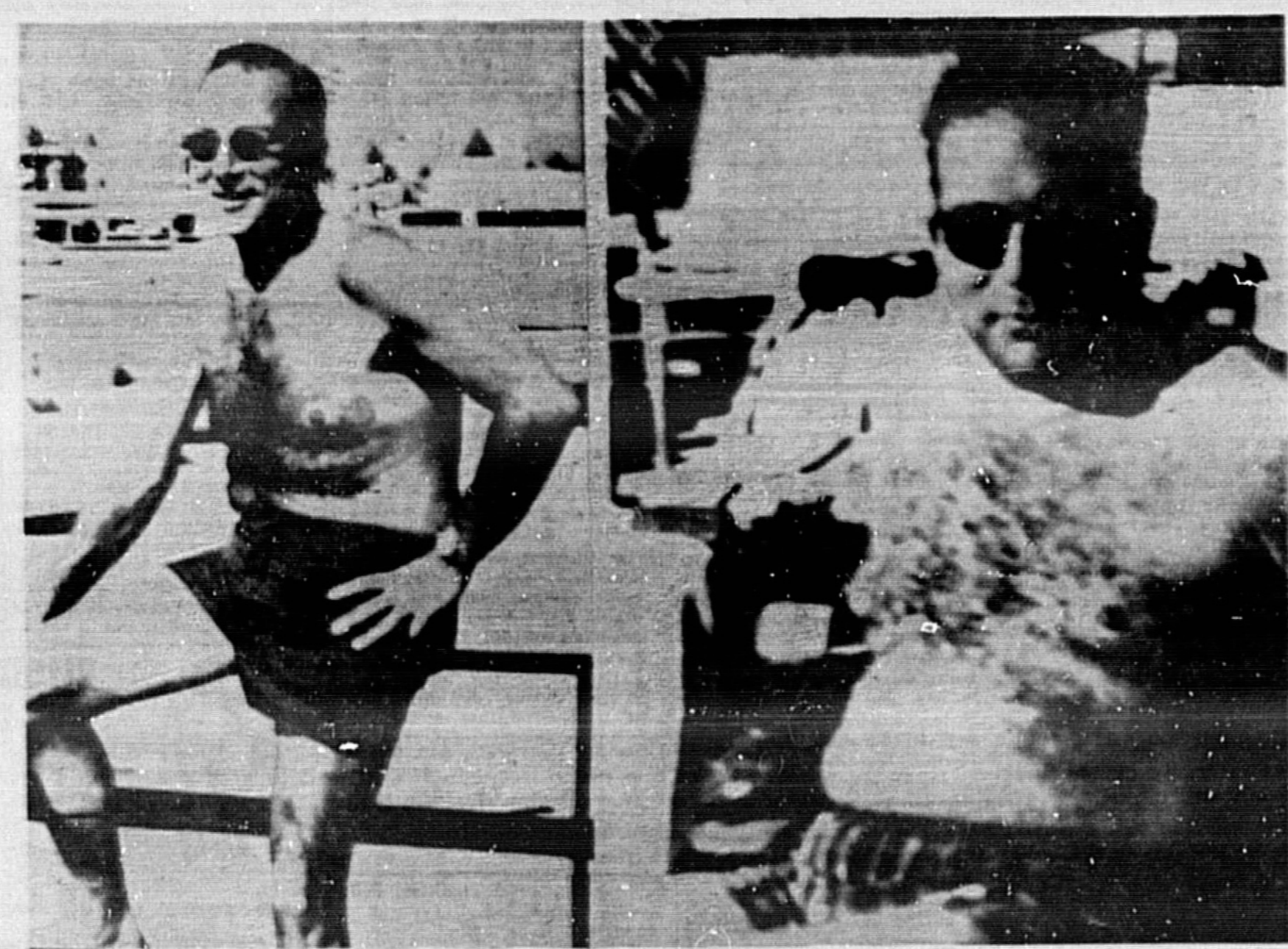

## Wells Suspected Of Contamination

Water supply for the Greater Altamonte Springs area may be in danger of contamination because of the Lake Orienta flooding condition, in the opinion of County Sanitation Val Robbins.

Two old drainage wells, possibly 40 years old, at the south end of the level of the lake, Robbins stated. He continued that these drainage wells are less than one-half mile from the supply wells for Altamonte Springs and environs.

Water from the drainage wells should be purified if seeping through the earth. Robbins said, but there is a possibility that a great amount of water could pass and not be purified.

## Mrs. Thompson Faces Life In Prison Will Appeal Murder Verdict

Mabel Frances Thompson, attractive mother of four, sits alone in a county jail cell today, faced with a life sentence in the women's state prison at Raiford.

Her only hope is that her attorney, by successful motions to the trial court, or that a higher court will uphold an appeal from her conviction of murder in the first degree, with mercy.

Under Florida law, a first degree murder conviction carries a mandatory life imprisonment penalty, if accompanied by a mercy plea by the jury, which occurred in this case.

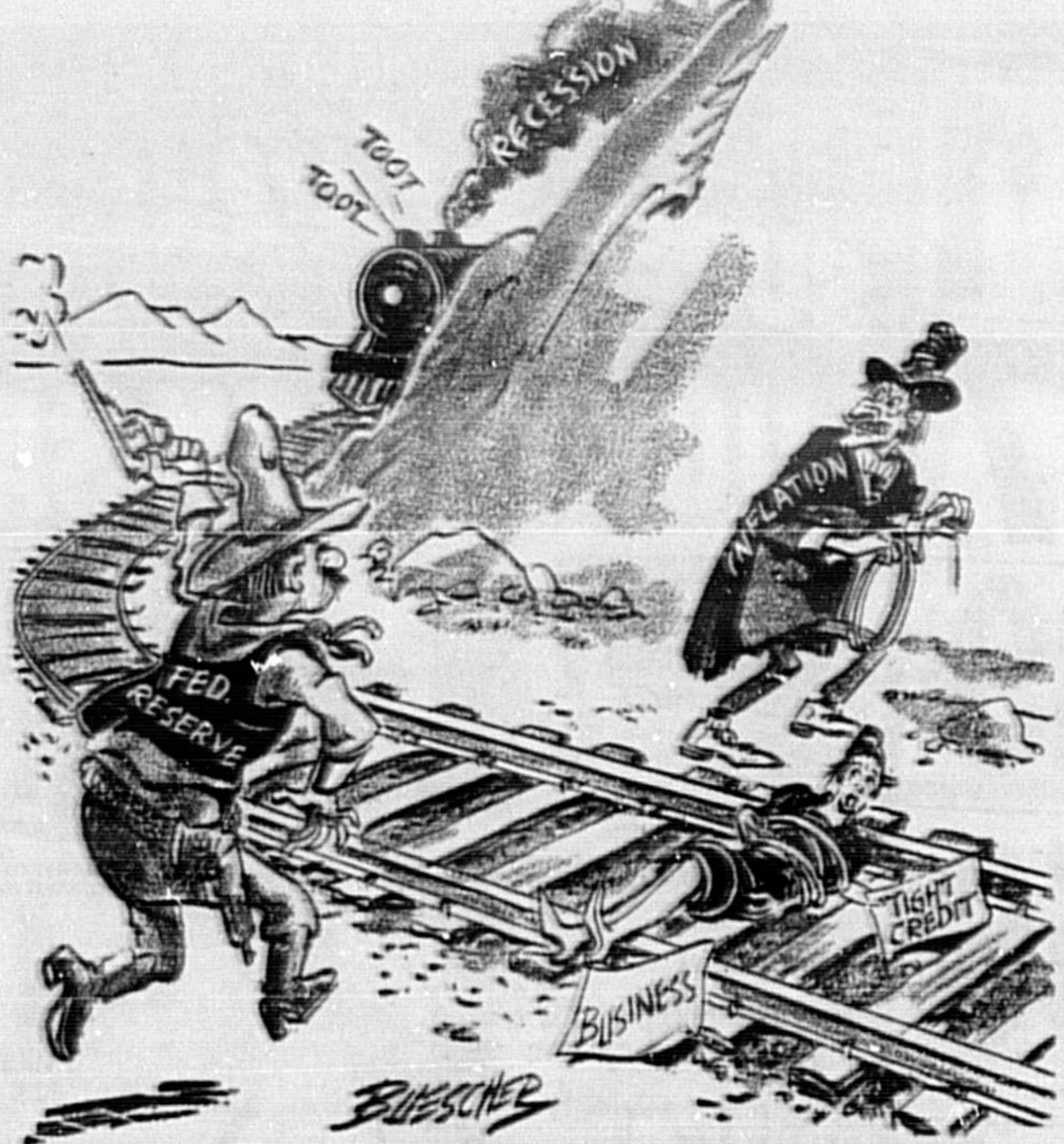

WAKULLA SPRINGS, Fla. (AP) — "He's blowing his commission."  
That's what Ed Ball, employee of the county, said as he arrested Sam Smith, according to County Commissioner Sam Smith.  
It came this week in a small-town tug-of-war over a dirt road.  
Wakulla County Commissioner Smith claims the old Arnan-Wakulla Station Road is a county road heavily traveled by his constituents and he wants it kept open.

Pagan was deputized by Taff in 1963 after he complained of needing power to cops with troublemakers around the Ball property, said Taff. His deputy commission was signed by each of the five commissioners, including Smith. Smith said the commission would be revoked.  
The disputed road once was the only direct route between Arnan, a community northwest of Crawfordville, and Wakulla Station, some 10 miles to the east. The fastest route now is U.S. Highway 918.

## Schooling Of State Aides Is Costly

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Free courses for university employees before Florida's taxpayers \$1.5 million a year, Administration Secretary Samuel Tucker said Tuesday.  
Tucker said he would tell Chancellor Robert Mautz during a meeting today the free courses violate legislative intent to find such benefits for state employees.  
"We can't find no justification for allowing free courses to be continued by the universities as a prerequisite," Tucker said. Mautz said the question of whether free courses were included in a statute against pre-requisites is one of interpretation. He said the \$1.5 million cost of the free courses was not excessive.  
In the case of the employees, the state is returning to the state in terms of better jobs and is consistent with the board of regents decided at its Monday meeting to fight Tucker's directive. Mautz said that although Tucker issued the directive almost two months ago it has not been sent to the university presidents.

Shake in a jar 1½ teasp. flour and ¼ cup of water for each cup of pot roast liquid. Add to liquid and cook to thicken, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper. It's a savory one-dish meal.

Cool and cut into bars; remove with a small metal spatula. Wrap in transparent plastic wrap. Store in tightly covered tin box.

Meanwhile, cook noodles according to package directions and drain. Return noodles to cooking pot; add cheese sauce; toss well. Add onion-bacon mixture and toss again. Serve at once. Makes four servings.

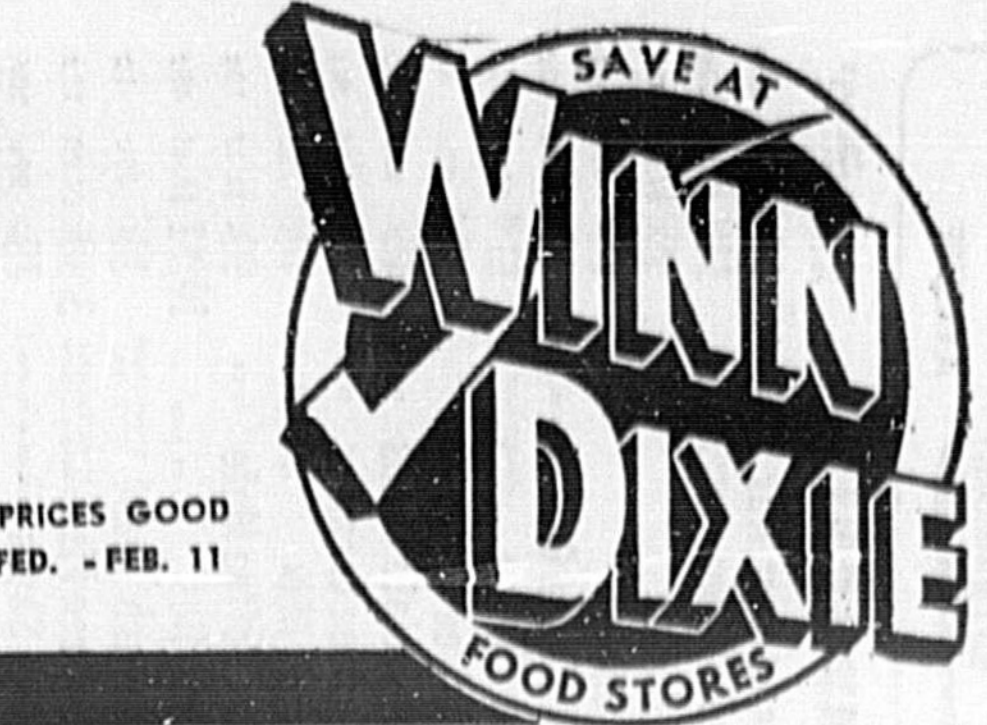

## Private Capital Hits Slums

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP) — An unusual breed of suburban taking root in a slum neighborhood here, with private capital being used to crack the kind of concrete shackles that are straggling the nation's crowded cities.

A small patch of redeveloped property, originally intended for expensive apartments, is being prepared instead for single family homes at remarkably modest cost. It's a test project that has raised as many questions as it has attracted compliments, and one which local officials believe is unique in the nation.

Under its terms, moderate-income families have been able to buy three-bedroom homes for as little as \$17,500, because investors haven't demanded high profits. The homeowners gain too, because laws and regulations haven't been sacrificed to leave room for more dwelling units.

The concept of single family dwellings replacing 19th century tenements and shabby tenements is not a new one. What is new, is having investors volunteer funds when profits are minimal. Ground was broken last March, and since then about 40 families have moved into homes which are expected to number 115 by 1971.

The project, called Parkview, is being built by the Mortgage Guarantee Insurance Corp., of Milwaukee. It's on a 21-acre tract that MGIC bought from the Milwaukee Redevelopment Authority for the bargain-basement price of \$147,000. The sale conditions were that 83 homesites would be built by the end of 1970, and that each would be on a lot of at least 1,900 square feet.

The homes, in five different models, originally cost between \$17,500 and \$21,000. But in December, MGIC announced that due to rising construction costs the price of subsequent units would range from \$17,700 to \$22,500.

MGIC estimates that under normal market conditions its \$20,300 model, even if built in a suburb where land prices are comparatively low, would cost about \$27,000.

Parkview's budget prices are partly due to \$1 million in loans, at low interest rates, contributed by the Savings and Loan Council of Milwaukee, which represents 49 lending institutions. The benefits of the low interest rate and MGIC's requirement of as little as a \$3 down payment, are making it easier for many buyers.

Besides Parkview's 7 1/2 per cent interest rate, many of the dwellings are being sold under Section 235 of the 1968 Federal Housing Act. Its provisions include the \$3 down payment and government financing of up to 85 per cent of the interest.

Parkview's investors say their prices contain no profit other than that needed to meet the original investment. MGIC has insured the council's loan, and said it may realize a small profit on that aspect of the arrangement.

Max H. Karl, head of MGIC, said other firms should consider Parkview-type projects as a civic service, even though it involves investment which would have drawn a higher return elsewhere.

"This is a bargain that brought homebuyers back into the inner city," he said.

But Richard Perrin, director of the Milwaukee housing authority, and other redevelopment experts can't help but wonder whether the precious inner city space wouldn't be better used for multi-family living structures.

They also question whether Parkview can attract the type of occupant who has a permanent income and the resources necessary to assure that the new dwellings will not have deteriorated into slums again in 10 or 20 years.

Edward W. Smyth, the real estate dealer who is handling sales for Parkview, agrees that the development would lose much of its appeal without assurances that it will contain the type of permanent tenants associated with the suburbs.

Smyth added that as low as the down payments and the monthly payments are, they are too steep for most slum dwellers.

# Mix Answer On Feb. 28

School Supt. John Angel said at his Wednesday news conference the effect of Gov. Claude Kirk's announced intention to withhold state funds from counties which would use the money to help finance forced busing of students would not be known until after U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) Feb. 28 decision on the county's compliance with the civil rights act.

HEW will announce in three weeks the results of a Washington hearing into Seminole County's school desegregation plan. Hearing was sought by the HEW to determine if the predominantly white facilities.

This busing would create a financial problem and could lead to chaos if county if forced to lay-off teachers and curtail other educational aspects in order to find money for the additional busing, John Evans, board chairman, has said.

Seminole could conceivably be involved in a federal court suit after the results of the compliance hearing is announced and this could bring along a federal court decision affecting county schools in same manner as Volusia and Orange counties.

Angel said he didn't think the court would force the county to undertake busing this late in the school year.

"I can't imagine any judge changing the school set-up with only two months or so left in the school year," Angel reflected.

The superintendent said he looked favorably on the Sanford School Improvement Board's inclusion of Crooms High School in the five city beautification projects.

"Personally, I would jump on it hook, line and sinker, but we still have to determine what consideration the effect of the HEW's desegregation decisions.

Crooms is a predominantly all-black school.

Discussing the county's football stadium situation, Angel said he would favor schools leaving the Sanford Municipal Stadium for the city for 25 years.

City is wanting to lease the stadium to the school board for \$1 a year with the schools assuming costs of maintenance.

Schools are presently using the stadium under an agreement of paying a specified amount per game and city is funding upkeep costs.

Angel said school board would consider an offer from the city regarding the disposition of the stadium.

Hobby resigned as sheriff Nov. 7, 1968, when called to Governor Kirk's office at Tallahassee.

Electronically in 1962, Hobby was suspended during his first term by then Gov. Leroy Collins after a federal grand jury indicted him (Hobby) on charges of accepting bribes in moonshining. A hung jury caused a mistrial and in 1969 a judge dropped the charges. He continued in office until his 1968 resignation.
