozled in an area where they concede a lack of expertise, some representatives refuse to believe that there really is a crisis in energy.

Frodded finally by Ways and Means chairman Al Ullman, congressional leaders agreed to seek a compromise with President Ford to end a five-month deadlock over energy strategy. The Oregon Democrat stated the fact clearly. "This is too important for politics," he said.

Mr. Ford, cheered by his discovery that the 94th Congress is not "veto-proof," after all, can be excused for publicly chastising the lawmakers. But the President is equally powerless to act without congressional cooperation.

It should be apparent on Capitol Hill, as well as in the White House, that the American people are going to pay in sacrifice and in hard cash for the goal of energy independence, whether it be through Mr. Ford's import fees or higher taxes or higher uncontrolled prices.

Used wisely, the energy supplies available can carry the nation until it improves its productivity of proven nuclear power, expands its access to fossil fuels and explores the potential of solar energy.

Mr. Ford and Congress must put aside their differences and get the energy campaign back on the right track.

A Poor Example

We don't dispute the contention of our federal lawmakers that their increasing office workload frequently distracts them from the pressing job of running the country.

But their solution counter to the professed goal of Congress to cut government expenditures and reduce the massive budget deficit that threatens to give new fuel to inflation.

The House recently voted to increase staff allowances for its members by \$2,500 a year and to increase by 50 per cent the authorized number of paid trips home for representatives.

Now the Senate has approved a proposal giving each senator up to an additional \$10,000 a year to hire additional aides. Present allowances for staff personnel range from a generous \$392,250 for senators from the smallest state to \$751,900 a year in the largest — California.

Even by the most conservative estimates, the congressional effort to reduce the distractions to legislative productivity bears a price tag upwards from \$15 million a year.

High Cost Of Foreign Deadbeats

It passed totally without public note the other day, but the Soviet Union actually made a payment toward its World War I debt to America.

Yes, by jingo, you read right. True, the \$12 million Russian check was 60 years past due, and is merely a nibble of their \$72 million outstanding loan, but surely mass celebration is in order. Host the colors. Wo! waka gramma. Anytime America is repaid anything is time for whoopee.

Actually, Russia is not the only nation making some restitution for American generosity in the war against the Kaiser. From time to time Greece and Finland also pay installments on their obligations of the period. Otherwise, though, the United States receives nothing, Original American loans in World War I totaled \$12 billion and, with interest, have since doubled, yet only crumbs of the total will ever be repaid. Seventeen nations are still owing France, Italy and Britain, refuse outright to repay a single copper.

But if there is a lesson here concerning the risks and barren fruits of international generosity, some in this town wonder if it will ever be learned. Even now, say a few grumbling members of Congress, the United States is continuing to make massive loans around the world with little hope of fair return. Sen. Harry Byrd of Virginia says foreign nations have currently accumulated at least \$22.8 billion in U.S. credit of which they will not in some cases and can not in others repay. Rep. Jack Kemp of New York adds that the charity in the best times is of dubious merit, but is damnably nutty in periods when the chess is hard.

Byrd and Kemp are among a small group of federal lawmakers who periodically call for legislation about the merits of lending money without attaching collection guarantees. Their efforts are studiously ignored. Complaining in Congress about the foreign debt is of a class with complaining about the public debt — a preserve of those hardy enough to withstand the snickers of their fellows.

Byrd points out vigorously that taxpayers who are now contributing \$100 million a day in interest on the national debt are tired of having both interest and principal ignored on most of the foreign debt. His protests, however, are greeted with snores.

In fact, the snores are not overt insults; rather they represent the congressional consensus that even were there a will there would not be a way to collect on the bulk of the foreign debt. That debt, including World War I, now totals more than \$50 billion, and as a practical matter is largely an accounting of money that is gone forever. The World War I sum has been a moot issue for years and is kept on the official books only because no one in authority has ever seriously tried to have it removed.

Food Stamps Are Costly First Aid

Much the same thing is happening to the food stamp program as has happened to the Social Security system.

Born in the Great Depression, Social Security was intended to provide a minimum income for those no longer working or unable to work. Its purpose was to serve of dire poverty among the elderly, the disabled, the widowed or orphaned.

Since then, of course, for millions of Americans Social Security has become their sole retirement income rather than merely a supplement to other income or savings. As every working person knows, payroll deductions needed to pay for steadily increasing Social Security benefits have soared to the point where many Americans are paying more in Social Security taxes than in income taxes.

Likewise, food stamps were originally conceived as a food-purchase subsidy provided by the federal government for families or individuals below a certain level of income. Since 1971, enrollment in the program has risen from about 9.4 million people to nearly 20 million and its cost is expected to reach \$6.5 billion in the fiscal year that began July 1.

How fast we have departed from the original concept of the program is shown by the recent ruling by the U.S. Court of Appeals in Washington invalidating the formula on which food stamp payments are based. The action was taken in response to a class-action suit brought by nine low-income families, the City of New York, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the National Welfare Rights Organization.

"For a family that needs a loaf of bread, the offer of a slice is a poor comfort," said a three-judge panel, ordering the Agriculture Department to come up with a new formula that allows food stamp recipients to purchase "a nutritionally adequate diet."

Most families probably go along with this, just as they have gone along with the idea that Social Security should provide every American with an adequate standard of living—assuming that we can agree on what is "adequate" in either case.

But while the Agriculture Department is liberalizing its eligibility requirements for those who really need food stamps, it is long past time for it to tighten up its procedures to exclude those who do not need them.

Congress has passed a temporary law banning stamps for students claimed as dependents by well-off families. Just the other day, however, the Senate Agriculture Committee was told that the department's complicated schedule of deductions is allowing many middle-income families to qualify for government help in paying their grocery bills. Expenses that can be subtracted from gross income include such things as federal, state and local taxes, Social Security taxes, medical costs over \$10 a month, child care payments, tuition fees, rent or mortgages payments and union dues and alimony payments.

Except that the hands of the top men in our government are so tied by our interpretations, corrective action may be psychologically impossible.

Buy Indian Jewelry With Caution

But outside the Southwestern United States where some regulations are used to control the sale of Indian jewelry the rule for buyers is, "Be Careful."

William R. Lancaster, writing in "The International Turquoise Annual" offers some suggestions for determining the quality of the jewelry you own or plan to buy.

He suggests that the piece be studied through a 10-power hand lens, if possible.

If your piece is handcrafted, study the detail of the silverwork. Joints should be even and well-soldered. The design should be consistent with a solid appearance.

"Study the turquoise in the piece. Is it well cut? Do the stones match well? Does it fit snug in the setting?" You also

will want to study the matrix and color of the stone.

"A detailed design done well took someone a lot more time than a plain or sloppy one. You have to go by logic. It's your own weapon," Lancaster points out.

And he cautions, "For every conceivable opportunity, you can bet that some unscrupulous fast buck artist has found a loophole."

It is not our intent to prevent you from buying Indian jewelry, but only to urge you, the consumer, to use caution, knowledge and good sense when making your purchases. This is a field in which prices have rapidly increased in recent years and continue to rise at a fast pace.

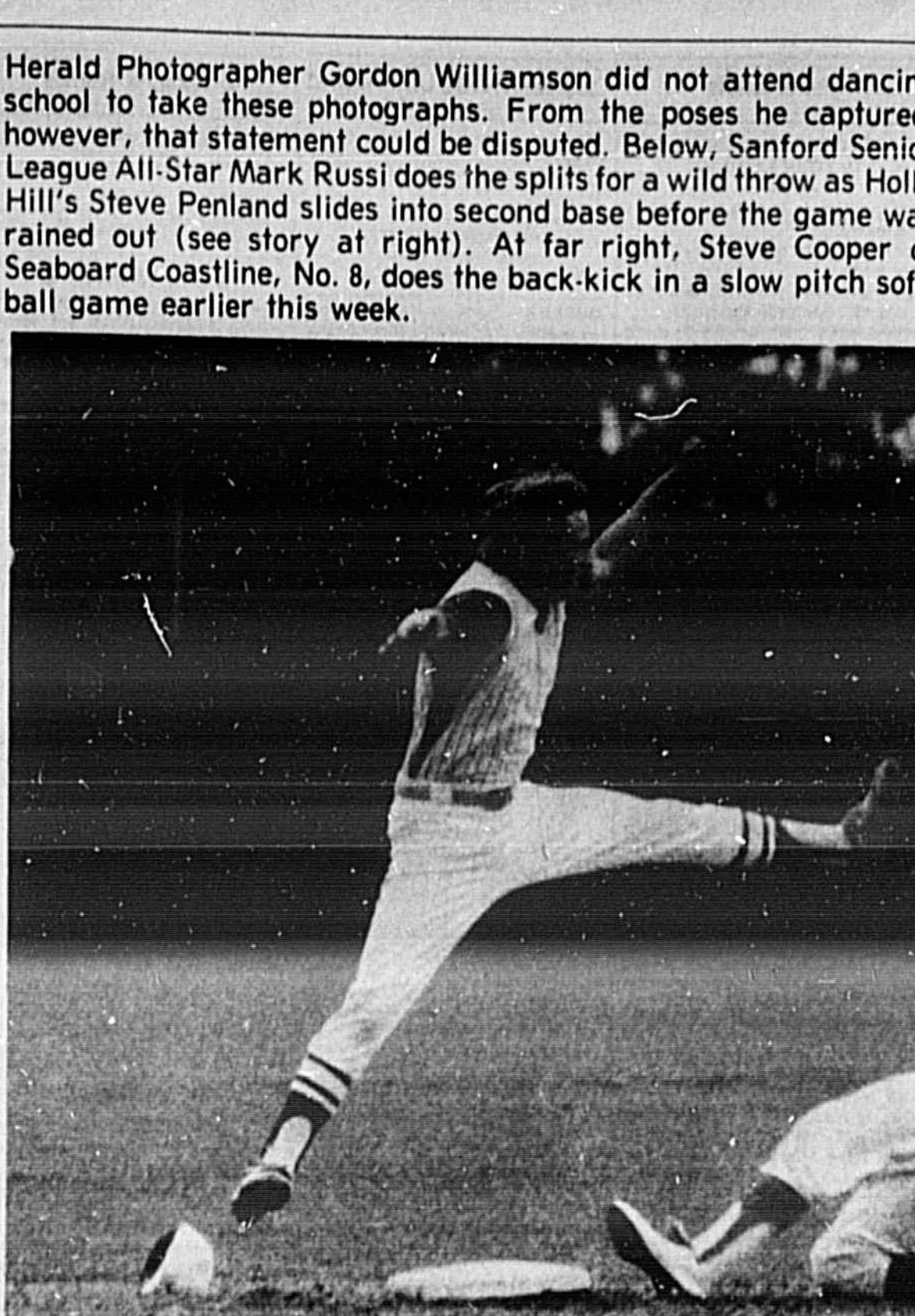

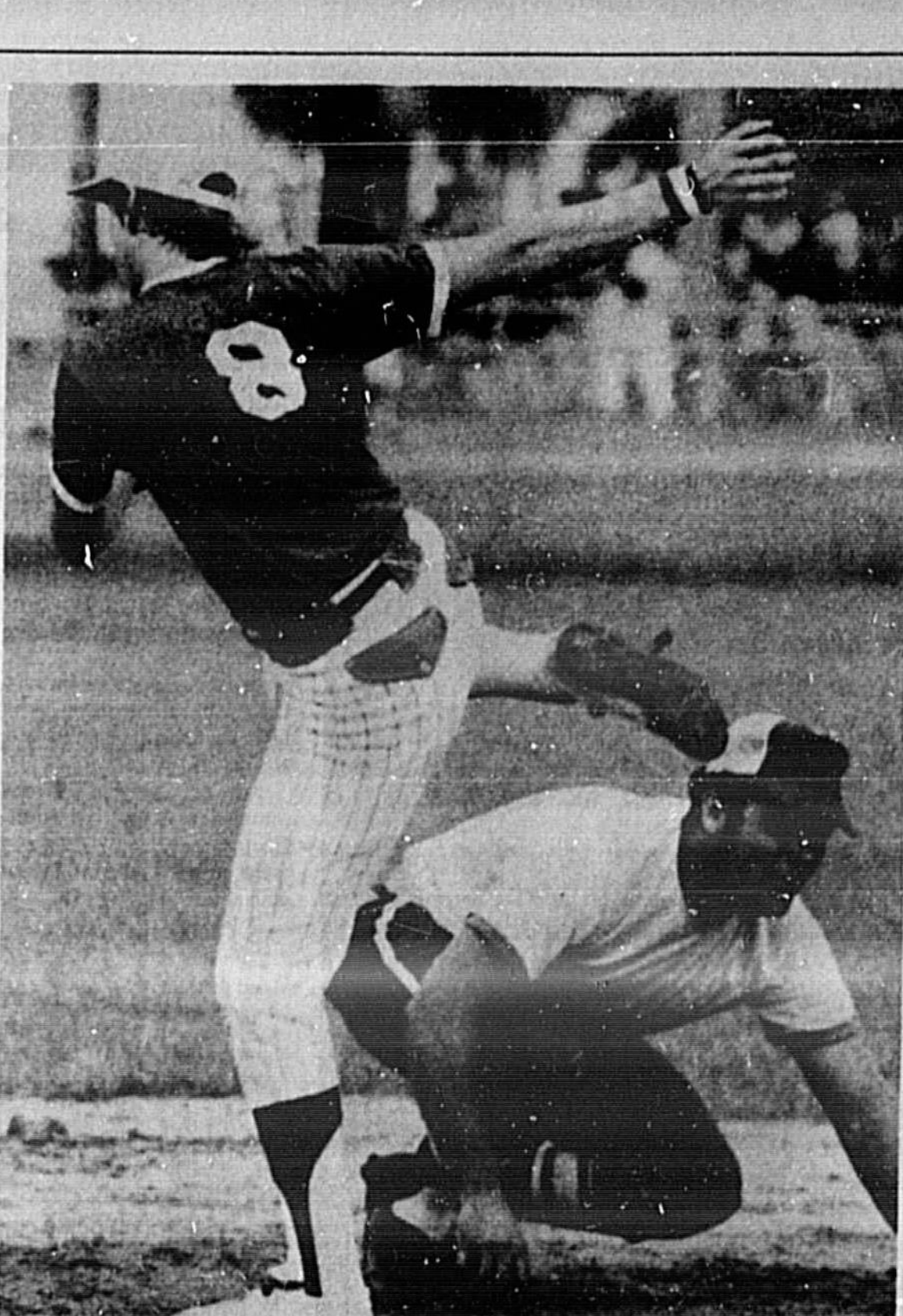

Scotland's Huish Bursts Into British Limelight

CARNOSTIE, Scotland (AP) — There are more than a few differences between a weekend golfer and a top tournament professional. Race To The All-Star Break

The least surprising reserve named Thursday was Milwaukee's Hank Aaron, named to his 28th all-star squad and his first as an American League. The Brewers' designated hitter was eighth in voting among AL outfielders. Aaron was selected to 24 in the National League with the Milwaukee Braves (setting out an all-star game in 1962 with an injury) and was traded to the Brewers last winter after surpassing Babe Ruth's record 714 career home runs. If he plays Tuesday night, he'll tie the record of 24 all-star appearances by Willie Mays and Stan Musial. Aaron said he was proud to be chosen, but said he was not sure whether he would be able to play because of an injured shoulder. Oakland's Claudell Washington and Cleveland's George Hendrick were also selected by Dark as reserve outfielders, despite the fact they didn't even show up among the fans' top 12 choices. The remaining two backup outfielders are Boston rookie Fred Lynn, who managed fourth in the voting as a written candidate, and Kansas City's Hal McRae, sixth in the balloting but chosen over the Texas Rangers' slump-ridden Jeff Burroughs. Lynn and first baseman Mike

Hargrove of the Rangers were the only runners-up in the voting who were named to the AL roster by Dark. Catchers Ray Fosse of Oakland, Carlton Fisk of Boston and Ellie Rodriguez of California were 2-3 in the voting but Dark opted for fifth-place Bill Freehan of Detroit as his No. 2 man. The New York Yankees' Chris Chambliss and Baltimore's Lee Maye were 3-4 among first basemen but were next two in line. Carl Yastrzemski of Boston and George Scott of Milwaukee — got the nod from Dark. Similarly, Dark bypassed Oakland's Sal Bando and Cleveland's Buddy Bell to pick rookie Dave Chalk of California at third base and chose Chicago's Bucky Dent over runner-up candidate Robin Yount of Milwaukee for reserve shortstop. The manager of the world champion A's has plenty of "home-grown" talent with which to work. Oakland uniforms will be on seven of the 28 players, the fourth straight year that the three-time world champions have outnumbered the remaining 11 AL clubs.

Before the recent successes, the Tigers had suffered through losing streaks of four, six and five games. The Boston Red Sox nipped the Texas Rangers 8-7; the Minnesota Twins stopped the New York Yankees 6-3 and the Baltimore Orioles turned back the California Angels 5-3. Vern Riffe teamed with Bob Reynolds for an eight-inning and Jack Pierce belted a home run to help the Tigers beat the Royals. Pierce walloped his homer in the fourth to tie the game at 2-2 and the Tigers scored their winning run in the fifth with the help of Ron LeFlore's baserunning. LeFlore led off the fifth by beating out a chopper to third, stole second, moved to third on Gary Sutherland's groundout and raced home on Leon Roberts' bouncer. Ruffe, 8-5, gave up two unearned runs before leaving in the ninth with one out and a man on second. Reynolds came into the game and left the potential tying run stranded. "There's really no answer for our slump and now our winning streak," said Detroit Manager Ralph Houk. "That's how baseball goes. We were playing real close ballgames in the slump. We were in all the games but we couldn't get the hit at the right time."

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Three Philadelphia Phils, two Pittsburgh Pirates and one player from each of six other National League clubs were chosen today by Manager Walt Alston as National League All-Stars for Tuesday's game against the American League All-Stars at Milwaukee. Philadelphia selections were outfielder Greg Luzinski, the league leader in home runs and runs batted in, and second baseman Larry Sanguillet of Dave Cash and Manny Sanguillet was named backup for starting catcher Johnny Bench of Cincinnati, and outfielder Al Oliver of Pittsburgh's other reserve player. The remaining six reserves are Tony Perez, Cincinnati, and Bob Watson, Houston, first base; Bill Madlock, Chicago, third base; and outfielders Reggie Smith of St. Louis, Bobby Carter of San Francisco and Gary Murer of Montreal. In addition to Bench, the Reds have second baseman Joe Morgan, shortstop Dave Concepcion and outfielder Pete Rose in a starting lineup that includes St. Louis' Lou Brock and three other Los Angeles Dodgers, who also have three men on the nine-man pitching staff, are Steve Garvey II, Ron Cey, 3b, and Jimmy Wynn, outfield. Today's reserve selections left the New York Mets, San Diego and Atlanta with only pitching staff representation on the NL team. PITTSBURGH (AP) — No offense, Joe DiMaggio; it was just another night's work for Willie Stargell. "Milestones are to be enjoyed once your career is over," Stargell said after his 36th career homer tied him with DiMaggio for 24th place on the all-time major-league list and secured the Pitt-

burgh Pirates' 4-1 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers Thursday night. In the only other game in the National League, the Chicago Cubs defeated the San Diego Padres 3-1. The Montreal-Atlanta game was postponed by rain. "I know I've got two games tomorrow and that milestones aren't going to be much help," Stargell said after the Pirate victory. "When you're playing you just have to grind it out," he added. Stargell grounded it out against the Dodgers with a run-scoring single that broke a 1-1 tie and a two-run insurance homer off Dodger reliever Mike Marshall. The victory was the 10th in 13 games for the Pirates, who moved six games ahead of the idle Philadelphia Phillies in the National League East. The Dodgers dropped 10 games behind the first-place Cincinnati Reds in the West. Cubs 3, Padres 1. Ray Burris stopped San Diego on eight hits and Chicago scored a pair of unearned runs in the second inning en route to victory over the Padres. With two out in the second inning, Manny Trillo walked and Steve Swisher doubled. Burris then grounded to shortstop Enzo Hernandez, who threw wild past first as both runners scored. Burris had a three-hit shutout going until there were two out in the sixth inning. Bobby Tolson and Willie McCovey both singled and Dave Winfield followed with a run-scoring double.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP) - The National Football League will shrink next year's 12-team status of 15 years ago if players were allowed to jump freely among teams, says Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

Rozelle, who concludes his testimony today, was the final witness for the league Thursday in a lawsuit brought by 15 players to abolish the Rozelle Rule.

Rozelle, like other league witnesses, said the draft of college players and the option compensation rule serve to spread out football talent and keep a competitive balance in the NFL.

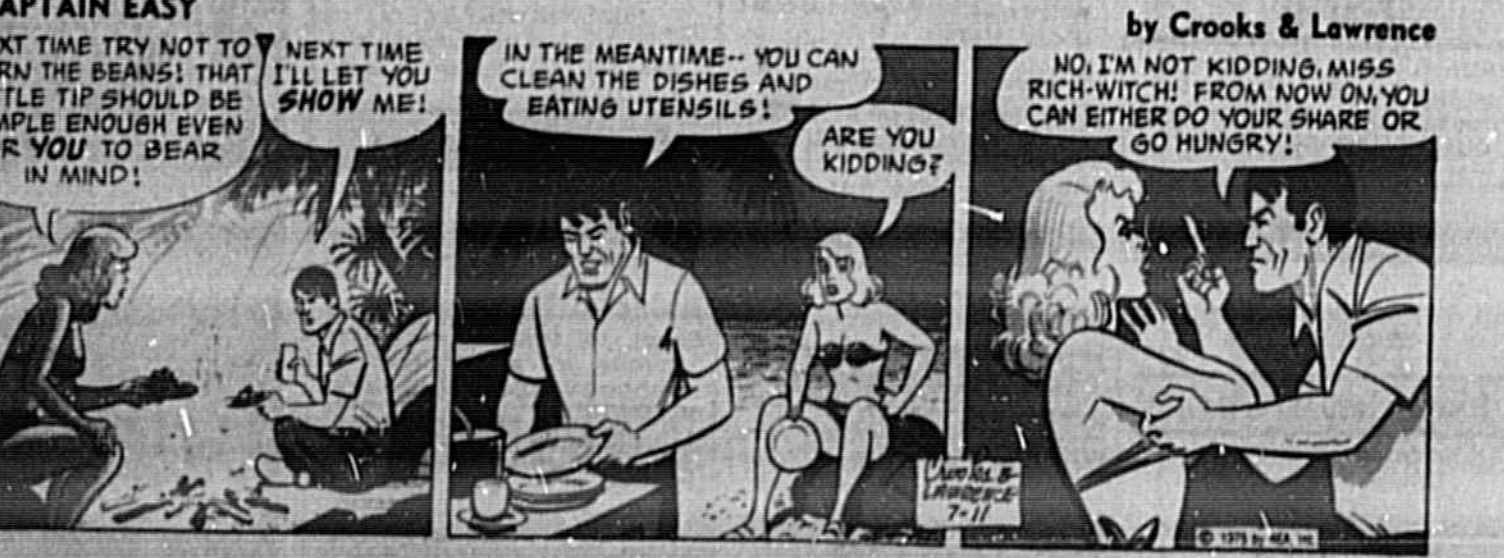
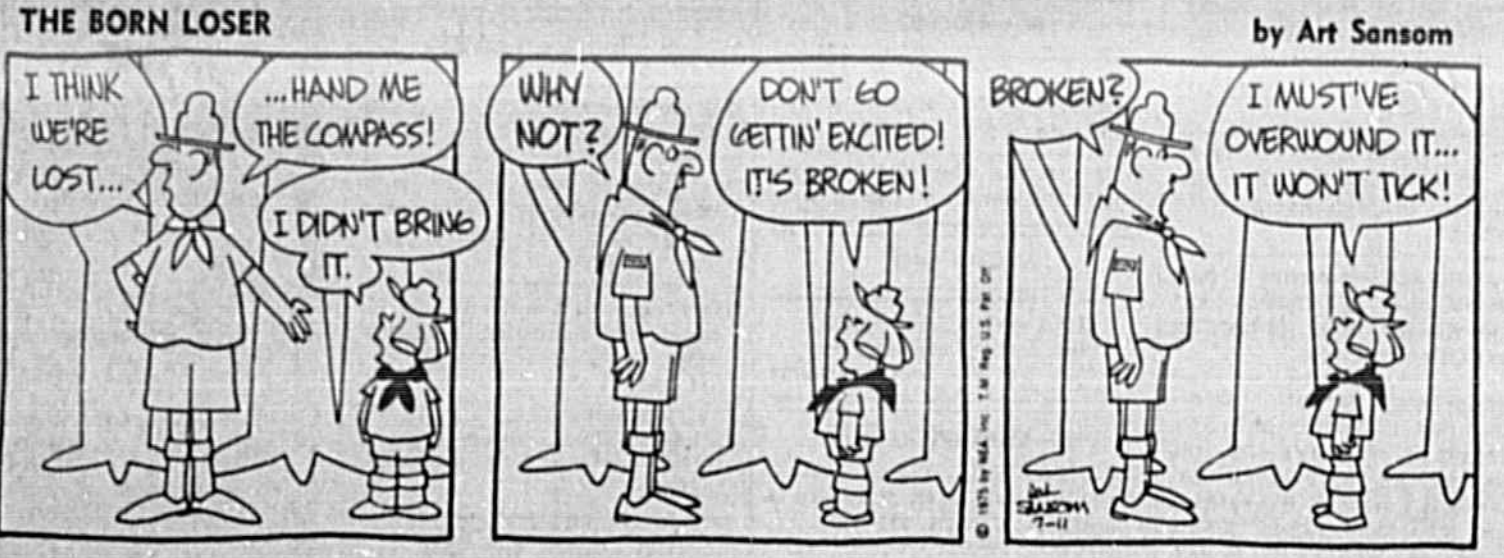

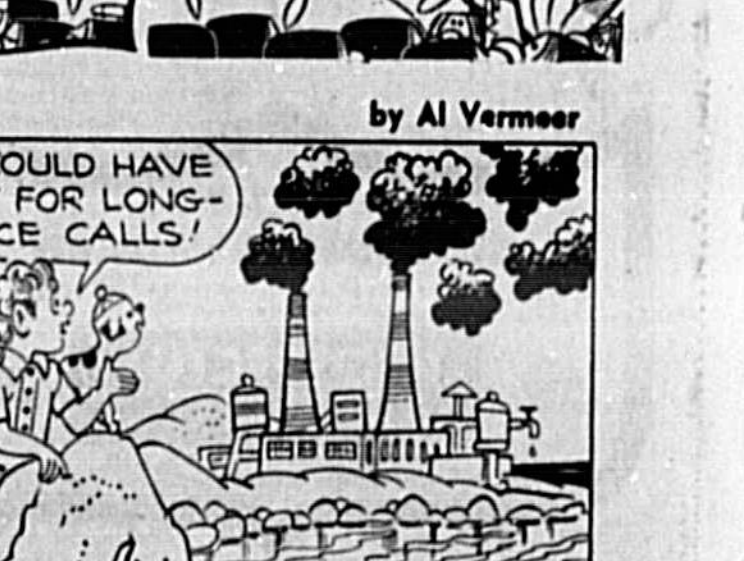

No Big Hike Seen Proposed Budget Balances

By GLENN McCASLAND Herald Staff Writer

The City of Sanford has proposed the 1975-76 budget and in the process dropped the millage rate without measurably raising property taxes.

City commissioners hammered out details of the proposed \$3,671,088 budget in an all-day work session Friday—\$111,214 more than the original figure proposed by City Manager Warren "Pete" Knowles.

The budget will be revamped for presentation to the Commission for final consideration and passage of a resolution approving the package.

Knowles said the adjusted budget would be redrawn over the weekend and the corrected copies back in the hands of commissioners early this week.

The commissioners trimmed and pared the proposed budget until they had a new millage rate of 6.33 mills for the new year. (The millage includes 5.63 general and 0.7 debt service.)

This is a decrease from the current millage of 8.47 and stems from a decision to whittle debt service millage.

The action, if given final approval when the full budget comes up for consideration, will find Sanford city residents paying very little more in city property taxes than last year before the county announced its property assessment millage.

The commissioners, seeking a solution for the millage change, used an estimate of \$20,000 for an average home and a 30 per cent evaluation increase by the county.

Pointing out that with \$5,000 allowed for homestead exemption, the millage would be figured on \$15,000 times \$6.97 per \$1,000. This would come to \$104.55 per household, Knowles said.

Then taking the \$20,000 figure again and multiplying by \$1.50 (based on a mill-and-a-half for

Vocal Proponents Out-Number Foes Public Hearing On Hoop Net Use Draws Large Crowd

Vocal proponents of the fish-catching hoop nets Friday night out-numbered, out-shouted and out-clapped opponents to the use of the nets in Seminole County when the two factions met in a public hearing in the Sanford Civic Center.

Approximately 200 persons, mostly commercial and sports fishermen, attended the public hearing moderated by officials with the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

The hearing was called to record the public's reaction to the Commission's law allowing hoop nets to be used in the St. Johns River between Volusia Bar and SR 46.

The one hour and 45 minute meeting sometimes dissolved into

shouting matches between speakers and the audience, and several times Maj. Bill King had to demand quiet of the audience.

A straw ballot was circulated among the audience to register sentiment on the use of hoop nets and to record the number of sports or commercial fishermen in attendance.

Lt. Jim Reed said the ballots would be tabulated next week and taken along with the minutes of the meeting, to the July 25 Game Commission meeting in Jacksonville for evaluation.

The public hearing was requested by the organized Friends of the St. Johns (FOSJ). Major King said that prior to the Commission passing the law, which was effective July 1, hearings had been held, but no opposition had surfaced.

Officials with the FOSJ oppose the use of the nets because they say the nets would cause a hazard to boat navigation because

To Disallow Bargaining By Principals Suit May Be Filed Against State

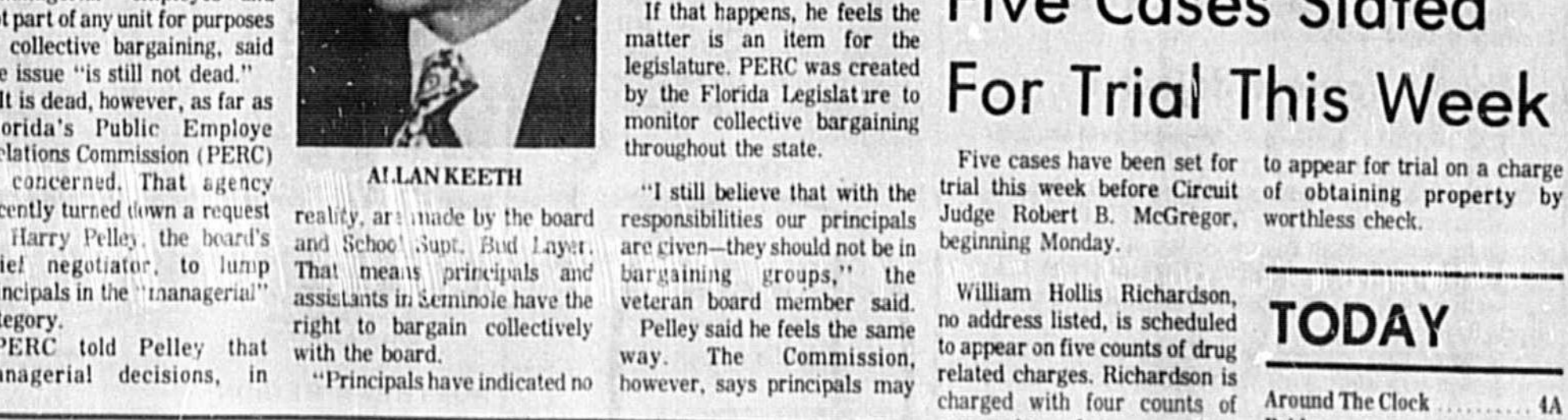

Seminole County may ask the state Superintendent and School Board Associations to join in a suit against the state to disallow principals and their assistants collective bargaining rights, a School Board member told The Herald.

Allan Keeth, who all along has considered principals "managerial" employees and not part of any unit for purposes of collective bargaining, said the issue "is still not dead."

It is dead, however, as far as Florida's Public Employee Relations Commission (PERC) is concerned. That agency recently turned down a request by Harry Pelley, the board's chief negotiator, to jump principals to the "managerial" category.

PERC told Pelley that managerial decisions, in



ALLAN KEETH reality, are made by the board and School Board. Ed Layot, That means principals and assistants in Seminole have the right to bargain collectively with the board.

"Principals have indicated no desire to organize," Keeth says. He also pointed out the two agencies that may be asked to join Seminole aren't allowed as entities to file a suit.

"But individual members as such can," Keeth said. He said the idea to file a "collective" suit was suggested by Pelley.

But there may be a snag. "Other districts have shown no interest that they want to go along," according to Keeth.

If that happens, he feels the matter is an item for the legislature. PERC was created by the Florida Legislature to monitor collective bargaining throughout the state.

"I still believe that with the responsibilities our principals are given—they should not be in bargaining groups," the veteran board member said.

Pelley said he feels the same way. The Commission, however, says principals may

Men Save Baby's Life

Johnson told Gilbert that Pelino and Johnson found the child in the pool, located
